## Town receives \$23,035 to redevelop land

Thanks to \$23,035 in provincial Brownfield Renewal funding, the Town of Princeton can begin to redevelop the former dry cleaning site at 167 Bridge Street (next to Town Hall).

The Province is providing \$23,035 to the Town on Princeton for early stage site investigation work to redevelop this former dry cleaning site as part of the town's plan to revitalize its downtown core.

The Brownfield Renewal Funding Program is designed to encourage more brownfield redevelopment

across British Columbia. Brownfields are abandoned, vacant, derelict, or underutilized commercial and industrial properties, where past actions have resulted in actual or perceived contamination.

The lot at 167 Bridge Street is one of 16 successful projects across British Columbia awarded more than \$730,000 through the Brownfield Renewal Funding Program.

The announcement was made September 1st by the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

## Atamanenko hosts forums on genetic modification

Alex Atamanenko, MP for BC Southern Interior, is co-sponsoring a series of MP forums to discuss the issues that surround genetic modification on a local and national level.

Lucy Sharratt is coordinator of the Canadian Biotechnology Action Network (CBAN), a collaborative campaign of 18 member groups working for food sovereignty and environmental justice. She has been active in the area of GM foods for the past 15 years. Lucy will be joined on the forum tour by April Reeves from the Society for a GE Free BC, Atamanenko and panellists from local agriculture organizations and food groups.

Through genetic modification (GM) scientists are able to change plants or animals at the molecular level. Right now there are four GM crops grown

in Canada, soy, canola, corn and white sugar beet, which are widely used as ingredients in processed foods. There are also a lot of unanswered questions about the risk that GM products might pose to people and the environment.

"I am extremely happy that Lucy Sharratt has found time to visit our area," said Atamanenko. "She is one of Canada's foremost experts on genetically modified organisms, and worked very closely with us when I was drafting my Bill C-474 on the economic impact to farmers of GMOS."

Because the science of GM foods is relatively new, government has been slow to react to the changes in the food industry that GM products have created. For example, the Canadian government has no

mandatory labelling requirement for foods that contain GM products, and no tracking or monitoring of possible health impacts.

Farmers and consumers continue to struggle with the implications of GM seeds and food being introduced into the market. For example, Saskatchewan farmer Percy Schmeiser went to court over the Monsanto Corporation's claim that he had illegally planted the company's GM canola seed. And consumer rejection has resulted in GM potatoes being withdrawn from the market.

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# Ironman Canada - Keremeos

The lead male Jordan Rapp was clocked at 4 hours, 3 minutes and 23 seconds when he passed the Armstrong Drive/Barcello Road Ironman Aid Station #8. Rapp ultimately won the event with an overall time of 8 hours, 28 minutes and 9 seconds. The last cyclist had still not yet passed the same aid station by 3:45 PM Sunday afternoon. Over 3,200 people registered for this year's Ironman. A mere 2,841 participated. Only 2,831 finished. In contrast, the first Ironman Canada event in 1983 saw only 23 people register for the race. Jordan Rapp of Penticton was out front Sunday morning August 28th and was spared some of the hotter afternoon Similkameen temperatures during this year's Ironman. Rapp's victory is the second in three years. Afternoon Similkameen temperatures as this year's event reached upwards of 37 degrees Celsius. Last year's event was cooler. Unfortunately, aid stations this year began running out of water by 1:15 PM. A mad scramble was engaged to redistribute water throughout the aid stations which helped for a while. Organizers purchased all bottled water they could at stores in Cawston and Keremeos. Even with the extra water, volunteers at the Armstrong Drive/Barcello Road aid station ultimately resorted to washing used water bottles with soapy water and refilling them with well water in order to keep the riders hydrated. Brian Keast of Waterloo, Ontario received first aid at the Armstrong Drive/Barcello Road Ironman Aid Station #8 Sunday morning. Brian was dumped from his bike by a passing farm truck. Unfortunately, Brian's bike was snapped almost in half by the accident and he was unable to continue the race until much later when another bike was delivered to him by the Bike Barn in Penticton. Volunteers at the aid station saw the farm vehicle passing westbound cyclists by straddling the centre line in order to avoid hitting oncoming cyclists. The vehicle turned off Barcello Road a short distance later. Keremeos RCMP have not yet identified the older-model, cream-colored flatdeck GMC farm truck but the driver has not yet been confirmed. When Brian was asked by the ambulance attendant if he was seriously injured, he replied, "No, but I am seriously pissed off!" Brian has participated in and set course records in other Ironman races in the United States. He is also a triple-bypass heart surgery survivor (it slowed him down for a bit). In an unrelated incident, two cyclists collided at Vaseaux Lake north of Oliver, resulting in one rider being incapacitated and taken to hospital by ambulance. Photo: Arlene Arlow

