RCMP call death 'suspicious'

The RCMP is currently investigating the death of a 56 year-old Princeton woman.

The Penticton Regional General Investigation Section and the Southeast District Major Crimes Unit are assisting with the probe.

Last Wednesday, November 9th, members of Princeton RCMP Detachment attended a residence on Osprey Lake Road, approximately 20-kilometres from Princeton in order to conduct a "well being check" on the woman.

When they arrived and entered the home, officers found her deceased

inside.

Investigators believe that the death is suspicious.

A Forensic Autopsy is scheduled for Monday, November 14. RCMP hope the results will assist investigators in making further determinations.

"At this time we can state that there are no indications that the woman's death poses a risk to the safety of the general public and community of Princeton," says RCMP Cpl. Dan Moskaluk.

The woman's identity has not been released to the public.

Deer, cougar spark council action

Two incidents have put fear for public safety high on the list of Town Council priorities. The first incident was the sighting of a cougar in pursuit of deer within the town. The second incident arose from an aggressive deer accosting a vision impaired elderly person using a walker in her own driveway. The second incident hit home with Councillor Frank Armitage, as the person accosted was his mother-in-law.

During the past few years, there have been more than one incident of cougars hunting in town. Two years ago, there were incidents of cougars threatening the lives of young people, one along the Tulameen River and one at

Memorial Park. In another incident in the winter, a cougar killed a deer on the ice under the wooden bridge at the end of Bridge Street.

There have been many incidents of deer behaving in an aggressive manner toward humans. Many times, local residents have complained to Town Council about the deer in Princeton, but there have been many people who opposed taking any action against the deer.

The cougar and deer problems are related. With so many deer taking up residence within Town boundaries, the cougar are attracted to residential areas as they hunt their natural prey. If easier prey appears, such as children, the cougar are not likely to wait for deer. This is a

frightening reality Town Council must address.

Councillor Armitage was impressed by the speed at which a conservation officer from Merritt responded to the complaint of the aggressive deer accosting his mother-in-law. The officer drove to Princeton and investigated, but could not clearly identify the deer

that had caused the problem. If he had been able to identify the deer, he would have removed the animal.

Councillor Armitage says it is time Town Council took "assertive action" to deal with the deer problem. This time, all members of Council agreed. They advocated culling or any other control mechanism.

Council is planning to send out a survey to find out how many local residents agree with culling the deer. Before any action can be taken, proof of citizen support is necessary.

In addition to sending out the survey, Council would like citizens to immediately contact the Ministry continued on Page 3

Community supports remembrance

Veterans Square was crowded with hundreds of people for the Remembrance Day ceremony in Princeton. This annual commemoration of those who sacrificed their lives in wartime and in peacekeeping is both a solemn time of remembrance and a re-dedication to the principles for which the dead gave their lives. On the cenotaph, and lining the pavement around the cenotaph, there were more wreaths and crosses than ever.

During the luncheon at the Legion Hall, many speakers emphasized the importance of remembering the fallen, the veterans, and the reasons for which they made a sacrifice or risked their lives. Jim Turner, Sgt. At Arms for the Legion, read a letter from the Prime Minister. Youth Ambassadors Roya Massoudi and Taylor Robillard read "In Flanders Fields", and Mayor Randy McLean recognized all veterans, and all those who risk their lives today, as

well as those who serve their communities, including the fire department, RCMP, Highway Rescue, and ambulance service. He mentioned speaking to graduates in June, and hoped they would value the freedom won for them and thank a veteran.

Legion Branch President Wayne Terepocki thanked all of the people who participated in the ceremony and thanked the community for supporting Remembrance Day.

Veterans from World War II, although few in number, stood and were recognized with heartfelt applause. Veterans of the Korean War, Viet Nam, Gulf War and Canada's peacekeeping troops were recognized.

RCMP Cst. Leach spoke of how impressed he was by the community support and by the large number of young people who participated in the ceremony. He said it is a day to remember our freedom and

those who gave their lives for it.

Legion Ladies Auxiliary President Charlene Longdo thanked Auxiliary members for making the lunch and asked them to stand and be recognized. They received a big round of applause. Then she presented a \$2,000 cheque to the Legion President along with a cheque for more than \$700 raised by the Ladies Auxiliary for their annual poppy drive.

