



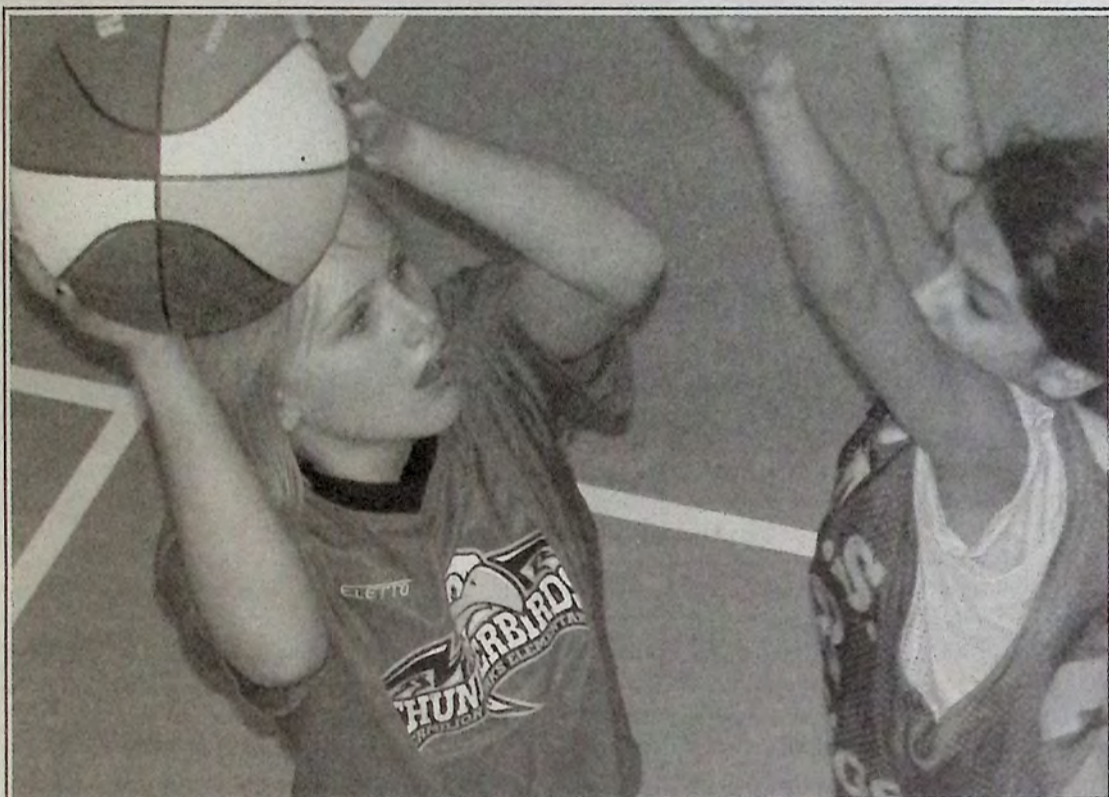

Old budget, new budget

School district budget process never seems to end. On February 24, the Board of Education gave final approval for the current budget, a total operating expense of \$26,687,315, down slightly from last year.

Work will begin shortly on next year's budget. The first step in this process will be a public budget review conducted in both Merritt and Princeton. Princeton stakeholders will have an opportunity to review the proposed budget on April 13 at 6:00 PM at the Board office located on Tapton Avenue.

Representatives from school PAC's, teacher and support staff unions, administrative officers and

members of the public are invited to attend. The purpose will be to discuss priorities and concerns about school district funding. Stakeholder groups are welcome to outline their priorities to the Board.

The Board will provide information on provincial government funding, district projections for enrollment, and specific information related to the district's budget. For example, student enrollment at the end of September has a big impact on what the provincial government will provide for the operation of district schools. The Board will adopt next year's budget late in May or early June after considering input from all the stakeholders.

CMMC receives 'strong buy' rating

In a 56-page report on Copper Mountain Mining Corporation's Similco Mines project near Princeton dated February 24th, Raymond James Equity Research recommends buying shares in the company.

The report gives CMMC a Strong Buy rating with a six to twelve-month target price of \$3.50 Canadian per share (at the time of last week's report they were trading at 0.36).

The detailed analysis of the project includes the following highlights:

- CMMC is the operator and 75% owner of the Copper Mountain project in British Columbia, Canada. The company is currently re-starting a brownfield mine by creating one Super Pit from three historic open pits.

