PXA sets work priorities

The maintenance work at Princeton's fairgrounds facility never seems to end. At the June 21 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), a look at the budget and the work that needs to be done called for setting some priorities. The first priority was to finish the job of cleaning, repairing and refreshing the barn stalls in preparation for horse racing on June 30.

Lyn Melnechenko raised the issue of the leaking roof on the ag barn, and the potential for leakage to

damage the structure. Terry Inglis said that would have to be the next project, and members agreed. John Bey had received quotes from two fencing companies for finishing the fencing work that needs to be done.

Stan Thompson reminded everyone that the septic system for the main washrooms and concession had to be checked before the horse racing. The priorities were set: septic system, roof repair, and then, if there is enough money, finishing the fencing. Water pipe leakages continued on Page 3

Pool committee hosts first meeting

It started with an open house-style gathering at Riverside Centre on June 21st and shifted to a presentation and question period regarding the proposed pool project.

Approximately 90 people attended the event, including most members of the 20-member pool committee.

The committee was formed with the number one task of providing information to allow residents to make an informed decision when voting on the upcoming referendum in September. The committee also has in its mandate the requirement of encouraging public input every step of the way leading up to and following the referendum vote.

On first glance through the handouts provided at last week's public meeting it became very clear that

the committee is trying very hard to be transparent and unbiased.

A recreation Master Plan conducted in 1998 identified a new indoor aquatic centre as the top priority in the community and the new Official Community Plan confirmed the need for such a facility was a high priority.

Since then, a number of community meetings were held in 2008 to examine the feasibility and design of the Princeton and District Family Aquatic Centre, but economic conditions in 2009 forced a temporary shelving of the project.

Positive changes in interest rates, the local job climate and an increase in the Home Owners Grant to residents in rural BC have sparked a renewed interest in the

project, which led to the formation of the local pool committee.

The referendum is set for Saturday, September 24th and if passed will allow the Town of Princeton to borrow up to \$6-million for the \$9.3-million project. Residents will assist in the payback of that loan through a system identified as a Parcel Tax. In other words, everyone pays the same amount on their property taxes rather than a formula measured against assessed value of local properties.

At the time of last week's meeting the Parcel Tax was estimated to cost each homeowner \$129.60 (loan repayment) and \$155.00 (operating expenses) for a total of \$284.60 per year for twenty years. The rate will fluctuate slightly based on changes in interest rates and the number of properties paying the Parcel Tax.

Again, at the time of last week's meeting there were a total of 3,549 parcels with improvements in Princeton and Area H, which would share the expenses of the pool project.

RDOS Finance Manager Warren Everton summed it up with the statement, "It's not a cheap proposition, that's for sure."


The annual operating expenses are projected to total in the neighbourhood of \$592,000 with an operational deficit each year pegged at roughly \$542,000. Those numbers are based on operating the pool 90-hours per week, 12-months of the year although it was pointed out that September to May would probably be the busy time of the year for the facility.

Consultant Bill Webster said the Princeton pool would likely be open 75-hours per week and pointed out, "Pools, like libraries, attract the broadest spectrum of your population."

Some discussion after the presentation revolved around what the preferred of the six design options available did not have, such as only four lanes and no deep end, but Recreation Director Lyle Thomas emphasized more than once that the preferred design was a place to start and public input would be used to direct the project.

There will be many more meetings in the future and you are encouraged to attend them so that you are able to make an informed decision on referendum day.

