Board approves plan for future of Similkameen Valley

Every resident and every landowner in the Similkameen watershed will be affected by a strategy endorsed by the Similkameen Valley Planning Society. The strategy is a positive groundwork for development of the valley during the next 10 years. A document titled Strategy for a Sustainable Similkameen Valley (2011 - 2020) will be sent to Keremeos Village Council, Princeton Town Council, Councils of Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands and to Regional District for endorsement by September 1. Then an action plan will be developed for implementation next year. Planning sessions will involve the general public.

The facts behind the strategy Similkameen Valley population growth rate between 2001 and 2006 exceeded that of the South Okanagan and the province. The highest growth rates were in Area H and the Village of Keremeos.

Most of the growth came from in-migration, that is from people moving to the valley because of a high quality natural environment and rural lifestyle. This in-migration trend will continue.

Along with increased economic activity there comes more pressure on the environment and an increase in the cost of living, particularly for housing. The newcomers bring their savings, their experience of other locations and lifestyles, and new ideas. Problems can result from this kind of migration: lack of affordable housing, widening income disparity between earlier inhabitants and newcomers, and social and economic displacement of residents of modest income.

The most common result of this kind of in-migration, based on experience of some similar American communities, is landscape fragmentation. Low density development takes place in former open areas which become residential areas. Water resources are depleted, ecological systems are stressed, and there are more prob-

lems between humans and wildlife. The strategy is intended to alleviate the problems.

The Similkameen Valley is recognized provincially and nationally for richness and rarity of species and habitats, with a high proportion designated as being at risk due to sensitivity to human disturbance. The strategy addresses this concern.

Similkameen Valley Planning Society mission statement

Throughout a lengthy study involving a panel of facilitators and valley residents, the Planning Society developed a mission: "to establish a socio-cultural, economic and environmental strategy for the Similkameen Valley that will maintain and enhance the quality of our rural and small town lifestyle."

The mission objectives are:

1. Celebrate the socio-cultural and bio-physical diversity of our valley.
2. Protect our valley's water, land, air quality and bio-diversity.
3. Promote a diverse valley economy with multiple opportunities.
4. Maintain a physically, culturally

and spiritually healthy Similkameen Valley.

5. Propose a means to implement, monitor and evaluate our valley's sustainability strategy.

6. Increase the participation of Similkameen Valley residents in achieving this mission.

THE STRATEGY - First Aim

1. Increase involvement of Valley residents in, especially strengthening local social and cultural institutions and activities (and secondarily, in influencing senior government's decisions) through social engagement and participation in elections, and volunteer community development and conservation organizations and government committees and boards.

2. Attract (compete for) in-migrants having values that complement the mission objectives of sustaining the quality of environmental amenities and small-town lifestyle.

3. Provide housing that helps the Valley develop a balanced population (especially children, workers and retirees).

4. Strengthen a Valley-wide sense

of community through heightening awareness and value of the Valley's rich cultural and biological diversity and natural and cultural history.

5. Build collaborative relationships between the Indian Bands and other communities in the Valley.

THE STRATEGY - Second Aim

6. Increase environmental conservation, efficiency of resource use and shift to alternative energy, with particular consideration for mitigating and adapting to climate change effects.

7. Improve water management significantly and integrate management into Valley-specific climate change.

8. Develop environmental management.

9. Attract (compete for) in-migrants with values that complement the Valley's mission objectives of sustaining the quality of its environmental amenities and small-town lifestyle.

10. Regulate housing and residential development for conservation of especially, land, water, energy

11. Undertake spatial planning for sustaining cultural, social, environmental and economic health, including growth management, supported by improved collaboration between local and regional decision-makers and greater community engagement.

THE STRATEGY - Third Aim

12. Increase economic activity and jobs principally through focusing on Valley resource-conserving and sustainable products and services, and substitution of imported goods and services.

13. Attract (compete for) knowledge-intensive, innovative and resource-conserving in-migrants.

14. Increase access to housing, especially for families of younger in-migrants and local born with modest incomes.

15. Formulate a Valley-wide Sustainable Economic Development Action Plan and a mechanism to implement it.

THE ACTION PLAN

The action plan is the next stage in the process. Two colleges have expressed interest in contributing their expertise to assist in planning, as this is one of a very few commu-

nities anywhere who are planning for future development of a watershed.

The planning will set out how, when, where, who is responsible and what financial resources are needed and budgeted to implement the strategy. Following endorsement of the strategy by all of the partners in the Similkameen Valley Planning Society, creation of the action plan will take place. Residents can expect to be consulted late this fall.

