## RCMP issue road check stats

On Saturday, November 20th RCMP South Okanagan Traffic Services were out and about in Princeton conducting road checks gearing up for the Holiday Season. Over the course of the evening three drivers were identified as having a blood alcohol content above the legal limit. Each of those drivers were issued 90-day driving prohibitions under the new Immediate

Roadside Prohibition program which includes a 30-day impoundment of the vehicle they were driving as well as other sanctions. There were a number of other violations identified including: five vehicle defects, four drivers speeding, three vehicles without insurance, two intersection violations, two 'failures to display N decal' as well as one marijuana seizure, one 'drive while disqualified' (7-day impound) and one driver without a driver's license.

There were also three warnings issued. Two of them for 'failure to produce driver's license' and one for 'failure to display N decal.'

Both the Princeton RCMP Detachment and South Okanagan Traffic Services remind you to make prior arrangements for a ride home this Holiday Season.

*This e-mail was received late last week at the Similkameen News Leader. With permission, we share it with you here.*

Hi George,  
 I was recently broken down in Princeton on Tuesday (the -23C night!) and was quite literally saved by a kind-hearted local who brought me into his home off the streets when I had absolutely nowhere to go.

It was some time around midnight and I was wandering the streets after

seeking assistance at the hotels who simply told me that they were sold out and to try heading to the opposite end of town to look for vacancies, of which there were none.

I was quite literally looking for the police station or a phone to call the police and ask them to put me in a cell for the night as I had absolutely no other options and am not familiar with Princeton.

That was when a truck pulled up and I recognized the tow truck driver who had helped me get my car from the East gate of Manning Park into town. Vic, from Abba Towing, went above and beyond what I would expect from anyone and offered me a couch to get myself out of the cold for the night.

Nearly frostbitten and dehydrated, it was impossible to express my gratitude to the kind soul who, despite having worked nearly 24 hours a day for the last however long, took time out of his personal hours to make sure that I was alright and out of the cold.

He asked for absolutely nothing in return and brought me into his home

for a warm drink and pleasant chat. It is very rare to meet the kind of person who would do such a thing for a complete stranger, especially being on a work schedule that affords him only a few hours of sleep a night.

The folks at Kal Tire were absolutely amazing the next day as well, charging me nothing to help me get my van out of the cold and running again. I was so impressed with how friendly the entire town was to me and how willing Vic was to help me in my time of need.

Again, it is impossible to express my gratitude and amazement at how wonderfully I was treated by Vic. He even offered to put my van in his own shop if the Kal Tire guys couldn't help me out!

I spoke with Terry at the liquor store (picking up a case of beer for the guys at Kal Tire) and he mentioned I should relay this story to you. You have some truly amazing people in your town and never has my faith in humanity been at such a high.

# Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen issues highlights

The following highlights are from the November 18th RDOS Board Meeting:

## Solid Waste Management Plan Public Survey - "Be In The Loop"

What do you think about your garbage, recycling, yard waste services or your local landfill? And what services would you like to see in the future?

## Solid Waste Management Plan Review

The RDOS is updating its Solid Waste Management Plan to help guide decisions about new programs for managing waste for the next 20 years, as required by the Province. The RDOS will need your input as

they investigate new and better programs to help residents and businesses reduce, reuse and recycle, extending the lifespan of local landfills and making the best use of tax dollars.

Stay tuned - they'll be sending out surveys later this fall and holding open houses next year to get your input on how the RDOS can better manage waste.

## Development Services

### Building Violation

2270 Highway 5, Electoral Area 'H'  
Certain works have been undertaken on the land contrary to the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen Building Bylaw No. 2333, 2005: Construction without a permit. Notice on Title be filed against the title of land. Injunctive action be taken to have owner bring the property into compliance.

### Agricultural Land Commission Referral

131 & 135 Black Mine Road— Electoral Area 'H'

To remove the subject property from the Agricultural Land Reserve in order to facilitate subdivision of land. Approved.

