Let's Jump In - slogan for new pool

Tanya ter Koers attended the June 6 Town Council meeting to provide an update on the activities of the Aquatic Centre Committee. The committee has developed a Face book page, and the slogan "Let's Jump In" to inform the public about the proposed aquatic centre before the referendum. Public meetings will be held in the near future.

The Aquatic Centre Committee was divided into sub-committees, one to develop the financial aspects and the other to communicate with the public. The cost of the proposed facility has not been fully determined at this point but will be available when public meetings are

held. Council noted there are a number of rumours around town about how much the aquatic centre will cost, but those are strictly rumours.

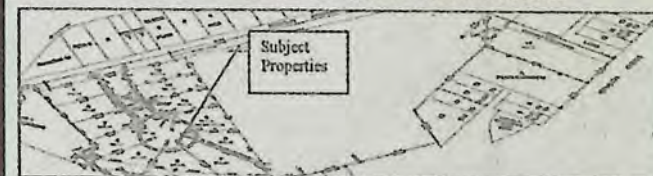

Copper Mountain processes first ore

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced June 6th that construction of the processing plant is complete and on scheduled for June 2011 production from the Copper

Mountain Mine. Mining is proceeding as planned and has been delivering ore to the primary crusher since mid April.

The Company has been stock piling ore as part of preproduction mining activities. The coarse ore stock pile

at the mill has in excess of 190,000 tonnes of mill feed that has been crushed in the Company's new primary crusher. On May 28, 2011 the commissioning of the mill was started with the first ore being processed. With the mechanical equipment

adjustments completed, production commenced on June 4, 2011. The start up has gone smoothly and it is anticipated that full production will be achieved by mid June.

"Following the receipt of our production permit on April 1, 2010, our contractors, suppliers, and our operating team have performed an outstanding job in completing all the challenges for our planned June 2011 production start. The processing plant and related facilities are all functioning well and meeting our expectations," states a news release.

The Official Mine Opening Ceremony will be held in mid August 2011, details will be announced in the near future.

CMMC (Copper Mountain Mining Corporation) will hold its annual general meeting of shareholders on Thursday June 23rd at 2:00 PM at the Terminal City Club, Presidents Room, 837 Hastings Street, Vancouver BC.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain is a Canadian resource company managed by an experienced team of professionals with a solid track record of exploration and development success. The Company's shares trade on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the symbol "CUM".

Copper Mountain owns 75% and Mitsubishi Materials Corporation owns 25% of the Copper Mountain Project. The 18,000 acre mine site is located 20 km south of the town of Princeton.

The Copper Mountain Project has a current resource of approximately 5 billion pounds of copper, the Copper Mountain Project is fully financed (\$438M) and in construction and on schedule for the mine to produce approximately 100 million pounds of copper per year by mid 2011.

WATER RESTRICTIONS

Water Restrictions will be in effect May 15, 2011.

By conserving today, we reduce the need for expanded facilities and costly upgrades to the water system.

What are the rules?

- Lawn sprinkling regulations are in effect from May 15 to September 30 every year.
- There are four stages of restrictions, each stage allowing less water use.
- Stage 1 comes into effect automatically on May 15 of every year unless more stringent water conservation measures are needed. Stages 2, 3 and 4 are implemented according to the severity of the water shortage. Each level requires increasingly larger reductions in water use.
- Residential, multi-family, commercial, Industrial, institutional and public properties are all required to follow the regulations.

Stage 1 Restrictions will be in effect May 15th.

- Even numbered civic addresses may water on Wednesdays, Friday and Sundays.
- Odd numbered civic addresses may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
- No watering is permitted between Noon and 6:00 pm.
- Watering is not permitted on Mondays.
- Washing of boats or motor vehicles with a hose is permitted only if using a hose with an automatic shut-off device.
- Public sector entities are restricted to three days per week at any time.

Bylaw Enforcement Officers will enforce all levels of the water restrictions bylaw. A person who contravenes the bylaw commits an offence under the Offence Act and is subject to a fine.