- Positive investment attributes:

i) Value enhancement with project progression - "We expect value

accretion to CMMC's shares as the project is advanced;"

ii) Low technical risk - "In our view the technical risks are relatively low given the similarity of the planned operation to the site's past-producing mine;"

iii) Monetization of existing infrastructure - "In our opinion the opportunity to utilize significant existing infrastructure increases the project attractiveness as it reduces development time and the risk of capital cost inflation;"

iv) Consolidation candidate - "As a meaningful size, advanced copper project we believe that CMMC could be attractive to larger mining entities;"

and v) "The project is located in mining friendly Canada."

- Near-term potential catalysts for the shares:

i) Securing the project loan;
ii) Receipt of the reclamation permit;
iii) Progress updates on the construction and development;
and iv) Exploration.

The positive investment case for Copper Mountain's shares is supported in the report by the following:

- Value enhancement with project progression - "We expect CMMC's advancement of the project to provide value accretion. In our opinion, concluding the project loan and the permitting are the key milestones to removing the remaining uncertainty. Additionally, construction progress will reduce the risk of delays and capital cost inflation."

- Low technical risk - "We believe that the technical risks of the project are relatively low given the similarity of the planned operation and the management team to those of the site's past-producing Similco mine. The metallurgical test results and the processing flowsheet are consistent with the historical operations of the Similco mine."

- Monetization of existing infrastructure - "In our view, the opportunity to utilize significant existing infrastructure increases the attractiveness of the project as it reduces

the development time, and it lowers the risk of capital cost inflation."

- Consolidation candidate - "We believe that CMMC's attributes as the majority owner of a meaningful size copper project in mining-friendly Canada places the company in the crosshairs of larger mining entities."

- Attractive valuation - "At a 2010E PINAV of 0.36x CMMC's shares trade at a discount to base metal development companies and producer peers in our research universe at 0.80x, and 0.63x, respectively. We believe that the low valuation is symptomatic of limited awareness of the project on the part of the investment community, and cautiousness regarding the ability of the company to secure the project financing."

- Low political risk - "The Copper Mountain project is located in the attractive mining jurisdiction of

British Columbia, Canada."

The report also outlines details of the Copper Mountain Project:

The Copper Mountain project is located in south central British Columbia and is focused on a porphyry copper deposit with gold and silver by-products. The project is a mine rehabilitation that aims to expand upon three existing, past producing open pit copper mines to create one large Super Pit through a series of push-backs of the pit walls.

The historical production at the property by previous operators began in 1923 and continued intermittently through 1996, and significant infrastructure remains available from past operations.

The mine will be an open pit, truck and shovel operation, and the plant will use conventional crushing, grinding, and flotation to produce copper concentrates. The company is currently in the process of constructing a 35,000 tonnes/day concentration plant.