### BYLAW: Regional Solid Waste Management Plan Service Establishment Amendment

The Regional District is in the process of amending and updating the Regional District Solid Waste

Management Plan and the costs associated with this will exceed the requisition limit of \$30,000. It is recommended that the limit be increased to \$200,000.

This would amount to an average cost of approximately \$3.95 per household. The Regional District Board has approved this bylaw and it is now being forwarded the Ministry of Community, Sport and Culture for approval that is needed prior to adoption.

### BYLAW: Similkameen Valley Economic Development Service Establishment Amendment

Bylaw No. 2361, 2005 established an economic development function for Electoral Areas B, G and H and the Village of Keremeos.

At the August 30th, 2010 Keremeos Council meeting, Council passed a resolution to initiate a formal request for the Village of Keremeos to withdraw from the Similkameen Valley Economic Development Service.

Although the Village of Keremeos has advised that they would like to withdraw from the service that has been set up with the RDOS, the Village has indicated that they plan to continue participating in the Similkameen Valley Economic Development Service and will provide funding directly to the Society on an annual basis based on project needs.

### ZONING AMENDMENT

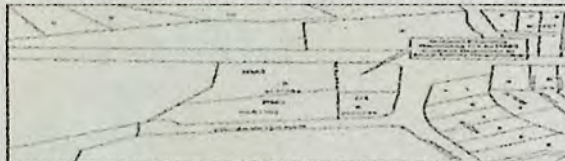
Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 842, 2010  
Pursuant to the provisions of Section 893 of the *Local Government Act*, notice is hereby given that Town Council will consider amending the Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw No. 646, 1994. The proposed Amendment is as follows:  
Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw No. 646, 1994

That Lot A, District Lot 1003, Yale Division Yale District, Plan KAP47564 except strata plan KAS1103 (Phase 1), Parcel Identifier 017-834-821 (civic address 402 Lapworth Avenue), be rezoned from Local Business (CL) to Multi-Family Residential (Medium Density) (RM3).

The purpose of which is to facilitate the subdivision and development of multi-family residential units at 402 Lapworth Avenue.

A public hearing is being waived under the provisions of Section 890 of the *Local Government Act*, as the subject properties are consistent with the Town of Princeton Official Community Plan. A local government may waive the holding of a public hearing on a proposed bylaw if the proposed bylaw is consistent with the Official Community Plan.

A copy of the subject Bylaw No. 842, 2010 (402 Lapworth Avenue) is available for examination during normal business hours 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday except statutory holidays in the Town Office, 169 Bridge Street, Princeton, B.C. commencing on November 15, 2010 up to and including December 6, 2010.

### AREA H RESIDENTS

2011 Landfill stickers are available at Town Hall for pick up by Regional District Area H property owners. Tenants wishing to pick up stickers require written permission from the landowner.



### GRANTS IN AID

To support non-profit organizations and agencies that provide programs and services that serves, benefits and/or adds value to the community.

#### POLICY:

That Council allocates annually a finite sum of money through the Town of Princeton budget for Grants in Aid, up to a maximum of \$10,000 per individual application request. Applications for Grants in Aid are to be received no later than January 31st of each year in which the grant will be used.

Mayor and Council, as part of the annual Town of Princeton budget process, will review and assess Grant in Aid requests by April 1st of each year.

Application packages are available at Town Hall.

### 2011 DOG LICENSES

2011 Dog licenses are available at Town Hall at a cost of \$10.00 for spayed or neutered animals and \$30.00 for non-neutered or unspayed dogs.

Town of Princeton Bylaw No.782 regulates the licensing of dogs, and states that any dog over the age of eight weeks must wear a valid license for the current year. A fine of \$75.00 will be charged for an unlicensed dog.

### 2010 WATER & SEWER REMINDER

2010 water and sewer invoices that remain unpaid at January 1, 2011 will be transferred to the property tax account and begin accruing interest.