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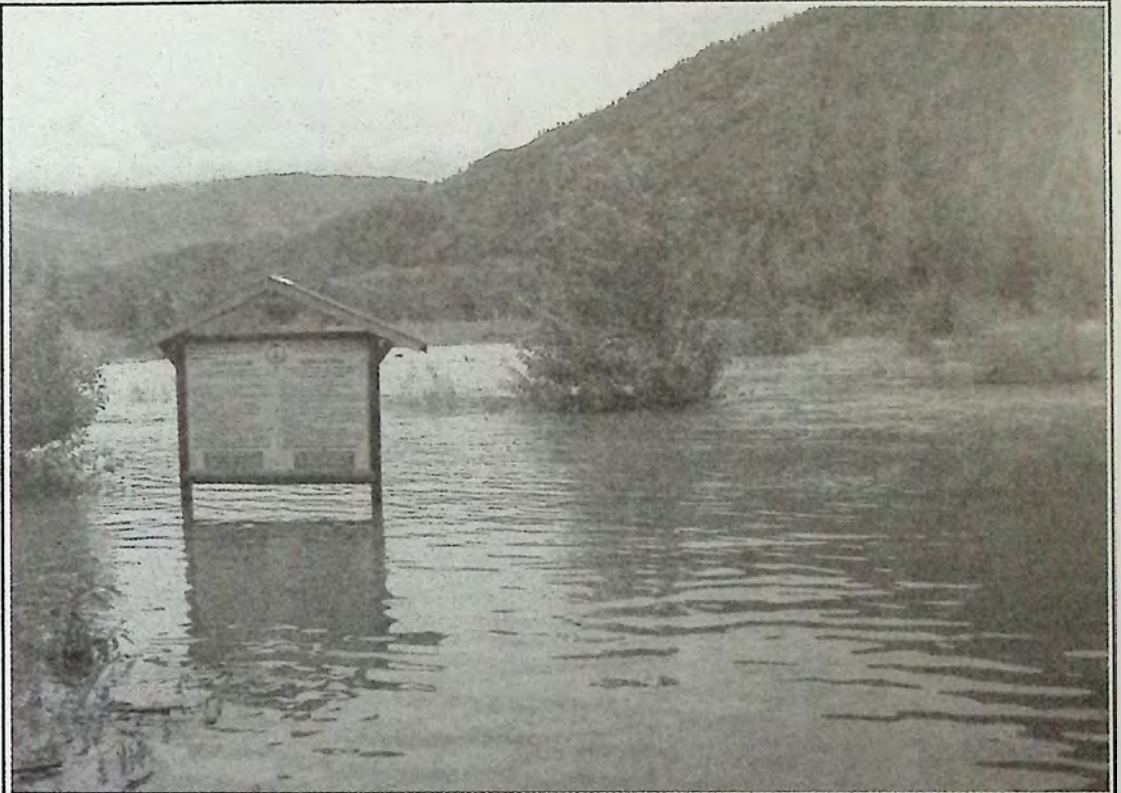

Village issues Council news

Here are the Village of Keremeos "Media Highlights" from the June 8th regular meeting of Council:

Council confirmed several motions made by the Committee of the Whole at its May 30, 2011 meeting including:

- Agreeing to replace yield signs with stop signs at the intersection of Richter Street and Sparks Drive near the Similkameen Elementary Secondary School to provide for additional safety of pedestrians and vehicular traffic; and
- Agreeing to allow the Recreation Commission to place concrete patio blocks in Memorial Park to provide a pathway from the

Veterans Avenue parking area to the outdoor pool, in advance of a paver stone walkway being installed once funds are in the Village's budget to do so.