Are you eligible to vote at the November elections for Mayor and Councillors for the Village of Keremeos? Is your name on the current list of electors?

If you are not sure you can find out by calling or visiting the Village of Keremeos office at 702-4th Street, Keremeos, BC, or by phoning us at 250.499.2711. The office is open from 8:30 AM to 12:00 Noon and from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM, Monday to Friday (excluding holidays).

Advance elector registrations will be accepted at the Village of Keremeos office up to and including September 27, 2011. With the exception of registrations on voting days, elector registrations will not be accepted during the period of September 28, 2011 to November 18, 2011.

#### ELECTOR QUALIFICATIONS

##### RESIDENT ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a resident of the Village of Keremeos for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law.

##### NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a registered owner of real property in the Village of Keremeos for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not entitled to register as a resident elector; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law; and
- if there is more than one registered owner of the property, only one of those individuals may, with the written consent of the majority of the owners, register as a non-resident property elector.

Note - there is NO corporate vote - If you own a property within the Village jointly with a corporation, you are not eligible to vote on behalf of that property.

#### LIST OF REGISTERED ELECTORS

Beginning October 4, 2011 until the close of general voting for the election on November 19, 2011, a copy of the list of registered electors will, upon signature, be available for public inspection, at the Village of Keremeos office at 702 4th Street, Keremeos, during regular office hours, Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays. #### OBJECTION TO REGISTRATION OF AN ELECTOR

## SESS prepares for students

Students attending Similkameen Elementary Secondary School in Keremeos (School District 53 (Okanagan-Similkameen)) are reminded of the following:  
**FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL** (Secondary Students)  
- Classes will begin at 8:30 AM on Tuesday, September 6 and run until 11:30 AM.  
- All students will first report to the

Secondary Gym for a quick assembly when the bell rings. After that, students will go to their home-rooms.

- A list of Secondary homerooms will be posted in the foyer next to the library and beside the Secondary Gym.

**School Supplies** - Secondary students require basic supplies such as paper, pencil, pens, calculators, etc.

Other supplies are determined by each teacher who will inform students what they will require for their specific course.

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# Crews tackle fire

A 1.5-hectare wildfire near Ashnola was spotted at 3:00 PM Saturday, August 27th.

Fire Information Officer Kevin Skrepnek says, "One air tanker from Abbotsford, a helicopter from Kelowna and ground crews from Penticton and Princeton were sent to fight the fire."

Swift response saw an Initial Attack Crew of seven members from Penticton working the fire lines in the early afternoon.

They were later joined by a 20 member Unit Crew from Princeton.

A number of cabins were evacuated as a precaution.

"RCMP were helping move a few people out of the area for a short period of time while the retardant

lines were being dropped," says Skrepnek.

All evacuees were allowed back later in the evening and there never was an official Evacuation Order and people were only moved for a matter of hours.

Skrepnek says crews managed to quickly get the fire guarded and are now in the mop-up stage.

The cause of the fire is under investigation, there were no storms reported in the area. Ashnola is close to Keremeos, where temperatures hit 34C the day of the fire.

Fire danger ratings continue to be listed as high to extreme in the surrounding region.

**Ashnola Forest Road closed until October**

Travellers are advised that the Ashnola Forest Service Road in the Keremeos area will be closed at 18.7 kilometres and 32.9 kilometres due to the installation of two stream crossings from Wednesday, September 7 through Friday, October 14.

The work will include the removal of two existing wooden culverts and replacement with a larger steel pipe and concrete-slab structure to improve public safety.

