Council reviews top ten projects

Where will the GamesTown money go?

Town Council received a list of the top 10 projects proposed by the GamesTown committee. The list was submitted at the May 17 Council meeting. Council will now review the list and select the project which will use the \$100,000 2010 GamesTown prize.

The top 10 projects were determined by the people who attended the public GamesTown meeting on May 12. There were many ideas of how the money should be spent but not all of the proposals met the guidelines specified by the government for approval of a project. The top 10 qualified under those guidelines.

At the top of the list, receiving the

most votes, was a basketball court. With just one vote less, two other projects qualified: park playground equipment and a Riverside Centre kitchen. Other projects included improvements to access on Martin's Lake and McCaffery Lake, KVR circuit training with drinking fountains, a running track, a kiosk at Swan Lake, a footbridge to connect Two Rivers Park to the Tourist Information Centre, and a day use picnic area at Memorial Park.

The committee added a list of 22 other projects proposed by the community which were excluded from the top 10, in order to give Council insight to what the community sees as important improvements.

Arts Council faces fund cuts

Del Hall and Ed Staples, President and Vice President of Princeton District Community Arts Council, were bearers of bad news to local members. Hall and Staples had attended the BC Assembly of Arts Councils conference in early May where they were shocked to learn Princeton is not eligible to apply for further funding until September 2012.

It seems the Princeton group has too much money in the bank and has not followed the reporting prescription preferred by the funding committee. The committee wanted more detailed documentation of events. Other Arts Councils have paid staff who do the reports, and have higher membership numbers. Arts Councils must now compete for funding.

At the May 19 Princeton Arts Council meeting, the executive presented a recommendation for showing the true membership of the local Arts Council. To date, the Arts

Council has acted as an umbrella organization for ten different clubs and societies, many of which have high membership numbers. The recommendation would make every member of a member group a voting member of the Arts Council. In addition, they will try to recruit artists and people interested in the arts as individual members. The recommendation will be circulated before the next Arts Council meeting for consideration at the September annual general meeting.

The guest speakers at the conference focused on the importance of arts as an economic stimulus for a community. Bill Usher, who had been involved in the arts community in Toronto for many years, is now employed the town of Golden, B.C. as a community arts director. He said "the arts community is not for the artists, it is for the community." He described how to transform a community through the arts. The purpose of what he does is to make Golden attractive to visitors. The Golden Town Council is funding his salary with a matching grant

from BC Arts Council, and has assisted in locating and funding a downtown gallery for display of local artists' works.

The message seemed quite clear to local Arts Council members that they have to change the way things have been done and meet the criteria expected by the BC Arts Council in order to compete for funding in the future. The news was disappointing, but members appeared ready to do what is necessary.

Goldcliff reports new gold drill discovery

George W. Sanders, President of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (GCN.TSXV), announced on May 18th a new drill discovery of disseminated gold mineralization in the Thor zone on the Panorama Ridge gold property.

The Thor showing is centrally located between the York-Viking and Nordic gold zones on a southwest to northeast trend of gold mineralization along the crest of Panorama Ridge. This drilling followed up Trench SP165 (excavated in 2007), which established surface gold mineralization over 69.80 metres grading 0.56 gold per tonne, including 1.01 grams per tonne gold over 31.50 metres.

The recently received drill results are from 8 holes drilled during 2008 from the area of Trench SP165. The holes were drilled in a fan pattern from one set-up. Drill

values range from 96.62 metres of 0.22 grams per tonne gold to 7.36 metres of 1.03 grams per tonne gold and include 1.36 metres of 6.35 grams per tonne gold.

The Panorama Ridge Gold property is 100 per cent-owned by the Company and is located near Hedley. These are the first holes drilled in the Thor zone, and they establish an important continuity of gold mineralization along the 1,000 metres of trend from the Tower and York-Viking zones (in the southwest) to the Nordic zone (in the northeast). Much more drilling will be required in the Thor zone in order to better determine the geometry of the Gold Mineralized Zone (GMZ) in this area.

On the Panorama Ridge property, the gold mineralization continuity at surface and at depth is related to

a disseminated gold envelop -- referred to as the gold mineralized zone (GMZ) -- that grades 0.20 grams gold per tonne or better. The GMZ defines the economic limits and potential for large disseminated gold deposits on the Panorama Ridge gold property.

In 2000, Goldcliff staked the Panorama Ridge property based on gossan outcrops (iron rich rocks) that were exposed on new logging roads along the ridge. The ensuing exploration activities have discovered ten gold showings. Four of the showings -- the York-Viking, Nordic, Thor and Tower -- have developed into significant zones of gold mineralization.

The gold mineralization occurs in a sedimentary-volcanic hosted rock sequence of the Upper Triassic Nicola Group, Hedley Formation. The gold values on the property occur over an extensive surface area and to considerable drill depths. The gold mineralization is mainly disseminated in nature and associated with silica-sulphide alteration (skarn).

The higher grade gold horizons and quartz veins occur within the broadly disseminated gold envelope (GMZ). The disseminated gold envelope contains zones of gold mineralization that range from 0.20 grams per tonne gold to over one ounce gold per ton (34.286 grams per tonne).

CFOS plans for economic growth

What has gardening got to do with economic growth? Apparently, when we do Economic Gardening, it makes the local economy grow.

Mary Ellen Heidt, of Community Futures of Okanagan Similkameen (CFOS) attended the May 17 Town Council meeting to present an opportunity to explore this successful method of creating a stronger local economy. Heidt told Council Economic Gardening was pioneered in Littleton, Colorado when the state was in a recession. It proved so successful it has become a model for small communities. She said she has seen Princeton go through two mine closures, and with the mine re-opening, now is the time to start planning ahead for economic stability in the future.

