## Town Council defers zoning decision

Should a lot designated Single Family Residential be rezoned to allow a suite over a garage?

This type of development is referred to as a "carriage house". Town Council held a public hearing on December 6 to consider the rezoning application of Heinz Ebenau at 477 Corina Avenue.

Ebenau explained that he had a building permit for what he plans to do.

People in the neighbourhood had been contacted, and there was no response by many, but two people did express a negative point of view on the proposed development. One couple referred to the construction as a "monster" building. Another referred to obscuring

the view. There were issues about inadequate parking available at the Ebenau residence.

Ebenau spoke in favour of his proposal, citing an inadequate supply of rental housing in Princeton. He pointed out he has not exceeded the 30 percent buildable space regulation.

Councillor Frank Armitage stated clearly that he did not like the concept of carriage house development.

Other members of Council did not speak on the rezoning, but in the regular meeting of Council, the motion to permit the rezoning was not voted on. The vote is deferred pending further consideration by Council.

## 'Beat the bushes' says Bey

Wednesday, December 8, was supposed to see a new Board of Directors elected. It did not happen.

John Bey chaired the meeting, beginning it with an announcement that the person who had been slated to become President had suffered a heart attack. The person who was to have put his name forward as Vice-President was not in attendance. There has yet to be a Secretary and Treasurer, and four Directors elected.

Bey said the Racing Days Association must find "eligible, competent people" to run for these offices. These people will have to satisfy the requirements of the Gaming Commission, which requires a fixed address and does a security check.

For a change, there is enough seed money to plan a race meet, although it must be augmented by sponsorships, but first, there must

be that Board of Directors in place.

A meeting of the Interior Horse Racing Association will be held January 16, and the dates of race meets must be submitted not long after that date. Bey called for a meeting to be held January 20 at the public library conference room. If no Board of Directors is elected then, the local race meet may be forfeited.

Princeton has held horse races on the Canada Day weekend for more than 40 years. Until now, there have always been competent people who stepped forward to organize the races. Racing Days has always meant a great deal to the local community.

It was begun in 1964 to stimulate a severely depressed economy. Local business people, Town

Council, the ranching community and those who loved horse races turned out to build the racetrack and sponsor the races. The celebration worked. Four years after Racing Days began, Princeton started to grow and expand. There have been some economic downturns during the years but never so bad as 1964, and never so bad this town could not celebrate Racing Days.

Other Interior communities have had big problems with hosting horse races, but Princeton has been one community that has always done it right, until now. Bey asked people interested in preserving horse racing in Princeton to "beat the bushes" for people to serve on the Racing Days Board of Directors by January 20.

## Tourism strategy falls short

Thompson Rivers University (TRU) students from Kamloops worked on a project in Princeton to develop a tourism strategy.

Town Council received a letter saying the project could not go further due to lack of funds and asked for further funding.

Mayor Randy McLean expressed disappointment in the report he had received because he thought

there would be a comprehensive tourism strategy evolving out of the study.

He said the only thing he could see was the promotion of China Ridge as a winter tourist attraction, with a recommendation to pay China Ridge members to complete work on the trails.

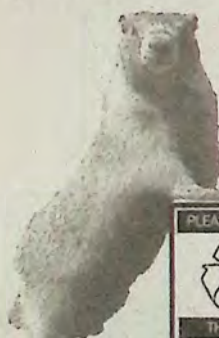
The matter was referred to budget.

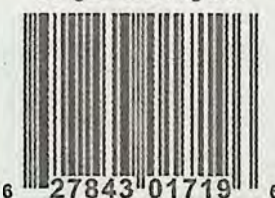

**Mayor cuts through the noise and clears the air**

There has been a steady stream of weighted commentary on the Renew Resources chipping operation located on Weyerhaeuser property that is across from homes on the south side of the river.

The complaints have revolved around noise and particulate pollution resulting from this operation.

The chipper operation is located in a heavy industrial zone, an area created many years ago in order to accommodate heavy industry and their operations. This new industry operates within the permitted uses of that industrial zone.

Industrial zones are commonplace in most communities, indeed in many cases those industries are a big reason there is a community there in the first place. This zoning has no restriction on noise and hours of operation, if a community cannot provide an area where this zoning and freedom of operation is in place,

there is always a nearby community that will accept the jobs and the tax benefits of a new industry.

While there are some detriments to living in a resource based community there are also a number of benefits.

