PXA stalls election

No election was called at the annual general meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), the group that manages the fairgrounds facility. The meeting was held on November 16 at the fairgrounds office with Vice-President Terry Inglis chairing. He explained there could be no election until the PXA constitution had been amended.

The problem is due to a stipulation that anyone running for the positions of President, Vice-President, Secretary or Treasurer must have been a paid-up member for one year and must have attended seven meetings. There were just three or four who qualified, and none would run for office.

An extraordinary meeting must be called to amend the constitution, and a motion was made as to what the amendment should say. The meeting will be held November 30

at the fairgrounds office. The formal wording of the amendment will be voted on at that meeting, and an election will take place if people agree to run.

Compounding the problem of finding people to run for office is the reluctance of anyone to run for office under existing conditions at the fairgrounds: lack of volunteers to do the heavy workload. Volunteers no longer have the time, and for some, the physical energy or skills needed to do the work. There is not enough money to hire people to do the work.

Vice-President Inglis outlined a plan to meet with Town Council to propose greater involvement by the Town and Area H. At that meeting, representatives from the PXA, Town Council and Area H Director Brad Hope will discuss options for future management.

Museum awaits new plans

Due to a shortfall in funding, Princeton museum renovations may take more time than anticipated. At the November 17 Museum Society meeting, members learned there is a \$100,000 shortage of funds for the renovations. The original plan called for \$250,000 from the Town, which owns the building. Of this, \$100,000 was loaned to complete the library. The money was to have been returned to the museum renovation project from the Forest Corporation, but the Forest Corporation has made no money during the recession. The Museum Society is looking for other sources of money, but nothing looks promising at this time.

The existing \$150,000 will be used to upgrade the essentials, such as plumbing, electrical, heating and other needed upgrades. Tenders will be issued, and as much of the work that can be done within the present budget will be done as soon

as possible.

The smaller items from the museum have been packed and moved, but larger items will remain in place. President Kathy Clement thanked the Posse players for their assistance in moving the packed items, saying the hockey players worked hard and their help was deeply appreciated.

Brenda Gould has removed and stored the First Nations items and will update information about them.

During the move, Terry Malanchuk discovered two boxes of photographic plates dating back to the late 1800s. These images are being researched to learn their historical significance.

The Museum Society has the Susan Allison book for sale along with CDs and other items. They will be at the Christmas Craft Fair at Princeton Secondary on December 5. Other fundraising includes a big yard sale next spring. More fundraising ideas for the future are needed, and members

were asked to think of ways the Museum Society can raise money. These ideas will be presented at future meetings.

Coalmont will be 100 years old in 2011. The Museum Society has not been advised of any celebrations planned in that community.

Changes to the constitution and accessions policy will be voted on at the January meeting, which will be held at the library conference room at 7:00 PM on January 19. This is a change in venue for the convenience of members.

Literacy looks for funding

Shauna Hassell attended the November 15 Town Council meeting to update Council on the Leaders for Literacy program. She described computer classes, reading intervention programs, and three six-week programs that had a high level of success. A new program will begin in January.

The Family Reading Circle for kindergarten to Grade 3 has just

started its second year. These programs have been funded by a Legacy Now grant and a grant from the Ministry of Education. Hassell told Town Council children in the Kindergarten to Grade 3 level are learning to read, but after Grade 3, they are reading to learn. This is why it is so important to teach children to read before Grade 4.

Hassell asked Council if the Town would be able to fund programs in the future. Council could make no promises except to consider it in budget discussions. Mayor Randy McLean praised the literacy programs, saying how good it is to have community programs based on people helping people.

Both Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Jason Earle are growing mustaches for Movember. They were challenged by young men of

Goldcliff closes financing

Judge orders jail for Keremeos man

Robert G. Lucy, a Keremeos resident, entered a guilty plea on August 8 to a charge of impaired driving causing bodily harm. He appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on November 18 for sentencing.

On June 20, 2009, Lucy had been behind the wheel two kilometres east of Hedley when he veered off the highway to the shoulder and drove on the shoulder about 50 metres then smashed into a couple who had pulled their double bicycle off the highway to take a break. The Calgary couple had been cycling to California, fulfilling a dream they had had.