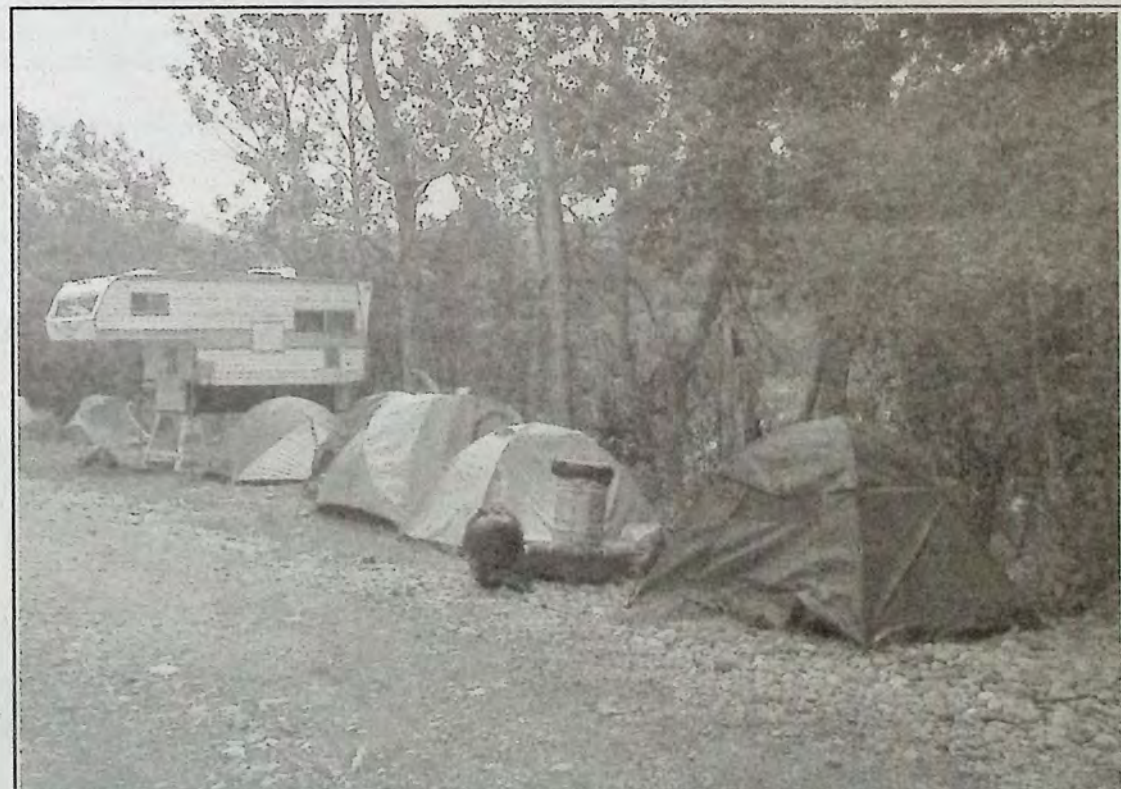
Council members reported on various meetings they had attended since the last Council meeting including a dinner meeting with the Princeton Council. Keremeos had won the Earth Challenge in 2010, and Princeton Council agreed to purchase dinner for the Keremeos Council members.

Discussions took place about the Similkameen Farm Workers Campground located just east of the Village's boundary along the

Similkameen River, and that a temporary location was being used while the river levels continue to be high.

Council passed a resolution to give first and second readings to a Zoning Amendment Bylaw to rectify some minor discrepancies between actual setbacks on properties in a 6 unit bare land strata subdivision and the original site specific Zoning Bylaw.

Council further resolved to waive the public hearing for this amendment as there is no impact to neighbouring property owners as most of the properties are developed and the amendments are very minor in nature.

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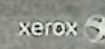
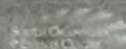

Safety tips can help gardeners avoid injury

(NC)—Any green thumb will tell you there's plenty of hard work required to make your garden grow. Lifting and hauling, digging, aerating and planting are all good exercise, but they can also lead to injury.

The good news is: it is possible to have a beautiful spring garden without suffering for your horticultural art. It starts with a little know-how. That's why the Ontario Chiropractic Association is relaunching Plant and Rake Without the Ache, a public education program aimed at helping gardeners stay pain-free.

"Improper gardening techniques

are a frequent cause of injury in the spring," says OCA President Dr. David Brunarski, noting that commonly seen injuries among gardeners range from repetitive strain injuries of the wrist and elbow, to sprain and strain injuries, especially in the lower back, as well as wear-and-tear on joints and muscles.

"Simple things, like warming up before you begin and staying hydrated can make a big difference."

Here are a few stretching tips that will help you make your garden the envy of the neighbourhood while helping you stay active all season long.

Warm up with a short, brisk walk, then gently repeat each of the following stretches five times. Hold all stretches for 15 to 20 seconds. Stop if it is painful.

