Princeton continues to be safe

Princeton RCMP Sgt. Dave Clare presented the 2009 Third Quarter crime stats at the November 2nd regular meeting of Town Council.

Princeton RCMP between July 1st and September 30th recorded a total of 316 incidents.

That figure is down from 419 incidents during the same period in 2008 and all categories were down from the same time frame in 2008.

Comparing year-to-date figures, a total of 840 general occurrences

were recorded - down from 1,019 in 2008.

By category, Assaults were up slightly year-to-date as well as Mischief-related incidents.

All other categories, including Fraud, Theft from Vehicles, Break and Enters, Disturbances and Vehicle Thefts were down with Break and Enters recording the largest decrease of 19 incidents so far this year compared to 45 from a year ago.

CMMC secures mining equipment

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced November 5th that the mobile mining equipment fleet for the Copper Mountain Project has been ordered with deliveries to match the mining plan.

The Company has placed orders through SMS Equipment for more than \$70 million worth of Komatsu mobile mining equipment to be delivered in stages over the next 18 months. Preproduction mining is scheduled to start in June 2010.

The equipment package includes 2 Komatsu PC8000 Electric Hydraulic Front Shovels with 42 m3 buckets, 13 - 240 Ton Komatsu 830E-AC Electric Drive Trucks, 1 Komatsu WA1200 Front End Loader, 2 Komatsu D375A Track Dozers, and 1 Komatsu WD600 Wheel Dozer.

John O'Rourke, Chief Executive Officer of the Company stated:

"We are extremely happy with the commitment that the Company has received from SMS Equipment and Komatsu in making this transaction work, and are looking forward to a long term relationship that will help the mine maintain favourable costs and high productivity."

Mill foundations work at the Copper Mountain Project is progressing well and concrete will continue to be poured through December 2009 to complete the building foundations in preparation for the erection of the building steel in the spring of 2010.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain is a Canadian resource company managed by an experienced team of professionals with a solid track record of exploration and development success. The Company's shares trade on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the symbol "CUM". Copper Mountain owns 75% and Mitsubishi Materials Corporation owns 25% of

The purpose of the proposed Pest Management Plan (PMP) is to manage problem vegetation on right-of-way transmission corridors, distribution networks, and their access roads within the FortisBC service area. The FortisBC service area is located in proximity to the communities of Creston, Crawford Bay, Kaslo, Slocan, South Slocan, Nelson, Castlegar, Salmo, Trail, Fruitvale, Grand Forks, Greenwood, and Midway, in the Okanagan Valley from Osoyoos to Kelowna, and in the Similkameen Valley from Princeton to Keremeos.

The pest management methods proposed for use include physical (non-chemical) treatment methods (selective slashing, mowing, pruning and burning), a biological control agent (fungus), cultural control methods (planting low growing trees and shrubs and compatible tree species, encouraging agro-forestry, and tree growth regulators/inhibitors when and if registered), and the use of pesticides (herbicides). The common name (and examples of trade names) of the pesticides proposed for use under this plan include: dicamba (Vanquish), glyphosate (Roundup, Roundup Weathermax, Glyphos, Vantage, Vantage Plus), and triclopyr (Garlon 4 or Garlon Ultra). Application methods include: foliar, soil, wick/wipe-on and cut surface, using backpack, wick/wipe-on applicator, squirt bottle, injection tools and handgun (power hose and nozzle).

The proposed duration of the PMP is from January 2, 2010 to January 1, 2015.

A draft copy of the proposed PMP and maps of the proposed treatment areas may be examined online at www.fortisbc.com or by contacting the Applicant listed above.

A person wishing to contribute information about a proposed treatment site, relevant to the development of the pest management plan, may send copies of the information to the applicant within 30 days of the publication of this notice and before December 21, 2009.

After building the Mini Chef Restaurant, forming a bus service supported by the Town and BC Transit, after building Mary Anne Apartments and Mary Anne Court, the new offices, and Vermilion Court, one might think Community Services was ready to rest. That was not the case. Times just kept on changing.

In 2000, Community Services was asked by BC Housing to consider managing Aspen Court, a low income residential complex. Community Services agreed.

In 2003, Mary Anne Apartments was torn down and replaced by Mary Anne House and in 2005, Victoria House.

Community Service began running an Adult Day Care program in Vermilion Court, and expanded its transportation service. When the adults under their care became too old to work in the Mini Chef Restaurant, it was sold to Belaire Restaurant, and the former employees became part of New Beginnings, a recreational club.