CMMC signs debt financing agreements

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced on May 31st that Project Finance Agreements for US\$322 Million have been executed by Similco Mines Ltd. ("Similco" 75% owned by the Company) for the Copper Mountain Project located 15 km south of Princeton.

The Project Financing consists of two tranches: (1) a Senior Credit Agreement for US\$162 Million provided by a consortium of Senior Lenders comprising The Bank of Tokyo-Mitsubishi UFJ, Ltd. and Mizuho Corporate Bank, Ltd., and (2) a Term Loan of US\$160 Million provided by Japan Bank for International Cooperation ("JBIC"), the international arm of Japan Finance Corporation.

The Lenders under the Senior Credit Agreement will have the benefit of export credit insurance by Nippon Export and Investment Insurance ("NEXI"). This is NEXI's first application of its insurance on project financing for a mineral resources development project. In connection with the Senior Credit Agreement, the shareholders of Similco have guarantee obligations prior to the Project completion.

The overall schedule of the project has remained unchanged with pre-production mining starting late this summer and construction planned to be completed by May 2011 for full production at the rate of 35,000 TPD by June 2011. There are currently 48 Copper Mountain personnel and 150 construction people at site. Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO, stated, "We are very pleased that our partner, Mitsubishi Materials Corporation, has success-

fully arranged the project financing with significant support from the two governmental Export Credit Agencies in Japan, NEXI and JBIC. This will allow the project to advance as planned and we are confident that we will achieve our target of full production in June 2011 at the rate of 105 million pounds of copper per year."

About Mitsubishi Materials Corporation:

Established in 1950, Mitsubishi is one of the world's largest diversified materials companies. 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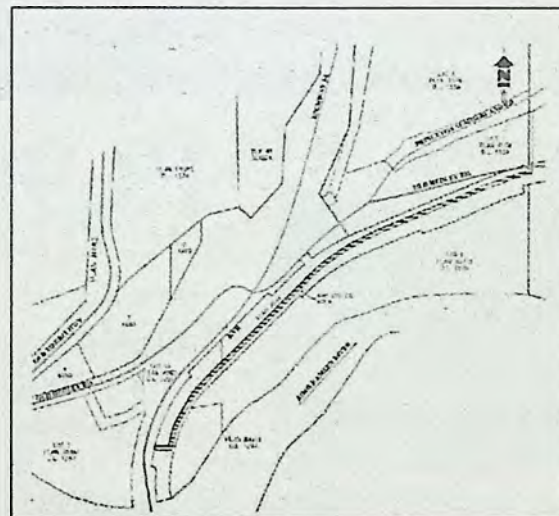

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Rookie firefighter training begins

"It's a talented looking bunch we've got this year although I wouldn't say they're a good looking bunch," joked Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department (KVFD) Training Officer, Doug MacLeod, about the new KVFD recruits.

It's been two years since the last intake of rookies.

In recent years several KVFD firefighters have retired or moved away resulting in the loss of many firefighter years of experience.

"I was getting a little worried," said Fire Chief Jordy Bosscha. "We were down to 22 firefighters. It took a long time for people to show they were interested joining us and for there to be enough to make it worthwhile to put on recruit training.... I would like to thank all that applied."

There are now eight new recruits, including three high school students, who will undertake an extensive training program.

"It's a big commitment of time for existing members to train them," said Deputy Chief, Bill

Sparkes.

MacLeod, who has been the Training Officer for fifteen years, says that training has changed over the years and is becoming more comprehensive.

MacLeod says his job will be made easier once the Regional Training Centre is up and running with specialist training facilities available to local fire departments. "I'm looking forward to it. It will alleviate a whole load of issues," said MacLeod.

The recruits have already had an orientation session and been assigned turnout gear. They will have four full days of training in safety and basic skills in structure fires and motor vehicle incidents. During this time they will also attend regular practices.

The recruits will then be issued a pager and attend calls for a minimum probationary six-month period.

After that they will continue to wear their black hats, signifying that they are rookies, for a minimum of a year before being awarded their yellow hats.

For all firefighters, whether they have just joined the department or been a member for decades, there is always something to learn and training is on going.

Small Business News

CFIB - Canadian Federation of Independent Business

British Columbia's business confidence level increased in May to 72.3 and remains 3rd highest in the country, according to CFIB's latest Business Barometer Index. BC's index is the highest it's been since December 2009, when it was 72.2. The vast majority of BC businesses, 82 per cent, say that the overall state of business is either good or satisfactory.

