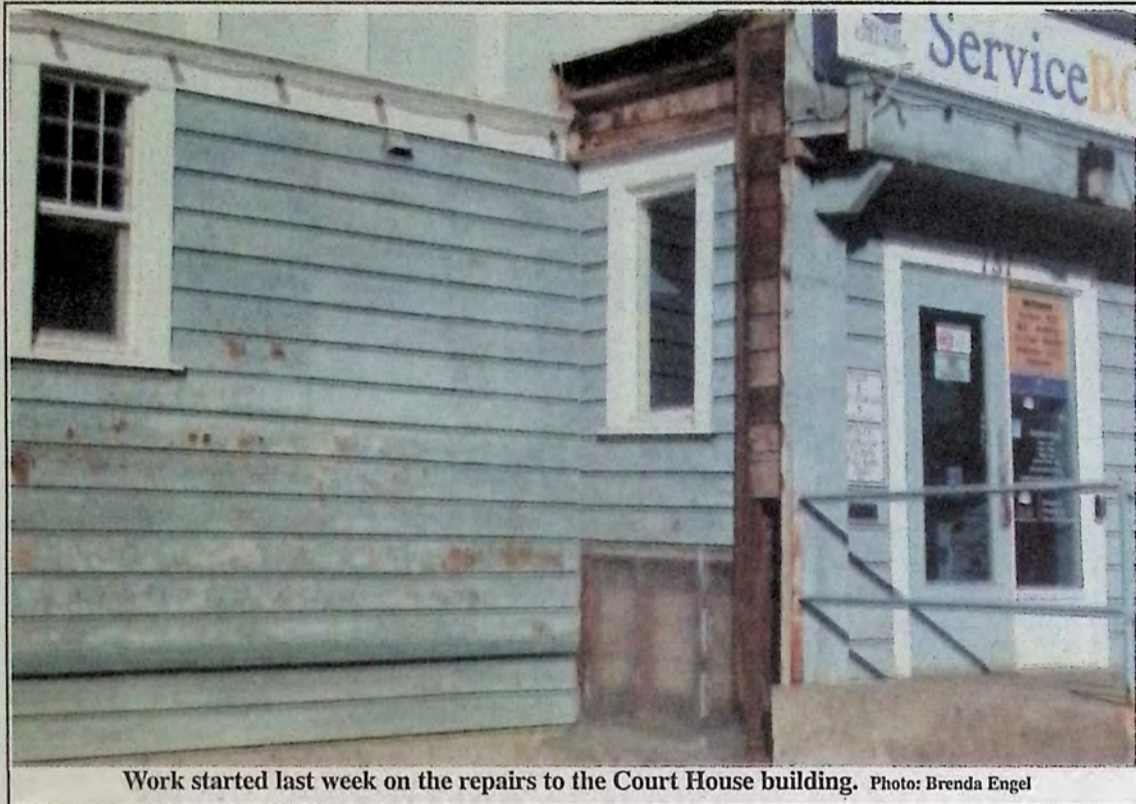

# Residents fill theatre for forum

Close to 150 people filled the theatre at Riverside Centre November 3rd for the Town of Princeton/Area H All-Candidates Forum hosted by Princeton Chamber of Commerce.

Moderator Keith Olsen, who has six years Town Council experience under his belt, explained the format for the evening, which started with Olsen reading short bios of each candidate followed by a maximum two-minute opening statement from each of them.

Questions filled the agenda alternating from submitted to ones taken from the floor with answers restricted to a maximum of 45-seconds. The evening ended with closing statements from each candidate.

Aside from one candidate arriving

late and another taking the odd cheap shot at an opponent, the audience heard pretty much the same answers from all candidates when questions were directed at the entire panel.

For example, on the question of whether or not the Town of Princeton and Area H should amalgamate into a District Municipality these were the answers:

Charles Weber - "We need to make some changes to the governance of the area."

Brad Hope - "Area H wants to be their own identity. It's not a one person system by any means."

Fred Thomas - "Each community likes to have it's own identity. If it came to complete amalgamation I

would be against it."

Randy McLean - "It would be difficult with such a large area."

Christina Longley-Scarbrick - "I don't like amalgamation of anything. It doesn't really work."

Jason Earle - "There are way too many things to consider with amalgamating Area H with Town of Princeton or Town of Princeton with Area H."

Marilyn Harkness - "I would perhaps consider it if there were smaller boundaries surrounding the area."

