



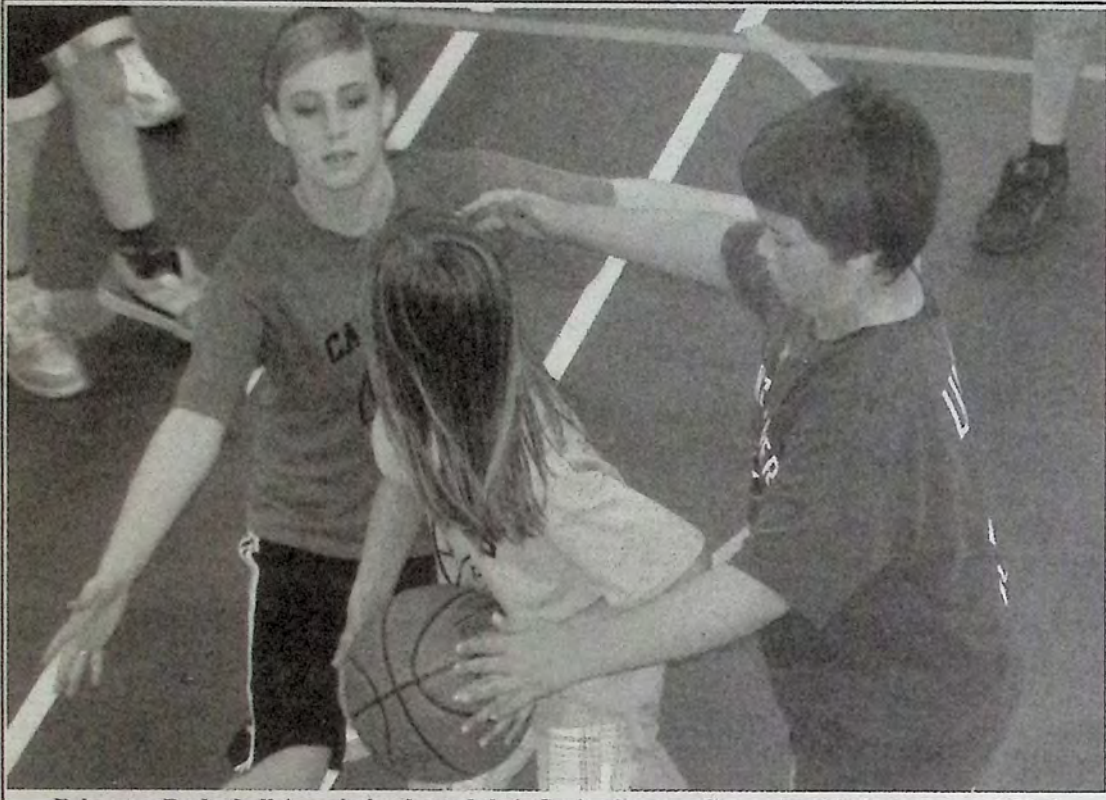

Racing Days Association has worries

Sponsorships for this year's horse races are coming in very slowly says John Bey, President of Princeton Racing Days Association. The races will take place July 3, with first post time at 1:00 PM.

There will be a concession stand and refreshment garden but no band this year due to cutbacks in B.C. Lottery funding and lack of sponsors. The Town of Princeton has approved the customary \$20,000 float to start the day's betting.

Eight races are offered, and Racing Days personnel will await entries on Monday, June 28. The number of horses entered always determines the number of races to be run. Trophies are being prepared.

Strong security will be in place during the races, particularly in the pari-mutuel area. More pari-mutuel volunteers are needed.

They will be expected at the track at about 10:00 AM and will be

given training and lunch before the races begin.

They will work until approximately 6:00 PM. Food and refreshments will be provided during the afternoon. Anyone wishing to assist in the pari-mutuels should contact Carol Ruoss.

The paddock area, where the horses can be seen prior to each race, is always decorated with plants and flowers. These will be donated by Don and Anna's Greenhouses of Keremeos this year.

At the Racing Days Association meeting on June 10, a list of jobs to be done during the race meet was matched with people willing to do the jobs. It was a long list, with many people doing double duty. There are still a lot of details to be taken care of.

Anyone wishing to help out should call John Bey at 250.295.3970. Racing Days members and PXA members formed a work party last weekend to begin preparations for the races.

Council okays new water rules

Princeton will soon have new regulations governing the use of sprinklers. At the June 7 Town Council meeting, first, second and third reading were given to a new bylaw which will change the days when sprinkling will be allowed. According to Council, Princeton uses four times the national average water consumption per resident.

The new bylaw is divided into stages of restriction. Stage 1 states premises with even numbered civic addresses may water lawns on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays. Residences with odd numbered addresses may water lawns on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Nobody is allowed to turn on sprinklers on Mondays. Sprinkling is not permitted between noon and 6:00 PM while water restrictions of any kind are in effect.

Nobody is to use a hose to wash boats or motor vehicles unless the

hose is equipped with an automatic shut-off device.

This bylaw is not in effect yet, as Council must give it final reading and approval, but when it is approved, it will be in effect from May 15 to September 30 unless otherwise imposed by the manager of public works.