BC is ahead of the national average. The national index is also up, to 67.3 from 66.4 last month. The observed small- and mid-sized business confidence suggests stable, sustainable economic growth.

Leading the country in business confidence in May were Saskatchewan (index of 73.8) and

Newfoundland and Labrador (index of 72.8). Lowest in the country were Manitoba (index of 59.3) and Nova Scotia (index of 61.2).

Driven by a healthy consumer sector and low interest rates, business confidence is highest among businesses in retail and natural resources. The sectors reporting relatively lower confidence are construction and farming. These sectors may recover mid-year, as this data are not seasonally-adjusted.

Trends observed in recent months on the major challenges facing BC businesses continue. Insufficient domestic demand, the shortage of skilled labour and management skills/ time constraints remain the main business constraints for BC

businesses. Taxation and regulatory costs are their major cost constraints, followed by fuel and energy costs.

Employment remains strong in BC businesses, with 83 percent planning to increase full time employment or expecting no change in full time employment numbers.

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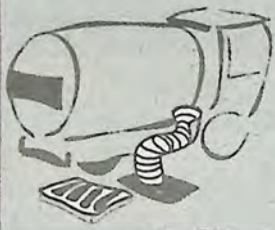

Remote communities benefitting from cutting-edge health care

(NC)—Call it a 21st century house call. New technology in the form of telehealth services and electronic medical records (EMRs) is bringing sophisticated health care to the doorsteps of patients living in Canada's remote communities. "Our EMR is very helpful because up here people go off to different clinics and different sites to get care and the EMR provides a central point of patient information," says Dr. Ewan Affleck a Yellowknife family physician.

EMRs are the modern version of a doctor's paper files, used to capture important patient information—medical history, medications, X-ray results, lab results—and assist with everything around the office from billing and scheduling to ordering tests and generating prescriptions. Prior to EMRs, Dr. Affleck says there was, "greater likelihood of confusion about drug databases, allergies, medical history, what's been done, so forth."

That's no longer the case.

"Now, we have a record of a patient's care, irrespective of which clinics they have visited. And that means we are better able to take care of them," he says.

EMRs permit doctors to provide care in remote communities by simply logging on.

They can then review a patient's medical history, check and see whether any recent updates have been made—tasks that make practicing medicine in remote communities much easier. It's a technology that can mean a world of difference to Dr. Affleck's patients.

He tells a story about how it helped to benefit an ill patient. He was able to use the EMR to pull up the latest articles on the disease, research the exercises that made the biggest difference, and communicate all the information to the patient online.

"With this information, the patient knows exactly what his problem is, he can better manage it at home and likely will not need follow up as often. I can provide significantly better care."

Humour helps relieve stress when you quit smoking

(NC)—The decision to quit smoking is one of the best choices a person can make for their future health. In fact, 70 per cent of smokers want to quit, but if it were that easy, everyone would do it. The addictive nature of smoking is the culprit, and without plans in place to manage the physical and emotional stress related to quitting, the journey can lead to failure for many smokers.

One of the greatest challenges is managing the withdrawal symptoms—irritability, frustration or anger, and anxiety can all contribute to the stress associated with quitting. A successful quitter will put a plan in place that will help alleviate these stresses as they go through the journey of becoming smoke-free.

Smokers should look for new ways to alleviate stress and help them through the process of becoming smoke-free, such as going for a walk, take time to breathe or something as simple as a good laugh, to keep them from turning back to cigarettes.

Laughter is the best medicine

We've all heard the saying that humour and laughter are good medicine. Interestingly, this saying has proven true, as a number of studies support the benefits of laughter in coping with stress. Laughter can have a lasting effect on your body as it often reacts to stress for a long period of time even after the laughing stops.

"Laughter is a great stress reliever and helps to address the symptoms of withdrawal that can come with quitting smoking," says Dr. Andrew McIvor, respirologist and professor of medicine at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. "Smoking is more than a habit, it involves a nicotine addiction, and while you certainly can't laugh it away, you can use laughter to calm

your nerves and relieve tension. Don't forget that dealing with withdrawal symptoms is just one aspect of quitting. It is also important to create a plan, and to speak with your doctor about other options available to help you quit, such as medicines and counselling."

Think about simple changes you can make, like laughing more, to help set yourself up for success. And remember to see your doctor who can work with you to develop a quit plan that is right for you.

Living Past 100

Rhubarb Is Good For You

Most people do not rave about the taste of rhubarb, but this spring plant does have many benefits despite its taste. Rhubarb can lower cholesterol, fix constipation, and ease some stomach or digestive problems. This is the season for rhubarb.