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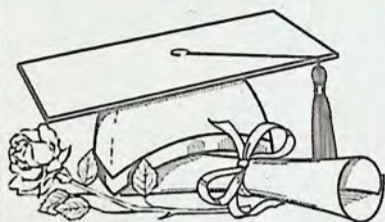

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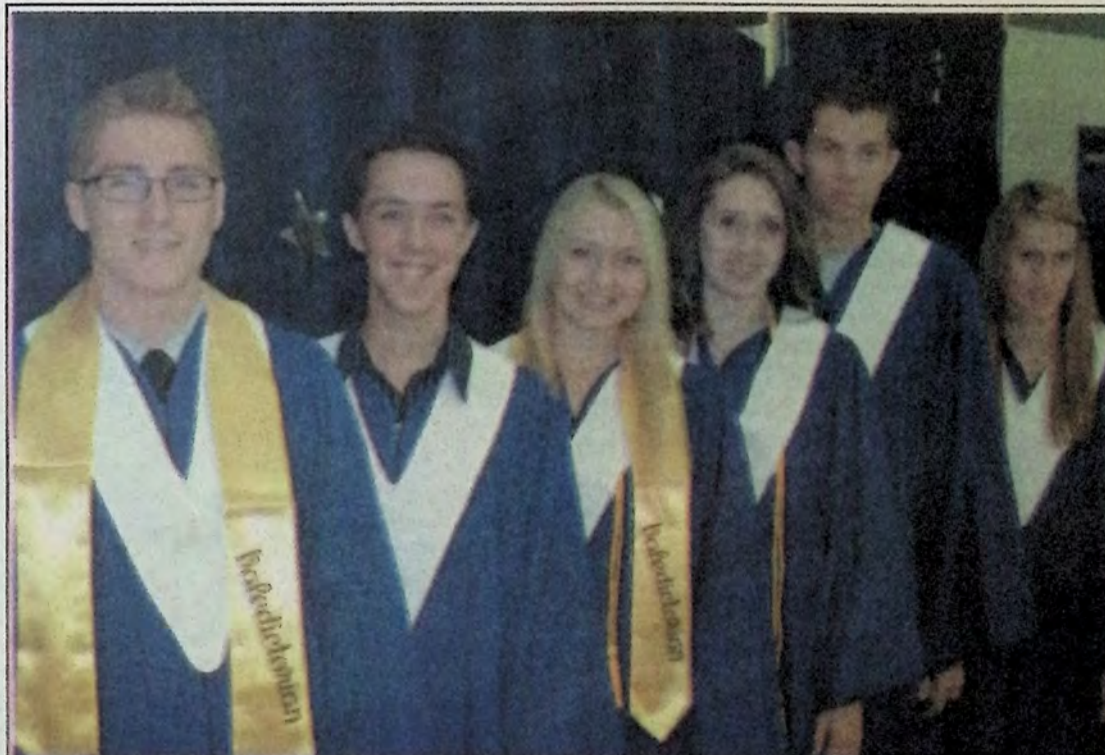
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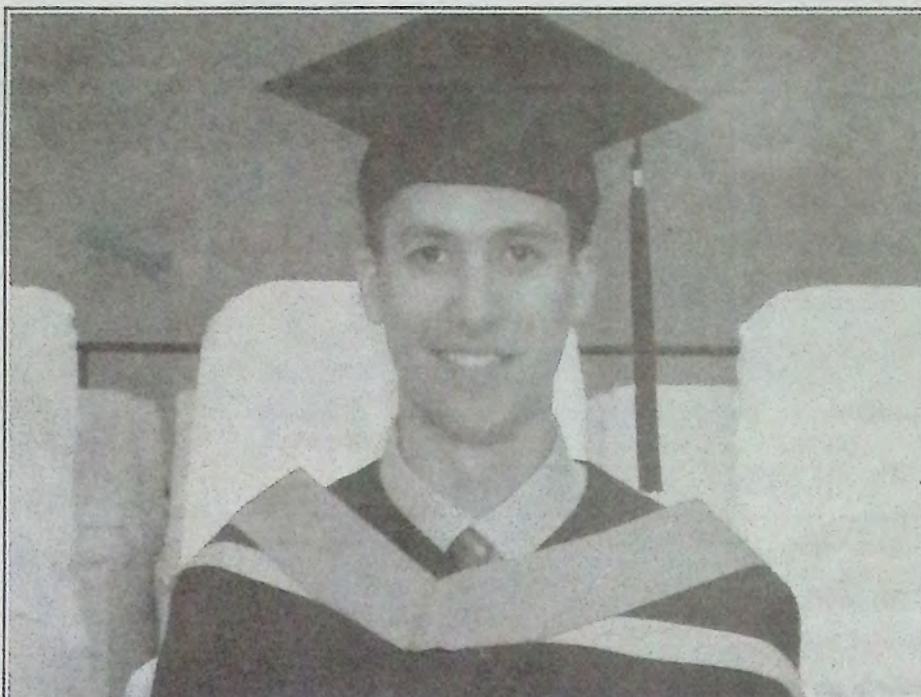