Stage 2 water restrictions will allow even numbered premises to use sprinklers on Wednesdays and Saturdays only, while odd numbered premises will be allowed to irrigate only on Thursdays and Sundays. The same restrictions are in effect regarding washing of boats or vehicles, and nobody is to hose down sidewalks and driveways unless to prepare the surface for painting or sealing, or for safety purposes.

Under stage 3 restrictions, nobody will be allowed to use sprinklers, soaker hoses, nor will they be allowed to wash vehicles or boats, nor fill garden ponds or swimming pools. Watering with a hand-held hose will be permitted for gardens, planters, trees and shrubs, and resi-

dents may wash the windows and license plates of a boat or vehicle using a hose with an automatic shut-off device or using a container of water.

Stage 4 calls for a complete ban on all outdoor water use.

Watering of public places such as boulevards and playing fields will follow the same rules as private property owners.

The health committee has achieved success: a new physician is moving to Princeton. He is in his mid-thirties, has a wife and two children, and will commence his practice in August.

New store sparks complaints

Two citizens, Marshall Davies and Dave Bates, appeared before Town Council at the June 7 meeting to criticize the plan for a new grocery store to be constructed later this year on the site formerly occupied by Princeton Hotel. They are residents of Harold and Angela Avenues.

Council was dealing with variances for parking and setbacks and a development permit which would enable construction to proceed. The citizens were concerned about noise and flashing lights in the middle of the night due to trucks delivering to the store, and were concerned there was not enough space allowed for trucks to back into the delivery lane behind the store. They expressed the fear that properties in the area would decline in value, and that traffic on Harold and Angela Avenues would become too congested. They added they thought there should be more than 80 parking stalls at the store.

Council addressed their concerns with the help of a representative of the company developing the site. First, he assured them there would be no truck deliveries in the middle of the night. As to parking, there would be 20 more parking stalls at the new store than presently available at the existing supermarket. The representative told local residents there would be deliveries between 7:00 PM and 9:00 PM, and during the day. The delivery lane is more than adequate, he said, as it is 24 feet wide.

Before Council voted on the motions that would facilitate construction, Mayor Randy McLean told Davies and Bates, "In order to incorporate business into our community, we have to make allowances."

Council voted unanimously to allow the variances and approved the development permit.

Following the vote, the company

representative invited Bates and Davies to discuss their concerns with him, and the three left Council chambers.

More parking concerns

A laundry business on Bridge Street applied for a variance on the number of parking spaces allocated to the business because the owner wants to construct a deli inside the building as an enhancement to the coin laundry. This would mean more parking spaces would be required under the existing parking bylaw.

There is parking at the rear of the laundry, as well as at the side and front and across the side street, but

a neighboring business under construction expressed concern that there would not be enough parking. They stated that the site under construction was two vacant lots commonly used by patrons of a restaurant across the street. With those parking spaces gone, there might not be adequate parking for the new deli.

Mayor Randy McLean said one of the problems in Princeton with parking is that everybody wants to park right at the business they are going to, and nobody wants to walk.

Council voted to allow the variance on parking spaces.

Council news in brief

Community Services Director Lyle Thomas reported to Town Council on June 7 that he has been reviewing plans for the aquatic centre.

Local librarians Joan Muir and Johanna Nott are to be honored by Okanagan Regional Library for their long service in Princeton's public library. Muir has served 30 years and Nott has served for 25 years. The plan is to take them on a boat ride on Okanagan Lake.

Councillor Ray Jarvis told Council there will be no Accessibility Day this year. Instead, people in wheelchairs and people using scooters or other walking assistance devices will enter the July 2 Rotary Racing Days parade.

Councillor Jarvis said there are far more people in Princeton using wheelchairs or other means of getting around than most people realize, and the Accessibility Committee hopes to raise public awareness of the need for accessible entrances in all public places in town.

Councillor Jarvis recently inspected the airport terminal building and

said Princeton should be very proud of it. He is sure it will be the envy of other small airports. People will have the opportunity to see it on July 17 during the air show.

Town Council approved closure of part of Bridge Street on July 3 for the annual Overwaitea Show 'n' Shine which will be opened by Mayor Randy McLean at 10:00 AM.

Council approved a \$20,000 float for Princeton Racing Days Association to cover the horse races on July 3.

Council approved use of the library washrooms, and will provide two porta potties and extra garbage receptacles for the Traditional Music Festival August 20-22.

Tulameen Turtle are holding a Great Copper Rush Garbage Clean Up. This group will be involved in geo-caching on the August long weekend and part of their activity will be filling one garbage bag with trash they find as they go through the outdoors.

Council has approved allowing them to put the trash in the landfill with no tipping fees.

NEW WATER RESTRICTIONS

Beginning June 22 Water Restrictions Bylaw 833, 2010 will be in effect.

By conserving today, we reduce the need for expanded facilities and costly upgrades to the water system.

What are the new rules?