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

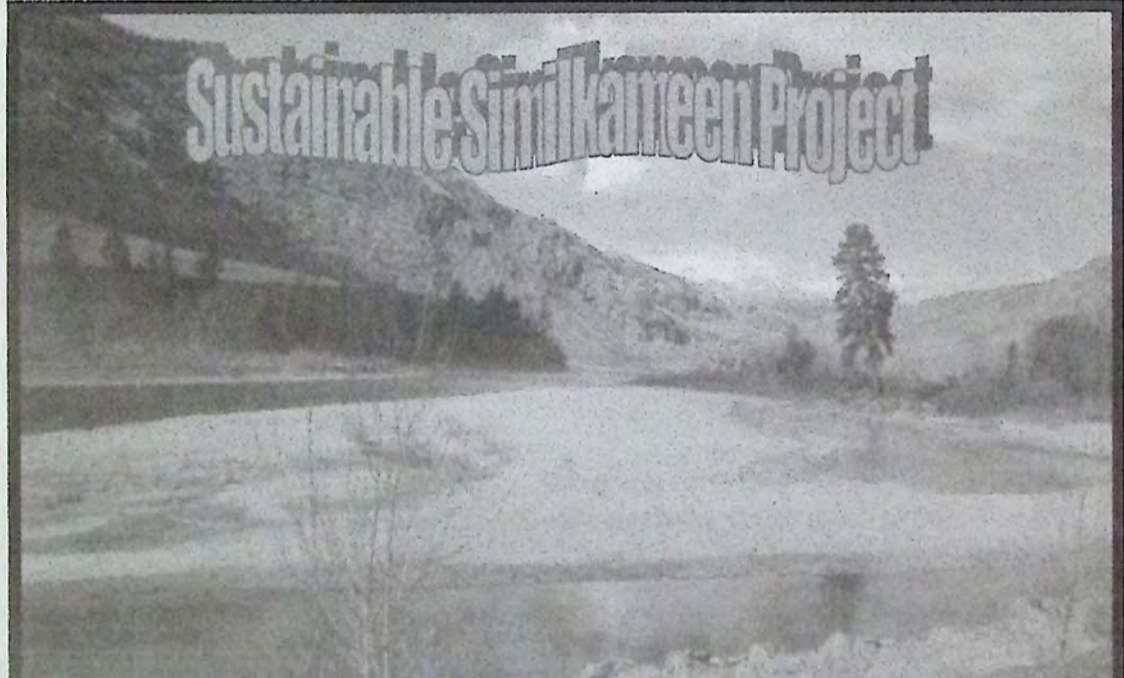

"We forecast the mine starting full production in 4Q11, and averaging 39,800 tonnes/year of copper over a 16.5 year mine life. We estimate the capital cost for the development to be US\$452 million, and our expectation is for a life-of-mine cash cost of US\$1.11/lb of copper."
 Importantly, Copper Mountain has the support of a strong partner for the project in Mitsubishi Materials Corp. Mitsubishi has a 25% equity

interest in the project, has agreed to purchase all of the copper concentrate produced life-of-mine (at market rates for treatment charges/refining charges), and intends to pursue arranging a minimum C\$330 million project loan. CMMC, as the 75% owner, will be the operator of the mine.
 The Copper Mountain property consists of 135 Crown mineral claims, 132 located mineral claims, 14 mining leases, and 12 fee simple properties. Overall, the property totals 6,702.1 hectares (67 square km). Approximately 10% of the claims are subject to production royalties of 1% to 5%, however, these claims are primarily in the northeastern portion of the property area where exploration is not currently planned.

C\$70 million worth of its Komatsu (6301-TO) mining equipment fleet. The semi-autogenous (SAG) mill and ball mills are scheduled to be delivered in mid-2010. Management's objective is to commission the plant in May 2011 and begin production in June 2011.
 "The history of mining in the Princeton area pretty much starts at Copper Mountain," says Similkameen News Leader owner/publisher George Elliott.