### ZONING AMENDMENT

Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 841, 2010  
Pursuant to the provisions of Section 893 of the *Local Government Act*, notice is hereby given that Town Council will consider amending the Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw No. 646, 1994. The proposed Amendment is as follows:  
Town of Princeton Zoning Bylaw No. 646, 1994

That Lot 37, District Lot 10031, Yale Division Yale District, Plan 22594, PID 006-801-510 (civic address 477 Corina Avenue), be rezoned from Single Family Residential (RS1) to Two Family Residential (RD).

The purpose of the zoning amendment is to facilitate the development of a secondary suite above a car garage (i.e. a "carriage" house) at 477 Corina Avenue.

Council will receive no representations on these bylaws after the close of the Public Hearing.

Colleen Christensen, Manager of the Similkameen Country Info Centre in Keremeos was pleased with the 2010 visitor statistics.

There were 8,821 visitors to the Info Centre in 2010 as of October 31st. In addition, a total of 1,718

telephone calls for information were received which is up from 999 phone calls in the same period in 2009.

The most common attraction for European visitors this season was the Grist Mill in Keremeos. Worldwide travellers included peo-

ple from Iceland, Auckland New Zealand, North Korea, Germany, Netherlands, Belgium, Ireland, England, Scotland and Japan.

The most unique visitors? A team on a four-person bicycle raising awareness for four different charities.

# SOSMF kicks off 5th Christmas campaign

The South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation (SOSMF) is about to launch the 5th annual Christmas campaign, to replace aging urology equipment for surgery in the operating rooms at Penticton Regional Hospital. The total cost of the equipment is \$400,000. To date the Medical Foundation has raised \$197,170 towards the project.

The first Christmas bulbs will be lit on the Christmas tree on the roof of Penticton Regional Hospital (PRH) on December 1, 2010 with brochures being delivered to every home owner the past couple of weeks.

Nearly 2,000 patients from all over the region have urology surgery every year. The surgery is performed to help diagnose and evaluate urinary tract and kidney disorders. Diagnosis may include bladder and kidney stones, chronic urology abnormalities and cancerous tumors of the prostate, kidney

or bladder. Fortunately most patients are in for the day and can go home within a few hours of their procedure.

PRH requires new specialized urology equipment for the operating room which includes ten new flexible cystoscopes, eight new rigid cystoscopes with telescopes, two new flexible ureteroscopes, a radiology apron and a new HD (high definition) video camera system. The total cost of this equipment is \$400,000.

Along with the individual pieces of equipment, we urgently need to replace the urology operating room table.

The one we currently have is more than 20 years old. Today's urology tables are state of the art and are used for any procedure that requires radiographic, fluoroscopic or tomographic imaging. All of the images are digital and reduce the patient's radiation exposure, enhance the quality of the images

and can be used digitally off-site for more diagnostic capabilities. The cost of this urology operating room table is \$395,000.

This brings the total cost to nearly \$800,000.

The Christmas campaign will focus on the smaller pieces of equipment and continue fundraising over the winter for the urology operating room table.

