## Harkness reports on health care

At the October 17 Town Council meeting, Councillor Marilyn Harkness reported to Town Council on proceedings of the Health Care Committee. The most recent meeting was attended by the team responsible for recruiting health care professionals for Interior Health.

Princeton is now the number one priority for recruitment of physicians, Harkness said. There is still a problem with funding of locum doctors.

The \$200,000 allocated to private practice physicians is to provide them with resources to determine how to cover ER services.

Councillor Harkness said the

Health Care Committee would like to hold a public meeting to explain to the public what is going on with Princeton's health care situation.

Councillor Frank Armitage still feels IHA does not recruit effectively.

"The thing that matters is results," he stated.

Although critical of recruitment efforts by IHA, he gave nothing but praise to local physicians who cared for his wife during her recent illness. He said they did a wonderful job.

He complimented a group of citizens, led by Spencer Coyne, who are addressing issues of concern in the community, including the health care situation.

## Town Council reviews traffic bylaw

Town Council is reviewing general regulations regarding what is permitted use of streets and roads within Town boundaries. One item that may be of concern to local residents are regulations regarding the tethering of animals in town.

The regulation states nobody may 'tether any animal to a traffic control device, utility pole, lamp standard or tree on a sidewalk of highway'. People with dogs will find this a problem, as there is nowhere else downtown that one may tether a dog.

The same may be said for tethering horses on occasion, as there are no hitching rails in town since the Princeton Hotel burned to the ground. Although horses are not commonly ridden in town, there are

occasions when horses may need to be tethered for a short period of time.

Of concern to others may be the regulation which prohibits use of "sleighs, toboggans, skis, skateboards, in-line skates, roller skates or other similar means of conveyance on any sidewalk or highway" within the town.

Another regulation restricts the use of a sidewalk or highway (street) for the purpose of selling or displaying any goods, except as authorized by a business licence issued by the Town or on a farm stand in accordance with Farm Practices Protection Act.

Council is also reviewing regulations regarding stopping, standing and parking of vehicles. No vehicles

can be left for 72 hours continuously, and there can be no vehicles parked overnight for the purpose of sleeping in the vehicle. The regulation further states nobody can park in the Town Office parking lot in any space labelled "reserved" during the day, nor may anyone leave a vehicle overnight in the Town Office parking lot, except with permission of the Town.

Most of the regulations are standard, but there is a regulation against parking on a street for the purpose of displaying a vehicle for sale, or for advertising, displaying signs, greasing, painting, wrecking, storing or replacing any vehicle except for the purpose of doing emergency repairs.

One regulation states no trailer may be parked on any street unless it is attached to a vehicle capable of pulling it. In other words, nobody can park his camping trailer or utility trailer out in front of his house.

Other parts of the bylaw deal with fines and towing away of offending vehicles. As in most municipalities, if this bylaw is adopted, the bylaw officer may issue tickets to owners of vehicles which violate the regulations.

One of the regulations specifies that snow, ice or rubbish on a sidewalk in front of real property must be removed by the owner or tenant by 11:00 AM daily unless requested by the Town to do so sooner.

## Candidates elected by acclamation

Town of Princeton and Area H electors will not be voting for School Board Trustees in next month's General Elections.

Chief Election Officer Patrick Robins declared the three School Board Trustee Candidates elected by acclamation on October 24th.

School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) School Trustees representing Electoral Area 2 (Princeton District) from December 2011 to December 2014 are incumbents David Rainer and Gordon Comeau and newcomer Leah Ward.

## Town plans to weigh garbage

At the October 17 Town Council meeting, Council approved \$27,245.50 (plus taxes) for a scale to weigh garbage at the landfill. The purpose of weighing the garbage is to determine just how much and what kind of garbage is going into the landfill. There are no fees per kilo for garbage at this time.

Councillor Frank Armitage asked whether Area H knew of the deci-

sion and whether they would share in the cost. He noted the cost of the scale is coming out of the provincial gas tax grant, and said he could think of uses for half the cost. Councillor Armitage was told the weigh scale is part of the budget and will be included in the agreement with Area H.

The scale records will provide Town Council with a firmer grip on

the kinds of materials going into the landfill. CAO Patrick Robins stated the landfill could last another 40 or 50 years with good management of what goes into it. Recycling helps extend the life of the landfill, and although recycling comes at a cost to local taxpayers, it postpones closing the existing landfill and opening a new landfill, which can cost millions of dollars.

