Arts Council continues busy season

Arts in the Park - A \$5,000 grant will be used to develop an Arts in the Park program for August 18 at Manning Park. This is part of a provincial celebration marking 100 years of provincial parks.

Drummers - A drumming workshop will be held April 16. See Nadine McEwen at Riverside Centre for details.

Arts & Culture Week is April 10-16 this year. Delegates for Princeton - Vicky Jones, Robin Lowe, President Del Hall and Treasurer Marjorie Holland will attend the assembly of BC Arts Councils in May to represent Princeton and to learn what is new in regard to organizations and government grants.

Contest for young gardeners - Princeton Garden Club is sponsoring a contest for youngsters to encourage them as gardeners. This year, they

will be asked to grow big squash and pumpkins.

Traditional Music - The Traditional Music Festival will take place August 19 to 21. Although it is months away, 30 musicians have said they are coming. The Traditional Music Festival AGM takes place at Riverside Centre on March 24. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Historic Clean-up - The Similkameen Branch of Okanagan Historical Society holds its annual general meeting on March 31 at Riverside Centre. This year, the members will hold a work party on April 16 to 17 to clean up the stamp mill site in Hedley. If you would like to be involved, contact Jon Bartlett.

Performing Arts - The youth group will be presenting Hansel and Gretel, May 6 to 8. The adult group will present Bill W. and Dr. Bob in June.

She covered every aspect of running the concession, and Fall Fair members were really pleased with the proposal, voting in favour of having Bernard and her crew take charge of the concession. John Bey, President of Racing Days, said he liked the proposal as well.

A drill team made up of young riders from the Okanagan will be featured at the Fall Fair on Sunday, September 4. RCMP identify accident victims

RCMP report that as a result of the fatal collision that occurred on March 7th, 2 kilometres east of Princeton on Highway 3, the driver of the green Pontiac, Kelly Pockett age 23 of North Vancouver, suc-

cumbed to her injuries and died in Kelowna hospital on March 15th.

The passenger of the Pontiac, Michael Gibson age 25 of North Vancouver died on March 7th.

"The Pontiac was westbound on Highway 3 when it entered a left-hand curve," says Cst. J. L. Peters of (SOTS) South Okanagan Traffic

Services at Keremeos RCMP Detachment.

"The road was wet with a light covering of snow. The vehicle lost control and hit the cement barrier on the outside of the curve."

The Pontiac bounced off the barrier crossing over the center line rotating sideways into the path of an oncoming white Hummer.

The driver of the Hummer, a 58-year old Penticton resident was treated and released from Princeton Hospital.

The investigation is continuing along with BC Coroner's Service.

Museum Society elects new executive

Thirty-one members turned out for the annual general meeting of Princeton Museum and Archives Society on March 23. The meeting began with a review of 2010 by outgoing President Kathy Clement. She commented on Princeton's 150th anniversary celebration and its success, and noted 2010 set a record for the number of visitors to the museum.

Councillor Frank Armitage conducted the election of a new Board of Directors. Bob Wicks was elected President, with Terry Malanchuk as Vice-President. Jon Bartlett is Secretary and Jerome Tykstra is Treasurer. Directors are Evelyn McCallum, Diane Sterne and Lori Thomas.

President Wicks took the chair to conduct the rest of the meeting, which dealt with current and future activities. He began by saying, "This will be an exciting year."

Speaking of the renovations and development plans in the works, President Wicks stated, "I see a museum the community can be proud of. I think our museum will be a place people will want to come and see."

The Museum Society was asked to participate in the 20th anniversary of Backcountry Horsemen and the 100th anniversary of B.C. provincial parks. The occasion is the opening of a new facility for horsemen at Manning Park on July 30. The matter was deferred to the April 13 museum meeting for further consideration.

The renovation of the museum is going well and slightly ahead of schedule. Robin Lowe outlined a

floor plan for displays, which will include a prehistoric cave entry, a log cabin, and special displays of the history of logging and mining. The museum staff have had the assistance of the curator of Kamloops Museum, Thompson River University, and movie set designers from Vancouver.

The design and layout was estimated to cost approximately \$110,000, but the Museum Society has only the \$50,000 Stout legacy fund. This amount is not sufficient to complete even the first phase of display plans. Our local mine management has a plan for Mining Week festivities which will include