Lucy's vehicle drove over the bicycle then hit the woman, Lydia Ducharme. She was seriously injured, having gone over the hood and breaking the windshield on Lucy's vehicle. She suffered a broken leg and two fractured vertebrae. Her husband suffered minor injuries.

Police attending the scene of the accident smelled liquor on Lucy's breath, and noted signs of intoxication. Breath analysis gave readings of .160 and .150 blood alcohol.

Lucy's defense counsel told the court Lucy had been returning from a funeral home where he had picked up his wife's remains. Lucy had had a "tough time of it since his wife died" his attorney stated, adding that Lucy's employers spoke well of him.

The 59 year old man had a driving history reflecting alcohol consumption prior to driving. Although a

prior driving while impaired conviction was very old, there was a record of 24 hour suspensions.

Man pays for window

Randy J. Myers stood trial in Provincial Court in Princeton on November 18 on a charge of mischief under \$5,000. Myers was accused of breaking the window of a van owned by Mark Howarth.

Howarth and his son, Dan, testified to substantially the same events which occurred on May 28, 2009. Howarth had purchased an old Chevette which was on a vacant lot on Old River Road. They had parked the van on a road above the lot and were removing parts from the Chevette when Myers suddenly appeared, screaming obscenities at them. Dan Howarth stated he had heard the sound of glass being smashing about a minute before Myers walked down from the road. He accused the Howarths of stealing, saying he had been ripped off before. Both Howarths said Myers appeared to have been drinking, and he smelled of liquor.

The Howarths explained to Myers the Chevette had been purchased, naming the former owner. This seemed to calm Myers and he left. Mark Howarth then asked his son to go to the van and get a box in which the Chevette parts could be carried. When Dan Howarth went to the van, he discovered a window broken.

spend one year in jail followed by one year on probation. Lucy's right to drive is prohibited for three years.

Father and son went to Myers residence, where they found him with friends and drinking a beer. The Howarths said Myers had admitted to smashing the window and agreed to pay the \$300 deductible for the repairs. Mark Howarth had the window replaced, but Myers never did pay. As the incident had been reported to police, police pursued the matter.

Myers testified that he had been advised there were men taking something from Myers vehicles he had stored on that lot. Myers had stored a vehicle there and had had parts stolen from it, so he took his bicycle and went to find out what was going on. Myers said he was angry until they explained to him that the vehicle was theirs. He told the court he had not smashed the window.

Judge G. Sinclair said he believed Myers broke the window and found him guilty. He ordered Myers to pay Howarth \$300. The 56 year old Princeton man will be on probation until the total amount has been paid to Mark Howarth.

Twenty members of the Similkameen Trails Society met at the Cawston Community Hall last Thursday, November 18th.

The Annual General Meeting elected by acclamation 2010-2011 Directors Peter Van Kleef, Louise Johnson, Duncan Baynes, Tony Dawson, Dave Cursons, Robert Quadvlieg and Brian Dunn.

Joe Littlefield is leaving the trails board after rendering yeoman's service to the society since it's founding. His withdrawal was received with regrets.

Trails Society members were unhappy with lack of progress in Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen efforts to obtain a trails permit for the abandoned

Burlington Northern right of way from the Red Bridge down to Coulthard Road in Cawston.

The abandoned rail bed is managed by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure Finance (highways).

Tony Dawson and Walter Despot reported on the Trails Stewardship Workshop held at RDOS offices in Penticton on October 5th.

The membership directed the new board to review the documentation of membership in anticipation of new insurance coverage for society volunteers working on trails development.

The members also directed the board to find ways to further move on current trail plans through to Cawston without waiting for an

official permit from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure Finance.

A committee of AGM was struck to research historic and popular Lower Similkameen trail ways through cataloguing and mapping.

The Similkameen Trails Society was incorporated in 2006 and the purpose of the society is:

- To promote and enhance the trails of the Similkameen;
- To raise funds necessary for trails stewardship;
- To promote courtesy to stakeholders and respect the environment; and, to cooperate with stakeholders and all levels of Government.

The by-laws of the Society are those set out in schedule B to the Society Act.

Five Tips to Help Families

Stay Healthy During Flu Season

Guard Against Winter Germs

This is the time of year when most of us face a few months of being indoors most of the time. What is the climate like in your house?