## Town approves Court House contract

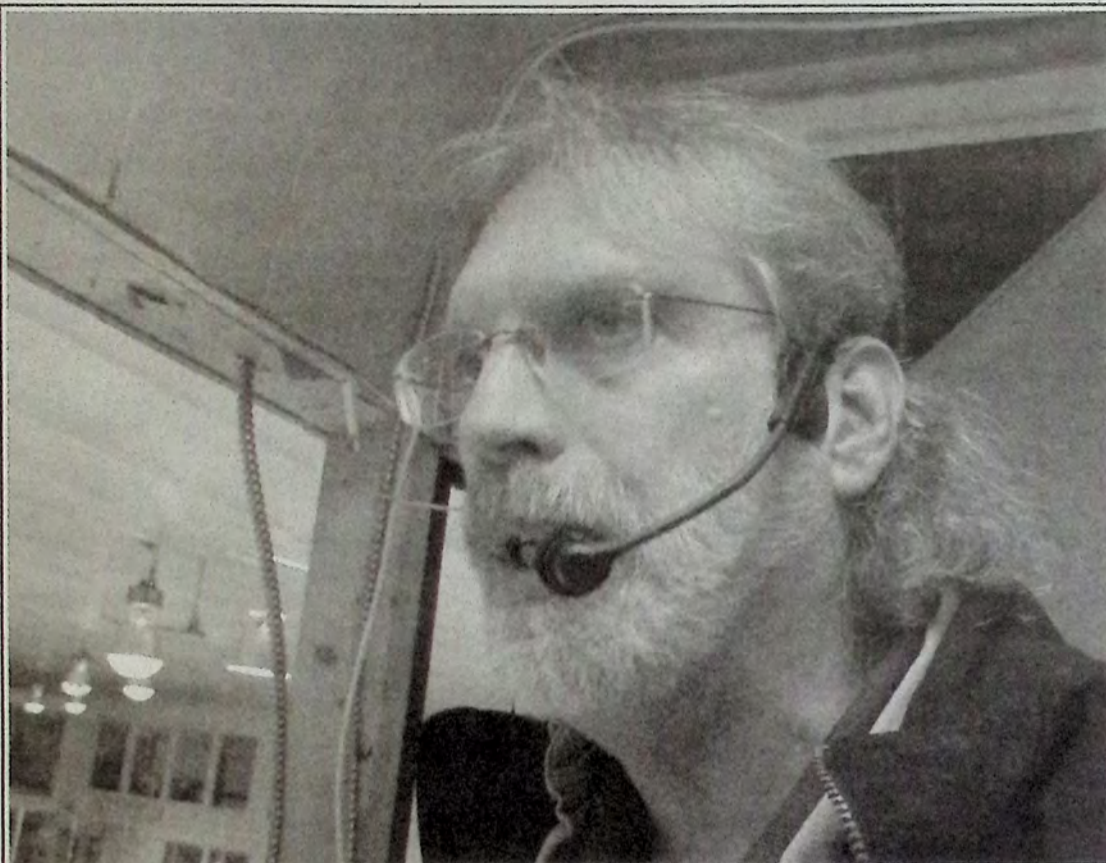
A company named Renshaw Contracting Ltd. has been awarded the contract for the exterior preparation of the Court House. Renshaw will do repairs to the exterior of the Court House, which includes the front portico, flashings

and window repair, at a cost plus 10 percent. The contract for the exterior preparation (for new paint) is at a fixed price of \$13,851. The painting will not be done until spring. The Town of Princeton acquired the Court House building when the

provincial government decided to sell it. Provincial government agencies continue to occupy offices in the building, and provincial court, both criminal and traffic, continue to use the court room once a month.

## Local webcaster hits 100!

When Princeton Posse internet play-by-play announcer George Elliott starts the October 29th webcast at Princeton Arena it will be his career 100th game in this, his 4th season with the team.

"I was approached a year before the league started broadcasting home games on the internet by Princeton Leisure Services Department Manager Lyle Thomas," Elliott says.

"I had had twenty-one years broadcast experience and so I guess I was the most likely choice for the job."

Seven years had passed since Elliott's radio career ended and the idea of hockey play-by-play intrigued him.

"I did just about anything one could do in radio in my broadcast career, except play-by-play and, unknown to Lyle, that was probably the only reason why I considered it at the time."

While Elliott admits he's not a huge sports fan, and rarely watched hockey prior to his involvement with the Posse he was up for the challenge.

"I did find it a little difficult at first, but it didn't take long for me to figure out that all I had to do was describe the game. That made it simple and before I knew it, I was getting into the rhythm of the sport."

Elliott's first Princeton Posse webcast was September 13, 2008 and it was broadcast from in the viewing stands.

"I couldn't see the far end of the rink when people in front of us stood up, it was not the best place to see a game."

Elliott pushed for a new location and thought the box above the time-keeper's booth would be perfect and the second webcast was from there, as have all the ones that have fol-

lowed.

"That is bar none the best seat in the house. It's right over centre ice and the camera can capture both sides of the rink with little effort," Elliott explains.

Elliott also credits a dedicated crew of volunteers for making the webcasts fun and something he looks forward to weekly.

"I've had some good colour commentators over the years. Kevin Robillard (former Posse Assistant Coach) brought a bench view to the webcasts and Clint Clifton (former Posse trainer and retired Junior Hockey Referee) brought a completely different ice level view to the webcasts which I hope made it interesting for those viewing them."

Other volunteers involved this season include Adam Gullason, Nick Nelson, Sarah Nelson and Morgan Dobbs, all local school students who share music, camera and Twitter duties during webcasts.

"When the pay-per-view system was added we didn't want fans to be left out if they chose not to pay for a game so we added Twitter to update followers throughout the game on what's been going on," Elliott adds.

"It's also allowed us a way to communicate with fans and players' families in a way that actually gets them involved in what we're doing."

Connecting with families is one of the big advantages of the webcasts, Elliott says.

"Last season our webcasts earned the second highest amount of revenue generated in the league from pay-per-view, and as much as I'd like to take credit for that, it's mostly because players on our team have families living a lot more than a couple hours drive to Princeton Arena. The webcasts keep them

connected to their boys, brothers, and nephews. We get feedback on a regular basis from family members telling us how much they value the way the webcasts allow them to stay

## SESS teacher receives honour

SESS (Similkameen Elementary Secondary School) teacher Will Eaton, who has been at the school for the past 16 years, has won the top teaching award in Canada. Nominated by his peers last year, Eaton met with Prime Minister Stephen Harper on October 4th to receive the award.

The Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence Program is Canada's way of recognizing the country's best teachers, promote what they have achieved, and share their innovative and suc-

cessful teaching practices.

The PMA Program began in 1993 to honour outstanding achievements of Math, Science, and Technology teachers. Awards are given at three levels: National, Regional, and Local.