Joyce Fraser, founder of Community Services, and Administrator during all of those hectic years, chose to retire. She was not the first of the longtime workers to retire. As each of the workers went into retirement, a party was held for them at Vermilion Court.

Lynn Pelly, who had kept the accounts straight for many years, became the new Administrator.

Changes kept coming. When Public Health Services was

moved to Princeton General Hospital, the former offices became the new home of Community Services. The house on Halliford was sold, and Community Services moved its office to the new location by Rotary Park. No doubt Pelly was glad she no longer had to climb that flight of stairs to the accounting department.

This year, Community Services took on one more job: administering the Cindy Parolin Sheltered Housing Program.

During all of these years, the task of running Community Services became increasingly complex. Community Services deals with many different government ministries. In 2006, it ran the gamut of accreditation, which can be a clerical nightmare. Each year, each service provided must be reviewed, and each year there is an audit. Community Services has never had a bad report nor an unacceptable audit. It has been a success year after year.

To quote Lynn Pelly in her 2009 Executive Director's report, "The agency has grown but still aspires to the same objectives set out many years ago when the Society's first constitution was signed. The mission statement remains: 'To promote, develop and coordinate comprehensive, integrated, community based services and affordable housing options in support of the disabled and elderly population of the community, ensuring access to a high quality of life.'"

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Club remains financially healthy

The past year has been a good one for Princeton Golf Club. Total income for the year (January 1st to October 31st) was up \$31,030.38

from the same period a year ago. Club Memberships, green fees, carts, rentals and the RV Park all recorded increased revenue with

only the restaurant and pro shop down from 2008.

Expenses for the past year were also up (\$24,214.18 from 2008)

with the only decrease coming from administration costs.

In his report to members, accountant Chris Kelley showed the club had total assets as at December 31, 2008 of \$1,772,310 – up slightly from the previous year.

“The club is in a very healthy financial position generating sufficient cash flow to meet all financial obligations.”

The unaudited total revenues for 2008 sat at a record \$884,304, up from \$852,882 a year before and \$594,633 in 2006.

The largest increase in revenue from 2008 was from regular memberships, which were up \$13,565. RV park rentals increased \$8,409.32 from the previous year.

On the other side of the coin, the restaurant cost the club \$5,253.79 more than it did in 2008 and the pro shop made \$2,195.58 less than the year before.

To address these issues the Golf Club circulated a survey to members, which stated it was intended to “assist the Board of Directors in

making some decisions on the future of the golf club.”

Questions on the survey clearly targeted the Pro Shop and Restaurant with a secondary focus on additional staff (starter and/or course marshal) and capital project priorities.

Golf Club returns executive

Princeton Golf Club hosted their annual general meeting November 1st at the Curling Club.

President Larry Evans, Vice President Murray White, Treasurer Tara Atkinson and Secretary Muriel Petersen were all re-elected.

Keith Simpson, Richard White and Wally Wallace were all elected to two-year terms.

Lloyd Wilson was elected to a one-year term.

Mike Monteith and Wayne Anderson each have a year remaining in their two-year terms.

Al Deans was presented with the first annual Princeton Golf Club Order of Merit for his years of dedication to the Club.

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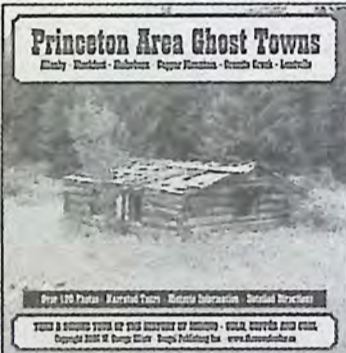

Village issues meeting highlights

Village of Keremeos Media Highlights from the November 2nd regular meeting of Village Council:

- Council heard from Staff Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, Oliver and Osoyoos Detachment Commander and Rural Area Manager, and Terri Kalaski, Community Safety and Crime Reduction Services, Penticton RCMP, regarding the Restorative Justice program, and a request for Council to proclaim November 15 to 22, 2009 as Restorative Justice Week in Keremeos.

Ms. Kalaski explained that Restorative Justice is an alternate way of dealing with people engaged with the RCMP due to criminal activities including theft and mischief. It is a process by which volunteer facilitators help to bring the criminal and the victim together to discuss the impacts to the victim of the crime, and help the criminal understand the implications of their criminal behavior on individuals. The program is being expanded into the Keremeos area and volunteers will be sought who must be good listeners and are able to facilitate discussion to move the process forward for both the victim and the criminal.