Brad Hope, Area H Director, spoke of Canada's role in wartime and peacekeeping. He said, "We are not a warlike nation but when called upon..." and went on to say Canadians have made the sacrifice.

Bob Paterson, the Legion Chair for the Remembrance Day activities, had many people to thank, and thanked everyone for attending. He read A Soldier's Poem, then invited everyone in the Legion Hall to stay for an afternoon of entertainment.

..... continued from Front Page of Environment conservation branch and report any incident of aggressive deer. The number to call is 1-877-952-7277 to report dangerous human-wildlife conflicts.

The other action citizens may take, which Council encourages, is to make a written report to Town

Council of any incidents involving aggressive or nuisance deer. If it is a specific incident, give date, location and other facts. If it is an ongoing situation, give location and the nature of the problem with deer. The more reports Council receives, the more likely they can persuade the Wildlife Branch to take action.

Twenty years ago, people in Princeton could grow gardens without fencing them, and did not worry about meeting deer while taking a walk, nor having encounters with aggressive deer in their neighbourhoods. Some people began hand feeding deer, and others enjoyed having the deer around so did not chase

them from their yards. Although feeding deer is a violation of a bylaw in Princeton, the damage was done. Deer began to feel safe in town, and soon began having their young in town.

Succeeding generations of deer began to regard the town as their

rightful territory, which has led to aggressive behaviour toward humans and their pets. The situation has deteriorated to the point that the deer no longer leave town during the summer to go to the high country as they did in the past, having found safety and food within Town boundaries.

Mayor Randy McLean and Dean Johnston attended a thermal energy conference in Vernon about the production of thermal energy from bio fuel such as wood pellets. Mayor McLean said it was very interesting and resulted in a great deal of discussion with Johnston who has been involved with the local pellet plant.

Councillor Jason Earle is growing a mustache for Movember, a nationwide initiative to promote awareness of prostate cancer.

Fortis BC has paid the Town of Princeton \$57,540 plus \$6,904.80 HST, for the franchise/operating agreement between the Town of Princeton and FortisBC Energy Inc.

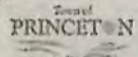
Two members of Town Council praised the book Dead Horse on the