Awards are presented at two levels: Certificate of Excellence (National Level) and Certificate of Achievement (Local Level). The Certificate of Excellence Level carries a cash prize of \$5,000. This money is issued to the recipient's school to be spent under his/her

direction.

Certificates of Excellence are awarded to the 15 top-ranked nominees, with at least one award designated for BC; Prairies; Yukon, Northwest Territories, and Nunavut; Ontario; Quebec; and Atlantic Canada.

"We are all extremely proud of Mr. Eaton," states a SESS spokesperson. "He is truly an excellent representative of the teaching excellence that we have here at Similkameen Elementary Secondary School." - submitted

## Goldcliff makes Tulameen discovery

Leonard W. Saleken, Chairman of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (GCN TSX.V), reported on October 19th that Goldcliff had made the first significant porphyry copper ore grade discovery in the Copper Mountain mining district in decades.

With surface samples highlighted by 0.655% copper – almost double the current reserve grades at the Copper Mountain Mine – and 1.3 grams per tonne silver, the Trojan showing is part of the Bolas anomaly, which is located in the Whipsaw target on the Tulameen property in the Copper Mountain mining district near Princeton.

The Tulameen property is 100 per cent owned by Goldcliff. The three-pronged Bolas anomaly also contains the Eagle showing, which is highlighted by 0.175% copper and 1.0 grams per tonne silver. The copper mineralization on both the Trojan and the Eagle showings is chalcopryite with malachite, and the iron sulphides are pyrite and pyrrhotite along with magnetite. These showings are situated on surface, above the substantial Bolas deposit-style chargeability anomaly. The Bolas anomaly is 2,000 long by 1,200 metres wide, and merges to form an area of 1.5 square kilometres at about 300 metres.

The Whipsaw alkalic porphyry copper-silver target area is located along the Copper Mountain south-west copper trend, approximately seven kilometres south-west of the Copper Mountain ore bodies. The Copper Mountain mineral reserves are 232,776,000 tons grading 0.36% Cu, 0.09 Au and 1.25 g/t Ag. The Trojan and Eagle showings are associated with the Bolas anomaly, which contains disseminated sulphide mineralization in the 3 to 5%

range.

### Trojan Showing

Similar to Goldcliff's previous gold discovery at Panorama Ridge, the Trojan showing was discovered along a reclaimed logging road. It is located 350 metres west of the Eagle showing. Coarse grained, green gabbro float was found over a strike length of 110 metres along the road, with variable quartz-carbonate veining, epidote and fracturing.

The chalcopryite and malachite were found within the gabbro at a number of locations along the road, occurring within quartz veinlets, along fractures, and as disseminations. Pyrite was relatively rare, generally occurring in concentrations less than 1%.

The rock samples of local float collected along the road gave anomalous copper values ranging from 192 to 6,549 ppm.

The highest copper value of 6,549 ppm (1201120033) was of gabbro with limonite, malachite and chalcopryite occurring along fractures, along with pin pricks of disseminated chalcopryite and malachite. This sample was also strongly magnetic, with magnetite occurring as fine grained disseminations and blebs. A sample of gabbro (1201120034) with malachite occurring along fractures gave a copper value of 4,727 ppm, while a sample of a 6 centimetre wide quartz vein (1201120029) with malachite and chalcopryite gave a copper value of 3,970 ppm. A float sample (1201120041) of a light grey-green dyke located midway between the Trojan and Eagle showings gave an anomalous copper value of 527 ppm. The dyke contains 5% fine-grained disseminated pyrite along with rusty fractures.

### Eagle Showing

Located on a prominent knoll at the end of an old mining road, the Eagle showing was discovered in 1972, at which time no sample values were reported. Two bulldozer trenches, each approximately 75 metres long, criss-cross the knoll, and a coarse grained, green gabbro is intermittently exposed in the trenches. Weak fractures within the gabbro contain limonite and 1 to 3% pyrite, along with rare 1 centimetre quartz-carbonate and epidote veinlets with pyrite.

Disseminated pyrite was noted adjacent to some fractures. Malachite and chalcopryite were rare. One sample (1201120040) of gabbro float, giving an anomalous copper value of 1,753 ppm, had limonite, malachite and chalcopryite occurring along fractures.

### Bolas 3-D IP Anomaly

The deposit-style Bolas chargeability anomaly is a disseminated iron sulphide body that is located near surface and extends to an estimated depth of 500 metres in Upper Triassic Nicola Group rocks. The Bolas anomaly measures approximately 2,000 meters in a northwest direction by about 1,200 meters southwest. At a depth of around 300 meters, the anomaly merges to form a chargeable body of the order of 1,800,000 square meters or 1.8 square kilometres in size. The iron sulphide content of the rocks within the Bolas anomaly is estimated to be 3 to 5%.

### Chargeability


The Bolas chargeability anomaly is a three-pronged star feature with a vertex centre and three end nodes that are referred to as the Whip, Elk and Eagle node areas of chargeability. Close to the surface, the chargeability response millisecond (ms)



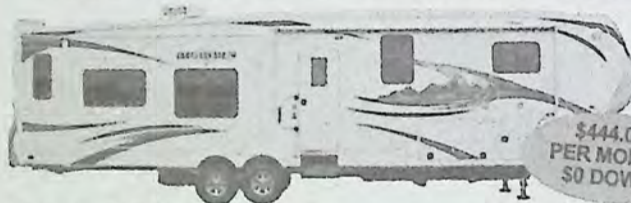

## BC Flu Vaccine Program Underway

Eligible British Columbians who want to protect themselves and their families from getting the flu and its complications this year are now able to get vaccinated at flu clinics throughout the province, announced Minister of Health Michael de Jong on October 17th.