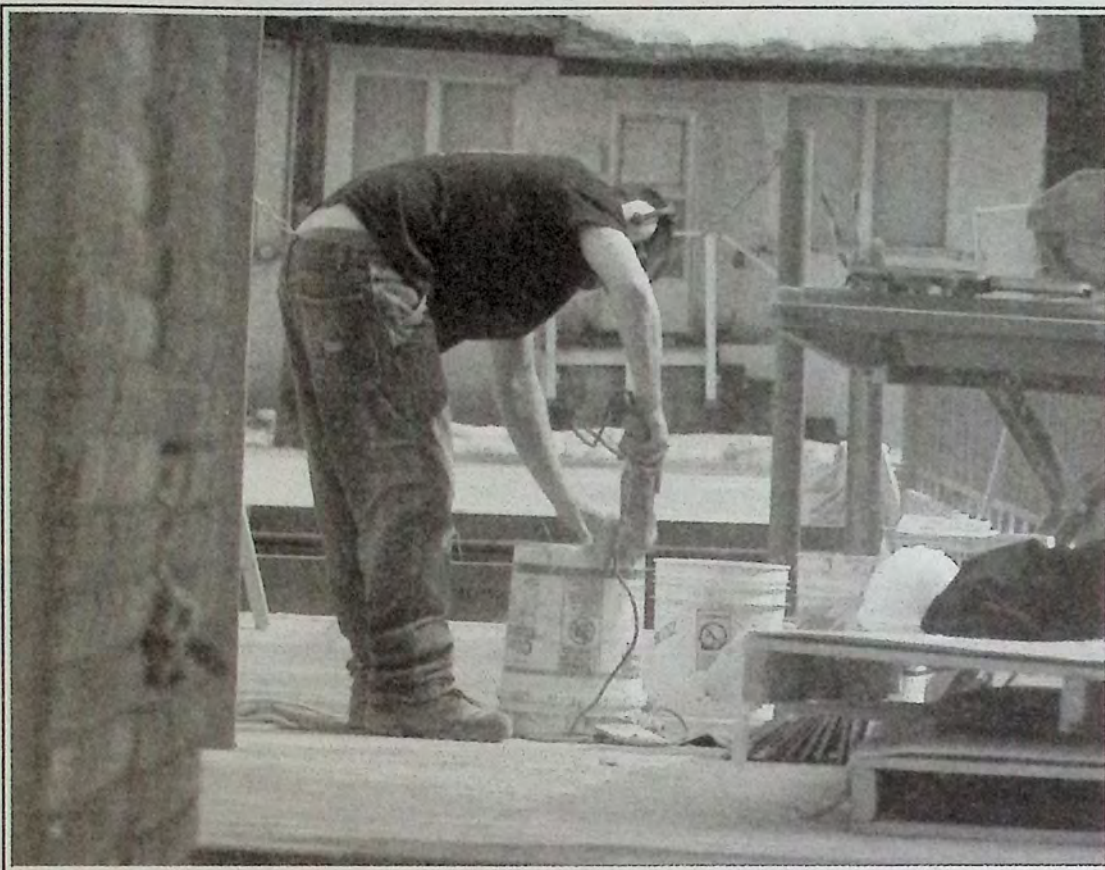

Town Council has entered into an agreement with Argo Road Maintenance to exchange winter and summer road maintenance services.

This works well, as both the Town and Argo use many of the roads in the same area.

The Town has agreed to allow Barry Beecroft Fuel Distributors

Ltd. the right to level some of the industrial park area. Beecroft will use the moved material to fill a depression in the area Beecroft will use to construct a new cardlock facility.

Patrick Robins has been appointed Chief Election Officer for the civic elections to be held November 19 this year. Shirley

McMahon has been appointed Deputy Chief Election Officer. They will organize the civic election procedure and secure additional staff for election day.

Members of Town Council were pleased to volunteer to participate in the Keremeos Rodeo parade to be held May 23. They enjoyed themselves last year at this event.

Councillors agreed to participate in Earth Hour (March 26th).

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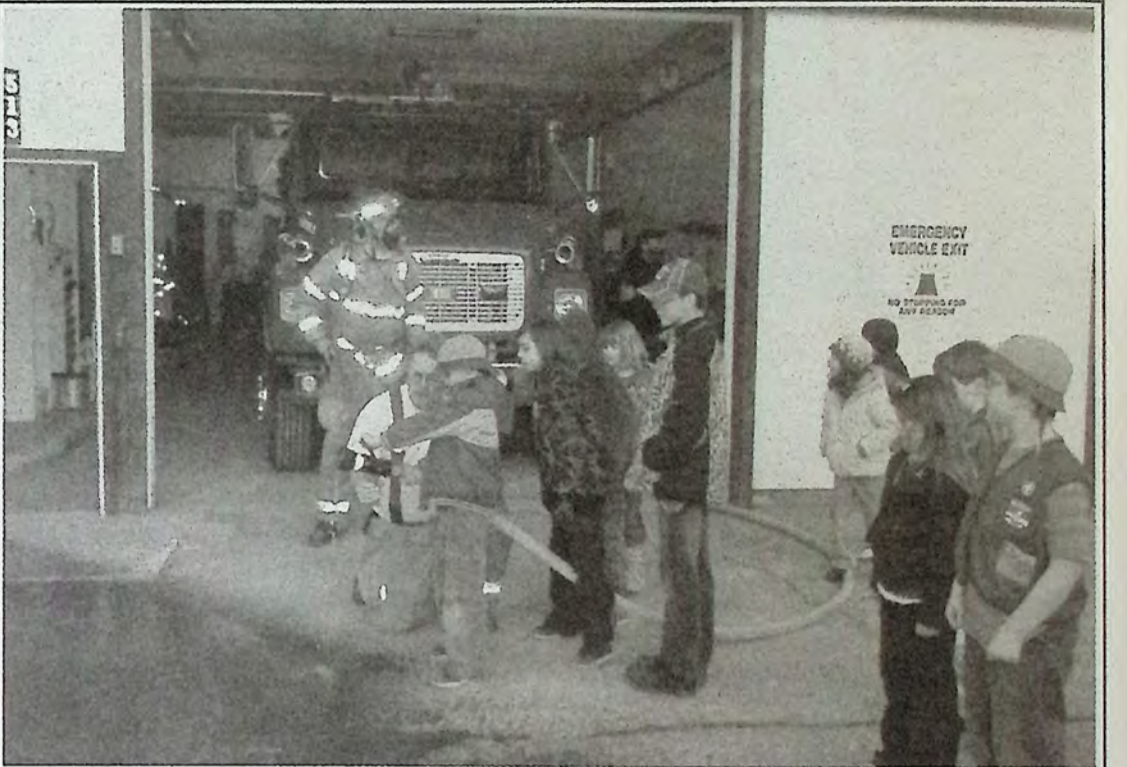

RDOS announces April collection dates

Yard waste collections will occur in Okanagan Falls, Twin Lakes, Oliver, Osoyoos, Keremeos and Electoral Areas 'A' (Osoyoos Rural), 'B' (Cawston), 'C' (Oliver Rural) and 'G' (Keremeos Rural/Hedley) the week of April 4 to 8.

