Town looks at project spending

Town Council is considering a project to pave the TransCanada Trail from the Bridge of Dreams to Weyerhaeuser on the northeast end, and through the tunnel to the other bridge on the Tulameen River at the southwest end.

At the August 15 Town Council meeting, Mayor Randy McLean said Trails BC had some extra money and Princeton had applied for it.

Restoring the zigzag walkway is another project under consideration. It was damaged when a pickup truck rolled over the edge of the hill and came crashing down to the lower level of Billiter Avenue last year.

Town Council has been negotiating with ICBC for a settlement, but this is not complete. The Town has set aside \$50,000 for the project and is looking at one of the options presented by an architect.

The new Town Hall project is on hold. The new Town Hall would require an expenditure of \$2.5 million, which the Town does not have. Mayor McLean said the Town would be looking for grants from the provincial government before deciding to go ahead with the project.

Princeton and Area H residents will go to referendum in September on the aquatic centre project to vote on projected costs up to \$6 million, with annual operating costs of approximately half a million dollars.

Town Council is seeking information about any consulting firm that may be able to provide a proposal for the next phase of studies for the Princeton Regional Airport. Council will be looking for land use planning as a basis for changes to the Town's zoning bylaw, review land tenures for hangar, commercial and air park development, review air park feasibility, and further infrastructure development.

Council has allocated \$35,000 to a project to improve sidewalk wheelchair ramps. A contract to do the work has been awarded to Artistic Imaging Inc. at \$1,785 plus HST for 17 ramps. Councillor Jason Earle asked if there was any way to include the one remaining ramp. He was told the company will do the worst ramps first, and follow with the others.

Fortunately, the Town has received \$63,927.69 in a gas tax rebate which should help with some of the projects.

Fair gears up for fun!

Princeton's annual Fall Fair looks like a lot of fun this year. The addition of thoroughbred horse racing, which begins at 1:00 PM on Saturday, September 3, is a change from past years, and will keep Saturday very lively.

The fair opens at 8:00 AM Saturday with a pancake breakfast (Sunday, too, with music) courtesy of Christian Riders. Exhibits buildings open at 9:00 AM and there will be plenty to see.

Fun for youngsters is a big item this year. Teens and pre-teens will be delighted with laser tag, brought to the fair as a result of a survey done at Princeton Secondary School. For younger folk, there will be four different, up to date bouncy units and a petting zoo as

well as games and activities. Shirley Freding, of Shirley's Arts and Crafts, will provide children with creative activities. On Sunday, the Pet Parade and Bicycle Parade will take place (see booklet for times). Sunday also features wagon rides. Don't forget the Scarecrow contest - open to individuals, families and businesses.

The concession stand will be open daily, and will remain open on Saturday to 10:00 PM during the dance. Frame 313 will start toes tapping and get people on the dance floor. They were very popular last year, so were invited back for a return engagement.

For older folks, there are drill team and team penning activities to watch, and bingo and the horse-


shoe tournament on Sunday. Horseshoes start at 10:00 AM and bingo at 11:00 AM.

There are a lot of vendors coming to the fair. Reichert's Sales and Service, Douglas Lake Equipment and Fortis BC are big ones, but there is quite a variety of smaller booths providing unique items and information.

West Coast Equipment will be on site, too, once again graciously offering equipment to help set up the fair. If you want a vendor spot, contact Lyn Melnechenko at 250.295.7898 before August 31.