- Lawn sprinkling regulations are in effect from May 15 to September 30 every year.
- There are four stages of restrictions, each stage allowing less water use.
- Stage 1 comes into effect automatically on May 15 of every year unless more stringent water conservation measures are needed. Stages 2, 3 and 4 are implemented according to the severity of the water shortage. Each level requires increasingly larger reductions in water use.
- Residential, multi-family, commercial, industrial, institutional and public properties are all required to follow the regulations.

Stage 1 restrictions will be in effect.

- Even numbered civic addresses may water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.
- Odd numbered civic addresses may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
- No watering is permitted between Noon and 6:00 pm.
- Watering is not permitted on Mondays.
- Washing of boats or motor vehicles with a hose is permitted only if using a hose with an automatic shut-off device.
- Public sector entities are restricted to three days per week at any time.

Bylaw Enforcement will enforce all levels of the water restrictions bylaw. A person who contravenes the bylaw commits an offence under the Offence Act and is subject to a fine. For more information visit Town hall during regular business hours.

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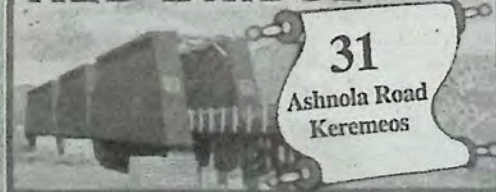

CFIB - Canadian Federation of Independent Business

Agri-business owners frustrated - Time for action: AgriStability costly, complex and unpredictable

As Federal, Provincial and Territorial (FPT) governments hold consultations with producers across Canada, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) released a report June 9th which reveals farmers' glaring frustration with the current Business Risk Management (BRM) program, AgriStability.

"While governments cannot solve many of the global problems that have impacted the agricultural sector, they can certainly take steps to improve the tax and regulatory environment in which agri-business owners operate. Additionally,

they can make programs like AgriStability more farmer-friendly," said Marilyn Braun-Pollon, CFIB's vice-president of agri-business.

CFIB's report: AgriStability or Aggravation, based on 1,081 responses from Canadian agri-business owners, identified several problematic areas within AgriStability such as: poor customer service, complex and large volumes of paperwork, timeliness issues, and predictability.

"It's clear the program is not responding to producers' needs when 58 per cent of those participating in AgriStability said they are somewhat or very dissatisfied with the program," noted Brian Bonney, CFIB's BC director of provincial

affairs. CFIB believes BRM tools are a last resort, but when producers do need them, they have to work. They must be transparent, accessible, predictable, and timely.

Key Findings:

- FPT governments do have a role to play in addressing the actions of foreign governments and managing risks beyond the producer's control (e.g. border closure).

- On average, producers are spending \$1,984.00 to participate in the AgriStability program, which is almost double what they were spending to participate in CAIS.

- Customer service issues are in need of immediate attention by FPT governments. (e.g. timeliness, complexity, and the overall service of staff).

- AgriStability, as currently designed, is not providing an adequate long-term solution to Canadian producers (e.g. livestock sector).

"Ministers have been reviewing BRM programs since July 2008 and CFIB farm members say it is time for action. We hope the feedback from these consultations will spur governments into action to make some immediate changes to AgriStability, as well as continue to address the competitive challenges in the Ag sector by tackling such issues as: reducing red tape, reducing the total tax burden and addressing agri-business succession," added Braun-Pollon. "We hope the July 2010 meeting of FPT Ministers of Agriculture will outline a concrete plan to address farmers' serious concerns," concluded Braun-Pollon.

Poison Ivy 101: Myths and Facts

(NC)—Now that winter is gone and spring is finally here, many are taking advantage of the warm weather by heading out to nearby ravines and exploring the woods. While it's great to be at one with nature, it's easy to stumble upon some common poisonous plants that can cause very unpleasant reactions. Poison Ivy, which is the most common and widespread poisonous plant, is characterized by its telltale three leaves and grows low to the ground or as a vine. To learn more about this unwelcome offender, consider the following myths and facts about poison ivy before going on your next hike:

Myth: A Poison Ivy rash is "contagious."

Fact: The rash is a reaction to urushiol (an oily organic allergen found in certain plants) and cannot pass from person to person once the urushiol binds.

Myth: Once I get Poison Ivy, I can never get it again.

Fact: Although not everyone reacts to Poison Ivy at initial exposure, people generally become more sensitized with each contact and could have a longer and more severe reaction to later exposures.

Myth: Once allergic, always allergic.
Fact: A person's sensitivity changes over time, even from season to season. People who were sensitive to

Working Outside?
(NC)—The warmer weather and longer days of sunlight mean Canadians can spend more time enjoying the outdoors. After the long months of winter, many Canadians are eagerly going from spending time inside to getting outside and checking projects off that pesky to-do list.

From cleaning out the eavestroughs, to raking the lawn, to getting their hands dirty in the garden, Canadians love to make the most of the warmer weather. While it is, for the most part, a more carefree and enjoyable time of year, there is one hidden risk lurking that many Canadians may not think about - tetanus.

The bacteria that cause tetanus are found everywhere in the environment including in dirt, soil and dust. The disease begins when these bacteria enter the body through a skin injury or break in the skin, such as the kind you could get from a sharp tool or even a splinter.