Frank Armitage - "This should not be done on a whim. It is a very serious matter and one must consider the impact on services."

Kim Maynard - "It would have to be discussed at length by the residents."

Ray Jarvis - "I would agree to a referendum to allow residents to

decide."

The question on the need for an aquatic centre and how to fund it produced similar answers from all candidates.

Brad Hope stated he viewed such a facility as essential to the community but pointed out funding would matter most to those paying for it and stated determining the tax tolerance of residents as a gauge.

Fred Thomas emphasized the need to find out "What could we afford to put up?"

Randy McLean suggested a financial threshold survey then designing a facility to match that.

Christina Longley-Scarbrick said she supported a pool. "We should actually have a pool for school

meets."

Jason Earle said he would have loved to have seen an aquatic centre project take place but was critical of the process and realistic with the comment, "Before we move forward, we need to find out what we want first."

Marilyn Harkness stressed the fact that not having a pool is affecting the community's ability to attract professionals. "We really need that enhanced recreational facility."

Frank Armitage pointed to the importance of public input every step of the way and, "affordability - that's the key."

Kim Maynard supports an aquatic centre but admitted, "It just has to ..... continued on Page 8

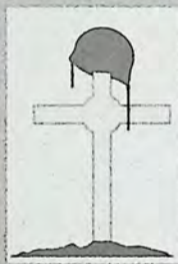



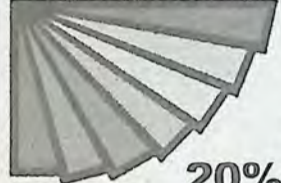

### Don't Go Viral This Flu Season!

Influenza season is just around the corner and there's no better time than now to make a plan to stay healthy. You know the routine: wash your hands frequently, get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids and eat nutritious food. But did you know that the single best way to protect yourself and others from the seasonal flu is by getting a flu shot?

Influenza or "the flu" is an infection of the upper airway caused by the influenza virus. It spreads easily from person to person through coughing, sneezing, face-to-face contact and by touching articles such as door knobs and telephones that have been contaminated with the influenza virus. So, if you think you have the flu, stay home to avoid sharing the virus with others. The flu can be deadly to some people.

The flu vaccine is safe and easy to get. It is available for free through the publicly funded program for those at risk and their household contacts. People who are eligible for free flu vaccine include those 65 years of age and older, people with chronic health conditions, caregivers of those at risk and other at risk groups, including young children and pregnant women.

This year's flu vaccine contains the same virus strains as last year. But don't be fooled into thinking you don't need to get the flu vaccine this year if you got it last year. Protection from a flu shot decreases over time so it's important to boost your protection by getting the flu shot every year.

Public Health nurses will be provid-

ing free flu vaccine to those who are eligible at community flu clinics. To find a clinic near you, watch for local announcements on dates and times, contact your local Public Health office or visit our website at [www.interiorhealth.ca](http://www.interiorhealth.ca).

Many physician offices and pharmacies also provide the vaccine for free to those who are eligible. People who are not eligible for free flu vaccine can still get vaccinated at most pharmacies, doctor's offices, walk-in clinics, and travel clinics for a small fee.

## Living Past 100

### Women's Cholesterol Can Protect

A study done by Norwegian medical researchers raises the level of controversy over cholesterol reducing drugs known as statins. The study examined the health records of more than 52,000 people and discovered a fact that seems to contradict everything being taught about high cholesterol.

The study was broad spectrum, examining the records of people age 20 to 74, then adjusted for age, smoking, blood pressure and a few other factors. The researchers discovered women with high cholesterol had a 28 percent lower risk of heart attack and stroke than women with low cholesterol. In fact, the risk of heart disease, cardiac arrest and stroke declined as cholesterol levels rose!

This study done in Norway will no doubt be challenged by many medical professionals and by pharmaceutical companies that make billions of dollars from the sale of statin drugs. However, the study does open the door to greater discussion of who should be prescribed statins and who should not, as the risk factors related to lower cholesterol apply only to women.

Most family physicians prescribe medications according to a 'protocol' based on what best practices dictate. Best practices tend not to separate men from women, so men and women with certain symptoms would receive the same prescriptions. The Norwegian study divides men and women through the discovery that cholesterol levels mean something different in women.

