RDOS refuses to purchase Eastgate utility

William Tower, President of the Bonnevier Water Co. Ltd. requested that the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen assume ownership of the company which is located at East Gate in Electoral Area H.

RDOS staff visited the site and observed the following:

- While the water system appears to have been constructed to the appropriate engineering and health standards in place in 1972-73 and appears to be in reasonably good condition, the water does not meet the IHA quality requirements and the system would require a new source well or installation of a fil-

tration treatment system.

- The intent of every water purveyor would be to offer a service to the member's at the most reasonable price. The distance between East Gate and Penticton; presents problems for RDOS to provide timely maintenance, react to emergencies and provide standby availability.

- Finding a qualified operator or contractor located in close proximity to the facilities will be difficult.

With those constraints, the Board announced at their July 8th regular meeting that the RDOS declined the offer to take ownership of the Bonnevier Water Co. Ltd.

RDOS receives final report

The Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) initiated a project intended to study and strategically respond to the affects of amenity migration occurring within the Valley.

The Strategy provides a number of recommendations, including the need for a demographic forecast of the Valley; consideration to the creation of a Housing Action Plan and Agency; and the formulation of a Water Management Action Plan and Valley Environmental Management and Conservation Action Plan.

The recommendations contained within the Strategy also speak to the need to "undertake more extensive land use planning throughout the Valley to appropriately manage and direct future growth."

The Regional District Board received the Strategy for a Sustainable Similkameen Valley and its recommendations for inclusion in the following RDOS

Documents:

- Electoral Area 'H' Zoning and Official community Plan (OCP) Bylaw Review;
 - Interlocution of an Agricultural Zone to Electoral Area 'G';
 - Initiation of community planning in Electoral Area 'B'; and
 - Drafting of a Regional Context Statement (RCS) for inclusion within Similkameen Valley electoral area and municipal OCP's.
- ELECTORAL AREA 'H' GAS TAX USAGE**

In other RDOS news, Electoral Area 'H' and the Vermillion Trails Society have completed an assessment of the conditions of the KVR/Trans Canada Trail in the Tulameen and Coalmont areas.

In order to promote the trail as a commuting corridor it is necessary to resurface a portion of the trail. The total budgeted cost of the upgrade is \$30,000. There are approximately 2.5 km of upgrades required near Tulameen, 1.5 km of upgrades required near Coalmont and upgrades needed to the trestle at Otter Lake to render it a safe and

usable part of the corridor.

The trail is located on crown land with a lease listed to the BC Trails Society. A bylaw was adopted by the Board during the July 8th regular meeting of the RDOS to authorize the expenditure of monies from the Electoral Area 'H' Community Works (Gas Tax) Reserve fund for trail upgrades in rural Princeton.

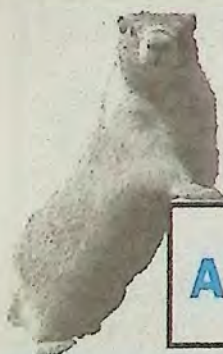
ELECTORAL AREA 'H' COOPERATIVE TRAILS AGREEMENT

Princeton and the surrounding areas are rich in natural, man made and historical trails. The trails provide significant opportunities to the people living in and visiting the area to observe and enjoy wildlife and the environment. Various user groups have come together with a desire to formulate a working group to promote the successful management of trails for recreational opportunities.

The Regional District Board authorized the Chairman and the CAO on July 8th to enter into the Cooperative Trails Agreement.

Court hears assault pleas

In Provincial Court in Princeton on July 15, there were a number of assault cases.

John L. McLeod, of Princeton, entered a guilty plea to a charge of assault of his girlfriend. He agreed to a peace bond with the condition that he not remain in his girlfriend's presence when she has been consuming alcohol.

Leslie J. Bell admitted guilt in an assault charge laid as a result of a complaint by Alexander Bernard of Hedley. Bell had attended at Bernard's residence and accused him of being a drug dealer and beating her son. She had kicked him, threatened to burn down his house and threw some object through his window. Bell had a prior similar conviction. Judge Sinclair sentenced her to one year on probation during which she is to have no contact with Bernard or the woman with whom he lives.

