## Holiday long weekend saw problems

The Labour Day long weekend had some serious problems. A house on Hidden Valley Road burned down. Councillor Frank Armitage praised local volunteer fire department personnel for the very professional way they dealt with the emergency.

On Labour Day Monday, another kind of emergency occurred which has Town Council worried. There was no doctor available at Princeton's hospital on one of the busiest days for highway traffic on

one of British Columbia's most dangerous highways.

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Marilyn Harkness both expressed a need for Interior Health management to ensure this does not happen again.

Councillor Harkness stated, "IHA needs some sort of procedure in place to deal with this sort of situation when a locum becomes ill."

Council will address this issue with Interior Health.

## Copper Mountain Mine ships first concentrate load

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced on September 7th that the Copper Mountain Mine had completed loading its first shipment of concentrate to Japan.

The first shipment was made up of 11,200 wet metric tonnes of concentrate containing approximately 5.6 million pounds of payable copper, 40,600 payable ounces of silver, and 2,470 payable ounces of gold with a combined value of approximately US \$29 million based on LME pricing.

Loading of the concentrate took approximately 18 hours with no problems encountered with the new loading facility that was built for Copper Mountain. The MV Polaris Melody is expected to arrive at the

Onahama port in Japan on September 21st for unloading and transportation of the concentrate to Mitsubishi's Onahama smelter for processing.

CEO & President of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation, Jim O'Rourke said of the milestone, "In just 16 months since receiving our permits to build on April 1, 2010 we have reached our goal of our first shipment of copper concentrate headed to Japan for processing at our partners' smelter in Onahama. We are all very pleased with the teams accomplishment in such a short time."

## Local mills receive forest license

Princeton Post and Rail and Princeton Wood Preservers have been awarded a restricted non-replaceable forest license of 35,000 cubic meters per year for 10 years.

The license will be managed by Weyerhaeuser Princeton with the agreement for the saw log component being traded for post and rail fibre which, combined with the license's post and rail content, will supply nearly 80 percent of both companies' needs.

Both companies will have to find the remaining 20 percent on the

open market, but the license is an improvement over the 60 percent they were forced to buy on the open market in previous years. Reduced trucking costs will benefit both companies.