Other factors that play a part in heart disease and stroke may be given more attention. These factors are stress, toxic substances (including viral and bacterial infections), lack of daily exercise, and an unhealthy diet. An unhealthy diet is one with too much sugar, too little fruits and vegetables, too many processed fats (like margarine) and too high a level of carbohydrates (like bread, cookies, potatoes), and too much fat, as in French fried potatoes, doughnuts, deep fried chicken.

## Judge finds absent man guilty

In Provincial Court in Princeton on Thursday, November 3, one of the rare courtroom procedures took place. Glen A. Renaud was on trial for failing to provide a breath sample. He was to defend himself.

Neither Renaud nor anyone representing Renaud appeared in court at the scheduled time for the trial. The court allowed an additional five to ten minutes for the accused to appear, then the trial commenced. This was the third trial scheduled for Renaud.

Two Crown witnesses appeared, Staff Sgt. Lozinski and Cst. McLeod, both of whom had dealt with Renaud on April 27, 2006, when he was stopped for speeding on Highway 3 in Princeton. RCMP had been tipped off by a private cit-

izen who had seen Renaud drinking beer in his vehicle when it was parked at a service station.

Both witnesses said they smelled liquor on Renaud and found an open can of beer in his vehicle. Both testified that Renaud had been belligerent, using profanity, and was generally aggressive when asked ordinary questions. When Cst. McLeod read

Renaud the breath test demand, at the road side, Renaud told the officer to go \_\_\_\_\_ himself. When told that his refusal would be considered a crime, and asked him again to provide a breath sample, Renaud again refused, using profanity.

As there was no defense, Judge Sinclair declared Renaud guilty and issued a warrant for Renaud's arrest.

## Driver loses license

David J. Creasey appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on Friday, November 4, to enter a guilty plea to a charge of impaired driving. He had been apprehended November 12, 2010, when he failed to stop at a police road check. Police followed Creasey

and stopped him. When he was placed in the police car, he passed out.

As Creasey had no prior convictions for impaired driving, he was given the minimum mandatory sentence, a \$1,000 fine, and is prohibited from driving for one year.

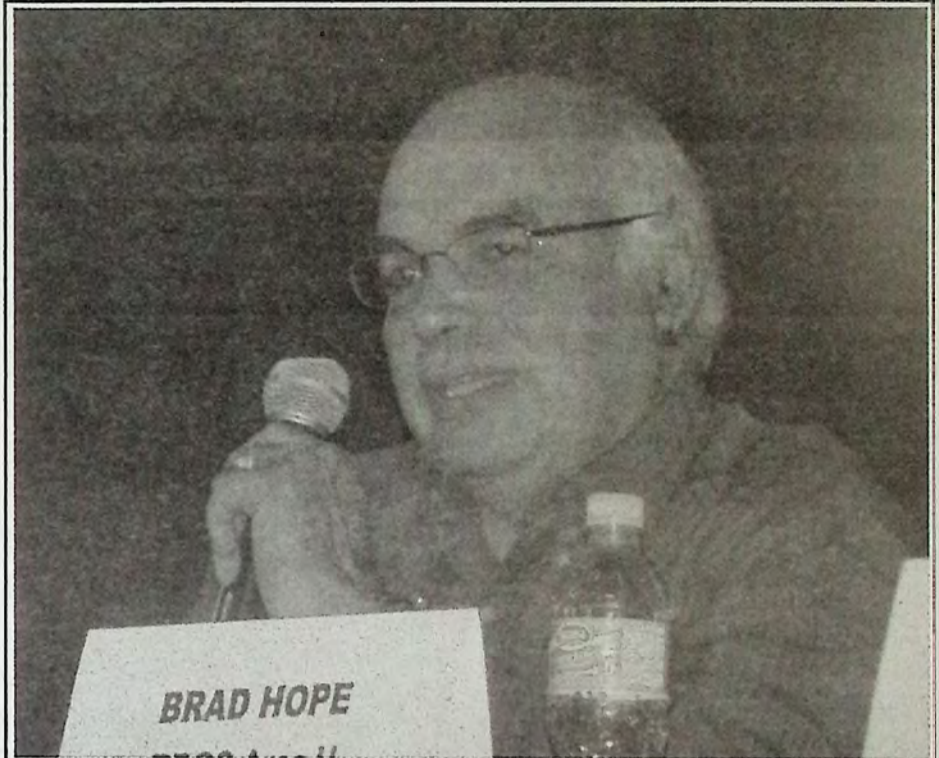

be something the community is happy to pay for."