Trustees examine FSA, Strong Start

The Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) for Grade 4 and Grade 7 showed a decline three years ago, according to discussion during the November 14, 2007 School Board meeting.

Part of the decline was explained as being the result of more students participating, which brought the average down, yet school trustees expressed a need to improve the average scores.

Trustee Gordon Swan expressed concerns about students just barely meeting expectations in writing skills. He had been told that focus had shifted to reading and number skills, which were viewed as a priority.

Two trustees expressed concern about the FSA adverse publicity from teachers and parents. They felt that opposition to the FSA might have influenced students to take the tests less seriously and therefore not do well.

Swan and Trustee Dina Slowikowski-Campbell did not agree with that point of view, saying adverse publicity had not affected provincial scores.

On the other hand, the Strong Start program was considered a huge success at the same school

board meeting.

Pam Thomas, a certified Early Childhood educator, made a presentation outlining the program, which was in its first year in the School District.

The Strong Start program is basically a flexible education program for children under school age who attend with their parents, grandparents or caregivers.

A total of 26 children were registered for the program, which included both indoor and outdoor activities.

Trustees praised the program, not-

ing that kindergarten children learn faster if they have and early start in preparedness.

The Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) elected a new executive at the November 13, 2007 annual general meeting.

John Bey was returned as President with Carol Ruoss Vice President, Stan Thompson, Terry Inglis, Ernie Willis and Eric Gregson were elected to two-year terms as Directors with Dene Thomas, Sandy Gabor and Linda Allison elected to one-year Director terms.

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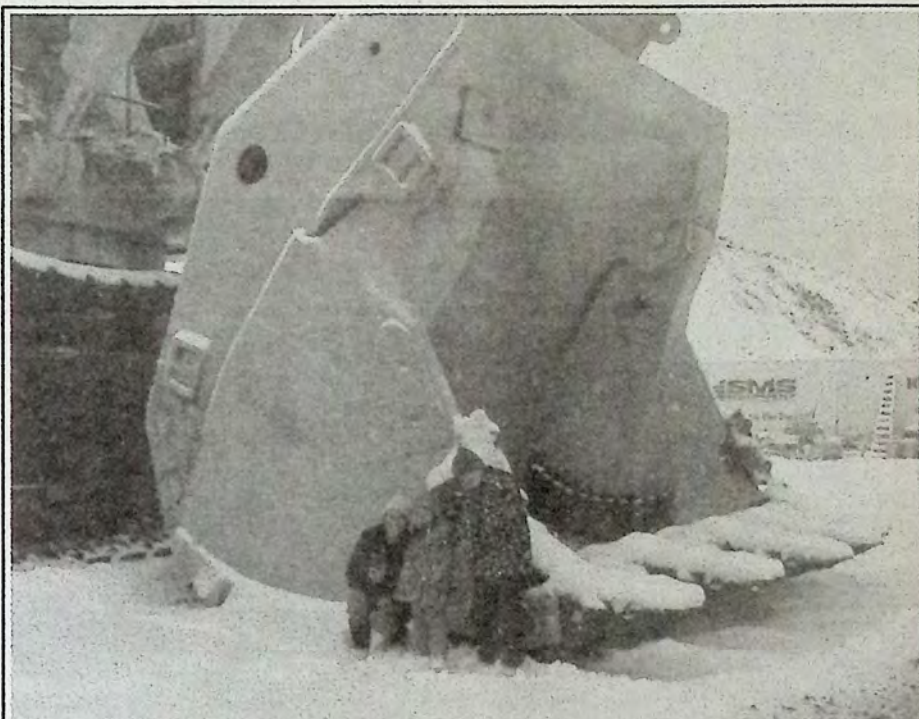

As the BC Lung Association's Christmas Seal campaign approaches its mid-way point, Princeton Volunteer Lung Association Director Marilyn Lawrence is asking British Columbians to help stamp out lung

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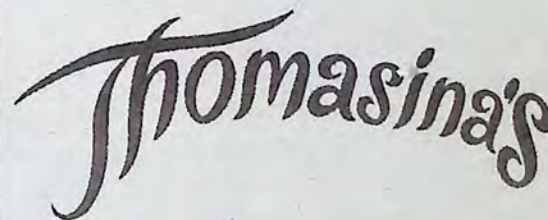
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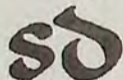

Snowflake Chocolate & Pecan Pie

(NC)— A chocolate pecan pie is the perfect dessert to end any holiday feast. A basic recipe with only a handful of ingredients, you can whip this pie together in an hour. This gooey dessert will impress your guests and warm their hearts. More holiday tips, recipes and free printable stencils are available at www.tenderflake.com.