Homes in Penticton, Naramata, Kaleden, West Bench, Heritage Hills and Carmi will get yard waste collected the week of April 11 to 15.

Residents are asked to place yard waste out by 7:00 AM on their regular garbage collection day during their scheduled week.

Yard waste can now be placed out in clear bags, in compostable kraft paper yard waste bags or in clearly identifiable regular garbage cans. Small branches must be 7.5cm/3-inches or less in diameter and shorter than 1 metre/3-feet in length. Branches can be bundled

with twine or string or placed in clearly identifiable regular garbage cans.

Bags, containers and bundles should weigh a maximum of 25 kilograms/55-pounds. Food waste, large branches and lumber are not included in this service and should not be mixed in with yard waste.

During the month of April, the RDOS will be hosting a series of composting events. On April 9 and 10, the RDOS will host a free Master Composting/Recycling

workshop. This is a two-day intensive composting session for residents interested in teaching composting and recycling in their community. Pre-registration is required.

Sego announces positive results

Sego Resources reports that rock geochemistry results from phase one of the percussion drilling program on at Miner Mountain have been received for 22 of 34 drill holes.

The grid drilling was over a gossan cap and a Titan 24 IP anomaly (2km x 250m) known as the Cuba Zone. These preliminary results indicate that at the east end of the grid the mineralized zone is open to the North, East and South. Results for the holes at the west end are pending.

Highlights include:

- Percussion Drill Hole 9-with 24 metres of greater than 10,000 ppm

copper and including one 2 metre section of 10,597 ppb gold (10.597 grams/t) the hole was very well mineralized, top to bottom.

- Percussion Drill Hole 21 was also mineralized top to bottom with 4 metres of greater than 10,000 ppm copper.

- Percussion Drill Holes 2, 8, 12, 13, 14, and 15 also bottomed in significant copper and/or gold mineralization.

These preliminary results indicate that at the east end of the grid the mineralized zone is open to the North, East and South. All results over 1,000 ppm copper are being

sent for fire assay.

Sego Resources Inc.'s sole project is the Miner Mountain Project, a Copper Gold Porphyry project near Princeton, 15 kilometres north of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation's former copper producer, which closed in 1996.

CMMC (Copper Mountain Mining Corporation) is planning to restart full production in June 2011. The Miner Mountain Project is situated within the Traditional Territory of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, with whom Sego has a Comprehensive Memorandum of Understanding. - submitted

The proposed Amendment is as follows:

The purpose of which is to articulate the policies within the Town of Princeton Official Community Plan to encourage the transition of properties from industrial to residential in the Burton Flats area.

How do Canadians sleep at night?

(NC)—There are many reasons why it's important to get a good night's sleep. When we don't get enough sleep, our productivity and behaviour are affected. This in turn affects our quality of work, and the quality of our family and personal life.

Sleep also plays an important role when it comes to our health and well-being. Lack of sleep is associated with increased risk of heart disease, stroke, diabetes, obesity and depression.

But how much sleep is enough? Experts say that most adults need somewhere between 7 and 9 hours of sleep every night. However we all know that simply going to bed doesn't necessarily guarantee a good night's rest. In 2009, a reported 34% of Canadians suffered from sleeping problems at one point during the year.

Studies have shown that there are many factors that affect our sleep patterns. The study, "Who gets any sleep

these days? Sleep patterns of Canadians," showed that on the whole, women get more sleep than men. However, women also have a tougher time getting to sleep and staying asleep.

A study, published in the Spring 2008 edition of *Canadian Social Trends*, used data from the 2005 General Social Survey (GSS) on time use to explore what affects our sleep patterns:

Children: Canadians with no children in the household got more sleep than in households with children under the age of 15. The more children they had, the less sleep they got. Those with at least two children slept 25 minutes less, while parents with only one child slept 17 minutes less.

Marital status: Married Canadians and those in common-law unions sleep less than others. Specifically, single people (never married) slept 24 minutes longer than people living with a partner.

Commuting: People with long commutes of an hour or more per day reported that their sleep lasted about 7 hours and 41 minutes. People with short commutes, 1 to 30 minutes, slept on average 22 minutes longer.

Income: On average, someone who made \$60,000 or more a year slept 40 minutes less on any given day in 2005 than someone who made \$20,000.

Stress: Stress reduces the amount of sleep that everyone gets. Men who felt that they were constantly under stress slept 35 minutes less than those who report little stress. Stressed out women slept 25 minutes less than their stress free counterparts.

Work: Overall, the more we work, the less we sleep. People who had worked for more than 9 hours on the day slept for only 7 hours and 32 minutes. This was 41 minutes fewer per night than people who had worked for less than 4 hours, and 55 minutes fewer per night than people who did not work any paid hours at all.

Tips for the road to smobriety

(NC)—The journey to quit-smoking is different for every smoker. Whether you're thinking about quitting or have made the decision to quit, making a commitment to becoming 'smober', or smoke-free, can be rewarding for your personal health, the health of your friends and family, and your wallet. The first step towards smobriety is to set a goal, whether it's to simply cut down or quit altogether.