Zachary Kaiser, of Mission, B.C.

was arrested and charged with assault on April 24 in Princeton. An off-duty police officer saw him hit and shove a young woman in a downtown area. The 22 year old Kaiser received a conditional discharge and nine months probation. He is to have no contact with the woman he assaulted.

Woman loses license

Pamela Shields appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on July 15 to enter a guilty plea to a charge of driving while impaired. She was apprehended following a report of a domestic dispute in progress.

When police attended, they saw her drive away and suspected she had been drinking. They sent out a bulletin and Shields was later stopped and her breath was tested. She failed the test. Shields had no prior convictions, and was ordered to pay the minimum \$1,000 fine and surrender her driver's license for one year.

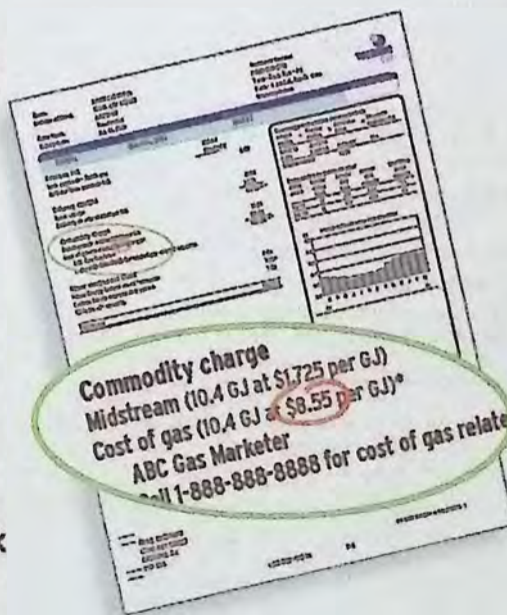

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Festival returns for 3rd year

Anyone walking down the streets of Princeton on the weekend of August 20th to 22nd shouldn't be surprised to hear fiddle tunes wafting across Bridge Street. Looking west onto the Veterans' Square they will see a big tent with a stage and people sitting in chairs tapping their toes or maybe even dancing in the street. Walking down Vermilion Avenue towards the Museum they may hear bagpipes or cowboy poetry or perhaps a song about sailing on the tall ships.

All of this and much more is the kind of music featured at the third annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival. Over 120 musicians will be in town that weekend.

This year is Princeton's 150th birthday and to celebrate this historic occasion the Festival will be launched at about 6:00 PM on Friday, August 20th with the arrival in town of about 70 horse riders of the Back Country Horsemen of BC who will have ridden here over historic trails from Hope. Their arrival is followed by the Festival's opening ceremony on Veterans' Square followed by an Irish country dance on Veterans' Way. The dance will feature a live band with fiddle, guitar and concertina. Everyone is welcome. There will be a caller to teach the dances so no experience is necessary and people don't even need to bring a partner. On Saturday and Sunday there will be music from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM on two stages - one on Vermilion Square and one in front of the Museum.

As well as the regular concerts by individual performing groups there will also be theme concerts called workshops. Over the next five weeks this column will feature descriptions of some of the work-

shops being offered at the Festival. A workshop is focused on a particular topic and is presented by a group of singers or musicians who are on the stage at the same time. This year there will be eleven workshops: "The Blues", "Celtic Harp", "Free Reed Instruments", "Hawaiian Music", "Mining Songs", "Railway Songs", "Sea Shanties", "Songs in French", "Spoken Word", "Traditional Ballads", and a "Celtic Jam".

Most people associate harps with angels. The harp is, in fact, the oldest known stringed instrument. The word 'harpa' or 'harp' comes from Anglo-Saxon, Old German, and Old Norse words meaning "to pluck." This year's Festival will feature four Celtic harp players who will all be onstage at the same time in the Celtic Harp workshop making angelic music.