The overall sawmill operation provides over 300 workers and their families a first-rate income. The operation pays over \$380,000 in taxes each year which helps pay for our infrastructure, maintenance and capitol projects.

To put that in context, a 1% tax increase raises \$12,000 in taxes, without the mill you would have to raise taxes 31% to enjoy the same benefits.

As you are well aware the forest industry is facing an uncertain future as a result of the pine beetle, the high Canadian dollar and the U.S. housing slump, any mills that are still operating are doing everything they can to enhance their bot-

tom line and prolong their future. The chipper enables the mill to take advantage of wood that would otherwise not be utilized and therefore helps to sustain their future.

In discussion with industry staff there has been an ongoing effort to try to reduce both the noise and the dust.

Berms have been constructed, dust retardant has been applied, new equipment is being considered and a consultant firm familiar with industrial noise and dust reduction has been engaged. When you consider this continuing effort to reduce the noise and dust problem and the fact they are operating in a zone created for them, is it fair to restrict the ability of an industry to operate more efficiently?

The community as a whole must consider the value of industry, the value of the corporate tax revenue to taxpayers and the livelihood of 300 workers and their families.

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# Spirit Festival plans ceramic mural

Robin Lowe and Ed Staples made a presentation to Town Council on December 6 to explain a request from the Arts Council to place a ceramic mural in the library foyer. This project is part of the Spirit

Festival for which the Arts Council received a \$10,000 grant.

The Spirit Festival is a joint activity between the Arts Council and Upper Similkameen Indian Band. It has three components. First, art in

a public place for the enjoyment of everyone. This would be the mural. Second, lessons about the history and traditions of the Similkameen Valley and its First Nations people. Third, a celebration for the commu-

nity in the form of a powwow.

The mural will embrace the theme through a collage of pictograph images on ceramic tiles. Ed Staples showed Town Council a few of the tiles he has prepared, using pictograph images found along Old Hedley Road. The tiles are very attractive, very earthy. The spirit of the tiles would honour First Nations people.

Staples told Council the Indian Band is applying to make the orig-

inal pictographs along Old Hedley Road a national historic site to be called the Spirit Trail.

Mayor Randy McLean spoke enthusiastically about the concept and the project. He said it would be a celebration of the Town and the Upper Similkameen Band working together, as they have done for many years. He would like to see some sort of interpretive plaque alongside the mural when it is completed.

## Council defers museum funding

Princeton & District Museum submitted a request to Town Council for a \$24,000 operating fund. This money is used to pay the Operations Manager's salary. The Museum Society has little funding of its own, and is currently facing a shortfall in funding for its renovations, as the Town borrowed \$100,000 of the renovations fund to complete the library. The Town does not have sufficient funds to

pay back the money borrowed.

Town Council deferred a decision pending consideration during the budget process.

Councillor Frank Armitage, who is liaison Councillor for the Museum Society, stated there will be a call for quotes on a scaled-down version of the renovation plans. The remaining improvements will be done as funds become available.

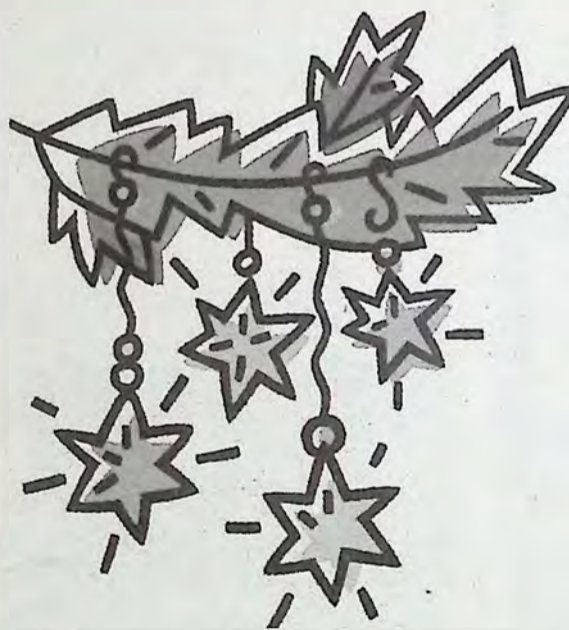

## Road mapping project underway

By now you've seen them along Highway 3A near Yellow Lake with what appears to be strange looking devices.

What are they doing and why?

Their portable "Trimble VRS Now" GPS devices are based on Real Time Kinematic satellite navigation.

