Posse win home opener

Home openers have not been kind to Princeton's KIJHL team.

Since 2005, the Posse have won only two of them, and the last win was in 2007 in overtime.

The Posse welcomed Spokane Braves to the Similkameen September 16th to officially start the 2011/12 regular season.

Princeton had a total of seven team veterans dressed for the game (Sky Buller, Tim Martens, Adrian Coulter, Devon Grossler, Alex Demchuk, Spencer Kristensen and Cameron Weir) and launched into an aggressive match from the first puck drop.

Spokane scored first at 14:46 (Mitch

Fowler from Nathan Carter) and half a period later Princeton responded with a tying goal at 4:06 (Justin Moltzahn from Adrian Coulter).

Princeton took the lead at 3:06 (Alex Demchuk from Eric Schmidt and Spencer Kristensen).

Just over a minute later, at 1:54, Keenan Fordy took a pass from Justin Moltzahn and sailed past the Spokane goal and backhanded a shot into the wide open right side.

The Posse added goal #4 at 14:07 of the second (Alex Demchuk from Spencer Kristensen) before Spokane's second at 10:39 on the power play (Mitch Fowler from continued on Page 8

Aquatic Centre Committee reviews the facts

The Aquatic Centre Committee would like to give you some facts that will help you make an informed decision for yourselves on how to vote. It is not our intention to convince you how to vote in making a decision that will affect your life, family, neighbors or community. The decision is yours to make.

Fact #1 - Under Law it is your right to vote as a resident who owns land or not. Under Law, non-resident land owners have the right to vote as one voice, meaning if more than one person is named on the title of land then the co-owners must assign one person to vote for them as a collective.

Under Law you must prove that you are 18 years of age or older, resident of BC at least six months pre-

ceding voting day; resident in the Electoral Area H or Town of Princeton for at least 30 days immediately preceding voting day (resident since August 25, 2011); and not otherwise disqualified by law to vote.

Under Law you must produce two pieces of ID to be able to cast your vote. This could be a driver's license and care card. One piece of ID must have your signature on it.

Fact #2 - You are voting on whether local government should borrow money on your behalf to build and operate an Aquatic Centre for the area. If the referendum passes, the local government can approach federal and provincial government for additional financial support along with corporation and other funding

opportunities. Local government will not start building until all funding is secure. If the referendum passes then local government has up to five years to enact the aquatic centre

The purpose of Bylaw No. 2564, 2011 is to establish a service for the purpose of providing an aquatic centre in the Town of Princeton including without limitation the acquisition of all necessary interests in property and the construction and maintenance, with a maximum annual requisition by way of parcel tax of \$1,206,491.

The purpose of Bylaw No. 2565, 2011 is to authorize the Regional District to borrow a sum not to exceed \$6,000,000 (six million dollars) for the purpose of providing an aquatic centre in the Town of Princeton under the Princeton Aquatic Centre Service, including without limitation the acquisition of all necessary or desirable interests in property and the construction of the aquatic centre facilities.

Elector Registration

There is no need to pre-register to vote as the registration of all electors for voting will take place at the time of voting. You will be required to make a declaration that you meet the following requirements:

- 18 years of age or older
- Canadian citizen
- resident of BC for at least 6 months immediately preceding voting day (Thursday, March 24, 2011)
- resident of OR registered owner of real property in the Electoral Area 'H' (Princeton Rural) and Town of Princeton service area for at least 30 days immediately preceding voting day (Thursday, August 25, 2011)
- not otherwise disqualified by law from voting.

Non-Resident Elector Registration

Non-Resident Electors meeting the requirements above, may register in advance or at the voting place. If non-resident electors choose to register at the time of voting they MUST be sure to obtain a Non-Resident Elector Certificate.

Mail-in Ballot

Regional District voters are eligible to vote using a mail in ballot if they:

- a) Have a physical disability, illness or injury that affects their ability to vote at another voting opportunity
- b) If voters expect to be absent from the Regional District on voting day and at the times of all advance voting opportunities
- c) Voters who reside in East Gate Manning Park of Electoral Area H are eligible to use mail in ballot, without meeting the above two requirements, as it is remote from the voting places.