Zeke Hoskin from Bellingham usually performs with Flip Breskin and this will be his third year at the Festival. Debi Johnson from Summerland began her affair with the harp 15 years ago when a friend introduced her to the instrument. She began to explore the rich history of Celtic and traditional music. Last year she performed at the Festival with Fiddle Frazzle and will be doing so again this year. Kate Gibson Oswald from Kelowna fell in love with the Celtic harp about 12 years ago. Most recently she performed at the Pacific Rim Arts Festival in Tofino. This will be Kate's first appearance at the Festival. Chris Roe from Seattle is a Festival regular who is probably best known for her singing. She is, however, also an accomplished multi-instrumentalist.

Most people have heard harmonicas and accordions but often don't

THE APPLICATION

On June 18, 2010 FortisBC Inc. (FortisBC) filed a 2011 Capital Expenditure Plan (the Application) with the British Columbia Utilities Commission (the Commission) pursuant to Sections 44.2 (1) (a) and (b) and 45 (2) of the Utilities Commission Act (the Act).

FortisBC states these expenditures are necessary to continue to provide reliable service, ensure public and employee safety, and to deliver Demand Side Management (DSM) programs to the Company's growing customer base.

The FortisBC 2011 Capital Expenditure Plan consists of expenditures of \$103.3 million in 2011 and \$5.3 million in 2012. These expenditures are necessary to continue to provide reliable service, ensure public and employee safety, and to deliver DSM programs to the Company's growing customer base. The 2011 Capital Expenditure Plan will also address total new expenditures on Plant and Equipment for 2011 that is forecasted at \$91.3 million.

THE REGULATORY PROCESS

The Commission has established a Regulatory Timetable for a Written Public Hearing process to review the Application.

Persons wishing to attend the FortisBC Workshop should notify the Commission, in writing or by electronic submission, no later than Friday, July 30, 2010.

INTERVENTIONS—REGISTERING TO PARTICIPATE

Persons who expect to actively participate in the FortisBC proceeding should register as Interveners with the Commission, in writing or by electronic submission, no later than Wednesday, August 11, 2010. Interveners are requested to identify their interest in the Application. Interveners will each receive a copy of the Application and all correspondence and filed documentation in accordance with the Commission's Document Filing Protocols.

Persons not expecting to actively participate, but who have an interest in the proceeding, should register as Interested Parties with the Commission, in writing, by the same date. Interested Parties will receive a copy of the Applicant's Executive Summary and the Commission's Decision when issued.

All submissions and/or correspondence received from active participants or the public relating to the Application will be placed on the public record and posted to the Commission's web site at www.bcuc.com. The Commission Panel in a proceeding may award costs for participation, pursuant to the Participant Assistance/Cost Award Guidelines, under section 118 of the Utilities Commission Act. The Guidelines are available at www.bcuc.com. Participants intending to apply for participant assistance must file a budget by Friday, August 13, 2010.

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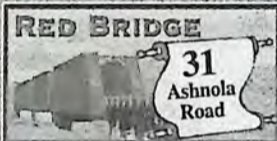

Village issues meeting highlights

Here are the Village of Keremeos "Media Highlights" from the July 12, 2010 regular meeting of Village Council:

Council heard from Hilma LaBelle, Executive Director of the South Okanagan Immigrant and Community Services regarding the services that the organization provides. She explained that a three-stage process was engaged leading up to the Community Protocol which has now been signed by many stakeholders, individuals in the South Okanagan/Similkameen, as well as Stockwell Day, the Provincial Minister of Multiculturalism and area Local Governments. She thanked the Village of Keremeos for being part of the protocol.

Council was informed by Mayor Despot that the official ceremony

for the "Keremeos Grist Mill postage stamp" will be held on Friday, July 23, 2010 at 1:30 PM at the Grist Mill.

Council discussed the issue of boulevard maintenance. Many BC communities have bylaws in place that require property owners to maintain the boulevards adjacent to their properties. The Village public works staff has been addressing various requests for maintenance (grass cutting, weed control), as they arise. Council agreed that the 'ad hoc' practice continue for now until time permits staff to bring information forward for Council to consider instituting a bylaw.

