## Racing Days faces death

There was a time when horse racing stopped because there were no horses. Next year, there may be no races because there is no Racing Days Association.

Only three executive and one regular member attended the annual general meeting of Racing Days Association held Thursday, October 21.

President John Bey, whose term in office has ended due to his resignation, was to have been replaced along with Secretary Carol Ruoss, who did not attend due to illness and submitted her resignation effective October 21. Treasurer Roberta Baron was present, and Director Sandi Gabor. The rest of the registered Board of Directors did not attend the meeting.

Councillor Jason Earle and Area H Director Brad Hope attended as interested parties from local government.

### Jarvis exposes landfill issues

Councillor Ray Jarvis reported on a meeting he attended regarding solid waste management. He stated there is a push to close all landfills through making everything part of recycling.

He said something must be done at Princeton's landfill about glass being crushed and buried instead of recycled. He would like to see more composting done by home owners, too. He emphasized how expensive it is to operate a landfill. During question period, Councillor Jarvis was asked what is being done to keep BPA containers out of

No election of a new Board of Directors was possible.

John Bey did report an ironic fact in view of the failure of the annual general meeting.

He had attended a meeting in Vancouver of horse racing interests in B.C. He learned there will be more money for the Interior tracks next year. He added that the cost analysis survey and study being done by Al Miller showed Princeton's Racing Days Association has been the only one doing the job right.

Racing Days Association requires the election of a Board of Directors if horse racing in Princeton is to continue or die. Another attempt at an election will be held January 20 at the public library at 7:00 PM.

Until then, the existing Board of Directors, such as it is, will continue to conduct the business of the Association.

Council was asked if it would be possible to have a bylaw banning plastic shopping bags from the community.

Council had no definite response to this question other than to say a report by Regional District showed attempts to do so had not been successful.

## PXA addresses problems

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) met October 19 at the fairgrounds office to discuss not only ongoing maintenance projects, but the future management of the grounds.

At the September meeting, Vice-President Terry Inglis presented a discussion paper listing the problems of operating and maintaining the fairgrounds facility with volunteer workers. He proposed that the Town of Princeton take over operation and maintenance of the facility.

At the October meeting, the proposal came to the floor once more. Inglis said he had received almost no feedback.

President John Bey stated Osoyoos had done that and it had not worked out, and Vernon is having problems with City Council. Bey suggested making some kind of agreement with the Town.

Inglis said if every member of the

PXA devoted one day a week to work on the facility, the work would still not be done. He personally had recorded 500 hours in 2010 up to August 21. There is too much work to do.

Councillor Jason Earle, who is Town Council's liaison with the PXA and user groups, told the meeting that decisions need to be made. He said the discussion paper is very important. He urged the PXA to go to Town Council with facts and talk to Council about the situation.

### Town Council comments on volunteer involvement

Both Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Jason Earle attended the volunteer appreciation dinner hosted by Princeton Exhibition Association. At the October 18 Town Council meeting, Mayor McLean said, "It is nice to say thank you to the people who put on events for our community."

The PXA annual general meeting takes place on November 16 at the fairgrounds office, weather permitting. If there is too much snow, it will be held at the public library meeting room.

At that meeting, a new executive must be elected if the PXA is to continue to function. At this time, John Bey has resigned as of November 17, along with Terry Inglis, Carol Ruoss and Peter Ruoss. To date, nobody has stepped forward to fill these positions soon to be vacated.

Councillor Earle said it is nice to see volunteers coming together.

"The number of volunteers is amazing," he said. He went on to urge people to attend the Racing Days Association annual general meeting on October 21.

"If you have an interest in horse racing, then step forward," he said.