Having a plan to help you stick with your commitment, can also keep you motivated along the way. To help you get started, here are a few tips from former smokers who have successfully quit:

1. Pick a quit date.

Set yourself up for success. Pick a realistic quit date that's not too soon or too far in the future. Mark it on your calendar to help you prepare.

2. Find a support system.

Sharing your experiences with others going through similar quit-journeys can help keep you motivated to achieve your goals. Online communities like Smober Up (www.facebook.com/smoberup) give you the chance to share and support with other smokers throughout your journey.

3. Arm yourself with the right tools.

You may crave a cigarette but don't give up. There are more nicotine replacement therapy options than ever, including the patch, gum or inhaler, so you can find the method that works best for you to fight cravings. Not only will these tools help you on your quit-journey, they can also increase your chances of quitting successfully.

4. Avoid triggers.

Try to steer clear of people, places or

activities that make you feel like smoking – at least until you feel confident enough to fight off cravings. Alcohol and coffee are usually strong triggers for smoking. Change your routine and try to avoid alcohol if it weakens your willpower, and limit tea and coffee to a few cups a day.

5. Celebrate your achievements. Celebrate each milestone you achieve along the way. Whether

you've made it through your first day without a cigarette, or your first year, it's important to recognize and celebrate your achievements, no matter how big or small.

As you begin your quit-journey, share your quit-goals with loved ones and think of all the reasons you want to quit smoking.

Put Some Ginger In Your Life

The healing power of ginger has been proclaimed by experts for thousands of years. Although ginger is not used a great deal by North Americans, it is an ingredient in a high number of Asian dishes. Asians have always used food as medicine, and ginger is a very tasty medicine.

Ginger can help prevent motion sickness. In studies done in the USA and the Netherlands, those who took ginger pills actually suffered much less motion sickness than those who took a widely used patent medicine. If you suffer from motion sickness, try taking a 1/4 teaspoon of powdered ginger 20 minutes before going on an automobile journey or boarding a ship. You can stir the ginger into a cup of hot water or tea.

Ginger is very effective for nausea, too. Just follow the instructions above to settle an upset stomach.

If you suffer from migraines, ginger could be your best friend. If you feel a headache coming on, take 1/3 teaspoon of powdered ginger in your tea or hot water. You may find it helps ward off the headache.

Ginger provides relief for most people suffering the pain of rheumatoid arthritis. Those who suffer from osteoarthritis will find some relief, too. Put a few slivers of fresh ginger in a cup of boiling water and drink it. If you must use powdered ginger, take 1/2 teaspoon in a cup of boiling water.

For those who have problems with blood clots, ginger may be the answer to your problems (unless you are taking anti-clotting medication). Ginger thins the elements in the blood that cause clotting. Ginger stops blood platelets from sticking to artery walls, and thus wards off clots that could cause a stroke or heart attack.

If you have never used fresh ginger, which is the best form of ginger to add to your food, simply peel it and grate it. A small amount of ginger goes a long way. Crystallized ginger is nearly as good, and is easier to store.

Ginger is good in cakes, cookies, chicken dishes, seafood dishes, stir fry, and goes well with pork and in some beef dishes. If you are over 60 years of age, try to use ginger in your food at least once a week.

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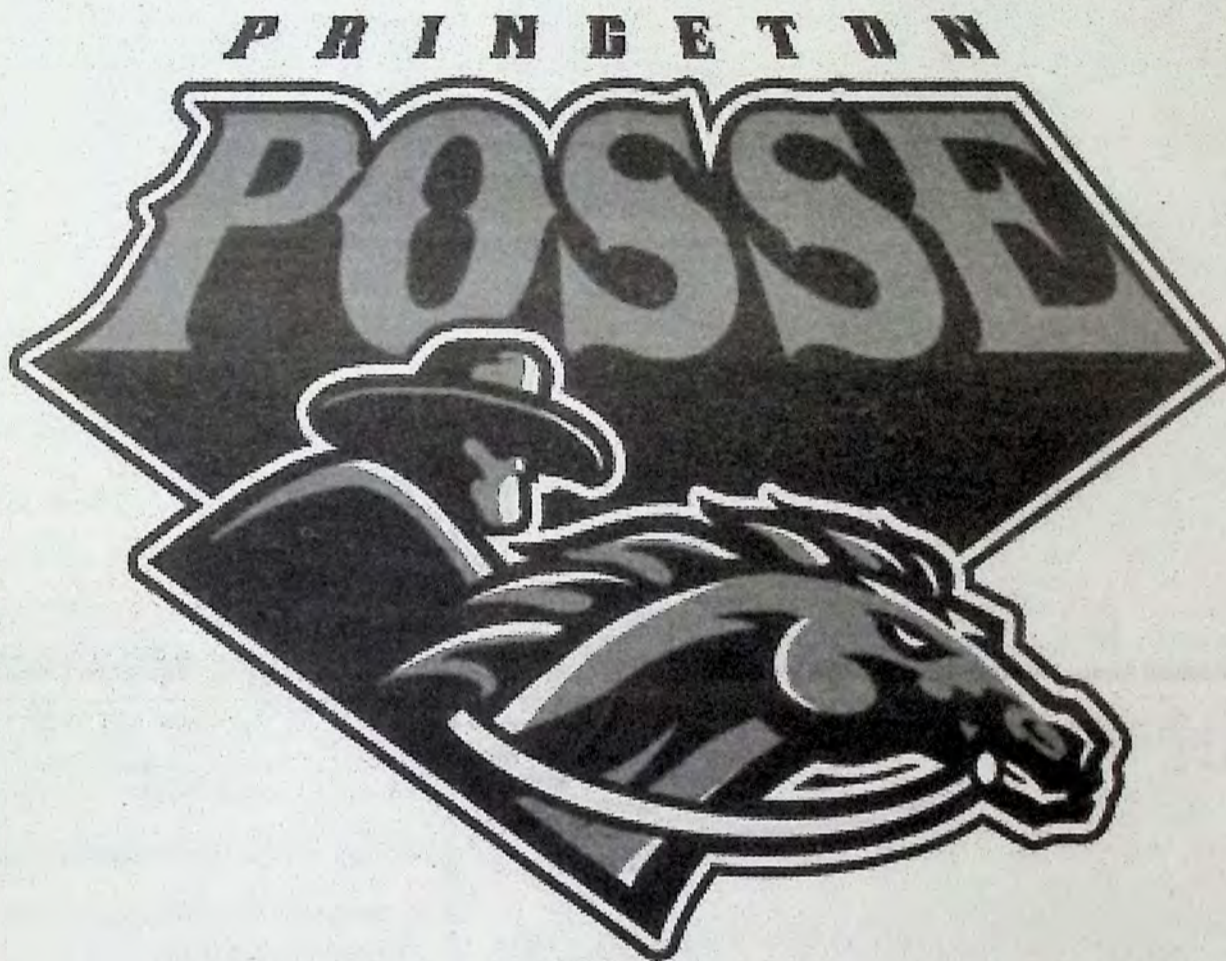

