School Board News

Trustees approve hockey plan
Many students at Princeton Secondary School would like to play hockey but have no team to join and no coach. Sandi Blair, Principal at Princeton Secondary, along with teacher Kirk McConnell, presented a plan to the Board of Education to bring hockey into the school curriculum.

Blair explained there are two ways to consider introducing hockey. One is as an elective. The other is as a hockey academy, which is more flexible but could charge fees. The plan is to have students spend three hours on the ice, and three hours off ice learning about game strategy, rules and positions.

The course would not only train

hockey players, but referees as well. The course would run for one semester. Dale 'Duner' Hladun, the coach of the Posse Junior B team, has offered his assistance, with help from Posse players, and the Town of Princeton is in favour of having the students use the ice during the day.

Trustees approved the concept, which allows Blair and McConnell to pursue the information needed to establish the course. Parents of interested students must be consulted, schools teaching hockey must be consulted, and other hockey academy courses must be reviewed before further approval is obtained.

Board approves tour
At the October 12 meeting of the

Board of Education of School District # 58 (Nicola-Similkameen), trustees approved a spring break European tour for students at Princeton Secondary School.

The students will see Germany, Switzerland and Italy on a tour planned by a company specializing in student tours. The Board and School Superintendent reviewed all of the preparations and security required, and decided all of the requirements had been met.

Enrolment drops in Princeton
School District administration was surprised to find that there are fewer students enrolled in Princeton schools than anticipated.

Projected enrolment was down by 61, with most of the loss in Vermilion Forks Elementary and Princeton Secondary.

Distance education had a substantial decrease in enrolment, too.

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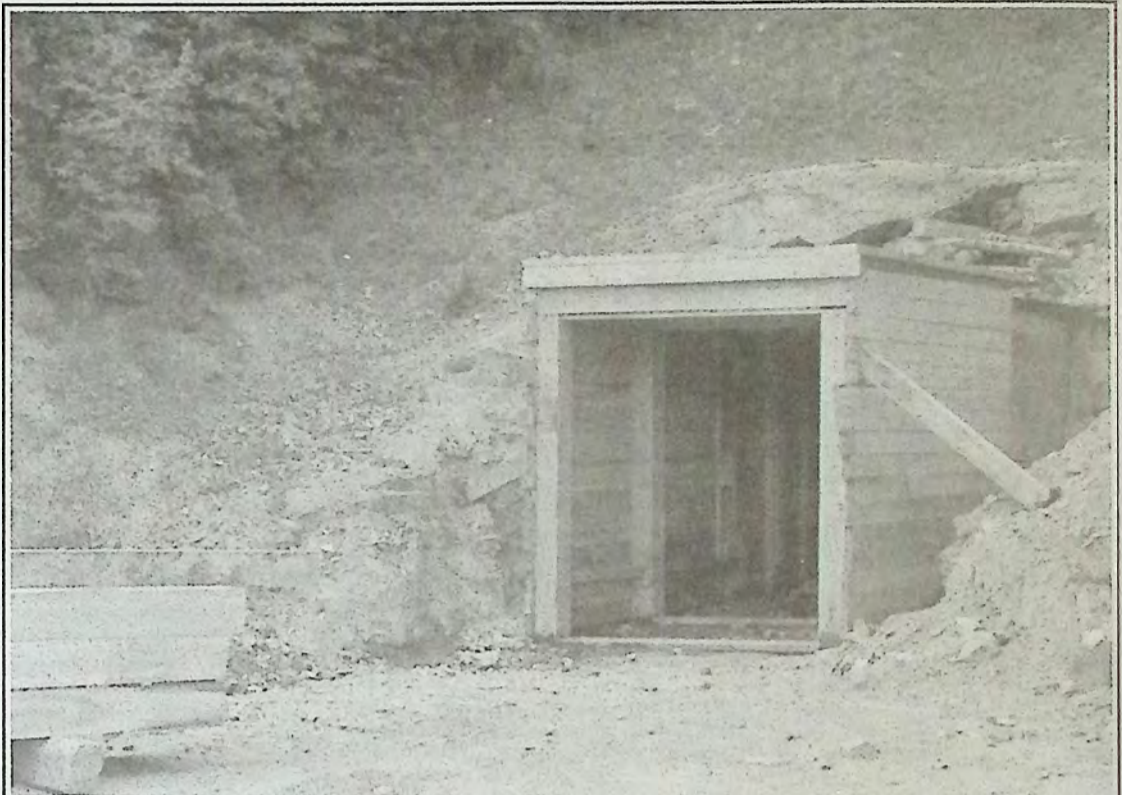

Huldra expects 200-tonne per day mill

Huldra Silver Inc. (TSX-V:HDA) (the "Company" or "Huldra") announced October 3rd that the shipment of the 200 tonne per day grinding and floatation mill began on September 30th from Zhengzhou, China.