Flu vaccinations are available from a variety of health-care providers, including family physicians, walk-in clinics, pharmacies and dedicated flu clinics. The vaccine is provided free of charge to high-risk groups and their regular contacts. All other British Columbians are able to purchase the vaccine for a fee.

Those eligible for the free vaccine include:

- People 65 and older and their caregivers.
- Children and adults with chronic health conditions and their household contacts.
- Health-care workers.
- Emergency responders.
- Healthy children between six months and 23 months of age.
- Household contacts and caregivers of children under two years old.
- Pregnant women who will be in their third trimester during influenza season.
- Residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities.
- Owners and operators of poultry farms.
- Aboriginal peoples.
- People who are very obese (those with a body mass index of 40 or greater).

- Corrections officers and inmates of provincial correctional institutions.

- People who provide care or service in potential outbreak settings that house high risk persons (such as crew on a ship).

Every year, influenza infects 10 to 20 per cent of the population, causing illness, lost productivity, and unnecessary hospitalizations.

In B.C., hundreds die as a result each year. While most people recover completely from the flu, vulnerable populations can suffer

serious consequences, including death.

## Living Past 100

### Does Population Affect Longevity?

This week, the world's population has reached the seven billion mark. Will that affect how long you and your children live?

It could. What the increase in population means is that there is more competition for the basic resources, particularly for food. Some nations are already ramping up their ability to feed their population in the future. For example, China is buying vast tracts of farmland in Africa to provide food for its billions of people.

In addition to more competition for food, there will be more pollution of our seas. It is the poorest, least industrialized nations that show the most rapid increase in population and these same nations tend to cause the most pollution. They do not have environmental regulations and they tend to discard all wastes into streams and the sea. This type of pollution affects seafood of all kinds. In some cases of pollution, sea creatures are the victims, adding to the loss of food sources.

Another danger of increased population is poor health care which allows for the rapid spread of viruses and bacterial infections. As in the case of SARS, we know these diseases can spread through international travel. A disease in some remote area of the world can be on our doorstep within days. Another example of the spread of disease is the story of HIV infection. Despite warnings, campaigns and regulations, AIDS has killed more than 40 million people since it was first diagnosed 30 years ago.

While it would seem there is little we can do about this situation, we can take action here at home to protect ourselves. Our planet has a lot of resources and could probably increase food production in those areas which are now under-utilized. We can avoid travel to many of the poorest nations.

Another thing we can do to protect our health is to buy less food from those nations which may have the highest populations and the worst regulations about food production. Many diseases are spread through food or the handling of food and nobody knows food is contaminated until somebody becomes seriously ill. This happens frequently in industrialized countries, but more frequently in poorer nations where food handling regulations may be very lax.

If you want to live a very long, healthy life, you are your own best defense. Use common sense, pay attention to what is happening in the world, and take care of your health.

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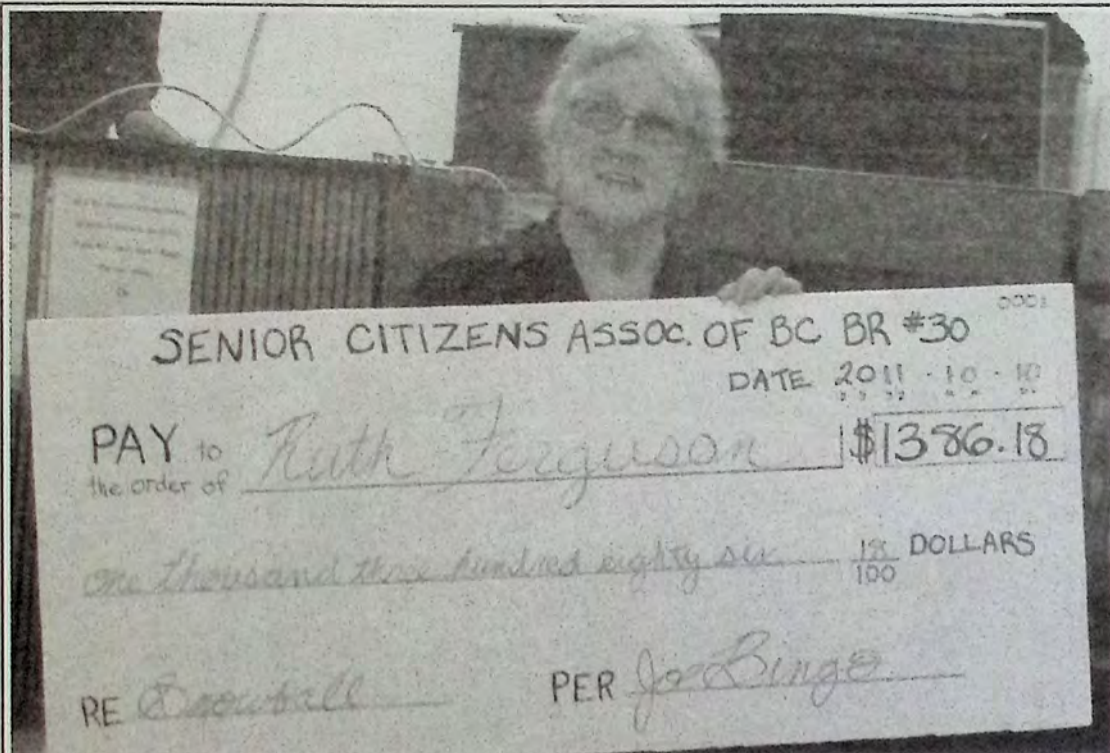

## Library reveals costs

Okanagan Regional Library has released its annual report for 2010. In addition to promoting its successes, the report shows a graph of where the library system gets its money and how it spends the money.