• **Thigh Stretch:** With one hand on the wall or a tree, bend your left knee then reach back and hold your ankle with your right hand. Pull your heel toward your buttocks and hold for 30 seconds. Relax and repeat with the other leg. To stretch the back thigh muscles (hamstrings),

with one hand on the wall or a tree put one foot on a chair, stump, or step. Slowly bend forward from the waist until you feel the pull at the back of your thigh. Hold for 30 seconds. Relax and repeat with the other leg.

• **Back Stretch:** Sit on a chair and slowly bend your body forward from your hips, putting your head down and resting your hands on the floor. Hold, then relax.

• **Shoulder Rolls:** With your arms hanging loosely at your sides, slowly rotate your shoulders in a circular motion forward, then backward.

• **Wrist Extension:** Hold one arm straight out as if you were giving a 'stop' signal, use your opposite hand to hold this position. Hold. Repeat with the other hand.

• **Wrist Flexion:** Hold one arm out in front, palm down. Bend your fingers until they point toward the ground. Use your opposite hand to hold this position.

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Living Past 100

The E. Coli Scare: Protect Yourself

The outbreak in Europe of a new strain of E. Coli bacteria has many people worried that it might be our problem next. Try not to be alarmed. The first thing you need to know about E. Coli is that the major source of the bacteria is cattle manure, particularly cattle manure that comes in contact with food.

Fresh produce is usually the source of any E. Coli outbreak. Raw produce served in salads can be contaminated by E. Coli if the vegetables are not properly washed. This is especially true in areas where liquid animal waste is sprayed on crops.

The new strain of E. Coli is resistant to antibiotics, and some people in the health food industry are convinced this new E. Coli is the product of cattle given too many antibiotics. In many places in our modern world, cattle are kept penned together in filthy conditions and are regularly given antibiotics to prevent the cattle contracting disease. As E. Coli is natural to cattle, there is a certain logic in the argument that using antibiotics on the cattle can create a strain of bacteria resistant to antibiotics.

Regardless of how the new strain of E. Coli developed, your best method of avoiding E. Coli is through washing your salad vegetables very well. In general, water containing chlorine will do the trick, but there are other products which will work. A teaspoon of hydrogen peroxide in a sink full of cold water will be a good place to wash your vegetables.

When making a salad, after you have washed the salad contents, wash your hands in the same solution. Do not transfer contamination from unwashed vegetables to any other food. Even if you are going to cook a vegetable, wash your hands after preparing the vegetable for the cooking pot.

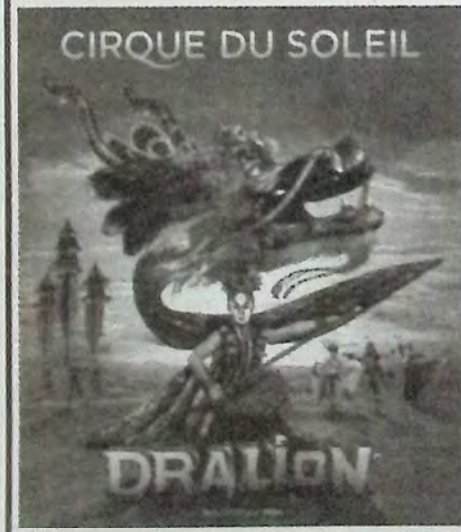
If you eat salad in a restaurant, you may be taking a risk. If you like a hamburger deluxe with the lettuce and tomato on it, you may be taking a risk. The key to dining out safely is knowing the restaurant and its level of caution about fresh vegetables.

You are entitled to ask. Generally, restaurants have far higher standards of food handling than the average home kitchen, so your risk of infection is higher at home unless the family cook has taken a Food Safe course and follows the rules strictly.

E. Coli is not a new bacteria, and it can kill people who may not have the resistance they need. That is why there are rules about food handling and keeping kitchens very clean.

In addition to washing food carefully and keeping your kitchen clean, there is one other thing you can do to protect yourself: eat probiotic yoghurt daily to build up the good bacteria in your digestive system.

