## Camper dispute leads to gunfire

Princeton RCMP report responding to a complaint of a camper being shot at in the early morning hours of Monday, May 24th at Kennedy Lake Resort.

"The investigation revealed that a dispute arose between two separate campsites," says Princeton RCMP Sgt. Dave Clare.

"This confrontation escalated from a physical altercation to a rifle being produced and a shot being fired into the air."

Police seized two rifles and arrested a 55-year old man from Surrey at the scene. He was later released and police are recommending charges of 'careless use of a firearm' and

'uttering threats' be pressed.

Princeton police have also released an update regarding the break and enter May 19th at Westland Insurance, 224 Bridge Street.

"A possible male suspect was seen running from the area the night of the break in," states a media advisory issued by the local RCMP Detachment.

The male is described as 5' 9" tall, 20-25 years old, 150-160 pounds, unshaven and 'dirty looking' wearing dark clothing.

## RDOS announces West Nile/Mosquito Control Program

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen West Nile virus Protection Program and regular Mosquito Control Program started in April and will continue until late August. Property owners have been contacted for permission to access and treat sites on foot and by helicopter. Helicopter applications allow the programs to effectively and efficiently treat large sites and sites that are difficult to access on foot.

The Mosquito Control Crew tests standing water for the presence of mosquito larvae. If the site requires treatment, a granular, biological Bti pesticide is applied to the water. Bti targets mosquito and biting black fly larvae. It affects midges to a lesser degree. The application of this pesticide does not adversely affect fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals, or other insects.

**Reduce Breeding Sites and Protect Yourself**  
Residents and businesses are urged

to remove standing water from rain gutters, caves troughs, Pails, rain barrel tops, tarps, pool and hot-tub covers, tires, roof-depressions and all other items collecting water. Refresh water in birdbaths, pets' water dishes, and troughs at least twice each week. Protect yourself by not allowing your yard to become a mosquito nursery.

Protect yourself by limiting your time outdoors at dawn and dusk; the mosquitos that can carry West Nile virus are most active at these times. Wear light-coloured pants and long-sleeved shirts. Use mosquito repellents as directed on the bottle. Horses are especially sensitive to the West Nile virus. Horse owners should contact their veterinarian to learn more about what they can do to protect their animals.

### Report Mosquito Habitat

If you have standing water of floodwater ponds, sloughs, marshes, water pooling in fields or other mosquito breeding sites on your property, the Mosquito Control Crew would like to hear from you. Call 250.490.4211 to report a potential

mosquito habitat site.

### Catchbasins

Strata and commercial catchbasins will be added to the 2010 West Nile virus Protection Program. If you are a strata member, you live in a strata building, or own or manage a commercial property with catchbasins contact the Mosquito Control Crew

at 250.490.4211.

### Tire Collection Program

The 2010 Tire Collection Program will begin soon. Tires left outside collect water and provide a perfect breeding ground for mosquitos. Contact the RDOS Tire Collection hotline at 250.490.4211 and they will pick up your regular-sized, car

and truck tires free of charge. You are asked to ensure tires are clean, unrimmed, and easily accessible. Tires are also accepted at the Campbell Mountain Landfill in Penticton, and at the Oliver, Keremeos, and Princeton landfills.

## MLA Harry Lali sets long-service record

Harry Lali, the long-time New Democrat MLA from Fraser-Nicola, surpassed his close friend and former New Democrat MLA and cabinet minister Moe Sihota last week to become the longest-serving South Asian MLA in British Columbia and Canada.

"It really has been an honour and a privilege to serve the people of Fraser-Nicola and the people of British Columbia for all these years and reach this historic milestone," said Lali from the legislature. "I am

honoured that the people of my constituency have consistently put their trust in me to represent them in Victoria."

Lali has represented Fraser-Nicola, formerly known as Yale-Lillooet, as MLA for almost 15 years. He was first elected in 1991, then re-elected in 1996, 2005, and 2009.

"I would also like to honour Moe Sihota, who is not only a good friend, but also served as one of my mentors both before and during the years we served together in caucus and in cabinet," said Lali.

Moe Sihota, party president, attended the official opposition caucus meeting in Victoria on Wednesday, May 26th and noted that Lali had surpassed his record.

In 1986, Sihota was the first Indo-Canadian to be elected to any legislature or parliament, and went on to become the first Indo-Canadian to be appointed to cabinet. Sihota achieved his long-service record in three consecutive election wins, being re-elected in 1991 and 1996, and served alongside Lali for 10 years.

Sihota said: "Harry has always been fiercely loyal to the New Democrats. When you went in to do battle with your political foes you could always count on Harry to be right there beside you."