..... continued from Front Page near the front gate require some digging work for repairs, but this can wait a bit.

One of the projects put on the back burner again is an electrical distribution improvement project. This would be very expensive and there is just not enough money to do it, so it will wait another year, along with a few other projects.

Two work parties have been held, one on June 19 by the Fall Fair, and another on June 26 by Racing Days Association. These work parties did general clean-up, such as grass trimming, removal of some unsightly materials, and other small jobs. The Town cuts the grass before each major event. Each user group and the PXA tries to help other groups before the events. Lyn

Melnechenko reminded the PXA the rodeo arena needs to be worked on before the Little Britches Rodeo on July 23, as the ground is too hard.

Only two major events follow the June 30 horse racing: Little Britches Rodeo and Fall Fair (September 3 and 4). The Fall Fair will include horse racing this year, and everyone is hoping this will

prove successful for both Fall Fair and Racing Days Association. In the meantime, maintenance work must proceed as quickly as possible during the good months.

Another issue dealt with by the PXA was another request to move an RV onto the grounds. The PXA is developing a new policy regarding temporary camping on the grounds. Future campers will be

looking at rates competitive with regular campground rates. PXA members accepted the necessity of allowing camping on a temporary basis, as the PXA grounds are the only local area where people traveling with horses can find accommodation for themselves and their horses. Members agreed there should be no winter camping allowed.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS POLICY

- provide services or programs that are compatible or complementary to those offered by the Town. When a service or program is offered by a non-profit group or club, the community benefits from a more cost-effective provision of services;
- provide a service that fulfills some basic need, or otherwise improves the quality of life for residents of the Town of Princeton.

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“Salmon-Safe” farm has Similkameen Valley organic connection

The Pacific Salmon Foundation has announced that two lower mainland based organic farms have received their Salmon-Safe certification - the first farms to receive the distinction in British Columbia and Canada.

Salmon-Safe is an eco-certification label that provides landowners and farmers guidelines to help improve land management practices that impact salmon habitat.

Vancouver-based Klippers Organic Acres and the Bees Knees Christmas Trees in Chilliwack were the first two

farms to become certified as Salmon-Safe. Klippers Organic Acres is a near 40 acre operation including an organic orchard and market garden in the Similkameen Valley.

The Salmon-Safe program which is run by the Pacific Salmon Foundation and Fraser Basin Council was made possible through an \$80,000 RBC Blue Water grant.

Funding for the Salmon-Safe Program in British Columbia has been provided by the RBC Blue Water Project.

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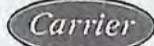

Can smoking impact more than health?

(NC)—We know the impact smoking has on our health, but what about our social life?

From social circles to life partners, tobacco is leaving more and more smokers in their own cloud of smoke.

According to a recent survey, smokers are more likely to surround themselves socially with other smokers compared to people who do not smoke.

In fact, almost three quarters of ex-smokers state that very few, if any, of the people in their circle of friends smoke. Smokers, on the other hand, tend to stick together as only one third say that few, if any, of the people in their social circle are non-smokers.

