## CMMC shows off B-I-G shovel

The excitement of the gold rush is back in BC and getting kicked off with a very big, very 21st century boost! SMS Equipment and Komatsu release the power of their biggest, most powerful excavating machine ever put to work in North America the Komatsu PC8000 is now ready to roll into action at Princeton's Copper Mountain Mine.

The 700-plus-tonne, Komatsu PC8000 excavator assembled on-site at the Copper Mountain Mine is only the 75th machine of its size and power ever built by Komatsu, and the first electric version to be installed at any location in North America.

Komatsu technicians from around the world, along with SMS Equipment's most skilled staff, have been on the job for weeks to take delivery of more than 1.6 million pounds of Komatsu heavy

duty excavating machine components and to ensure the assembly project proceeds on schedule.

Developed specifically for the biggest mining operations in the world and built in Dusseldorf Germany, the Komatsu PC8000-6 electric powered hydraulic shovel is designed to meet the highest levels of production, safety and environmental responsibility.

These machines are simply number one in the world, built to perform at 4,020 horsepower, with a bucket capacity of 42 cubic metres. The PC8000's output is many times greater than the smaller excavators previously used in mining operations, meaning that the job moves faster and the overall capacity of the mine production is greater, improving the efficiency and profitability of the mining operation.

## Latest play mimics radio

Princeton Performing Arts presented their latest production on November 5 and 6 to a small audience. The players performed Under Milk Wood, a play written by Dylan Thomas for radio. All of the cast appeared on stage at once, alternating parts as the script demanded.

The play reflects the life of villagers in a tiny seaport in Wales. The scenery of the play is left to the imagination of listeners as Jon Bartlett opens with a description of the village at night. The dreams of the villagers are the initial introduction to the characters. As day dawns, the characters and the village come to life.

We learn about the village drunk, the nosy postman, the blind sailor, the baker with two wives, the sexually frustrated teenager, the repressed desires of the school teacher, and the unrepressed desires of the village "woman of loose morals". This last character has a

singing role, played by Rika Ruebsaat.

Len Fowler assisted in narration. Dick Bird was the blind captain, Tim Hall the butcher, Peter Rykonen the baker and local drunk, David Reid the poet preacher, Debbie Cappos was Mrs. Willy Nilly, and Sylvia Fowler played the part of Mrs. Cherry Owen. Elaine Rutherford and Della Osborne were the wives of the baker, Rianfa Riel was Mrs. Pugh, Hillary Riel was Miss Price, Delth Hall Mrs. Ogmore-Pritchard who communed with the ghosts of her departed but well-trained husbands. Dawn Gardner played the part of Mary Ann Sailors, Taylor Gibb was Gossamer Beynon and Gillian Hodgson was Bessie Bighead. Along with all of these roles, each performer spoke the lines of several other village characters as needed.

The members of Princeton Performing Arts did an excellent bit of vocal work bringing the Welsh village and its characters to life. While radio performers can read a

script in front of them, they still have to know their lines and the emphasis and timing. The actors who read Under Milk Wood met the challenge very well.

For those who remember radio, and who enjoy Dylan Thomas, Under Milk Wood was two hours of good entertainment. However, this radio play would not be everyone's memorable occasion. The rich poetic language of Dylan Thomas, while a treat to some, would make many others want to turn the dial to something a little less demanding of the listener.

## Committee looks for hospital staff

Councillor Marilyn Harkness reported to Town Council on November 1 that the Health Recruitment Committee is still at work.

They have received more money for marketing, which will assist in their efforts to recruit one more physician for Princeton.

Some changes are needed at the hospital, and fund raising will be

necessary. Currently, part-time staff are sleeping in the doctor's room, and creating sleeping quarters in the basement is under consideration. More examination rooms and a better waiting room set-up is

needed. This will require funding not available from government.

On-call staffing is covered up to New Year's Day, and there is still time to ensure staffing for that period.

## Council discusses town website

At the November 1 Town Council meeting, Council was asked whether something could be done

to improve the Town website. Links are needed on the website to provide people with the opportunity to go to other local websites. The Town website needs updating, Council was told.