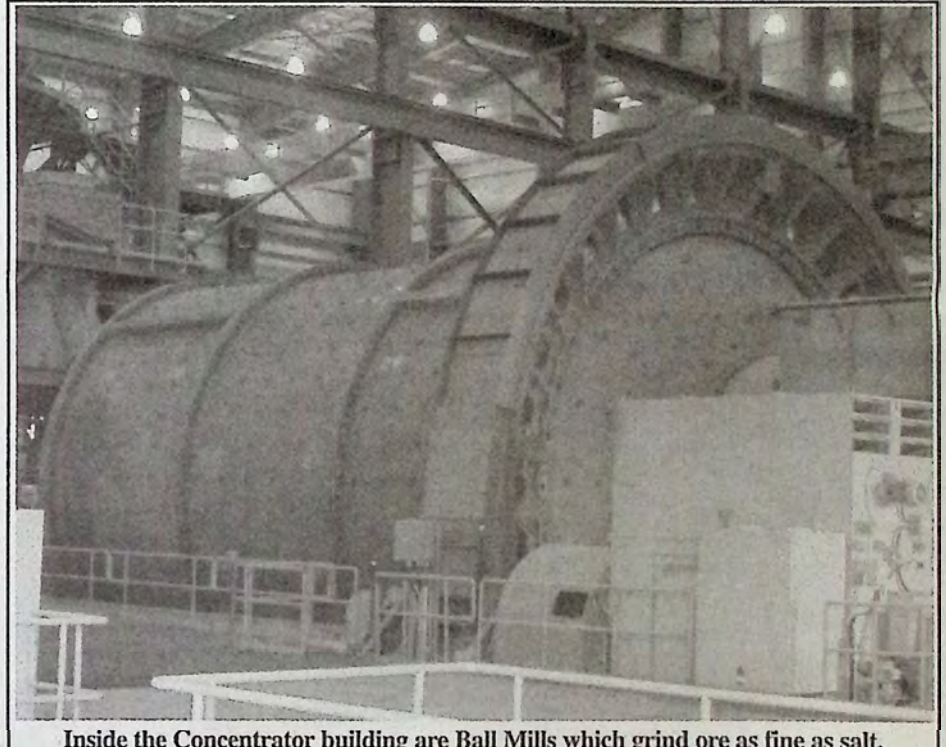

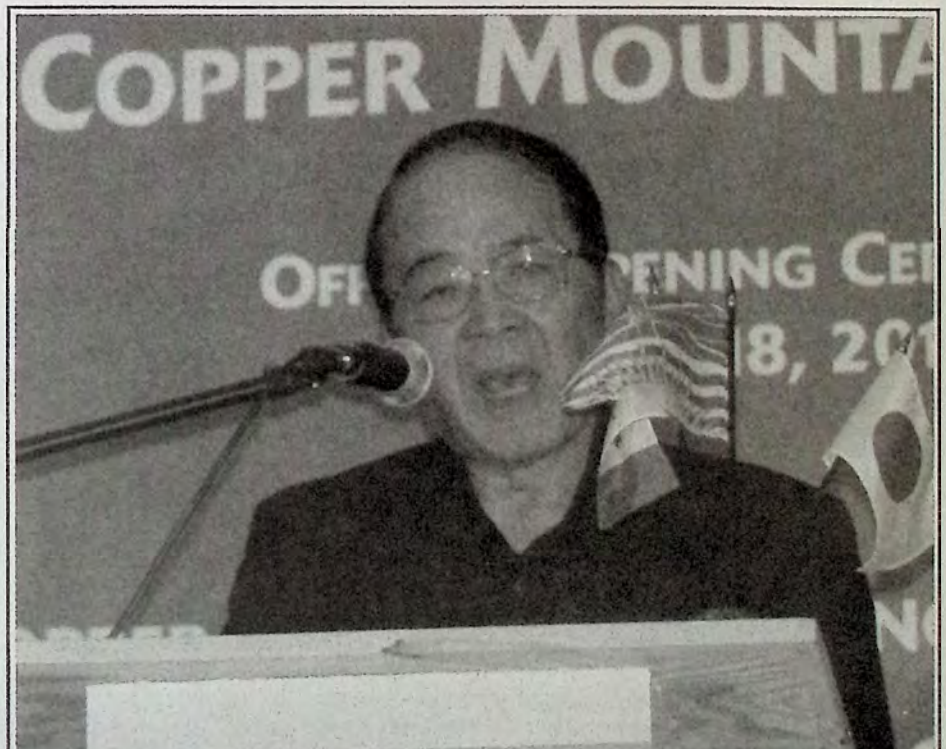

Mayor McLean's Copper Mountain Mine speech

Town of Princeton Mayor Randy McLean was one of a handful of guest speakers at the Official Opening Ceremony at Copper Mountain Mine August 18th. His speech is below:

"Thank all of you who have taken the time to be here today, what a turnout, this is the second time half of Princeton has shown up to welcome Copper Mountain Mining to our community. From the very beginnings of the rumors that something might be happening up here on the hill, there has been nothing but the most positive response in the community. And why not, with the influx of economic boom and mine workers our whole community has been transformed, stores and businesses are busier, curling, golf and other recreational clubs have greater participation, service clubs and cultural activities have more hard working members, more moms pushing baby-carriages down main street, more children in our schools (those miners are busy people), in so many ways in Princeton there has been a huge boost in confidence and attitude.