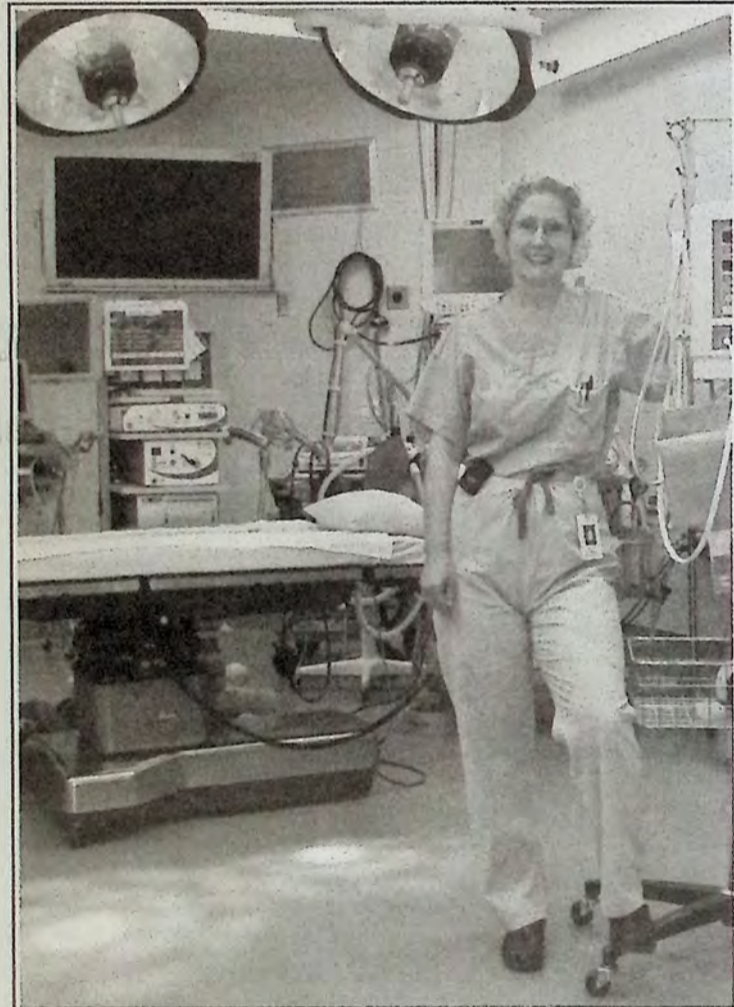

Executive Director, Janice Perrino says that the Medical Foundations' goal is always to make sure that the Penticton Regional Hospital has the best medical equipment available for the residents over the entire region.

Chairperson for the Medical Foundation Jane Drapeau, explains, "that we still have a lot of funds to raise but with this kind of a start, we're half way there and can see the light at the end of the tunnel. Thank you to everyone who has made a gift so far."



## Snow Shoveling Safety: Lift Light, Shovel Right

(NC)—A shovelful of snow can weigh 5-7 pounds. Imagine the weight you have to lift to clear your sidewalk or driveway. The British Columbia Chiropractic Association offers the following tips to help keep your back healthy this winter.

- Don't let the snow pile up.

If the weather report calls for sever-

al days of snow, frequent shoveling allows you to move smaller amounts of snow at a time.

- Pick the right shovel.

Use the lightweight pusher-type shovel. If you are using a metal shovel, spray it with Teflon first so snow does not stick to it.

- Push, don't throw.

Always push the snow to the side rather than throwing it. This allows you to avoid lifting heavy shovelfuls of snow and sudden twisting or turning movements.

- Bend your knees.

If you find you have to lift a shovelful of snow, use your knees and your leg and arm muscles to do the pushing and lifting, while keeping your back straight.

- Warm up.

Before tackling any strenuous activity take the time to do warm up with some overall conditioning—such as 10 to 15 minutes of walking—followed by some simple stretching.

- Take a break.

If you feel tired or short of breath, stop and take a rest. Shake out your arms and legs. Stop shoveling immediately if you feel chest or pack pain.

If you have back pain that is severe or that persists for more than a day after shoveling, see a chiropractor.

If you have chest pain that is severe, seek immediate medical attention.

### Clothing

- Mittens are warmer than gloves.

- Select warm, waterproof boots with enough room for an extra pair of socks and to wiggle toes around.

- Remove drawstrings from clothing that could catch on climbing or other play equipment. Use Velcro or snap closures instead.

- After play, remove wet clothing immediately.

### Winter play

Active games will help to keep your

child warm. Teach your child a few important rules to ensure safe winter play.

- Stay away from snowplows and snow blowers. Choose play areas away from roads, fences and water.

- Take extra caution when crossing roads as it may be hard for drivers to see children through snowy or frosty windows.

- Do not play on roadside snow banks. Snowplow drivers and other drivers may not see a child.

- Snowball fights can be dangerous and cause injury, especially if the snow is hard-packed or icy.

### How To Get Fat By The Book

If the average American is overweight, could it be the official Food Guide?

This sounds silly, until you look at the daily food guide. The average, health-conscious American following the food guide is certain to become overweight. This is alarming, considering a weight gain of 8.8 pounds is enough to increase your chances of having heart problems.