Staff Sgt. Lozinski noted that the RCMP supports this approach to justice as the court system is not as effective as it could be and other approaches that could work to help people understand how their actions affect others are welcomed.

With two Village residents supporting the proclamation as per the Village's policy, Council proclaimed November 15 to 22, 2009 as Restorative Justice Week in the Village of Keremeos.

- Council considered the third quarter Budget Variance report and were informed that while the budget is close, the Village can expect a small surplus at the end of 2009.

- Council approved office closure hours during Christmas - the Village office will close at 12:00 noon on Thursday, December 24, 2009, and will be closed December 25 and December 28, will open from 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM on Tuesday and Wednesday, December 29 and 30, and will be closed on Thursday, December 31, 2009 and Friday, January 1, 2009.

- Council considered draft Terms of

Reference for a Green Advisory Committee. Various issues were discussed including the Terms of Reference potentially being too convoluted, too many rules could discourage people from participating, and uncertainty regarding how many people might be interested in volunteering for such a committee. Council agreed that the Terms of Reference would be further discussed at the November 30, 2009 Committee of the Whole meeting.

- Council considered a report on additional costs incurred while the Victory Hall external upgrades have been ongoing. While an additional \$27,000 worth of works has been required to bring stairs, landings, landing coverings and the handicap ramp into safe conditions, the Victory Hall upgrade project is still within budget.

Municipal spending growth in BC unsustainable
Operating spending growth continues to exceed population and inflation growth

As municipalities across the province consider property tax increases for 2010, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) released its second annual BC Municipal Spending Watch November 5th showing that municipal operating spending continues to outpace population and inflation growth by a wide margin.

The study found that between 2000 and 2007 (the last year data is available) municipal operating spending across BC grew by 44 per cent, while population and inflation grew by only 25 per cent.

Of 153 municipalities, 129 were unable to keep operating spending growth to population and inflation.

"This kind of spending is disrespectful to taxpayers and harmful to communities," said Laura Jones, CFIB's Vice President for Western Canada.

"It means property taxes and other municipal fees increase faster than the ability of residents and business owners to pay." If local governments had kept spending increases in line with population and inflation, taxpayers would have been left with an additional \$572 million in their pockets in 2007. Put another way, property taxes could have been 14 per cent lower, leaving families more money to save and businesses more money to invest.

Twelve of BC's largest municipal-

ities spent more than double (2.00) population and inflation growth: Prince George (2.89); North Vancouver District (2.82); West Vancouver (2.80); Port Coquitlam (2.73); Penticton (2.58); North Vancouver City (2.54); Langley City (2.30); Vernon (2.21); Chilliwack (2.21); Maple Ridge (2.13); Coquitlam (2.10); and Langley District (2.09). Prince George had the greatest improvement in fiscal sustainability since last year while Mission saw the largest deterioration.

The study finds that municipal wages are a substantial driver of municipal spending, with municipal employees earning 35 per cent

more in wages and benefits than they would make in an equivalent job in the private sector.

"This is a wake up call to taxpayers. It's time to demand more accountability from municipal governments—we have a number of recommendations including creating a Municipal Auditor General and restoring the business vote," concludes Jones.

Fight That Winter Fat

It seems everybody puts on weight during winter, especially belly fat. It's almost like we think we're bears, and we ought to stuff ourselves for the cold weather. Unless you are one of the fortunate few who never gains a pound no matter how much you eat, then you are among the majority of Canadians who eat way too much in winter. Along with the cold weather of winter, we encounter the feasting of Christmas and New Year's Eve celebrations. We celebrate with alcohol as well as with food, adding thousands of calories, and adding to our store of fat. Here's some good news: you don't have to go that route. You can keep your weight down just by following a few simple guidelines.

What really puts on weight, particularly in the waistline and belly, is carbohydrates. Carbohydrates are easy to identify. They are found in cereals, breads, cakes, potatoes, and anything containing sugar, especially cane sugar and corn syrup. Maple sugar or syrup are much harder to digest and therefore safer to eat.

Winter makes us want warm, comforting foods, so we turn to the rich desserts, like cakes, pies and puddings, loaded with sugar and starch (carbohydrates). Eliminate those from your winter diet, and you can keep yourself from gaining a lot of weight.