The mill inspection in China has been progressing for approximately two weeks with all work substan-

tially completed. Some electrical components are still going through Canadian Standards Association (CSA) approval and should have been completed last week.

The assembly of the mill will commence at the Company's Merritt mill site in November. Civil and foundation work will be completed prior to the arrival of the mill in British Columbia.

Ryan Sharp, the Company's President and CEO, states "We are extremely happy with the work done by Dave Archibald and Canadian Royal Mining Corp., and their partners at Zhengzhou Zhongding Heavy Duty Machine Manufacturing Co. Ltd. We put together a very aggressive schedule and they were able to deliver. This is a major milestone for the Company as we progress towards production."

The Company continues to transfer stockpiled material from the Treasure Mountain Property to its mill site in Merritt, at the rate of approximately 400 tonnes per day.

About Huldra

Huldra is currently working on plans to put its Treasure Mountain Project, located 3 hours east of Vancouver, into development, subject to permitting and financing. The Company is also actively assessing other opportunities for acquisition and development.

About Treasure Mountain

Miners were first attracted to the area in the early 1890's and Charles Connelly was credited with staking the first claim in 1894.

Leadville, which was also known during its 40-year history as Summit City, Summit Camp and Summit City Camp, was never a city, camp or settlement.

BC Mining File #092H6-AG1 describes the site of the Silver Chief claim as being "located at about the 5,400 foot elevation on the south slope of Treasure Mountain, at the

head of the Tulameen River, 17 miles east-northeast of Hope and during the early period of exploration the area was known as Summit Camp."

The report continued to state that the Silver Chief claim was staked by Andy Jensen of Tulameen in 1906 and optioned to W. B. Dornberg and associates of Spokane in 1910. Development work went until 1915 under the name of Treasure Mountain Mining Company.

When work ceased in 1915 the workings comprised a 65-foot shaft, an upper crosscut (a cutting made across the course of a vein or the general direction of the workings) adit totaling about 227 feet of crosscut and drifts (a horizontal or inclined passage following a mineral vein or coal seam), and the #2 crosscut adit (a horizontal passage leading into a mine for the purposes of access or drainage), 425 feet below the upper adit, totaling about 958 feet of crosscut and drifts, evidence that a lot of work had been done at the site.

The Mary E Mining Company Limited was incorporated in 1925 in order to purchase the property from Dornberg and associates and underground work the following year was done in the #2 adit as well as a new crosscut adit (known as #3) on Lot 1209, about 378 feet below #2.

In 1926 the company was renamed the Cascade Consolidated Silver Mining Company Limited. From 1951 to 1956 intermittent development work was completed. By December 1956 a 50-ton per day mill was installed near the portal of the #3 adit but all work ceased early the next year with the mill removed from the property in July 1957. The company charter was surrendered in 1961.

The site has been the property of Huldra Silver Inc. since 1980.

NEW SAVINGS TOOLS HELP CANADIANS WITH DISABILITIES AND THEIR FAMILIES INVEST IN THEIR FUTURE

In December 2008, the Government of Canada introduced the Registered Disability Savings Plan (RDSP), Canada Disability Savings Grant and Canada Disability Savings Bond to help Canadians with disabilities and their families save for the future.

The RDSP is available to Canadian residents under the age of 60 who are eligible for the Disability Tax Credit, which is also known as the Disability Amount. Application T-2201. People who are eligible, and the parents or guardians of eligible minors, can open an RDSP at one of several financial organizations across the country.

There is no annual contribution limit to an RDSP. The lifetime contribution limit is \$200,000. Friends and family can also contribute to a plan with written permission of the plan holder. Any investment income earned in the plan accumulates tax free, until money is withdrawn.

To encourage savings, the Government of Canada introduced the Canada Disability Savings Grant and the Canada Disability Savings Bond.