Council discussed the issue of requests from residents to improve boulevards adjacent to their properties. Safety concerns from public

works staff include vehicles not being able to pull off the pavement when necessary due to the improvements being placed too close to the pavement edge. While the Village encourages residents and businesses to improve the aesthetics of their properties and boulevards, some criteria are needed to ensure continued safety on Village roadways.

Council will be considering a more comprehensive dust control program during its 2011 budget discussions. Council deliberated whether or not to include a particular alley in the 2010 dust control program when the alley was not originally included in the 2010 program. Costs for more dust control applications are a factor, which must be balanced with community needs and wishes.

Facility celebrates 'historic' postage stamp

On July 23rd at 1:30 PM the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens welcome the public to a special ceremony. It's a celebration of a the Keremeos Grist Mill Commemorative Stamp issued in January by Canada Post.

Rika Ruebsaat and Jon Bartlett of the Princeton Traditional Music Society will sing traditional songs while local dignitaries join the public in the festivities.

A Canada Post commemorative plaque will be presented to the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens.

The event celebrates the Keremeos element in a quintet of stamps featuring five Historic Canadian Mills: Watson's Mill in

Manotick, Ontario; the Keremeos Grist Mill in Keremeos, British Columbia; the Old Stone Mill National Historic Site in Delta, Ontario; the Riodon Grist Mill in Caraquet, New Brunswick; and Cornell Mill in Stanbridge East, Quebec.

Representatives of The newly revived Similkameen Branch of the Okanagan Historical Society and of the South Similkameen Museum Society will be on hand for the event.

Grist Mill operator, Jim Millar, will give visitors and dignitaries a special tour of the Keremeos Grist Mill.

Another upcoming event at the Grist Mill features the Desert Sage

Spinners and Weavers of Oliver and area who will be onsite demonstrating their heritage skills and displaying their wares from 10:00 AM to 2:30 PM on Sunday, July 25th.

The Grist Mill Heritage Site, acquired on behalf of the people of British Columbia, was restored by the BC Heritage Trust in the 1990's. In 1877 Barrington Price established this mill by Keremeos Creek, where for some twenty years it served pioneering families.

The Keremeos Grist Mill Gardens are open daily, May 22 to September 19, 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM with Tearoom, Giftshop, Campground and interpretive tours of the mill.

RDOS announces pest control

MOSQUITO CONTROL AND WEST NILE VIRUS PROTECTION PROGRAM

The RDOS operates two programs aimed at reducing the mosquito population. The Mosquito control Program targets mosquitoes that affect quality of life. These mosquitoes are not West Nile virus vectors. The West Nile virus Protection Program targets potential WNV vector mosquitoes. Both programs are needed to provide comprehensive mosquito control

throughout the RDOS. Mosquito Control staff can only treat where permission is granted from the property owner, resident and other interested parties including non-government environmental organizations (NGEOs).

Various areas have opposed treatment. The Board has approved that a letter be forwarded to the Provincial Health Officer requesting an Order to larvicide for the purpose of West Nile virus vector control throughout the RDOS.

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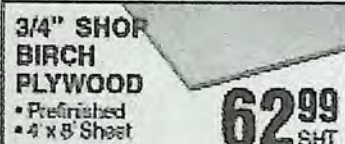
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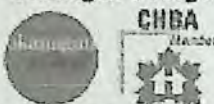


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PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen recognizes the significant value of volunteers, volunteer groups and agencies to the spiritual, educational, social, cultural and physical well-being of the region.

These non-profit organizations have the opportunity to apply for a Property Tax Exemption. The following criteria will determine eligibility.

The applicant(s) must:

- Qualify for an exemption under the provisions of the Local Government Act, the general authority for property tax exemptions. (Sections 809 and 810);
- Be in compliance with Regional District policies, plans, bylaws and regulations (i.e. zoning);
- Be a non-profit organization;
- Not be in competition with for-profit business;
- Provide services or programs that are compatible or complementary to those offered by the Regional District;
- Provide a service that fulfills some basic need, or otherwise improves the quality of life for residents of the Regional District.