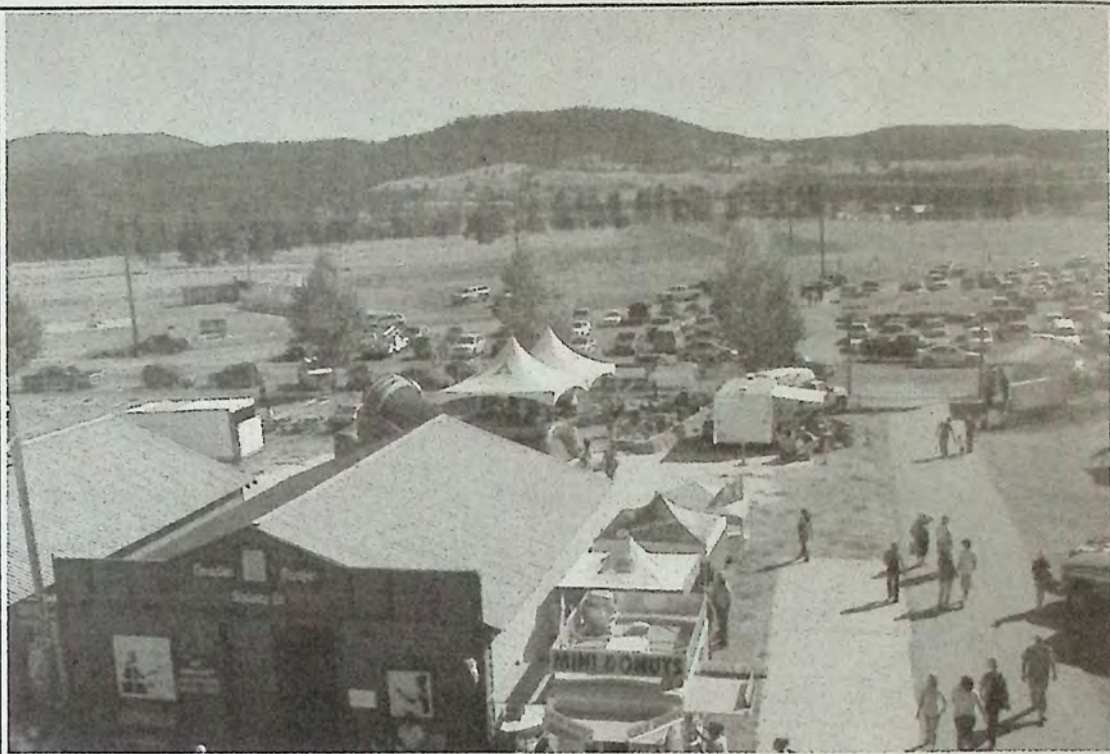

# Princeton and Area H Aquatic Centre Proposal

**Informed decision-making for the upcoming referendum  
on September 14 and September 24, 2011**

There is a proposal by the Princeton Town Council and RDOS arena employees to build "an exciting one-stop recreation and fitness centre." An Arena services tax has recently been converted and increased to help pay for existing facilities. This referendum is asking for the right to borrow \$6 million toward the cost of building the new aquatic facility which is loosely estimated to cost over \$9 million. This would result in an additional tax of up to \$361 per year for construction and operations.

With the current economy the way it is, this is a bad time to be going into debt and putting a long term tax burden on property owner and businesses. Money spent on this extravagant proposal, regardless of how it is raised, will compromise the ability of the town and district to finance important projects.

*Princeton needs to guarantee a 24/7 Emergency Room - we must attract young doctors.  
Princeton is undertaking a water study - capital could be required.  
Princeton is undertaking a sewerage study - capital could be required.*

Large debt and \$600,000 annual maintenance losses on the pool could also negatively affect hospital development, airport expansion, the new town hall proposal and other more critical services.

In the town of Hope, user fees for an equivalent "exciting one-stop recreation centre" are an additional average \$500 a year for seniors and adults. Other larger towns are having trouble financing similar projects. Princeton is just too small to afford this kind of facility. Although yet another referendum would be required for Princeton to do this alone, without Area 'H', the tax increase would be about \$934.

Most would agree that it is desirable for Princeton residents to have an indoor swimming pool. However, it needs to be realized in a fair, affordable, and financially responsible manner just as we did with the original Centennial Park pool or the second nine holes at the golf course in recent times. The consultants supporting Council in this proposal have already earned over \$31,000 on the project. We need to take back ownership and decide our affairs on our own.

Are you eligible to vote at the November elections for Mayor and Councillors for the Village of Keremeos? Is your name on the current list of electors?

If you are not sure you can find out by calling or visiting the Village of Keremeos office at 702-4th Street, Keremeos, BC, or by phoning us at 250.499.2711. The office is open from 8:30 AM to 12:00 Noon and from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM, Monday to Friday (excluding holidays).

Advance elector registrations will be accepted at the Village of Keremeos office up to and including September 27, 2011. With the exception of registrations on voting days, elector registrations will not be accepted during the period of September 28, 2011 to November 18, 2011.

#### ELECTOR QUALIFICATIONS

##### RESIDENT ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a resident of the Village of Keremeos for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law.

##### NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a registered owner of real property in the Village of Keremeos for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not entitled to register as a resident elector; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law; and
- if there is more than one registered owner of the property, only one of those individuals may, with the written consent of the majority of the owners, register as a non-resident property elector.

Note - there is NO corporate vote - if you own a property within the Village jointly with a corporation, you are not eligible to vote on behalf of that property.

#### LIST OF REGISTERED ELECTORS

Beginning October 4, 2011 until the close of general voting for the election on November 19, 2011, a copy of the list of registered electors will, upon signature, be available for public inspection, at the Village of Keremeos office at 702 4th Street, Keremeos, during regular office hours, Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays. An elector may request that their address or other information about them be omitted from or obscured on the list of electors.

#### OBJECTION TO REGISTRATION OF AN ELECTOR

An objection to the registration of a person whose name appears on the list of registered electors may be made in accordance with the *Local Government Act* until 4:00 PM on October 14, 2011. An objection must be in writing and may only be made by a person entitled to be registered as an elector of the Village of Keremeos and can only be made on the basis that the person whose name appears has died or is not qualified to be registered as an elector of the Village of Keremeos.

## Similkameen attractions deserve investment

The Liberal government should be doing more work with local agencies in the Similkameen region to showcase its attractions, says New Democrat arts and tourism critic Spencer Chandra Herbert following a trip to the area on the Labour Day weekend.

"I've been blown away by the beauty, the history and the heritage of the Similkameen," said Chandra Herbert.