"How nice is it that our children are staying here or moving back because they can find meaningful jobs right here in the community and can raise our grandchildren right down the block. Princeton is

building towards a brighter and more prosperous future and so can many small communities across the province that have potential mining properties around their borders. Pine beetle affected forest revenue can be replaced by mine revenue to strengthen our province.

"This is a historic day for Princeton, a day when we welcome back mining to the community. There are so many people that have worked so hard over the past years to make this possible. I have sometimes referred to one of them as unwavering with a single-mindedness of purpose, translation stubbornness. Fourteen years ago when Jim O'Rourke left this site he made it clear that there was still a potential property here and today after fourteen years of hard work and dedication he is back with 270 workers and a 400 million dollar operation and ladies and gentlemen today I am standing here thanking God for that stubbornness.

"Jim, Princeton is so grateful for all you have done for us. Four years ago when Jim was looking for potential investors, one must remember that the global financial situation did not lend itself to investment and yet Mitsubishi Materials Corporation stepped forward, the only criteria they asked for was an environmentally and safety focused operation and that fell right in place

with the only kind of industry Jim would be associated with. Mitsubishi Materials Corporation, Princeton thanks you for your trust and belief.

"Throughout the establishment process the Upper Similkameen Band have been up front and supportive, they have worked together with Copper Mountain to ensure that the traditional territory, for which they are responsible, is cared for. Princeton thanks the chiefs, Chief Charlotte Mitchell, the councils the elders and the band members. As well I would like to acknowledge the new members of our community, the new mine employees who have fitted in so seamlessly and bolstered our economy as well as boosting the morale of many of our groups, organizations and recreational clubs by their participation.

"Finally I would like to acknowledge the tremendous contribution of our provincial government, from the beginning they have been in our corner on both sides of the house doing everything they could to bring about this project. Our local MLA Harry Lali has joined together with the provincial ministers to help promote our mine. Minister Rich Coleman as well as former mines and energy ministers Randy Haws and Blair Lekstrom have worked tirelessly to

make Copper Mountain a reality. We received the odd groan when we brought timeline concerns from Jim because they were already working as hard as they could to speed things along. That constant assistance and concern for those timelines will never be forgotten. MLA Bill Barisoff is somewhat of a legend in the eyes of the mine managers as a result of the time Bill Van Damme called me to see if I knew someone who could do anything about a Highways Ministry edict concerning winter restricted roads, as there were 14 trucks carrying heavy equipment sitting in town and unable to move. I made a few calls and was absolutely turned down and then I called the Speaker MLA

Barisoff and later that night he called and said 'you have 3 hours to get the equipment through' and they got it through.

"We all should have known that if you could control both sides of the house in the middle of a fierce debate, getting around a highways ministry edict would be a piece of cake. That was the type of cooperation we received and I want to thank all of the members of the legislature who showed up here today to help us celebrate this historic day in Princeton. Ladies and gentlemen will you join with me now in expressing how we in Princeton appreciate the work all of these people have done to brighten our future." (standing ovation).

RCMP report Hedley sub-station break-in

There's still time for savvy summer salads

(NC)—It's summer and in celebration of having farm-fresh fruits and vegetables in abundance, now is the time to sharpen your salad savvy skills. Don't settle for the same old greens topped with a blob of dressing. Mayo Clinic offers the following salad ideas to inspire you to build a better salad. The amounts listed will help you limit portion sizes and control calories.

• **Leafy greens:** Choose 2 cups or more of any of the following: arugula, bok choy, cabbage, chard, endive, escarole, greens (collard, mustard, turnip), kale, lettuce (bibb, green or red leaf, iceberg, romaine), mesclun, radicchio, spinach or watercress.

• **Vegetables and fruits:** Choose two or more of the following for a total of 2 cups: artichoke, asparagus, beets, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, cucumber, green onions, jicama, pea pods, peppers, radishes, squash, apples,

apricots, berries, citrus sections, grapes, mango, melon, peaches, pears, pineapple, pomegranate or watermelon.

• **Protein:** Choose 1/2 cup of the following: lentils, peas, tofu, tempeh or beans (soy, black, pinto, garbanzo, white or kidney). Or choose up to 2 ounces of lean beef, lamb, pork, poultry, tuna, salmon, trout, sardines, scallops, shrimp, clams or crab. Other options include 1 egg or 1 ounce of low-fat cheese such as cheddar, cottage, goat, feta or Swiss.