Town Council said the problem is the need for somebody on staff to maintain the website. Contracting somebody to do it has been costly and not entirely satisfactory. Town Administrator Patrick Robins stated there is a program to go into place to assist the Town in expanding what the Town website covers. This is from a purely municipal business standpoint.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness said an updated website with links would assist in recruiting hospital and other health care staff.

Town Council will look into it, but is not making any promises.

# CMMC assists in boost of copper exports to Japan

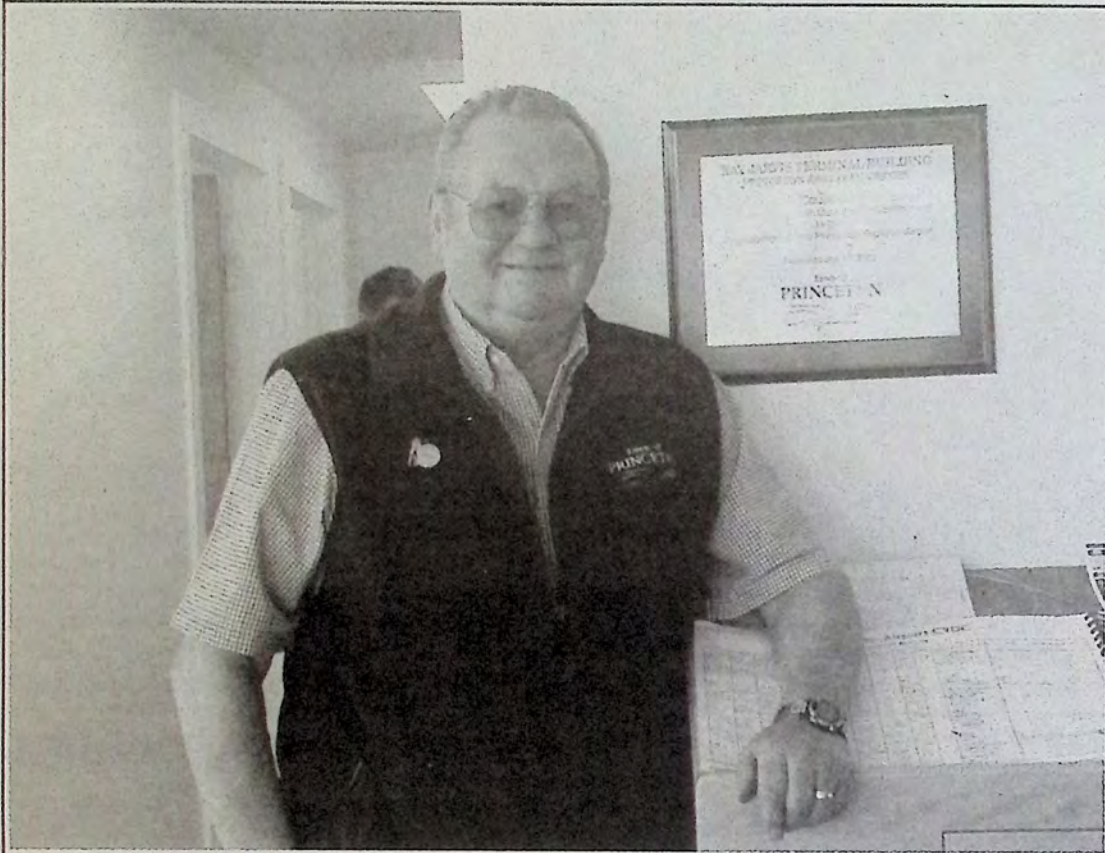
Copper concentrate from the Copper Mountain Mine near Princeton will soon be shipping to Mitsubishi Materials Corporation of Japan through the Port of Vancouver, Shirley Bond, Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure

announced November 4th in Tokyo. "This really shows how the Pacific Gateway is the best transportation route for Asian businesses," said Bond. "Mitsubishi Materials Corporation invests in the B.C. Copper

Mountain Mine to get the copper concentrate they need, knowing that the best way to ship it is through the Port of Vancouver." The Copper Mountain Project near Princeton is 75 per cent owned by the B.C. Copper Mountain Mining