So what can we use as substitutes for those comforting rich foods?

Try the old reliables that satisfy hunger without a lot of useless sugars and starches that your body stores as belly fat. A good stew, a bowl of chili con carne, a plate of spaghetti and sauce, or a bowl of split pea soup is nourishing, but not fattening. When it comes to celebrations, focus on the main course and avoid the endless snacks and drinks. If you want a good social drink, without all of the calories, stick to tea, coffee, or old-fashioned cocoa (not the instant chocolate drinks loaded with sugar).

The other thing you need to remember about winter and weight is the need for exercise. You need to do things that move your body, like walking or sports, hiking or going to the gym. You can do exercises at home, or you can dance. If you have small children, build snowmen and forts, go sledding, or take them on nature walks. If you are a typical housewife, winter is a good time to clean out all of the closets and cupboards, wash walls, clean upholstery, and dung out the basement or organize the garage. The key is to keep moving.

So, what have you planned for winter to keep you healthy and guarantee a long life?

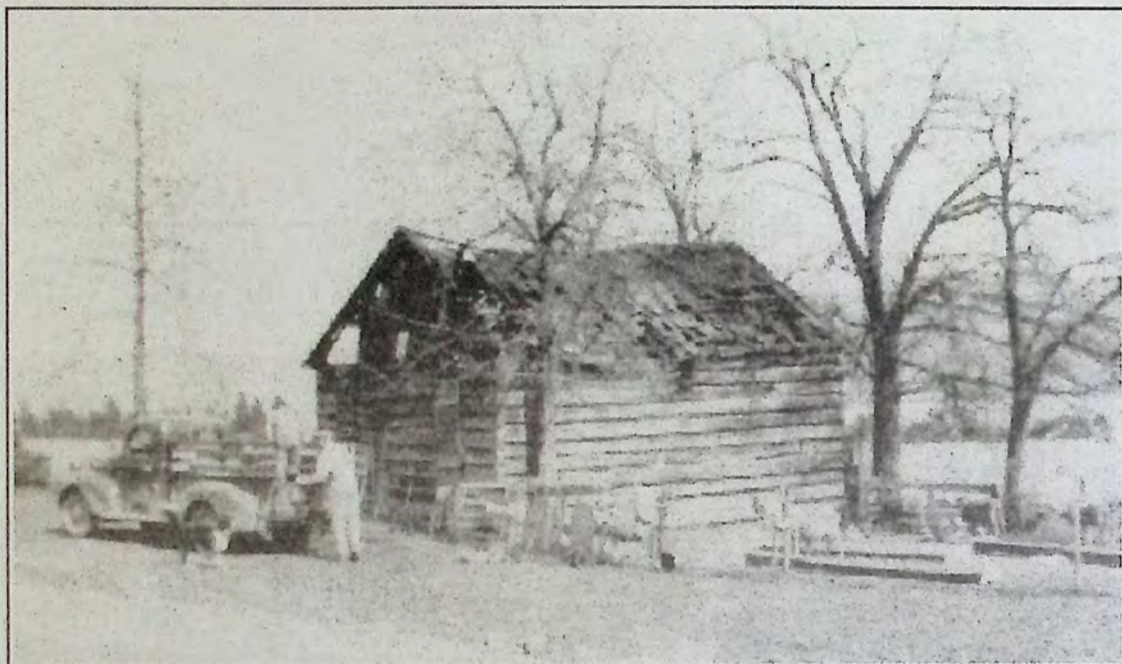

Susan Allison's Children - Part 2

Susan and John Allison's eighth child was a son. George was born at Westbank on October 27th, 1879. Living most of his life in Princeton, he married a widow, Mrs Violet Sadler. Three children followed, daughter Shelia, a son Glenn and finally another daughter called Colleen.

In 1948, George was taken ill whilst visiting Ocean Falls, he died shortly afterwards in Vancouver and is buried at Summerland.

Elfreda Flora Allison, commonly known as Freda, was born August 26th, 1881, the last of the children to be born at the family's Westbank home.

When staying with her uncle in Vancouver she met Major G. F. Holmes, an officer on an English ship, and soon was married. They returned to England and lived in Epsom Surrey. Subsequently, they had four sons - Patrick, Jack, James and Arthur, all of who were brought up and lived in the UK.

Freda died in 1961 and is buried in England.