• **Carbohydrates and whole grains:** Choose 1/2 cup of one of the following whole grains: barley, bulgur, couscous, croutons, kasha, millet, quinoa, pasta, brown rice or wild rice. Or choose one serving (according to the

label) of whole-grain crackers or baked chips.

• **Herbs and spices:** Choose as many as you desire of the following: basil, chives, cilantro, dill, fennel, lavender, lemon grass, mint, oregano, parsley, sorrel, tarragon, thyme, allspice, caraway seeds, cinnamon, clove, cardamom, ginger, horseradish, mustard, nutmeg, paprika or pepper (black, cayenne, chili, red or white).

• **Extras:** Choose one of the following: mayonnaise (1 tablespoon), salad dressing (2 tablespoons), sour cream (3 tablespoons), oil (1 teaspoon), avocado (1/4), nuts (about 6), olives (8), dried fruit (2 tablespoons) or salsa (1/4 cup). If you choose fat-free mayonnaise, salad dressing or sour cream, you can double the portion size.

Living Past 100

Vegetables Lead To Longer Life

Vegetables and fruit contain food elements essential to good health. Although these special elements were discovered only a couple of decades ago, doctors and nutritionists knew these plant foods are essential for health, and can often cure illnesses. One such simple cure is fruit to cure scurvy. English ships carried limes to give to sailors to prevent scurvy, hence the name "limeys" for the English!

This is the season of plentiful garden produce. Many fresh vegetables are in the marketplace, and many fruits become available in August. Apricots, peaches and plums are lovely. Try to buy those grown closest to home to support your local producers. Local farmers guarantee your food security.

Among all of the garden vegetables available now, one of the old time favourites is beets. Beets come in a variety of colours, and both the top and the root of beets are edible. The tops should be well-cleaned then steamed, and served with a little butter and/or vinegar. The roots can be canned, pickled and eaten fresh and raw in a salad, or cooked in hot water until soft. Never peel a beet root if you are going to cook it. The colour bleeds out of it, and it is this colour that contains the wonderful nutrients beets contain.

Beets are famous for their cancer prevention qualities. Beet roots have been used in the treatment of tumours, and one American doctor recommends eating a raw beet salad every week to kill off any cancer cells in your body.

Beet root is especially important for women, as it contains iron. Dark red beet roots are the best for iron and the production of healthy red blood cells.

No part of the beet freezes well, but beet roots do keep well in the refrigerator if kept in a bag to prevent moisture loss.

Princeton Town Council receives citizen requests

A company called MWP is cleaning an area of land near the tunnel. The debris on the property of the former post and rail operation consists of piles of wood mixed with rocks and soil. MWP asked Council for a permit to burn the debris.

Council was in favour of burning the debris rather than adding it to the landfill, but must consult the Ministry of Environment first.

Princeton Fire Department would be on hand to provide control, and no burning can take place until after October 15.

While thanking Town Council for allowing the annual Racing Days art show to take place in the library conference room, Mary Bedford of Vermilion Artists, asked Council if semi-transparent drapes could be placed over the rear windows of the room to prevent the distraction

of passing traffic. Council is considering the request.

Mel Berg, representing a group of local musicians, asked if Council could waive the liability insurance for ongoing use of the Veterans Park gazebo for musical productions during the summer. Council will look into a blanket insurance policy for activities in the park.

spaces since Coco's Bistro has begun operating next to it. As many of the people who use the Thrift Shop are somewhat dis-

abled, the Auxiliary requested three reserved parking places in front of the shop. Town staff will look into the matter.

- 1 lb. pork tenderloin 500 g
- 3 tbsp olive oil 45 mL
- 2 tbsp fresh lemon juice 25 mL
- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 tsp dried oregano 7 mL
- 1/8 tsp each dried rosemary and black pepper 0.5 mL
- 16 medium whole fresh Mushrooms
- 1 large lemon, cut into wedges 1
- Wooden Skewers

Cut pork tenderloin into 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ (2.5 cm) cubes. In a large glass bowl or resealable plastic bag mix oil with lemon juice garlic, oregano, rosemary and pepper. Add mushrooms and pork to mixture and toss to coat. Cover or seal and marinate 2-24 hours in refrigerator, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile soak skewers in water for at least 30 minutes. Alternate mushrooms, pork cubes and lemon wedges on or water-soaked wooden or metal skewers. Barbecue over medium high heat, about 5-7 minutes per side or until pork is slightly pink in the centre.