The Canada Disability Savings Grant is a matching grant that the Government deposits into the RDSP. Each year, the Government will match contributions made by paying up to \$3 for every \$1 paid into the plan, depending on the amount contributed and the beneficiary's family income. The Government will deposit a maximum of \$3,500 each year, with a lifetime limit of \$70,000. Grants will be paid into the RDSP until the year the beneficiary turns 49 years old.

For example:

If the beneficiary's family income is less than or equal to \$83,088:
- The Government will deposit \$3 for every \$1 on the first \$500 contributed to the RDSP and \$2 for every \$1 on the next \$1,000.

If the beneficiary's family income is over \$83,088:

- The Government will match \$1 for every \$1 contributed on the first \$1,000.

The Government of Canada will also pay a Canada Disability Savings Bond of up to \$1,000 to low-income and modest-income Canadians. The good news is that no contributions are necessary to receive the bond; simply open an RDSP and fill out an application form at the financial organization where you have your RDSP. Bonds will be paid into the RDSP until the year the beneficiary turns 49 years old.

For example:

If the beneficiary's family income is less than or equal to \$24,183:

- The Government will deposit \$1,000 each year into the RDSP.

For beneficiary family incomes between \$24,183 and \$41,544:

- The Government will deposit a portion of the \$1,000. As your income increases, the bond amount paid decreases.

IMPROVEMENTS TO THE RDSP

This year, the Government of Canada has introduced new measures to the RDSP, the grant and the bond that provide more flexibility to Canadians with disabilities and their families when saving for the future.

If you or a loved one currently has an RDSP or are thinking about opening an RDSP, this is important news for you:

- Beginning in January 2011, you can claim unused grant and bond entitlements from the past 10 years (starting from 2008, the year RDSPs became available). This applies to new and existing plans.

If you have a child or grandchild with a disability, this is important news for you:

- As of July 2011, parents or grandparents are able to arrange for some or all of their retirement savings to be transferred, tax-free, to the RDSP of their financially dependent child or grandchild when they pass away.

Money paid out of an RDSP will not affect a person's eligibility for federal benefits, such as the Canada Child Tax Benefit, the Goods and Services Tax credit, Old Age Security or Employment Insurance benefits. In addition, RDSPs will have little or no impact on provincial and territorial social assistance payments. For further details, contact your provincial or territorial government.

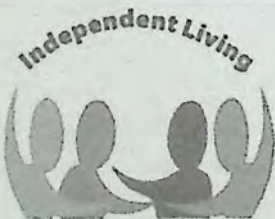

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News from School District 58 (Nicola-Similkameen)

Board aims for more grads

The rate of students graduating in School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) was 68 percent for the year 2009-2010. This is about average for British Columbia, but the Board of Education is aiming for a 75 percent graduation rate. The rate is determined by comparing the number of students enrolled in Grade 8 with the number from the same class who graduate from Grade 12.

Although the majority of drop-out students in the past were males, the majority of drop-outs are now females. Most students drop out between grades 9 and 12.

District Superintendent Dr. Robert Peacock told the Board, "If you can keep them to Grade 12, they graduate."

The trustees would like to know why more girls are dropping out, and Trustee Richie Gage suggested making discreet inquiries to determine the cause.

Schools celebrate garden

School Superintendent Dr. Robert Peacock praised the celebration held earlier this fall at the garden students tend at John Allison Elementary School. He showed the school trustees a number of photos taken on that occasion and remarked on how much fun everyone had.

Students ate food prepared from garden vegetables, they harvested vegetables, and they danced to music played for them in the garden.

Dr. Peacock praised Shirley Low, who spearheaded the project to make a garden to teach children about how to grow their own food. In addition to learning gardening basics, the children learn a great deal about plants, and the relationship between sun, rain and other elements on the plants.

Extra cash feeds students

Schools are allocated extra money for the needs of "vulnerable" stu-

dents. This year, School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) receives \$320,000.

Steve McNiven reported to the

Board of Education on October 12 that much of that money goes to breakfast or lunch programs for children identified as vulnerable. In

addition to food programs, some money goes to counseling of vulnerable children, and some goes to after school programs.

Council elctions bring new faces to race

One of the new faces seeking a seat on Village of Keremeos Council is Arlene Arlow.

"I grew up in Alberta on a mixed farm: grain and cattle. My work ethic was founded on the farm," Arlow states.

"I promise to listen to you, my fellow citizens, and not shut you down. I promise to pursue stepping up By-Law enforcement."

Arlow see policing as another issue she feels needs attention.