"The region is incredible, and the local organizations that have been safeguarding its treasures and sharing them with visitors from British Columbia and across the world should be applauded for the good work they have done."

Chandra Herbert took time to visit

Keremeos' Grist Mill, which is B.C.'s oldest remaining flour mill, and explored the Snaza'ist Discovery Centre, which teaches visitors about the history of local First Nations and the Mascot Mine.

"Investigating the Snaza'ist Discovery Centre is like taking a trip through time to a different age, a different British Columbia," said Chandra Herbert.

"The Liberal government should be doing more to help local agencies market this fascinating attraction to both Canadian and international visitors."

The New Democrat critic noted that in 2009 the Liberal government cut all funds to Heritage B.C.

and since then investments in heritage protection have been reduced by 40 per cent.

"Communities and First Nations in the Similkameen need to be celebrated for the important work they have done to protect heritage assets like the Mascot Mine and the Keremeos Grist Mill," said Chandra Herbert, noting their potential to underpin a thriving tourism industry.

"Adrian Dix and the New Democrats believe that the province should be doing more to partner with local agencies to promote the region and spread the word about the unforgettable vacation experiences these and other B.C. communities have to offer."

## Canadians still choosing not to check for skin cancer despite risks

(NC)—Most Canadians (85 per cent) know that melanoma is a form of skin cancer and yet over one third (35 per cent) still never check for unusual moles/freckles or get them checked, according to a new survey conducted by the Save Your Skin Foundation.

Melanoma is one of the fastest growing cancers worldwide, but because it is one of the only cancers that is clearly visible on the skin, early detection is not only possible, but important for successful treatment.

"It's important to learn the basics of melanoma and regularly check your moles. The earlier anomalies can be brought to your doctor's attention, the greater your chances

for survival," explains Kathy Barnard, founder of Save Your Skin Foundation and a melanoma patient herself.

Young people in particular are lax in checking for skin cancer, despite the fact that melanoma is the second most common cancer among those aged 15 to 34. According to the survey, almost half (46%) of Canadians in that age group never check for unusual moles or freckles. Even when told that the incidence of melanoma has more than tripled over the past 30 years, just over half (52%) are only a little more likely or no more likely to check moles or freckles.

Overall, Canadians are not taking enough action to detect this highly visible cancer early on.

Of those who do take steps to spot melanoma, by checking for unusual moles or freckles, almost half (49%) rely on their family doctor

as their primary source of detection. And less than one in five (17%) get or do the monthly mole checks as recommended by the CDA (Canadian Dermatology Association).

The Save Your Skin Foundation wants to emphasize the importance of noticing the early signs of melanoma and to encourage everyone to routinely check themselves and their loved ones.

"Make it a fun habit," suggests Kathy Barnard. "If you are a parent, teach your kids young, take pictures, make a scrapbook, so they know what to look for and are aware of the disease. Between adults, the practice can become a welcome romantic fixture in everyday busy lives."

### Plaque And Heart Disease

There is a widespread belief that having plaque on your teeth will lead to heart disease. There is a very small amount of truth to this belief, but you need to look into the depths of the belief to understand how poor dental health can affect your heart.

Most of what you believe about a link between poor dental health and heart disease came through advertising for dental cleansers and toothpastes. In fact, the real danger is not plaque but a gum disease called periodontitis. This is a serious disease, but the links to heart disease are sketchy at best. There are a lot of other conditions that can do as much damage.

First, before you worry about the right mouth wash or toothpaste, think about what you eat. The best, healthiest teeth on the planet belong to native tribes that do not eat processed foods, preserved meats or foods and drinks having a high sugar content. Healthy teeth are a product of diet more than of mouth wash and toothpaste.

The very same poor diet that encourages the formation of plaque and gum disease is the very same diet that encourages heart disease. Isn't this a more likely link between dental health and heart health?

This is not to say you should give up brushing your teeth! The very same "primitive" people who eat a healthy diet also brush their teeth. The brushing of teeth is not a new development: toothbrushes are a new development. The more primitive people who live without toothbrushes have been known to brush their teeth with frayed ends of twigs. In addition, they tend to eat more fibrous foods that take a lot more chewing and thus the foods they eat help remove plaque.

There is a lot of bunk in advertising. Be careful of what you believe about a product somebody is encouraging you to buy. You could brush your teeth with salt, baking soda, or just plain water and probably do yourself as much good as using the latest brand of toothpaste or mouthwash. It is the brushing that does the good more than what you put on the brush!