The Economic Gardening Project is, in a nutshell, "economic growth by nurturing business". Economic gardening connects entrepreneurs with access to capital, talented employees, peer networks, market

information, access to markets, technology, research and development, and training in all aspects of business.

The project would provide local entrepreneurs with access to information on what the competition is doing, markets, customers, and competitors in a way that is accessible only to large firms. Data and GIS mapping system provide information on consumer spending and demographic information that assist businesses with information needed to target a market, adapt products and identify site location. The project would cost \$190,000.

Community Futures has applied for grants from a variety of sources. Oliver and Osoyoos have both committed \$4,000. Heidt will be asking Similkameen Valley Planning Society for a contribution for the Similkameen Valley.

During the first year, a person running the project would meet with 60 businesses to identify common issues, provide information to

assist them, and develop programs and workshops as needed. In addition, the technology would have to be purchased through partnering, and set up an operational structure. She said the goal is to create 90 new jobs during the next three years and expand nine markets with the ultimate goal of making local businesses and jobs sustainable.

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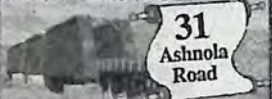

When their most recent 2007 concert was given in Cawston the Mishra had become almost a tradition locally.

In three previous visits The Mishras had won the hearts of the local audiences.

Many Lower Similkameen residents had enjoyed the strains of the classical Indian sitar, the rapid-fire tabla drums and the melodious vocals for the first time in live concert.

The Sitar itself is a technical wonder, an ancient precursor of the modern guitar.

In North America, Ravi Shankar beginning in the 1960's popularized the Sitar and even the Beatles brought it aboard some of their most exotic work.

Pandit, the father presents as a solemn and self-possessed Master while Deobrat, his son, exudes high spirits and a mischievous streak.

These traits in each are wonderfully expressed in the emotionality of their music. Their deep regard for one another as father and son, master and student, is always plain.

Very early this century, The Mishra family had begun travelling from Benares, India to California and up through Oregon to British Columbia in the company of their American tabla player, Marco Zonka from San Diego and road manager, Felicity Gerwin from Winlaw, BC.

The present tour that includes a Cawston Hall concert on Sunday evening, June 6th will feature a

new generation of the Mishra Family.

Young Prashant Mishra is the tabla player and another of the elder Pandit's students will accompany.

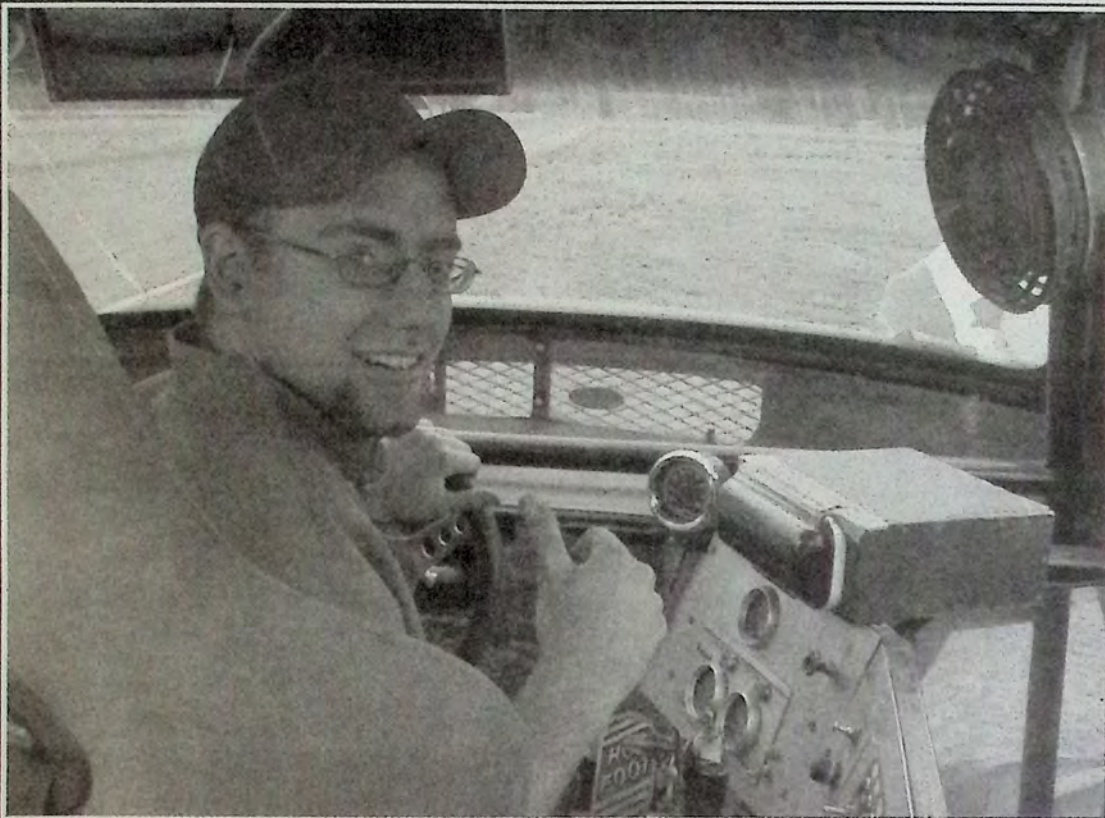
In the past couple of years Deobrat has made his way to Nelson where he conducts an annual music academy in Sitar, tabla, vocals and the Classical Indian music tradition.