And it doesn't stop there! When it comes to relationships, smoking can be a major deterrent to non-smokers when playing the dating game, with as many as 60 per cent of non-smokers stating that they have chosen not to date someone because he or she smoked.

"When I was smoking, I felt like people would run off as soon as I lit up a cigarette," said John Beaven who was a smoker for almost 35 years.

"I spoke to my doctor about treatment options on my road to quitting smoking for good; and now that I am smoke-free, I feel more accepted in social situations."

Despite the impact of smoking on health, increased social stigma of smoking and the Federal Tobacco Control Strategy's goal to reduce smoking prevalence from 19 per cent to 12 per cent by 2011, 18 per cent of Canadians continue to smoke.

Quitting smoking is often difficult

and only 5-10 per cent of smokers will succeed in quitting cold turkey. Nicotine addiction is just as powerful as an addiction to heroin or cocaine.

Nicotine withdrawal symptoms are a major cause of quitting failure and can include: light-headedness, sleep disturbance, craving for nicotine, irritability, aggression, restlessness, poor concentration, depression or increased appetite.

Which Supplements Make Sense?

These days, there is a lot written about food supplements (also known as vitamins). There are so many on the market, and so many special combinations for this, that and the other ailment, that you could spend a fortune on supplements and not achieve much. A company in the United States has done some research and narrowed down what the most valuable supplements are.

This company puts Vitamin D at the top of the list for both men and women. Recent research into the benefits of Vitamin D have given the "sunshine vitamin" more roles to play in maintaining good health. For post-menopausal women and older men, a combination of calcium, magnesium and Vitamin D have top billing. Princeton Town Council News

Town Council met June 20 at the public library meeting room. No major business was transacted, but a number of small items were dealt with. Town Council will not have a public meeting following the July and August long weekends. Formal public meetings will be held July 18 and August 15.

The 2010 annual report is available to the public at Town Hall on request. This report contains the 2010 progress report and the 2011 strategic priorities, along with the audited financial statements and other pertinent facts related to the operation of the Corporation of the Town of Princeton.

Town Council granted permission to the Grads of 2011 to hold a parade through downtown Princeton before the prom begins.

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Frank Armitage expressed approval for the plan.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness reported on a conference she attended regarding health issues in the Southern Interior. One of the topics of discussion was the recruitment of physicians for rural communities, and Councillor Harkness said most of the rural community representatives expressed frustration at trying to have doctors move to their communities. She noted that Interior Health Authority has not filled a position of recruiter for the region, as the persons who had been doing the job were suffering ill health. She urged Council to pressure IHA to fill the position. She presented some recommendations about recruiting and Mayor McLean stated he would

call a meeting of the health committee to address the recommendations.

Mayor McLean and Councillors Harkness, Jason Earle and Frank Armitage commented favorably on the Dinner on the Bridge, remarking on the high quality of the dinner, the music and the unique experience of dining on the bridge. Mayor McLean stated it should be an annual event. The dinner raises funds for trail maintenance.

Fortis has given local citizens a device called an "amp check". This device is plugged into a socket and then an appliance is plugged into the device. The amp check then tells the amount of electricity the appliance consumes in a year. This assists the