"One example was an annual local sporting event this year. I watched uniformed police officers sit in the bleachers by the hour, enjoying the show. Were we paying them to

have fun?"

Arlow sees a lot of confusing elements which need to be clarified for better understanding.

"I perceive that in the municipality and the regional district, there are a lot of 'official plans.' Fancy-sounding names for committees and plans are great, but are the results being measured? I will pursue cooperation, accountability and results, not just 'plans.'"

Attracting business to the Lower Similkameen is another goal of Arlow's.

"Somehow, with input from you, local businesses, fellow Councillors and Village staff, I will pursue a bet-

ter environment for new businesses."

Arlow also points to branding the Similkameen in a more unique manner.

"I also believe in pursuing a strong identity and branding for the Similkameen Valley outside of the valley: currently, our valley seems to be an addendum to the Okanagan. I want to change that."

Arlow expects to put in some extra work and plans to get her hands dirty.

"I want to get to know the movers and the shakers, including the volunteers who make this one heck of

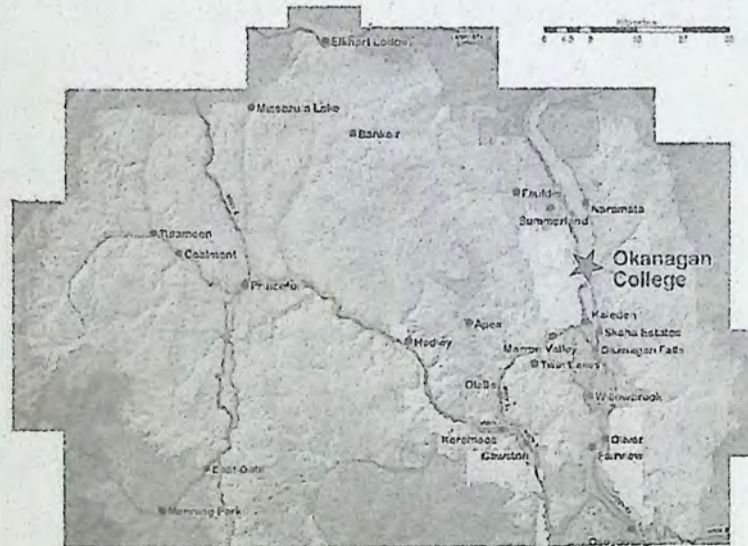

Be safe and sound at home in just seven days

(NC)—Making your home a safe haven for your family should be a top priority. But according to the Home Safety Council, less than one-third of homeowners make any safety improvements.

Luckily, updating your home safety doesn't have to be a daunting task. Within seven days you can make your home safe, sound and secure.

Day 1: Bathrooms

Locate medicines and dangerous chemicals, like nail polish remover or mouthwash, and place them in a locked cabinet.

Next, install grab bars to help prevent falls. Moen Home Care offers a variety of designer grab bars, including three grab bars with accessories. These "disguised" safety devices include a grab bar with a paper holder (to assist getting on and off the toilet), a towel bar (to hold towels while assisting getting into and out of the shower or tub) and a shelf (to keep shower items handy and keep a firm grip in the

Day 2: Kitchen

Start your safety update by ensuring hazardous items are out of reach. This includes: knives, scissors, cleaning supplies and any cords from small appliances.

Next, if you have young children, install childproof latches on all cupboards, oven doors and stove handles. Finally, keep a fire extinguisher within arms' reach of your oven.

Day 3: Hallways/Stairs

To prevent against falls, ensure there is bright lighting near stairs and remove or secure any tripping hazards from the area.

Next, be sure working smoke detectors are in the hallways on each floor—and change their batteries every six months. Finally, provide secure railings on both sides of the stairs.

Day 4: Electrical/Heating

Place safety plugs in all electrical outlets.

Next, create barriers around any hot surfaces, such as baseboards, radiators and fireplaces, to keep small

hands from being burned—while also ensuring that there is a clear distance from other objects that could catch fire.

Day 5: Bedrooms

If you're in an older home, be sure that the walls have a safe, non-lead paint.

Next, look for any dangling cords from blinds and pin them up to remove strangulation hazards. Window guards are also available to prevent accidental falls from open windows.

Day 6: Family Room

Place all large equipment on a wall and make the wires and cords inaccessible.

Next, secure any shelves or bookcases to the wall to avoid tipping hazards. Finally, if you have toddlers, be sure to add corner pads to any furniture with sharp corners.