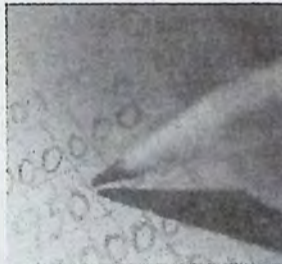

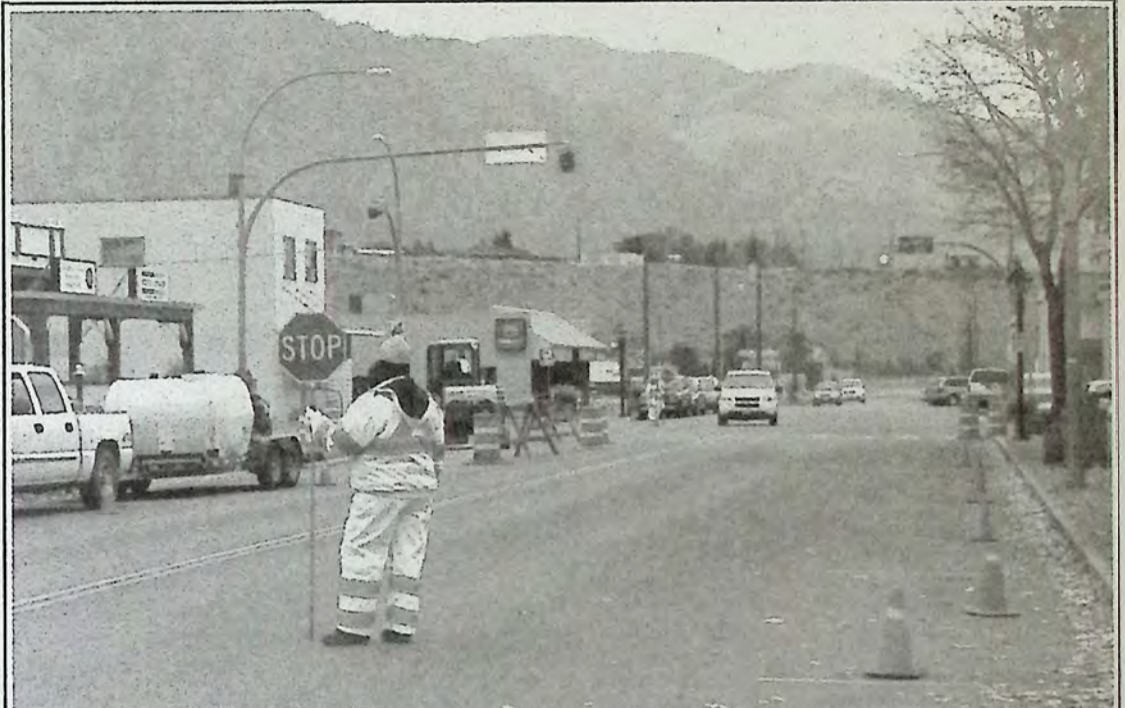

Keremeos - Cawston - Olalla



The Highway 3 intersection of 7th Avenue and 7th Street in Keremeos is finally getting some improvements. The safety of westbound traffic will improve by removing the curb lane. Traditionally, long tractor-trailer units have had to take the inside lane to get around the corner without the trailer jumping the curb. Inattentive drivers have been known to take the curb lane in an effort to beat the tractor-trailer unit around the corner, with the inevitable "crunch" being their consequence. Speeding leads to drug seizure

A total of more than \$40,000.00 worth of cocaine was seized by RCMP from a vehicle after a Burnaby man was caught speeding on Highway 3 in Keremeos.

RCMP Cpl. Dan Moskaluk, says the keen sense of the officer and even keener sense of his partner, RCMP dog Otis, led to the discovery November 3rd.

During the course of the vehicle stop, Cpl. Ryan McLeod made several observations which subsequently led to the arrest of the

vehicle occupants for drug possession.

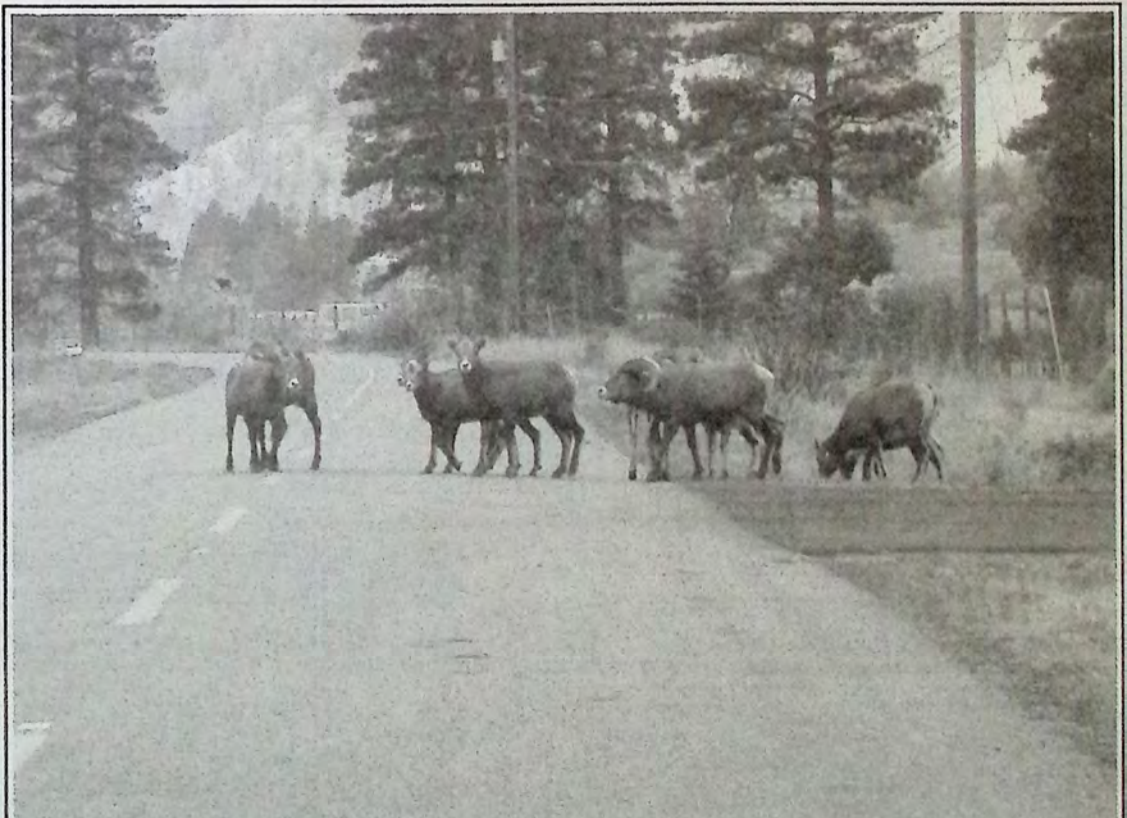
The driver had cocaine on him and a sealed kilogram brick of cocaine was found in the vehicle by the K-9 Unit, during a search of the vehicle.