Preparation time: 15 minutes. Serves: 8

Ingredients

- 2 (1 pkg.) Tenderflake pie shells
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) pecan halves, divided
- 1 cup (250 mL) semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 2/3 cup (150 mL) corn syrup
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) sugar
- 3 Eggs

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).
2. Remove frozen pie shells. Place one pie shell on a baking sheet to thaw so it can be used to stencil the pie. Set the other pie shell aside.
3. Coarsely chop 1/2 cup (125 mL) of the pecans and set aside.
4. Melt chocolate in double boiler or in microwave on Medium for 2 to 3 minutes.
5. Combine melted chocolate, corn syrup, sugar and eggs in a large bowl. Stir in chopped pecans.
6. Pour mixture into one of the pie shell. Arrange remaining pecan halves over top of filling.
7. Remove remaining pie shell from foil and place on a floured surface, gently flattening edge.
8. Cut festive shapes, using holly, star shaped, maple leaves, etc. cookie cutters and arrange, slightly overlapping on edge of filled crust.
9. Bake in preheated oven for 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F (180°C) and continue to bake for 20 minutes or until filling is set.
10. Allow to cool before serving with ice cream or whipped cream. Refrigerate any leftovers.

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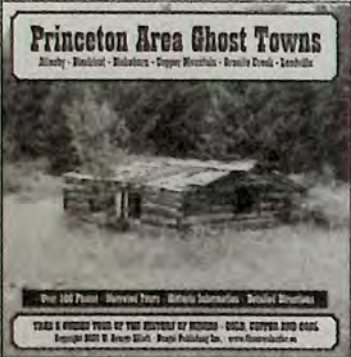

Travel Today Is Miraculous

A few weeks ago, I traveled to Kamloops. On the return trip, we traveled by the old highway back to Merritt, around Nicola Lake. I started thinking about my great-grandparents traveling that road in 1860 on their honeymoon.

These days, the old road is paved, and going to and from Kamloops is less than a day's journey. My great-grandparents traveled on horseback, leading pack horses. The trip took them a week of riding 10 or 12 hours a day, and that was if everything went well and the weather was good.

Travel was difficult in those days, yet people thought nothing of traveling hundreds, even thousands, of miles across plains, through mountains, or across oceans. My mother's grandfather came west from Kentucky to California, on horseback. He was working for somebody driving a herd of horses to the west coast. On a good day, they could travel between 25 and 30 miles. It must have taken months. There were rivers to cross, and no bridges. There were mountains to climb. There was heat, dust, thunder storms, rain, mud, wind, and who knows what other dangers along the way. Today, if you want to move a herd of horses, or even one horse, you load an appropriate trailer and drive with horsepower under the hood.

My great-grandfather took a ship from California to British Columbia in 1858. He was 20 years old and had crossed the continent the hard way. My great-grandmother lived at Ashnola, but her people had traveled to the Similkameen Valley from somewhere else a long time before she was born. Her people still traveled around the Okanagan area and up to Kamloops, and at one time, before the Sioux had guns and

took over the west, they had traveled to Montana, on horseback, to hunt buffalo.

If you have ridden horseback any distance, even with a good saddle, you know how uncomfortable a long trip can be. Not only were you tired and sore at the end of the day, so was your horse. You had to take the saddle off, rub down the horse, see that he was fed and had water, before your day was done. Nowadays, we turn off the engine, lock the door, and the work of the journey is over.

My father's family traveled from England in 1894. They were on a steamship (big modern improvement), landing in New York. That trip was not too bad, but then they traveled by rail to Wyoming, and that was not comfortable. Five or six days of sitting on hard seats on a swaying train car is not comfortable.