In Princeton, on May 28th, 1883, Susan Allison gave birth to her tenth child, a son, Alfred. He married Isabella, "Bell" Martin who had a daughter from a previous marriage, but together they had twin daughters, Gladys and Grace, the latter of which was still born.

In time Gladys married Dave Archibald. Upon the death of his wife Alfred remarried Florence DuHamel. Having served in Europe during the Great War, he died of natural causes in 1954 and is buried in Princeton at the Allison family cemetery.

Number eleven was another daughter, Valeria Helen Grace, known as Grace, was born in

Princeton on November 17th, 1884. In 1902 she married H. H. Thomas, "Bert", who was brother to W.H. Thomas, "Bill", who was married to Grace's sister Caroline (Carrie). They lived at One Mile and had seven children; four girls - Constance (Babs), Phyllis, Teresa and Helen and three boys - Stephen (Bob), Charles (Bill) and Herbert.

On Christmas Eve, 1886, "Harry", Harold Archibald, was born in Princeton. In time he took over the land originally claimed in 1860 by Capt. Luard of the Royal Engineers and that later had been ranched by John Allison himself. Harry - like his brother, served during the First World War and for many years worked for the BC Forestry Service. He was married to Kathleen O'Maly in 1919 and they had five children, two sons - Harold and Ronnie and three daughters - Margaret, Susie and Betty.

Harold Archibald died in Princeton May 6th, 1951 and like his father before him is buried in the Cemetery at the foot of Castle Rock.

The penultimate child to be born to Susan and John Allison was, like the couple's fourteenth and final off-spring, a girl. Aurelia Angela, "Angie" to family and

friends alike, was born September 26th, 1889. Angie was educated in Victoria, but lived most of her life in Princeton. She married Henry McDiarmid and together they had nine children. First born Jean was followed by four boys - Hugh, Bruce, Jack and Alan. Freda came next and then boys Alistair and Dick before the last of the siblings, Beryl.

The final time that Susan gave birth was August 28th, 1892, when Alice Olivia Ashwick Allison was born in Princeton. On October 21st, 1911, in a ceremony officiated by the Reverend A. Langford, Alice married an employee of the Allison's, Si Perkins. During the next seventeen years together they had eight children.

Sadly, in 1928 her husband was killed by a truck and Alice and her family moved to Vancouver where she lived for the next twenty one years. In 1949, now remarried to one Edward Wright, she returned to the Okanagan and Trout Creek, Summerland, where she lived until her death on August 1st, 1971. A daughter, Alison, had been killed during the hostilities of the Second World War, but Alice was survived by husband Edward, son Rod and three of her daughters - Evadne, Elvie and Susie.

The Price of Freedom

You may have seen it recently on television: a Belgian family preserving the memory, in their country, of seven Canadian airmen who died on their property.

In 1944, a Canadian bomber was shot down while returning from a bombing run over Dusseldorf, Germany. The burning plane landed on a field in Belgium. The owner of the property erected a memorial to those fallen airmen and the family continues to keep the memorial, and its surrounding garden, in good condition.

Why did this family honour these

Canadians?

"They made a sacrifice for our liberty."

That seems like a very simple statement, but it is a statement summarizing why Canadians have gone into war zones.

There is nothing so precious as freedom. We Canadians have lived in freedom all during our history. We may worship as we choose, we may wear the clothes we choose, we can travel freely within our own nation. If we are law-abiding citizens, we need not fear our police force nor our military. We have

given ourselves insurance in case of job loss, we have medicare, social welfare, old age pensions. We are blessed among nations.

Canadians are still dying in an effort to help others achieve the freedom we enjoy. As this article is being written, 133 Canadians have given their lives in a distant land called Afghanistan.

They are in a country ravaged by war for the past two decades. They are trying to keep that country safe for ordinary citizens.