One recreation trail on Easygoing Creek will not be accessible during the closure.

**Living Past 100**

**The Joys of September Foods**

September is a month of harvests of all kinds, but those of us who live in the Similkameen watershed have such an abundance of good foods grown here that we should treasure them.

September is a great month for tomatoes. They are sold by the box in bulk, great for canning and making sauce. It is said tomatoes are a man's best friend because they keep the prostate healthy. It is the red colour in tomatoes that protect men, and men should eat at least three meals a week containing a serving of tomatoes, whether raw or cooked.

September is the time of year for pears. Pears are not only tasty, they are good for your circulatory system. Pears contain soluble fibre that washes the bad cholesterol out of your digestive system, preventing it from being absorbed in your blood. Bartlett pears keep well when canned, and can be made into chutney that is very good with chicken, turkey and pork. Later in the fall, D'Anjou pears are available, great for winter keeping.

Apples of many varieties are harvested in September. You can make your own apple pie pack in jars, and you can make apple sauce. Apples are another fruit that helps reduce cholesterol. Eat apples frequently, as they are really good for you.

Peppers are another food harvested in September. If you can eat peppers, then you should indulge, as they contain nutrients good for your heart, and contain plenty of Vitamin C. Peppers can be frozen this way: dice the peppers into one centimeter squares, lay them on a cookie sheet, and quick freeze them. When they are frozen, transfer them to bags and put them back in the freezer. When you want to spice up a stew or stir-fry, shake some frozen peppers into your pan. Autumn is the time for winter squash of all kinds. The darker orange the flesh of the squash (and pumpkin), the more nutrients the squash contains. Squash is rich in many vitamins and contains good levels of protein. Squash is one of the three sacred foods of the native people of North America. Winter squash keeps well at room temperature, so don't hesitate to buy several. If you buy one of the really big winter squash and bake it, you will have leftovers. Scrape the leftover squash from the skin, put it in a freezer bag and freeze it. It freezes well after baking and can be used as is for a side dish or can be added to chicken broth to make squash soup.

Don't let our abundance go to waste, because these foods are so healthy!

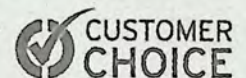

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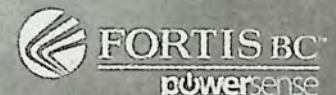

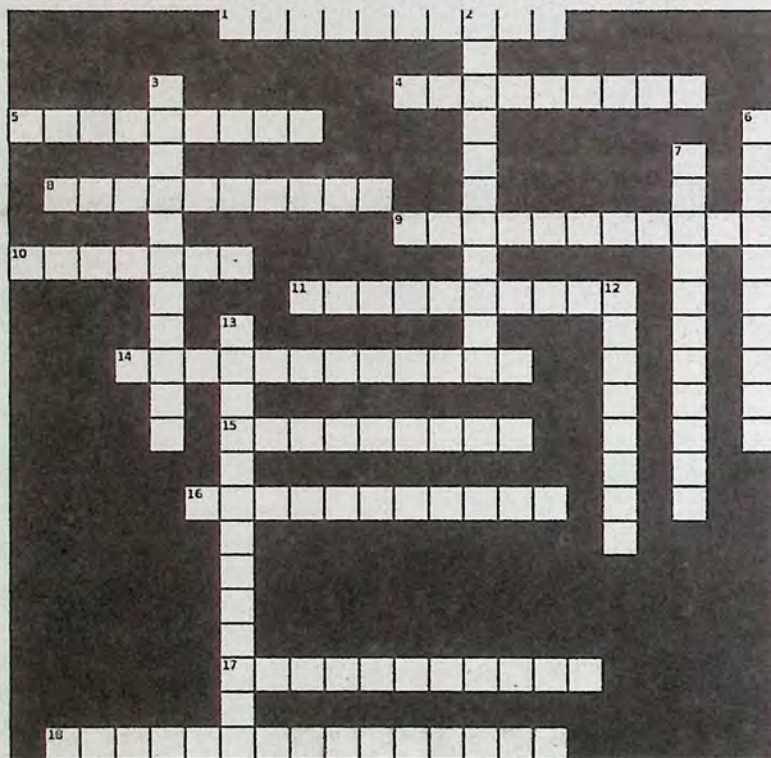

### When A Loss Becomes A Subsidy

By definition a deficit is the amount by which a sum falls short of some reference amount. In economics, a deficit is a shortfall in revenue.