Lali slams Liberals on Olympic spending

Fraser-Nicola New Democrat MLA Harry Lali says the B.C. Liberals spent nearly \$2.4 million of taxpayers' money on Olympic tickets, and Kamloops-North Thompson MLA Terry Lake snapped up several of them to attend a hockey game and two victory ceremonies.

A report details the use of nearly \$1 million worth of Olympics tickets purchased directly by the B.C. Liberal government, but neglects to report on the additional \$1.4 million of taxpayers' money spent by various Crown corporations.

The report revealed that Lake received \$500 worth of tickets, including ones to a semi-final men's hockey game between the United States and Finland and a victory ceremony featuring the

rock band INXS. The total amount of taxpayer-funded tickets used by Lake and fellow Kamloops Liberal MLA Kevin Krueger was \$2,048.

"I wonder what kind of business deals Dr. Lake worked on while he was watching INXS perform?" asked Lali.

"If Dr. Lake, indeed, wasn't signing deals at the rock concert then what was he doing there with tickets paid for by taxpayers?"

"The people of Kamloops deserve to know what their elected representatives did for them at the Olympics," said Lali.

"Terry Lake needs to provide an explanation to Kamloops-North Thompson taxpayers."

According to the report, Lake attended the concert and victory ceremony in a luxury suite with

Krueger and several tourism industry representatives. Lake's Olympic experience at the semi-final hockey game was shared with Minister of State for Mining Randy Hawes and several mining industry executives.

"I can see how the government might justify the tourism minister wining and dining tourism officials, or the mining minister showing a good time to mining executives; however, what was backbencher Terry Lake doing there?" demanded Lali.

Carole James and New Democrats have been holding the B.C. Liberals accountable for breaking their word on the HST, and for backtracking on their election promises to protect health care, education, and other vital services.

(NC)—You can't see it smell it or taste it. It may be lurking in your home and, if not guarded against, can kill you and your loved ones while you sleep. Known as the "silent killer" carbon monoxide takes the life of hundreds of North Americans every year. It is actually the leading cause of fatal poisonings in North America.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colourless, odourless, tasteless deadly gas that can be produced by any appliance, engine or heating device that uses combustible fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood or charcoal. Carbon monoxide can leak into the home when a fuel-burning device is poorly maintained, improperly vented or breaks down. Other potential sources include automobiles left running in

attached garages, clogged or blocked chimney openings, inadequate venting, malfunctioning appliances or the operation of a barbecue in an enclosed area such as your home or garage.

When inhaled CO inhibits the blood's capacity to transport oxygen throughout the body. It can poison the body quickly in high concentrations, or slowly over long periods of time.

Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea and dizziness, burning eyes, confusion, drowsiness and even loss of consciousness. In severe cases, CO poisoning can cause brain damage and death. The elderly, children and people with heart or respiratory conditions may be particularly sensitive to CO.

According to Patrice De Luca, V.P. of Marketing and Business Development for Reliance Protectron Security Services, the best defense against carbon monoxide poisoning is detection and prevention.

"The only way to detect this deadly gas is by installing carbon monoxide detectors," De Luca explained, recommending that detectors be installed on each level of your home. "At minimum, one should be installed outside every sleeping level."

De Luca stressed the importance of having the CO detectors linked to a monitoring centre since many of those killed or injured by carbon monoxide are asleep at the time of

exposure and timing is crucial for alerting emergency help.

"Protectron carbon monoxide detectors offer valuable protection by alerting you to the presence this gas and notifying the monitoring centre, which will immediately take the appropriate measures to help you," he added.

What to look for in a CO detector:

- Choose one that is listed with the Canadian Standards Association (CSA). The logos of the testing agency will be on the product.

- If you have a battery powered unit, make sure you change the detectors battery as recommended by the manufacturer, and test the unit once a month.

- Replace the unit as recommended by the manufacturer (generally between 5 and 10 years).

How to prevent CO poisoning:

- Have a qualified service technician check your furnace and other fuel-burning equipment at least once a year.

- Have your chimneys cleaned and inspected at least once a year.

- Never run vehicles, motor bikes, lawn-mowers, generators, or snow blowers in attached garages, even if the doors are open.

If your carbon monoxide detector alarm sounds, De Luca advises to exit as quickly as possible and call the fire department from a neighbour's home. More information on home security is available at www.protectron.com.

Living Past 100

Simple Foods May Prevent Cancer

This year is Princeton's 150th anniversary since founding. This may seem unrelated to a health column, but there is a connection. Approximately 150 years ago, a French doctor decided to research cancer and made some important discoveries. The discovery he made was that cancer was almost unknown in the natives of Africa and America. He also noted that cancer was more likely to be found in urban centers. Even animals reflected the same pattern: cancer was common among domesticated animals but rare in wild animals.

Dr. Albert Schweizer, about 60 years later, was to write a book about cancer and stated almost the same finding. When he arrived in Africa, he could find not even one case of cancer! He, too, noted the difference between urban residents and the natives of this undeveloped area. He concluded that the difference in cancer cases was due to a difference in what people ate. He noted that the natives of his area of Africa had more cases of cancer after they began eating the same foods as the Europeans were eating.

More recently, other medical researchers have discovered the same truth: what we eat influences whether or not we will have cancer.

What is significant about the French doctor's findings 150 years ago is that, although Europeans were showing a higher rate of cancer, they could not blame it on chemical contaminants, because there were no chemicals used to grow food in those days. The key difference was that the natives of Africa and America ate no refined foods except those they may have received from Europeans with whom they came into contact.

The diet of those groups without cancer was very basic: meat, fish, vegetables and fruit in season or dried, and very little flour except what they could grind for themselves. They did not eat preservatives. They ate no cake, cookies, milkshakes, cheeseburgers, candy, bacon (American natives ate no pork), no refined flours or sugars. In fact, they ate little or no grains. They ate no canned or packaged foods. They rarely consumed alcohol (although American natives smoked tobacco).