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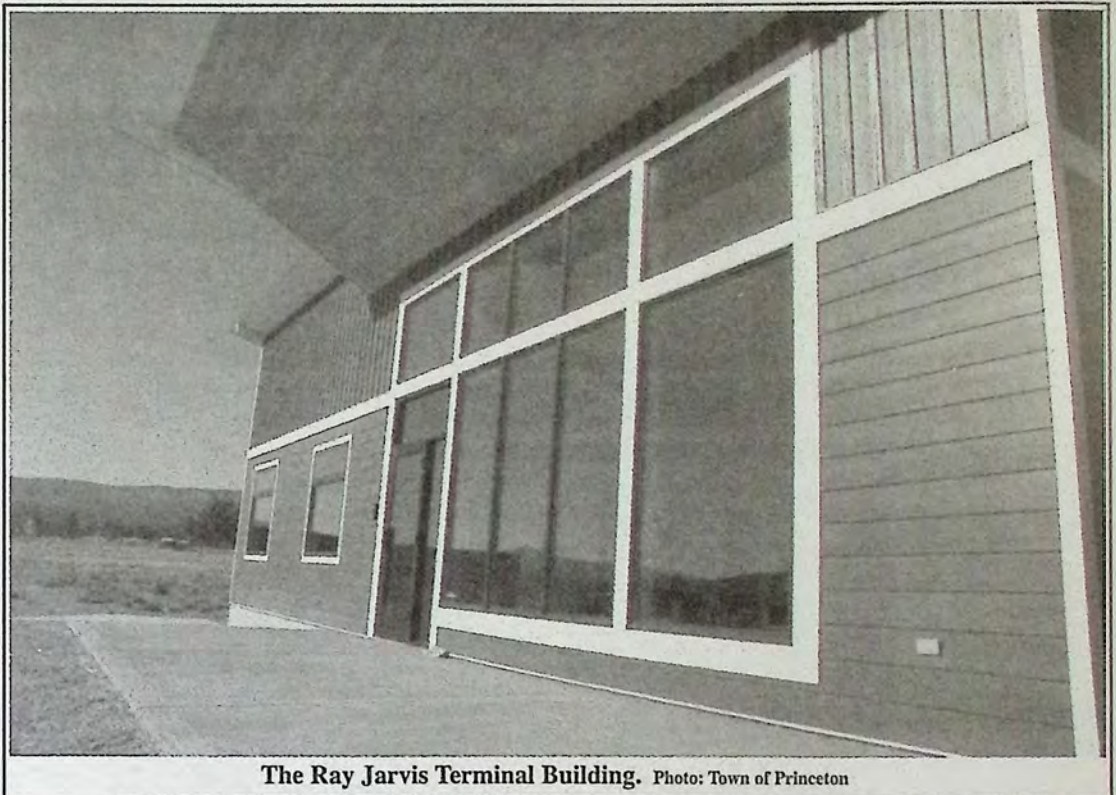


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The Ray Jarvis Terminal Building. Photo: Town of Princeton

**Town hosts open house November 7th**

Join the Airport Select Committee and Town of Princeton on Sunday November 7 between 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM at the Princeton Regional Airport for an open house. Come see the finishing touches to the Ray Jarvis Terminal Building.

Town representatives will be on hand to discuss the future development and vision for the airport. On display will be the preliminary land use plan that was developed in 2006 by William R. Neale and Associates and the accompanying 10-Year Feasibility Study.

The airport has seen varied use over the past 18 months including

being the base for a research and development company, multiple exploration companies and forest fire fighting operations. The terminal building was used by a research and development company conducting multiple unmanned flight missions that tested their unmanned air vehicles (UAV); the UAV has multiple roles including the collection of geophysical and remote sensing (aerial photography) data.

NAV CANADA completed an electronic aid to aircraft navigating at the Princeton Regional Airport this past year. A runway survey was completed providing an accurate GPS based (RNAV) instrument approach for aircraft. With the survey completed, official readings for the Princeton aerodrome will allow RNAV equipped aircraft to make full use of the approaches satisfying Transport Canada requirements and above all, ensuring aviation safety.

The Princeton Regional Airport continues to be host to some very interesting aircraft and operations. In the spring the airport hosted a Canadian Air Force CC-130 Hercules transport airplane on a training exercise. The visiting

Hercules carried Search and Rescue parachutists on training from their Comox base. Princeton typically sees the CC-115 Buffalo aircraft training in Princeton; a much smaller aircraft than the Hercules. General aviation aircraft continue to make Princeton a stop on their route; landings in 2010 far exceed the total number of landings in the past four years combined.

With the completion of major infrastructure servicing to the airport lands, the airport is poised for future investment as the Town begins to articulate the development strategy outlined in the 2006 10-year Airport Feasibility Study. These strategies include the development of aviation and non-aviation commercial development, hangar facility development for forward operating bases and private aircraft and an airpark.

The Princeton Regional Airport is also home to the Annual Princeton Air Show; scheduled in 2011 for Saturday July 16. The airport also hosts a number of other events including a semi-annual jet flyers competition and vehicle racing and rallying.

"If I was asked to describe what the meeting centred on I would have to say the main focus was to fine tune a few things," Committee member George Elliott said last week.