They are trying to prevent the continued on Page 22

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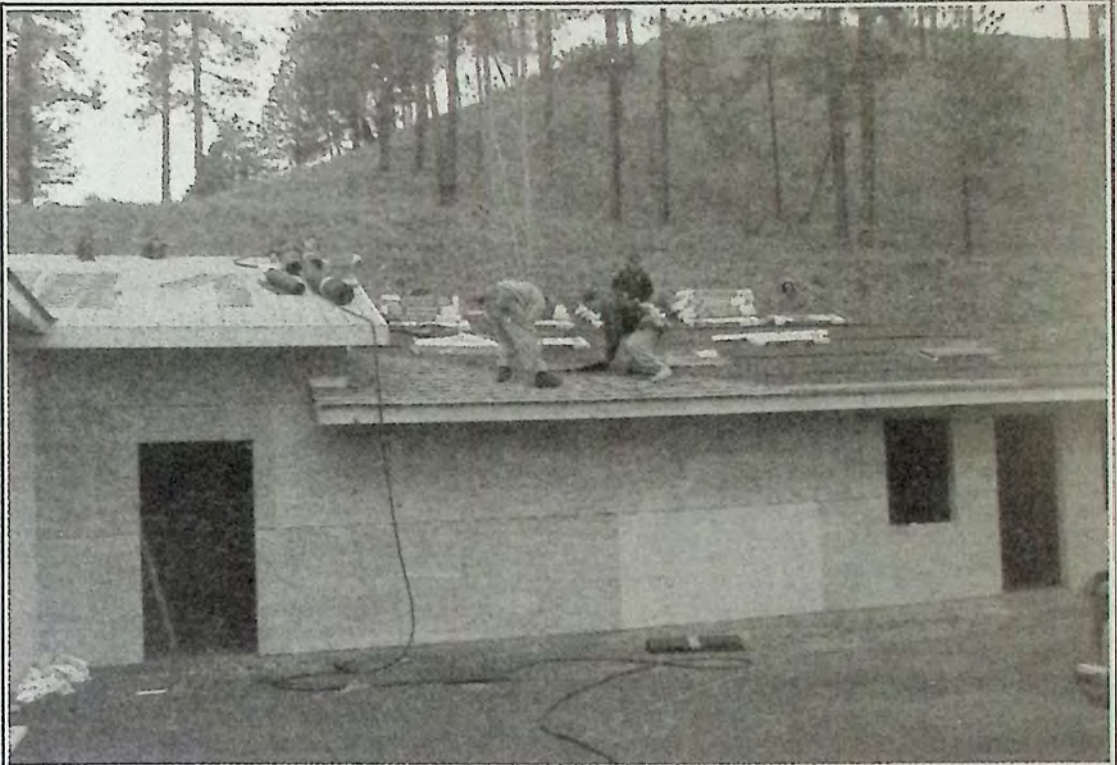

Pepperoni Pizza Pasta

(NC)—Looking for a new way to tempt the kids with a nutritious dinner they'll actually eat? Try this high fibre pasta dish disguised as a pizza.

- 1 pkg (454 g) Catelli Smart Spaghetti
- 375 mL (1-1/2 cups) sliced deli pepperoni
- 50mL (1/4 cup) finely chopped onion
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 500mL (2 cups) sliced mushrooms, optional
- 5 mL (1 tsp) each dried oregano and basil leaves
- 500 mL (2 cups) pizza sauce (approx)
- 500 mL (2 cups) shredded mozzarella cheese
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 50 mL (1/4 cup) Parmesan cheese

• Cook spaghetti according to package directions. Drain well. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (180 degrees C.)

• Slice all but 50 mL (1/4 cup) of the pepperoni into thin strips.

• Stir the pepperoni strips, onion, green pepper, mushrooms (if using), oregano, basil, pizza sauce, half of the cheese, eggs and Parmesan in a large bowl until well combined. Toss the sauce mixture with the cooked pasta.

• Transfer the mixture to a greased 9 x 13-inch (3L) baking dish. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and dot with the reserved pepperoni slices. Bake for 30 minutes. Let the dish stand for 5 minutes; slice and serve with additional warmed pizza sauce if desired.

Dump site rage or power tripping?

To The Editor;

In so doing, people would live up to this new honour system and it would free the attendants to supervise the customers and to direct them in proper recycling ways. I am sure that this move would be welcomed by the attendants as it would allow them to be more productive as well and also because it would remove the unjust doubts that could hang over their heads. Some people are doubters by nature.

If this is not suitable, I would suggest that a receipt be issued to all and not only to those who request it.

How Can We Help Them Remember?

Remembering what war is all about is essential for our young people, and for elected officials. At the same time, I realize the number of World War II and Korean War veterans are becoming fewer. People who were youngsters when those wars took place are now old age pensioners.

I can still remember many things about World War II and the Korean War. I remember our blackout curtains, the local militia, the endless news broadcasts from the front lines. I remember school chums whose fathers died in the war. I do not remember the war itself, because it affected me only as it affected my family and neighbours.

What I know about the war is related to my experiences as an adult, both from films and from what I saw while my husband was stationed in Europe with NATO forces.