Corporation and 25 per cent by a wholly owned B.C. subsidiary of Mitsubishi Materials Corporation of Japan. Mitsubishi Materials Corporation is one of the world's largest diversified materials companies and has activities in metal smelting and refining, cement, advanced materials, tools, electronic materials and components. "British Columbia's mining industry is on the rise not only because of our competitive investment climate, but because suppliers also know they have efficient access to Asian markets," said Minister of State for Mining Randy Hawes. "Copper Mountain is a great example of this, with hundreds of jobs and economic growth for Princeton the net result." "Our partnership with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation gives us a direct line into the Japanese market," said Copper Mountain Mining Corporation director Jim O'Rourke. "We move our products to Japan

#### Community Climate Action Plan

**RDOS releases untidy premises guidelines**

The RDOS has established rules and regulations to deal with untidy and unsightly premises within Electoral Area C (Oliver Rural), Area D (Kaleden/Okanagan Falls), Area E (Naramata), Area F (Okanagan Lake West/West Bench) and Area G (Keremeos rural/Hedley).

When a complaint is received alleging that a property is untidy or unsightly, a Bylaw Enforcement Officer will attend the property to determine if the situation warrants further action. If so, a letter is sent to the owner of the property requesting that the discarded material be removed within a set timeline.

If the timeline is not met, the issue

is forwarded to the Board for consideration at its next meeting. At that time the Board will consider authorizing that the property be cleaned up.

If compliance is not forthcoming, the Regional District may, by its employees or other persons, enter the property and effect the removal of the material at the expense of the person who failed to comply. The cost of cleanup may be recovered by being added to taxes if unpaid.

*No owner or occupier of property will cause or permit:*

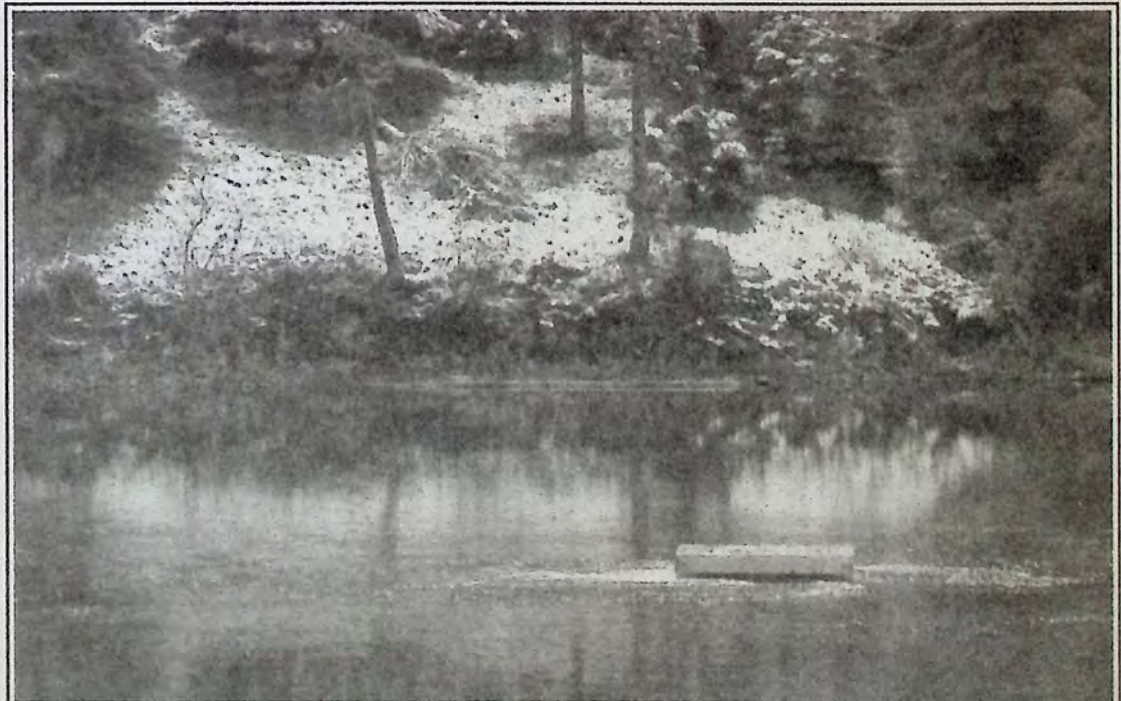
- Refuse, garbage, or other noxious, offensive, or unwholesome material to collect or accumulate
- Water to collect or accumulate on

the property or any buildings or structures

- Noxious weeds to grow or accumulate on the property
- Trees, brush, and other growths on the property to create a safety hazard
- Graffiti to be placed on any buildings or structures
- Any other unsightly condition to exist on the property, buildings or structures