Lali received a round of applause from all his New Democrat and Liberal colleagues in the B.C. Legislature Thursday, May 27th when Surrey-Newton MLA Harry Bains stood up during the daily "Introductions by Members" segment to point out that Lali had overtaken Sihota for the distinction of "longest-serving Indo-Canadian MLA in B.C."

New Democrat leader Carole James said: "Harry brings experience and passion to our caucus table. He is a real fighter and is never afraid to speak his mind, especially when it comes to standing up for his constituents and for rural British Columbia."

Lali first served as MLA as a part of the Mike Harcourt team from 1991 to 1996. Lali was re-elected in May 1996 under then-Premier Glen Clark. In 1996 Lali was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Forests, and then appointed Minister of Transportation and Highways by Clark in 1998, a post he held for three years. Lali took a sabbatical from elected politics in May, 2001. Four years later Lali jumped back into political life and has since been re-elected twice more, in 2005 and again in 2009. Harry and his wife Rani have three children and live in Merritt.

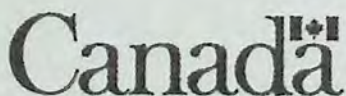
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# Sego Resources report find from drilling program

Sego Resources reported May 26th further copper and precious metal grade discoveries from the drilling program in the Granby Zone at the Miner Mountain Project.

Of the 20 holes drilled to date by Sego Resources Inc. at Miner

Mountain, holes 1-3 were drilled in the Regal Zone, holes 12-13 in the South Zone and holes 4-11 and 14-20 inclusive were drilled in the Granby Zone.

Of the four drill holes reported, DDH-19 is approximately 250 metres southwest of the centre of

the cluster of other holes drilled by Sego in the Granby Zone. Mineralization in DDH 19 is hosted by variably altered microdiorite below a prominent fault zone separating it from barren, essentially unaltered volcanic rocks in the upper 27 metres of the hole.

DDH-19 is located at the head of a prominent westerly trending gully which overlooks the high grade landslide material of the Regal Zone located by previous trenching and DDH-1-3. (News Release of June 2, 2008).

Consultant Selina Tribe, Ph.D., P.Geo., an expert in landslide studies, conducted a terrain study for Sego and indicated probable sources for the Regal and other likely slides. This study led to the excavation of trenches 93,94 and 95 during the current program. DDH-19, reported above, was drilled beneath trench 95.

The other three holes reported herein, DDH-16, 18 and 20, are at the north and eastern ends of the Granby Zone, approximately 275 to 320 metres northeast of DDH-19. Mineralization in these and nearby holes is hosted by variably altered volcanic and intrusive rocks.

Trenching and drilling at Miner Mountain, and further petrographic studies by Kathryn Dunne, M.Sc., P.Geo., submitted in a report dated May 7, 2010 confirm the presence of intrusive and volcanic rocks and of strong potassic and other alteration assemblages characteristic of alkalic porphyry systems such as Copper Mountain (15km to the south) and Afton (125 km to the

North). The petrographic study also identified chalcopyrite and bornite partially replaced by chalcocite and covellite, a suite of copper minerals.

The Kathryn Dunne, M.Sc., P.Geo. and the Selina Tribe, Ph.D., P.Geo. reports as well as the location of trenches and drill holes can be found on our website: [www.segoresources.com](http://www.segoresources.com).

Sego Resources Inc. is a mineral exploration company, exploring the Miner Mountain Project, a large scale porphyry copper-gold target northeast of Princeton that is 2,400 hectares in size.

Exploration to date, has located zones of high grade surface copper-gold mineralization and drilling has confirmed the presence of significant copper-gold grades at depth. The Miner Mountain Project is 15 kilometres north of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation's former copper producer (closed 1996) that is scheduled to resume production in 2011, following a recent favourable feasibility study.

The Miner Mountain Project is situated within the traditional territory of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band with whom Sego has a memorandum of understanding which provides a constructive framework for future development and exploration.