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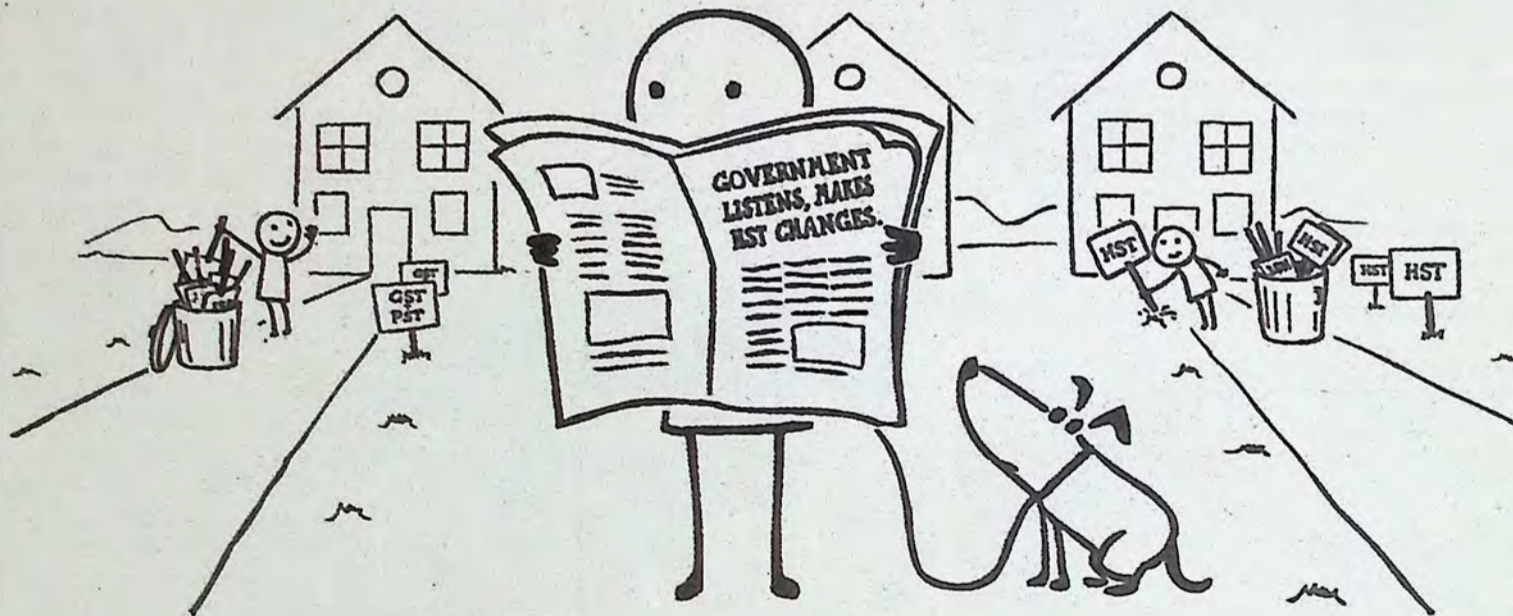

After listening to British Columbians, the government has proposed an HST reduction from 12% to 11% by 2012, then to 10% by 2014. This proposed change will take effect if the province votes to keep the HST in the referendum. If B.C. votes to return to the GST + PST system, the combined rate will remain at 12%.