The first symptom is usually spasm of the jaw muscles, sometimes referred to as "lockjaw," followed by painful spasms of muscles in the face, neck, chest, abdomen, arms and legs, which can last up to a month. It can be fatal in 10 to 20 per cent of cases, even with treatment.

"Tetanus is a severe and potentially fatal disease, but the good news is

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Don't let skin scrapes lead to tetanus
Canadians can protect themselves by receiving the tetanus vaccination," said Dr. Bonnie Henry, chair of the Canadian Coalition for Immunization Awareness and Promotion (CCIAP).

"It is recommended that adults receive a tetanus booster every 10 years, so before you get outside and start your next project, check with your doctor or local clinic to make

poison ivy as children may not be allergic as adults.

Myth: Dead Poison Ivy plants are no longer toxic.

Fact: Urushiol remains active for up to five years. Never handle dead plants that look like Poison Ivy without proper protection.

Here's a tip. "In the event of contact, try taking an oatmeal bath for relief, or an over-the-counter antihistamine such as Benadryl, which can start to work in as little as 15 minutes," says Shannon Koppenhoefer, a paramedic specializing in wilderness first-aid.

"If the rash affects a large area of skin or is serious, be sure to see a doctor."

Why Women Need Cherries

Cherry season is coming, and although the price may seem high, have at least one good feed of local tree-ripened cherries. For women, these delicious treats are more than just a treat, they are one of the few foods shown to have a protective effect against breast cancer. In laboratory animals, breast cancer was eradicated by the special alcohol in cherries.

Cherries are good for everybody. They contain Vitamin C, Vitamin E and quercetin, all of which protect against free radicals, thus cutting down the risk of stroke and cancer.

Cherries and cherry juice have long been used to relieve the pain of gout, although there is no scientific evidence cherries can help. Nevertheless, Gout sufferers claim cherries and cherry juice help them. The best cherries for this are the "black" cherries, such as Bing cherries.

If you are one of those people who like to preserve food, canning cherries makes good sense. Cherries can also be made into a delicious jam, and cherry juice can be preserved well by freezing. For ease of handling, invest in a modern cherry pitting machine (you'll never regret it).

It is worth remembering that we live in one of the regions of North America where the finest cherries are grown, and we should take advantage of having such great fruit in our own neighbourhood.

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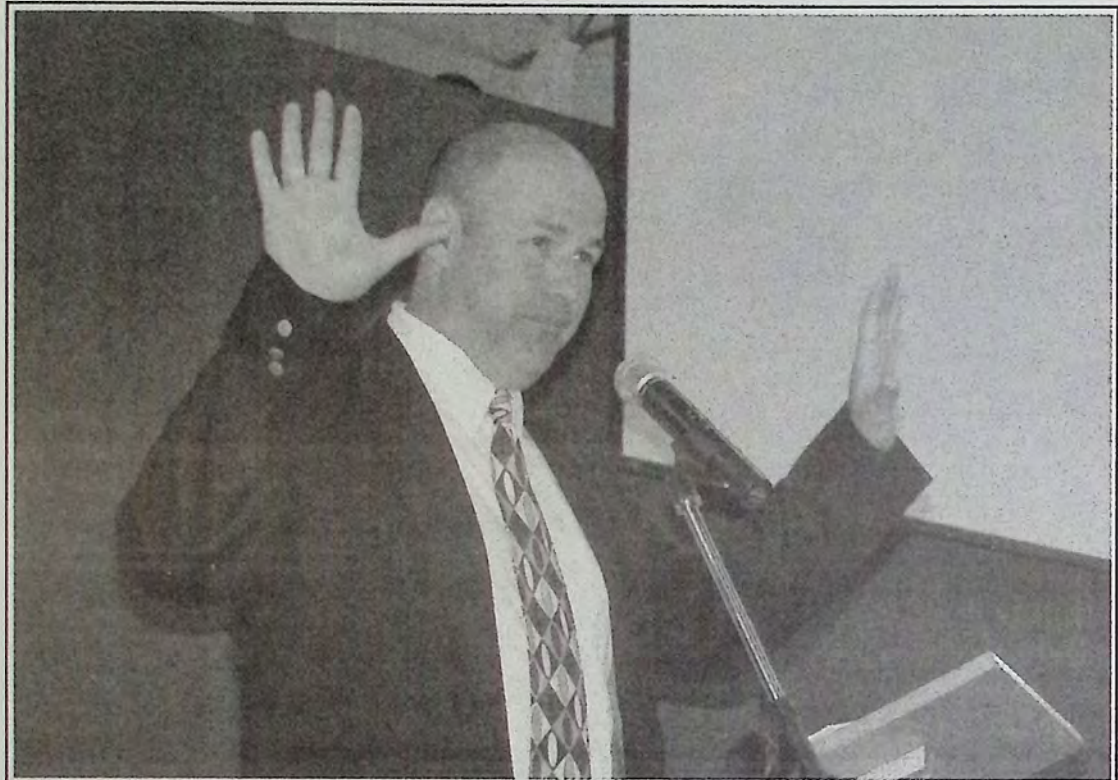

Stats say it's safe to live here

Crime stats released by South Okanagan RCMP Crime Analyst J. Scott, and presented by Sgt. Mike Savage at the June 15, 2009 Town Council meeting show Princeton continues to be a safe place to live.