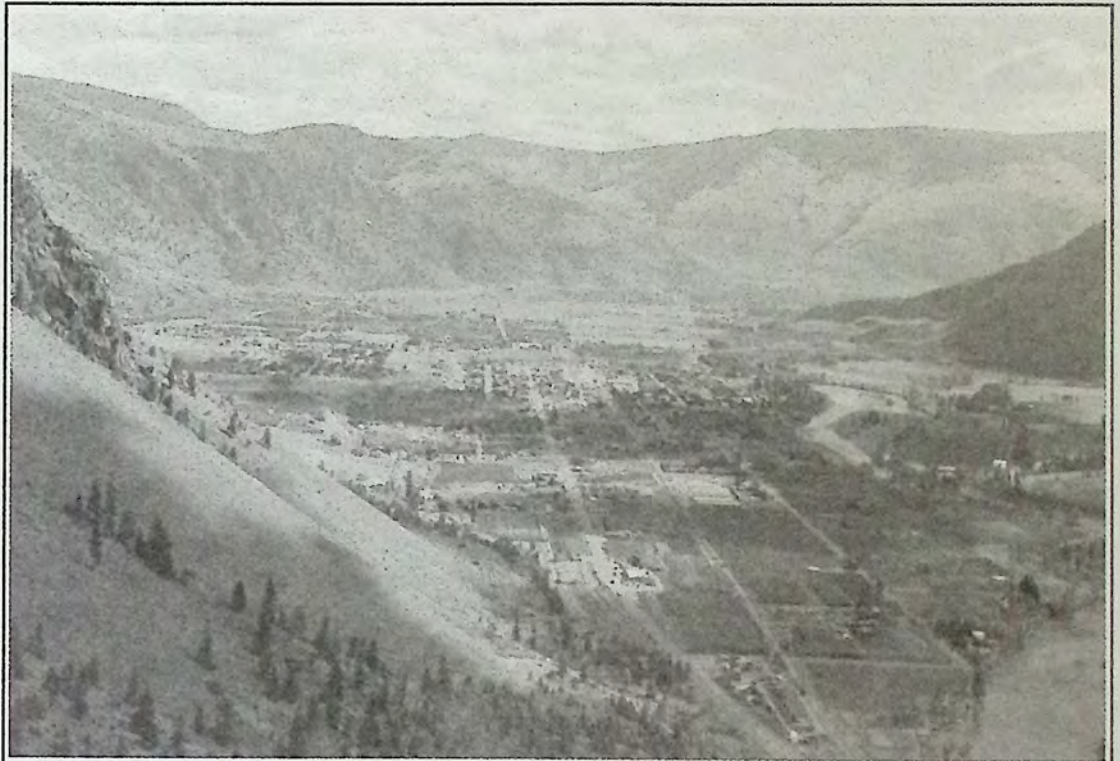

## RDOS announces yard waste collection dates

Yard Waste collections occur in Okanagan Falls, Twin Lakes, Oliver, Osoyoos, Keremeos and Electoral Areas 'A', 'B', 'C' and 'G' the week of May 31st to June 4th. Homes in Penticton, Naramata, Kaleden, West Bench, Heritage Hills and Carmi get pickups the week of June 7th to 11th. Residents are asked to place bags and bundles out by 7:00 AM on their regular garbage collection day during their scheduled week. Residents should place their yard

waste in clear bags or bundle branches with twine or string. Bags and bundles should weigh no more than 25 kg/55 pounds. To be collected in this program, branches must be smaller than 7.5 cm/3 inches in diameter and shorter than 1 m/3 feet in length. Food waste and lumber are not collected with this service and should not be mixed in bags or bundles.

Home owners are reminded that any landfill will receive up to 500 kg/1,100 pounds per load of yard

waste, clean lumber and large branches any time of year.