The guide to daily food choices calls for 2-3 servings of milk, yogurt, cheese or other dairy product. For example, in one day, you should drink one cup of milk, and eat 1 1/2 cups ice cream, and 1 1/2 ounces of cheese (or substitute 2 cups of cottage cheese or 1 1/2 cups yogurt). That is just the dairy section.

Going to meat, fish, beans and egg section, the guide recommends 2-3 servings daily of two to three ounces of meat or fish (about the size of a hamburger), one egg (but no more than three a week) and a 1/2 cup portion of cooked dried beans or 2 tablespoons of peanut butter or nuts.

The food guide calls for 2-3 servings of vegetables and 2-4 servings of fruit.

Then we go to the grains: recommended servings, 6-11 daily. A serving is one slice of bread, 1/2 cup cooked cereal, rice or pasta, or three cups of popcorn, or two medium cookies.

If you were to follow this guide and have everything recommended for one day, you would get fat, unless you were a 200 pound man who worked at heavy labour all day long. This is simply too much food for the average person.

The only good part of the food guide is the recommendation to use fats and sweets sparingly.

Try making up a daily menu following this food guide and you will soon discover how difficult it would be for the average person just to eat this much food. Imagine eating six slices of bread every day, plus all that dairy product, plus the fruit and vegetables, and the high protein foods.

The American Department of Agriculture made up this food guide. It obviously was made to encourage high consumption of agricultural products.

## It was all about the numbers

A judicial recount of ballots cast in the 2008 Municipal Election was conducted November 27, 2008 at Princeton Town Hall.

Candidate Dina Slowikowski-Campbell had filed the request through Penticton Courts and the recount was presided over by Judge G. Sinclair. Slowikowski-Campbell had finished two votes behind the fourth elected Councillor, Marilyn Harkness, in both the unofficial and official election results as released by Chief Election Officer Patrick Robins.

The recount focused on just the ballots marked for either Slowikowski-

Campbell or Harkness and included the same 'helpers' who were present following the closing of the polls on election night.

After the recount the numbers remained 385 for Harkness and 383 for Slowikowski-Campbell. Upon further inspection of rejected ballots, Judge Sinclair awarded both candidate one vote each bringing the final tally to 386 votes for Harkness and 384 for Slowikowski-Campbell.

Judge Sinclair declared Harkness elected.

A record number of visitors signed the guestbook at Princeton Museum in the 2008 season.

Between opening day in April to the end of October 6,141 visitors toured the museum, more than any year before. They donated \$4,000 and Museum Society members were disappointed in the low donations total. The matter was discussed at the November 25, 2008 Museum Society meeting which saw discussion revolve around charging a small admission fee (\$2 for adults, \$1 per child with Museum Society members admitted free of charge).

No vote was taken and the matter was left for resolution at the Museum Society's annual General meeting set for January 20, 2009.

**Harvest Vegetable Curry**

(NC)—Serve this colourful and flavourful main-course vegetable dish over couscous, bulgur or brown rice. The chickpeas and grain complement each other to form complete protein.

- 2 carrots, sliced
- 2 cups cubed peeled squash (about 1-inch/2.5 cm pieces) 500 mL
- 2 cups broccoli florets 500 mL
- 1 sweet red pepper, cut in strips
- 1 small (6-inch/15 cm) yellow zucchini, cut in chunks
- 1 red onion, cut in thin wedges
- 1 can (19 oz/540 mL) chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- 1 tbsp olive oil 15 mL
- 2 tbsp minced gingerroot 25 mL
- 1 tbsp curry powder or paste 15 mL
- 1 tsp ground cumin 5 mL
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 tsp crushed red pepper flakes 1 mL
- 1/2 cup sodium-reduced vegetable broth or water 125 mL
- 2 tbsp fresh lemon juice 25 mL
- 3 cups hot cooked brown rice, couscous or bulgur 750 mL
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh coriander (cilantro) or parsley 50 mL

Steam carrots and squash for 5 minutes. Add broccoli, red pepper, zucchini and red onion; steam for 5 minutes. Add chickpeas; steam for 3 to 5 minutes or until all vegetables are tender-crisp.