Application forms are available online at www.rdos.bc.ca or at the RDOS office, 101 Martin Street, Penticton, BC.

The deadline for submitting completed application forms including supporting documentation is **JULY 31, 2010**.

Successful applicants may be asked to publicly acknowledge the exemption.

This tells us there is more to life than just food, exercise and the right medication. Any health professional will tell you there is a better chance of a patient pulling through a difficult disease or living with a painful condition if the patient has a strong spirit.

There is an attitude or spirit of loving life, of working with health professionals to assist in regaining and maintaining health. Some people even grow stronger because of an illness and develop a better attitude about life. There are many instances of people going through a near death experience and coming out of it with the determination to change what is wrong with their lives and live more fully with more joy in the blessings of daily life.

Counting your blessings, loving others, being grateful for the small pleasures of daily life, can actually do a great deal for your health and help you live longer and better. A person who can find happiness in watching a sunset or take pleasure in hearing a child laugh is the person who is likely to stay healthy. People with this attitude actually produce a hormone that promotes healing!

Think of the opposite kind of person, the one who finds little good in life, who complains about every little thing, who feels he got a bad deal out of life, or that life is unfair to him, that person is not going to heal fast or live a long healthy life.

A study done of volunteers who go out of their way to make life better for others showed these people are healthier than those who do not. Bridging gaps, breaking tradition

The bridge over Similkameen River was in the news this time nine years ago with the announcement of Neelco Construction Inc. of Chilliwack being awarded the contract to replace the structure.

Neelco had the lowest of eight bids at \$2.615 million. The Ministry of Transportation set the total cost of the project at \$3.180 million including materials, engineering and supervision.

The former Visitor InfoCentre and Chamber of Commerce office was removed as it was in the path of the new highway alignment.

Princeton's Royal Canadian Legion asked Town Council at the July 9, 2001 regular meeting if they would donate a prize to the upcoming Legion Golf Tournament. Councillor Kathy Clement was not in favour of donating prizes.

Princeton Rodeo Club was gearing up for two big events in 2001. One was a team roping competition August 18 and 19 and the club was preparing to host the BC Team Roping Finals September 14, 15 and 16 - on the weekend following Fall Fair.

A total of 50 golfers participated in the Princeton Men's Club Championship at Princeton Golf

Club. Bill Montgomery took Low Gross with 153.

Tip Anderson had Low Net with 130.

"Start breeding thoroughbreds," said Sandi Gabor, Racing Days Vice President.