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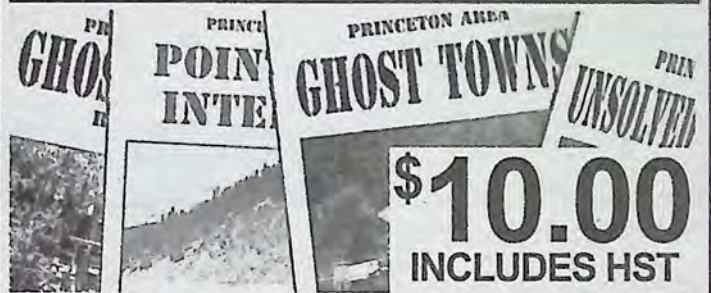

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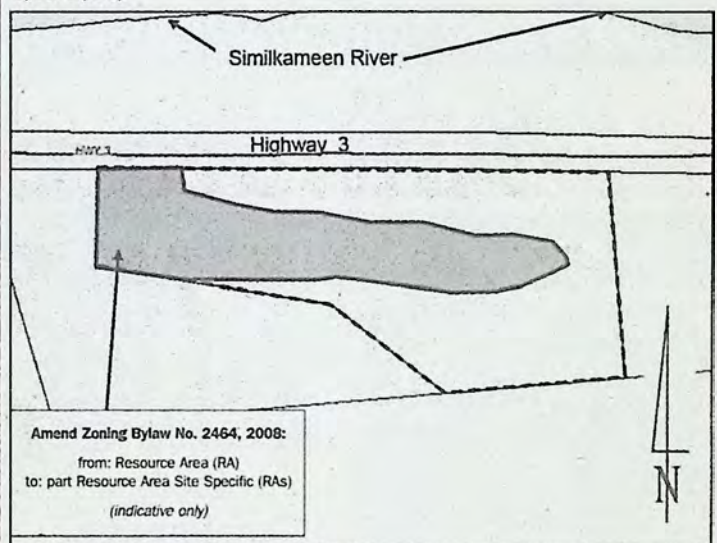

Mushroom Empanadas

(NC)—These tasty bites make a great hors d'oeuvres, or a light supper when eaten alongside a green salad. They can be prepped the night before you plan on serving them (just bake them the next day) and they also reheat well.

Empanada dough:

- 2 cups (500 mL) all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) whole wheat flour
- 1 tsp (5 mL) salt
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) all-vegetable shortening, cold & cut into cubes
- 1 large egg
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) ice water
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) vinegar

Mushroom filling:

- 1 tbsp (15 mL) unsalted butter
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) olive oil
- 2 fat cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 small red onion, minced
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) fresh thyme, stems removed
- 1 lb (500 g) button mushrooms, sliced & roughly chopped
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) kosher salt
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) white wine
- 2 tbsp (25 mL) heavy cream
- 1 cup (250 mL) Asiago cheese, grated
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten with 1 tsp (5 mL) of water

Combine flours and salt in a large bowl and stir. Add shortening and use your fingers to blend until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

In a small bowl, whisk the egg with the ice water and add in the vinegar. Slowly pour into the flour mixture and use a fork to gently incorporate it. Gently knead the dough until it comes together into a ball - two or three times should do it.

Wrap the dough in plastic wrap, flatten it slightly with the palm of your hand, and chill in the fridge for at least 1 hour.

Heat oil and butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and onion and saute until soft. Add mushrooms, thyme, salt and pepper and cook until the ingredients start to turn golden and fragrant. Add wine, stirring, until it evaporates. Turn down heat and add cream, stirring until it absorbs into the mixture. Remove from heat and let cool. Preheat oven to 400F.