Backyard compost bins, priced at \$39 taxes included, are still available at the Campbell Mountain, Summerland, Oliver and Keremeos landfills. These easy to use compost bins come with an instruction manual. Used as directed, compost bins help turn kitchen scraps, yard waste and rotten pumpkins into excellent food for your garden and house plants. 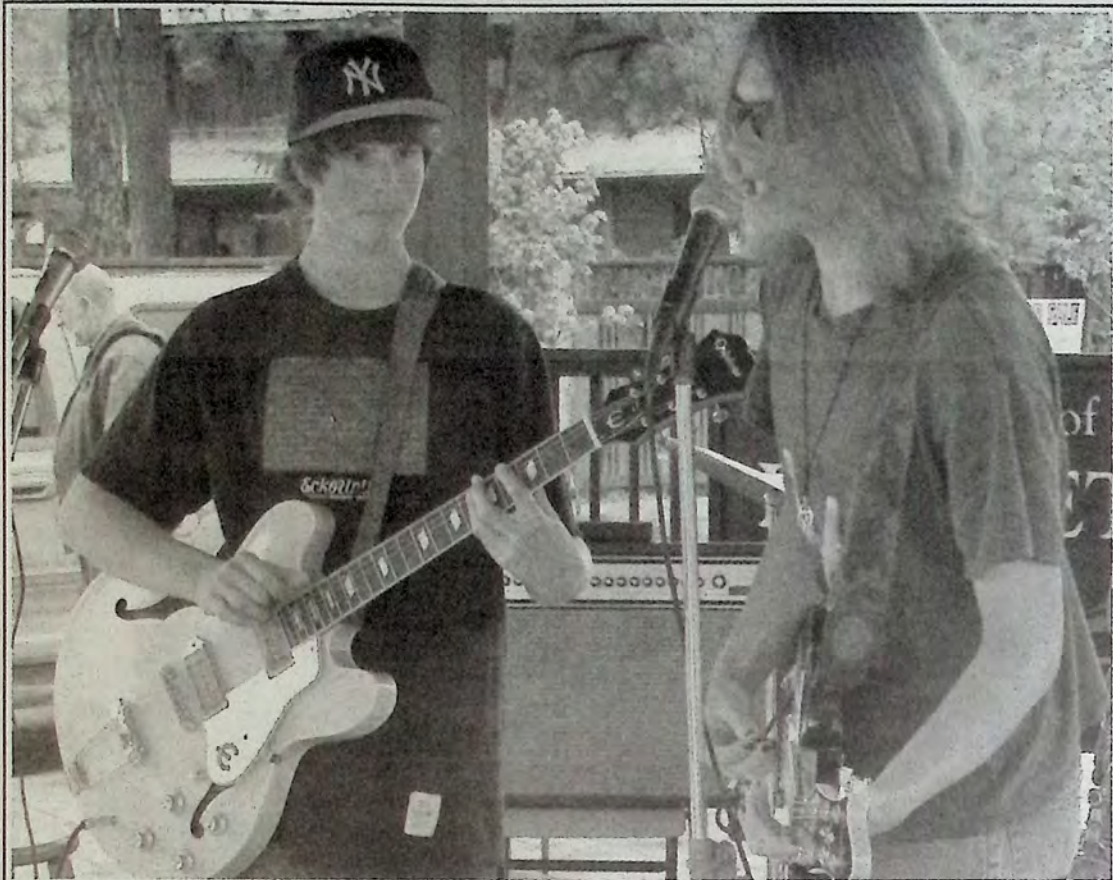

## 2009 an active year for the ORL

At the May 19 meeting of the Okanagan Regional Library Board, the Board reviewed the Executive Summary for the 2009 year. Major highlights include:

- An overall increase in circulation of items through the system of 3%, with significant increases noted at the Kelowna, Mission, Vernon, Enderby, Falkland, Golden, Kaleden, Naramata, Revelstoke, and Sorrento Branches; Silver Creek Branch had the largest jump in circulation with an increase of 31.6% over 2008 figures.
- A total of 1.75 million visits to ORL branches in 2009.
- Huge increases in online activity, with an 86.5% increase in the use of

Library To Go (downloadable Audiobooks and eBooks) and a 18.7% increase in the number of holds placed online.

- The ORL website was accessed 1.2 million times, a 28% increase over 2008.
- Over 88,430 people participated in ORL programs.

The Board also received and approved the audited financial statements for the 2009 budget year, with a current fund deficit for the year of \$227,229.

New business included the Board approving a Terms of Reference for the Vernon Building Committee and an overview of the Vernon Building Program, which outlines the build-

ing requirements for a new Vernon Branch to serve the needs of the community for the next 20 years.

The Board also acknowledged the opening of the new South Shuswap Branch in Blind Bay, and congratulated member Ivan Idzan, a city councillor in Salmon Arm, on his election to Vice President of the BC Library Trustees' Association.

Further improvements to the ORL system were completed recently with the opening of the new library branch in Princeton.

ORL has 29 branches serving communities in the Thompson-Okanagan and Similkameen including facilities in Princeton, Hedley and Keremeos.

## Health record portals putting patients in charge

(NC)—A new health care technology called patient portals is beginning to change how health care is delivered in Canada. For many years patients have just been spectators when it came to the management of their own health. Now patient portals, part of new electronic medical record (EMR) technology, are putting patients directly into the game. Ottawa physician Dr. Jay Mercer calls it 'Gretzky-medicine'. "It's not just about scoring. It's about giving people the puck in the right position to score," he says using a

distinctly Canadian analogy to explain how the portals allow patients to gain access to their health information and interact with doctors and specialists in an unprecedented manner.

"I'm getting you the information to make it much easier for you to know what's going on."

Patient portals let patients play a greater part in their own care. The portals can be used by patients to see their health records, access a list of their medications and dosage instructions, find medical forms and

request prescription refills - all through a secure, on-line system.

Patient portals can be part of an EMR, the modern version of a doctor's paper files that can capture important patient information - medical history, medications, X-ray results, lab results - and assist with billing, scheduling, ordering tests and generating prescriptions. Seven years ago Dr. Jay Mercer was one of the earliest adopters of EMRs. Now he believes patient portals are resulting in another big improvement to patient care by allowing patients to exchange information with their doctors, including blood pressure readings, weight measurement and tracking various symptoms, all without ever leaving home.