Meanwhile, in small saucepan, heat oil over medium heat; cook gingerroot, curry powder, cumin, garlic and red pepper flakes, stirring often, for 2 minutes. Add broth and lemon juice; simmer, covered, of 2 minutes. Toss vegetables with sauce.

Serve over hot rice. Sprinkle with coriander or parsley. Makes 4 main-course servings.

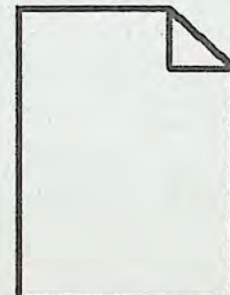

## My Turn...

### Only Twelve Months To Wait!

I'm pretty excited.

The next Municipal Elections are a year away and already we've got a huge selection of candidates to choose from.

It didn't really dawn on me until I thought about the complaining in recent weeks about the new cardlock on Burton Avenue and the chipper across the river from a residential area.

The common thread in both of those arguments is residents, or more accurately, voters in the Town of Princeton, have been spending a lot of time pointing at the mistakes made by our current elected officials.

You don't have to be a brain surgeon to come to the conclusion that those pointing the fingers obviously would have done things differently, if they were on Town Council.

Unless, of course, that's been their plan all along.

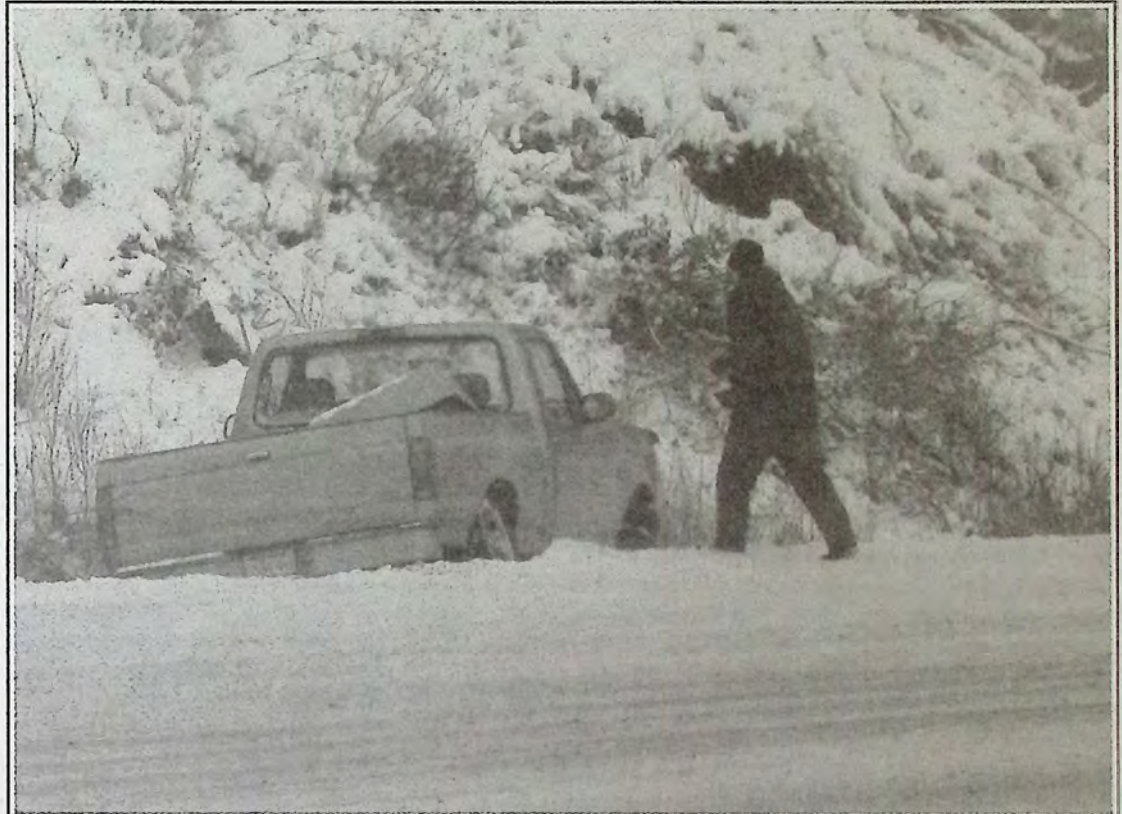

## Do Families Leave A Legacy Of Crime?

Since 1982, I have been attending Provincial Court in Princeton, and reporting who was convicted of what. It has been interesting to watch and listen, but I feel somewhat depressed when I see certain young people in court. Because I have attended for so many years, I saw the children of certain individuals appearing in court just as their parents had done. Now I am seeing the grandchildren of certain individuals coming to court just as the grandparents did!

I am of the opinion anybody can make a mistake and wind up facing a judge, at least when we are talking about petty crime. However, when I see one generation after another of the same family following in the footsteps of parents and even grandparents, I start wondering what kind of legacy these youngsters have inherited. What is happening in some families that allows them to continue a pattern of criminal activity? When I was in college, I studied psychology. The big issue was whether heredity (genes) or environment created certain behavioral patterns. That was 50 years ago, and I am not sure anybody can say, with certainty, that it is one thing or another. The one thing I do know is that the inherited environment probably has a lot to do with what children think is acceptable behaviour.