Ray Jarvis suggested a remodel and redesign of the existing Centennial Pool in Memorial Park would be the most affordable way to establish an aquatic centre in Princeton.

Charles Weber summed up his thoughts with, "We need to have a lot more public input and we have to have something that comes within budget."

Other questions revolved around public Town Council meeting formats and the perception of 'secret' meetings, would candidates be in favour of providing free or subsidized housing as a way to attract doctors to the community and whether or not candidates would

try to pull away some of the copper mine tax base from Area H to the Town of Princeton.

The only question everyone expected was about the deer problem. Candidates were asked what they would do about it.

Ray Jarvis - "I would be in favour of culling them out one way or another."

Kim Maynard - "Something must be done, but what?"

Frank Armitage - "Anything to get rid of them."

Marilyn Harkness - "I don't mind the deer. But I know it's a problem."

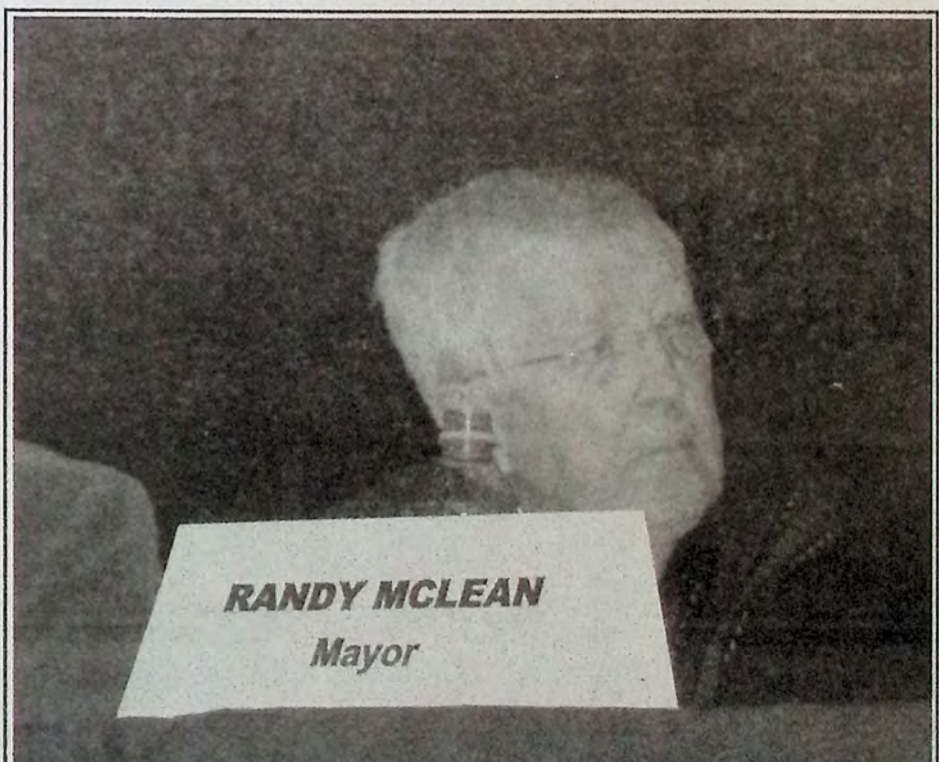

## Posse crumple Leafs

It's not often Princeton fans get to see Nelson Leafs play the Posse at home and they got a rare treat when the teams met in Princeton Arena November 4th.

What they didn't know was that Princeton has rarely beaten the tough Kootenay team. In fact, the last time the Posse took two points away from the Leafs was on January 20, 2008 with a 5-3 win in Nelson.

The last win at home against the Leafs for Princeton was a 3-2 squeaker November 10, 2007.

The Posse wasted little time in drawing first blood in the first period. Jaden Janzen took a pass from Curtis Bellamy and skated across the Nelson goal crease from right to left and snapped a quick backhand between the legs of Leaf goalie Andrew Walton.

Princeton added to their lead at 16:22 with a goal scored by Alex Demchuk. Assists went to Eric Kubis and Devon Grossler.

Nelson responded with a goal at 13:16 (Carsen Williams from Max Mois) to finish the period trailing 2-1.

The second period saw both teams battle back and forth but ended with no further scoring.

Princeton widened their lead at 17:09 of the third with a goal

scored by Eric Kubis, who was assisted by Alex Demchuk.