**Local men receive commendation**

At the September 6 Town Council meeting, Mayor Randy McLean presented certificates of commen-

datation to the three rescuers. Mayor McLean read the letter from Governor General David Johnson which stated, "Your selfless actions are an inspiration to others and the highest form of citizenship".

Mayor McLean praised them on behalf of the people of Princeton, saying "We're very proud."

**Air quality interim report**

The interim report of the air quality monitoring project was received by Town Council. The report indicates the level of particulate matter in the air during the cold months was higher than that in Kamloops and Merritt. The report says the particulates were those typical of emissions from wood burning

stoves.

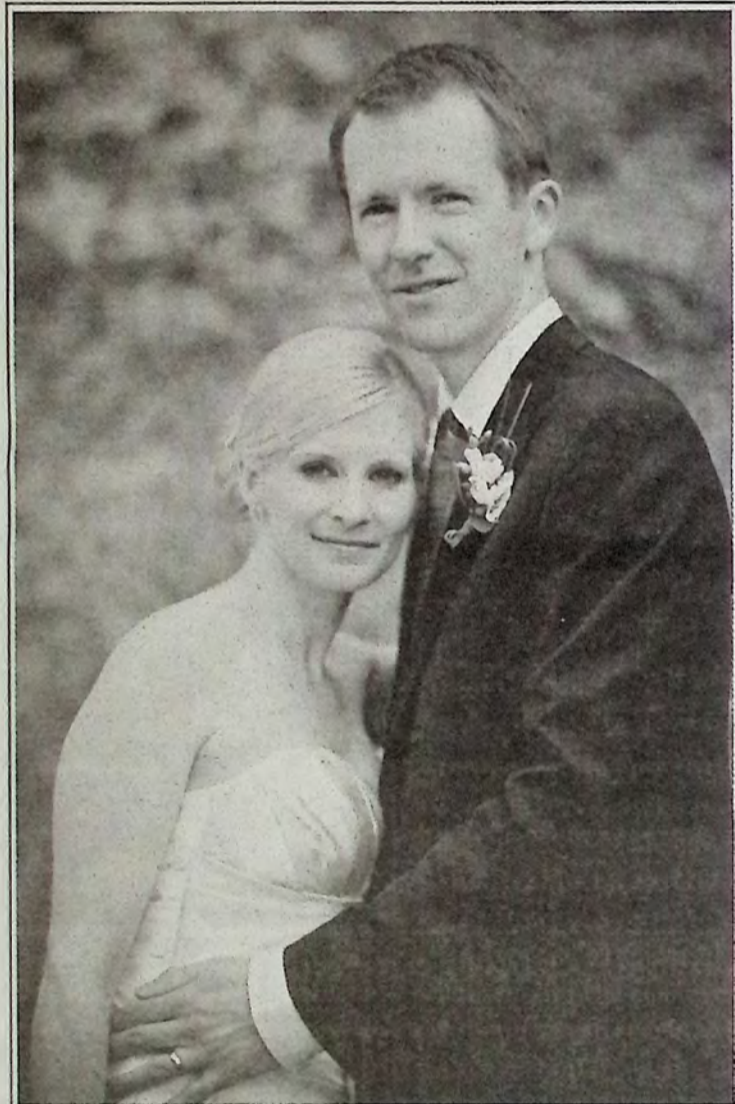
Mayor Randy McLean said, at the September 6 Town Council meeting, there is likely a need for more people to convert their old wood burning units to more modern stoves.

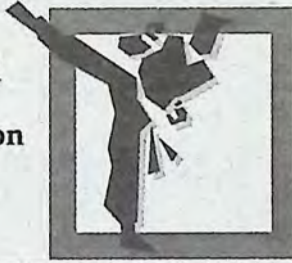

## Cemetery costs rise, Council moves stop sign

Town Council approved a bylaw that will see an increase in fees for burials and installation of grave markers. Mayor Randy McLean said the increase reflects the real cost of operating the cemetery, and brings local costs into line with what other communities charge. At the same time, local residents receive a very hefty discount on costs com-

pared with non-residents.

Grave preparation for an adult now costs \$600. Add to that the cost of the plot, the grave liner and the contribution to the care fund, and the total cost of a burial is \$1,370. If the burial is on a Saturday, the cost increases \$200.

A child burial, and burial of cremains, is much less, at \$220.