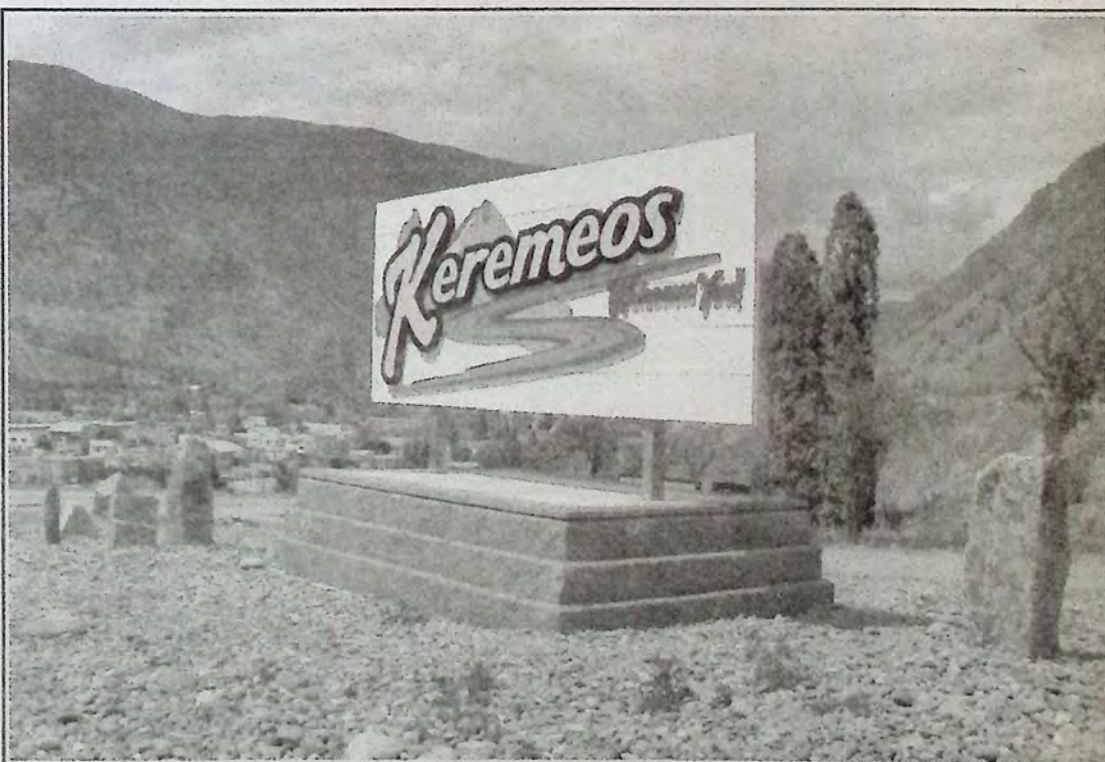

## Do you have a problem with debt?

(NC) Payment overdue. Insufficient funds. Overdraft. If just reading these words makes you feel stressed out, you may have a problem with debt. Taking control of your debt can lower your stress and give you the peace of mind you have probably been craving for a very long time.

Some of the warning signs that you may have a problem with debt

include: bounced cheques, calls from collection agencies, "borrowing from Peter to pay Paul" or having to get a second job.

If collection agencies are calling, work out a repayment plan and get it in writing. Do not treat any debts lightly. Leaving them unpaid long enough can result in court action, which could lead to money being taken from your paycheque and/or

your assets being seized. Many debtors hate the word budget because it seems so restrictive. Actually, the more you plan your spending, the more financial freedom you will eventually have. If it helps, call it a "spending plan" instead of a "budget." Credit counsellors can also help.

One of the best sources of information on debt is the Canadian Consumer Handbook, which you can find at [www.consumerhandbook.ca](http://www.consumerhandbook.ca). It has tips on everything from debt and credit reporting to collection agencies and contracts.

It's important to get a copy of your credit report each year. You can obtain one from one of two Canadian credit reporting companies: TransUnion or Equifax. Your credit report lists your credit rating on a scale from one (you pay your bills within 30 days of the due date) to nine (you never pay your bills at all or have made a consumer debt repayment proposal to a lender).

Your score indicates your risk for being denied a credit card, loan or mortgage. Getting out of debt will raise your score. Contact information for the credit reporting companies in Canada can be found at [www.consumerhandbook.ca](http://www.consumerhandbook.ca).