Roll out dough to 1/8 inch thick on a floured surface. Use a 3 1/2-inch circle cutter to cut out circles of dough. Scraps can be collected, re-rolled and cut into circles.

Place about a teaspoon of the mushroom mixture onto each circle, topping with some cheese, while leaving a half-inch border around the filling. Brush the egg wash on the empty side of the circle and fold dough over to create a semi-circle. Use a fork to press the edges tightly together. Brush the egg wash over the tops of all of the completed empanadas and place on cookie sheets lined with parchment or silpat. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until the empanadas are golden brown and flaky. Let cool slightly before serving.

Makes 18 empanadas.

MP says budget fails to address farmers' priorities

New Democrat Agriculture Critic Alex Atamanenko (BC Southern Interior), says he's disappointed but not surprised that the Conservatives failed to make agriculture a priority in last week's budget.

"Those of us who have to work with Conservatives and their antics at the Standing Committee on Agriculture can tell you that this government isn't interested in acting on the real concerns facing farmers in a future filled with uncertainties," said Atamanenko.

"Nothing in this budget will take the country even one step closer to having the comprehensive national food strategy that most farm organizations and civil society groups are calling for."

According to Atamanenko the Conservatives remains oblivious to the fact that, for many food growers, income stabilization programs are still failing to be bankable and responsive.

"I know farmers will be disappointed that, once again, the federal government is refusing to include Business Risk Management as an eligible component of the Agri-Flex program," said Atamanenko.

"It is also abundantly clear that the much needed costing review of railway charges that are gouging farmers is never going to happen under a Conservative government."

Atamanenko says he would have liked to see much more in the budget to nurture the local food movement that is gaining in strength as Canadians try to do more to support

farmers and eat healthier food.

"There is nothing in the budget to address the dire situation facing Okanagan fruit growers in BC who have lost so much money due to the yearly dumping into our markets at harvest time by the US and China as a result of trade agreements. All in all, what is clearly indicated in this budget is that Conservatives are determined to stay the course with the same failed policies and lack of vision that will ensure the number of family farms in Canada will continue to decline," concluded Atamanenko.

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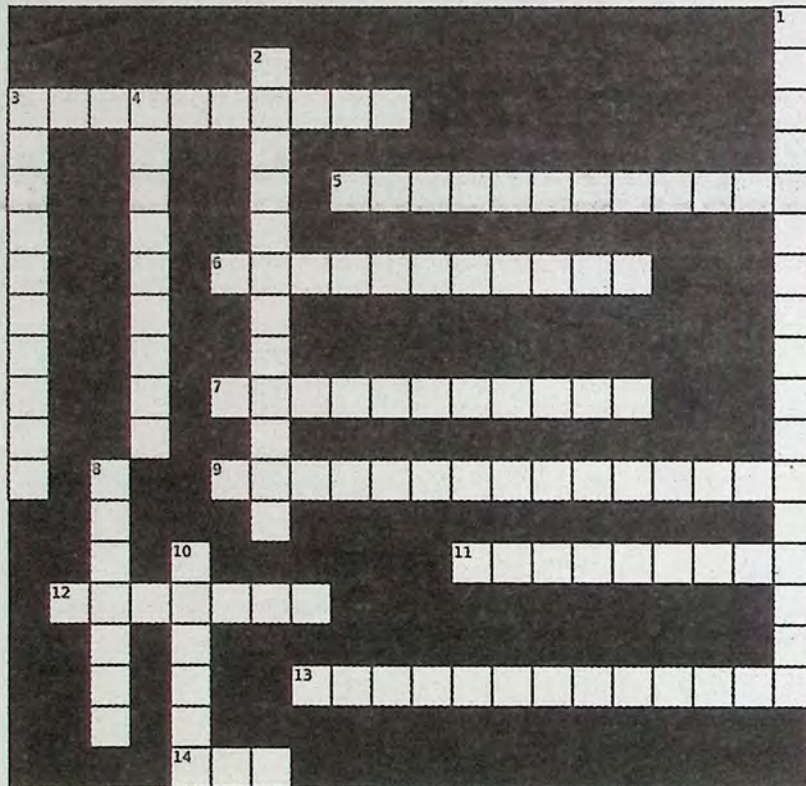

I Like To Call It A Routine

A conversation I was in last week led to a different conversation over breakfast a few days later. The original conversation revolved around ritualistic behaviour. The second conversation revolved around routine actions.

Rotary supports pre-school program

Princeton Rotary Club President Ken Blower presented a \$1,300.00 cheque last Friday to Susan Hamilton of Communities For Kids and Nicki Forde from Little Folks Nursery School, but do you know what the pre-school program is all about?

Princeton Communities for Kids Preschool Support Program

Organization Mandate

Communities for Kids is a volunteer organization of parents of preschool children and other interested persons established in each community of the South Okanagan and Similkameen under the direction of Interior Health. The initial organization of the Princeton group took place in the spring of 2003 at two large community meetings and led to the determination of an executive committee referred to as the community table. The mission statement of the Princeton Communities for Kids is, "To create and develop opportunities for children and families to grow mentally, physically, emotionally, and socially within the community of Princeton and district, focusing on childhood development for 0-6 years of age."

Project Rationale

The Preschool Support Program was developed in response to a 2004 Communities for Kids

Princeton needs assessment and in response to the Early Development Instrument, an early years learning instrument, administered to Princeton kindergarten students. The Early Development Instrument, designed by Dr. Hertzmann of UBC, indicated that many Princeton children enter kindergarten lacking the skills known to support school success. These children lack the background knowledge for developing concepts and vocabulary, not the ability to learn.