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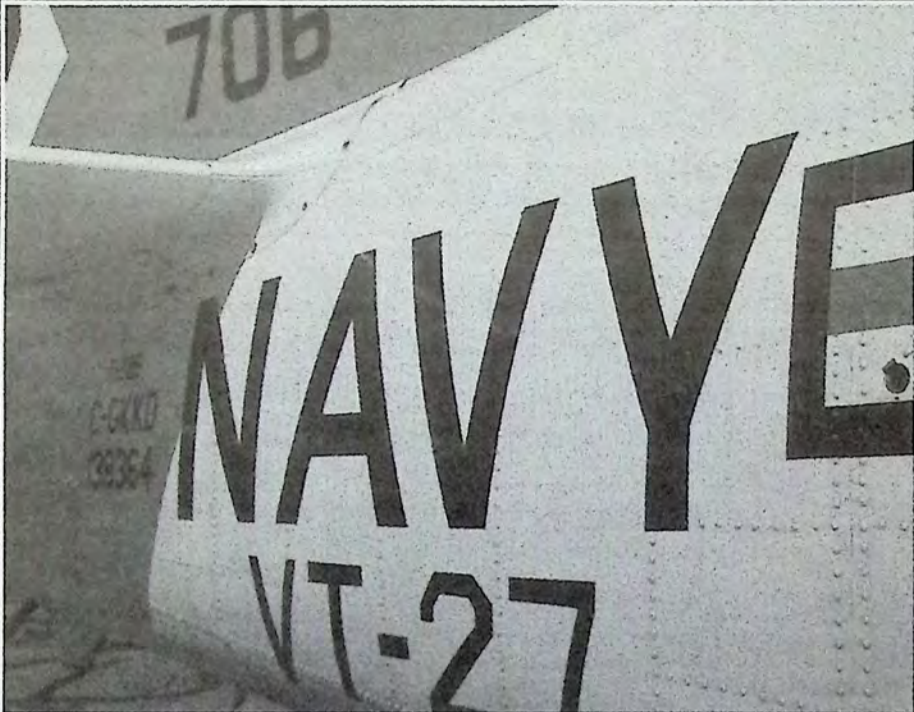
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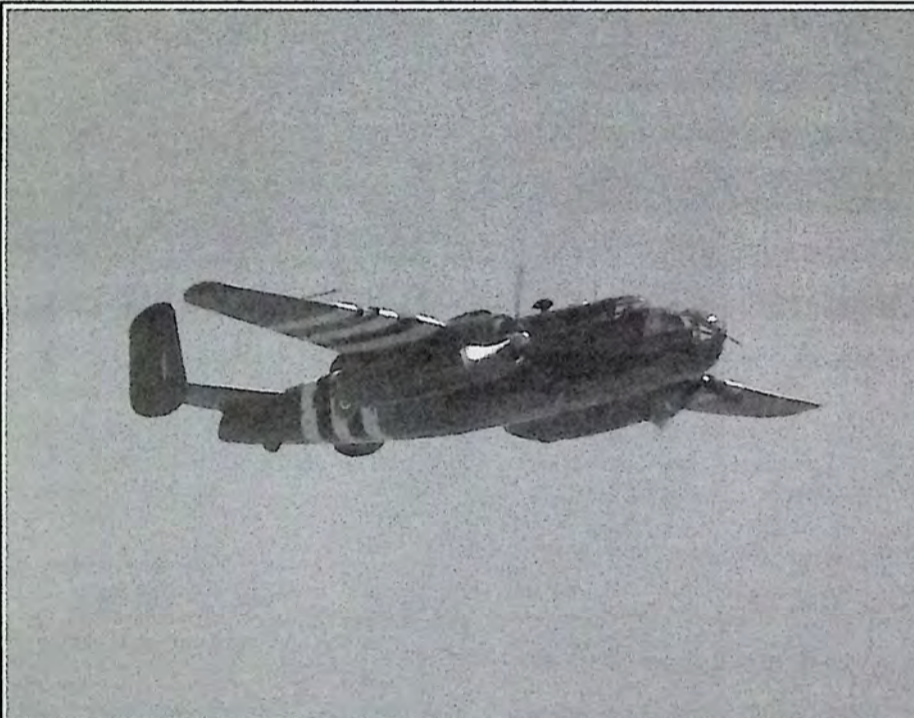

Mexican Skillet Rice

(NC)—Whole grain brown rice, seasoned with Mexican-inspired spices and ingredients, takes this skillet to the max. Gluten-free and full of fresh ingredients, it offers celiacs a flavourful and healthy recipe option.

- 1 lb lean ground beef or turkey 500 g
- 1 chopped medium onion
- 1 tsp chili powder 5 mL
- 1 tsp ground cumin 5 mL
- 1/2 tsp salt 2 mL
- 3 cups cooked brown rice 750 mL
- 1 16 oz (475 mL) can pinto beans, drained
- 2 4 oz (118 mL) cans diced green chilies
- 1 seeded and chopped tomato (optional)
- Shredded Cheddar cheese (optional)
- Fresh cilantro for garnish (optional)

In large skillet over medium-high heat, cook meat until brown, stirring to crumble; drain fat. Add onion, chili powder, cumin and salt; cook until onion is tender. Stir in rice, beans and chiles; cook until heated through. Top with tomato, cheese and cilantro, if desired.

While reading the article "Accessibility group boggles Town Council" in last week's News Leader, it occurred to me that the Accessibility Awareness Committee is slowly and effectively being painted as a group of discontented complainers who can only find faults in our community and have very little to offer to Princeton. And I take umbrage with this portrayal.