"Any time we can take a kilo of cocaine out of circulation, it's a substantial disruption to someone's illicit operations," says Cpl. Moskaluk.

"Having one of our Traffic Services Units intercepting it

while in transit before it is distributed at street level in our communities, makes it an even bigger disruption that assists in keeping several communities safer and healthier."

Police say the vehicle, a 2006 Mazda, was also seized and will be sought to be forfeited as offence related property under provisions of the Criminal Code. A 46-year old male from Burnaby faces charges of cocaine possession for the purpose of trafficking.

Museum hosts historical show

Princeton's Museum and Archives Society presented a special film on November 9 at Riverside Centre. The film was a double view of Vancouver, the first film ever taken of the city in 1907 and a 2007 view of the same area. The film was brought to Princeton by Scott Anderson, President of the Vancouver Historical Society.

The early film was taken from a camera set up on the front of a BC Electric streetcar. It captured scenes from Hastings Street to Granville to Robson. The city had a population of

70,000 at that time and most of the traffic was streetcars, horse drawn vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians. There was one automobile in the film. Scenes were narrated by a number of Vancouver residents, and historic buildings were highlighted. One shop carried the sign P. Burns & Co., owned by the same Patrick Burns who, with a partner named Blake, established the Blakeburn mine and the village of the same name.

The modern version showed the city of 600,000 people and one million

automobiles in colour alongside the early film. It was fascinating.

The evening included a brief film of the recent history of Princeton Museum describing the achievements of the past year. President Robert Wicks encouraged the audience to consider becoming a member of the Museum Society.

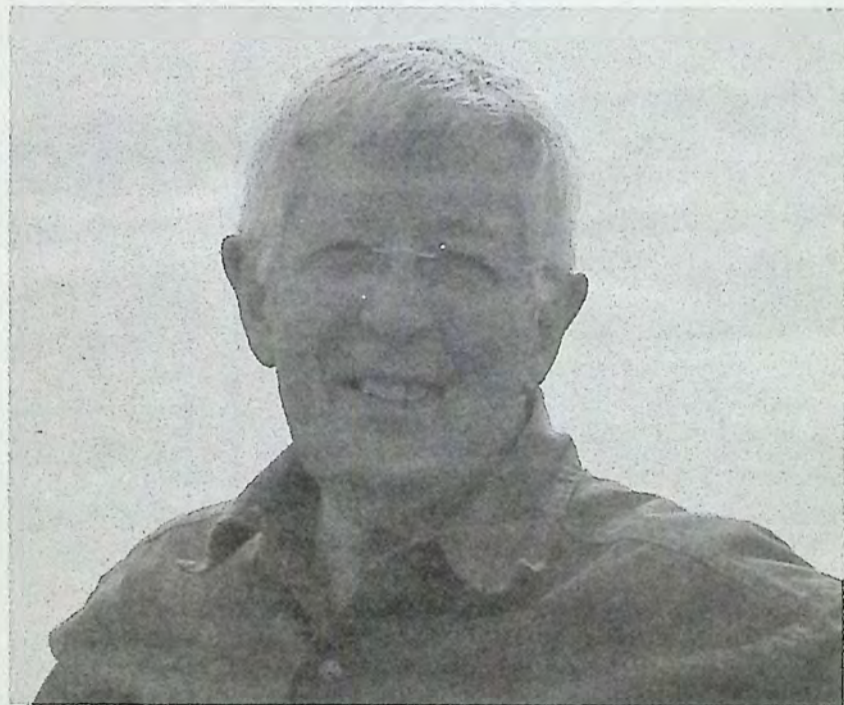

Is A 'Silent Killer' Lurking In Your Home?