He says the difference the portal has made to his patients is dramatic. "For example, I'm not sending an 80-year old woman out in the middle of winter to potentially break her hip just to come to my office to check her blood pressure. She's doing it at home, feeding it to me online, and we're both getting the same results."

## Managing your meds

(NC)—Every year, incorrect use of prescription drugs is the cause of one quarter of hospital admissions for the elderly and 23 per cent of all nursing home admissions. But keeping track of what drug to take at the right time can be challenging, especially for people with multiple prescriptions.

"According to the Canada Safety Council the average Canadian over the age of 65 is taking nine medications daily," says Holly Quinn, spokesperson for myNurse, a new service from Bayshore Home Health that offers people regular health management visits by a registered nurse. "Factor in additional health problems such as dementia, and it's easy to understand why drug non-adherence is a serious health concern for the elderly."

Quinn offers the following tips:

- Have a health professional review your medications, help you establish a schedule, and discuss possible side effects or interaction concerns.
- Always take your medication at the same time and in the manner prescribed.

- Have your pharmacist organize your medications in a blister card.
- Visit [www.mynursehealthcheck.ca](http://www.mynursehealthcheck.ca) to download a handy chart to keep track of the medicines you're taking.
- Unless otherwise instructed, finish any prescription you receive—even if you're feeling better.
- If you have trouble opening the safety cap of your medication bottle, ask for a flip top lid.
- Tell your doctor and pharmacist immediately if you experience new or unexpected side effects from your medication.

The May 29, 2007 Similkameen News Leader was the annual 'Grad Issue' which featured individual photos of the 22 members of the Class of 2007. Although it was one of the smaller graduating classes in recent history (20 from Princeton Secondary School plus two from The Bridge) many of those students have gone on to great things representing their Similkameen Valley home with pride.

The graduation ceremony on May 26, 2007 followed the theme of "We're On Our Way" and included an empty chair for Tanner Hogg who would have graduated with them. Hogg passed away three years before.

The ceremony also featured three valedictorians - Amy Burke and Denis Gutierrez-Ogrinc gave a humorous review of their progress through various schools while Miranda Grigg gave a more serious farewell from the class and to the end of school days.

The prestigious Bernice Wardle Trophy was presented to MaryAnn Campbell.

In other news from three years ago, the Princeton Accessibility Awareness Committee challenged members of Town Council to experience the hazards and difficulties one faces in a wheelchair in downtown Princeton. The May 31st event opened the eyes of many par-

ticipants and assisted the committee in getting some cosmetic changes made to local businesses, sidewalks and facilities.

The PAAC plans another 'Accessibility Awareness Day' early this month to keep their concerns in the public eye. One major issue the committee has spent a considerable amount of time on is the pedestrian-controlled crossing at Highway 3 and Burton Avenue.

Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin attended the May 22, 2007 Town Council meeting requesting funding. The money requested was to fund a study on amenity migrants - those who move to a community to enjoy a lifestyle and possibly invest in that community and bring jobs with them.

The cost of the study was \$40,000 and the SVPS had secured the majority of that through grants and other funding sources. Town Council was asked to make up the \$5,425 shortfall.

"Council appeared reluctant to do so, as the budget for this year has been set," the article stated.

"Councillors asked McLaughlin if he had requested money from Keremeos Council and all Area Directors. McLaughlin had not yet asked them. Councillor Jim Manion suggested McLaughlin come back with a cost sharing for-

mula and Council would take another look at it."

John Henry celebrated turning 60 by running in the 8th annual Coalmont to Princeton race June 10, 2007.

"I will be sixty later this year and would like to challenge any other 'soon-to-be-sixties' to give it a try."

Vermilion Artists hosted one of the first events held in the former Goldion Restaurant during Racing Days 2007 - an Art Show. However, the plan did not meet with full approval of Town Council when the space was requested at the May 22, 2007 Town Council meeting.

Although the Town of Princeton owned the property, intended to be the future site of the public library, Councillor Maria Sadegur opposed having the art show in the former dining room and suggested Vermilion Artists should have asked to use the Legion Hall for the event.

"CAO Patrick Robins said he believes the dining area will be useable with the removal of a few tables and chairs. Council voted in favour, with Councillor Sadegur still opposed."

The site ended up being used for many art shows since that time and was reopened last week as the new public library after months of renovations.