Could we reduce the incidence of cancer just by eating simple foods? There are many medical researchers today who believe this is the way we should eat.

SVPS keeps plugging away at it

The Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) has had an interesting history in the valley. It was on the front page of the May 23, 2006 Similkameen News Leader where the group pressed for a commitment in an article with the headline, "Does Princeton want an EDO?"

SVPS Chair George Hanson and Similkameen Valley Economic development Officer Michael McLaughlin attended the May 15, 2006 Town Council meeting asking for continued financial support (along with other SVPS governing bodies) in hiring an EDO.

Two nights later the SVPS hosted a public meeting, which attracted two people.

"Regardless of the turn out, the SVPS had a lot of good things to say about itself," the article stated and outlined updates and bits of shared information from all participating bodies including RDOS Area H, the Town of Princeton, Village of Keremeos, RDOS Area G, RDOS Area B, the Lower Similkameen Indian Band and the Upper Similkameen Indian Band.

Keremeos Mayor Walter Despot spoke on the unifying effects of the SVPS.

"One of my objectives was to see valley unification in projects and concerns that affect the valley. I think we've come a long way on that. We're working as a valley now and I find that very reassuring, as we cannot survive alone."

Councillor Jim Manion agreed. "The more information we know about each other the more people will travel back and forth and we're seeing that."

Back to the May 15, 2006 Town Council meeting - Mayor Randy McLean had a 'good news' report on Princeton's future. He had recently met with Weyerhaeuser Forest Land Manager Bob Taylor and Rob Marshall of the local Timberlands Division to discuss the timber situation at the Princeton mill.

"Mayor McLean said he had learned there may be a shortage in seven years, but it is not likely to seriously affect the local Weyerhaeuser mill except to perhaps decrease the number of shifts."

Council also looked into a policy on mobile home parks.

The suggestion came from a letter from a Merritt lobby group regarding a new policy regarding rezoning

of mobile home parks.

"The issue arises as a result of a growing number of mobile home parks being sold and redeveloped as standard housing sites. The result is the displacement of tenants of the park. The majority of mobile home park tenants are seniors, who cannot easily find affordable housing elsewhere."

Dr. Mike Whittle wanted to come back to Princeton to set up a private practice. Almost 40 people attended the council meeting in support of Whittle's appeal.

At issue was a lack of sufficient parking spaces to meet bylaw requirements at a property in the downtown core Whittle was in the process of purchasing to locate his practice.

It was on May 18, 2006 that the RDOS endorsed an application to the Olympic/Paralympic Live Sites program for \$170,000 to aid in the creation of a multi-media theatre for the Princeton Riverside Wellness Centre.

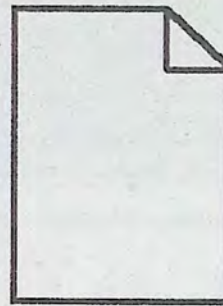
"The project will allow for the use of the centre as a theatre that will host community music, drama and dance events as well as conventions."

Jet fliers take over Princeton Airport

The Princeton Radio Control Fliers will again be flying real turbine powered radio controlled airplanes at your airport. There are posters and signs around town directing you to the weekend event.

You can attend from Saturday, June 5th to Sunday, June 6th. The pilots come from quite a distance to fly at this wonderful site. Pilots have come from as far East as Manitoba and South from Washington State, many stay at Princeton hotels but others camp at the flying area.

This event is being run under the Model Aeronautics Association of Canada (MAAC) sanction and insurance. During the event the Town posts a notice with Transport Canada, NOTAM, to let 'full scale' pilots know that the we will be flying there.

The club was formed by some serious Jet Turbine Model fliers to

be able to fly off of the long hard surface runway of the Princeton airport. An event will be held this Fall as well.

Flying will start setting up earlier in the week but the first day of normal flying will be on the Saturday, the main day. Many fliers have to

leave fairly early on the Sunday in order to get home for work on Monday.

On the Saturdays, around Noon, we line up all of the models on the runway and let spectators get 'up close and personal' with the planes and pilots. - submitted

**Council votes for
water tax bylaw**

Local residents living on Airport Road, Jacobson Road, and in East Princeton face a water system parcel tax this year under new bylaws that received first, second and third readings at the May 17 Town Council meeting.

Those residents affected have the option of paying the entire cost of the water supply or paying for it with an annual payment. For those

living on Airport Road, the annual payment will be \$414.14. Residents of East Princeton will pay \$466.15 per year, and those who live on Jacobson Road will pay \$509.22 per year.

A parcel tax review panel will be held Monday, June 7, at 7:30 PM at Town Hall for the purpose of discussing the bylaw and tax with residents affected.

PXA praises Princeton Rodeo Club

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) met at the fairgrounds on May 18 to discuss use and maintenance of the fairgrounds facility. President John Bey and volunteer grounds maintenance person Peter Ruoss had high praise for the way Princeton Rodeo Club ran the recent rodeo. Both expressed appreciation for the way Rodeo Club members cleaned up the grounds so

quickly. In return, the Rodeo Club thanked the PXA for all of the help provided before and during the event. Compliments went out to the security team, too, for how well they did their jobs. One of the issues that came up during the rodeo was related to operating the refreshment area. Some members were concerned about last

minute changes requested by the RCMP. PXA members decided the proper solution to the problem was to establish liaison with the RCMP as soon as possible to establish a clearer understanding of the latest regulations governing this type of operation so any changes required can be done in advance of Racing Days.