It is up to the individual whether or not taking Omega 3 supplements is worthwhile. If you do decide to take it, follow the instructions on the bottle, or consult your physician about dosage.

## Jeff Turner saves bear

'Ghost Bear' film maker rescues frightened cub

A black bear cub that wandered into Cenotaph Park on Friday at noon drew a crowd of local and foreign spectators. They took still and video photographs of the little bear, or just observed. The cub, which weighed no more than 16 kilos (40 pounds), found the attention frightening. It went up a tree in the park. Conservation Officer Al Lay was out of town. RCMP were called. Constable Kate Anderson arrived to guard the cub while the Conservation Service was consulted. Town crew brought detour barriers while Cst. Anderson and Sgt. Kent Lozinski did crowd control, assisted by Citizens on Patrol. The cub reserved the right to remain in the tree while the humans fussed around down below, trying to decide what to do about the bear. Conservation Service left the decision to RCMP, who did not have any means of dealing with the situation.

Jeff Turner, well-known wildlife film maker whose first film was about the "ghost" or "spirit" bears of coastal B.C., lives in Tulameen area. He received a call advising him there was a cub in town. Turner arrived at the scene with a pet carrier cage.

Post Control Officer Keith Frankland was called to bring the pole and mouse used for capturing stray dogs. Turner put the mouse over the cub's head and pulled it to the ground. With help from Cst. Anderson and Sgt. Lozinski, Turner put the cub in the carrier. A temporary permit was issued to Turner to harbour the cub. Turners had appropriate accommodation for the cub, and when the News Leader talked to Sue Turner on Friday afternoon, she said the cub was "safe and happy". A decision will be made as to future accommodation, either with Turners or at a rehabilitation centre in Smithers.

The confusion was finally settled when Tulameen resident, and local film maker, Jeff Turner arrived on the scene with a pet carrier cage. The cub was reported to be "safe and happy" later in the day.

Princeton Golf Club reported a strong season during their AGM on October 25, 2003 with a membership of 330. Those members played 9,000 rounds of golf over the season with another 9,000 being played by non-members - up about

2,000 from the previous year.

Local doctors gave Princeton Posse some much-needed life support by presenting "Posse Galore" - a performance of skits and jokes. Over the years the annual 'Doctor's

Show' as it was often referred to became a sellout fundraising event for many different local causes.

The comedic skills of Veterinarian Dr. Phil Goss, X-Ray Technician Mike Ball, Dr. Douglas Reid, Dietitian Jane Johnson and Dr. John Bosomworth were noteworthy.

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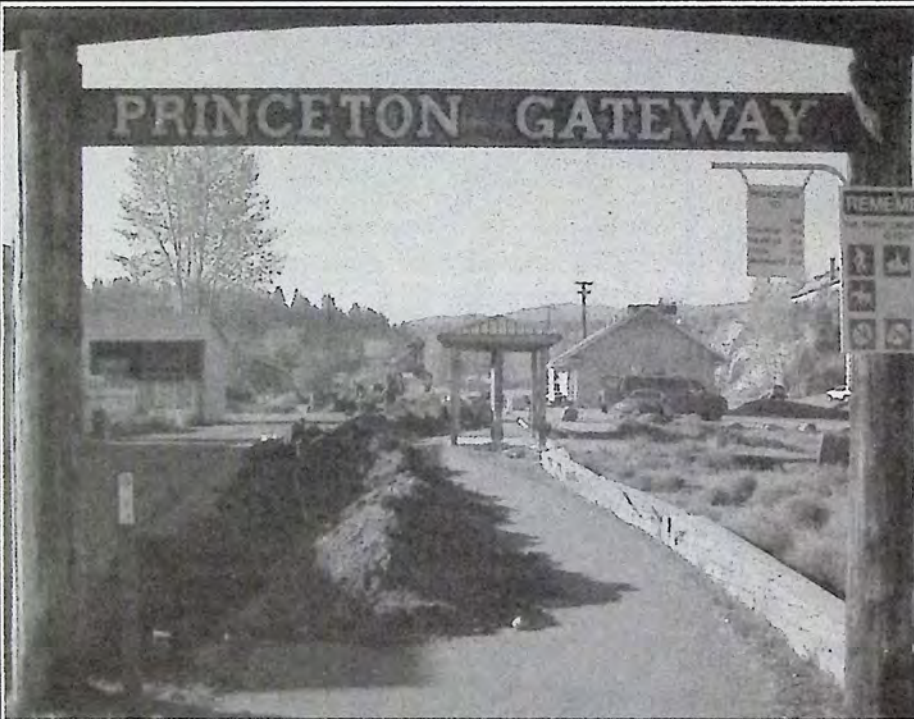
# Trail Lighting Project

## Osoyoos Coyotes desert Posse

Princeton Posse hosted Osoyoos Coyotes in an unusual Tuesday night match October 19th.