### Be Prepared If Interest Rates Rise

As an investor, you'll want an "all-weather" strategy - one you can follow in all types of markets and every economic climate. Of course, that doesn't mean you should never adjust your portfolio in response to changes in the investment world. And we may be close to one of those changes: Specifically, it's quite possible the Bank of Canada (BoC) will increase its benchmark lending rate in the second half of 2010. If that happens, should you re-evaluate your bond holdings?

As you may know, interest rates help determine bond prices. If interest rates go up, the value of your existing bonds is likely to decline, because investors won't pay you full price for your bonds when they can get newly issued ones that pay higher interest rates. And while the BoC's actions will affect the prices of short-term bonds, your long-term bonds will likely decline even further. That's because long-term bonds are affected primarily by expectations about inflation - and typically, when the BoC raises rates, it does so, in part, because of fears of inflation.

So what steps should you take in anticipation of a jump in short-term rates? Should you sell some of your long-term bonds now? Actually, you may not have to rush into anything. In the first place, no one can really predict exactly when rates will change. Secondly, even if short-term rates rise, there's no guarantee that long-term rates will rise as well. But even if market rates rise, and the prices of your bonds fall, you can still anticipate two key benefits, provided the bond issuer doesn't default. First, you'll still collect regular interest payments, and second, you'll be able to redeem your bond for the full face value once it matures.

If you do want to be more proactive, however, you can create and maintain a portfolio of bonds that can provide advantages in all interest rate environments. How? By owning a "ladder" of bonds of varying maturities. When market rates are low, you'll still have your long-term bonds, which typically pay higher rates, working for you. And when market rates increase, you can use the proceeds from your maturing short-term bonds to purchase new ones issued at the higher rates.

Apart from the regular income stream and the ability to collect a lump sum, both of which you can get from holding your bonds until maturity, and beyond the interest rate protection you may be able to achieve through a bond ladder, you can gain one other important advantage from owning bonds: diversification. If a market downturn hurts stock prices, the presence of bonds may help reduce the impact on your portfolio, because bonds frequently (though not always) move in the opposite direction of stocks. (Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss).

As we've seen, you can "weatherize" your bond portfolio for all interest rate climates. Furthermore, bonds can offer you real benefits, no matter what's happening with interest rates. So while it's obviously a good idea to be aware of changes in these rates, avoid overreacting to them. By making the right long-term moves with your bond portfolio, you can make progress toward your financial goals today - and tomorrow.

## Small Business 101

### CFIB - Canadian Federation of Independent Business

CFIB commends Mayors and Councillors for supporting the return of the Business Vote

On May 26th, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) joined four BC mayors and four Councillors from across BC as they announce their personal support for small businesses in their communities by endorsing the return of the business vote in local government elections.

"I have to commend these municipal representatives that have made a very personal commitment to restore representation to their local business community," said Brian Bonney, CFIB Director of Provincial Affairs, BC.

Restoring the business vote is about creating a stronger incentive to listen to the concerns of business, concerns that are different from residents at the municipal level.

"As representatives of our communities, we are committed to a thriving small business sector that is essential for creating jobs, training workers, providing essential goods and services, and supporting local charities," said Mayor Susan Roline, Merritt, BC.

A critical ingredient to the successful return of the business vote is the process CFIB has recommended. This would dramatically increase the effectiveness of the business vote as well as eliminate potential for abuse.

"Eliminating businesses' right to vote because the process allowed someone to rent a storage locker and obtain a business license to gain an extra vote amounted to throwing the baby out with the bathwater," said Bonney.

"The 1993 decision to eliminate the right of businesses to vote in municipal elections in BC reflected a gen-

eral lack of awareness about BC's small- and medium-sized businesses, the challenges they face and the economic and social benefits they provide to our communities," said Mayor Greg Phelps, Courtenay, BC.

"With just one potential business vote for every 7.7 citizen's votes, the business vote will not be the silver bullet that restores representation over night. However, as mayors and Councillors, it is our duty to support all taxpayers in our communities. The right to vote given to non-resident property owners in local government elections recognizes the inherent right to representation relative to the taxes non-resident property owners pay in our municipalities. It points to a fundamental connection between taxation and representation."

"We support this fundamental right to have a vote in relation to property taxation that our local community businesses are seeking through restoration of the business vote", said Councillor Kevin Flynn, Salmon Arm, BC.

"Restoring the municipal business vote will recognize the vital contributions that small- and medium-sized businesses make to where we all live, work and play," said Mayor Rick Green, Langley Township, BC.

"Business owners take tremendous personal risks, drive our economy, donate to non-profits and employ our citizens even during recessions," said Councillor Linda Reimer, Coquitlam, BC.