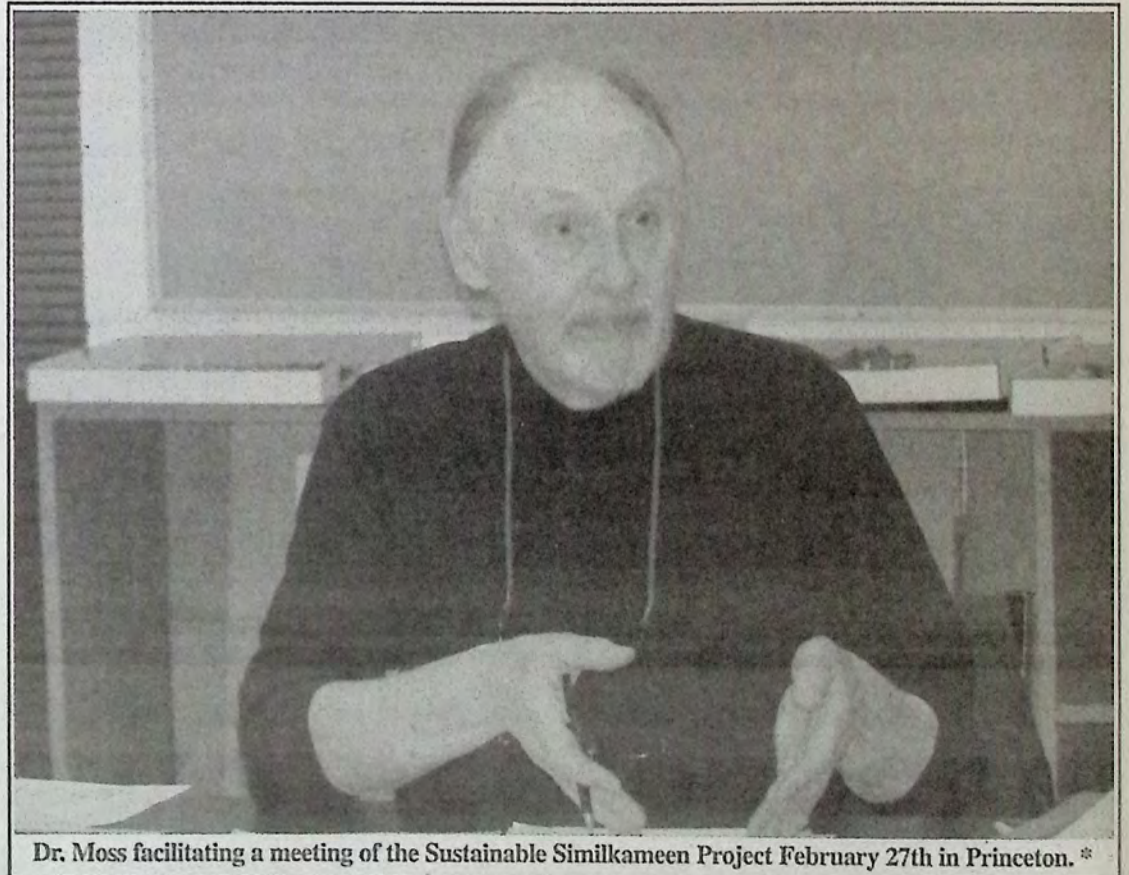

Students plan own studies

What can a student do if what he or she really wants to learn is not available?

Students at Princeton Secondary School may have no interest in the elective courses presented to them. Due to the size of the student population at Princeton Secondary, the number of elective courses are limited. Elective courses are not mandatory for graduation but do make up the number of credits required for graduation.

Students who have a passion to learn something not offered as an elective may choose Independent Directed Studies (IDS). To follow this route, a student must prepare his or her own lessons, and must learn what the course requires. If a student who has a passionate interest in a subject, the student will learn.

Principal Bill Lawrence attended the February 24 Board of Education meeting to describe the success of IDS to the trustees. Levi Dubé, a student who completed an IDS course last year, was with him.

Lawrence described how Dubé found a mentor from the community to teach him all about the guitar, not only how to play it, but the history and construction of the guitar. Dubé was not the only student taking a course under the IDS program. Another student elected barrel racing as a course.

Students follow their independent studies under the supervision of a teacher.

Levi Dubé spoke with enthusiasm about IDS from his own experience. He was able, through his mentor, to not only learn, but to participate in community functions

he would not have pursued on his own. He said his mentor encouraged him to enter a talent contest, where he won a prize and went on to perform at the 2009 Fall Fair. He learned how to conduct a talent contest and arrange a musical performance. He is now a mentor to another student who is studying guitar. In addition, he has made a friend, his mentor, professional musician Dan Davidson.

Superintendent R. Peacock recommended continuing IDS at Princeton Secondary. The trustees voted in favour.

Board secures health grant

The local school district will be hiring a health coordinator for the next school term. Assistant Superintendent Stephen McNiven applied for a \$30,000 grant from Interior Health to fund the coordinator, who will serve Merritt and Princeton schools. The funding will be in place this August.

In the letter McNiven received advising him of the grant approval, Heather Allen and Carol Todd, Project Co-Sponsors of the

Healthier Schools Healthier Students Project, stated evidence has shown "a comprehensive school health approach can be more effective and have greater impact on lifelong health" than programs that just address a single health problem such as substance abuse, early school leaving, violence and other concerns.

The health coordinator will be hired for the semester beginning in September.

Board praises students

School trustees at the February 24 Board of Education meeting had some proud words to say about students at Princeton Secondary School.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau remarked on the number of musically talented students at the

school.

Superintendent R. Peacock commented with pride on the achievement of both the senior and junior girls' basketball teams, both of whom won the Valley Championship and went on to compete in the Provincials.

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

Living donors define selflessness

(NC)—It's not always easy being selfless, particularly when you have agreed to undergo major surgery to save someone else's life. But that's exactly what 1,084 living donors did in Canada between 1995 and 2008. Individuals in good health, who would otherwise have not needed surgery, defined selflessness by donating an organ (or part of an organ) to either a related or unrelated recipient.