Signed complaint forms are accepted when the complainant is directly impacted, and within 30 metres of the subject property.

The complainant must be willing to appear as a witness in the event the matter proceeds to enforcement in the courts. - submitted

## Your Doctor Recommends

**Q:** My family and I are avid skiers and our question is - What type of tint should we use for ski goggles or sunglasses?

**A:** The type of tint for ski goggles will vary on the time of day and the weather conditions. On dull weather days, skiers would benefit from brown or rose coloured tints as these are high contrast tints that make variations in terrain stand out more. For later in the day and overcast conditions, an orange tint will do better. For nighttime skiing, a yellow tint will lighten everything up. For high sun conditions a grey tint works best as it is a relief tint that makes things dimmer. Polarization and a back side anti-reflection coating (on sunglasses) is recommended for all these type of conditions.

## Common diabetes myths dispelled

(NC)—Diabetes is a complex and often misunderstood disease.

Diabetes educator, Stacey Horodezny, believes Diabetes Awareness Month in November is the perfect time to clarify common myths about the disease.

"As the rate of diabetes continues to rise in Canada, this is an important time for us to not only raise

awareness, but also to educate people about this disease that affects millions of Canadians across the country," says Ms. Horodezny.

**Myth # 1: There is a cure for diabetes.**

**Fact # 1:** There is no cure for diabetes, but it can be managed. The key is to keep your blood sugar under control through proper meal

planning, exercise and medication, if needed. A Diabetes Education Centre can help you learn more about diabetes and how to get in control.

**Myth # 2: Your diabetes will go away once your blood sugar is under control.**

**Fact # 2:** Unfortunately, diabetes is a chronic illness meaning that it will be with you for the rest of your life. Keeping your blood sugar in target range (stable) simply means that your diabetes is under control, which will help reduce your risk of further complications, like blindness, kidney and heart disease. Having control of your diabetes can allow you to live a full and rewarding life.

**Myth # 3: Diabetes is impossible to manage.**

**Fact # 3:** Diabetes is a complex disease that can be difficult, but not impossible, to manage.

Education programs, like Diabetes Conversations, can help Canadians with diabetes take control of their disease. Diabetes Conversations uses a tool called Conversation Maps – large (three-feet by five-feet), colourful, interactive, table-top illustrations – to help people with diabetes learn how to manage their condition so they can make better decisions about how to live with diabetes.

For example, if you are overweight and have arthritis, one of the most important things you can do to help yourself is to look at a change in diet to help you achieve and maintain a healthy weight. For others, healthy eating may give you the energy to complete your daily activities.

The most important link between your diet and arthritis is your weight. Being overweight puts an extra burden on your weight-bearing joints (back, hips, knees, ankles and feet) when they are already damaged or under strain. The Arthritis Society offers the following tips for cutting down on excess calories:

**Reduce fat intake.** A healthy diet should include a small amount of unsaturated fats and limit the amount of saturated and trans fat. Fill up on vegetables, fruits and whole grain bread and cereals that are naturally lower in fats. Eat fish and skinless poultry more often. Bake, broil and grill instead of frying foods. Use oils and soft-tub margarines sparingly.

**Reduce sugar intake.** Sugar contains 'empty' calories and has no other food value so it can be cut back without losing any nutrients. There is little nutritional difference between white table sugar and brown sugar, honey, syrup, cane sugar, raw sugar or any other type of sugar – so beware. Limit or avoid adding sugar to drinks and cereals.

Although artificial sweeteners contain few calories, it is better to get used to food being less sweet.