For example, Princeton's 2007 rate of 96 crimes per 1,000 population was eight points lower than the BC provincial average of 104 per 1,000 population.

In fact, the majority of categories saw decreases with only a slight increase in property crimes.

"The most prevalent types of property crimes in Princeton in 2007 were theft and break and enter with residential break-ins being the most common B&E sub-type," the report stated.

"All in all I would say Princeton is a pretty safe community," Sgt. Savage told Council after presenting the report.

"Our members take pride in what they do and the service they provide to the community and I think the numbers reflect that."

Despite all that, RCMP reported responding to a report of a suspicious male near a local bank at 9:30 AM on June 16, 2009.

"The suspicious male was observed by armoured car staff that were at the bank that morning," Sgt. Savage reported.

The man was described as being approximately 35 years of age wearing dark clothing and dark body armour.

Last year's Graduation Ceremony took place June 20th at PSS as part of a shift in philosophy. The simple explanation for the change in date from late May to late June had to do with the timing of Provincial exams.

It just made sense to have the ceremony after exams were written, rather than before.

The PSS Class of '09 contained 29 students, plus two Bridge graduates and their theme said it all: "We are destined for greatness, made to shine. We are the Class of 2009."

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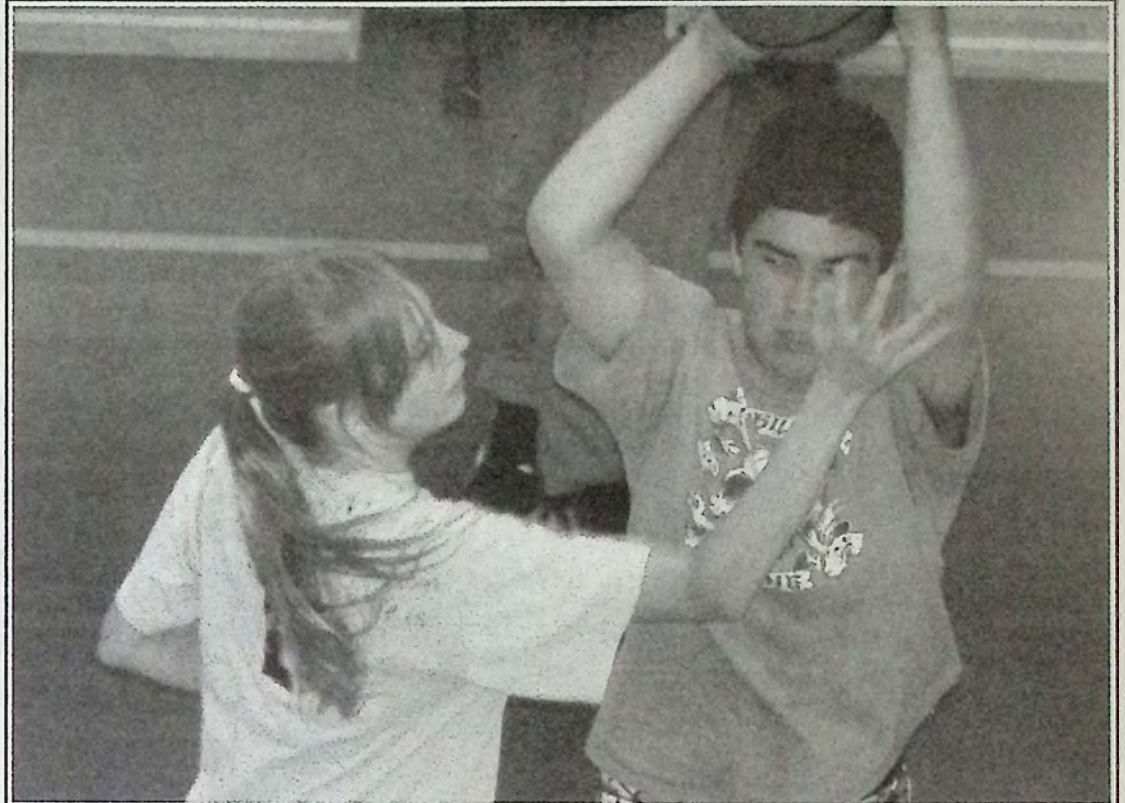

Judge dismisses case

Donald M. Neumann, a resident of Princeton area, stood trial in Princeton Provincial Court on June 10 on charges of breach of recognition. He had been released on bail on another matter on condition he have no firearms or ammunition in his possession. At the time, his rifles and ammunition were seized.

On June 10, 2009, RCMP attended Neumann's residence ostensibly to seek Neumann's on-again, off-again girlfriend, Rebecca Williams, to serve her with a subpoena. Williams, recovering from serious injuries suffered in a motor vehicle accident, was recuperating at Neumann's residence. Neumann was in custody in Penticton at that time, but Williams testified officers told her he was under an order to have no contact with Williams and she should not be at his residence.

Williams stated she and Neumann had split up two months before the accident in which she had been injured and she was at his residence only because she felt she had nowhere else to go when released from hospital.