"The only way to detect this deadly gas is by installing carbon monoxide detectors," De Luca explained, recommending that detectors be installed on each level of your home.

"At minimum, one should be installed outside every sleeping level."

De Luca stressed the importance of having the CO detectors linked to a monitoring centre since many of those killed or injured by carbon monoxide are asleep at the time of exposure and timing is crucial for alerting emergency help.

"Protectron carbon monoxide detectors offer valuable protection by alerting you to the presence of this gas and notifying the monitoring centre, which will immediately take the appropriate measures to help you," he added.

What to look for in a CO detector:

- Choose one that is listed with the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) standard. The logos of the testing agency will be on the prod-

uct.

- If you have a battery powered unit, make sure you change the detectors battery as recommended by the manufacturer, and test the unit once a month.

- Replace the unit as recommended by the manufacturer (generally between 5 and 10 years).

How to prevent CO poisoning:

- Have a qualified service technician check your furnace and other fuel-burning equipment at least once a year.

- Have your chimneys cleaned and inspected at least once a year.

- Never run vehicles, motor bikes, lawn-mowers, generators, or snow blowers in attached garages, even if the doors are open.

If your carbon monoxide detector alarm sounds, De Luca advises to exit as quickly as possible and call the fire department from a neighbour's home. More information on home security is available at www.protectron.com.

What Stress Shortens Life?

A long life depends on the length of your telomeres. Telomeres are a part of each gene sequence, and the shorter, or less active, the telomeres become, the shorter your life will be. Two kinds of stress are the greatest enemies of telomeres.

The first kind of stress that will affect your life is oxidation stress. This is the kind of stress caused by high cholesterol, inadequate amounts of antioxidants like Vitamin C and plant phytochemicals (plant substances which fight free radicals). Along with oxidation stress, we can include another kind of body stress from toxins, as in smoking, food preservatives and excess alcohol, as well as substances we breathe or put on our skin that put stress on our bodies because they are toxic: exhaust fumes, fumes from cleaning products, soaps, cosmetics.

The second kind of stress is what we term emotional stress. This can be caused by traumatic events such as the loss of a loved one, or a divorce, or squabbling in the family. Emotional stress to a lesser degree takes the form of worry, or not liking one's job, or having too many demands on one's time, such as young parents experience. Severe emotional stress is often experienced by those caring for a seriously or terminally ill loved one at home, which is a 24/7 job with little time for relief of stress.

What prevents oxidation stress? First, watch what you eat. Increase your intake of fruits and vegetables, reduce your consumption of fats, preservatives, and your intake of toxic substances that produce fumes.

The reduction of emotional stress is much more difficult. Many of us are trapped in jobs we take simply because we must make a living. Some of us are trapped in difficult family situations. One of the most effective ways to reduce this kind of stress is to go for long walks. In many situations, counseling helps.

Reducing both body and emotional stress is one way to enjoy a long, healthy life.

As the late "60 Minutes" reporter Andy Rooney often began: "It occurred to me..." Well it occurred to me that the increased level of public interest leading up to the Aquatic Centre referendum, ill conceived though it was, would have lead to an increase in the sales of newspapers in Princeton. Many editions contained a number of Letters to the Editor yet it is obvious from this week's papers that there is far less public interest in the upcoming municipal elections. Did newspaper sales actually increase in the weeks leading up to the referendum?

All too often we have heard it said that voter apathy is behind poor voter turn-out. amazing opportunity to elect a new 'facilitator.' In all likelihood failing to do so will result in the election of a council that will deliver another three years of the same.