Rhubarb is a member of the buckwheat family of plants. Like buckwheat, it is a good source of fibre. Rhubarb fibre flushes out cholesterol, and lowers the level of triglycerides. Due to the fibre, rhubarb is also a good way to keep the bowels moving regularly.

Vitamin C is a good protection against some diseases, and rhubarb contains vitamin C. This vitamin also protects against some of the effects of aging, such as wrinkles.

Rhubarb has been shown to prevent cell mutation that leads to cancer.

One note of caution: for those people inclined to develop kidney stones, rhubarb should be avoided, as it may lead to more stones.

Enjoying rhubarb means cooking it properly to cut down the tartness. First, remember to select the reddest stalks. Some varieties of rhubarb have very dark red stalks. The more red, the sweeter the rhubarb. Second, cut the stalks into bite-size pieces and cook gently in orange or pineapple juice. Do not add sugar until it is cooked or you may add more than required. Taste the cooked rhubarb and add only enough sugar to make it acceptable.

Rhubarb makes a good pie filling, is great in a coffee cake or muffin, and can be preserved as is, or made into jam or sauce.

Never eat anything but the rhubarb stalks. The rest of the plant is toxic. However, many gardeners boil rhubarb leaves, strain the pulp from the liquid, and use the liquid to keep bugs from ruining berry and soft fruit crops, such as plums and even apples.

Rhubarb is free if you grow it yourself. It is very hardy. Select root stock from the sweetest variety and plant it in a prepared section of soil about one meter square. Preparation must include mixing the soil with a large amount of manure, as rhubarb needs a lot of underground nourishment to produce the best stalks. If you plant the root in September, you will have a good crop next spring. Other than an occasional bit of irrigation, rhubarb requires no attention. After a few years in the same location, rhubarb benefits by being moved to a new location prepared as described. If you move to a new residence, don't forget to dig up your rhubarb and take it with you.



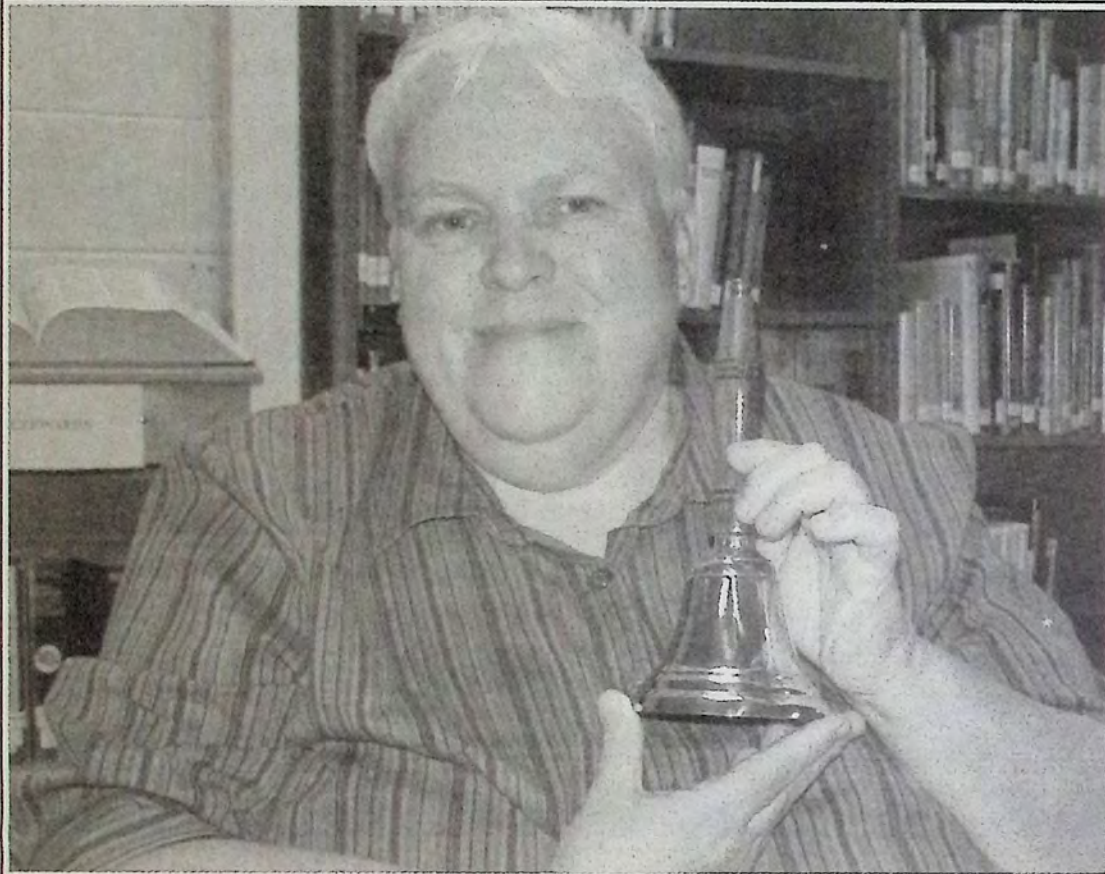

Government gives \$\$\$ to Town

There were two major announcements made this time two years ago.