Day 7: Rest and Enjoy

Now you can sit back and breathe a sigh of relief that your home is safe and sound for your family.

Get Ready For Comfort Food

This is the time of year when we Canadians begin to appreciate comfort foods. These are the foods that make us feel warm and full to help fight off the chill of cold weather. Most people have a favourite comfort food, but here is a list of some of the popular comfort foods.

Macaroni and cheese is a comfort food favored by many people. This food is best when cooked in the oven with a little onion added. Mac and cheese is a high fat, high calorie food, one that does make you feel warm and does fill the empty spot. There is plenty of protein and calcium in mac and cheese, and if it is served with a green salad or some broccoli or other greens, it is a nutritious winter meal.

For most people, a thick winter soup is the ultimate comfort food. Soups can be made at home from a wide variety of ingredients, and it is the variety of ingredients that makes soup an excellent choice as a comfort food. Now that the nights are getting colder, think about changing your diet to comfort as well as nutrition.

Thanks to our new fire truck and the monitor which can shoot a cannon of water directly from the top of the truck, the house next door, less than 2-feet away from the burning house, remains unscathed.

There were a lot of happy people that night, with more than 130 people being served a delicious dinner which included turkey, ham, all the fixings and lots of pies to choose from!

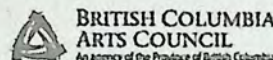
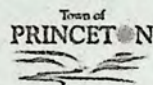

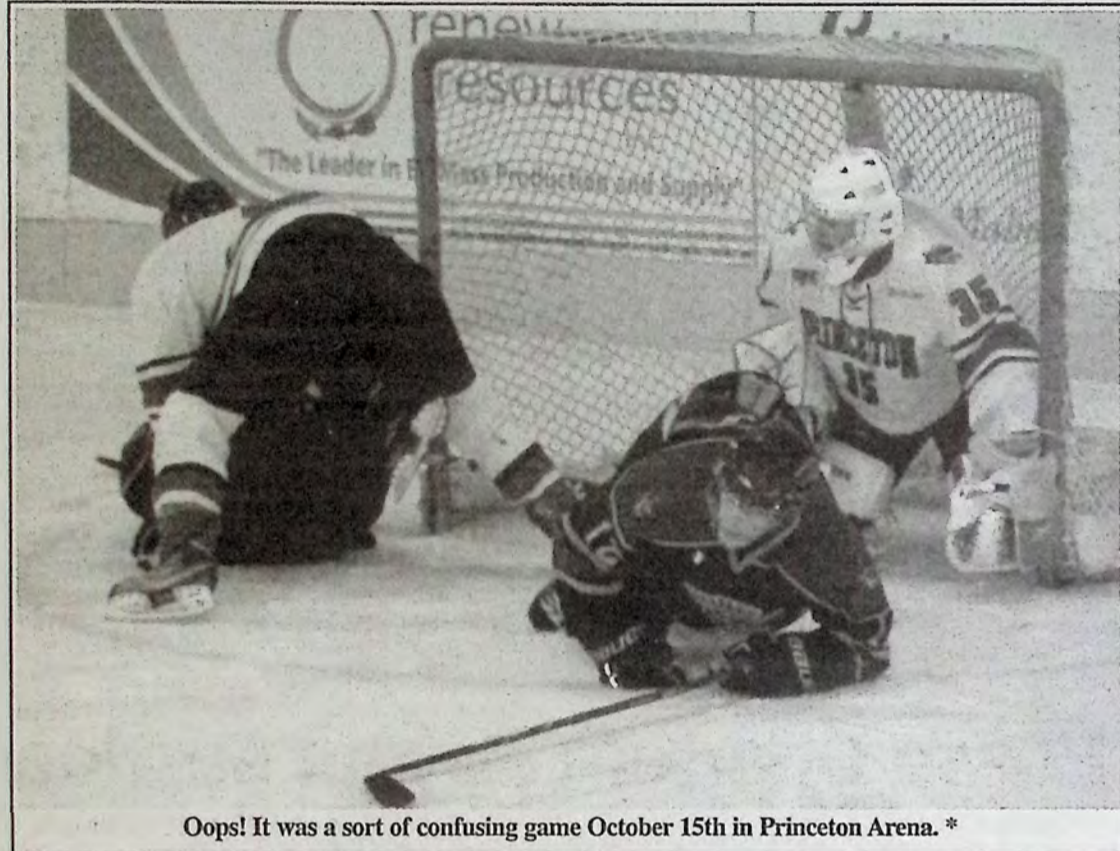

Princeton's Devon Grossler broke the tie at 18:27 with a power play goal. Assistance came from Curtis Bellamy.