Placing a memorial marker ranges from \$110 to \$140.

For more detailed information on what you are allowed or disallowed to do at the cemetery, you can pick up a copy of the cemetery bylaw at Town Hall.

A complaint from the Accessibility Awareness Committee prompted action by Town Council. The committee told Town Council the stop sign at the corner of Bridge Street and Angela Avenue, near the supermarket, obstructed access for persons using wheelchairs.

Town staff looked into the problem and discovered the stop sign is in the middle of the sidewalk. The sign will be moved to a more sensible location.

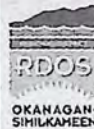

With the formal announcement August 29th that Mayor Walter Despot of Keremeos will not seek re-election, a big vacancy will open for an aspiring mayor.

Councillors Manfred Bauer, Gary Thielman, Charlene Cowling and Ed Minshull have not officially made their political aspirations known. Should one or more of the serving councillors decide to take a run at the mayor's position or decide themselves not to seek re-election, there would be more than one position to fill.

Mayor Despot plans to spend more time with his wife and family. He has endured recent cancer treatments and is expected to be symptom-free by January when he and his wife plan to visit Antarctica for the second time.

Here is Mayor Despot's announcement as presented at the August 29th Council meeting:

"It is with personal regret that I have concluded not to seek re-election as Mayor of Keremeos. I have enjoyed my nine years [mostly!] in office, and I thank the citizens of Keremeos for putting their trust in me.

"I am pleased with the advancements Keremeos has made, especially in health care, living accommodations, [assisted living, and low income housing], the development of

Memorial Park, and a major sewer upgrade on the bench.

"The Similkameen Valley Planning Society, reactivated in early 2003, has taken up the Valley challenge of clean ample water, clean air and improving upon our country living ambiance. We can no longer just think of the Village of Keremeos.

"I have always strived to make Keremeos a more enjoyable, comfortable place to live, be it thru Pharmacy, health services, Community projects, or emergency services. I will, of course, continue to devote myself to projects in the South Similkameen through Lower Similkameen Community Services and the South Okanagan /Similkameen Medical Foundation.

"To all the people I have worked with these past nine years, and farther back, thank you for your friendship and your devotion to our Community.

"After nine years now is the time to spend more time with my wife, and in my garden. I thank Barbara for her tolerance and understanding during these nine years.

"I sincerely hope to see a large slate of good candidates running for Council and Mayor in November."

We never know who will actually be running until nominations close on October 14th!!