Before 4:00 PM September 22, 2011 eligible electors must submit the following information to the Regional District office by mail, telephone, fax or email (info@rdos.bc.ca):

- a) Full name
- b) Residential address
- c) Address of the property in relation to which they are voting (for non-resident electors),
- d) Method of delivery of the mail ballot package:
 - a. Pick up at Regional District office, OR
 - b. Regular lettermail through Canada Post to residential address, OR
 - c. Regular lettermail through Canada Post to an alternate address provided when requesting the ballot package
- e) Electors must indicate whether they will be voting as a resident or non-resident property elector.

From on or about September 7, 2011 until 4:00 PM, September 22, 2011, mail ballot packages will be sent to electors who have submitted a request with the required information as noted above.

Chief Election Officer by the close of the polling station(s) September 24, 2011 – 8:00 PM**

Identification

All electors will be required to produce two pieces of identification that TOGETHER prove who they are and where they live. One of the pieces of identification MUST have a signature on it.

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The estimated annual debt payment on \$6,000,000.00 over 20 years is \$456,500.

The annual parcel tax per Residential or Business property will not exceed \$361.

The maximum tax rate is set by bylaw and is subject to elector assent.

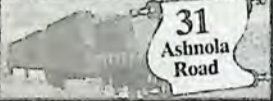

Preventing Parkinson's Disease

Some rather odd findings by American medical researchers regarding Parkinson's disease have been published in obscure papers. Two of the findings indicate coffee and cigarette smoking may prevent the disease. The third finding has not been given any real publicity, but suggests Co-enzyme Q10 can prevent the onset of Parkinson's and slow down the progress of this debilitating disease.

Parkinson's disease is a degenerative disease affecting the nervous system. Scientists have found a deficiency of a brain substance called dopamine, a substance that carries messages from one nerve cell to another. This disease has been blamed on malnutrition.

A number of drugs are available for the treatment of Parkinson's, all of them effective to a point, but none of them are a cure.

Calcium and magnesium are essential supplements in the treatment of Parkinson's, and a good preventative measure. No more than 1,500 mg. should be taken daily. GABA and lecithin have been proven helpful. CoQ10 is a new supplement recommended following the research done in the United States. The recommended amount is 1,000 mg. per day, but it is no instant miracle. It must be taken for 16 months before the results are noticeable. The key is that the brain function improves slowly. In Parkinson's, any improvement is preferable to the steady decline of brain function.

When it comes to preventing Parkinson's, the best prevention is a good daily diet of a wide variety of foods: whole grains, fruit, vegetables, meat, fish and dairy. A good daily diet prevents most diseases.

Boyfriend leads to trouble

Kayla Read drove from Prince George to Princeton to see her boyfriend who was working in Princeton. Police stopped her in Princeton on a routine check. The officer could smell a strong odour of marijuana in the vehicle and following a brief search, discovered 473 grams of marijuana in a satchel in the car. Read replied, "Yes."

Judge Shaw commented, "A very serious stupid mistake." then added some equally serious statements to

Read about the usual consequences for conviction of trafficking drugs.

As Read had never been before the court in the past, Judge Shaw decided to be lenient and give Read a conditional discharge with a one year probation. The conditions are that Read consume no alcohol or illegal drugs and have no drug paraphernalia in her possession, nor any firearms. Read is to complete 20 hours of community work service.

As a final comment on the case, Judge Shaw said, "Miss Read, I think you have a lot of potential. Let's see it."

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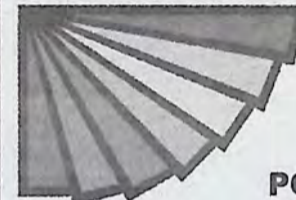

They have worked together to lobby, and will continue to lobby, for Medical Service Funding that is distributed from the Ministry of Health to keep our emergency doors open.

Triple Cherry Pie

This fresh and simple recipe offers an iconic dessert option the whole family will love.

Ingredient List:

- 2 1/2 cups (500 g) fresh, sweet northwest cherries (about 1 pound), pitted
- 2 1/2 cups (500 g) fresh or frozen tart cherries (about 1 pound), pitted
- 1/2 cup (100 g) dried Northwest cherries
- 3/4 cup (150 g) granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons (25 g) quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/2 teaspoon (2 g) almond extract
- 1/4 teaspoon (1 g) ground nutmeg
- pastry for 2-crust, 9-inch pie
- 1 tablespoon (14 g) butter, chopped

Preparation Method:

Combine sweet cherries, tart cherries, dried cherries, sugar, tapioca, almond extract, and nutmeg in a large bowl; mix well. Let stand 15 minutes. (It is not necessary to thaw frozen tart cherries before using.) Line a 9-inch pie plate with half the pastry.