Traditionally, Real Time Kinematic technology requires a base station in the vicinity of a RTK device in order to provide a benchmark for the signal system. The signals shared between the base station, the RTK devices and orbiting satellites are ultimately "aligned" to provide measurable results for

engineers and contractors.

In the case of the Yellow Lake highway project, the measurable results are used to calculate the volume of material to be removed (both rockface and roadbed).

Once the volume of material to be removed is known, the equipment required and the time required to remove the material can be calculated. The devices that Francois and Ron (see photo above) are using share signals directly with satellites and eliminate the expense of a stationary "base station".

You can expect to see Francois and Ron on-site over the coming months on a continual basis as

they check and recheck the progress of material being removed from the site.

The final paperwork for the project is being signed and it is anticipated that heavy equipment will be moved to the Yellow Lake vicinity within the next week or so.

Portable message signage is already in place both east and west of the Yellow Lake summit. Motorists can expect delays in their travels until late Spring 2011. The project will be managed out of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure Southern Interior Region office in Kamloops.

**Nourishing the bones is an antidote for osteoporosis**

(NC)—It may be too easy to take our bones for granted.

In childhood, without much attention at all, our skeleton grows in both size and density—and because the bones are living tissue it means new bone is replacing old bone all the time. Extracted from the foods you eat, specific building blocks of nutrients are required to do this effectively.

Did you know that up to 90 per cent of peak bone mass is acquired by age 18 for girls and by age 20 for boys? The early years are the best time to nurture life long bone health.

“Bone mass, or the amount of tissue in the skeleton, tends to keep growing until around age 30, when

it reaches its maximum strength and density,” explains Dr. Tkachuk at LifeLabs, a leading diagnostic centre. “Healthy men and women experience minimal reduction in total bone mass until the changing years when the body requires more calcium. Women often experience rapid bone loss in the first few years after menopause and if left unchecked, this loss of important tissue can lead to osteoporosis.”

*Scheduling a bone density test is now standard practice for middle age people, the doctor said. Osteoporosis can be prevented, so here are a few more tips from LifeLabs to keep your bones dense and strong:*

• **Feed them calcium:**

A diet low in calcium forces the cells to extract it from our bones. A diet rich in calcium nourishes both the body and the bones. Dairy products (milk, yoghurt, cheese), broccoli, kale, okra, beans, almonds, sesame seeds, walnuts, sardines, salmon, pasta, figs, apricots, oranges and tofu are all high in calcium and if in doubt, supplements are often advised by health care providers.

• **Feed them essential nutrients:**

Sufficient vitamin D is required to absorb calcium. Sunshine is the best source and others are milk and certain breakfast cereals. Additional nutrients high on the list are: phosphorous, vitamin C, magnesium, copper, manganese, zinc, iron, boron, and protein.

• **Do weight bearing exercise:**

Add weights to your daily routines. Exercise – and strength training in particular – helps maintain bone mass.

• **Curtail bad habits:**

Excessive alcohol and smoking cause damage to both your bone mass and to your overall health. Quit smoking and limit alcohol intake.

• **Don't wait:**

Read up, learn, and do something about maintaining healthy bones as early in your life as possible.

**The Joy of Cold Weather Cooking**

When winter comes, trying to force salads and light food on the family is nearly hopeless. They want hot food and lots of it. If you worry about the nourishment in cold weather foods, take heart: the traditional winter foods are loaded with what's good for you.

A winter favourite is stew. A good old-fashioned stew contains onions, carrots, potatoes, meat and your favourite herbs and spices, like garlic, parsley and red pepper. All of these are good for you. If you like your stew with tomatoes, rice and celery, plus carrots and onions, you are still enjoying good nutrition.

Chili con carne is another favourite food in winter. With beans, beef, tomatoes, onions and celery, this is great food for the family. This dish is loaded with nutrients, and if you serve salad and corn bread on the side, you are serving a meal fit for a king.

Macaroni and cheese is another winter warm-up meal, and it has plenty of nutrition - lots of calcium, protein, and of course it is full of fat, but once in awhile it will not do you harm. Serve it with broccoli, green beans, or a salad, and you have everything you need in one meal.

Soups are another of those winter comfort foods. Make a thick, rich soup and you are feeding the family good solid nutrition. You can put nearly everything in a soup: celery, barley, beans, potatoes, carrots, onion, garlic, squash, peas, corn, beets, and on and on. Try serving different kinds of soup on different days, and make everyone happy.