After a short time in Wyoming, they bought a wagon and team, and set out for southern Colorado. If you have ever sat on a wagon bench and traveled along an unpaved trail, you have some idea of how uncomfortable that would be. The trip took them several weeks as they followed the Powder River south, crossed the mountains and then followed the Purgatory River down to the flatlands. They drove across that area and again climbed mountains, heading for Raton Pass, to the mine where my grandfather found a job. It must have been terrible for my grandmother, as she had three children and one on the way.

I love to read history, and have been reading a series about cattle drives in the 1800's. Can you imagine driving thousands of head of half-wild longhorns from Texas to Montana? There were no roads, no bridges, no signposts, and a lot of pesky predators (two-legged as

well as four-legged). Imagine riding horseback behind a huge herd of cattle for a thousand miles, through every kind of weather. If you have never had to deal with range cattle, you have no idea how unruly they can be. They do not choose to go where you want them to go, you have to force them every step of the way. That is why it is called a cattle drive - you have to drive them. It is a job just short of the gates of hell, but they did it.

Others drove oxen pulling some of the most cumbersome wagons on earth. Some of those Conestoga wagons weighed two tons before they were loaded. The oxen averaged 10 miles a day. Imagine traveling a thousand miles at 10 miles a day. That makes it a minimum of 100 days, and only if everything goes well. Of course, nothing ever did.

Our Red River settlers, and the Mounties, moved freight on Red River carts drawn by oxen. These unwieldy two-wheel vehicles could travel well over any terrain except mud. They carried a very small payload. Today, if we want to move freight, we call a freight truck.

People of those days could not have imagined traveling across the continent by car, bus or train in five days, comfort all the way. They could not have foreseen a time when people climbed aboard an aircraft and traveled halfway round the planet in a day.

Now we are moving into a new phase of travel. Rich people will be able to book a flight into space, to look at our planet from far above. Of course, people have been going into space since the 1960's, but not as tourists.

Travel today is nothing short of miraculous compared with the days of horseback, wagons, and railroads.

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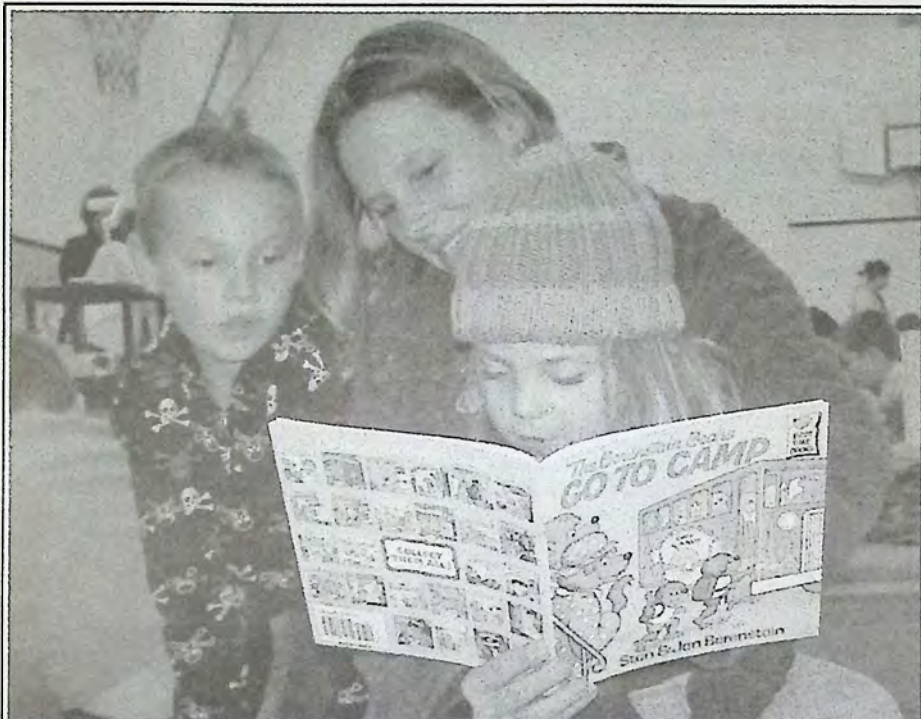
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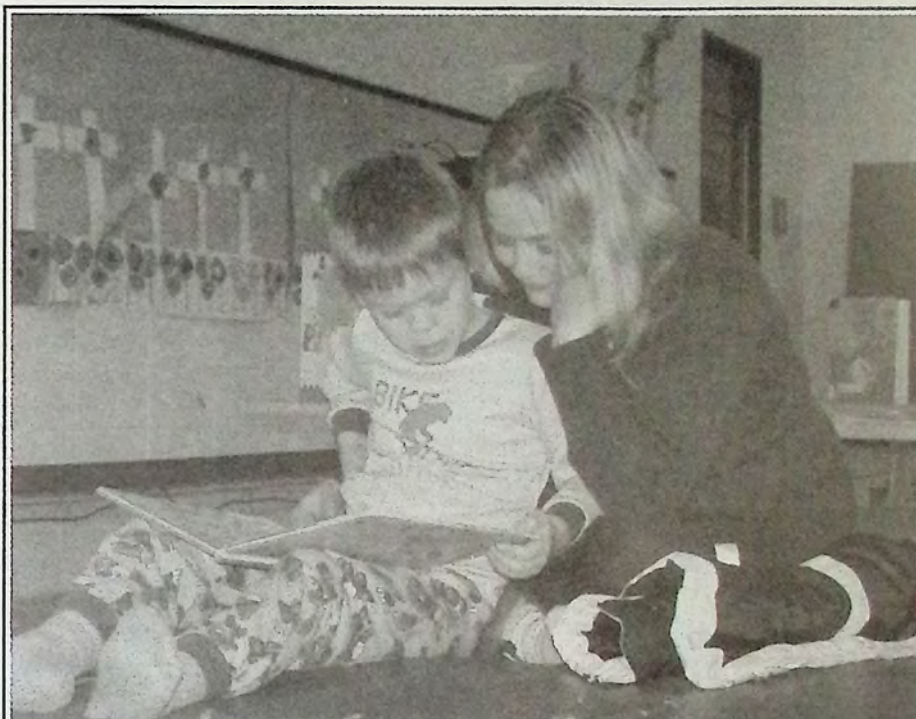