President Bey advised member groups to apply as early as possible for liquor permits so that regulations can be met well in advance of the event and last minute changes do not occur.

A request from Princeton 150 committee to rent the tent belonging to the Rodeo Club and Fall Fair resulted in a negative response. Vice President Terry Inglis advised it takes six men to set up and take down the tent. Neither the Fall Fair nor the Rodeo Club members appeared willing to commit themselves to doing the job.

The next public event at the fairgrounds will be the Fall Fair community yard sale on June 5, preceded by a work party day on May 30 when the Fall Fair plans to work on the grounds. The next major event at the fairgrounds will be the horse racing meet held July 3. The next meeting of the PXA will be on June 15 at 7:00 PM at the fairgrounds office.

Mayor McLean said the rodeo was a "great event" and commented on what a good job the Rodeo Club had done.

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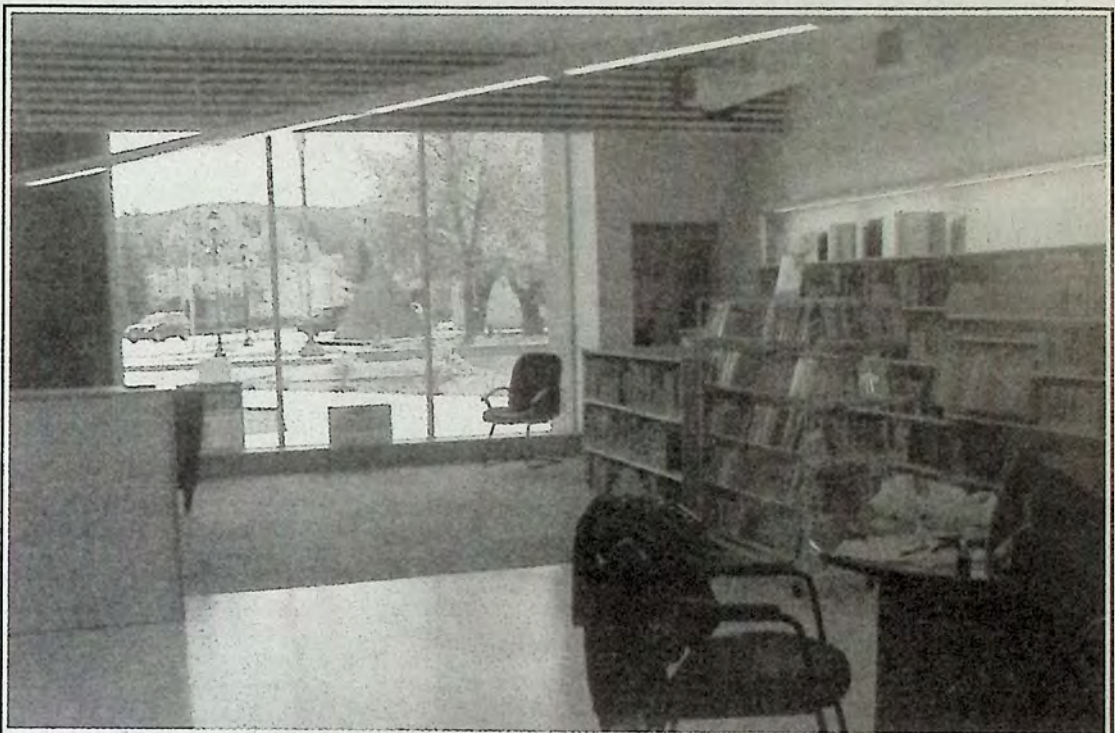
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New Princeton Library

Savoury Cherry Bruschetta

(NC)—Serve these with drinks as hors d'oeuvres – they're a nice contrast to the heavier pre-dinner snacks often served. Or spoon over grilled chicken, duck or pork as a fresh salsa.

- 6 slices white sandwich bread
- 2 tsp (10 mL) olive oil

Savoury Cherry Topping

- 1/2 lb (250 g) California cherries
- 1 lime
- 2 tsp (10 mL) olive oil
- 1 large garlic clove, minced
- 1 small jalapeno pepper, minced
- 2 to 3 tbsp (25 to 45 mL) slivered fresh mint or basil
- 1 green onion, thinly sliced
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) salt

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C). Trim crusts from bread and discard. Using a rolling pin, roll bread really thin. Cut each slice into quarters. Lightly oil a 12 mini muffin cup pan. Press a bread square into each muffin cup. Brush bread with half the oil. Bake until a deep golden, 15 to 20 minutes depending on the pan. Repeat with remaining bread squares. Cool completely on a rack. These can be made up to a week in advance and stored in an airtight container.

Pit cherries then coarsely chop. Place in a bowl. Finely grate lime peel over cherries, then squeeze 2 tsp (10 mL) lime juice over top. Stir in oil, garlic and jalapeno. Just before serving toss with mint, green onion and salt.

Spoon a heaping teaspoon (7 mL) cherry mix into bread cups. Garnish each with a tiny sprig of mint if you wish. Makes 24. Source: Recipe and image provided by the Buy California Marketing Agreement.