Other words for deficit include shortfall, shortage, arrears, discrepancy and debit.

A subsidy is a form of financial assistance paid to a business or economic sector.

Other words for subsidy include funding, financial backing, grant, support and aid.

While I credit the Pool Committee for trying to get as much information out as they feel we need to know as voters prior to the upcoming Referendum, I do take exception to what I find, well, deceiving.

For example, in the most recent mailing by the group, I point to Question 5 under the heading of The Cost. The question is about the operating expenses. The answer refers to the difference between projected expenditures and projected revenues as "net subsidy."

More specifically, when you subtract the Projected Revenues of \$193,000.00 from the Projected Expenditures of \$706,200.00 you end up with what is being identified as a Net Subsidy of \$513,200.00.

When did a loss become a subsidy?

Why not just tell us the truth and forget about the user-friendly terminology?

I really dislike being lied to. If it's a loss, be realistic about it and tell us it's a loss.

I think honesty would probably help push the proposal a bit further than trying to soften the hard stuff by covering it in rainbows and candy floss.

I can understand a loss far more than a subsidy.

Sure, either way, I'm going to have to pay for it, but give the voters of Princeton and Area H a break.

We all pretty much expect the pool to lose money.

The existing Centennial Pool, leaks and all, continues to lose money so why would a multi-million dollar monster of a pool be any different?

I applaud the Pool Committee for their work. I'm sure it has not been easy to be a volunteer on a committee trying to convince the masses we need to move forward and this massive expense is required to do so.

That being said, you lost me when political correctness got in the way and the language of failing to meet the budget turned into words to make me feel special, warm and fuzzy all over.

Hey, it's just a \$513,200.00 (annual) subsidy we're all going to have to chip in and cover for the next 20 years.

### Are We Pooling Resources?

Dear Editor,

We would like to share with you several of our concerns regarding the proposed Princeton Aquatic Centre and the upcoming referendum on September 24th.

The first concern we have is that the proposed Aquatic Centre parcel tax is unfair. There are many people in this community who live on 2, 3 or 4 parcels with improvements on them. This does not necessarily mean that these people are well off, however they will end up paying 2, 3 or 4 times the \$360 Parcel Tax.

In some cases the property tax that people will have to pay would increase by more than \$1,200 per year.

We have talked to people who are living on a yearly income of \$10,000, have two 25 foot wide parcels with a current property tax of \$100 who will not be able to afford the extra \$360 per parcel.

They could face a lien on their home, lose their home altogether or be forced to move. Some of these people have lived here as a full time resident for 50 years and are on a disability pension.

We are certainly not against a swimming pool for Princeton, however we cannot in good conscience vote to approve funding for such an extravagant facility when we know that there are people in the community that will experience serious financial distress if the referendum is passed.

Our second concern is the long term debt that our community will be facing to pay for the Aquatic Centre.

We live in uncertain financial times and we believe that it would be prudent to raise the needed capital through fund raising, corporate

donations, personal donations, and government grants and once we have the money, build a pool that is within our means or fix up the old pool and add a roof, rather than saddling our community with a 20 year loan and an annual operational deficit of \$600,000.

A fundraising campaign to build a pool for Princeton may be a way to heal angry and/or hurt feelings that have developed in our community over this issue and it may help to unite the community by working towards one goal, instead of the division and bitterness that are now present.

Although the pool committee does not support the idea of a user fee, we feel that this may be an alternative worth considering to offset the \$600,000 operating cost deficit. This could be administered in the same way as the Princeton Golf and Country golf club membership.

A reduced entrance fee for Princeton Aquatic Centre members would also encourage members to use the pool and at the same time give all residents a choice.

For occasional users and people visiting our community, the entrance fee could be higher than for people who pay the user fee. There are people who are now willing to pay \$360 or more for a parcel tax to support a new pool. We could find out how many of those are willing to pay the same amount through a user fee, so we will know exactly how much money will come in.