I know of a family where the father thought scamming people was a sign of his cleverness. One of his sons followed in his footsteps. The three others did not, and have much better lives as a result. What determined the difference?

I know of another family in which domestic violence was frequent, yet none of the children followed that pattern. What prevented that?

The secret world inside families

is difficult to study, because people do not want to closely examine the family dynamics to see where positive changes could occur. No family wants to see itself as wrong in any way, but there must be something very wrong going on when three generations of a family turn out to be criminals.

I do not know if there is a genetic influence leading to criminal activity. I recall two brothers who appeared in court in Princeton many years ago. One brother was a good citizen who tried to keep the other from going astray. In a sense, the good brother was a victim of the criminal brother, because the good one frequently paid the price for the criminal conduct. I do not know where these men are today, but I hope the good one finally put some distance between himself and his brother. I doubt genetics had anything to do with this situation.

I suspect what really is going on

is what happens in society at large. I recall a time when people turned a blind eye to wife beating and child beating. I recall a time, not so long ago, when a couple of guys could have a slug fest to settle their differences, and that was acceptable.

There was a time when a drunk driver who killed somebody got off easy because he was drunk. Society was prepared to find this behaviour acceptable.

Is that what happens in some families? Do they find criminal behaviour acceptable? Do they think it is acceptable to steal or do damage, and do they think the only real crime is getting caught? If this is the case, then I do feel sorry for their children because those children will suffer from having to go to court, having to pay for lawyers, or pay fines, or pay damages, or even go to jail. Let's hope somehow the family pattern will be shattered, but this is probably a faint hope.