Small Business and Revenue Minister Rick Thorpe was in town and presented a \$200,000 cheque from the BC Spirit Squares Program to Mayor Randy McLean in a ceremony on June 7, 2008. The presentation took place downtown in Cenotaph Park and paved the way for what became Veterans Square.

"The upgraded plaza will give Princeton residents and visitors an excellent venue to celebrate this city's past, present and future, while at the same time honouring both the Cenotaph and our veterans," Thorpe said at the time.

"The town square has historical significance for the residents of Princeton and has served as a gathering place since the community was established," Mayor McLean added.

Another \$100,000 of provincial money went to Princeton Airport the same week.

The presentation, made during the first annual Airport Appreciation Day (now known as Airshow), was in support of upgrades to the facility.

"A fuel facility has been our number one priority and our consultants have consistently told us that a fuel system would ensure that the air-

port reaches its full potential and becomes an economic catalyst for our region," Mayor McLean stated upon accepting the cheque.

School District 58 (Nicola-Similkameen) honoured school staff with their annual Retirement/Long Service Celebration on June 2, 2008. A total of five district staff members retired from Princeton schools that year including Diane Rodewoldt (33 years), Fran McHaffie (27 years), Eileen deBruyn (20 years), Johanna Nott (16 years), and Bonnie Jeston.

Five, ten, fifteen, twenty and twenty-five year service pins were also presented.

A proposed new subdivision, called Princeton Trails, received final approval to a zoning bylaw on

June 2, 2008. The lots are located between Similkameen Avenue and the Trans-Canada Trail.

Former Princeton Posse GM Blair Noel took the next step in his hockey management career on June 2, 2008. The Alberni Valley Bulldogs of the BCHL announced on that day that Noel had been hired on as their Business Manager. Noel moved on to join the Penticton Lakers of the KIJHL when the team moved from Summerland a season ago.

And speaking of cash contributions being handed out in and around town, the Communities For Kids Pre-School Support Program received a shot in the arm June 4, 2008 when Princeton Legion presented a cheque in the amount of \$1,200 to the program.