Local taxation provides 88 percent of the library's income. The provincial and federal governments provide eight percent, and four percent comes from donations, fees, grants and book sales. Many libraries have citizen groups who work on behalf

of the library system, such as Westbank Friends of the Library.

The 2010 budget was \$15.26 million. Half of that went to wages, rent was 20 percent, 14 percent went to buying books and materials, three percent covered mortgages, with another three percent going to computers and telecommunication. Ten percent was listed as "other" expenses.

During 2010, the regional library opened three new facilities: South Shuswap, Rutland and Princeton.

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Jason Earle attended the Volunteer Appreciation Dinner hosted by Princeton Exhibition Association, Princeton Rodeo Club, Racing Days Association and Fall Fair Association. Both enjoyed themselves.

Councillor Earle commented on the things he had done at the fairgrounds, including raking leaves with his mother-in-law, and how much he had enjoyed the times spent as a volunteer.

Mayor McLean said he and his friends want to volunteer again next year. They had fun doing some work at the Fall Fair this year. He went on to say how important volunteers are to the community.

"Try to imagine what this community would be like if there were no volunteers," the mayor said.

Town Council is hosting a community supper on October 27 for volunteers from throughout the community, as they bring together the various groups who put on events. The mayor and councillors will be among those volunteers as they serve beef on a bun to those invited to the supper.

connected in some way.”

How many more webcasts will Elliott do?

“I don’t know. I guess when it quits being fun I’ll have to think about it. So far, I haven’t missed a single one since I started, which I’m sure puts me near the top of the list in the league, and the team keeps asking me back each season so I guess that’s an indication of some kind,” Elliott laughs.

Elliott points out he does the webcasts at no cost to the team to keep it fun.

“As soon as there’s a price attached to my services, expectations come in to play and then it becomes a job. I want to stay in control of what we do on the webcasts and at the moment we try to keep it light, but as professional as we can with the tools available.”

In addition to going to the arena an hour before face-off to set up and test equipment, and leaving sometimes almost an hour after each game following clean-up and other webcast-related duties, Elliott puts in about an hour of homework per game pulling stats and paperwork together. He also puts an addition few hours online promoting upcoming games on Twitter, Facebook and on websites.

“I do those things for the fans and families. We do the webcasts for the fans and families. That’s the bottom line,” Elliott says.

“If we happen to be part of the connection that keeps families together when separated during hockey season, then I think I’ve done my job.”

## New Arts Council board goes to work

The first order of business at the October 19 Arts Council meeting was to welcome new member Anne Williams, a newcomer to Princeton, as everyone gave a personal introduction as a means of getting acquainted.

The upcoming concert series, featuring Kelowna Ballet, Ian Tyson and Ingrid Schellenberg has received some complaints from the community due to the \$80 cost for the series. This price was as low as the Arts Council could make it, even with a grant from the government to cover some of the costs. President Dell Hall noted the Ian Tyson show tickets cost \$55 to \$66 in other locations, whereas in Princeton, each show of the series costs only \$26.60. The tickets to the series are in three sections, so if one person wants to see only the ballet, and another wants to see only Ian Tyson, they could go together on the ticket and either sell or donate the remaining ticket section.

Tickets are on sale now at Sunflower Gallery or Thomasina's Tea Room.

Princeton has a new Town website. Nadine McEwen explained how the calendar works. She said she will add things to the calendar if people contact her at her office.

Eight committees were established and each committee must define its terms of reference and state what it

plans to do for the coming year. These goals are not inflexible and there may be additions as time goes by.

Sunflower Gallery will participate in the November 25 Princeton Christmas Light-up. The gallery will remain open all evening. Although the Arts Council hopes to have more people come in and perhaps purchase art gifts for Christmas, the gallery is still averaging \$1,000 per month in sales.

The Arts Council will participate in the October 27 community dinner and "Let's Talk" evening which is sponsored by the Town. Grant in aid applications will be distributed and dates of major events will be discussed.

Funding for a second Spirit Festival has been cut. The provincial gov-

ernment had originally planned to fund spirit festivals for two years, but budget cuts eliminated the grants. The Arts Council, which sponsored the Spirit Festival held last February, was disappointed, but saw the festival and powwow as such a success that they will try to continue it through other means.

Princeton District Community Arts Council has had a tremendously successful year despite a few setbacks and is planning for more art and cultural events and programs in the coming year. The goal of the Arts Council is to promote ongoing arts and cultural activities in the community. The Arts Council meets in the Arts Council room at Riverside Community Centre at 4:30 PM on November 16. Anyone interested is welcome to attend.

## Council okays Airshow 5

Town Council passed a motion at the October 17 public meeting to approve a 2012 air show, the fifth in Princeton. The 2011 air show cost taxpayers \$19,000. It was supposed to break even thanks to corporate sponsors and admission fees. According to CAO Patrick Robins,

the weather cut attendance, as it rained that day. Attendance was down to 1,400.

At an admission rate of \$5.00 per person, the air show needed 3,600 more people to cover the \$19,000 shortfall, or a total of 5,000 people attending the show.