As public awareness of living donation grows, more individuals are beginning to consider being a live donor. In the majority of the cases individuals know the recipient. It's usually someone who they are emotionally attached to such as a parent, child, sibling, spouse or even a good friend. And in some cases, living donors agree to donate an organ to a complete stranger.

In fact, the Living Donor Paired Exchange Registry launched by Canadian Blood services in February 2009 is designed to optimize the use of organs from living donors. The mechanism creates the opportunity where an individual who is willing to donate an organ, primarily a kidney, but is incompatible with the intended recipient may nonetheless be a possible match for someone already in the registry, along with a family member or friend who also wants to be a donor. By agreeing to be included in the registry and be part of a paired exchange, living donors can then be matched with other compatible recipients. A form of "swapping" occurs that maximizes the chances of finding a donor - recipient match.

Living donation also has additional advantages. The actual logistics of the transplantation process are simpler. In many cases, the convenience of a living donation enables the transplant to take place at an acceptable time for both donor and recipient and when they are both in optimal health, while waiting time for a transplant tends to be reduced to a matter of months rather than years for deceased donation. The organ donated by a living donor also tends to be healthier at the time of the operation and works right away, leading to a better-functioning organ after transplantation, and longer graft survival. Potential

donors can also be tested ahead of time. This not only allows for the most compatible recipient to be found, but it also lessens the risk of rejection because living donor transplants are usually done between family members, ensuring a better chance of a genetic match between donor and recipient.

No one knows or understands how important the benefits of living donation are more than Toronto, Ontario resident Pamela Mitchell. "In my mind, only a sibling or a close relative could be a viable candidate to donate a kidney, and it had never crossed my mind to ask any of my other loved ones. I began to mention it in passing to relatives and friends. Much to my great surprise the responses were overwhelmingly positive. Even co-workers sent emails offering me their kidney. I was amazed at everyone's generosity!"

Ms. Mitchell's cousin's daughter, Debra, became her donor in September 2001. The transplant was performed and worked perfectly. Since then she's continued to travel to places like Nepal, Thailand, France and Cuba. She runs optimizing health groups in patient self-management for people with chronic conditions, and does

volunteer work by offering peer support for people with kidney disease. "I am definitely not bored," she states.

Ms. Mitchell is also a frequent contributor to the Transplant Companions (www.transplantcompanions.ca) and Transplant Adherence Programs (www.transplantadherence.ca). These two national programs, funded by Astellas Pharma Canada are designed to educate pre and post-transplant kidney patients. The Transplant Companions program is aimed at pre-transplant kidney patients and follows an interactive workshop model. The program is now offered at 14 Canadian transplant and care centres, seven of which have made attendance at the program's workshops compulsory for their pre-transplant patients.

Its sister program, the Transplant Adherence Program focuses on life after transplantation, and provides transplant recipients with information and resources, including newsletters, a DVD and an interactive web-site, which encourage and support adherence to their treatment regimens. Living Past 100

Is It Really Depression?

More and more people are using anti-depressant medication, but some health experts are wondering if these drugs are over-prescribed. People who feel tired, anxious or emotionally numb, people who feel irritable or sleep too much or too little, may be diagnosed as depressed. There could be other factors causing these symptoms.

The further north you live, the more likely you are to suffer from lack of sunshine. This can bring on symptoms of depression when all you really need is Vitamin D or a vacation in the sun.

Feelings of fatigue, lack of motivation, unhappiness and irritability are often signs of iron deficiency. This is easily discovered through a simple blood test. Sometimes these same symptoms can result from taking other medications. Your physician should take all aspects of your health into consideration before prescribing anti-depressants. Anti-depressants should never be prescribed without a thorough medical check-up, as the symptoms may result from an underlying physical condition which anti-depressants will not fix.

A prolonged period of stress can wear you down until you have symptoms of depression. Grief can have the same effect. Dissatisfaction with your job, your life in general, can lead to feelings of depression. Your physician needs to know about everything going on in your life that affects your emotional well-being.

Hormone changes that accompany growing older can bring on symptoms that mimic depression. A man over 50 years of age may begin to feel angry because he cannot play sports he used to, or he may be anxious about his sexual prowess. He may not want to talk about these feelings, but he may exhibit signs of depression. What he needs is some good counselling.

Women may show symptoms of depression when their children leave home. Suddenly a woman's major job is done and she may feel useless. Combined with declining estrogen, a general malaise becomes evident.