"The business vote will likely inspire business owners, their staff and their families to take more interest in local government elections and become more involved. This increased interest and involvement in the political process is a good out-

come for all of us as it would strengthen our democracy as it allows the businesses that are integral to our communities to be heard," said Councillor John Trainor, Armstrong, BC.

Despite the significant contribution small- and medium-sized enterprises make to the economy and the many benefits they bring to our communities, irrefutable evidence shows many BC businesses face excessive municipal taxes compared to residents on same value property. When comparing provinces, BC municipalities have the most extreme differential between residential and business property tax rates in Canada. The local government representatives in support of this proposal recognize this fact and feel more needs to be done to reduce businesses property tax burden compared to residents. However, they stress that this should be done over time as the growing number of residential properties will not increase the tax burden on residential taxpayers in their communities.

However, returning representation is not just about taxes. Businesses are disenfranchised on a wide variety of local government issues including bylaws, user fees, permits, licensing, land use and old fashioned customer service.

BC's small- and medium-sized businesses account for a majority of all businesses in BC and more than one-third of BC's gross domestic product. The vast majority have fewer than five employees, but collectively employ over 50 per cent of BC's private-sector workforce.

Recipe #325

## Maple Walnut Rice Cakes

(NC)—Looking for an unexpected and delicious way to use leftover rice? These tender and delicious rice cakes have an appealing nutty flavour and the added bonus of being gluten-free.

- 2 eggs
- 2 tbsp milk 30 mL
- 1 tbsp maple syrup 15 mL
- 2 cups cooked, U.S. long grain white or brown rice 500 mL
- 1/2 cup rice flour 125 mL
- 1/2 cup chopped toasted walnuts 125 mL
- 1/2 tsp salt 2 mL
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon 2 mL
- 2 tbsp melted butter 30 mL
- Additional maple syrup
- Chopped fresh fruit (optional)

- 1) In a large bowl, whisk eggs with milk and maple syrup; stir in rice, rice flour, walnuts, salt and cinnamon.
- 2) Brush a large, nonstick skillet with some of the butter and set over medium heat. Working in batches, spoon 1/3 cup (75 mL) of rice mixture per cake into the skillet. Press lightly with the back of the spatula to flatten.
- 3) Cook for 3 minutes or until set and bottoms are golden. Turn and cook for 3 minutes or until golden. Repeat, brushing skillet with butter as needed, until all the rice mixture is used. Serve with additional maple syrup and fresh fruit (if using).

Makes 4 servings. Per serving: about 475 cal, 18 g fat, 11 g pro, 70 g carb, 2 g fibre, 669 g sodium.

Tip: Recipe doubles easily to serve a hungry crowd.

Tip: Transfer cakes as they are cooked to a baking sheet and place in an oven preheated to 150°F (65°C) to keep warm until ready to serve. Optional Tip: Whole-wheat flour can be used instead of rice flour for those who aren't worried about gluten content.

## Our MP Tells The Other Side

I was keenly interested in what our Member of Parliament, Alex Atamanenko, had to say in a recent news letter. He talked about Canada's low rate of corporate taxes, and pointed out some of the ruling party's propaganda does not equal the facts. I will say at the outset that I am one of those voters who is not committed to any political party, so whether Alex Atamanenko is a New Democrat does not bother me. I have heard too many political promises to really believe in any political party completely. What I do like is facts.

What our MP is telling us is that our current federal government is continuing to cut corporate taxes for no reason that stands up to careful scrutiny. Cutting corporate taxes is supposed to increase the number of jobs and make our economy more competitive on the world market through innovation. Atamanenko quotes statistics showing Canada's corporations invest less in innovations than 13 other nations.

The other thing corporate tax cuts are supposed to do is increase productivity. This is measured through Gross National Production (GDP). Atamanenko quotes our federal government report which shows reduction in corporate taxes was matched by a decrease in productivity, a sign that big business is not investing in

technology nor research and development.

Canada's government often compares itself to the U.S. government, but American corporations pay higher corporate taxes than Canadian corporations.

Ten years ago, Canada ranked fifth in competitiveness, and now ranks ninth. At the same time as the government has been giving corporations a tax break, corporations have not been spending money on better machinery, more research, or increased productivity. The corporations have not created more jobs. Instead, these corporations have chalked up higher profits.

Why has the government chosen to reduce corporate taxes again rather than look at corporate performance? It is important to remember that corporations spend money on lobbying. Corporations court politicians and political parties. The corporate point of view and business philosophy can be instilled in many ways. Dinner parties, one on one lunches, sponsorships of conferences and direct campaign contributions put politicians in a position to be swayed by corporate persuasion.