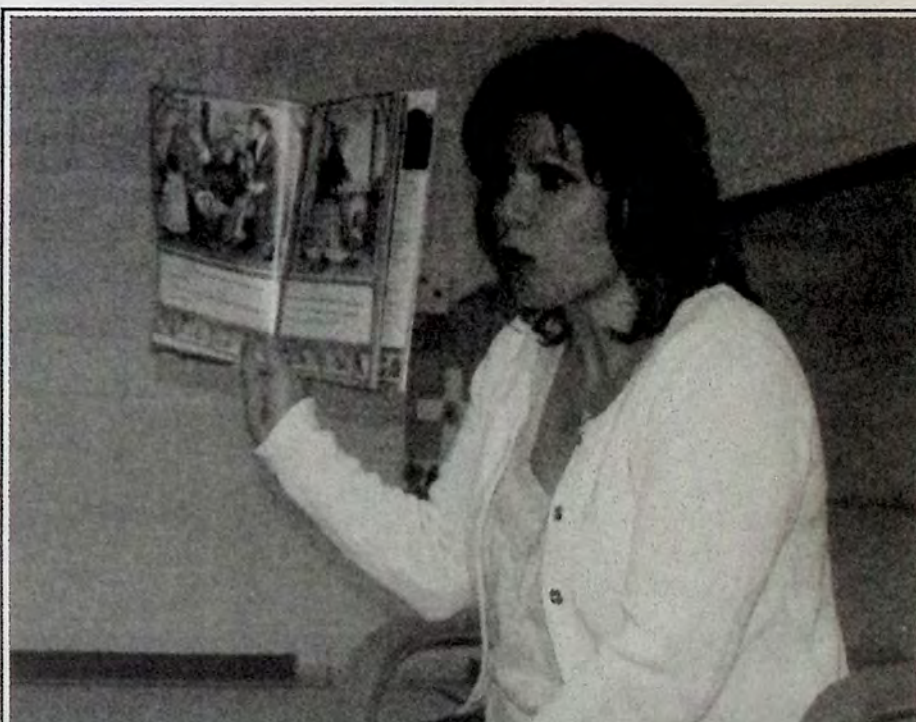