These examples are not clinical depression. One doctor said hidden anger is often diagnosed as depression. Anti-depressants were not produced to clear up problems stemming from dissatisfaction or anger. It is important for you and your doctor to review everything that could be the cause of how you feel before a diagnosis of depression is made. All anti-depressants can have side effects.

An end, and a beginning

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Laurie Currie loved "this town"

-former publisher, radio station owner, and Princeton "booster" dies



When a great "community" man passes away, he leaves a legacy to remember. Laurie Currie has left a huge legacy for Princeton. Currie was born April 28, 1928, in Clithrow and moved to Princeton as a youth. He married Sonia in 1952, in Princeton, and the newlyweds moved to Ocean Falls, B.C., where he worked as a steam engineer. Both daughters, Laverne and Arlene, were born there. The family moved back to Princeton in 1955, and Currie became the third owner of the Similkameen Spotlight. He owned the community newspaper until 1981, when he sold it to his longtime employee, Fred Heck. In the meantime, in 1972, Currie had established Princeton's first, and only, local radio station, later absorbed by the parent company in 1999, when Currie finally retired. When he invested in business in Princeton, Currie invested a lot more - he invested all of himself. He expressed, "I love this town!" His love for Princeton and the surrounding area, led him into the many ways he promoted the area. He was active in Princeton Fish & Game Club for many years, promoted angling in his weekly "fishing" column, and in a fishing guide book, he published. Currie was one of the founders of Princeton Racing Days Association in 1964 and was President "Mr. Racing Days" until 1990. He was an active member of Princeton Rotary Club for

The front page headline of the March 5, 2002 Similkameen News Leader said it all: *Laurie Currie loved 'this town' - former publisher, radio station owner and Princeton 'booster' dies.*

Currie not only invested in local businesses, at one time owning a local newspaper and the local radio station simultaneously - he also invested himself in the community. He had a hand in many community projects ranging from establishing Princeton Racing Days and Snowpatch Ski Hill to his involvement in Princeton Golf Club expansions and assisting new businesses through his involvement in Community Futures Development Corporation.

Similkameen News Leader Publisher/Owner George Elliott worked with Currie for a dozen years.

"Laurie was my boss at the radio station and one thing he always emphasized was the importance of working within your community. He's the guy who got me interested in a lot of different organizations I may never have considered joining had it not been for his philosophy that if I planned to stay in Princeton, I better get involved in Princeton."

Elliott was the person who lobbied the Town of Princeton in 2002 to name the road that passes by Princeton Fairgrounds 'Laurie Currie Way.'

"I wanted a lasting reminder

somewhere to honour Laurie and his contributions and couldn't think of a better place than near the race track," Elliott explains.

"I thought it was going to be a lot of work, but everyone concerned obviously felt the way I did and the road was named after Laurie only weeks after his passing. I still smile whenever I pass by one of the road signs."

A new group formed eight years ago this week. The Business Enhancement Group, which later became Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association, established an organizational structure February 26, 2002.

A total of nine committees were formed, some with longer-term goals than others. The BEA folded a few years later.

Local doctors were in the news eight years ago this week speaking out about their concerns over possible cutbacks in the x-ray department at Princeton Hospital.

Dr. Sue Erasmus, Chief of Medical Staff at the time, wrote a letter to then Health Administrator Marilyn Harkness expressing the concern on behalf of all local doctors.

Erasmus argued that Princeton's geographic location was reason enough to reconsider a one-day per week closure of the x-ray department.

"Such a cut in services would severely limit our ability to deliver a safe level of service, let alone

quality service, to accident victims. We strongly object to even considering such a step, which would endanger patients' lives and expose physicians and the hospital to medico-legal action."

Real estate prices in March 2002 were worth noting. An ad from this week eight years ago for a 3-bedroom, 2-bath home located downtown with a fenced yard, large deck, workshop and lane access was worth \$66,000 and included \$2,000 cash back on purchase!

Nervous energy nets playoff win

"The two teams took advantage of the intermission to tighten the defense systems," Robillard stated on the Posse website (www.princetonposse.org).

"Both teams looked to reduce the scoring chances that dominated the first period."

Princeton scored twice in the sec-

ond. The first goal, at 9:52 (Brooks Christensen from Lee Muir and Chad Brears) was on the power play and the second at 1:16 (Chard Brears from Brooks Christensen) was short handed.