The last time the two teams met, on October 1st, Princeton dragged the visitors into double overtime and finished the contest in a 6-all tie.

Osoyoos scored first at 15:34 of the first period. Stefan Jensen got the marker with assistance from Taylor House and Josh DaCosta.

Princeton received their first power play opportunity at 13:15 when Jason Bell was called for roughing after the whistle, a penalty that was called frequently during the game.

Barely a minute into the power play Princeton's Ben Reinbolt popped a rebound in from in front of the Osoyoos net to tie the game. Assists went to Spencer Kristensen and Brett Serpico.

Princeton had another power play at 8:29 when Sam Nigg went off for hooking but could not produce.

Seconds into the second period Princeton gave Osoyoos their first power play at 19:20 when Devon Grossler went off for cross checking. Only seconds later Princeton's Tim Martens went off for roughing after the whistle setting Osoyoos up for a 2-man advantage.

The Posse managed to fight off the advances of the Coyotes and the period ended without any additional scoring.

The third period saw Osoyoos dominate scoring a power play goal at 13:19 (Taylor House from Ross Mancuso and Kyle Laslo), and out shooting Princeton 15 to 6

including two empty net goals (1:09 - Stefan Jensen and with 50.4-seconds left - Stefan Jensen from Taylor House).

# Posse show strength in third

Beaver Valley Nitehawks stopped in Princeton October 22nd to take on the Posse in the first part of a three game road trip for the Kootenay team.

The Nitehawks wasted little time getting their first goal at 16:29 (Mason Spear from Keanan Patershuk) and added a second goal at 14:18 (Justin Niminiken from Burhan Pourmokhtari).

Princeton's Spencer Kristensen was called for elbowing at 9:04 giving the Nitehawks their first of four power plays in the game, but the penalty passed without notice.

Princeton got their first of seven power plays at 6:58 when Nick Perez went off for roughing, but the Posse could not capitalize.

The second period saw Beaver

Valley score two more goals at even strength (18:05 - Colton Donselaar from Chris Derochie and at 5:32 - Ryon Sookro from Chris Derochie and Colton Donselaar).

It wasn't until near the end of the period when all the effort Princeton was putting into the game started paying off.

Princeton's Brett Serpico took a shot on goal from inside the blue line and Devon Grossler was able to deflect the puck in from just outside the goal crease. Nick Cecconi earned an assist on that goal, scored at 2:09.

**Quebec Pea Soup**  
(WITH GARLICKY CROUTONS)

(NC)—Rib sticking and hearty, this pea soup packs a nutritional punch, is full of fibre and comforting flavour. Just before serving, pop a few bagels into the toaster – they're a perfect accompaniment to the soup.

**Soup**  
- 2 cups dried yellow split peas 500 mL  
- 1 carton low-sodium chicken broth 900 mL  
- 4 cups water 1 L  
- 1 onion, chopped  
- 2 each celery stalks and carrots, sliced  
- 2 garlic cloves, minced  
- 1 tsp dried summer savoury leaves 5 mL  
- 2 bay leaves  
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper 2 mL

**Croutons**  
- 2 Garlic and Onion Country Harvest Bagels  
- 1 tbsp olive oil 15 mL

- Place all soup ingredients in a very large saucepan. Cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer covered about 1 1/2 hours, stirring occasionally until peas are very tender. Discard bay leaves.
- Meanwhile, preheat oven to 400F (200C). Slice bagels into 3/4 inch (4 cm) wedges, then cut again into 1/2-inch (1-cm) size croutons. Place in a bowl. While tossing bagel wedges, drizzle in oil to coat as best you can. Turn onto a baking sheet. Bake, stirring once, until golden, 5 to 8 minutes.
- Remove about 2 cups (500 mL) soup and puree until smooth. Stir back into soup in pot. Soup should be thick, but thin with a little water or broth if you wish. Makes 8 cups (2 L) soup and 3 1/2 cups (875 mL) croutons. Leftover croutons can be stored in an airtight container for up to 5 days or frozen. Soup will thicken as it cools. Nutrition per cup (250 mL) soup with 1/4 cup (50 mL) croutons 292 calories, 6.3 g fibre, 3.2 g fat, 414 mg sodium, 0.1g Omega-3

# Community Arts Council makes changes

Princeton Community Arts Council has been undergoing rapid change during the past two years. The society had been denied funding from BC Arts Council due to lack of activity and low membership, but has now been asked to re-apply for project assistance. Independently, the Arts Council has seen a flow of approximately \$50,000 through its coffers in the past year.