I saw the devastation of Hiroshima after the bomb, and the Japanese people dying of radiation sickness. I saw it on film. Thank God I wasn't there to see it, smell it, and hear it, but isn't that really what experience is? When you really know what war is about, you see it, hear it, smell it, and sometimes taste it.

In Europe, I saw things most Canadians will never see, and I heard the stories of people who went through it. In the little village where we lived in Belgium, every baby had been bayoneted, and every young woman had been turned into a prostitute for the officers. Every young man had been interned to work in Germany. The village was about the size of Hedley. Try to imagine that!

We visited friends who lived in a village in France. Well, it had been a village at one time. There was the only house still standing,

although the village, now merely a crossroads, was marked with a sign. The rest of the village had been wiped out by the Nazi army because the villagers had shown tough resistance.

We saw the bunkers of the Maginot line which had been constructed to defend France. They had proven a big waste of money.

We visited the war memorial at Verdun, where the foundation of the structure is filled with the bones of soldiers who died there. The bones were dug out of the trenches, and nobody really knew who they were nor what country they were fighting for.

We went to the American war memorial at Bastogne where each column of the structure is inscribed with the names of soldiers who died driving the Nazis from the city.

I could go on to tell more stories about those kinds of places, but although they touched me, they were not the war, they were just reminders of what war is. They were not the experience of war. These places told about the cost of war.

The big question now is: how do we help our youngest people remember the cost of war?

We can thank the Royal Canadian Legion for hosting Remembrance Day each year, and for trying to teach our youngsters what war is all about, but is that going to be enough? As generations grow up and become even more distanced from the events of the past century, when does Remembrance Day become a meaningless ritual for them?

The real reason we need to remember is that spirit of 1945, which said, "Never again."

The world in 1945 was so weary of war that everyone wanted some way to avoid war. Nobody wanted any more wars. The United Nations was formed to address problems between nations, and to make it clear, throughout the

world, that the old idea of armies conquering nations and creating empires was not going to be tolerated any more.

Somehow, we need to remember the spirit of 1945, and the will to ensure *Never again*.

I believe movies are a great way to show youngsters what war was like in the twentieth century. Of course, today's wars, should we be stupid enough to engage in war, would be quite different from World War II or even the Korean War or Viet Nam. Each war has become more devastating. The weapons of today are horrendous compared with the weapons of the first half of the last century. I believe we need to show young people what war can mean today, as well as what it was in the past. Film makers have done a good job of showing the various aspects of war.

At the same time, I believe we have to remember what causes war, and how we can achieve peace, or the promise of "Never again" will not be fulfilled. How are we going to do that? I do not believe we can do that simply by continuing the rituals of Remembrance Day, as important as those rituals are. I believe it is time to do more. The slogan of Remembrance Day and of the Royal Canadian Legion is "Lest We Forget". For today's youngsters, who have never experienced much to do with war, the real cost of war will be easy to forget if we do not find new ways to make them remember.

return of a dictatorship that allowed no freedom of worship, no right of individuals to be anything but what the ruling dictators ordered.
Canadian soldiers have given

their lives to keep the peace in Gaza, Cyprus, Somalia, Bosnia, Rwanda, and now Afghanistan. When we hear the families of dead soldiers speak of their lost loved one, they mourn, but they also say "He (or she) believed in

what he (or she) was doing."

Nations have begun war for greed, power, expansion, religious domination, and the right to rule others. Canadians have never gone to war for those reasons. We do not honour our fallen soldiers simply because they were brave, nor because they were fighters. War is a horrible waste, and Canada has never begun a war.

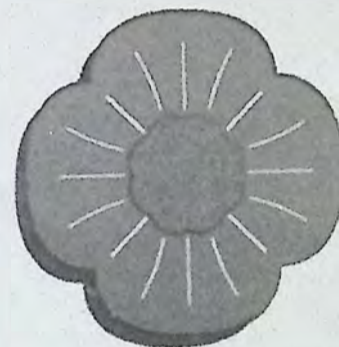
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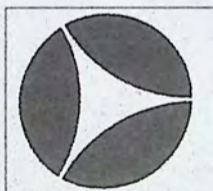
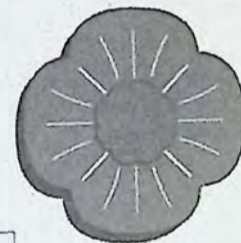