The third period saw Sicamous rally back with three goals of their own to tie the game at 6-all.

At 8:27 Princeton's Brendan Stephen chipped a puck away from the Sicamous defense in the neutral

zone and created a 2-on-1 once past the defensemen.

"Using the Posse forward as a decoy Stephen sniped a wrist shot over the Eagle goalie to give the Posse a 7-6 lead," Robillard described the play online.

If needed, Game #5 will be Thursday, March 4th in Princeton with Game #6 (if needed) set for Friday, March 5th in Sicamous. If the series goes the full seven, the final game will be Saturday, March 6th in Princeton.

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

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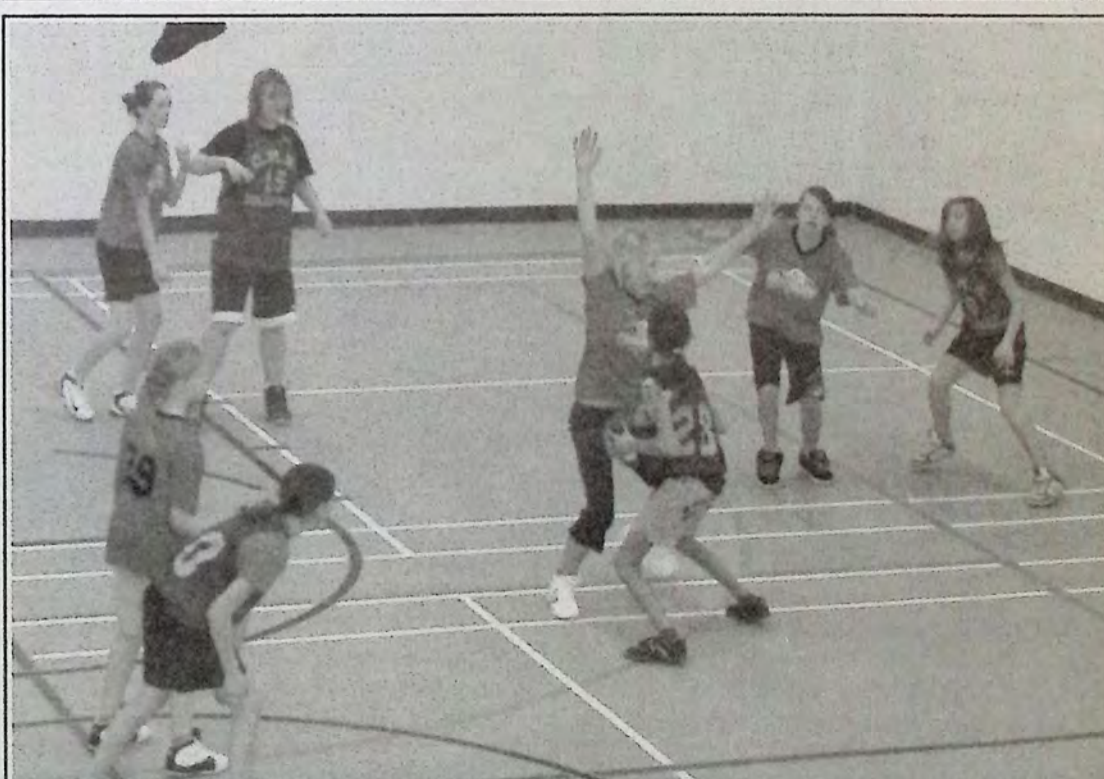

Citrus Salmon with Orange Relish

(NC)—Fresh oranges and ground ginger pair to make a bold and nutrient-packed accompaniment to salmon fillets. Serve this antioxidant-rich relish with any kind of fish, or with shrimp or scallops.

Prep Time: 20 minutes / Marinate: 30 minutes / Cook Time: 15 minutes

Citrus Salmon:

- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 1/2 teaspoons McCormick Gourmet thyme leaves, divided
- 4 salmon fillets (about 1 pound)
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar

low-grade copper mines in British Columbia," Elliott says.

Citing low ore prices and the cost of transporting ore by rail to the concentrator in Allenby as reasons, Granby suspended operations in 1957.

Newmont Mines Limited reactivated the site as an open-pit mine in 1970 creating 250 jobs. A conveyor system high above the Similkameen River was used to transport ore from the pits to the mill.