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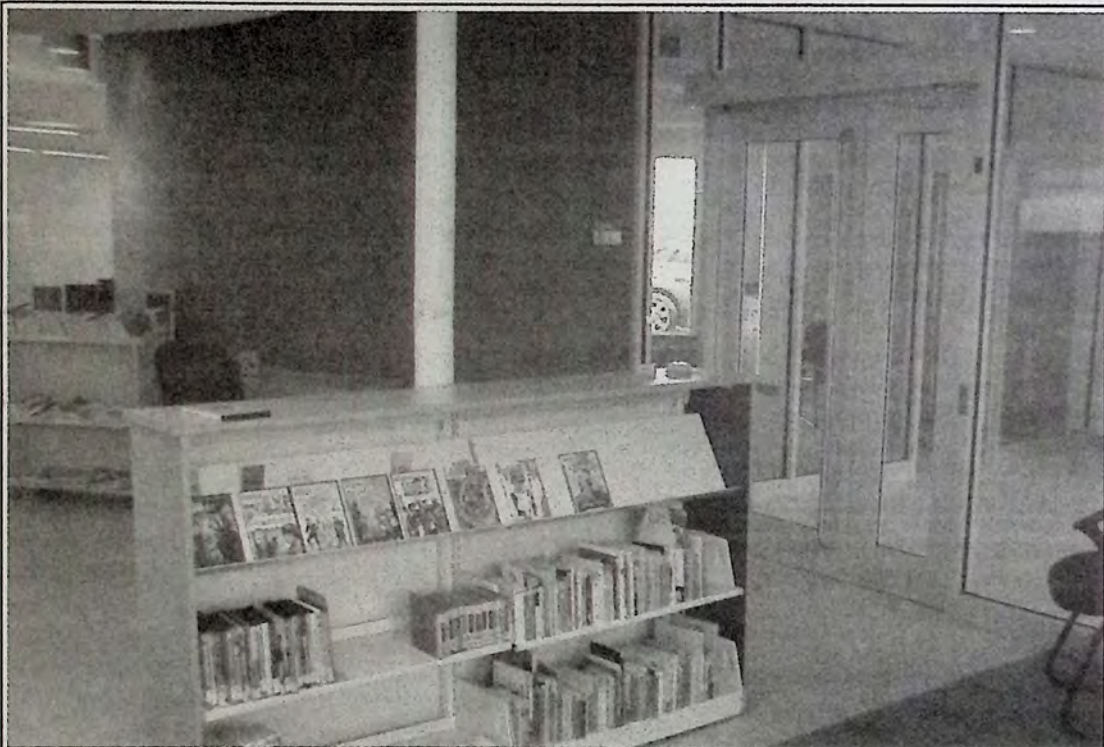
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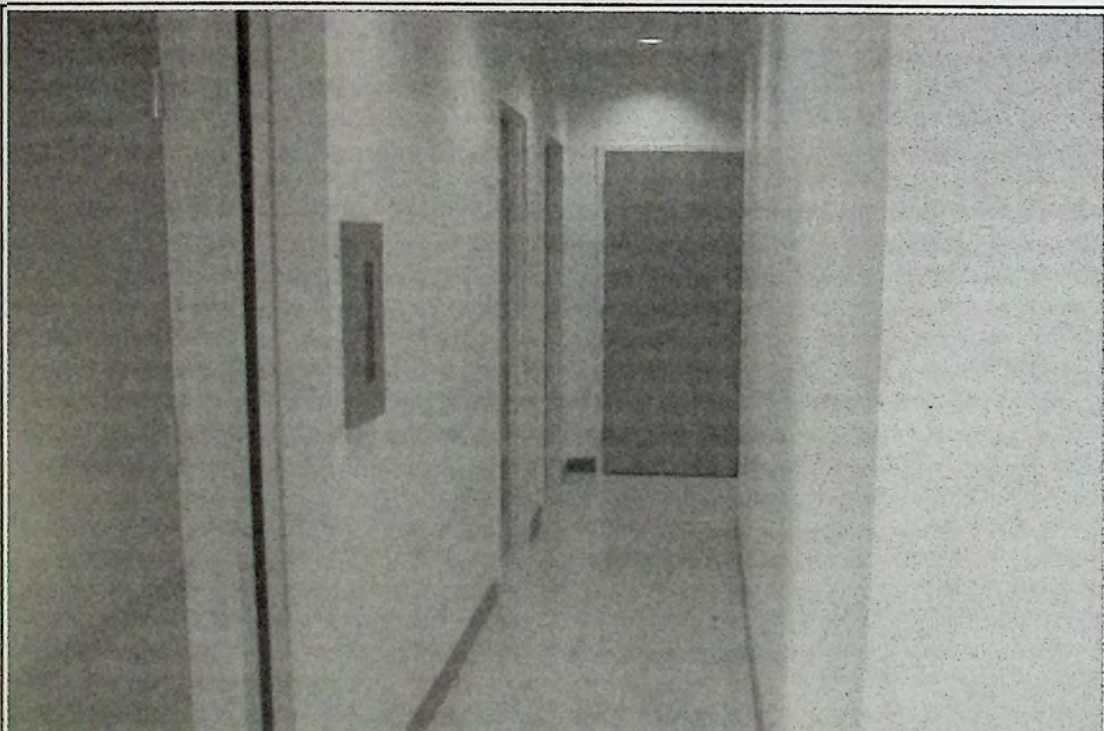