Prior to knocking on the door to speak to Williams, officers had wandered around the rural property and had taken photographs of targets. Williams told the court the officers asked her about firearms at the residence and Williams said she told them if there were any they would be in a particular room, and the police went to that room and searched for the firearm. During the search, Williams was packing her belongings and after the search,

the officers took her to a friend's home in Princeton.

A police officer testified to much the same information revealed by Williams, then told the court he had applied for a search warrant later the same day and received the warrant. On June 11, 2009, the officers had returned to Neumann's home and searched it, finding ammunition and expended shells in the attic.

Defense argued Neumann's charter rights had been violated as Williams had no authority to permit a search, and was never told she could refuse to allow the officers to search. Neumann himself had never been asked for permission to search his residence.

Crown Counsel said the initial warrantless search had been done with the understanding that

Williams was Neumann's girlfriend, she was in his residence and her belongings were in his residence, therefore the evidence obtained should be admissible.

Judge G. Sinclair ruled that Williams had no authority to consent to the search and she did not give an informed consent because she was never told she could refuse to give permission. Judge Sinclair said it was a serious breach to intrude into a private dwelling, and the search violated section 8 of the Charter of Rights. He ruled the evidence obtained later under the search warrant was to be excluded because the warrant was granted using evidence obtained by the initial unwarranted search.

Without the evidence, the Crown had no case, and the case was dismissed.

Man loses licence twice

A 57 year old Princeton man appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 10 to plead guilty to a charge of driving while prohibited. Donald G. Cathro was seen by a police officer on March 23 this year loading something into his vehicle. The officer knew

Cathro had a driving prohibition and warned him not to drive. The officer returned to where Cathro had been seen but the vehicle had moved. Cathro was later arrested and charged. He was ordered to pay a \$500 fine and is prohibited from driving for one more year.

Schouten receives Cannings Award

Madelon Schouten of Princeton has been awarded the Steve Cannings Award for outstanding contributions to ornithology (bird study) in British Columbia.

The award was announced on May 29th at the annual meeting of British Columbia Field Ornithologists in Revelstoke, and a commemorative plaque was presented to Madelon on June 8th at the monthly meeting of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists in Princeton.

British Columbia Field Ornithologists (www.bcfo.ca) is a province-wide organization, founded in 1991, for people who are interested in watching or studying birds. Most BCFO members are amateur birders or birdwatchers, but the membership also includes quite a few professional ornithologists.

Starting in 2007, BCFO has presented an annual award to an outstanding ornithologist in BC.

The purpose of the award is as follows: to recognize an individual who has made significant contributions over a long period of time to ornithology in British Columbia in any one or more of the following three areas: (1) research on bird biology or ecology, or detailed documentation of the avifauna of a portion of B.C.; (2) conservation of birds or of bird habitats in B.C.; (3) public education about birds in B.C.

This year, the award, formerly called the BCFO Award for Ornithology, was renamed the Steve Cannings Award, after the late Steve Cannings of Penticton, BC.

Steve was an outstanding naturalist and ornithologist who studied the birds of the Okanagan Valley for decades, served as a mentor to many beginning birders and naturalists, founded the South Okanagan Naturalists' Club, and was a major force for conservation in B.C.

Madelon was born in the former Dutch East Indies, now Indonesia, and emigrated with her family to the Netherlands after Indonesia became independent. She eventually moved to Canada in 1956.

She admits to being fascinated by the natural world since childhood, but says that her obsession with birds started with a course that she took from Dr. Miklos Udvardy, long-time ornithology professor at the University of BC. She became active in the Vancouver Natural

History Society, and in 1971, founded a new society called the White Rock and Surrey Naturalists, which is now one of the largest and most active naturalist clubs in the province.

She played a prominent role for years in the White Rock and Surrey Naturalists, and for 20 years she organized and compiled the White Rock/Surrey Christmas Bird Count, an annual effort to count all the birds within a 15-mile diameter circle. She also taught many bird identification courses for the public over the years, and introduced many people to birding for the first time. In addition, she began a "beached bird survey" of birds found dead along shorelines to help evaluate the effects of marine pollution, a project which eventually became part of a continuing province-wide survey.

In 1991, after retiring, she moved to the Princeton area, and soon after-

ward formed the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists, an organization that continues to thrive today. She also started and still runs the Princeton Christmas Bird Count, and has prepared several editions of a bird checklist for the Princeton area.

Finally, Madelon has been a long-term participant in the Breeding Bird Survey, a system of standardized roadside bird counts, organized in Canada by the Canadian Wildlife Service. Each of these surveys involves a series of 50 point counts along a predetermined route, and takes 4 to 5 hours.

Madelon has completed 134 of these Breeding Bird Surveys since 1973, along 8 different routes — more than anyone else in Canada. She received a special award several years ago from the Canadian Wildlife Service for her long-term participation in this volunteer project.

Did you read the Strategy for a Sustainable Similkameen Valley in last week's News Leader?

I really like the strategy. What it means, in a nutshell (maybe one of those walnut shells from Cawston), is that we make every effort to keep our lifestyle while absorbing a lot of newcomers into our valley community.

