Local air quality check begins

Town Council is in favour of having an air quality measuring device installed on top of the fire hall this spring. In a telephone interview with Ralph Adams of the Ministry of Environment, Council learned the machine will provide a baseline of data for downtown Princeton. The device, called a Partisol, is designed to measure particles in the air.

The Ministry of Environment pro-

poses a two year period of daily measurements. Adams said Council may have access to the averages in perhaps six months, but the most accurate air quality evaluation is based on one year, as particulate matter readings can change with the weather and with the seasons. Depending on measurements, further tests may be done.



The CT Scan campaign was a complete success! The goal; to

new state of the art CT Scanner for the Penticton Regional raise \$1.7 million dollars for a Hospital. Private individuals,

Auxiliaries, Service clubs and businesses all came together to donate the much needed funds.

Campaign Chair Walter Despot, said, "this is fantastic news for the 90,000 people in the region who will use the new CT Scan. Every dollar brought us closer to the goal. We want to sincerely thank everyone who made a donation towards this important campaign."

The South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation (SOSMF) officially launched the campaign last June to replace the current, aging CT Scanner at Penticton Regional Hospital (PRH).

The CT Scan is used up to 50 times each day for diagnostic examinations of the head, neck, chest, abdomen/pelvis and bones. Along with diagnosing infections, problems with the heart and strokes, appendicitis and internal injuries which cause bleeding, the new CT Scan will deliver a minimum of 40% less radiation.

This week, a medical team from PRH are visiting other major hospitals across Canada to see the new technology in CT Scans available, which will help them make the decision regarding the best machine for the Penticton Regional Hospital. The goal is to have the machine operational by August, 2010.

Ken Jaggard, Board Chair, said, "there are still many pledges outstanding and people will be continuing to raise funds for the CT Scan. We want to thank everyone who made a donation towards this incredible campaign and for helping us make sure our regional hospital has state of the art technology."

Approval in principle has been granted on an application for an initiative petition. The petition will be issued to proponent William Vander Zalm on Tuesday, April 6, 2010 and signature sheets must be submitted to the Chief Electoral Officer by July 5, 2010.

The Title of the Initiative is:

An initiative to end the harmonized sales tax (HST).

Summary of Initiative:

The purpose of the initiative draft Bill is to declare that the agreement between the federal government and the British Columbia government to establish a harmonized sales tax (HST) is not in effect. The draft Bill would reinstate the 7% provincial sales tax (PST) with the same exemptions as were in effect as of June 30, 2010 and establish the provincial sales tax as the only sales tax in British Columbia for the purposes of raising provincial revenue. The draft Bill proposes that it be effective retroactively to June 30, 2010. The Bill also proposes that the provincial share of HST revenues received between June 30, 2010 and the date of Royal Assent of the Bill that exceeds what would be collected under the PST rules as of June 30, 2010 would be reimbursed to British Columbians on a per capita basis.

Opponent Registration:

Individuals or organizations who intend to incur expenses as opponents must apply for registration with the Chief Electoral Officer by Monday, March 8, 2010. Registration applications for opponents are available from Elections BC.

Initiative Advertising:

Individuals or organizations who sponsor initiative advertising, other than the proponent and registered opponents, must register with the Chief Electoral Officer before they conduct or publish initiative advertising. Registration applications are available from Elections BC.

Who May Sign the Petition:

Registered voters as of Tuesday, April 6, 2010 may sign the Initiative petition. Individuals may only sign the petition once, and must sign the petition sheet for the electoral district in which they are registered at the time of signing. Signed petitions are available for public inspection.





Similkameen Sustainability Strategy makes progress

"We're at the bottom of the food chain and usually we're dumped on and have very little say in what we have to do," said Mayor Walter Despot at the January 30th Sustainable Similkameen Project panel meeting. Mayor Despot was describing the frustrations of local politicians regarding Federal and Provincial decisions which impact on local communities.

In Mayor Despot's opinion, 95 percent of local politicians work towards sustainability, however, they are hampered by Federal or Provincial regulations which are difficult to implement and take time, money and resources.