As I see it, the Accessibility Awareness Committee has many roles.

For example, one role is to identify the physical obstacles that prevent the less able from fully participating in our community. A second role is to provide this information to the individuals or organizations that might best address the accessibility deficit. A third role is to suggest possible ways to address the accessibility deficit.

A fourth role of the Committee, when appropriate and when the

budget permits, is to provide funding to implement the necessary accessibility changes. Several businesses and community organizations, as well as the less able, have benefited from the more than \$15,000 the Accessibility Awareness Committee has invested in accessibility improvements in Princeton.

So the Committee does not just complain, we have added to our community.

The main goal of the Accessibility Awareness Committee is to make Princeton safe and accessible for everyone, regardless of ability.

The Accessibility Awareness Committee, in virtually every letter written to Town Council ends with a statement asking them to please contact the Committee if they have any questions or need anything clarified. The letters also include the motto, "Don't plan for the disabled, plan with the disabled".

For me, the idea of the motto is

vital to positive change in Princeton. So as mistakes continue to be repeated, I am saying again, Town Council, please, stop planning for me and other less than able people in Princeton and start planning with us...include us in the process.

A safe and accessible Princeton will be much more expensive and much slower arriving if Town Council does not address the accessibility deficits that have already been identified, prioritized, and presented to them, and if Town Council doesn't stop repeating mistakes already made! And yes, mistakes are present in the accessible washroom in the new Library building, the concrete in the new Town Square, and a newly constructed building in town.

Bottom line, by not including the less able in the process, you are excluding us. And that, my friends, is a loss for everyone.

Even The Cowboys Are Getting Old

The loss of the bull riding finals, and the comments of Rodeo Club President Ken Crompton started me thinking about the days when Princeton Rodeo Club first began. What a great club they were! They were the envy of other rodeo clubs around the countryside. I would hear stories from my brother-in-law over in Armstrong about how the Princeton cowboys inspired the rest of them.

Princeton Rodeo Club was formed in late 1981, and by August 1982, they had built the rodeo arena, the announcer's stand, the chutes and the corrals. They put on the first rodeo Princeton had seen in a long time. Their wives helped, too, running the concession and raising money for the club.

They were an amazing group, real westerners inspired by the high spirits of the old west. They did a cattle drive down Bridge Street one year. Another year they played robbers and held up the last passenger train on the Kettle Valley Railroad. When Princeton celebrated downtown revitalization, the cowboys held up the Welby Stage on its way from the airport to the town centre, robbing Premier Bill Vander Zalm. The firing of black powder guns was not unheard of. The enthusiastic young cowboys included John Allison, Mac Lind, the Thomas brothers, Terry Wright, and many others.

They invited Canada's most famous professional cowboy, Kenny McLean, to move to Princeton and share the Princeton Exhibition Association facility. McLean made Princeton his home for many years as part of the Rodeo Club.

This group, led by Stan Thompson, made an alliance with Tonasket Comancheros Rodeo

Club and, as part of the Sister City initiative, began the International Pony Express Friendship Ride that went from Princeton to Tonasket one year and back the other way the next. They carried mail from Princeton, Hedley, Keremeos and Loomis post offices to Tonasket post office, with bragging rights to the fastest international mail service in the world. The riders, on their journey by horse, faced ambush by local redskins between Keremeos and the border, and outlaws after the mail when they crossed the border. It was a hoot, and they did it for 13 years. The ride was on television, in newspapers, and made the centerfold of The Province, featuring Bernie Juneau making a mad dash down the highway with the mail.

Every time the Pony Express Ride took place, there was a ceremony at the Canada-U.S. border, where dignitaries from both sides reaffirmed the peaceful history of the two nations, and riders carrying the flags of their respective countries passed the mail across the border while both national anthems were sung by the crowds on either side of the border.

The riders who carried the mail were honored to do so. It was a special honour to carry the flag to the border at Nighthawk for the exchange ceremony. I remember the late William "Pinky" Foster mounting the horse and carrying the flag in what was probably the last time he sat on a horse.