Cassiar Mining Corporation took over the operation, eventually changing its name to Princeton Mining Corporation and operated the Copper Mountain site under the name Similco Mines Limited.

Once again metal prices dictated the life of the mine with it dropping down to 'care and maintenance' status in late 1993 but went back to production by the following summer. The open-pit operation finally closed in 1996, falling victim to

market conditions.

Imperial Metals Limited purchased the property from Princeton Mining Corporation in 1996 and started an exploration project the following year. In 2000 Leader Mining International Inc. of Calgary began negotiations to purchase Similco

from Imperial with plans to re-open the open-pit operation, which never happened.

The property sat quietly until late in 2006 when Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (CMMC) purchased 100% of Similco from 3983714 Canada Inc.

Board changes record check

Anyone who poses a physical or sexual abuse risk to children will not be hired by the school district nor permitted to work with students as a volunteer.

On February 24, the Board of Education updated the Criminal Record Check regulation for the school district.

A criminal record check will be required for teachers, registered students in a post-secondary course who will work with children, all school staff, volunteers in child care facilities and licensed after school programs.

Volunteers whose participation in a school activity may involve unsupervised access to students, or individuals who volunteer on a regular basis, are required to complete the district "Police Criminal Record Check" form.

Volunteers will not be permitted to provide services to students until the record check has been completed and reviewed.

The record check will apply to exchange teachers, service contractors, student practicum placement or work experience students.

Selling Our Sovereignty In 'Buy American' Negotiations

With Parliament prorogued the Harper government has been busy wrapping up a last minute and lopsided deal with the U.S. on how to handle the 'Buy American' provisions in their 2009 stimulus legislation. With just a few days left before the bidding was closed on the \$275 billion U.S. stimulus fund, 98% which was already committed, the deal was finally signed on February 12. With very little time for Canadian companies to bid on the few remaining contracts worth up to \$5 billion the deal did not even provide any guarantee or mechanism to enforce Canadian access to these funds. In return Canadian provinces and municipalities are obliged to provide U.S. companies access to infrastructure procurement projects, valued at \$25 billion, until September 2011. Another consequence of this deal is that we have agreed to let the World Trade Organization (WTO) Agreement on Government Procurement dictate forever how procurement and purchasing is to be handled by our provincial and municipal governments.

For little more than a symbolic gesture on the part of the Americans and without any debate or a vote in the House of Commons, Stephen Harper is unilaterally giving up our sovereign right to give preference to local goods and suppliers on local infrastructure projects. In doing so he is setting the precedent for further erosion of our sovereignty as provincial and municipal contracts are offered up to the European Union in an incentive to sign a free trade agreement with Canada.

Across the country infrastructure procurement projects have been effectively used by provincial and

municipal governments to create jobs and stimulate sustainable economic development. Unlike B.C.'s Gordon Campbell who has one of the worst records when it comes protecting procurement rights, Manitoba and Nova Scotia NDP governments have taken some steps to protect certain sectors of their economies, as have some other provinces.

With no Buy Canadian Act of our own similar to the Bill introduced by federal New Democrats in the House of Commons, our country will be deprived of a key economic tool to provide the same leverage that Americans and every other industrial economy have developed in order to ensure jobs are created and stay at home.

After selling out our softwood lumber and manufacturing sectors Harper is tying the hands of provincial and municipal governments so they can't give preference to local businesses even though the US has found ways to exclude American policies from its own WTO commitments. Let us also not forget that we have made it almost impossible for our fruit and vegetable producers to compete with cheap subsidized American produce.

It's difficult to imagine how any of this works in favour of our sovereignty, especially as we try to create jobs for Canadians in these difficult economic times.

In the 2006 Speech from the Throne, Stephen Harper promised that "significant international treaties will be submitted to votes in Parliament." In other speeches he has promised transparent and accountable government. What we have instead are broken promises, a padlocked Parliament, the HST

and a brand new trade arrangement that was negotiated in secret. Rest assured that New Democrats will be taking this government to serious task when the doors of Parliament are finally open to us once again on March 3rd.

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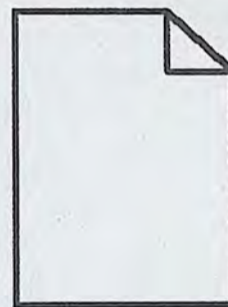

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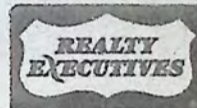