Chore was credited with an unassisted goal.

Two-minutes later, at 10:04, North Okanagan broke the tie with Pat Chore's second goal of the night. Assists went to his brother Eric Chore and Ben Greenaway.

In the last minute of play Princeton pulled their goalie to add an extra man on a power play and lined players across the front of the Knight net from the face-off circle in what resembled a football play.

Unfortunately someone fumbled and time ran out.

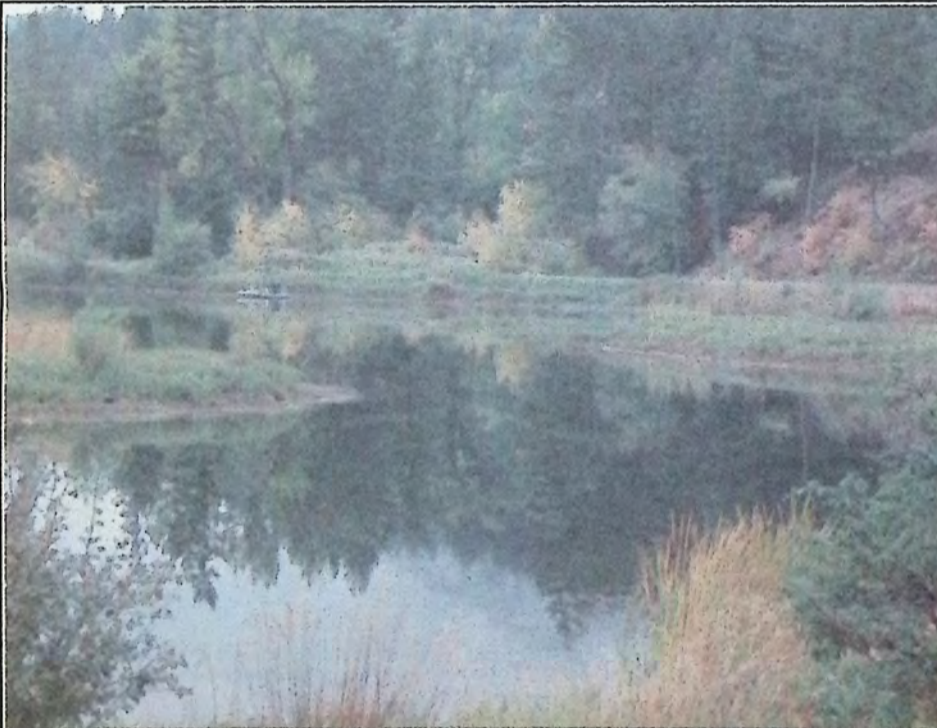

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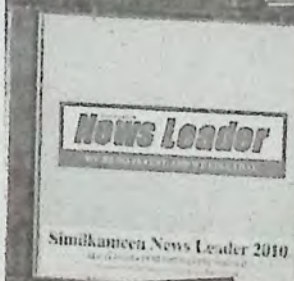

Firecracker Candied Apples

- 2 cups sugar 500 mL
- 3/4 cup water 175 mL
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup 125 mL
- 1/2 tsp red food colouring 2 mL
- 12-14 9.5g packets Pop Rocks
- 1 tsp vegetable oil 5 mL
- 12 small Ontario Crispin apples
- 12 candy sticks

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and brush generously with vegetable oil, set aside.

In a medium heavy bottomed pot, combine sugar, water, corn syrup and food colouring. Bring to a boil and reduce heat to medium high, boiling until candy mixture reaches a temperature of 290°F—300°F, hard crack stage, about 20 minutes.

Empty all Pop Rock packets into a small bowl and mix with the vegetable oil and set aside. Insert candy sticks half way into apples and place next to candy mixture.

When candy is ready, remove from heat, tilt pan slightly to one side while dipping an apple, twisting to thoroughly coat the apple and let excess candy drip away. Working quickly, remove from pot and lightly roll into pop rocks to coat sides. Some pop rocks may crackle from the heat. Place onto baking sheet to cool, repeat steps with remaining apples. Store candied apples at room temperature and enjoy within 24 hours for best results.

Best enjoyed within 24 hours.