Fill with cherry mixture; dot with butter. Roll out remaining pastry and cut into six strips about 1-inch wide and 10-inches long. Weave into a lattice pattern over cherries. Trim edges, pinching top and bottom crusts together. Bake in a preheated 375°F (190.5 °C) oven 50 to 60 minutes, or until crust is golden and filling is bubbly.

If necessary, cover edge of crust with aluminum foil to prevent overbrowning. Let cool before serving.

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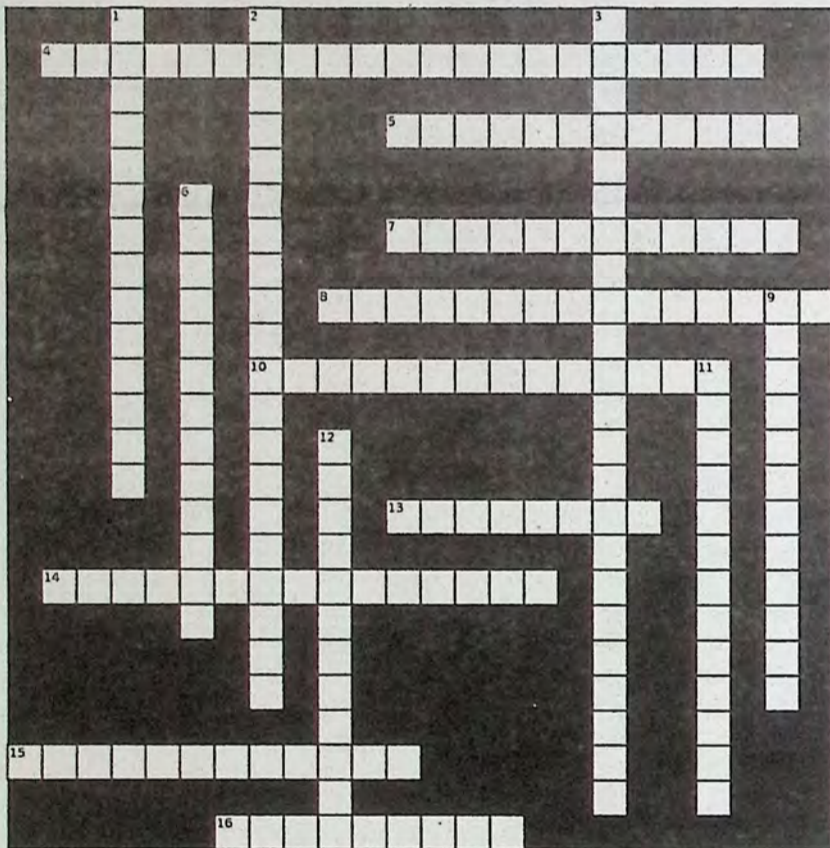

Soon It Will Be Over

We voted on the Pool Referendum during the Advance Poll. It's becoming a habit of ours – voting before General Voting Day.

I like it so I can basically get it done early and not worry about waiting in line or trying to find parking or having to hear last-minute attempts to sway our vote one way or other.

I will say that I did hesitate for a moment once I was in the voting booth.

I knew how I wanted to vote and tried very hard to make my decision based on something other than emotion – which is how many have been reacting in the weeks leading up to the Pool Referendum. There's been more than enough dirt thrown back and forth to fill Centennial Pool, again.

There's no doubt in my mind the addition of a new aquatic centre would be an asset to the community. Will it be the best thing to happen to Princeton? I guess that depends on what you are using as your gauge.

I sort of think the best thing to happen to Princeton is the re-opening of Copper Mountain Mine. Call me silly, but I think in order for our town to grow and properly afford some new infrastructure, we need a solid local economy.

That's why I think the Pool Proposal is just slightly ahead of its time. Maybe a year or two from now, once the mine has stabilized and the local economy has adjusted to the shift that is currently taking place, it might be the right project to develop.

Or, at least, that's how I look at it.

What happens if the Pool Referendum fails?

It shouldn't be the end of the project. If anything, it should be the starting point for the existing Pool Committee to start the process all over again.

A 'NO' vote should be understood by the Pool Committee and those supporting the project as 'No, not right now' and not 'No, not ever.'