In this way a tax burden won't be placed on people who live as far away as East Gate or Missezula Lake and will never use the pool, or people who have a cabin at the lake for the summer and prefer to

do their swimming there, or people who cannot afford the parcel tax.

We feel that it's important to mention that this Aquatic Centre is a luxury item which cannot and should not be compared with essential services such as what we pay through our taxes for education, social welfare and the construction and maintenance of infrastructure.

Our last concern is with the feasibility report. The same consultants PERC (Professional Environmental Recreational Consultants Ltd) that prepared the feasibility study for the Princeton Pool also did a feasibility study for the town of Vanderhoof which has a similar population base, but a substantially higher average annual income, according to the 2006 Census. The proposed aquatic centre building costs in each community are similar.

In the Vanderhoof feasibility study, the consultants advised against the pool because, according to their report, a population of 4,000 was not enough for their community to afford the aquatic centre. The consultants recommended that Vanderhoof form a cooperative partnership with outlying areas which would bring their population base to 13,000.

The total population of Princeton plus Area H is 5,400, however there are only 3,344 parcels, consequently the costs will be born by the 3,344 property owners or less, since some people have more than one property.

This begs the question: "Why did the consultants not advise against this project as they did in the Vanderhoof study?" This question has been presented to the Pool Committee several times, however so far an answer has not been provided.

Let us make it clear that we would love to see a full season pool in our community but we cannot support the concept if it presents an unfair financial burden to some residents of our community.

There has to be a better way.

## The Revolution In Iceland

The first nation to experience economic collapse was Iceland. In 2003, Iceland's banks had been privatized and began to rack up foreign debt. In 2008, the banks went bankrupt and so did the nation. In the past decade, Iceland went from boom to bust.

Iceland's banks were nationalized as the first move of a bankrupt nation. Then Iceland borrowed four and a half million dollars, but was under pressure to take some hard measures in order to pay back the debt.

The people of Iceland protested and rioted over what was happening. They forced an election in 2009 and put a left-wing coalition government in place. This left-wing government did not like the laissez fair economics, but bowed to demands that Iceland pay off a

debt amounting to three and a half million Euros. This would have forced every Icelandic citizen to pay around \$130 a month for 15 years.

Icelanders did not see any reason to pay off debts incurred by private banks. They convinced their government to do what the people wanted. The government refused to sign a law making Icelanders repay the bankers' debts.

Iceland's government received threats from foreign bankers who said they would prevent Iceland from getting any aid from the International Monetary Fund. The British government threatened to freeze Icelanders' bank accounts. The citizens of Iceland voted in 2010 to refuse to pay those debts incurred by private banks.

Furthermore, the government began an investigation into the cause of the financial crisis, and eventually issued an international arrest warrant for the head of one of the failed banks. Other bankers involved in creating the bank collapse had fled Iceland.

Today, Iceland is developing a new constitution, but it is also recovering from economic collapse by seizing its own sovereignty and refusing to be dictated to by the international banking community. What Iceland has done is told the world that the citizens of Iceland will not be responsible for debts owed by private businesses,

even if those businesses are banks. Icelanders have freed themselves of manipulations of the international money men.

You don't hear about this on the news, probably because nobody wants to see Greece, Ireland, Italy or Spain learn a lesson from the people of Iceland. As the European Union feels the threat of collapse of four economies, the international banking community is telling the debtor nations to sell their utilities, transportation systems, and all public assets, to pay their debts. What if these poor nations follow Iceland's example?

In other financial news, The American government has put in place a regulation demanding a certain level of reserve funds be held by every bank. There was a law like this in place from the F.D. Roosevelt government to the Reagan government, but the Reagan government "deregulated". It is interesting to see the regulation being brought back this summer after the recent stock market roller coaster ride, to say nothing of the recession that began in 2008.

Perhaps nations will learn from Iceland, even though all we hear about Iceland is related to volcanic eruptions. One thing is sure: Icelanders have told the world that Iceland belongs to them and they will run it as they see fit. I think Canadians could and should absorb that particular lesson.

## Aquatic Pool Proposal springs more leaks

To The Editor;

RE: Pool Committee info.