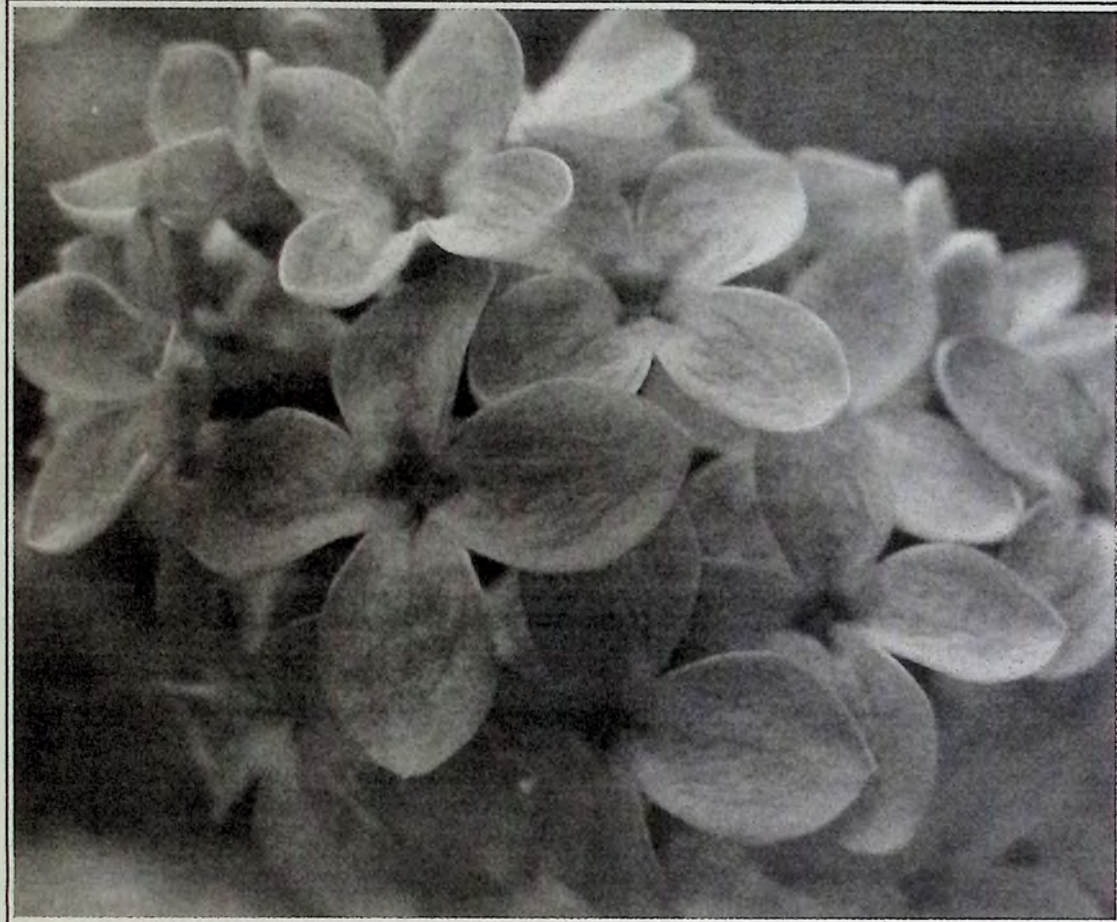

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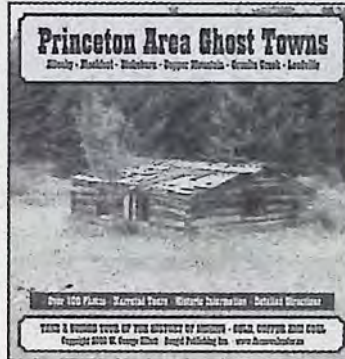
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

Indian Style Grilled Cheese Sandwiches

ON NAAN BREAD

(NC)—Everyone's favourite, the classic grilled cheese, made even more irresistible by combining aged cheddar with Patak's naan bread. Serves 2. Heat rating: 1 out of 5 (Mild)

Preparation time: 10 minutes. Cooking time: 5-8 minutes

- 1 1/2 tsp (7 mL) olive oil
- 1 package (200 g) Patak's plain naan bread
- 2 tbsp (25 mL) Patak's sweet mango chutney
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) finely chopped mint
- 1 cup (250 mL) coarsely grated old white cheddar cheese

Preheat a panini press or set a cast iron pan over medium heat.

Brush olive oil on one side of each naan bread and arrange oiled side down on work surface. Spread mango chutney on one naan; scatter mint on top, followed by a layer of cheese. Cover with remaining naan bread, oiled side up. Cut sandwich in half crosswise.

Transfer sandwiches to panini press or pan and cook until cheese is melted and both sides of naan are golden brown, about 5 minutes. If using a cast iron pan, cook, flipping once, about 3-4 minutes per side.

We Need The Right To Water

The Council of Canadians has been lobbying the government to make water a human right. This would guarantee that Canadian water would not become a commodity for sale. Worldwide, it would address the issue of one billion people who do not have access to clean drinking water.

There are many sides to the issues surrounding water use and water conservation. Some issues focus on selling water. Others focus on the need for water for irrigation purposes. Other issues deal with the need for safe drinking water. Every one of these issues is important to segments of the population, but our government has done little to address the water issues in some overall plan.

In the Similkameen, water is an issue related to conservation for the purpose of irrigation and fire protection, for preservation of fish stocks both in Canada and the United States, and for future economic development. Because our area and the watershed south of the international border are dependent on the Similkameen River and Tulameen River, water use is carefully regulated by the Columbia River Treaty.

When the issue of American demands for water is discussed,

those of us who live in the Similkameen watershed must remember that our river is jointly owned by the Americans. The Similkameen River begins in the United States and flows north into British Columbia before turning east and then south to flow into the Okanagan River at Tonasket, Washington. This geographic fact must be remembered when we talk about our water supply.

Conservation of water is extremely important for irrigation south of the border, but is just as important for the salmon fishery. When too little Similkameen water is present in the Okanagan River, the salmon have a problem finding their way back to their spawning grounds.

The dams in Washington supply water to an arid region. Similkameen water flows into Chief Joseph dam and Grand Coulee dam. Our spring freshet restores water levels behind those dams, guaranteeing crops for the coming growing season. When we see our local rivers decline in September to almost no flow in a bad year, the dams, the farms, and power production south of the border are affected.