Model early interventions; for example, the Abecedarin Project and the Perry Preschool, provide compelling evidence of the significant benefits and longterm savings that preschool programs create for schools and society. Preschool programs address the child characteristics considered necessary for successful school readiness, including knowledge,

skills and dispositions. Preschool programs also facilitate the early identification of students with special needs and the timely referral of these students to professionals.

Program Description

- Objective

Princeton is fortunate to have an established preschool program at Little Folks Nursery School. The Communities for Kids Preschool Support Program was established to financially assist more children to attend Little Folks Nursery School for 2 sessions a week in the year preceding their entry into kindergarten.

- Funding

The cost of funding one student for two sessions per week at Little Folks Nursery School is \$1,300. for one school year. Because Interior Health does not provide any funding to the Communities for Kids organization to establish children's

Is Japan The Start Of 2012?

There has been a lot of hype about the Mayan prophecies connected with December 21, 2012. While that date is, in itself, not significant, the earth changes predicted may already be in progress. To understand why 2012 is significant, you really need to understand the position the earth is taking in the Milky Way galaxy. Our solar system spirals through the galaxy at a rate of 25,800 years to complete an entire revolution through the galaxy. The Mayan calendar, which is remarkably accurate, reveals a return to a specific location in the Milky Way galaxy. Due to the slow pace of our solar system through the galaxy, the Mayan prophecies can apply to as much as 20 years before that date and 20 years afterward.

There is no question we are experiencing Earth changes, the least of which is climate change (or, to use the previous term, global warming). Earth's resonance (vibration) has increased from 8 Hz. to 13 Hz. Magnetic north is shifting 40 miles per year closer to Russia. There is a significant increase in earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. For example, in the week before Japan's catastrophic earthquake, there were 12 volcanoes erupting, nine of which were on the Pacific ring of fire.

Although the Mayan prophecies do predict major changes in the form of catastrophic events, those events will not happen just because the date reads December 21, 2012, and will not occur the way Hollywood has shown. Perhaps one of the most significant of the prophecies applies better to what has happened in Japan with the meltdown of the nuclear reactors. This prophecy is interpreted to mean that we will be victims of our own technology and we will have to reconsider the role of technology in our lives. I doubt there is a better example of technological disaster than the meltdown

of a nuclear reactor.

In the Book of Revelations in the Bible, there was a hint of a disaster called "wormwood". The translation of the name "Chernobyl" is "wormwood". Many Christians believed the Chernobyl disaster had been predicted in Revelations. Whether or not that is true, it was our first example of an all-out technological disaster. As a result of the Chernobyl disaster, 985,000 people died. Most of them died slowly and painfully, and some are still suffering more than 20 years later. If you would like to know more about that disaster, see nukefree.org website. (Internet coverage of Japan's disaster was far better than television.)

After Chernobyl, many nations began to reconsider the impact of nuclear energy plants on our environment, but long before Chernobyl, a nun, Dr. Rosalie Bertell, wrote a book about the impact on nuclear energy on our planet. Her book is titled *No Immediate Danger*. The key word is "immediate". She wrote about the danger of increasing background radiation on earth, and predicted a big increase in the number of cancer patients. That prediction proved true in the 35 years since her book was published. After Chernobyl, there was more citizen pressure than ever to stop nuclear weapons proliferation and to stop constructing nuclear power plants. Chernobyl is still a disaster. Experts say the "contained" power plant is still not properly contained. Contamination will continue for several more thousand years.

Despite the Chernobyl disaster, some nations kept trying to tell us how safe nuclear power plants are. Canada has been foremost in promoting so-called "safe" nuclear power plants, because Canada makes money from supplying the basic materials that go into nuclear generators, and from our Candu reactors. In 2010, there was a television advertisement promoting nuclear power. The letters kept rearranging to finally make the word "clean". There has never been anything safe or clean about the production of nuclear power, no matter how much is spent on advertising. The potential always exists for some kind of failure leading to the release of radioactive materials into the air or the water.

Right now, Ontario is considering constructing two more nuclear power plants. President Obama is

busy telling the world nuclear generating plants are safe, and he has a bill before Congress for \$38 Billion to construct two more nuclear power plants in the U.S.A. In fact, the week after the Japan disaster, Obama was busy telling Americans how safe nuclear power plants are. That same week, an "accident" at the Pickering, Ontario nuclear plant dumped radioactive water into Lake Ontario.

What really boggles my mind is how ridiculous it is to say we need more nuclear power plants. Yes, we need more electricity, but have you any idea how much electricity could be generated by spending \$38 billion on solar panels and wind farms? Not only would it generate power, it would be "green" power. We do have alternative sources of power. We do not need more nuclear power.

Why don't governments push for more green power like solar panels? I could not figure this out until I realized that no major utility corporation can see making a profit from solar energy. I don't know why they can't see it, because Sweden is already encouraging people to produce power through solar panels. In fact, some people have been able to retire early on the money they make selling power from solar panels. If everybody converted to solar panels, there would be a lot more electricity available for industry and for places that can't produce solar power very well.

If the Mayan prophecies are true, then we really MUST rethink our technology so it doesn't kill us. To do that, we have to become militant. We have to protest. We have to make our governments, and our world leaders, understand that we will not accept more nuclear power plants, and that we would like the present plants shut down and buried.