When it is snack time, you might want to stick to a traditional favourite, popcorn, with hot chocolate as a drink. Try to avoid loading up on sugary foods. Everybody goes in for some heavy duty sweets in winter, but how about shifting the sweet stuff to a baked apple, pumpkin pie, or berry pie? These are far healthier and just as satisfying.

Winter is a good time for cooked puddings, Cocoa, milk, cornstarch and a little sugar makes a great pudding. Cornstarch puddings can be served warm, and in a number of flavours. Tapioca pudding is good when it's warm, so is apple crisp and poached pears.

There is nothing like a good hot meal to warm your soul in winter. Go for it!

## From a leaky roof to murder and ranching

The Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) decided to take a short winter recess after their December 8, 1998 meeting.

Vice President Skip Jones also used the meeting to clarify an issue that saw a \$60,000 number floating around in relation to repairs at the fairgrounds.

"We don't want the \$60,000," Jones stated.

"It is simply notification that there is a problem with the grandstand roof and the big building and it will take \$60,000 to fix it."

He emphasized that the property belongs to the Town of Princeton and the PXA is notifying them of problems with the town property.

The PXA will also apply for proper highway signage to identify the location of Sunflower Downs. Members agreed the signs should read 'Princeton Fairgrounds' for the clearest message of where rodeo, races, Fall Fair and other events would take place.

A total of six additional officers from the Major Crime Units in Vancouver and Kelowna joined Sgt. Tom Payne of Princeton RCMP Detachment in the investigation into the murder of Joseph 'Phen' Drushka, the 32-year old man found dead in his Princeton home December 5, 1998.

Sgt. Payne told the News Leader at the time that about 200 files had been generated since the start of

the investigation and that each file required a follow-up investigation.

The focus of the investigation was to try to learn as much as possible about the activities and whereabouts of Drushka from December 2 to December 5.

An autopsy was performed December 10, 1998 but due to the nature of the investigation police did not release any information regarding autopsy results or the cause of death.

An amendment to Electoral Area H Rural Land Use Bylaw #1725 was the subject of a public review planned for December 21, 1998.

The proposed future development plan for Princeton Stock Ranch, owned at the time by the Willis family, included a possible purchase by a consortium, depended on adding a new definition of Health and Recreational Ranch to the existing bylaw.

The amendment would create a new designation to be called ATA (Agri-Tourist Area) to be added to the existing designations identified as Resource Area (RA) and Large Holdings (LH).

The bylaw amendment paved the way for the RockRidge Canyon project.

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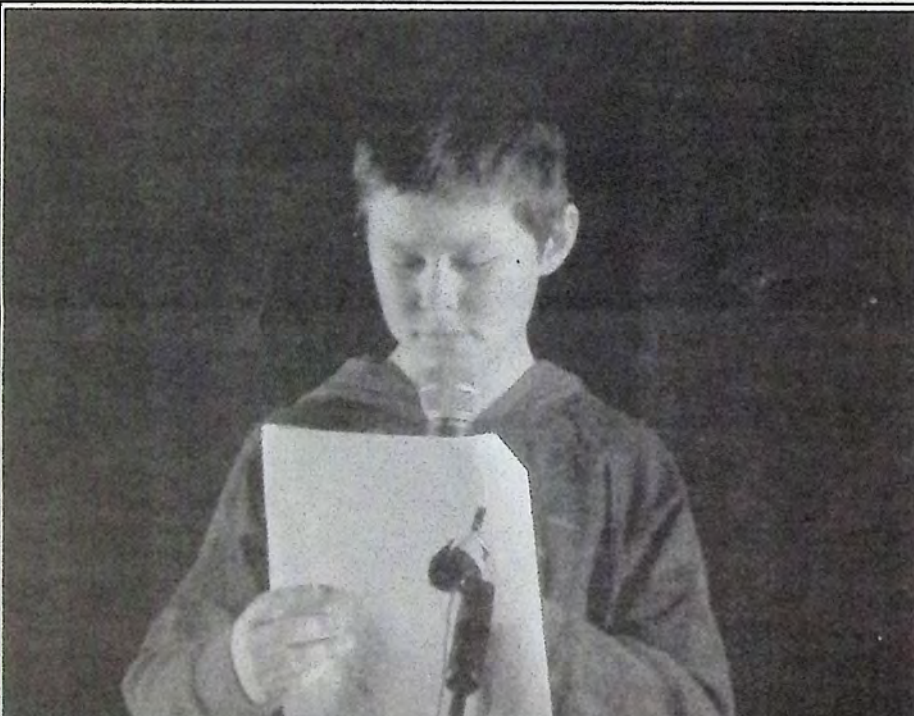

## Chiefs receive some payback

After Princeton Posse took the Kelowna Chiefs to a 3-all double overtime tie in Kelowna on December 4th there was bound to be some animosity in the air the following afternoon in Princeton Arena.