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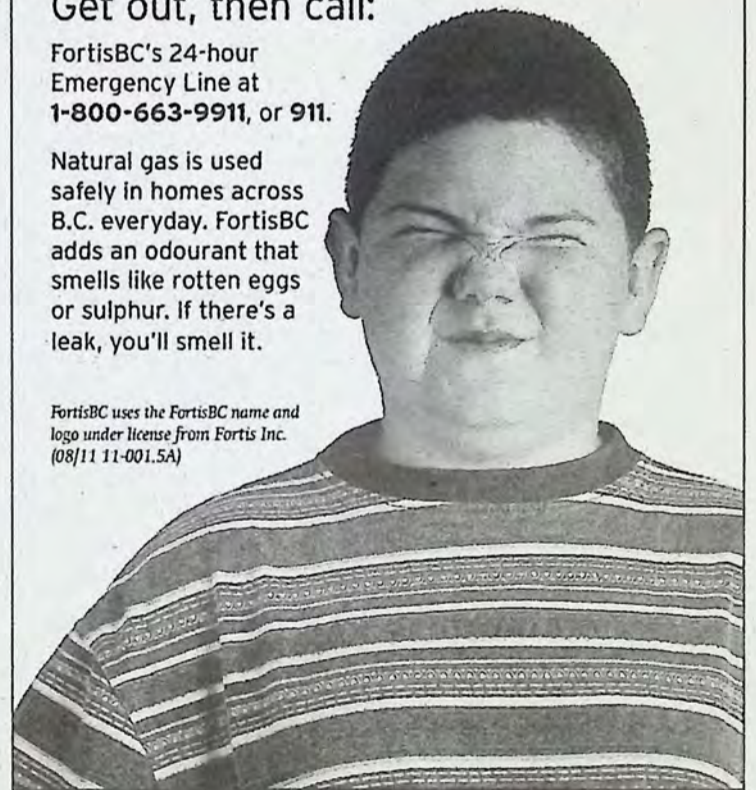

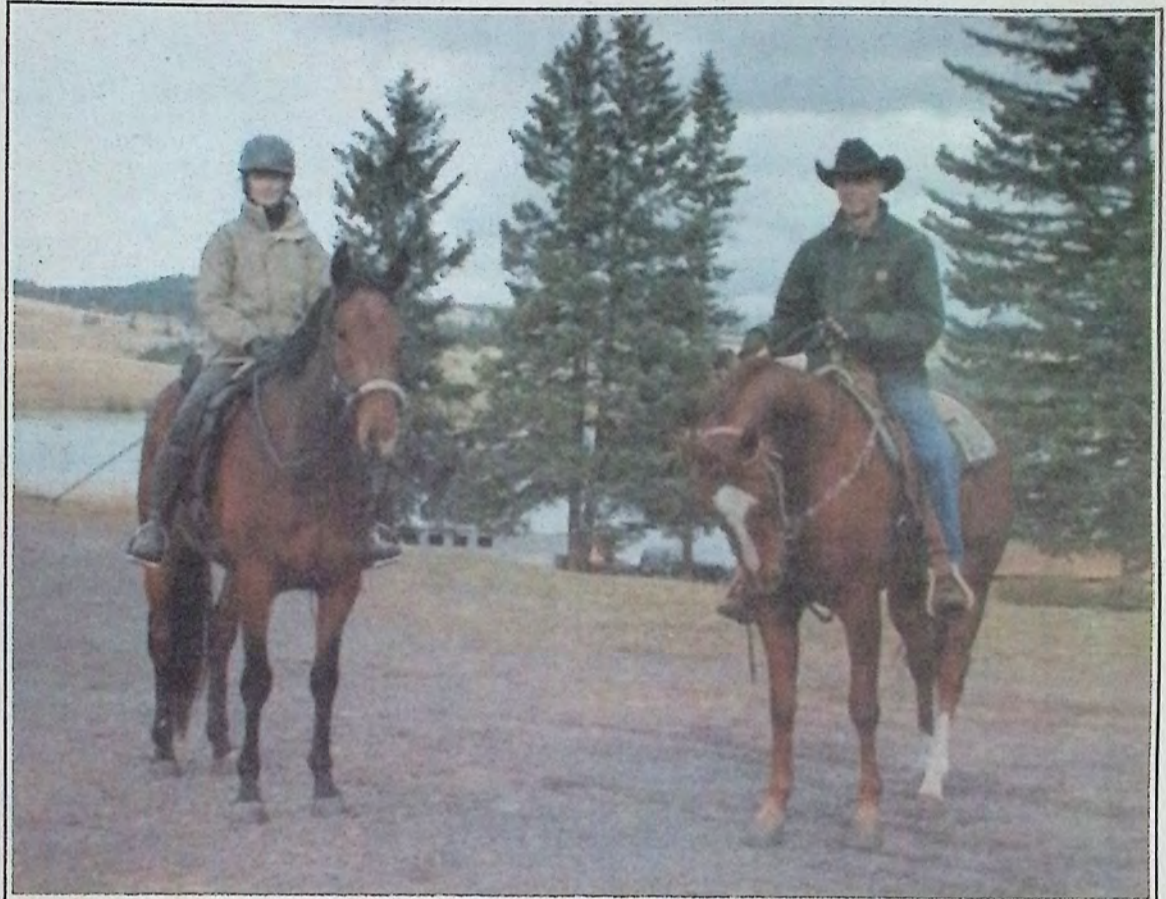

Here's a fun snacking cake that was developed by Emily Richards, P.H. Ec., for the Heart and Stroke Foundation. It has lots of apple taste and is perfect to tuck into kids lunches to tote along or when friends are coming over for a visit

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) wheat bran
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) ground flax
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) baking powder
- 2 tsp (10 mL) cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) ground nutmeg
- Pinch cloves (optional)
- Pinch salt
- 2 cups (500 mL) unsweetened applesauce
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) canola oil

Directions:

In large bowl whisk together flour, bran, flax, baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, if using and salt.

In another bowl, whisk together applesauce, brown sugar, eggs and oil. Pour over flour mixture and stir until moistened.

Scrape batter into greased and parchment paper lined 13 x 9-inch baking pan and spread evenly. Bake in 350 F oven for about 35 minutes or until cake tester inserted in centre comes out clean. Let cool completely and cut into bars. Tip: Use a cookie cutter to cut out your favourite shapes for the kids.