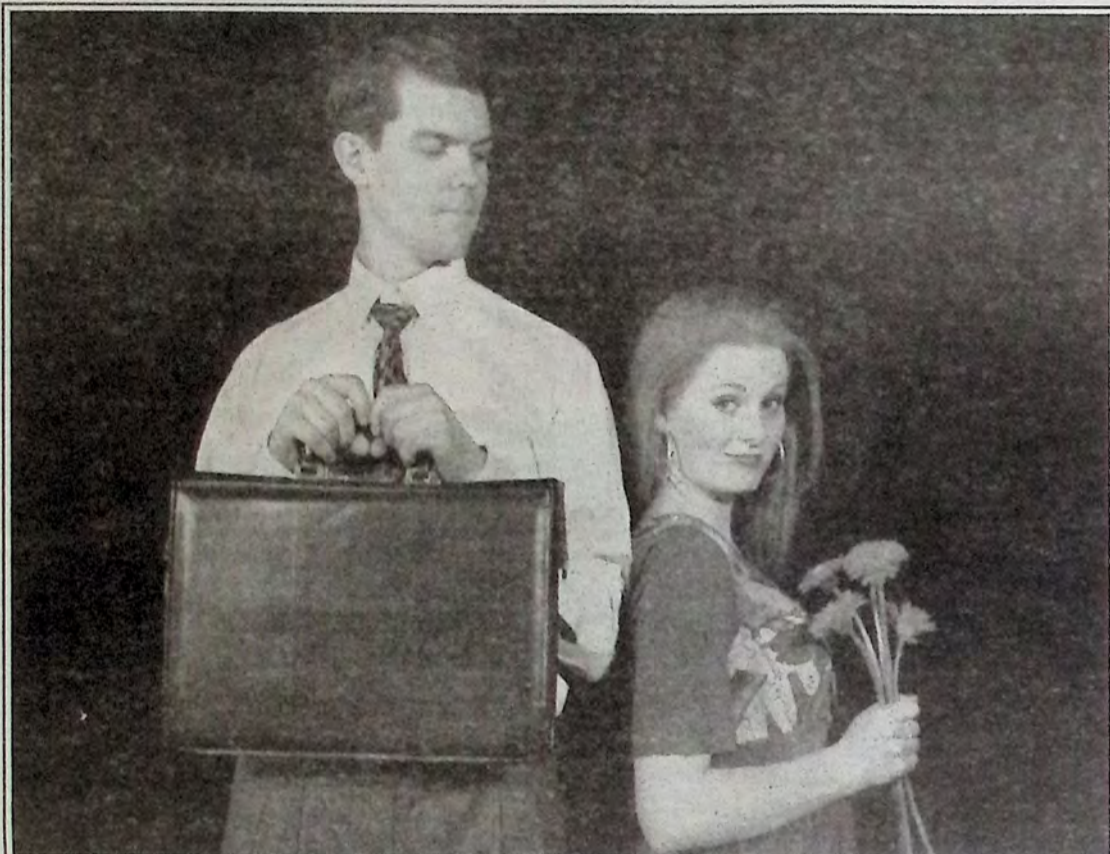

Hot & Cheesy Mushroom Dip

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp oil (15 mL)
- 1 tbsp butter (15 mL)
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 lb. fresh mushrooms, cleaned and sliced (500 g)
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 1 tsp thyme, chopped (5 mL)
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup white wine or broth (50 mL)
- 1 (4oz) package cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup sour cream (125 mL)
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise (50 mL)
- 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese, grated (50 mL)
- 1/4 cup grated parmigiano reggiano (50 mL)

1. Heat the oil and melt the butter in a pan.
2. Add the onion and cook until it starts to caramelize, about 20 minutes.
3. Add the mushrooms and saute until they start to caramelize, about 20 minutes.
4. Add the garlic and thyme and saute until fragrant, about a minute.
5. Season with salt and pepper.
6. Add the wine, deglazed the pan and cook until it has evaporated.
7. Puree 1/2 of the mushrooms in a food processor.
8. Mix the mushrooms, cream cheese, sour cream, mayonnaise, mozzarella and parmigiano reggiano and place in a baking dish.
9. Bake in a preheated 350F oven until bubbling and golden brown on top, about 20-40 minutes.