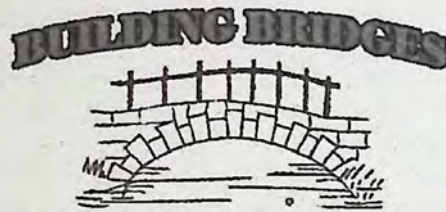
There is a lobby group south of the border who want a dam on the Similkameen River, primarily for water conservation. The federal

and provincial governments are not moving toward making this happen. We could benefit not only from the water conservation but also from power production, yet our government seems far more interested in building the Site C dam in the north rather than conserve the water, and therefore the farms and fishery, in our watershed.

Plans for a dam in the upper Similkameen area showed the benefits for everyone, yet our provincial government has dragged its feet repeatedly, never making a commitment to the project despite all of the work done to show it is not only feasible, but desirable.

The need for proper handling of water is not only a conservation issue, it is an economic and political issue. Why do our governments fail to make any commitments toward making access to water a right, on the one hand, and making conservation a priority on the other hand? It seems no level of government wants to talk about water.

It is worth remembering that great civilizations, such as the Mayan civilization and the Annasazi, died because of drought and a failure to ensure a secure water supply. Let's not ignore the importance of water to the survival of our way of life.

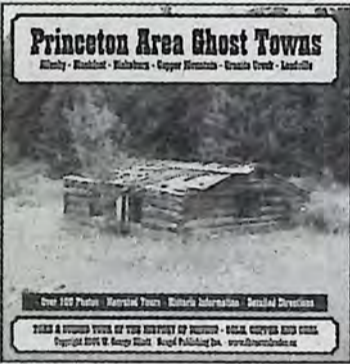
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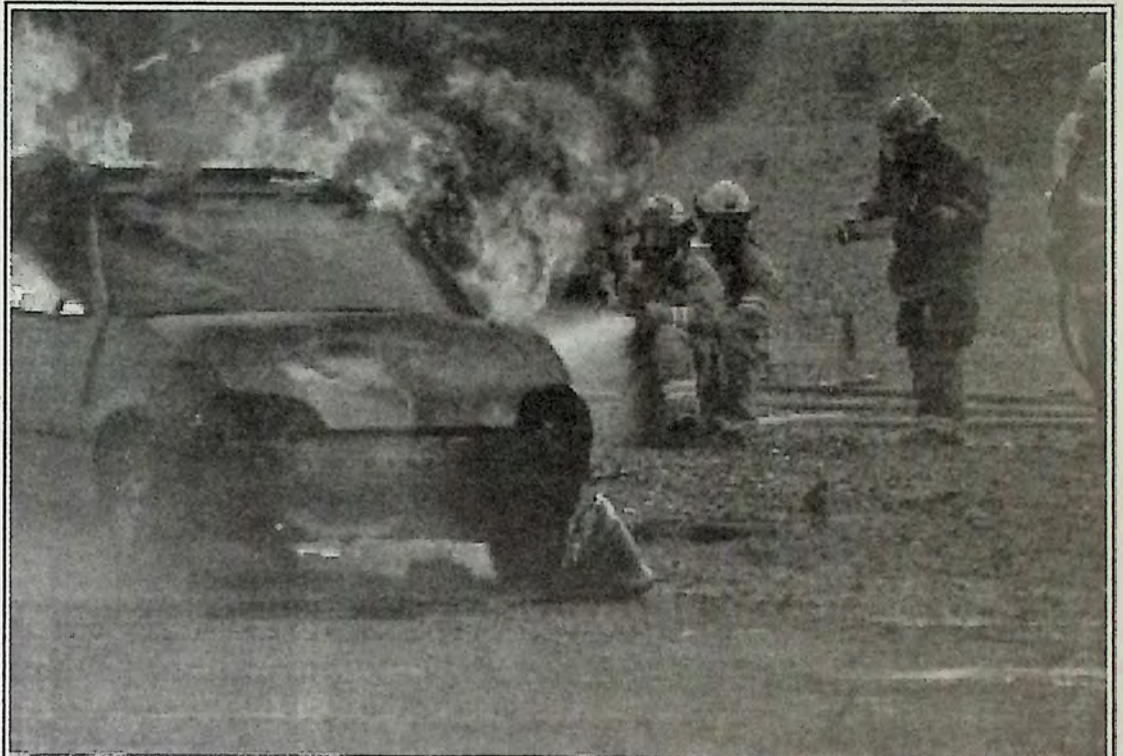

Training together helps everyone

It's been proven time and time again that when teams with common goals work together, share resources and communicate with each other it benefits all concerned.