Makes 4 servings

Variation: Add pieces (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ /2.5 cm) of green or red sweet pepper and 1 tbsp (15 mL) oil to the marinade and alternate with other ingredients on skewers OR substitute lamb leg or chicken breast for pork

Tip: Instead of barbecuing the kabobs may be broiled in oven or cooked in 425°F (220°C) oven.

That being said, I don't think we should be filling Centennial Pool with dirt again any time soon. If you've lived in Princeton long enough you'll know exactly what that was about.

On the front page of this issue of the News Leader are details on projects planned and projects on hold, as discussed at the most recent Town Council meeting.

The \$2.5-million Town Hall project was put on hold. The reason? The Town can't afford to build it at the moment.

However, the Town has set aside \$50,000 for repairing the 'zig zag' walkway from First Bench to downtown (pending an ICBC settlement) and \$35,000 for a project to improve sidewalk wheelchair ramps.

Unless I've missed something, it looks to me that Town Council has chosen to take care of projects they can afford and hold off on those that they can't.

I think Town Council should be applauded for setting such a responsible example of proper use of public funds. It always made more sense to me to buy things when you can rather than "if you build it, they will come" spending.

Which brings me back to my original thought about the Aquatic Pool Proposal.

Midway Between A Mill And ?

Dear Editor,

Stephen Hill, the unsuccessful Conservative candidate in the 2011 election in our BC Southern Interior riding, is once again making news headlines. During the election, Mr. Hill frequently took credit for the reopening of the mill in Midway, BC. In fact, this claim was false, the mill has not yet reopened, is now in jeopardy of never reopening, and many people and the Village of Midway are at risk of incurring further significant investment losses. This week on CBC radio, Mr. Hill, a financial planner from Rossland, admitted that mistakes were made during negotiations to purchase the mill from Montana-based Fox Lumber Sales Inc., specifically regarding the mortgage repayment date.

The agreement, worth \$2.9 million included the assumption of a \$500,000 tax debt to the Village of Midway, \$700,000 from 42 Boundary and Osoyoos area investors, monies from other private investors, and a \$1 million mortgage to be held by Fox Lumber. And it is the August 31st due date of the million dollar mortgage that is the wrench in the works. Nine months after the agreement to purchase was completed, after legal and accounting

costs, the newly formed purchasing company, Boundary Sawmills, has only \$200,000 remaining and must raise another \$800,000 to meet their August 31st mortgage obligation. If these funds are not raised, investors and the Village of Midway will lose the money they've already spent and, by foreclosure, will probably lose the mill property to Fox Lumber Sales Inc.

The mill in Midway, like our mill in Princeton, is a key to the economic heart of the community. Kudos to Mr. Hill who has pledged

he will search for investors until the funds are raised for the mortgage due date at the end of August. I hope he is successful in his efforts. For shame, however, that he used this false accomplishment as a keystone of his campaign platform. No doubt Mr. Hill will again seek our votes in a future election. Before that time comes, let us hope that the mill in Midway has reopened and Mr. Hill can base his campaign on fact rather than fiction.

What Can I Do About It?

It often seems the lunatics are running the asylum. There are many things we do not like in our world today, ranging from meltdowns to HAARP to chem trails to genetically modified foods and cloning. If you ask yourself, "What can I do about it?" you will answer, "Nothing."

I know that feeling of being just one lone voice raised in objection.

My most recent protest is one that Alex Atamanenko reported in his most recent news letter. It involves reducing the Canadian Wheat Board to zero influence in marketing Canadian wheat and barley. The Canadian Wheat Board has been operating for 76 years as the

agency making the international and national grain deals on behalf of Canada's grain producers. Those same producers fund, operate and direct their own marketing system, guaranteeing payment to the grain producers. Now our government (the Conservatives) are planning to remove the farmers' marketing power.

The Canadian Wheat Board ensures individual grain producers they need not compete with one another to sell their grain. The proposed legislation will pit one farmer against the other to sell their grain, and that will seriously affect the farmers' incomes.