"Senior governments are going to break the taxpayer," said Despot.

Increasing local politicians' and residents' input into policy making is one of the areas that the Sustainable Similkameen Project panel is looking into.

Volunteer panel members also discussed the huge importance of volunteers in the community. Without volunteers, safety, security and tourism would be affected.

"What happens to a community if there are no cultural events? It would hurt the cultural fabric of the community," said Princeton resident and business owner, George Elliott.

Giving the example of grads helping with the Similkameen Sizzle, high school student panel members, Kelsey Colpitts and Satinder Lidher, explained that local youth volunteer in the community and would be prepared to help more. Students need more information on what's needed in the community and encouragement to participate.

Despite difficulties in moving towards sustainability, progress is being made.

There are several examples including the Organic Farming

Institute (OFI) which is up and running and is proving to be a success. The OFI is one of the Similkameen Valley Planning Society's (SVPS) projects.

The SVPS, a unique partnership that includes the municipalities of Keremeos and Princeton, the Lower Similkameen Indian Band, the Upper Similkameen Indian Band and Electoral Areas 'B', 'G' and 'H' of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, was formed in the spring of 2003. According to Despot, among the many benefits of the SVPS is that its members have acquired a lot of understanding and respect for their neighbours.

Another example of progress is the Princeton Skills Centre. Marilyn Harkness, Princeton Councillor, explained that the centre provides many valuable services including offering further education and skills applicable to jobs and starting businesses.

The panel identified what they considered were the main strengths and weaknesses of the valley. These will be used in a strengths-weaknesses-opportunities-threats analysis, which will then be used to write the Similkameen's sustainability strategy.

The sustainability strategy will be presented to Similkameen Valley residents for input on the evening of Saturday, March 20, at the Victory Hall in Keremeos.

USIB comes home to Hedley

Last Friday was a day of immense satisfaction and pride for Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB). The Band opened its new administration headquarters in Hedley with tours for the public, coffee and snacks.

The move to Hedley was seen by Band Council as a homecoming, Chief Richard Holmes welcomed everyone to the grand opening and remarked on the importance of having the administration office close to the people it serves. Councillor Carmelita Holmes said the move to Hedley will strengthen the community, and Councillor Mason Squakin encouraged everyone to see the move as positive for the community. Until a month ago, the administration offices were in Keremeos. The cramped quarters and lack of comfort made every day a challenge. The archaeological section moved to Hedley two years ago to have more space. Last month, the contents of the Keremeos office were packed into boxes and trucked to Hedley, where the Band had prepared the top floor of the Mascot Mines Tour building to accommodate the offices.

Chief Richard Holmes estimated seven years of work had gone into the building. The first phase was the money-making mine tours project, but the vision of having the office in the top floor was never far from mind.

The administration floor is reached by stairs or elevator near the main entrance. The offices are spacious, but the greatest asset is the conference room, big enough to hold the entire Band and more. It can be used for conferences, seminars and special occasions. A small kitchen with a pass-through to the conference room makes luncheons and banquets possible for special occasions. According to the employees and Band Council members, the biggest asset during a work day is the windows. The former offices in Keremeos offered little in the way of a view outdoors, and no sunlight to speak of. The new offices have the big old windows of the former school building.

It is hard to describe the amount of labour that has gone into the building since USIB gained possession. Workers describe removing layer after layer of linoleum and carpet to expose the original hardwood floors, which have been sanded and finished to a golden glow. Old wainscotting was revealed and lovingly restored. The old heating system was removed and a new forced air system put in place. The window frames were sanded, repaired and painted. New wiring is in place to service present computer technology. The Band received a grant to make the new

facility an Olympic Live Site, which will go into operation on Friday for the Olympic opening ceremonies, and the entire community is invited to attend and watch all the Olympics. This is the beginning of a new phase for USIB but it is not a time for sitting back and taking life easy for this goahead group. They have a vision of what they could be and what they could do. The new administration offices are just another benchmark of achievement.