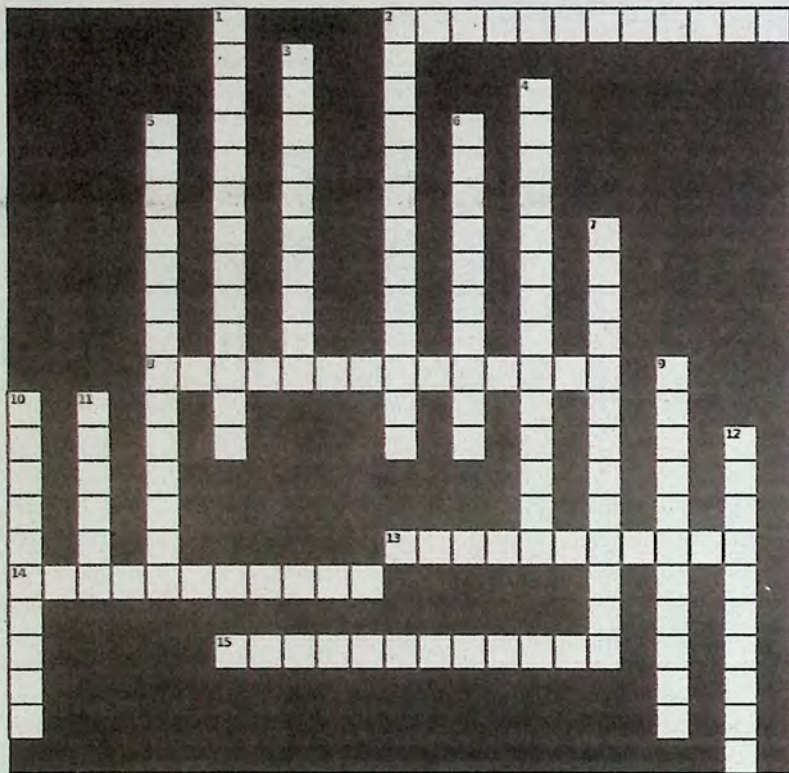

I Love It When I'm Right!

I always have lots of ideas and opinions, and a lot of the time I get ridiculing feedback. This was the case back in the 1980s when I opposed privatization. Well, I was right.

Another time, back in the 1980s, I sounded off about all of the mergers going on. I said mergers do not create wealth and corporations should be looking for opportunities to create wealth. I had a lot of negative feedback on that topic, too. Well, I was right.

I opposed deregulation, too. I was against NAFTA. I said it would do Canada no good, it would be set up to benefit the United States. Some people thought I was just misinformed, and tried to persuade me we would have bigger, better markets for all our goods. Well, I was right again.

I questioned the whole concept of a "level playing field". Who would decide it was level? Why did it have to be level, and for whose benefit? I found out I was right to question it.

Now I have the satisfaction of knowing I was right, but what good does that do now?

How do I know I was right?

There is an American whistle blower who wrote a book called Hoodwinked. The author, John Perkins, is an economist who worked for the secret side of corporate America, which he describes in his other book, "Confessions of an Economic Hit Man". You can borrow these books at your local library.

Hoodwinked is a book about the deliberate, malice aforethought efforts of corporations to control not only the economy but the government of every nation that has some resource worth having. Perkins knows all about this sort of thing because he was helping corporations do this until his conscience got the better of him and he quit.

Perkins says he witnessed nation after nation being sucked into the corporate promise of abundance for everyone through the corporation moving in and the World Bank lending money for infra-

structure. The World Bank gave loans that far exceeded the nation's ability to repay, and then the corporations began privatizing the assets of that nation. The assets were things like health care, highways, hydroelectric dams, and in Argentina, water distribution. Corporate ownership of water in Argentina meant everybody paid for water, and it was against the law for people to collect rainwater. That ended with a rebellion a couple of years ago, when both the coerced government and the corporation had to back off.

Perkins explains why privatization is not good for the economy of a nation, and why it is not good for the people of that nation. You simply must read this book.

Deregulation is not good for the economy or the people, Perkins says. He points to deregulation as one of the primary reasons for the present recession that began in late 2007. The deregulation of how corporations conduct business was, in his view, the beginning of the recession and he warns that the world economy will continue to undergo these major recessions until governments insist on regulating corporate behaviour as they did before the 1980s. The latest news out of Wall Street? America is falling into a great, great depression NOW. America is not recovering.

When it comes to the NAFTA so-called "free trade" deal, Perkins is quick to state the deal was loaded in favour of the United States right from the start: that was the intention. He states, on page 155, "Free Trade is a euphemism; it prohibits others from enjoying the benefits offered to the multinationals."

People who object to the way the corporations operate, or who will not cooperate with corporation goals, are often labelled "terrorists", although they might just be fighting for the legitimate rights of the people. I quote Perkins again: "The 'terrorists' I have found in Andean caves and desert villages are people whose families were forced off their farms by oil companies, hydroelectric dams, or 'free trade' agreements."

Perkins describes the strategy used to enslave Third World countries. It begins with seduction of government leaders, then is followed by big infrastructure loans by the World Bank. Then, when the country cannot pay the debt, the corporation moves in to save it by appropriating assets that belong to the people.

The corporations will hire local labourers at starvation wages, and the governments held in bondage will be forced to quell any opposition to the new conditions. Those

leaders who will not cooperate are disposed of somehow and replaced with more cooperative leaders.