While I await the Referendum Information Package for more details, the table of three year financial projections printed in Similkameen News Leader on August 30th 2011, to my mind, confirms all the financial objections to the Aquatic Centre proposal.

It is bad enough that after revisions by "the committee" the Net Cost deficit projections are still in excess of \$513,000 annually but it is the trend that is far more alarming. "Fanangle" the numbers however you like - the trend shows a deficit that increases with each passing year.

\$706,200.00

**1st Year Total Revenues:**

\$193,000.00

**Operating Deficit**

(\$513,200.00)

**Deficit Trend:** -----

**2nd Year Total Expenditures:**

\$730,250.00

Major McLean and Town Council may shrug their shoulders to financial shortfalls during the referendum but they will not be able to after the Aquatic Centre is built. Why? Because, unlike Ottawa, Princeton Town Council can't print money! The deficit has to be funded somehow.

So what are their choices? Well they really only have two as I see it. One is to cut the opening hours from the presently projected 85/90 hours per week and cut the number

of weeks per year that the centre will be open. A number of other BC communities running Aquatic Centres "in the red" have already had to do this.

Their second choice is to raise taxes. It has been said that the Parcel Tax will "never" be increased - that being the case then other taxes will have to be increased. Whether it is the addition of the Parcel Tax or an increase in other taxes or both, Princeton will earn the reputation of being a very expensive town to live in and own a business in! Try selling a house or business after the Parcel Tax has been added to your current Property Taxes.

There is a third choice of course. Town Council could try to borrow even more money to cover the deficit but, based on the deficit projections already provided, who

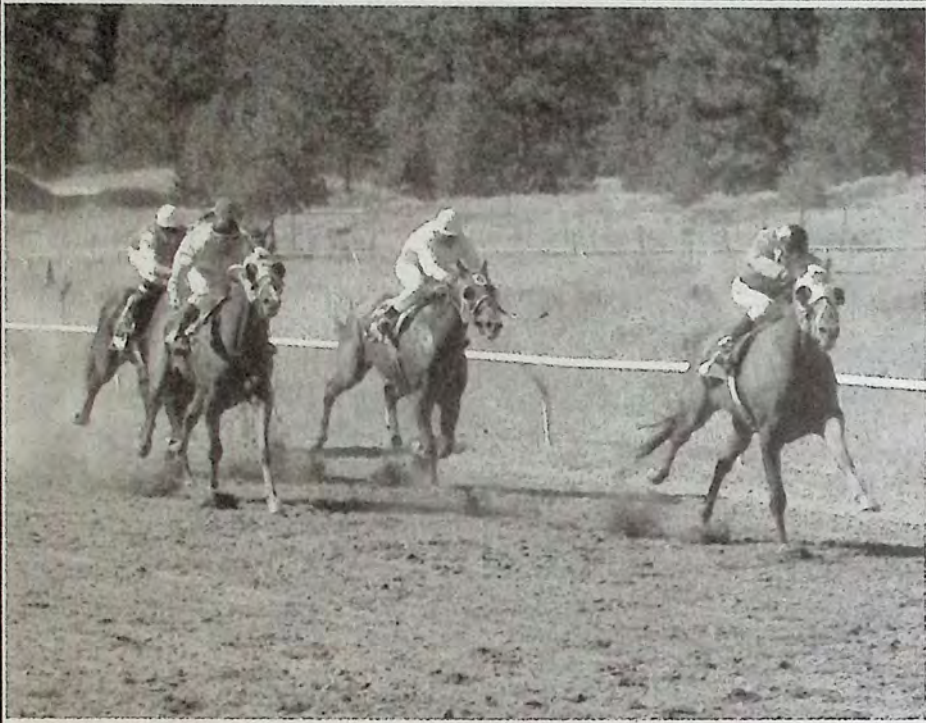
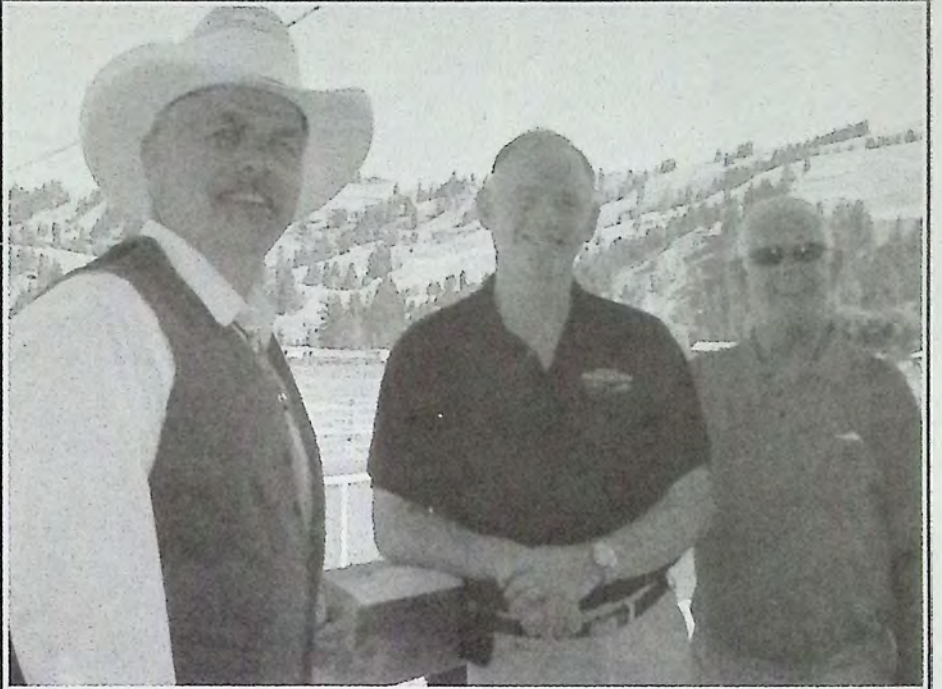