**Eat more vegetables and fruit.**

Vegetables and fruit should make up the largest component of your diet. Besides being a great source of energy for your body, vegetables and fruit are a great way to boost your fibre intake, which will help you with weight management. Eat at least one dark green (broccoli, romaine lettuce, and spinach) and one orange (carrots, sweet potatoes, and winter squash) vegetable each day. Choose vegetables and fruits prepared with little or no added fat, sugar or salt.

## Living Past 100

### No, You Can't Cut The Mustard!

People concerned about healthy living often want to cut out some of our favourite condiments. This can be a big mistake if you decide to cut out mustard. That yellow paste we put on hot dogs, hamburgers and other foods is actually very good for you. Ordinary yellow mustard has anti-cancer properties.

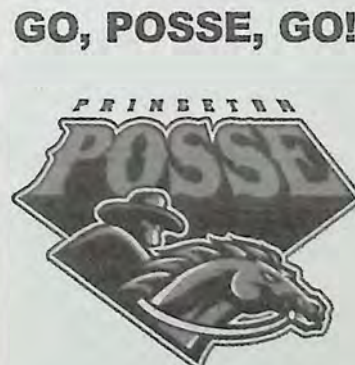
In laboratory research, Canadian scientists found that yellow mustard is great for preventing colon cancer. In fact, they found that even in bowels already exhibiting cancer lesions, mustard stopped the lesions from growing and reduced the number of lesions. Yellow mustard, which contains a certain gum and oil, helps the colon defend against tumours. The tests were done on laboratory mice, but these mice are genetically close to human DNA and tests done on them show great promise for humans.

The best mustard is home-made, because it does not contain any preservatives or salt. That is not to say there is no value in the prepared mustard you buy in a supermarket. However, for the health-conscious consumer, buying the raw mustard seed is the best option. Most good health food stores carry mustard seed.

There are white, brown and black mustard seeds. The kind you want to buy are the white seeds, because they are the source of yellow mustard. If you are buying mustard, avoid Dijon mustard, as it comes from brown mustard seeds.

To make your own mustard, soak the seeds overnight in water, wine or vinegar (depending on the taste you want). When the seeds have been softened, grind them into a paste. You can mix in other herbs and spices, such as garlic, pepper, or turmeric. You will want to experiment with small amounts until you discover the mustard combination that most pleases your taste buds.

If you are not accustomed to using mustard, try it on red meats, ham, in meat loaf, in potato salad (or on potatoes), in barbecue sauce, or add a tiny bit to a variety of soups. Make mustard part of the way you spice up your life.

## Rodeo Club marks end of era

The main headline across the top of the November 14, 2006 Similkameen News Leader stated, "Ashes could lead to charges."

It was just the week before when RCMP made their recommendations that "dozens of charges be laid against Fred Netherton who is alleged to have given grieving families the wrong ashes."

RCMP Sgt. Terry McLachlan told the News Leader at the time that the former Princeton funeral director could face 58 criminal charges plus 20 additional charges under provincial crematorium law.

In other news from four years ago, Princeton Rodeo Club marked the end of an era when long-time President Stan Thompson stepped down at the November 3, 2006 AGM of the club.

"I'm not running for President again," he stated.

Mike Theal was elected to replace Thompson in the elections held later that evening.

Princeton Lions Club took over the Karl Lang Park Project with an official notice during the November 6, 2006 Town Council meeting.

Lions Club Zone Chair Penny Lott told council the Lions Club planned to start work on the park project the following April with a dedication ceremony planned for September 11, 2008. The date was the anniversary of Lang's first visit to Town Council requesting a

beautification project for the park, located at the West entrance to Princeton at Highway 3 and Mayne Avenue.

Lang died suddenly on December 17, 2002 only months after Town Council approved his presentation.

And Town Council criticized FortisBC for announcing their

intention to close the Princeton office, formerly the Princeton Light & Power office. FortisBC planned to close the office on December 31, 2006.

"Their intent should be to create jobs and now we're losing jobs," Councillor Pam Jones stated in reference to the announcement.