If we all can see it that way, maybe the next time an aquatic centre proposal comes up the results will be different.

Pool Reality Check

To The Editor,

Here are few more points to consider in the discussion about the proposed Aquatic Centre (AC). The figures I have used for population, age of residents and family income are from the 2006 census. Not included are the areas around the mentioned towns, areas equivalent to Area H. Other figures are from our AC committee's pamphlets and the Town of Princeton commissioned AC Feasibility Study.

1. Who is calling the shots? The Town of Princeton has been paying most/all? of the bills in the push forward to the referendum. Over the period 2008 to the present the Town has paid the consultants \$31,566.42. Although there are a few Area H residents on the AC committee the committee is a de facto agent of the Town of Princeton and they have acted as the promotion group for the project.

2. Who chose the design for the AC? I came away from the June 2011 public AC meeting with the firm impression that the AC committee had selected "The Preferred Concept". It turns out that if we go to the website www.princeton-aquaticcentre.com and choose "feasibility study", then click at the bottom of the page to go on to the feasibility study we will find on page 49, "The Preferred Concept" dated "26 June 2008". That design is the same as the design that we were presented with at the June 2011 meeting.

3. Demographics. As we age activity levels gradually decline, so a younger population will have more potential AC users. At the June 2011 meeting the consultants offered up Houston B.C. as a possible model as it is the town with an aquatic centre whose population is closest to Princeton's. Houston has 18% more residents, 3,165 vs. 2,675 for Princeton. What the consultants did not tell us was that Houston's population 65 and over is 8% vs. 26% for Princeton's. To put this into perspective, Canada has 16% of its population 65 and over and it is forecast to rise to 24% in 40 years. Also not mentioned by the consultants is that Houston's median family income (the median is where half of the

families earn more and half earn less) was 51% higher than Princeton's, \$74,861 vs. \$49,444.

4. Population matters. To compare the operating loss of an aquatic centre in large and small towns we can use the per capita cost which is the cost if every person in a town paid an equal amount to cover the operating loss. For example if aquatic centres in Merritt and Princeton both had an operating loss of \$500,000 per year the per capita cost for Merritt, population 6,995, would be \$71.48 and for Princeton, population 2,675, it would be \$186.92, 261% higher. Capital costs are similarly affected. The new \$50 million Olympic size pool in Kelowna, population 106,705, has a per capita cost of \$469. Princeton's proposed \$9 million aquatic centre would have a per capita cost of \$3,364.

5. Revenue. In the AC committee Revision #3 pamphlet, they estimate annual AC revenue at \$193,000 or \$72.15 per capita. Similar communities with operating ACs mentioned in the feasibility study had per capita revenues of: Kimberly \$37.34, Revelstoke \$42.66, Fernie \$48.21, Houston \$63.09. Among the five communities Princeton has the highest median age (51) and the lowest median family income; is it believable that a Princeton aquatic centre would take in the highest per capita revenue? In addition a survey to gauge the interest of citizens in in-the-water activities has never been done. If the revenue estimate is too high then the operating loss will increase and we would expect taxes to increase.

6. A deluxe facility. The architect design for "The Preferred Concept" is pleasing to look at, spacious, has lots of windows (2,583 sq. ft.), with large change rooms (2,210 sq. ft.), with two pools each at different temperatures plus a twenty-person hot tub and a sauna. Pretty nice, just the sort of thing a wealthy town would want. A prudent smaller town with an older population and modest income would likely choose a single pool designed to accommodate as many uses as possible in a simple rectangular building with a smallish window area to conserve

heat. Why is Princeton Town Council endorsing such an expensive concept?

7. Health and exercise. Scientific data compiled over recent decades re-enforces the evidence showing the positive effect of exercise on health and particularly on better health as we age. Apart from improving more common conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes, more recent data confirms that exercise suppresses cancer and delays the onset and severity of such intractable conditions as arthritis and dementia. Almost any activity is good but the best ones are those that engage the most people the most often. Our recreation department should be relentlessly promoting the "active lifestyle". Here is a quote from the excellent recreational facilities feasibility study, page 32, of the city of Lakeside, Ontario, "Year after year, provincial trends suggest that swimming continues to be one of the most popular activities pursued by citizens, usually ranking only behind walking as the favoured leisure pursuit." Walking and walking paths have advantages: they are relatively inexpensive to build, maintenance costs are very small, most of us walk, you don't have to pay, you can go any time that suits you and if you wish you can take friends, children, grandma, baby and the dog. Fresh air and exercise are hard to beat. Many options are needed to engage our citizens in the "active lifestyle".