**Winter Sparkles Fruit Pie**

(NC)— What holiday dinner is complete without a fruit pie for dessert? Seasonal fruits like apples paired with pears, frozen cranberries and juicy oranges create a perfect medley of tastes. For a tart taste, try Jonagold or Pippin apples or for a sweeter taste try Fuji or Empire. And remember to let your pie sit for about an hour after removing from the oven to let the juices settle before serving. **Ingredients**

- 2 Tenderflake® frozen deep dish pie shells
- 2 small tart apples, peeled and sliced
- 2 medium pears, peeled and sliced
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) fresh or frozen cranberries
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) granulated sugar
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) all-purpose flour

- Coarse sugar

**Directions**

1. Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

4. Use printable stencils or cookie cutters to cut out pastry shapes from the second thawed pie shell. Place pastry shapes on top of filling in a circular pattern. Brush lightly with milk and sprinkle with coarse sugar
5. Bake in preheated oven for 15 minutes. Lower temperature to 350°F (180°C) and continue baking for 35 to 45 minutes or until pastry is golden and fruit is cooked.

# Sego makes new discovery

Sego Resources reports that it has completed 6 trenches, on the greatly expanded Granby Zone, to date. The first trench, Trench 96, is located approximately 40 metres west of diamond drill hole MM-10-19, which cut 60.4 metres averaging 0.24% copper, 0.16 g/t gold and 0.72 g/t silver, and bottomed in mineralization.

This trench, approximately 200 metres long and oriented in a northeasterly direction, is located in the area identified by Dr. S. Tribe, P.Geo. in her March 17, 2010 Terrain Study of Miner Mountain as a headscarp of the Regal slide zone. Approximately 40 metres west and 15 metres downslope of Trench 96, Trenches 40 and 22 cut copper mineralization in oxidized rock ranging from high individual assays (1.87% copper and 0.09 g/t gold; 1.40% copper and 0.65 g/t gold) to a well mineralized zone of 19 metres averaging 0.99% copper and 0.65 g/t gold.

For further information refer to the

news releases of April 24, 2008 and May 12, 2008 on our web site. Trench 96 cut, but did not penetrate, a 100 metre zone of intensely clay altered and leached, gossanous cap rock with sparse oxide copper mineralization.

A 76 metre zone of less altered, recognizable microdiorite at the south end of the trench is well mineralized with visible chalcopyrite and pyrite. Assays are pending.

Trenches 97, 98, and 101 are located 87, 147 and 219 metres respectively east of Trench 96. Trenches 97 and 98 are both oriented in a north-south direction, 110 metres long and approximately 15 metres higher than Trench 96.

Trench 101 is oriented in a northwesterly direction, 50 metres long and approximately 10 metres higher than Trench 96. All three trenches cut gossanous cap rock with only sparse oxide copper mineralization. Sparse veinlets of pyrite, calcite and gypsum were observed in the intensely altered gossan of Trench

97 and 98.

Although trenching reached a depth of approximately 12 metres (30 feet) by benching down, the excavator did not penetrate the gossanous cap which extends for at least 200 metres east-west and 100 metres north-south, and is open in both directions.

Drilling is required to test below this zone. Sego is calling for bids on a percussion drilling program to grid the entire zone, to be followed by diamond drilling.

Trench 99 which is 50 metres southwest of Trench 96, on the headscarp of another slide located by Dr. Tribe, intersected over 120 metres of potassically and propylitically altered volcanics with copper oxide mineralization.

Trench 100 which is 205 metres northwest of Trench 96 tested an area between known zones of copper mineralization uncovered propylitically altered volcanics with zones of copper oxide mineralization.

No wonder some long-term English speaking Canadians have no idea what some of us are saying to each other.