While we are protesting, we should also campaign to make the production of nuclear power an international crime, because when a nuclear disaster occurs, there are international consequences. We received radioactive fallout from Chernobyl, and now from Japan. To me, that is an international consequence none of us wants.

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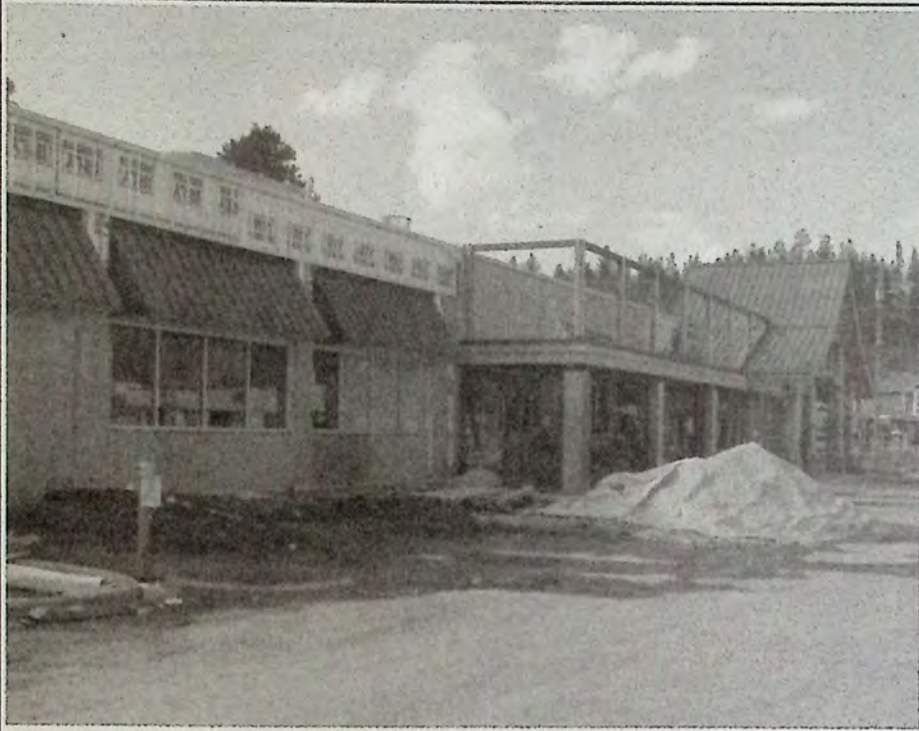


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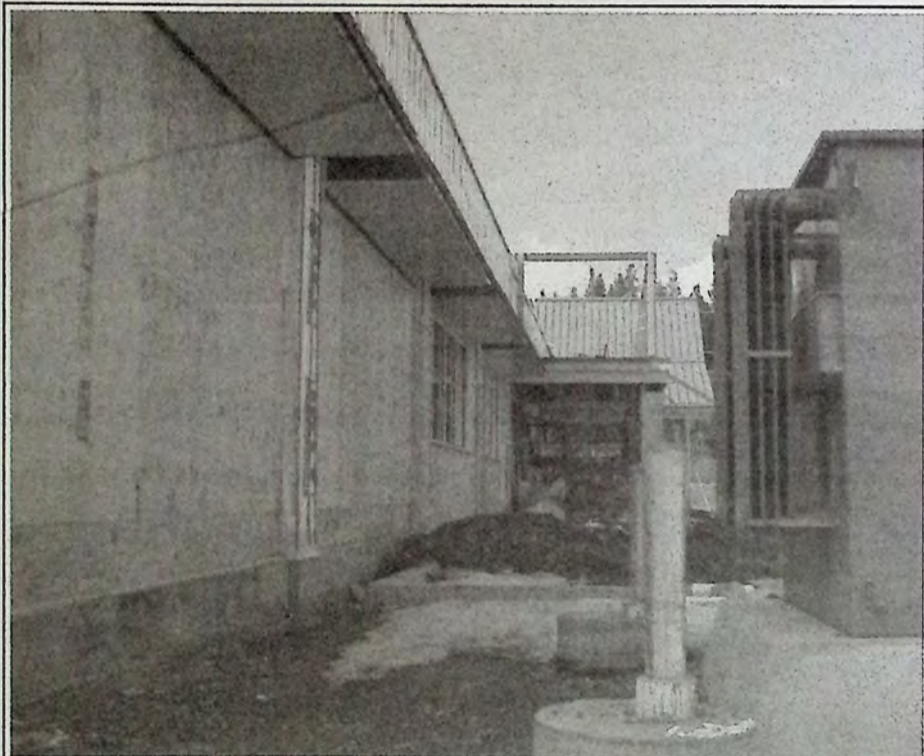

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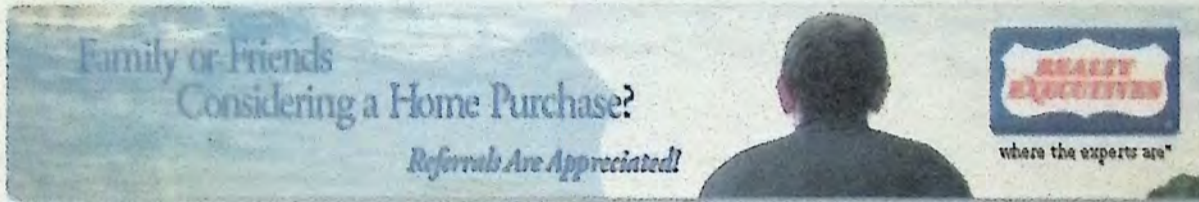