I like the idea of treating our entire watershed as a community. I have more than a "drive through" acquaintance with the various locations in the Similkameen Valley and I know people from one end of the valley to the other. This is a good place to live, and generally speaking, the people are good people.

I have lived most of my life in the Similkameen Valley, which makes me an "oldtimer", but that does not mean I have no room in my life for people who are new to the valley.

I enjoy meeting the newcomers because they bring new ideas and new perspectives.

The strategy for the next 10 years treats the watershed as if it were our neighbourhood, and really this is our neighbourhood. What I find about too many of us who live in the Similkameen Valley is that we are narrow-

minded about our neighbourhood. We can find our way to Penticton or Vancouver, but we haven't found our way to many places right here in the valley.

I would bet there are people living in Tulameen who have never gone to Cawston in late August to buy the sweetest field-ripened melons in the world. I would bet there are people in Cawston who have never gone to Tulameen Family Days parade, which happens to be a parade full of fun and laughter.

I wonder how many Keremeos residents have come to the horse races in Princeton, and how many Princeton residents have gone to the Keremeos Elks Rodeo. How many valley residents have bothered to go to events put on by our local Indian Bands? Have you ever crossed the Chopaka bridge to go to the Easter Sunday rodeo?

Yes, it is on Chopaka Indian Reserve but everyone is welcome. Have you ever gone to a powwow in Hedley or the Ashnola Valley? Do you even know where the Ashnola River joins the Similkameen, and have you ever been in the Ashnola to see the California bighorn sheep in summer or the rock rabbits (pica) playing in the rockslides?

Have you ever stopped at Hedley Museum for a cup of tea and a piece of pie? Have you ever enjoyed a buffalo burger or Thai food in Keremeos? Have you ever stopped at the collectibles shop in Olalla, or visited the friendly marmots at Lightning Lake?

How many people in the valley think of it as their own neighbourhood? I know I do.

I have been to nearly every celebration in the valley, from Hedley Stamp Mill Days to Apple Day at the Grist Mill and Otter Valley Fish and Game Club dinners in Tulameen. I like to go to the Elders Dinner held once a

month in Keremeos, an event involving fundraising for the Elders bus (it is lunch plus a loonie auction). I have gone up the mountain to the old Mascot Mine, and I have walked through the tunnel in Princeton to see Vermilion Bluffs where First Nations people mined ochre. I have been out to Osprey Lake and the Three Lakes Store, and I have enjoyed meeting friends at Kars Under the K.

The valley really is our neighbourhood, and we should get to know our own neighbourhood and the people in it. We do live in one of the best places in the world, and we should enjoy it. I think our people should get to know each other better through sharing activities, such as our Senior Citizens doing things with Keremeos seniors, and our arts groups sharing activities.

All of this takes communication between groups and published notices of when things are taking place, but surely that is not so big an obstacle.

The Strategy calls for preservation and enhancement of our social and cultural organizations. Maybe we can join forces between organizations not only to preserve them but to enhance them.

Perhaps the Keremeos Legion working with the Princeton Legion can achieve more goals, and the arts groups in each community can do presentations with other arts groups. All organizations are in need of new members, and some are dying due to lack of young members. Perhaps by joining forces for special events, they can attract new younger members.

Perhaps all of us need to talk to our valley neighbours and talk about what we can do, and how we can best welcome the newcomers and turn them into "old-timers" who know everybody and everything that's going on.

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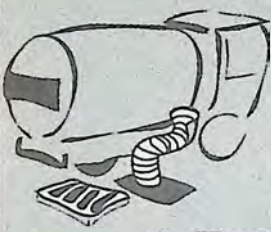

Woman pays big fine

Sherri Robinson appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 11 to plead guilty to a charge under the Motor Vehicle Act. She had been seen speeding through Princeton on Highway 3, doing more than 80 kmph in a 50 kmph zone.

She was arrested on November 23, 2008, and initially contested the charge. She opted for a lesser charge and was ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine.

Local man goes to jail

Michael Joseph Magny appeared in custody in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 10 and 11 facing charges for which he was detained on June 10.

He was held overnight in cells on June 10 following a bail hearing. On June 11, Crown Counsel asked that Magny be detained in custody until his trial on December 9 because Magny was deemed unlikely to obey a court order due to prior record.

Crown Counsel added concerns about Magny's connection to the local drug trade.

After a discussion between Crown Counsel, Defense, and Magny, the 43 year old Princeton man chose to plead guilty to several counts. The circumstances leading to the charges related to two incidents and a breach of recognizance.

On March 26, 2010, police saw a vehicle making an illegal turn down to Similkameen Avenue. The police officer followed the vehicle as it proceeded to turn onto Stout Road and then onto the dyke, going at a fast speed.

From the dyke, the vehicle went up a footpath to Highway 3, turned

west, and was driven at speeds up to 150 kmph until it turned onto Blackfoot Road and finally came to a stop. At this point, Magny was arrested. He was on a two year driving prohibition.