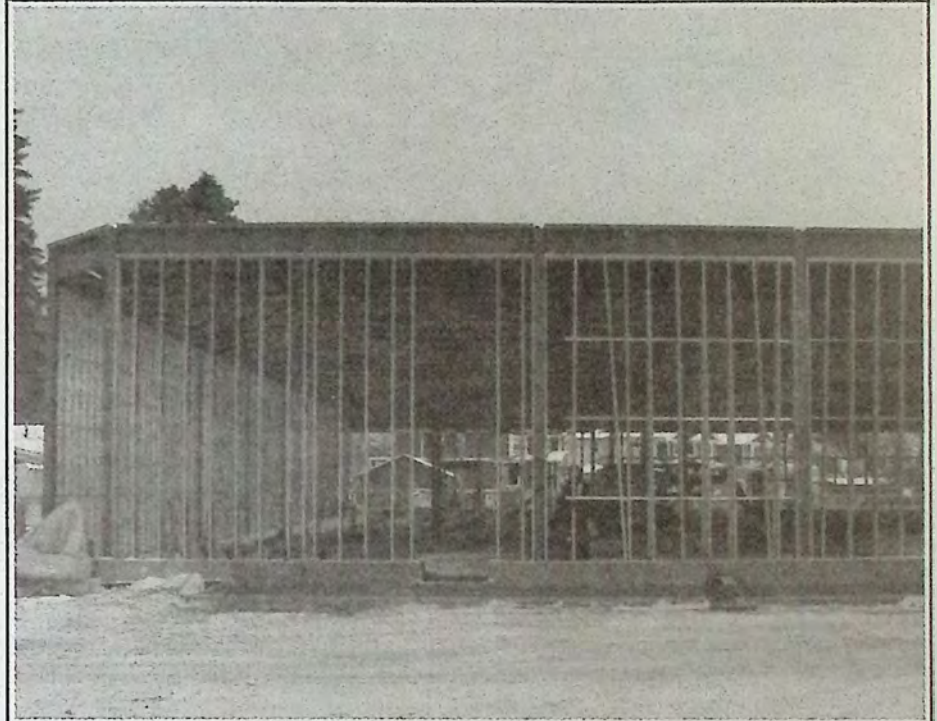

## Local cancer patients to benefit from gift

The BC Cancer Foundation announced November 23rd that a gift from the estate of a long-time Kelowna resident and former cancer patient will fund a major cancer prevention research project coming to the Southern Interior in the New Year.

The donor was a former cancer patient who had received treatment and care at the BC Cancer Agency's Centre for the Southern Interior, in Kelowna. She included a gift in her will to the Foundation, wishing to support the Agency's regional centre.

Her gift will enable the Agency to open a local clinic offering area residents the opportunity to participate in the Agency's BC Generations Project in their home community.

The Project is recruiting men and women between the ages of 40 and 69 from throughout the South Okanagan and Similkameen to join a long-term study examining how environment, lifestyle and genes contribute to cancer and other chronic diseases.

Participants provide basic infor-

mation and blood and urine samples, which are added to a comprehensive data pool. From it, Agency researchers will learn more about prevention of cancer and disease, for the benefit of future generations.

The Project is part of a national initiative following 300,000 Canadians for over 20 years, and is the largest of its kind ever undertaken in Canada.

BC Cancer Foundation President & CEO Douglas Nelson said, "Our donor was very grateful for the care she received and wanted to continue to support the BC Cancer Agency in her community after the end of her own life. The BC Cancer Foundation is happy to be able to fulfill her wish by funding the BC Generations Project in Kelowna for the benefit of the region's citizens, now and in the future."

"It's a huge opportunity for this generation to do something for future generations," added Richard Gallagher, BC Generations Project principal investigator and senior scientist in the BC Cancer

Agency's Cancer Control Research Program.

"This could help protect your children or your grandchildren from getting cancer or chronic disease."

Anyone aged 40 to 69 residing in the South Okanagan and Similkameen is encouraged to participate.

More than 6,500 British Columbians have already registered by phone at 1-877-675-8221, by e-mail at bcgenerationsproject@bccrc.ca or online at www.bcgenerationsproject.ca.

The BC Generations Project plans to open the registration clinic in Kelowna on January 6th, 2011.

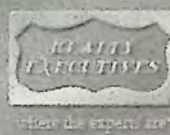
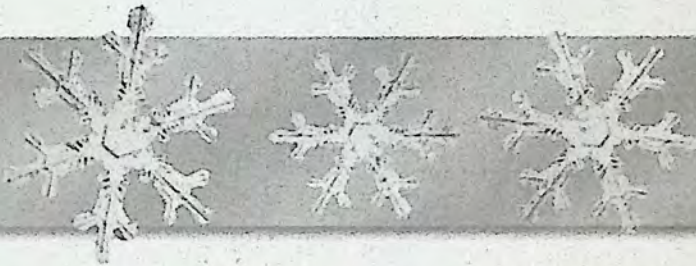