Sunflower Gallery has been a success. Nearly \$2,000 has been paid to local artist during the first three months of operation. The Arts Council will ask Town Council for an extension of the use of the Sunflower Gallery space.

Work on the cultural survey continues. The results of the survey will be presented to Town Council in November.

Three concerts are in the planning stages. The North Shore Singers and the Denton Trio have asked the Arts Council for a booking during

the winter season. The Denton Trio has been here before.

The North Shore Singers from Vancouver will be new to Princeton's audience. The third concert will be held at Lightning Lakes in Manning Park next summer, a day before the Traditional Music Festival. It is part of the Arts in the Park program developed to celebrate the 100th anniversary of BC Parks.

The Performing Arts Society is putting on a play for voices, entitled Under Milkwood. Rehearsals are going well and the play will be presented November 6 and 7. Tickets are \$10 and can be bought in advance at Sunflower Gallery Thursday through Saturday, or at the door before the performances. A Performing Arts youth group has been formed and is using the Riverside Theatre for their activities.

Nadine McEwen reported she has had to cancel a lot of recreation and

arts programs advertised in the Recreation Guide. She said people do not seem to understand that they must register for a program before it can go ahead.

She has had people show up for a program on the day it is due to start, only to find it has been cancelled due to lack of interest. The deadline for information going into the Winter Recreation Guide is November 16.

Terms of membership in the Arts Council are being changed. Individual memberships remain the same, but group memberships begin at \$30 per year plus \$2.00 per individual member.

A \$30 a year membership will be issued to any business interested in becoming part of the Arts Council. Life memberships can now be awarded.

If anyone wants to nominate a person who has made an outstanding contribution to Princeton's arts and culture, nomination forms will be

available next week.

The time of the monthly meeting has been changed to 4:30 PM in order to be more convenient for people working a full day. The next meeting is on November 17 at Riverside Centre.

### The First of Many Deaths?

When you saw this week's front page headline "Racing Days Faces Death" what did you think?

I felt a little nostalgic to be honest with you.

I was President of Princeton Racing Days for nine years. When I first got involved the event hosted two days of racing at Sunflower Downs. It was a transition from two weekends (yes, four days) of racing just prior to my involvement.

I was President when Racing Days dwindled down to a single day of racing. At the time we were trying so hard to attract horse owners from just about anywhere to come to our track. The fact of the matter at the time was that there just weren't enough horses available on the circuit.

It got so bad that Racing Days didn't run for a couple of years because of it.

The weekend was not the same without horse racing. One year bed racing down Vermilion Avenue was attempted. It obviously never caught on.

What will happen to Racing Days now?

Well, the reasons are a lot different now to the way things were when I was a part of the event.

There's horses. There's financial support. There's a lot of interest coming back to smaller racetracks in the interior.

There's just not enough people available who are willing to spend the time required to attend regular meetings in town, association meetings out of town, assist with the organizing of volunteers and dealing with all the other aspects of setting things in place for what amounts to four or five hours of live horse racing once a year.

It's a lot of work and the dedicated volunteers are tired. Some are worn out. Others are too sick to carry on.

The passing of Racing Days could be the start of the end of a lot of volunteer driven events in Princeton. The important thing to remember here is that it's not unique to Princeton, but since this is our town, it affects us all directly.

I strongly urge Town Council to take a long and hard look at what volunteers do for the community. They are involved in more than just horse racing and fairgrounds facility management. The cultural fabric of our community would be invisible if it wasn't for volunteers organizing and hosting events that celebrate everything from the arts and drama to horse racing.

The death of Princeton Racing Days can be prevented. But it will need more than band-aid solutions.

If Racing Days is allowed to die, which group is next?