Lobbying is not a new thing. All of us lobby our governments for all sorts of benefits to our individual special interests. We go in groups to our Town Council, we appeal to our provincial government, and to our federal government. The difference between our lobbying and the lobbying of big corporations is significant. Generally, what the public wants is something good for all of us. What corporations want is less government interference so they can make bigger profits.

It is important to remember that corporations are structured to create bigger and bigger profits. Corporations are not concerned with lobbying for better health care, nor affordable housing, nor lower university tuition, nor environmental improvements. Corporations lobby to gain an advantage that will lead to bigger profits.

When we, as private citizens, lobby our government, our bottom line is not profits, it is improvement in social conditions that affect all of us. We elect our politicians to bring those improvements to us. We pay taxes to our governments to finance the improvements we would like to see. This is how the goal of the private citizen and the big corporations are at odds, and why we need to be alert to the persuasiveness of corporations as they court the goodwill of political parties.

Many nations agree to higher taxes for everyone in order to improve the standard of comfort for the average citizen. Canada's efforts to court corporate investment has led to corporations trying to take over providing health care, and health care insurance, as well as trying to own our water supply and polluting our lakes, rivers and seas. Our federal government appears to have been easily coaxed by corporate sweet talk to the point where such groups as the Council of Canadians, and several environmental lobbyists, have had to remind politicians they could be out of office if they do not pay attention to what Canadian citizens want.

Thank you Alex Atamanenko for bringing us some truths about corporate tax cuts.

## BC Southern Interior Monthly Report

### HST: Where is the benefit for BC communities?

As of July 1st, the governments of Canada and British Columbia intend to institute a Harmonized Sales Tax (HST) of 12 per cent, combining a 7 per cent Provincial Sales Tax (PST) with a 5 per cent federal Goods and Service Tax (GST).

As well, despite the Provincial bill still not being passed at the time of this column's writing, some sections of the bill took effect on May 1, with businesses being required to start collecting the HST for pre-paid services that will be used after July 1, such as gym memberships and travel tickets.

The HST means that residents and businesses will be paying more for many goods or services that were previously exempt. Many foods, vitamins, meals in restaurants, funeral costs, hairdressers and hundreds of other everyday items will soon cost you more.

Both governments claim that HST will save about \$2 billion for BC businesses, helping them become more competitive. The governments say big businesses will save: - about \$1.9 billion because they will no longer have to pay PST on products that are considered business "inputs" and - another \$150 million annually because they will no longer need to have separate collecting, accounting and remitting process for PST.

The governments believe that these savings to companies can be passed down to consumers or provide new investment opportunities to create jobs and economic growth.

It is not so simple or clear, how-

ever. Remember the promises of lower prices when the Free Trade deals were struck with the United States, and then Mexico? I think most Canadians will agree that this has not happened to any great extent. There is nothing that guarantees any input cost savings found for companies will actually be passed on to consumers as savings.

The main purpose of a company is to maximize profit. There is no guarantee that corporations that achieve this greater profit will decide to reinvest these profits into more jobs, or technologies, or even in Canada.

Yet, to coerce BC's transition to the HST, the federal government dangled \$1.6 billion in special one-time transfer payments in front of BC, at a time of severe economic downturn. In effect, the federal government is spending Canadian taxpayers hard-earned money to further shift the tax burden from the corporate sector to individual taxpayers, and onto low and middle income families. A whopping \$1.9 Billion. And, the HST will all be paid to the federal Canada Revenue Agency.

The Province counters by holding up their Low Income Credit for families and individuals, saying over 1.1 million British Columbians will receive quarterly credits of \$52.50, or a little over 50 cents a day. Does this really match the increased tax they will pay with the HST?

Meanwhile we witness school and hospital closures all over the province, with those left having budgets cut to the bone. Skilled

teachers and health professionals are joining the ranks of the unemployed. Will this mean a growing exodus from rural areas to bigger centres - either to search for a job, or for a community that still offers a school and hospital?

The HST is a regressive, unfair tax, and the timing couldn't be worse. It will not help to create new jobs and will further hurt low and middle income British Columbians. And remember, the BC government stated before the last provincial election that they would not institute the HST.

There is currently an initiative to end the Harmonized Sales Tax in BC. To be successful the petition must be signed by 10% of the registered voters in each provincial constituency by July 5th.

I encourage you to inform yourself further on this very important issue.

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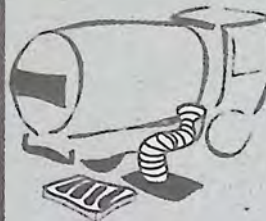


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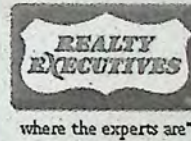