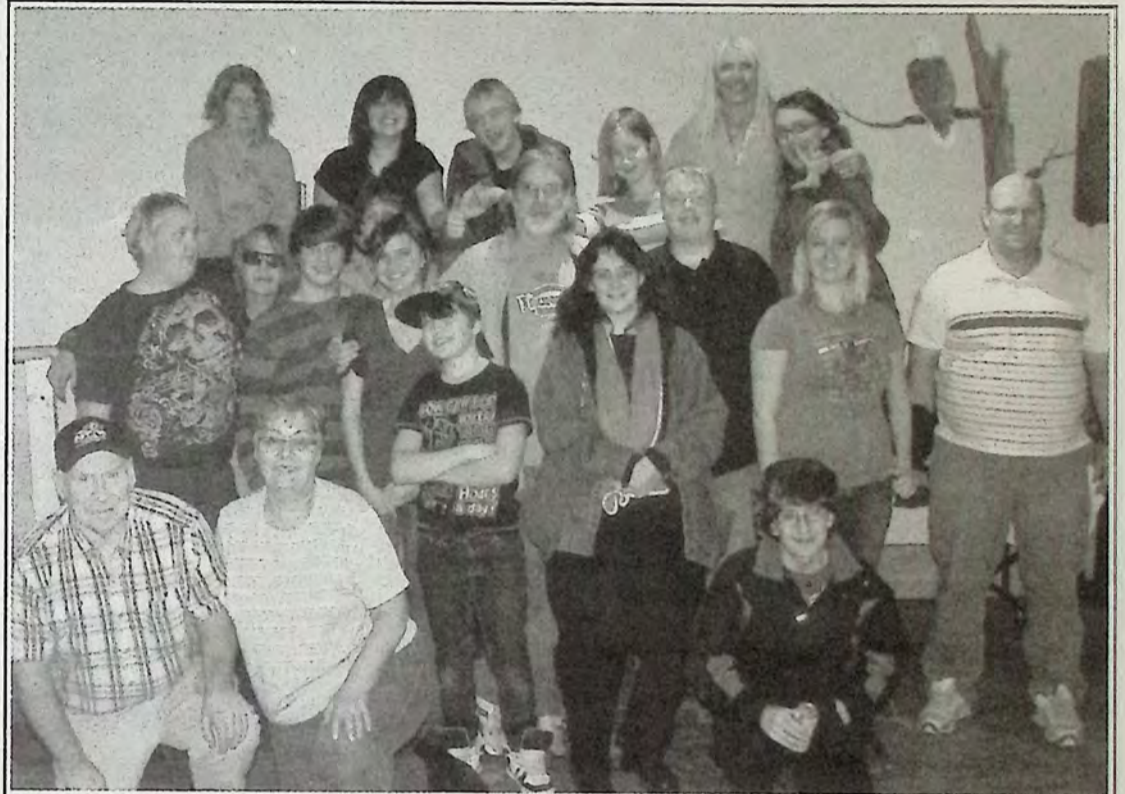
And I'm not going to blame rap music because, in actual fact, it's just another form of expression.

## Is Lou Dobbs A Secret NDP Cardholder?

I was reading a book by CNN broadcaster Lou Dobbs when it struck me: he sounds like Jack Layton. Dobbs is a Republican, which is the same as a Conservative in Canada. However, in his book War on the Middle Class, you might swear he was a member of the New Democratic Party.

Dobbs talks about a government bought and paid for by big corporations and their lobbyists. He talks about corporations outsourcing manufacturing and services, even financial services, erasing millions of jobs of middle class people. He talks about how even national sovereignty and national security are affected by outsourcing banking, insurance and credit card services, computer services and telephone services can result in identity theft and theft from bank accounts.

Lou Dobbs talks about the dangers of reducing corporate taxes and thereby shifting more of the tax burden to working people, who are finding it harder and harder to make ends meet because companies have scaled down pension and health benefits. I was surprised to learn that 50 years ago, corporate taxes in the United States made up one-third of the tax revenue of the nation, and it is now down to six percent. The average wage earner now makes up the difference. He talks about corporations seeking tax havens to avoid paying their share.

This book was a real eye-opener for a Canadian, because this is not the sort of thing we hear broadcast on our media to any extent. Apparently Dobbs is one of the few broadcasters in the US who does this sort of criticism of his government's actions and policies. Dobbs talks of pressures brought to bear on CNN to have him muzzled or fired so he would not be broadcasting these unsavory facts.

Thankfully, CNN resisted the pressure.