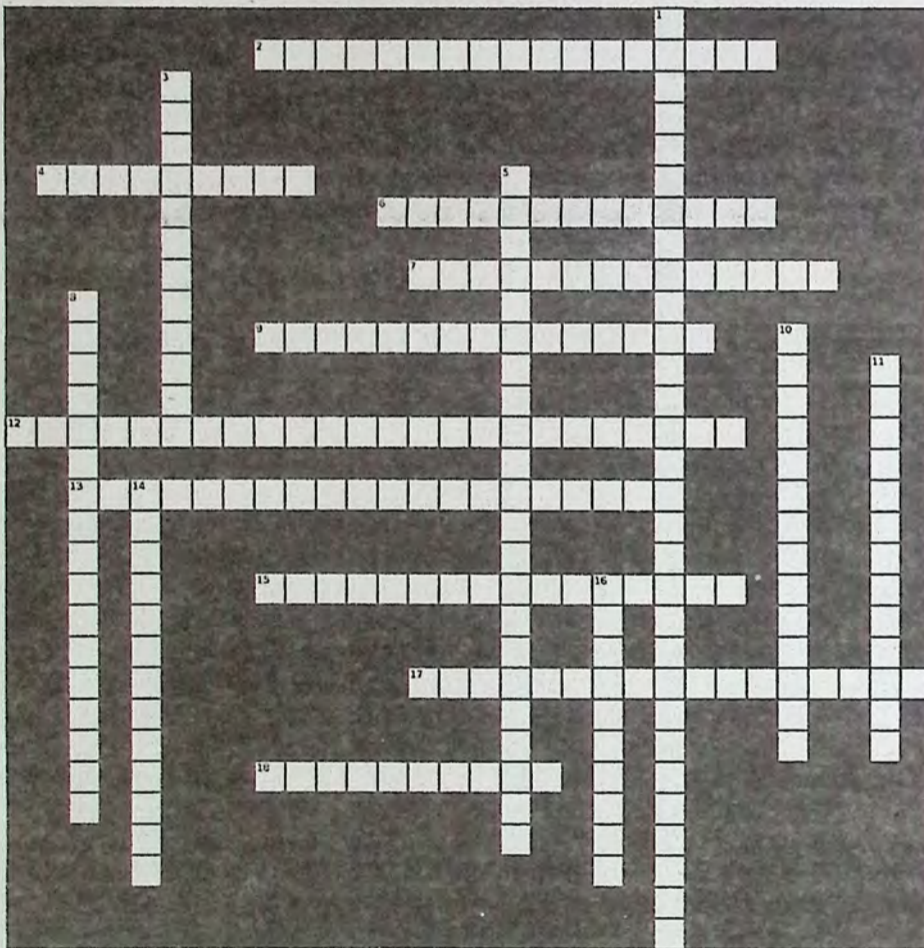

## We Should Be Richer Than We Are

These days, Canada is considered one of the most secure nations on earth, the best place on earth to do business, but Canadians are not reaping enough benefits from our good business climate.

Here is another fact you may not know: in a resource-hungry world, Canada ranks fourth in having the greatest mineral wealth. Most of that mineral wealth is potash, but we have copper and gold resources that still need to be developed. We have oil in the horrible mess known as the tar sands, and we have plenty of natural gas. We could produce a lot more electrical power for the endless greed of our North American cities.

In short, Canada is rich, yet our health care system, our educational system, and our infrastructure programs are begging for money. We have hundreds of thousands of children and pensioners living below the poverty line. What are we doing wrong?

The happiest, best fed, best educated people in the world live in Denmark. Yes, Denmark, a tiny country that does not register in the top ten, or even the top twenty, richest countries in the world. In Denmark, if you need health care, it is there for you immediately. If you want to go to university, you need not go into a debt you will pay for half your working life. If you are

unemployed, you need not fear losing your home. No wonder the Danes are happy.

The Americans would scoff at the Danes as socialists, and Americans are paranoid about anything that smacks of socialism. At the same time, as billionaire Warren Buffet has been pointing out, the rich in the U.S.A. pay lower taxes than the middle income group. He paid 17 percent and his housekeeper paid 30 percent. He agrees with those who say the rich must pay more, but we Canadians are always so influenced by policies in the U.S.A. and by corporate lobbyists that our people are actually becoming poorer in one of the richest nations in the world.

The Danes do something else that we have stopped doing: they ensure that companies doing business in their country are primarily Danish companies. Danes invest in Denmark. Canadians who do invest in Canada often sell out to American companies with the blessings of our "leaders" in Ottawa.

There was a time when selling to foreigners was very limited, but lobbyists persuaded politicians that foreign investment, like free trade, was good for us. It is not. Even American economists say free trade with Canada benefit's the Americans more than the Canadians (think of the softwood tariff fiasco!)

We Canadians have let our riches slip through our fingers. Now our people have to beg for essential services taken for granted in Denmark.

We are so busy conserving and scrimping that we cannot find the money, the vision, nor the will to develop and expand our resources so that our citizens can reap the benefits.

I am not suggesting the government should raise taxes on everyone. We do pay lower taxes than the Danes, and lower taxes than the

Americans (except the rich). What I am saying is we have failed to protect our resources so our resources work for us.

Let me give you an example of what I mean. During the past two weeks, a major Canadian bank has faced the failure of its partner bank in Belgium. I have no idea how much that Canadian bank invested in the Belgian bank, but I do know Canadian corporations, like our local mining company, have had to go to foreign investors to find start-up money. Why did our own Canadian bank not invest in Canada's development?