Volunteer fire departments are no exception to this concept.

It's known simply as 'mutual aid' and describes times when one department may call on a neighbouring department for extra people or equipment.

Perfect examples of how mutual aid agreements are successful include the Okanagan Mountain wildfire and the Princeton Hotel fire.

A mutual aid training session was conducted by Princeton Volunteer Fire Department June 2nd and included members from Tulameen, Hedley and Hayes Creek volunteer fire departments.

The residents living in the coverage areas of each department depend on these crews to be quick and skilled in all aspects of fire-

fighting. Mutual aid training adds to existing skills of those who have trained to become volunteer fire fighters.

"How can we work together and help each other during emergency operations?" Princeton Fire Chief Eric Gregson asks.

"With practical training with the equipment which gives members the confidence to use the tools available in high stress situations," Gregson says.

He also says their is a simpler method to achieve the goals set out in establishing mutual aid arrangements with nearby fire departments.

"By practicing common fire ground tactics and accountable systems makes procedures easier to follow."

What it boils down to is if a crew made up of members from different fire departments end up responding to a mutual aid call, there won't be a lot of wasted time

trying to figure out who's going to do what and how as each member should be familiar enough with equipment and tactics that stepping into a situation with other firefighters shouldn't be strange or unusual territory.

And for those people depending on the fire trucks to show up and take care of business, that's a whole lot of good news.

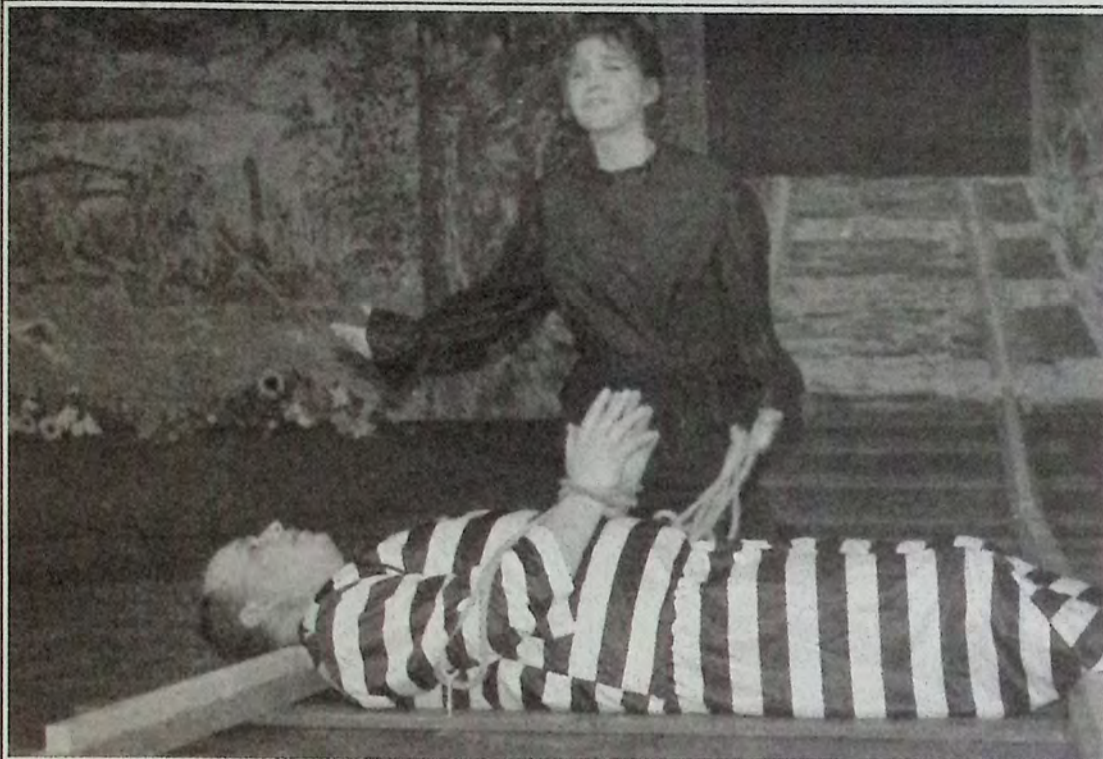
The joint training sessions also build friendships and bonds between members of different fire departments which also assists in many ways out in the field.

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
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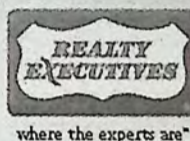