### Cardlock continues to fuel discussion...

Dear Editor,

There are absolutely no absolutes. Never! After all, man would never fly. Don't tell Oroville and Wilbur. The Titanic was unsinkable. Oops. World War One was the war to end all wars. How has that worked out? The new Esso cardlock on Burton is environmentally state of the art and will never leak. Time will tell, but the odds are poor.

There are a couple of environmentally approved accidental spill safe guards at this site everyone needs to know about.

When, not if, there are minor refuelling spills, the contaminate will be directed, by design and approved by the Town of Princeton and Ministry of Environment, to an oil water separator that, when filled by contaminant and rainwater will flow directly into our sewage system. With larger spills, again by design and approval, the contaminant will flood onto the road and to the Town's storm drainage system. Then the contaminants will flow

directly into the Similkameen River.

Contaminants that don't go down the storm grates will flow willy-nilly, most likely across Burton as they did in 1996 and contaminate residential properties. In the past, Esso has purchased these properties and left them as condemned. I am not sure that Mr. Esselink will be as willing to purchase contaminated properties.

Mr. Esselink, owner of Cool Creek Agencies, and Esso, seem hell bent on establishing this commercial cardlock on Burton Avenue.

The Town of Princeton has claimed, by their own neglect and fault, to be unable to stop the cardlock from being in the Burton location due to their failure to address the re-zoning proposed in the Official Community Plan.

The Industrial Park, as was suggested to Mr. Esselink by the Town very early in this debacle, is an appropriate location... maybe the Town can make him a deal on

lot pricing!

If Mr. Esselink and Esso continue to insist that the cardlock must be on Burton, I have a few suggestions.

First, before issuing a business licence for this location, ensure that all bylaws have been met. Second, as the cardlock system is safe and foolproof, have Mr. Esselink and Cool Creek Agencies provide a fully insured bond, in trust, to the Town of Princeton in the amount of \$5,000,000 to help pay for the eventual rehabilitation costs when the site is closed, to pay for any spills, and to provide funding to purchase any properties damaged by these spills.

This should not be of any difficulty as the cardlock system is safe. But again, there are no absolutes.

## Will More Free Trade Help Us?

Canada has been negotiating a free trade deal with the European Union. The parties met last week to discuss the Canada-EU Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA). The Council of Canadians believes this is a bad deal for Canada for several reasons.

I have a low opinion of free trade deals. The North American free trade deals have not, in my view, improved trade for Canada. The exchange of free trade goods is not conducted in the manner of being free trade.

The agreement is dominated by what the Americans want. For example, the Americans would like us to give up our medical care system and would like more access to our water resources, but when it comes to what we want, please note: our forest industries are still paying through the nose on the softwood lumber tariff. How free is that?

According to information I have received, what's on the table for the latest free trade agreement is in much the same spirit as the deal with the Americans. Europe has the world's largest water service corporations.

These corporations can expand only if public water service utilities are expanded. These corporations, under the proposed agreement, would give multinational water corporations unprecedented

access to our drinking water services. They might even lay claim to the water itself.

Some of the wording in the agreement would allow major corporations to ignore or challenge our present environmental legislation. Certainly, the agreement would make enforcement of existing regulations more difficult, and enacting of further legislation would be almost impossible.

CETA wants to have access to all of our public services including health care. This sounds very much like what happened when we started negotiating trade with the USA. The average Canadian wants nobody touching our health care system. We want no privatization.

The free trade agreement proposed by the European Union would allow European corporations unrestricted access to purchasing contracts of our governments.

In other words, we might see our jobs go to European companies who compete for government contracts.

Free trade has done nothing to solve the problems of global poverty. In fact, in many instances, free trade agreements may have contributed to creating more poverty and deeper economic crises.

CETA has other possible impacts, such as giving foreign companies the power to force farmers to buy gene patented

seeds at high prices, eliminating the right of farmers to save, reuse and sell seed. At this time, on the dairy front, the EU is seeking market access for milk byproducts used as dairy replacements, while we Canadians do a great deal to ensure our dairy products are free of these substances.

What can you do to influence the outcome of these new free trade negotiations?

First, contact your Member of Parliament, Alex Atamanenko, and tell him we must protect legislation meant to protect our public services, water, health care, and agriculture.

Then contact Steven Harper's office and voice your opposition to any deal that threatens the items listed above. Send a brief note to these men in government. You don't even have to pay postage to send a letter to your Member of Parliament.

I believe most of these free trade agreements begin through lobbying of corporations eager to pursue their own interests, and in every nation in the world today, it seems corporations have powerful influence on politicians. This seems to me a case of the tail wagging the dog.