I remember another situation in which a major Canadian bank invested a ton of money in a waterfront development in England when there were plenty of projects in Canada needing development. The bank lost a ton of money in that failed project, and I am sure its base of Canadian depositors paid higher service charges for a number of years to help cover the costs.

What I am saying is there is no real Canadian spirit of building our nation, despite our amazing history. Most nations build due to a big population. We are a nation that built ourselves up on a very low population and a shoestring budget, but back in those days, we believed in who we are, and we believed in what we were doing. We built a nation out of the wilderness and when we could finally afford it, we gave our citizens benefits only a few other nations even considered. Yes, we had to struggle to get those benefits, but we earned those benefits through the way we built our nation.

I do not blame the average Canadian for what has happened to us, except to say we do not discuss politics enough in this country, and we pay too much attention to what television tells us is the truth. We are a rich country and we need to make sure our politicians understand this and do not squander our resources by benefiting other nations instead of making sure Canadian citizens come first.

As Chairman of the Society over the past two years I have actively promoted valley wide community participation in long range planning in these areas. SVPS has produced an excellent in depth sustainability study. The study is already being used in long term planning in our

levels are weak to moderate. With increasing depth, the chargeability response millisecond levels become stronger and begin to merge at about 150 meters in depth. As depth continues to increase, the chargeability star features ultimately merge to form the continuous chargeability anomalous area. The chargeability values in the Bolas anomaly reach their maximum (25 to 30 ms) at about 300 meters below surface and then begin to fade to around 20 to 25 ms at 500 meters.

**Whipsaw Target Area  
Magnetic Environment**

The most visible magnetic feature of the Whipsaw Target is a strong, broad, crescent-shaped magnetic high that fills more than half of the area. Inversion of the ground magnetic indicates that the deep-seated, crescent-shaped magnetic high is consistent with a deep-seated magnetic intrusive rock. A similarly intense, broad crescent-shaped magnetic high in the Copper Mountain area corresponds with mapped diorite intrusive rock and suggests that the magnetic high in the Whipsaw area may well be caused by the same rock type at depth.

The Whipsaw crescent-shaped, magnetic high partially surrounds a subcircular magnetic feature that is low, compared to the crescent-shaped high, but higher relative to magnetic background seen to the north. Once again, a similar pattern can be observed in the Copper Mountain area. There the subcircu-

lar magnetic feature corresponds with rocks mapped as monzonite and syenite, suggesting that the deep subcircular magnetic feature at Whipsaw may also be caused by a similar, less magnetic rock type. Strong chargeability anomalies occur within the subcircular magnetic feature.

Charles lists improving fire protection infrastructure. With RDOS financial and technical support I have been able to provide the Hayes Creek Fire Brigade with vehicle and construction costs, Erris Fire Brigade with land and a fire truck, Allison Lake, Missezula Lake and Eastgate with equipment along with additional training funds for the Tulameen Fire Department.

**Resistivity Data**  
Analysis of inverted resistivity data, with help from chargeability and magnetic inversions as well as magnetic intensity, indicates that the Princeton/Nicola contact may be vertical to sub-vertical and that the Princeton Group rocks could vary from about 150 to over 500 meters in depth, possibly over Nicola Group rocks. This may mean that the area of Princeton rocks could be down-dropped relative to the Nicola rocks across a fault-forming graben. If this is case, the deep moderate to weak chargeability anomalies seen in the area of Princeton rocks may then reflect the tops of chargeable material buried within Nicola rocks.

Allison Lake, Tulameen, and Missezula Lake. Forest fuel reduction is critical in protecting communities from forest fires.

On his list is supporting the arts, improving roads, lobbying for better health care and so on. All good things, although particularly in the case of health care we need creative solutions and continuous community effort to achieve the level of medical service we require.

What troubles me about Charles letter is his talk about transparency! In truth I find that if I do my job properly, transparency pretty much happens. I spend a great deal of time in our communities. I go to almost all AGMs, hold public meetings, meet with all the fire brigades, the water boards, attend community functions and meet on a regular basis with ratepayer executive committees. Communities know what they want; I try and help them make it happen, if I am wrong they tell me.

In three years with SVPS and RDOS Boards, I have enjoyed working with professional, dedicated, individuals. Interestingly during those three years only two transparency issues that have ever arisen, both involving Charles. In the first he has either not understood the Local the Government Act and the roles of the APC and OCP committees or has deliberately attempted to mislead the public into believing that adequate consultation is not taking place.

One would hope it was just a misunderstanding. Unfortunately, the second instance was clearly an attempt to circumvent the wishes of the electorate.

Confronted with a community petition of well over 800 signatures he chose to question the validity of the signatures and the integrity of the residents that collected them rather than admit that he had placed his own interests above those he claimed to represent.

Lists are easy, I make them nearly every day. Results come with consultation, cooperation and hard work. That said, without integrity in the equation the rest is meaningless.

Other problems involved the horse owners at the agricultural barn and pens. Paul Bedard outlined misuse of areas not intended for use by horse owners, and horse owners

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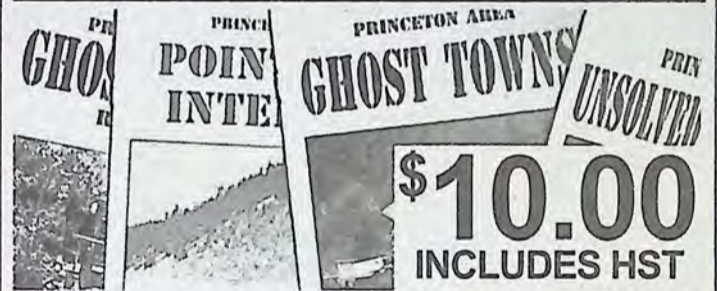


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