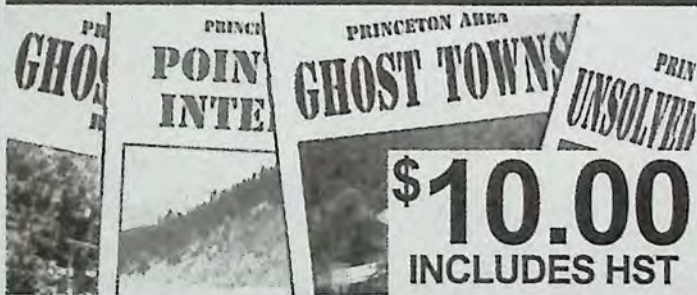

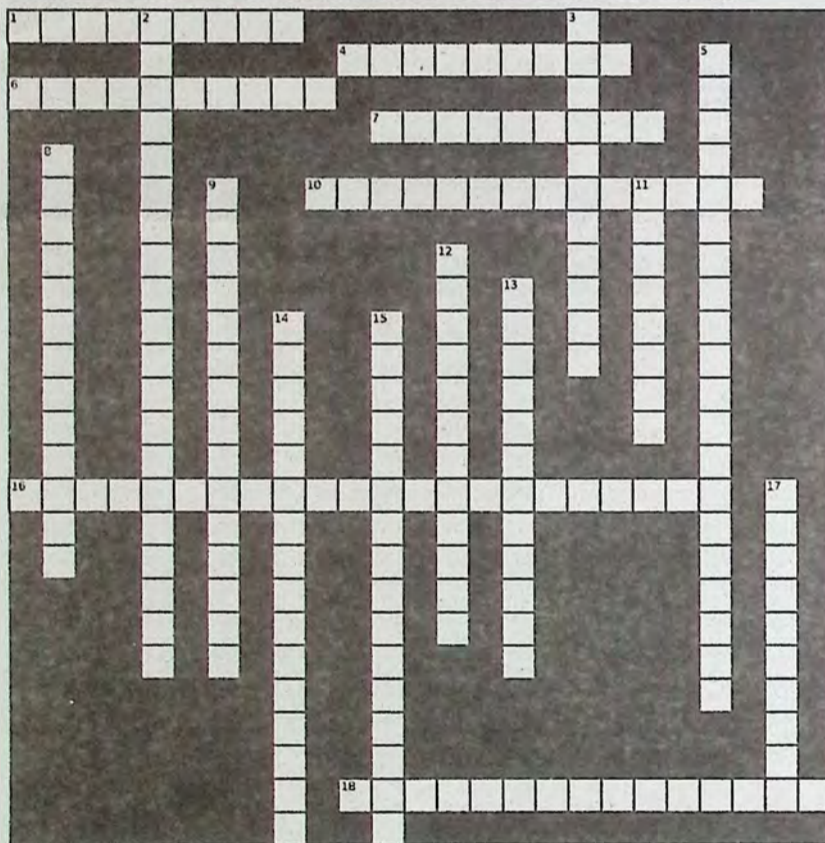

Former Princeton boy comes back to town

To say Randy Barnetson has roots in the Similkameen Valley would be putting it lightly - four generations of his relatives have lived in the region.

Barnetson also went to Princeton Secondary School and his mother, Joy Walker, still lives in Princeton.

The 55-year old has been a Pastor for more than 30 years, has six sons (all living in the Vancouver area) and has been married to First Nations recording artist Cheryl Bear for 20 years.

Before taking on the Interim Pastor position at Princeton's Living Water Foursquare Church Barnetson and his wife were very busy spreading the Gospel.

"Our goal was to visit every one of the approximately one-thousand First Nations communities,

Reservations, Reserves and settlements in the USA and Canada. So far, we have been to nearly 500."

Their approach has been simple, and effective.

"We do concerts in parks, community halls, on the streets, rescue missions, malls, pow wows, potlatches, school assemblies, churches, literally anywhere!"

"We have regularly taken teams of First Nations christian drummers and dancers to other countries

around the world on short term mission trips sharing the Gospel through Native cultural songs and dances. We have been to over 30 nations so far. These teams are very effective, especially in Muslim nations. These trips also have the benefit of developing team members into leaders."

Barnetson will spend three days a week in Princeton providing all the services of a full-time Pastor affording Living Water Foursquare Church some stability as they continue their Pastoral Search for a full-time Pastor.