First, stop eating fatty foods, especially those fries, potato chips, fat meats such as sausages. 

Five years ago this week the main headline story in the Similkameen News Leader was in reference to \$10,000 worth of riding gear stolen from the Princeton Fairgrounds in addition to other acts of vandalism.

"The thieves must have utilized a vehicle during the commission of this offence and we are hoping someone may have noticed something suspicious some time that evening," Princeton RCMP Detachment Commander Sgt. Kurt Lozinski stated at the time.

Six months before, on August 5, 2004, the property was hit by vandals who raced around on the horse race track with ATVs and broke into a storage room on top of the grandstand.

Lloyd Forman was a name soon to be somewhat familiar to local residents this time five years ago. Forman won the nomination as Liberal Candidate for Yale-Lillooet, in effect, replacing Dave Chutter as the province moved towards another election.

"I am looking forward to listening and serving Princeton over the next four years," Forman told the News Leader at the time.

Forman never got a chance as the NDP's Harry Lali steamrolled his way back to Victoria. Lali referred to Forman as a "die-hard Gordon Campbell loyalist" and sliced the Liberals in typical Lali fashion with the comment:

"This is the third provincial election in a row that the local Liberals have managed to field a relic from the old Social Credit to run against me. It's Back to the Future: Part III."

Princeton 4-H Club hosted another successful open house five years ago this week. The group, which has seen its share of ups and downs, did not host an open house this year and there has been talk that the club may fold locally as a result.

The intersection of Highway 3 and Burton Avenue was an issue of concern five years ago. While a pedestrian-controlled crossing light has since been installed and further improvements were made last summer, the intersection is still considered dangerous.

Leading up to Valentine's Day 2005, Copper Mountain Bar & Grill opened their upstairs fine dining venture Ram's Head Restaurant. It was obviously slightly ahead of it's time as support overall was lukewarm over time. The location has recently been converted into living space.

Calling herself 'a local whiner' in a letter to the Editor five years ago, Joyce Fraser responded to a letter published the week before about the growing problem of deer within the Town Limits.

The deer problem still exists, but months ago the Town of Princeton adopted a bylaw against the feeding of deer in the community.

No word yet on any fines actually being collected, but the deer are still here.

An inconsistent loss for Princeton

Princeton Posse played host to Nelson Leafs February 5th in what could only be called a very inconsistent game.

Both teams played extremely well, it was the officiating that was inconsistent.

Posse Captain Dan Hillman tried to explain to the official on ice that he had just missed the same penalty moments ago and was tossed

from the game for defending his teammate.

"The referee missed the first call on Salisbury when he got hit from behind, which is a dangerous play," explained Posse Assistant Coach Kevin Robillard during the team webcast.

"He was far enough from the boards where it's borderline in my opinion, but the way he's kicking Danny Hillman out of the game here - this is what we talk about about an official who tries to take over a game. He was doing a good job of controlling it here but it's these kinds of plays where he misses the one call at the one end and calls the exact same thing five feet away. So, you know, that frustrates teams as the consistency isn't there and that's what's the frustrating part. He just missed a call right in front of him and then the same play he calls."

Princeton tied the game at two-all to finish the period (2:30 - Dayton Shaw from Ben Morgan and Chad Brears and at 1:03 - Ben Reinbolt from Nick Cecconi and Dayton

Nelson scored again at 6:54 of the second period, another twenty minutes of flubbed and confusing

"The inconsistency is what really drives us crazy," Robillard said during the webcast.

"Again, if you're going to make that call make it both ways on both teams."

The third period was not much better prompting Robillard to point out, "The good thing about all this is the league officials are able to use these games to basically look at similar to what we do - looking at the game films for what the officials are calling so certainly this official will get some feedback just on his game management today."

Princeton scored at 13:39 in the third to tie the game at 3-all. Evan Stack got the goal with assists going to Spencer Kristensen and Bill Marshall.

Nelson took the lead back at 8:20. Then the strangest call of all was made at 6:20 when a Princeton fan beating on a drum was asked by the officials to leave the building.