Nelson responded at 16:29 (Colten Dawson from Walker Sidoni and Brett Norman) and exactly nine seconds later Princeton's team points leader Kurtis Bond scored one for the home team. Assists went to Jaden Janzen and Kaleb Boyle.

There was no further scoring although Posse goalie Phoenix Logan-Hill had quite a workout. He was pelted the full 60-minutes of play with almost twice as many shots as Princeton fired at the Nelson net.

At one point it looked as if Logan-Hill was in the middle of a driving range stopping line drives aimed at every possible location.

## News Leader Recipe 397

### Mushroom and Squash Bisque

(NC)—Easy to make with pre-cut vegetables and prepared in the microwave, this hearty fall bisque combines the rich mellow flavour of mushrooms with any of the varieties of squash, in season. Evaporated milk adds creaminess but keeps it low in fat.

Preparation Time: 15 minutes Cooking Time: 15 minutes

- 1 tbsp (15 mL) butter
- 1 cup (250 mL) each chopped onion and carrot
- 1/2 lb (250 g) sliced fresh white mushrooms (about 3 cups/750 mL)
- 2 cups (500 mL) peeled, cubed squash
- 3 cups (750 mL) chicken broth
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) evaporated milk (or light cream)
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) salt
- 8 acorn squash bowls\* (optional)

Garnish: Sour cream and basil leaves (optional)

In large (8 cup/2L) microwaveable bowl combine butter, onion, carrot, mushrooms and squash. Cover; microwave on high for 8-10 minutes or until vegetables are tender, stirring once. Transfer half the vegetables and half the broth to blender or food processor; puree until smooth. Repeat with remaining vegetables and broth. Return to bowl; stir in milk and microwave on high for 5-7 minutes or until heated through. Serve in squash bowls, if desired. Garnish with sour cream swirl and basil if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Variation: In large saucepan combine butter, vegetables and broth. Bring to boil; lower heat, cover and simmer 10-12 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add milk and puree as directed.

Acorn Squash Bowls: Purchase 4 medium acorn squash. Cut a thin slice off the bottom and top to allow "squash bowls" to sit level. To ease cutting squash in half, microwave each squash about 3-6 minutes or until a knife will pierce the skin easily; then halve with a knife and scoop out seeds and some of pulp to make the cavity larger.

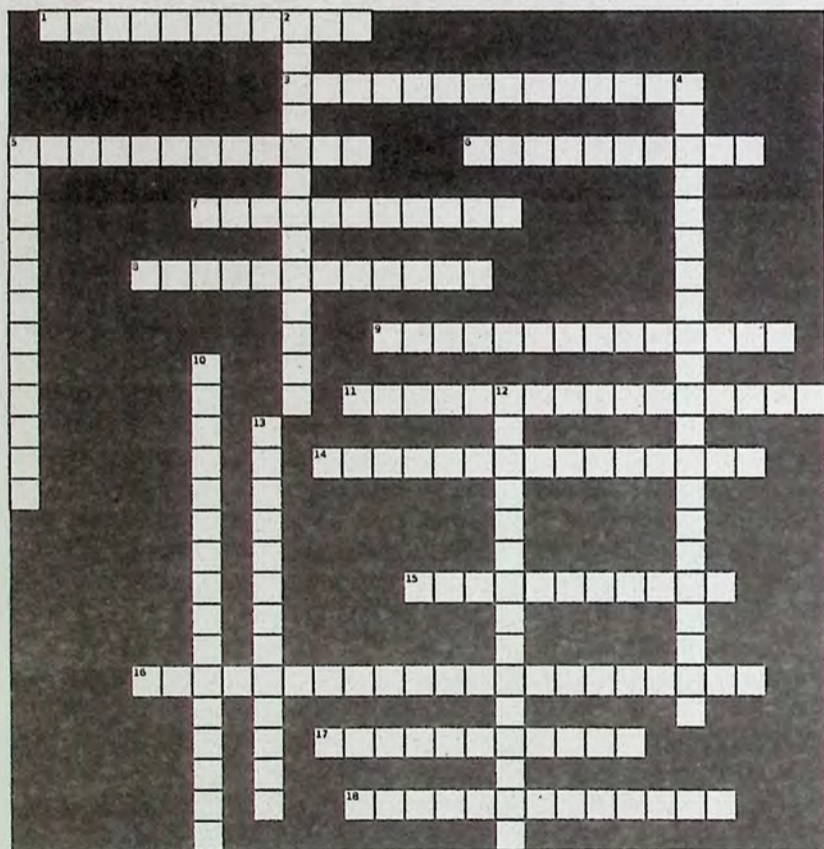

## My Turn

### What Are Your Voting Options?

Each Municipal Election I get a bit itchy about marking my ballot.