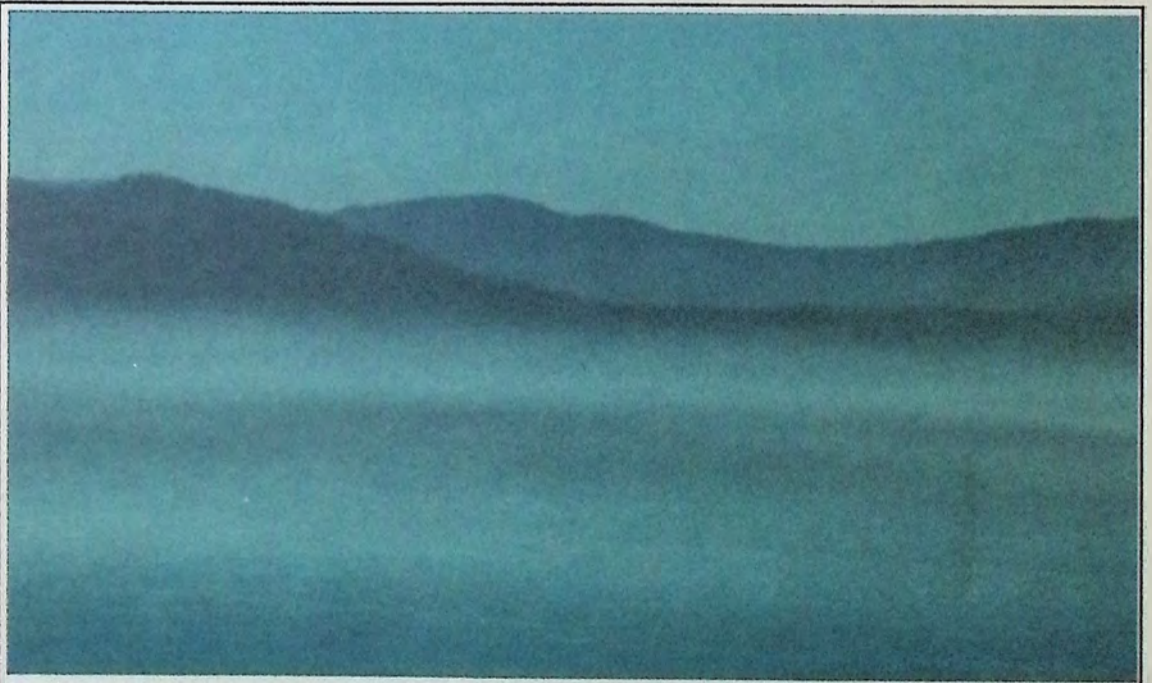

### Council approves seniors' plan

Princeton's Senior Citizens Branch 30 had requested support from Town Council for the Seniors' application for a grant to fix the roof on the Senior Citizens Centre. Keith Parsons attended the September 6 Town Council meeting to explain the problem with the roof and showed the design that would prevent further leaking.

Town Council supported the grant application, on condition the plan met with the building inspector's approval. Town Council also agreed to renew the lease earlier than scheduled, which was one of the conditions for receiving the grant.

Next year, the plan includes expanding the festival to involve the south Similkameen and the valley's wineries with small events at the wineries.

Council gave its support to having a festival next year and will support the grant application.

Mayor Randy McLean talked about the success of community events, adding "It really doesn't happen without people like you who do the work."

### Jarvis back to work

Councillor Ray Jarvis received a very warm welcome back to his seat at the Town Council table on September 6. Councillor Jarvis spoke of nearly dying in July and, with tears in his eyes, thanked all of the people who sent cards and good wishes to him while he was hospitalized.

He underwent an amputation and has a prosthetic leg. He said he is looking forward to "getting back on two feet" and hopes to be able to walk up and down the streets in the near future.

All other members of Town Council and staff gave a personal "welcome

back" to Councillor Jarvis.

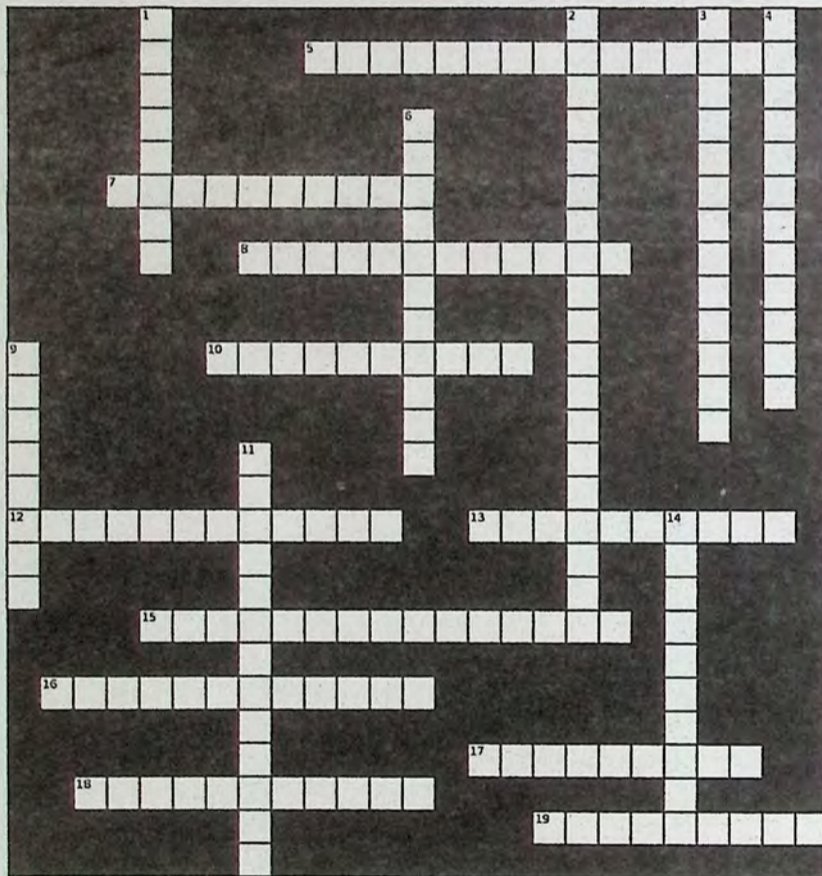

## Cancer Expert Blasts Cancer Society

Is there any family in Canada that has not lost a member to cancer? Is there any family that has not wept in grief over the suffering of a family member enduring cancer? All of us have a vested interest in how cancer donations and funding are spent, and an American doctor feels the money in the United States is not being spent properly. He goes so far as to suggest people stop donating to the American Cancer Society. We might want to think on what he is saying, as the same criticism might be leveled in our country.