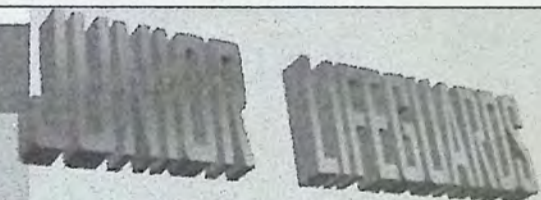

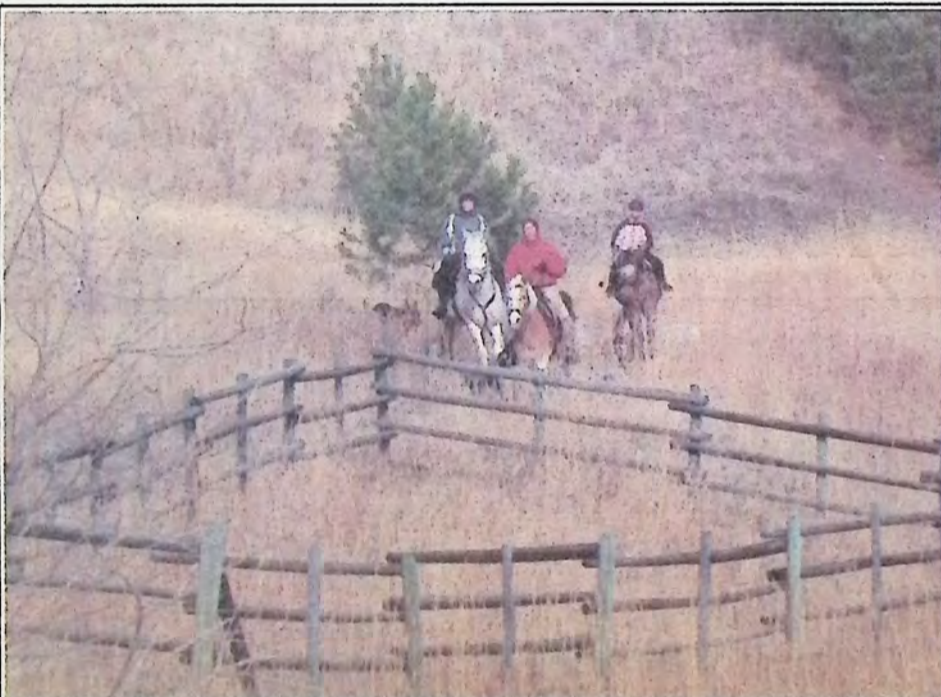

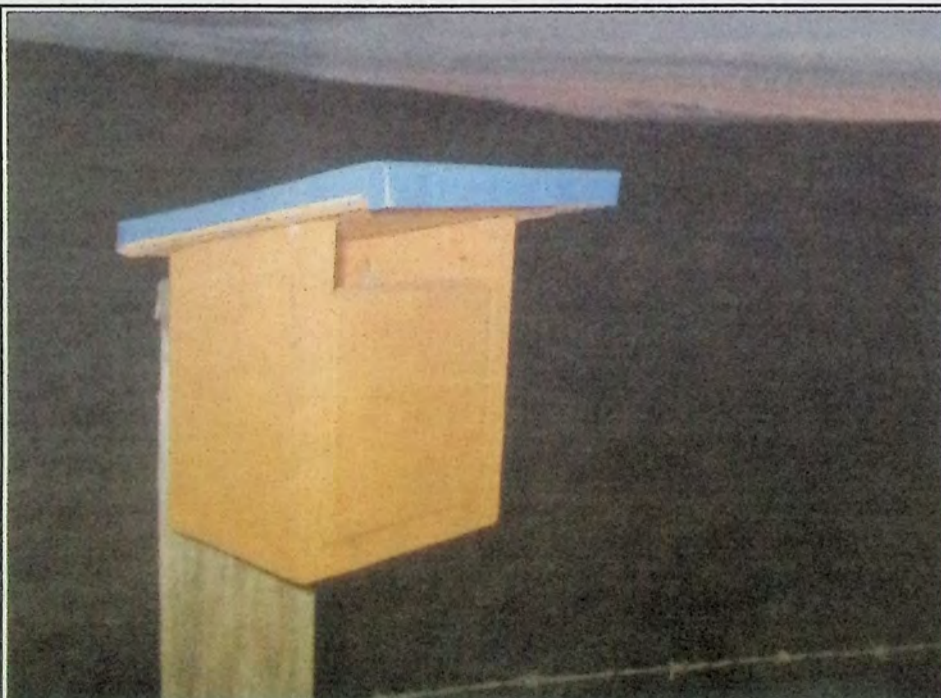

Stuffed Peppers

Hands-on time : 25 minutes / Total time: 1 1/4 hours / Makes: 4 servings

- 4 red bell peppers
- 1/4 lb (100 g) beef filet (your preferred cut) to grill
- 1 small chicken breast
- 1 Italian sausage
- 1/3 cup Saputo parmesancheese, grated
- 1/2 cup Saputo mozzarellissimacheese, shredded
- Chopped parsley
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 1 egg
- 2 tomatoes, diced
- Salt and fresh ground pepper