8. The biggest deficiency. We know the recreational choice of Princeton Town Council but at no time have our politicians asked us for our preferences. What kind of an expensive feasibility study is it that only addresses design features and cost without FIRST ascertaining the preferences of the potential users? What if an aquatic centre is not our first choice? We need an independent, transparent, and unbiased survey of recreational preferences before any further grand initiatives are launched.

Is The World Really Going Crazy?

If you have thought the world seems to be going crazy, or you have thought the people you know seem to have a lot of emotional or mental problems, you are probably right.

A major study was undertaken in all of the nations of Europe. The purpose of the study was to discover how many people suffered from mental and emotional problems that were identified by physicians. The results of the study were published recently. Four out of 10 Europeans suffer some form of mental and/or emotional disorder.

A similar study has not been done in North America, but chances are we are just as mentally disturbed as the Europeans. I do not believe I would be surprised to learn 40 percent of us are a bit nutty in some

From what I have seen of how politicians conduct themselves in most nations, I firmly believe a large percentage are in dire need of treatment. I believe many of the media people who endorse the nutty ideas are candidates for treatment, along with the bureaucrats who carry out some of the nutty directives and policies (this latter group may have been driven crazy).

One of the things we do not do in our polite society is express our belief that somebody is crazy, off his rocker, a few bricks short of a load, or whatever. In particular, we do not make this statement to the person who needs treatment. We might say it confidentially to somebody we trust, but we do not say it to the person who most needs to know he or she has stripped a mental gear.

I should not limit my remarks to only the political category, or the media, or the bureaucrats, because there are a lot of good examples closer to home. If you have driven any distance in summertime traffic in our valley, you have seen many examples of people who are clearly in need of treatment for believing they are immortal and their speeding and unsafe passing will have no consequences. Most of us have little idiosyncrasies in our behaviour that cause no harm to anyone and probably do not need any sort of treatment, but it seems, according to the European study, that four out of 10 of us have some serious problems. I believe each of us needs to do some soul-searching now and then to see whether what we believe and what we do makes any sort of common sense.

If there seems to be a lack of sense, then maybe it's time to reconsider one's own sanity?



To the Editor,

It would appear that 1998 was an important year in the evolution of the Princeton Aquatic Centre saga.

The "Town of Princeton Proposal for a New Indoor Aquatic Centre for Princeton and District" brochure takes that year as a starting point, and so does the Information Sheet distributed to all Area 'H' residents.

The significance of this year was explained by the Arena and Recreation Centre Manager, Lyle Thomas:

"In 1998 the recreation department conducted a recreation survey of both the Town and Area H. Although not a scientific study, 360 surveys were filled in and returned. 55% were from Town

residents, and 45% were from Area H residents. The number one need or desire identified by those who responded was the construction of an indoor aquatic centre. Since then we have conducted many smaller surveys and found the same response."

I have not been able to locate the "many smaller surveys" and it would appear that these important documents are not published, but the original 1998 pool survey can now be found on-line by simply using Google.

One of the things which sticks out is that there is no mention of any Area 'H' communities, and the terms "Princeton" and "District" are used interchangeably.

It is interesting to note the first two points in the Aquatic Centre

Referendum Brochure which everyone probably has seen by now.

- A recreation Master Plan conducted in 1998 identified a new indoor aquatic centre as the number one priority in the community.

- The new Official Community Plan confirmed that the need for a new Aquatic Centre was a high priority.

The only mention in the Princeton OCP is in section 8.2.3 which states "Initiate a feasibility study for an expansion of aquatic and/or recreation facilities within the community including opportunities to retrofit Riverside Centre."

Nevertheless, how the original 1998 survey turned into a "Master Plan" is perhaps more concerning,

especially considering that it ends with the following summary:

"It is important to note that the pool was only one part of an extensive community survey. The pool did rank high on the list of interest and concern. Therefore it would be wise to produce a sur-

vey that would address only pool issues. Questions that need answering are: Indoor vs Outdoor, Leisure vs Competition Pool, Tax increase for development, New or Renovate Existing Pool."

I couldn't agree more.