Leading American cancer expert, Dr. Samuel Epstein, has written a book attacking the American Cancer Society (ACS) and includes the National Cancer Institute. His book National Cancer Institute and American Cancer Society: Criminal Indifference to Cancer Prevention and Conflicts of Interest, states both the ACS and NCS have spent tens of billions of taxpayer and

charity dollars on treatment of cancer but not on prevention.

Epstein says both institutions have issued statements leading people to believe the cancer rate is dropping, but this is false. The cancer rate continues to rise, says Epstein, and uses the NCI data to prove the truth. He finds that the number of cancer patients has increased 18 percent, and notes the dramatic increase in cancers among non-smokers.

This is quite alarming, as the campaign to stamp out smoking and second hand smoke should have led to a reduction in cancers. Instead, liver cancers have increased by 104 percent, thyroid by 54 percent, and prostate by 88 percent.

Worse, according to Dr. Epstein, the ACS and NCI have been withholding cancer prevention information, focusing only on stopping smoking and bad diet. He says they ignore cancer-causing contaminants in cosmetics, pesticides and other consumer products, including prescription drugs, high-dose diagnostic radiation (especially for children) and fail to inform the public of contaminants in the air, water, soil, the food we eat and our workplaces.

A further criticism comes from the way the American Cancer Society handles complaints about contaminants.

They demand proof that the contaminants have actually caused human cancers. Rather than seek to eliminate contaminants from our environment, the ACS demands cancer patients follow a

legal procedure to develop proof.

The NCI has told the public the causes of childhood cancers are largely unknown. Dr. Epstein says there is plenty of scientific evidence to show that children are affected by environmental contaminants, and children are the most vulnerable to these contaminants.

To confirm what Dr. Epstein says, two west coast doctors in the United States have issued a warning about infant deaths as a result of radioactive fallout. These doctors report a 35 percent increase in deaths of children under one year of age since the Fukushima nuclear disaster.

The way Dr. Epstein sees the role of the ACS and NCI is to take a pro-active stand against environmental contaminants, which is what these publicly funded and privately funded bodies are not doing.

I support Dr. Epstein's position completely. Billions upon billions of dollars have been spent on cancer research during the past 50 years and we are very slightly ahead in treatment after 50 years. I know cancer research is important, but maybe prevention is more important?

If there is a list of contaminants out there, then shouldn't our cancer societies and foundations be spending money to stop the contaminants from entering our environment? Instead, we are told not to smoke and to eat properly, so if we do get cancer, it is our own fault, right?

The incidence of cancer is increasing every year. Don't tell me we can blame all the new cases on smoking or obesity.

There were a lot more smokers and many fat people 50 years ago, and the cancer rate was much lower. Why can't we point a finger at industrial pollutants, nuclear pollutants, food pollutants, and drug contaminants?

If cancer societies really cared about stopping cancer, why not work to stop it before it starts? Why can't the cancer societies go after the major polluters, or at least tell us who they are and what they manufacture or do to our environment?

Maybe, before we give another dollar to a cancer society, we should ask what the society has done lately to take the contaminants out of our environment and off the shelves of food stores, cosmetic counters and pharmacies.

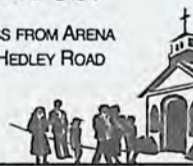

# Pool Committee sends information

The Princeton & District Aquatic Centre Referendum Committee is answering many questions regarding the parcel tax and how it affects individual property owners. The Committee recommends that you contact Princeton Town Hall or the RDOS Office regarding your personal property tax notices for your own personal understanding of your own taxes. Below are answers to some basic questions but as everyone is unique please review your tax notice and contact your appropriate governing body.

The main question that keeps coming up from the community is: If my home, business, or cabin is situated on one or more parcels of land do I have to pay for each parcel of land with improvements on them? It all depends if the parcels of land with improvements on it is considered one folio or not. Do you receive one tax notice for everything as it is one folio or do you receive multiple tax notices for your home and then your garage? Every land owner is unique in our vast community and should take the time to understand their personal taxes.