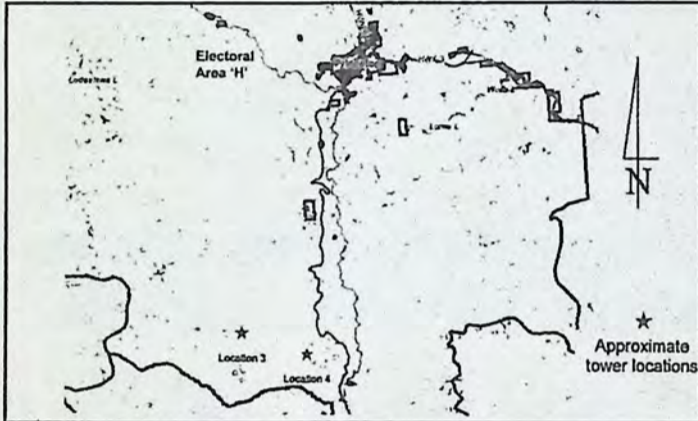

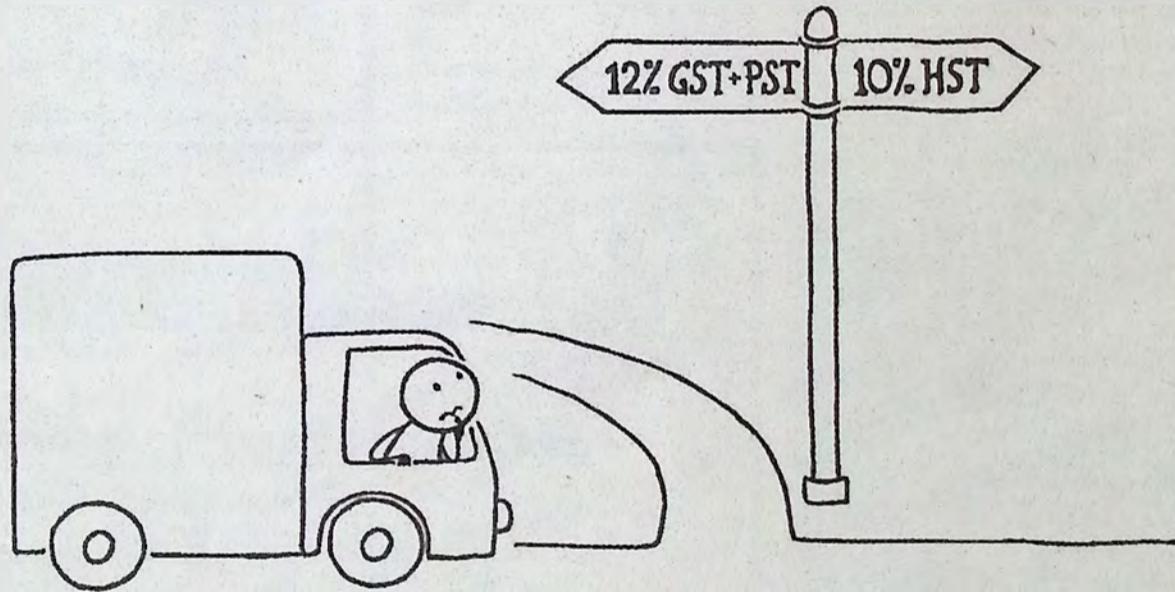

owner to determine whether the appliance is using excessive power and whether it should be replaced. The amp check can be borrowed from the public library during regular library hours.

The plan is basically the same as presented 20 years ago by Princeton Light & Power, but is being updated to meet today's requirements. Although the dam

will produce electrical energy, Mayor McLean stated he prefers to think of the dam as a reservoir providing water control for the Similkameen River and guaranteeing an adequate flow of water year round.

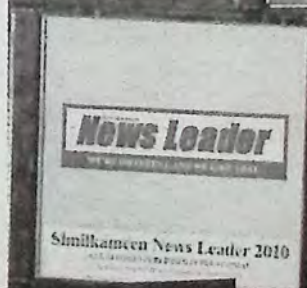

Blue Cheese Vinaigrette**

Serves: 4 / Prep time: 15 minutes / Grilling time: 6 to 8 minutes

- 4 New York strip steaks, each 10 to 12 ounces and about 1 inch thick, trimmed of excess fat
- Extra-virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt
- Ground black pepper

Vinaigrette

- 1 tablespoon minced shallot
- 2 teaspoons red wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 2 cups (about 20) cherry tomatoes, each cut into quarters
- 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh basil leaves
- 2 ounces crumbled Gorgonzola cheese (1/2 cup)