The second incident occurred on April 9, 2010. Three men were working on the footbridge known as the Bridge of Dreams. Access to the bridge was blocked off with large concrete blocks. Magny, driving a dirt bike, raced between the blocks. One of the workers, Bob Hart, stepped out to stop Magny and Magny went straight at Hart. Hart managed to grab on to the bike and hold it, while another person called police. Magny called for help from a friend, Archie Pelly, and also tried to bribe Hart and the others (with \$50) to let him go.

Neither effort worked. The dirt bike Magny was riding was a bike owned by Maria Ball and reported stolen in 2008.

Judge G. Sinclair sentenced Magny to a total of four months in jail, and a two year driving prohibition to commence after the jail term is completed.

Hedley man beats rap

On June 10, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Hedley resident Gregory Sykes defended himself against a charge of uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm.

The Crown called witnesses William Leslie Minshull and his father, William Henry Minshull, both residents of Hedley living as next door neighbours.

They both testified that on the evening of August 24, 2009, Sykes and three other men had come to W.L. Minshull's house

where they pounded on the door, threatening to beat Minshull and rape his girlfriend. The younger Minshull said he had looked out his window and had seen Sykes as well as heard him. The older Minshull stated he had heard the voices and identified one of the voices as Sykes'.

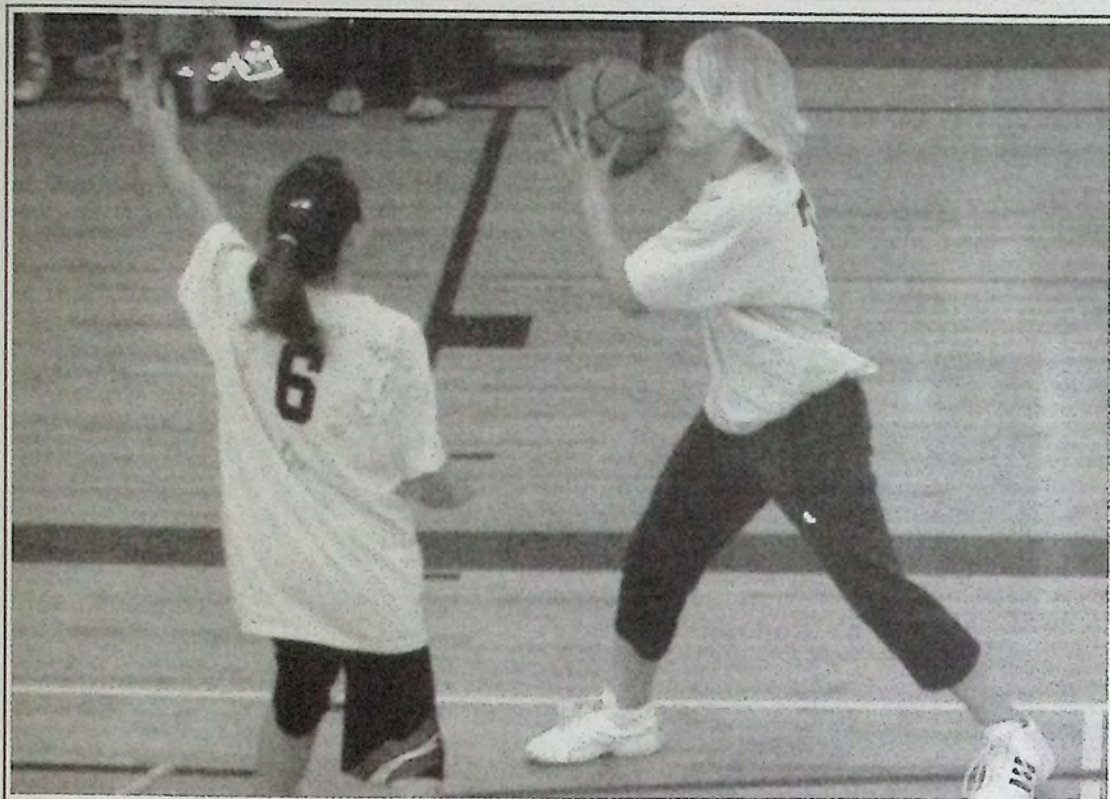
He said he knew Sykes' voice as he had often heard Sykes arguing with his girlfriend in Sykes' backyard adjacent to the elder Minshull's backyard.

'Sykes called two witnesses, Tony Heinrich and Bob Lucy, both of whom had been Hedley residents at the time of the incident. Heinrich testified he had already admitted his guilt in the incident, and stated Sykes had not been present during the incident. Heinrich said he had been drinking and was "fairly drunk" and angry with Minshull who had stolen a job from him. He had beaten on Minshull's door, but never threatened to kill him.

Bob Lucy testified he had been drinking with Heinrich and Sykes that evening and had gone with Heinrich to Minshull's residence in case there was trouble. He stated Sykes had not gone with them. He and Heinrich had gone to Minshull's twice that evening.

Sykes testified on his own behalf, saying the three men had been drinking. Tony Heinrich had been angry with Minshull, but Sykes had told him not to go to Minshull's house. Sykes claimed he refused to go with Heinrich and Lucy.

Judge G. Sinclair stated there was reasonable doubt in the case, and found Sykes not guilty.