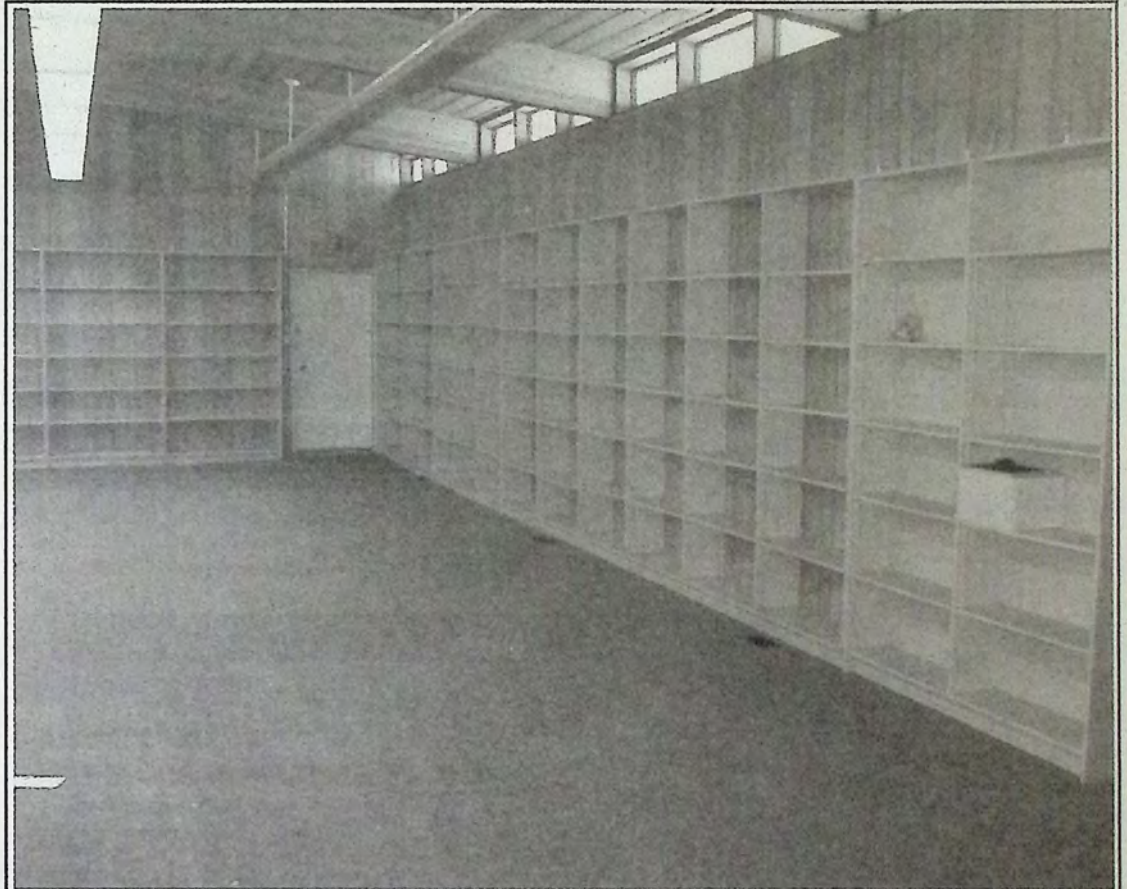

Town sets rules for Veterans Square

Town Council has adopted a policy and rules for those individuals or groups wishing to use Veterans Square for special events. Bookings for these events will be handled by Town Hall.

Each event must have a designated event manager who will be named on the event permit. The event committee must have a first aid attendant, must advise the neighbourhood of the event, determine extra needs for the event such as bleachers, garbage bins, tents, and so on. The events committee must plan for parking and traffic control and for washroom cleaning and monitoring (there will be a public washroom in the new library building).

Alcohol consumption is prohibited except when approved by a special event liquor licence issued by the RCMP and CAPE.

Each event must have proof of liability insurance which names

the Town of Princeton as additionally insured.

All amplified sound must be controlled and will be governed by the Town noise control bylaw.

The event organizer is responsible for ensuring the area is left clean and tidy and that no damage is done to park facilities, amenities or vegetation. If this is not done, there may be fees charged for cleaning and/or repairs and no further bookings will be approved for that organization or group.

No confetti, glitter or other manufactured products may be used in the square. Organic based products such as rice, rose petals and bubbles may be used.

Vendors and concession operators require written permission by the Town and must meet the requirements of all food safe and health authorities.