PREPARATION :

- Preheat oven at 375° F (190° C).
- Wash peppers, cut off the top and stem and remove the seeds and ribs.
- On a grill pan or barbecue, grill beef, chicken and sausage.
- Once the meat is cooked, chop it finely. Add a handful of parmesan, parsley, chopped garlic, one egg, salt and pepper. Mix well.
- Stuff the peppers with the meat mixture, cover with diced tomatoes and shredded mozzarellissima cheese, place them in a baking dish and bake in the oven for 45 minutes.
- Enjoy hot or cold.

- And to pursue fair distribution of area taxes.

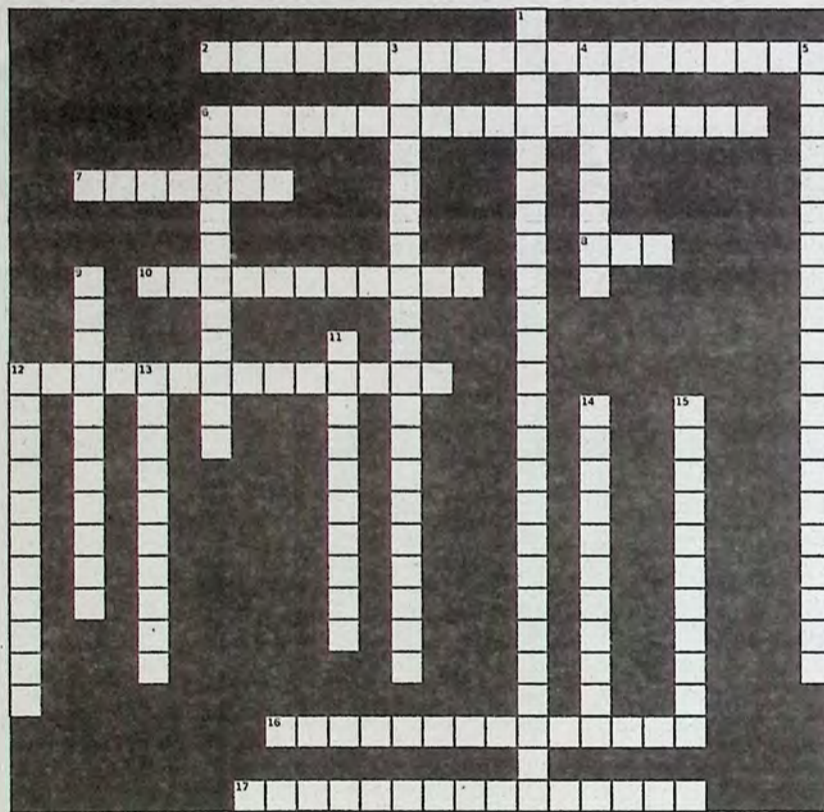

What conclusions did I draw from these occurrences?

Well, as a small business owner located in the same block as the two businesses in question, I know sometimes when there's only one of us in the office and something like a bathroom break or a quick trip to the post office or bank is required, there's not much we can do other than lock the front door and take care of whatever needs to be taken care of. It's not as if any of us are trying to purposely turn away customers.

What I find so very interesting about the two incidents is that they involved two different employees working for the Town of Princeton.

While a single incident I could write off as being the result of bad timing, or just a bad day, the fact that it happened twice in a matter of days on the same street and involved two different downtown businesses and two different people makes me wonder.

Maybe they have forgotten how fortunate they are to be working in a community where the majority of businesses are owner/operated.

Maybe they have forgotten how many of the local business owners are thankful for having such a dedicated crew of town employees who keep our downtown streets clean and presentable.

I was sort of under the impression we were all in the business of conducting business together, whether it's owning a store or being a customer in a store. I thought we were all supposed to try to work together to make our community grow.

After being exposed to the attitude of two town employees, it makes me wonder whose side they really are on.