He was one of the founding members of Princeton Rodeo Club. So was Bob Lind and Glen Sellers, along with some of the others I've mentioned, and a few more as well.

These guys from Princeton Rodeo Club took the Welby Stage to Tonasket every year to ride in the Founder's Day parade. They took the Welby Stage to the Chopaka Rodeo to carry Barney Allison's widow and family into

the rodeo arena for a giveaway to honour Barney's memory.

In those days, when Princeton hosted a rodeo, they put on a big dance at the arena. I recall asking Stan Thompson whether the previous night's dance had been a good one.

"It was great!" Stan said, giving me the full benefit of his engaging grin. "A fight broke out about midnight and it turned into a brawl. They'll be back next year!"

That last comment may sound a bit rough and tumble, but we're talking cowboys and cowboys have their own ways of having fun. During their regular days, these cowboys worked at trucking, logging, and ranching. They worked hard and they played hard. Princeton Rodeo Club did a lot to promote Princeton and spread goodwill up and down the Similkameen Valley. Now, 29 years later, they are still hosting a rodeo, and in recent years, the bull riding finals, but they are getting old, and their cowboy spirit isn't what it used to be. Kenny McLean and Pinky Foster have gone to their reward. The young fellows who carried forward the spirit of the west are middle aged. They probably ride ATVs instead of horses.

I was told by one person who attended the June meeting of the Rodeo Club there were not enough members present to form a quorum.

Young men and women aren't stepping forward to take the place of the aging cowboys, and if that cowboy spirit is dying, then there will be no Rodeo Club and no rodeos in Princeton in the future. I'd hate to see that happen because that club has been an inspiration and the best goodwill ambassadors Princeton has ever seen. However, if our Rodeo Club bites the dust, I will honour them in my memory. They had a good ride and made top points as far as I'm concerned.

Though I was concerned that they would be disappointed to see that little remained, they proved me wrong, they were visibly thrilled.

Albert Cole was 19 when he died in the disaster of 1930. When his body was recovered from the #4 mine it was placed, temporarily in the main town cellar. Now standing

atop that very cellar, Mrs. M. Cole expressed her gratitude that I was able to supply her with such a tangible conduit to her bitter sweet past at Blakeburn.

Upon visiting the 'Big Pit' at Blakeburn, B. Miller suddenly announced that the ashes of one of his relations is buried a short distance away.

This was my turn to be Wow'ed for I had no idea that anyone was interned at Blakeburn. We all had a terrific and informative 'historic walk.'

All who attended this 'walk,' and the several dozen who were unable to attend, have asked me to host more tours and how can I say no. Therefore, on behave of the

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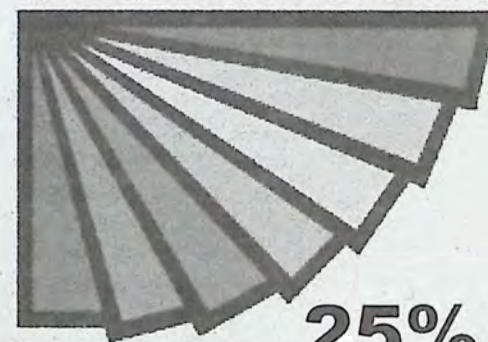


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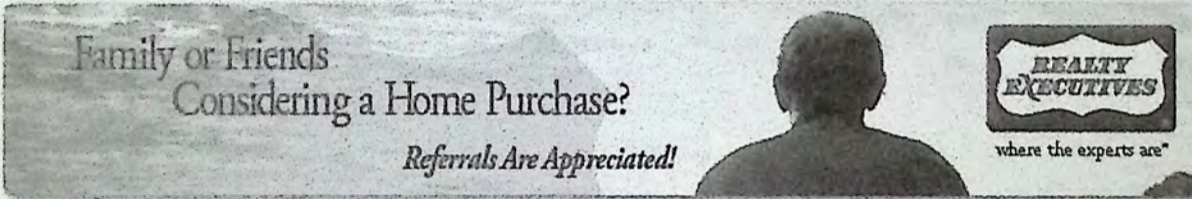