1. Prepare the grill for direct cooking over high heat (450° to 550°F).
2. Lightly brush the steaks on both sides with oil and season evenly with salt and pepper. Allow the steaks to stand at room temperature for 15 to 30 minutes before grilling.
3. In a medium bowl whisk the shallot, vinegar, mustard, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Slowly whisk in 2 tablespoons of oil, forming a smooth vinaigrette. Add the tomatoes and basil. Mix well.
4. Brush the cooking grates clean. Grill the steaks over direct high heat, with the lid closed as much as possible, until cooked to your desired doneness, 6 to 8 minutes for medium rare, turning once or twice (if flare-ups occur, move the steaks temporarily over indirect heat). Remove from the grill and let rest for 3 to 5 minutes. Add the cheese to the vinaigrette. Mix gently. Serve the steaks warm with the vinaigrette spooned over the top.

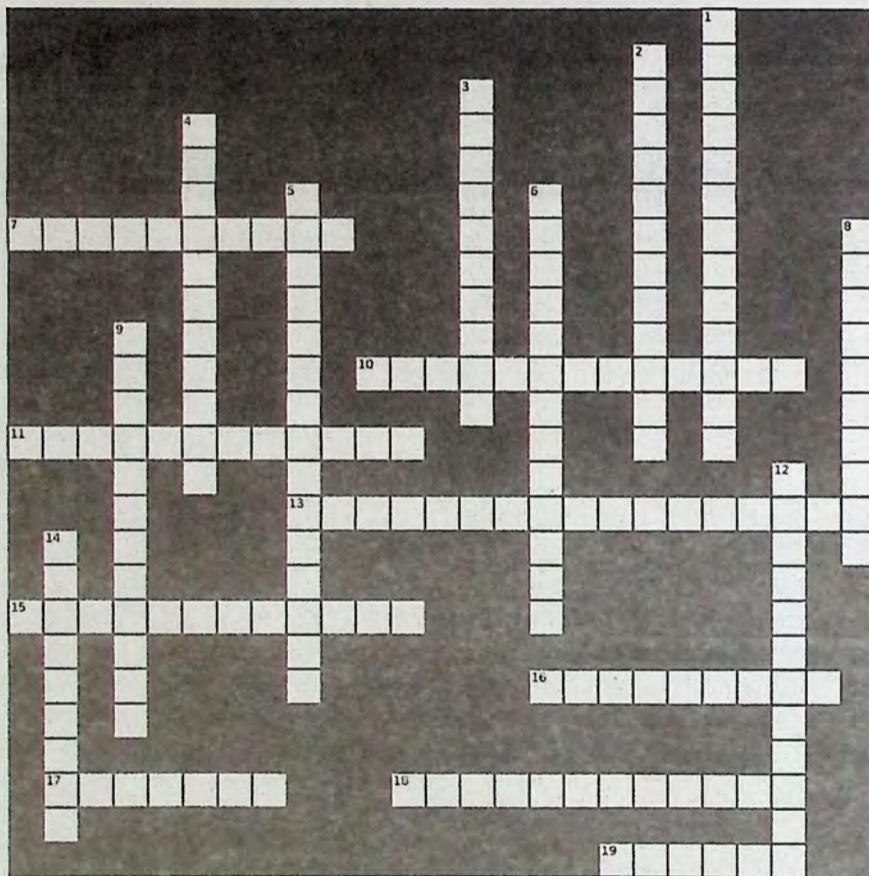

While I personally view exhaustion and 'burn out' as the result of poor time management or the lack of a proper support system to rely on (or not properly using a support system already in place) some people just fail in that department for a host of other reasons as well.

I also think they did the right thing.

Would an indoor pool facility have been enough to keep them here? I think not.

Would an indoor pool facility have attracted them to the community in the first place? Based on their profession, I would say not likely, although I could see them probably having some indirect involvement with the pool.