I was well into the book when I heard, on our evening news, that the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives had announced the rich in Canada were richer than they used to be, and that the income gap between rich and middle income earners had widened once again. Dobbs goes into that earnings gap to show the same thing has happened in the States. He then points to corporate spending on management personnel, pointing out how much money CEO's are paid compared with the average worker.

For example, he cites the case of Chuck Conoway, the CEO of Kmart when it went bankrupt, as receiving a \$9.5 million severance package. During the first five years of this millennium, the CEO's of AT&T, BellSouth, Time Warner, Lucent, Merck, Pfizer, Safeway, Home Depot, Verizon and Wal-Mart were paid, together, a total of \$865 million in compensation while shareholders of these companies lost \$160 million. Workers lost their jobs, with no compensation packages. He cites many corporations in which CEO's received pay increases of hundreds of thousands of dollars while employees wages went down.

All of this is while corporations lobby for lower taxes on the basis that they are having financial problems.

Dobbs talks about the failure of medicare in the USA. He reviews the number of American presidents who tried desperately to bring in various forms of medicare, only to be shot down in Congress. He notes the American health insurance company alliance paid \$20 million in one case just to see that the public would not buy into the plan.

He then notes how health insurance rates have climbed to the extent that a company paying its employees' health insurance aver-

ages \$10,000 or more per employee, and how some companies can no longer afford to offer the benefit of health insurance. Dobbs also talks about how difficult it has become for the average American to even be accepted for coverage by a health insurance company.

Dobbs talks about his nation becoming an importer of food, which has never been before, and points out the lack of national security when a nation cannot feed itself.

Everything he talked about, except for the high cost of millions of illegal immigrants, could have come right out of any New Democrat election platform. When Dobbs talks about the preservation of the working class or middle class and the dream of giving everyone a chance at a decent standard of living and a decent standard of health care, he sounds like a New Democrat. When he talks about exporting jobs to low wage countries, or the high cost of tuition to a post secondary education. He sounds like a New Democrat.

The book was written before the collapse of the American economy and the big corporate bail-outs. I wondered what he would think of the new president and the present state of the economy. The way I see it, things have not changed much in the States. Unfortunately, few people seem to pay attention to the NDP platform, so I see Canada increasingly infected by the same corporate influences as Dobbs talked about.

In a way, Canadian workers may not be so endangered as American workers. Although we have lost a lot of manufacturing jobs, the natural resources that make up a large part of our economy cannot be moved offshore. You cannot move a mine, an oil or gas well, a hydro dam, a grain field, or a forest to another country. In another respect, we can be vulnerable because our largest trading partner is the United States.

### CFIB - Canadian Federation of Independent Business Year-End Tips To Help Reduce Your Income Tax Bill

With the year drawing to a close, it's time to make sure you head into 2011 in as strong a financial position as possible.

That means taking steps before the year ends to reduce your 2010 income tax bill. Here are five tips you may want to consider:

#### Complete tax-saving transactions.

Many items that are deductible or qualify for tax credits must be paid before the end of the year. These include medical and child care expenses, professional dues, alimony, and donations to political parties or charities.

Keep in mind that it may be advan-

tageous to make donations of publicly-traded securities to a registered charity. In addition to the donation tax credit, there is also no capital gains tax.

#### Trigger accrued losses before year-end.

If your investment objectives have changed or the underlying fundamentals of an investment have changed, consider selling the investment and triggering a capital loss.

Losses must first be used to offset gains in the current tax year, and unused losses can be applied to the past three years or to future years. Sell securities at least three business

days before year-end so the transaction will settle by December 31.

#### Consider adjusting your installment payments.

If you make quarterly payments, the final installment is due December 15. Installment payments are based on the previous year's income.

If your 2010 income is lower than in previous years, you might want to reduce your December 15 installment.

#### Contribute to a RESP.

Put money into a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) before year-end to qualify for the 2010 Canada Education Savings

Grant.

There is no deduction for the contributions but the earnings will accumulate tax-free.

#### Are you turning 71?

If you are turning age 71 in 2010, you have until December 31 to convert your Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) to a Registered Retirement Income Fund (RRIF). If you were planning to make a final contribution to your RRSP before converting it to a RRIF, the contribution must be made by December 31.

If you have unused contribution room or will continue to have earned income you can make contributions to your spouses' RRSP after you turn 71.

There may be more you can do, so speak with your tax advisor to determine actions you might want to take that are appropriate for your particular circumstances.

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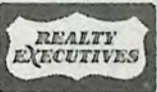