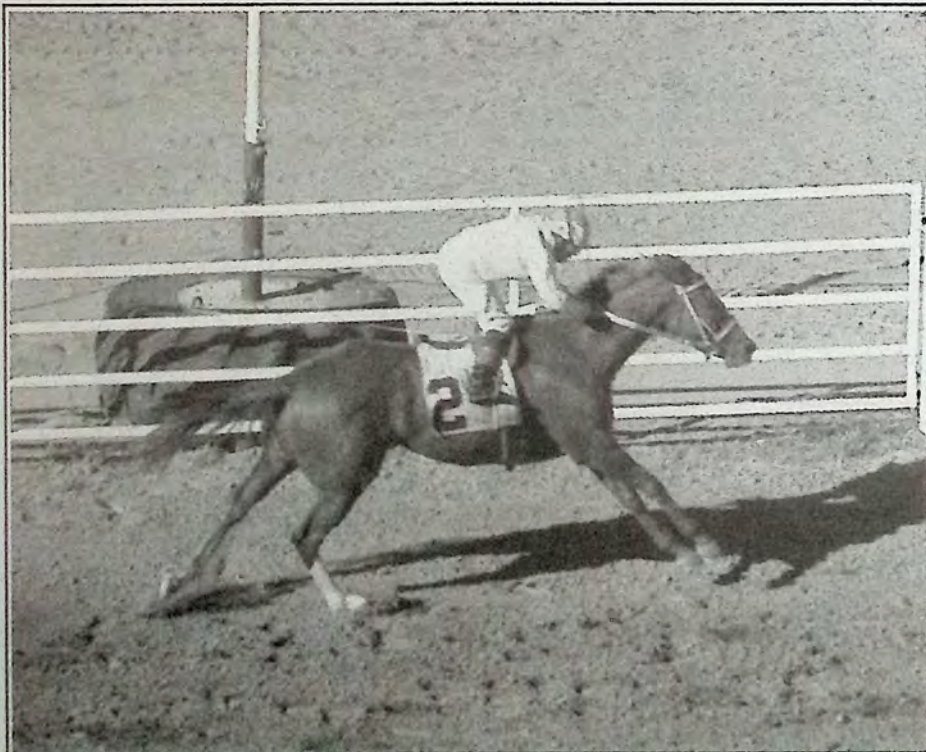