Where I am going with this is that I truly appreciate the effort and work of the pool committee but would prefer that they concentrate on verifiable facts rather than consultants who refer to stats with words like 'roughly' and 'thereabouts' in their vocabulary.

However, for a first-time effort, I think a lot of ground was covered and there is still a lot of ground yet to be covered between now and the September 24th referendum.

Regardless of how you feel today about the project, the pool committee deserves our support for the work they are doing for you and I.

Resident Supports Pool Plan

To the Editor,

I attended the public meeting last Tuesday about the proposed aquatic centre and while the turnout was not as high as I anticipated it was generally an excellent information process. The two handouts were quite clear and easy to understand. It was confirmed that EVERYONE who is a resident of Princeton and Area H for at least 30 days prior to the vote, a Canadian citizen, lived in British Columbia for at least 6 months and of voting age would have a vote in the decision making to borrow the necessary funds. Renters included!

The cost to each landowner (only where a residence is located, not on vacant land) on their property taxes would be what is called a parcel rate, otherwise a flat rate, of \$283.60 or less per year for 20 years and includes capital plus operation moneys. When one considers the increase in our home-owner grants this year and possibly in the future, the fact that a large number of residents qualify for the seniors' grant as well and some even qualify for the handicapped portion of the property tax grants, I don't think many will notice a great increase in the actual dollar increase they would have to pay. Those who own rental properties calculate their

mortgage, sewer and water and property taxes when they decide how much rent to charge so it would not cost these people any more money as it comes out of their rental income.

One gentleman pointed out that he used the current outdoor pool daily to swim laps and that he was the only one who did this - my answer to that is that the current pool smells terrible, the chemicals they use in the water make me itch and it is too cold getting in and out of this pool. I feel quite strongly that an indoor pool would be used much more often for those who like to do lengths or just have fun in a pool as the conditions are much more comfortable.

Health issues were also discussed briefly - especially the increase in the number of diabetics or pre-diabetics in this area. I just happen to be one of these people and know that exercise is of the greatest importance with this disease. I am not a biker or aerobic type person and really only walk or work in my gardens - definitely not enough exercise to help combat this and many other ailments/diseases. I think having the pool would convince me to get off my duff and go for a swim which is proven to be one of the healthiest exercises a person can

get as you get a full-body workout with little physical effort.

It is noted that the majority of people present at this first meeting preferred a proper diving depth to the pool and not the currently suggested depth of 2.1 meters. The suggested design is NOT written in stone and can be adapted to community needs and demands as necessary. The only thing we are asked to vote on in this referendum is the dollars to be spent on the acquisition of this Aquatic Centre. The actual details of the facilities built can be adjusted to suit the majority.

Personally, I feel that if we want to improve our town, give all citizens another choice of something to do, give out-of-towners another place to go for entertainment and fun (one example mentioned is the young people coming for hockey tournaments and there is nothing for them to do but sit in the motel rooms when not on the ice), improve our personal health and make this town and area more attractive to everyone this Centre is essential. I would encourage everyone to attend the next town meeting when it is announced so that we can all be well informed when it is time to vote! This would be money very well spent.

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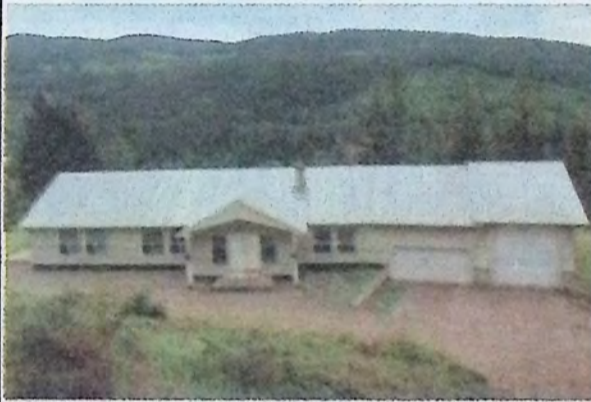
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