Usually I pick most of my choices early in the campaign. I often base my choices on a variety of things, such as track record, experience, need for change, whatever.

I also try not to get fooled by the conversations candidates have with me in my office. As much as I want to be treated just like any other voter I am also very much aware of the fact that my media connections may play into how a candidate presents himself or herself to me.

HINT: If I only see you in my office during an election campaign, I remember that when I go to the polls. The same goes for whether or not I see you during your term.

What I love about election time is the games.

I've probably told every candidate I have spoken to over the years that I was voting for them. The fact of the matter is there are years I haven't voted for a full slate of candidates.

The method is called 'plunking' and it is considered a voting strategy.

Basically speaking, you 'plunk' when you don't vote for a total of four candidates for Town Council, for example.

When you go to vote you are usually told, often there's signage posted as well, instructing you to vote for a maximum of four candidates for Town Council (sticking to the example).

There's nothing saying you can vote for less than that, and I've sat in on more than one election night observing ballot counts where a lot of people in Princeton will vote for one, two or maybe three candidates instead of a full four.

Some people claim it's the same as spoiling your ballot.

The reality is that when you spoil your ballot (vote for too many candidates or don't vote for any) your vote does not get counted. When you plunk, the one, two or three people you voted for will receive your votes in their total.

Will I plunk in this election?

### Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To The Editor;

The entire town of Coalmont was without phone service from 4:00 PM November 2nd until 9:45 AM November 3rd. We have NO cell phone coverage in our area, and that means that there is no 9-1-1 emergency service available here. If we need Police, Fire, or Ambulance we are out of luck as we have NO way to contact them.

We have contacted Telus several times, as have our neighbours, using their online repair chat service, and to be frank, it is like being in a "Laurel and Hardy" skit! The person responding goes through a script of questions focusing on why your individual phone is not working with the purpose of booking a repair call. Ours is booked for November 18. They could guarantee that we will have phone service before that date. After several attempts, they have FINALLY woken up to the fact that it was the entire town that was out of service, not individual customers.

This is an ongoing problem, ever since Argo Road Maintenance dug up our phone cables over a year ago on October 25, 2010. Argo was in the process of clearing the ditches on the approach to town at the base of a posted avalanche area to give the snow and rocks somewhere to collect, and ripped up the phone cables in the process. There was a virtual rat's nest of wires sticking out of the ground. We went through the same complaint process with Telus then, and they kept saying "we have no other reports of outages in your area, please have your neighbours CALL us to report the problem."

Telus seem oblivious to the fact there is no cell phone service here, in fact their reaction is one of disbelief. The photo on the right is of the cables lying exposed in the ditch after they were re-spliced.

The cables are in substantially the same condition as of last week despite several attempts to have Telus re-bury them. That assumes, of course, that copper thieves have not harvested them as they would be an easy target. Almost daily, rocks roll down that slope, and we are amazed that a boulder has not smashed the splices over the last

year. Service problems have continued on a monthly basis ever since the original incident.

We have requested that Telus flag our town so that on the first report of trouble they send out a radio-telephone equipped vehicle and park it at the main intersection of town with a sign "9-1-1 Emergency Phone". That request has fallen on deaf ears. Not only do they NOT have such a system in place, they don't even respond in a timely manner when they are notified of a complete failure of the phone system and lack of 9-1-1 service. At the present time, there have still been no Telus vehicles attending the current problem.

We complained to the CRTC about a month ago because the phone lines were out once again at

that time. Telus did, indeed, contact us, but offered no assurances that the phone system would be properly repaired, the cables re-buried, and a contingency plan set up to provide 9-1-1 service should this problem reoccur.

In other words, they did NOTHING. We have reactivated our CRTC complaint. Our greatest concern is that someone will die because of the inaction of Telus and their apparent disregard for the seriousness of this situation. They appear to be completely incapable of solving this problem. Telephones have been around for a century, as long as the town of Coalmont. You would think that by now we should have a reliable service.

This Friday, we will once again take a day to remember the men and women who fought in so many wars.