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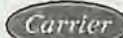
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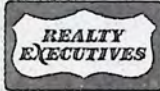
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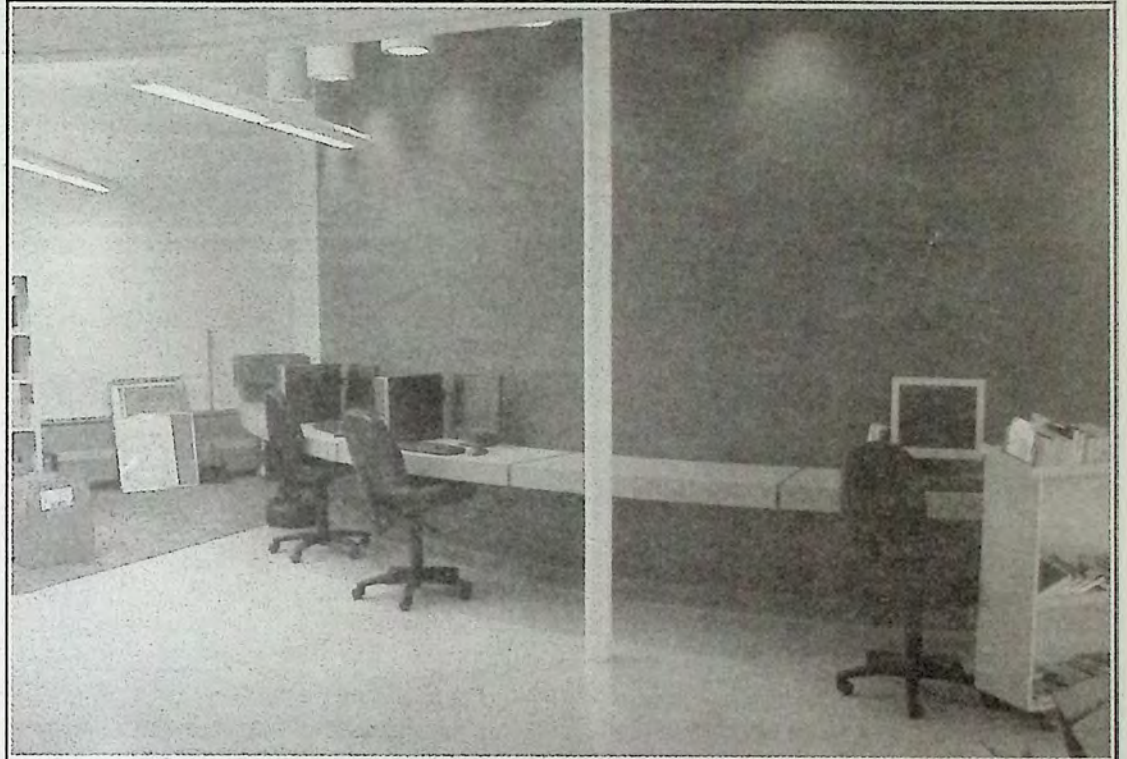
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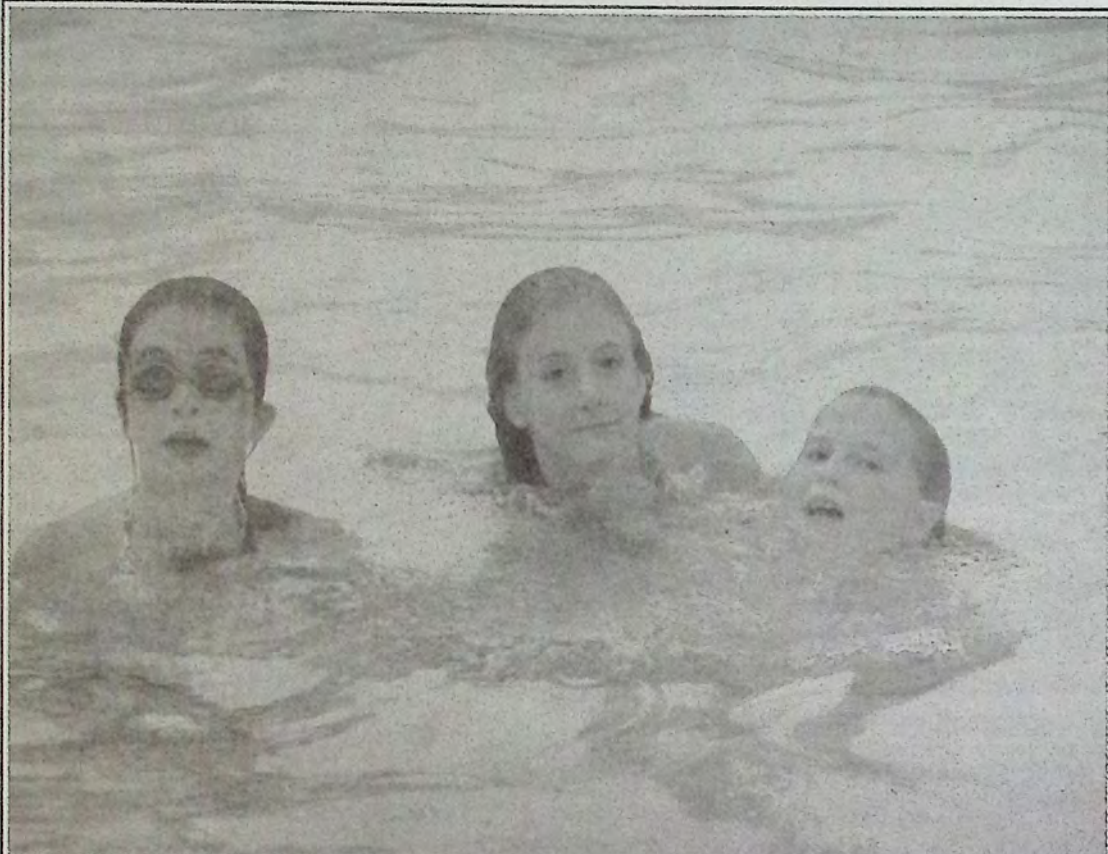
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The wide open floor plan of the new Princeton Library.*

How much salt do you ingest in a day? For some of us, a large amount of salt is poison. Sodium is a hidden silent killer, and is contributing to unnecessary deaths. The typical adult body needs no more than 1,500 mg of sodium per day to regulate fluids and blood pressure, and to keep muscles and nerves running smoothly.

On an average Canadians consume over 3,000 mg of sodium daily. One teaspoon of salt contains about 2,300 milligrams of sodium. Just for an example a tin of salmon or pork and beans are about 18%. Campbell's soup is 27% and a cup of soup is up to 30% or 700 mg.

Excessive sodium consumption is causing major health problems, leading to high blood pressure which causes stroke, heart disease and kidney failure. Just throwing out the salt shaker is not enough. About 80% of our salt consumption comes from processed food, pre-packaged, frozen and ready to eat foods. This would include pizza, microwave dinners, hot dogs, and hamburgers.

Salt has been a preservative since the dawn of civilization. The fight is on between the food industry and the medical community. You may wonder, if the reduction of salt could compromise food safety. In Britain they have been reducing

sodium over a decade.

Why can't we do the same? We would miss the salt at first, however in time our taste buds would get accustomed to the taste of food.

As we seniors know this, we try to make fresh and use non salt spices to add flavor to our soups and side dishes.

We will be serving lunch until June 11 and starting up again in September. Hopefully we have a Father's Day breakfast in the works, as the Mother's Day event was a success. During the summer the hall will still be open for pool and cards, along with bingo on Monday night. New members are always welcome.