The day may come when we have to cut the tail off the dog, as happened recently when Hungary nationalized a company that spilled millions of gallons of toxic sludge. I believe we need to show that the dog is in control, not the tail.



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
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

# Invasive Plant Alert

**Bird Seed Blues**

It is welcome news to learn that some communities in our region are cracking down on practices that may entice bears into residential neighborhoods. Certainly garbage placed out the night before pick up is an attractant to many bears. However, another common attractant that causes bears to venture onto private land is the presence of bird feeders which brings me to the topic of this week's article.

As temperatures drop, many landowners are filling bird feeders to provide a helping hand to those species that reside in our region for the duration of the winter. At this time of year, many bird species gather into large flocks, roving widely in search of food. Most of these will congregate readily around bird feeding stations. What does this have to do with invasive plants?

Well as it turns out, some of the mixed birdseed packages may be harbouring seeds of invasive plants. Mixed seed is commonly marketed as "wild bird seed", "wild bird mix", "finch mix" and so on. There

are no regulations about any of these mixes. Seed houses and retailers mix their own and they may not declare the contents on the package. Buying the components separately and mixing them yourself is the only way of being absolutely sure of what you are scooping into your feeders.

Throughout the year, I visit many private properties and help to identify invasive plants and provide management advice. While I cannot always be certain of the original source of invasive plants, some of the more unusual species are commonly discovered either under a bird feeder or in the vicinity of garden plants commonly used by seed feeding birds. This has led me to believe that the source of some invasive plants is indeed bird seed, and the birds then become vectors and assist the spread of these invaders. This conclusion is supported by two studies from the U.S.

In a 2004 survey conducted in Oregon, seeds of more than 50 invasive plant species were identified in 10 wild bird feed brands purchased in that state. All of the brands were found to contain invasive plants, with 10 of the plant species on the state's noxious weed list.

These included: buffalobur, bull thistle, Canada thistle, common ragweed, cuscuta species, field bindweed, jointed goatgrass, kochia, puncture vine and velvet leaf.

No doubt many of these species sound familiar, as the majority of these invaders are problematic in the Okanagan and Similkameen valleys and some have been mentioned in previous articles. When the Oregon researchers tested whether the invasive plant seeds would grow once they fell from a feeder, they found that about 30 plant species beyond the intended ingredients grew within 28 days.

Four of those were state noxious weeds. More recently, a press release issued in 2006 by the Idaho Department of Agriculture indicated that this agency had ordered two dozen companies in the U.S. to stop the sale of bird and other animal feeds that contain noxious weed seeds. Over a period of several months, the department sampled 92 feeds from 34 manufacturers. Lab tests concluded that 54 of the 92 feed samples contained viable noxious weed seeds, including buffalobur, jointed goat grass, field bindweed, johnson grass, Canada thistle and hoary cress. Most of the products containing the noxious weed seed were domestic or wild bird feed mixes, but some were also feeds for hamsters, gerbils and squirrels.

Considering the results of these two studies, it is not surprising that "strange plants" are appearing in gardens and other places. So if you do chose to feed the birds during the cooler months, please follow these simple precautions. Carefully select the seed mix, or better yet, create the mix yourself. Consider putting the seed mix on cookie sheets and baking in the oven on the top shelf at 325 degrees for about 15 minutes. The seed still tastes good to the birds, but the heat prevents germination. In the spring, remove any unusual plants growing under or near your bird feeder, before the plant goes to seed.

Prevention is the least expensive and often the most practical method for reducing the spread of invasive plants. And for the sake of being bear smart, avoid using any type of birdfeeder during bear season and wait until winter to put out your feeders.

## Council hears second cardlock appeal

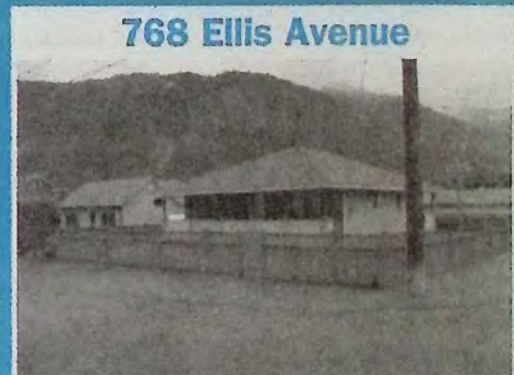