Posse webcast play-by-play announcer George Elliott said after the game, "I'm a bit stunned. It's not as if the fan was obnoxious and was shouting obscenities or anything. He's a long time supporter of the Posse who was banging on a homemade drum he fashioned out of what appeared to be a couple of old plastic ice cream pails. There's fans in the stands with louder noisemakers than his drum. It didn't make sense, but considering how the rest of the game went, it pretty much fit in with the overall tone of the game."

Final score: Nelson 4, Princeton 3. Shots on goal: Princeton 37, Nelson 24. Penalties in Minutes: Princeton: 14 for 55-minutes. Nelson 13 for 26-minutes.







Call It A Spiritual Experience

The Olympic Torch passed through Princeton over the weekend. I knew it was coming probably as long as you have, but never really thought much about it until two weeks ago.

I consider myself sort of 'neutral' about the whole Olympic move-

Part of me thinks, "Yea! Go Team Canada. Whip some butts" and another part of me thinks, "Oh, what an expensive mistake" but you know, if the world is coming to the neighbourhood we still have to be reasonably hospitable.

What tipped me off to the effect of the promotional stunt of Olympic proportions was two weeks ago when Brenda was in Penticton picking up that week's News Leader from the printer and happened upon the Olympic Torch quite by accident on one of the main streets. She took some photos and called me right away.

To say she sounded delirious would be putting it mildly. She, too, has had what I would call a 'neutral' position on the Olympics, but, seeing the torch sort of swept her up into the spirit of the thing.

When you think about it, the Torch Relay is really not much more than a huge moving promotional tool used by the Olympic Committee to reach you. Whether or not you care about the games and whether or not you plan on attending the games or watching them on TV the torch and it's twisting route is supposed to at least make you think about the event.

Once Brenda managed to calm down she told me she didn't expect to get so swept up in the spirit of the relay, but she did. She watched it approach her, witnessed a 'hand off' to another runner take place almost in front of her and watched that runner disappear in traffic.

Since that happened I kept reminding myself the Torch Relay's arrival in Princeton to me is not much more than a news item. Every day or so I'd ask Brenda if she planned to be up early and downtown to see it arrive here. Each morning she sounded a bit more excited about it. It reminded me of the countdown to Christmas I experienced as a young boy.

So to say I wasn't a little excited nor a little bit proud to be a Canadian when the Olympic Torch passed me on Bridge Street last weekend would be a lie. I can't say I had the same experience Brenda had, but you could tell that many residents lining Bridge Street and standing in Veterans Square on Sunday morning weregetting caught up in the spirit of the event.

Someone last week mentioned to me they were going because it was, in their view, an once-in-a-lifetime event.

Had there not been the Olympics in Calgary in 1988 I'd say that could have been a true statement, but there's no doubt it'll be a long time before British Columbia will be hosting the event again and with that in mind I was glad to be there to witness something that was truly a lot more than just a news item.

I have seen increases of around 10% or better for the last three years which has been around a \$1,000 increase a year for 30 tenants in a residential property. Where is the justice for this?

Due to these increases Princeton has now lost a low-income building. Where do these low-income people go - on the streets due to greed by the Town of Princeton?

My advice to anyone looking to invest in Princeton is to go somewhere else due to many reasons. Also, if you intend to build, do not do it. Is Council going to allow this to continue as rental increases allowed are only 3.2% per year? Otherwise a landlord has the option to match rents in Princeton - the going rate is around \$600 per month (1-bedroom). Many more landlords are going to do this increase soon.

She is coming back this summer, and I will take her for a walk over the Bridge of Dreams, and through the tunnel, where trains were still running when she lived here, and it was off limits.

Using my sister as a city person discovering our town, I hope you can see how we need to show people what we have and what they can do in Princeton. I would love to see a big neon sign out by Highway 3 that says "Rodeo this


You could purchase a chicken in her name if she's an animal lover, or specifically choose a sponsor child whom you know she would love. Putting time into your selection is what will make this gift unique.