Iran is a good example of this technique. In 1951, the people of Iran elected Mohammed Mossadegh who promised to force foreign oil corporations to share more of the oil money with the people of Iran, or the companies would be taken over. Then Mossadegh did what he promised. The CIA launched a campaign to create public unrest in Iran and Mossadegh was ousted, and spent the rest of his life under house arrest. Put in his place was the newly crowned Shah of Iran, who was quite happy to do business according to corporations. Iran became Americanized during the 1960s, but during the 1970s, the Iranians were fed up with the American corporations and kicked them and the Shah out of Iran. Ayatollah Khomeini took over, and was portrayed as a religious fanatic. The oil of Iran is now controlled by the people of Iran. They are doing it their way. These days, Israel, shortly after a visit from Obama, announced "somebody" should bomb Iran's nuclear facilities to prevent them from developing nuclear missiles, although there is no proof Iran is developing missiles. Shades of "weapons of mass destruction"? Or shades of "I want your oil"?

While there is no doubt that the people have been hoodwinked by corporations, none of this would have been possible without government collusion, whether in a government body or by select politicians. Perkins named Brian Mulroney's government as one that went hand in glove along with the corporate agenda. Fortunately, Canada did not deregulate and privatize to the extent that the American government did, and I believe we have to watch our governments to make sure they do not go any further with this nonsense.

Perkins has nothing good to say about overpaid, socially irresponsible CEOs who manage these corporations. He calls their brand of capitalism "predatory capitalism". This predatory capitalism may be the cause of the so-called April Spring of the Middle East, which has now spread to Europe. You are not hearing much about the peaceful protests of Europe. Start watching BBC and CBC

news if you want to hear about it. You may not have heard about the protest in Peru, where peasants have blocked the international highway with boulders and barbed wire to protest a Canadian mining firm, Bear Creek, which wants to build a silver mine near Lake Titicaca. The development has been halted for six months while the government studies the situation.

Perkins does not advocate protests such as those in the Middle East, or

Europe, or South America, but people all over the world are catching on to the corporate seduction and coercion techniques. The goals of predatory corporations are just more money.

No recognition is given to the people who make money for the corporations, the people who actually do the work and create something others need. There is no concept of giving workers a share of the wealth they create. It is no wonder

ordinary people have taken to the streets to demand a fair deal. In our country, this has not happened so far, but it could happen here unless we give fair warning now that we will not tolerate any more predatory capitalism.

After saying all this, I urge you to borrow the book *Hoodwinked* and have an eye-opening read. I have told you only a small portion of what Perkins exposes about corporate/government evil.

VTS News

The Vermilion Trails Society has been busy doing some much needed maintenance work on the Trans Canada Trail between Princeton and Tulameen.

A lot of the trail bed has been graded along this stretch, most of the rockslides have been removed, and work has been done to fix some river slippage. We also had a steel tunnel placed at the sand slide at kilometer 123 to allow for safe passage through the continually sloughing slide area.

This section of the trail is a wonderful place to spend some time biking or hiking. The trip through the canyon is truly breathtaking. A quick note to those looking at traveling this section of the trail at this time of year - please remember - the river is high due to spring freshet, and can cause unstable banks during full flow. Please ensure you stay safe by keeping to the inside of the trail bed when traveling next to the river.

The Vermilion Trail Society is dedicated to improving the entire 113 kilometers of trail in our district so that hikers and bikers will be able to use it without having to concentrate on watching the trail underneath them instead of the natural beauty that surrounds them.

Our focus is to make the entire trail bed from Osprey Lake to Brookmere an enjoyable destination for daytrips and trekkers alike, with

a well-groomed surface that is easy to travel. As we are a non-profit society with limited funds and a lot of trail bed, we recognize that this will not happen overnight, but with a dedicated group of volunteers, we are working hard to make the improvements as quickly as possible.

Over the next few months you will see the gazebos at Jura Station and near the Parr Tunnel get facelifts, riprap placed to prevent river erosion, removal of fallen trees, and other general maintenance issues. As funding becomes available, we will address grading issues between Princeton and Osprey Lake, as well as various other projects we have on our "wish list".

Another event we have coming up quickly is our Summer Solstice "Art For the Park" Dinner and Silent Auction being held June 18th on our new pedestrian bridge over the river in Princeton.