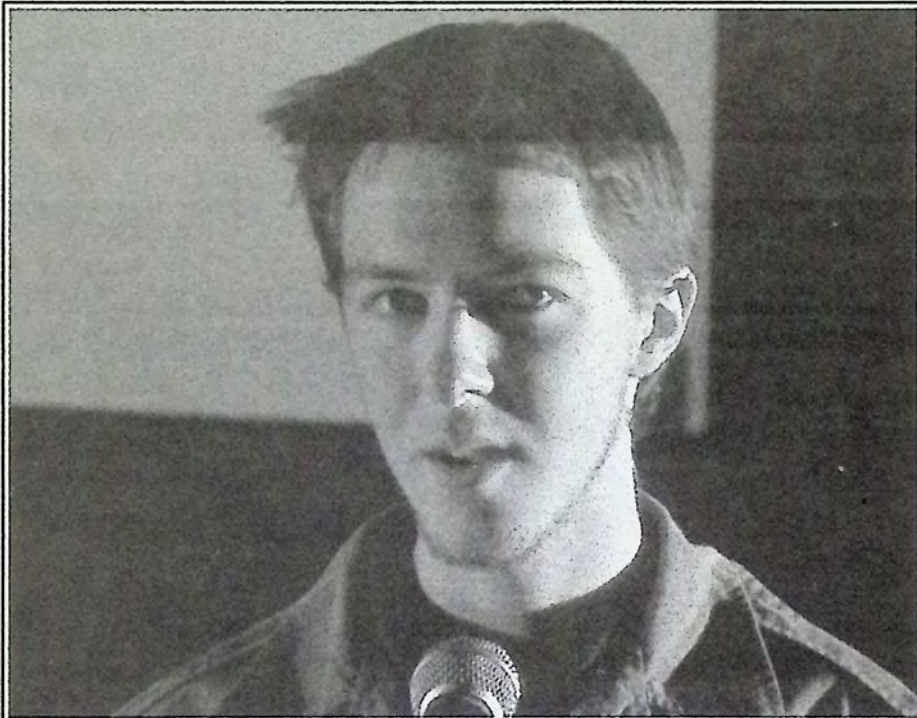

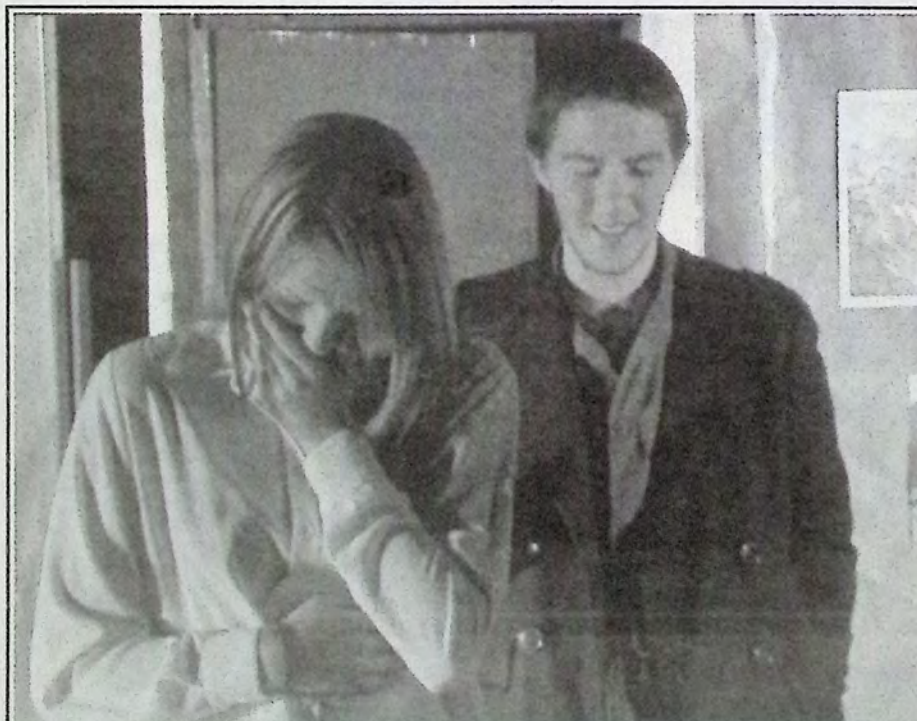

## Coyotes nip Princeton

November 7th saw Princeton Posse host Osoyoos Coyotes for an afternoon match in Princeton Arena.