Several giant multinational corporations dominate world grain markets. They want a shot at taking over control of our grain, and the government's proposed legislation will give them what they want. If you think this has nothing to do with you, then maybe you don't eat bread or cereals. If you do eat these products, then expect to pay more.

The Canadian Wheat Board Act created this agency, but the Conservative government intends to ignore the Act, and ram through the legislation. The Act requires a plebiscite before any changes are made to the Act, and the Wheat

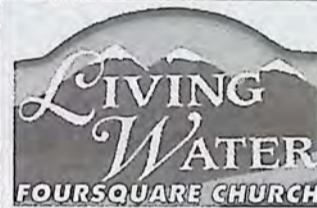

Neighbours complain of Cooper's noise

Town Council has received a complaint that Cooper's Foods is not meeting the obligation agreed to regarding noise levels. Trucks unloading behind the store in the middle of the night are disturbing the peace of the neighbourhood according to a letter sent to Town Council.

The letter from Dave Bates cited a promise made by Moreno Trevisan of Overwaita Food Group on June 6, 2010.

According to Bates, and a local newspaper report, Trevisan promised deliveries to the store would be between 7:00 PM and 9:00 PM only three days a week. Bates says trucks arrive as early as 7:00 AM and there is activity until after midnight.

Bates states in his letter there are loud noises of beeping as the trucks back up, pallets are knocked around, and trucks sit idling for hours.

He added other non-noise complaints of tires scraping curbs, asphalt broken up in parking lots, a truck striking a utility pole, lighting knocked off a building, and tire marks over sidewalks in front of houses.

Council decided to send the letter of complaint to Trevisan.

Council wants Fortis back

Town Council received a letter from Fortis BC asking if Council would like to provide input on the proposed installation of "smart" meters.

Councillor Jason Earle commented on the public presentation by Fortis in Princeton, noting very few people attended as that was the same evening as the aquatic centre meeting. He said Fortis would probably make the presentation again if asked.

Earle added there has been some public outcry against the radiation emitted when the meters send wireless messages to head office, which occurs several times a day. He said there has been major controversy in other countries.

Council voted to have Fortis come back to Princeton and make a second public presentation.

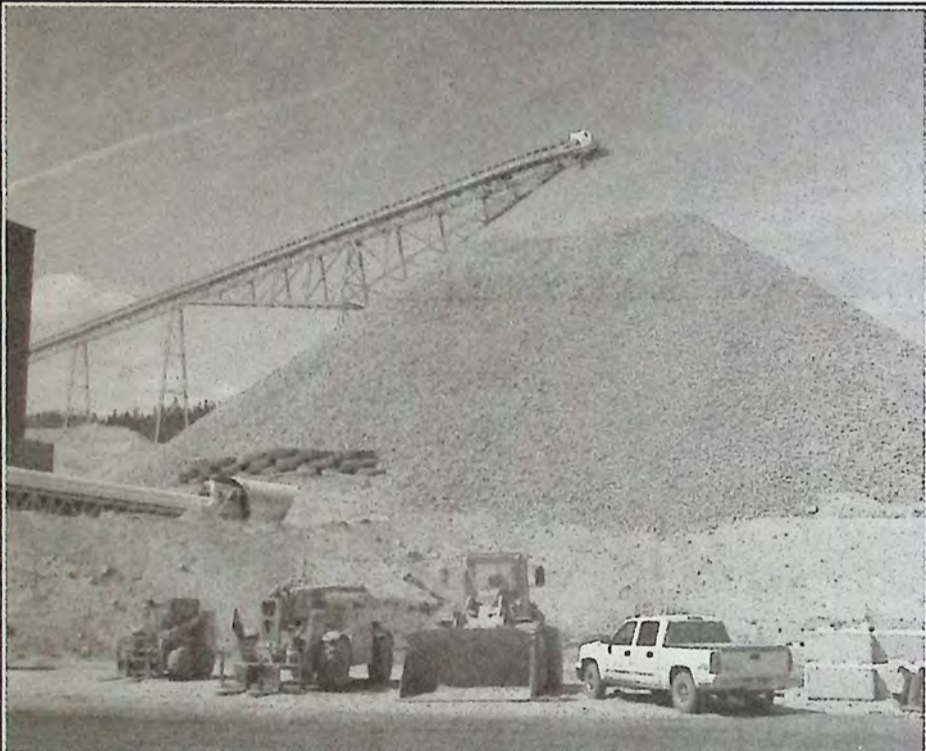