An example from the Area is a land owner who has five parcels of land with a home, garage and another building on three separate parcels of land but is considered one folio for their property taxes. This property owner will only pay the one parcel tax.

Another example from the Area is a land owner who has three parcels

of land with a home and garage on it. This land owner receives two property taxes separately for their home and garage as their land is subdivided and considered two separate folios. In this case the land owner will be paying a parcel tax for these separate parcels of land.

If you receive property taxes for land with no improvements on it then the aquatic centre parcel tax does not apply.

If you own a home in Area H, rental home in Princeton and own the land that your business operates on then you will be taxed accordingly for three separate parcels of land.

Currently the aquatic centre parcel tax will be taxed to 3,344 parcels of land. At this time the government does not recognize parcels of land under development such as the subdivisions and business park being built in Princeton or homes under construction in Area H.

In the future as the area continues to grow and additional parcels of land are developed this cost will be shared by more and more parcels of land with improvements on them.

Health Care Professionals state time and again that the benefit of an aquatic centre for any community is a great thing. Swimming is widely regarded as the best overall exercise. Water allows for gentle resistance to body movement that builds more muscle than any other exercise; buoyancy allows for safer, low impact aerobics and helps to avoid injury. Simply floating in water helps reduce stress. The social benefits of being with others reduces depression and adds to the overall enjoyment of an aquatic experience.

Princeton and Area H strive to bring more health care professionals to our area. An Aquatic Centre is a great facility to do so. Health Care Professionals who have considered our area have stated that the lack of an aquatic centre to assist in the healthy living of the community is one of the reasons they are not moving here. Patients who require 'weightless' exercise through the use of water

have to travel out of town to do so and in turn, do not make those trips.

An Aquatic Centre can assist everyone in remaining healthy over long winter months where exercising outdoors on icy roads and windy trails is not an enjoyable thing. Outdoor winter sport enthusiasts can benefit from additional forms of exercise that an aquatic centre can bring; along with the relaxation and therapy of a hot tub.

Growing industry in the area invites new families to invest in homes here. A main obstacle for families choosing not to purchase a home in the area is due to the lack of an aquatic centre which has been heard from realtors and industry managers.

Currently many families invest time and money to travel outside the area to enjoy aquatic centres in other communities for swim lessons, exercise and fun. For years, youth from our area have asked for a facility where they can play, be with friends, learn about water safety, take lessons and enjoy an aquatic centre in a controlled safe environment.

Local sport organizations have asked for an aquatic centre for the added training benefits for their athletes. Teams from outside of the community often turn down tournament invitations as there is no aquatic centre to entertain their families between games or in the evenings.

The benefits of an aquatic centre for our community are endless. Please consider them as you decide how to vote for yourself, family, neighbors and community on September 24, 2011.

#### Elector Registration

There is no need to pre-register to vote as the registration of all electors for voting will take place at the time of voting. You will be required to make a declaration that you meet the following requirements:

- 18 years of age or older
- Canadian citizen
- resident of BC for at least 6 months immediately preceding voting day (Thursday, March 24, 2011)
- resident of OR registered owner of real property in the Electoral Area 'H' (Princeton Rural) and Town of Princeton service area for at least 30 days immediately preceding voting day (Thursday, August 25, 2011)
- not otherwise disqualified by law from voting.

#### Non-Resident Elector Registration

Non-Resident Electors meeting the requirements above, may register in advance or at the voting place. If non-resident electors choose to register at the time of voting they MUST be sure to obtain a Non-Resident Elector Certificate.

#### Mail-in Ballot

Regional District voters are eligible to vote using a mail in ballot if they:

- a) Have a physical disability, illness or injury that affects their ability to vote at another voting opportunity
- b) If voters expect to be absent from the Regional District on voting day and at the times of all advance voting opportunities
- c) Voters who reside in East Gate Manning Park of Electoral Area H are eligible to use mail in ballot, without meeting the above two requirements, as it is remote from the voting places.

Before 4:00 PM September 22, 2011 eligible electors must submit the following information to the Regional District office by mail, telephone, fax or email (info@rdos.bc.ca):

- a) Full name
- b) Residential address
- c) Address of the property in relation to which they are voting (for non-resident electors),
- d) Method of delivery of the mail ballot package:
  - a. Pick up at Regional District office, OR
  - b. Regular lettermail through Canada Post to residential address, OR
  - c. Regular lettermail through Canada Post to an alternate address provided when requesting the ballot package