It was the fourth game in five days for the Posse who had just come back from the North Okanagan with a 6-4 victory against Armstrong the previous night.

## Revelstoke claws Princeton

**Pear Quinoa Breakfast Bowl**

(NC)—Forget traditional oatmeal. Quinoa is a gluten-free, protein-rich ancient grain that is easy to prepare. Enhanced with tender, diced California pears and cinnamon, this wholesome breakfast dish will become a family favourite.

- 1 cup Dry quinoa (250 mL)
- 1 cup Each apple juice and water (250 mL)
- 2 tbsp Maple syrup (30 mL)
- 2 tsp Ground cinnamon (10 mL)
- 1/4 tsp Salt (1 mL)
- 2 Ripe California Bartlett pears, finely chopped
- Low fat vanilla or plain yogurt
- Toasted, sliced natural almonds

### Landfill operators send clarification

To The Editor:

Re: *Recycling in Princeton*

It appears there are some misconceptions about what is recycled.

First, the people of this town need to be commended for embracing the recycling program and how people work at trying to recycle. Also, our staff for the work they put into it.

Here are the items that presently are recycled and shipped for further processing.

*Plastics classification: all have a triangle marking with a number on it.*

- No. 2 include milk jugs, colored No. 2 plastic include such things as laundry soap container, some margarine containers, various lids, and container from food or soap products. All other numbers have no value.

- Oil pails and the oil plastic bottles, as well as the oil are recycled.

- No. 1 plastic: Water bottles, juice bottles, liquor bottles, most soap bottles are No. 1. This includes Canadian and products from the USA.

- No. 1 wide mouth containers like

peanut butter, some sauces, ketchup. If these plastic bottles and containers are not rinsed and have left in substances they cannot be recycled and the processing plant is unable to take them. They are then put into the landfill.

- No. 7 blue colored water jugs. We are currently trying to find places to process other plastics without increasing cost to the taxpayers.

*Also recycled:*

- All paper products include newsprint, books, etc. Metal rings in books need be removed, juice boxes, wine boxes.

- All cardboard products - Styrofoam not taken.

- House paint, paint cans (not commercial vehicle paint).

- Paint in spray cans of all types of paint accepted.

- All types and sizes of batteries are recycled.

- Tin and aluminum.

- Aluminum gets separated from the tin and this includes tin foil, can (pop, beer and most cat food cans are aluminum).

*Glass* - all types of glass including china, earth ware, auto glass, jars

(refundables get separated). These products are turned into gravel and used in the landfill. The landfill requires one foot of cover for each layer of cell on top of the waste products. The cover must be material that will not decompose or burn. The perfect solution is glass turned into gravel on a lower layer, with the upper layer gravel from the area.

At this time the only plant that processes glass is past Vernon and they accept only certain types of glass. Shipping cost is incredible and is only an extra cost to tax payers.

We estimate approximately 20-25% of plastic goes into the landfill at this time. Wood is chipped and at present stock piled. There is no market that will take the chips.

To all the people who recycle, Thank you, you have saved the landfill's lifespan as well as the environment.

## How To Be A Great Lover (By The Book)

Sex begins in the brain. If you do not believe that, then you really need to read *The Female Brain*. Even if you believe it, you still need to read *The Female Brain*. There is so much information about how sex is linked to brain function, and that information is not limited to women's brains. Snakes are mainly corpouscular (active at dawn and dusk) they grow very slowly and do not reproduce until they are four years old, they have different ways of catching their prey, some constrict their prey, some grab and swallow and others like the rattle snake poison their prey with their fangs which

are concealed in the roof of their mouths, they can smell with their tongues and have special heat sensors on their heads to help them when they are hunting.

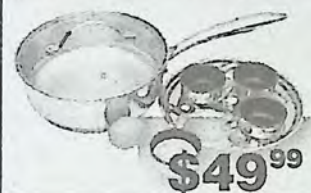

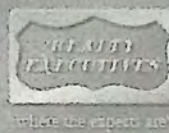