Can A Nation Live Beyond Its Means? Yes!

The ongoing crises in the European Union (Eurozone) is hard to understand unless you know the meaning of "sovereign" debt. This term means the nation is in debt, and it means the nation has borrowed more money than it can repay. This means the whole nation could go bankrupt.

We seldom think of nations going bankrupt from living beyond their means, but this is what has happened in Greece. Greece is about to go bankrupt unless the Eurozone solution works. Greeks do not like the idea of living on less, but that is what they are going to have to do to pay off what they owe.

Not far behind Greece is Italy. The government of Italy is struggling to repay what it owes, and Italians are going to have to bite the bullet pretty soon, too.

What happens if these European countries start going bankrupt? First and foremost, the banks of other countries within the Eurozone will go bankrupt and that will start a chain reaction that will affect all of the European Union nations.

One of the errors Greece made was to borrow money to pay pensions to people retiring at age 50 or 55. These people were civil servants, and apparently Greece is top heavy with civil servants. Early retirement at half a full pension seemed a solution to help younger people find employment, but the plan backfired. Greece does not produce enough to pay back what it owes, let alone keep paying all of those pensions.

To add to the problems the

Greeks face is the fact that they have never been a wealthy nation. The wealth of a nation depends on several things: its natural resources, its ability to produce what the people of the nation want (few imports), and the productivity of its people. Greece does not have big deposits of natural resources to dip into like Canada does, and it must import a great deal of things such as wheat, oil, minerals, and so on. When the nation's people depend too much on imported products rather than living on the products its people produce, then it is in trouble. When we look at the productivity of the people, paying too many people not to work cuts down on productivity. It is a pathway to poverty.

What I am saying is an over-simplification of the problems that face Greece, Italy and other Eurozone countries. The wealthier nations of Europe, such as Germany, France and Britain, began to lend money to the less wealthy nations in an effort to raise standards of living across Europe.

However, lending money to these nations puts the poorer nations in a bind. Until they can increase their productivity, they cannot pay back the money they borrowed. It is like lending money to a man who has no job and no likely prospects of a job.

Greece is now having to sell its national assets, like its power plants and its communications systems and its transportation systems, things Greek taxpayers paid

for years ago. Even with these sales, it will not be enough, because it is a solution for just one year. What will they have to sell next, and when will they run out of things to sell?

When a nation or a state or a province begin selling off things the taxpayers have bought, it is called privatizing, and we have certainly seen our share of that in British Columbia. This is a good reason to ask our government if we are living beyond our means as a province, and if so, why?

If the world economic situation continues as it has, we may see other nations go down the same path as Greece in the near future, because a lot of nations are deeply in debt. They cannot borrow their way out of it. They need to remember how much the interest on the debt will cost them.

What is happening to Greece should be a lesson to all of us. We cannot allow our nation to borrow too much, and we must learn to be more productive, to import less while we consume more of our own products.

We cannot sell off our national and provincial assets to try to gain more time while we continue to produce less and import more. These are lessons which Canadians must learn if we are to remain a strong nation.

Otherwise, say good-bye to your government pension, unemployment insurance and other benefits, and say hello to less money for you and higher taxes as well. That's the bullet the Greeks are going to have to bite.

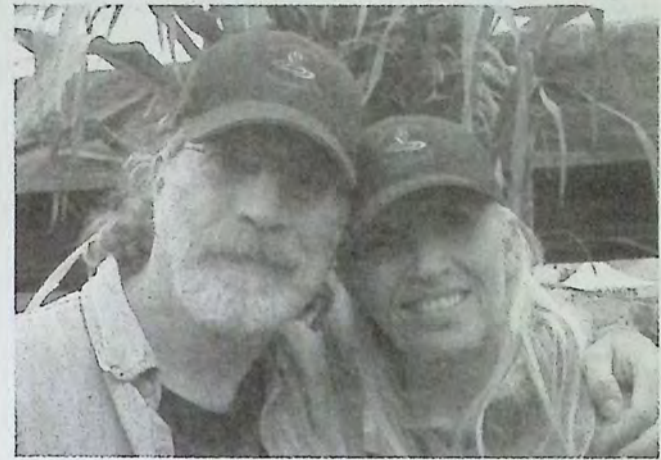

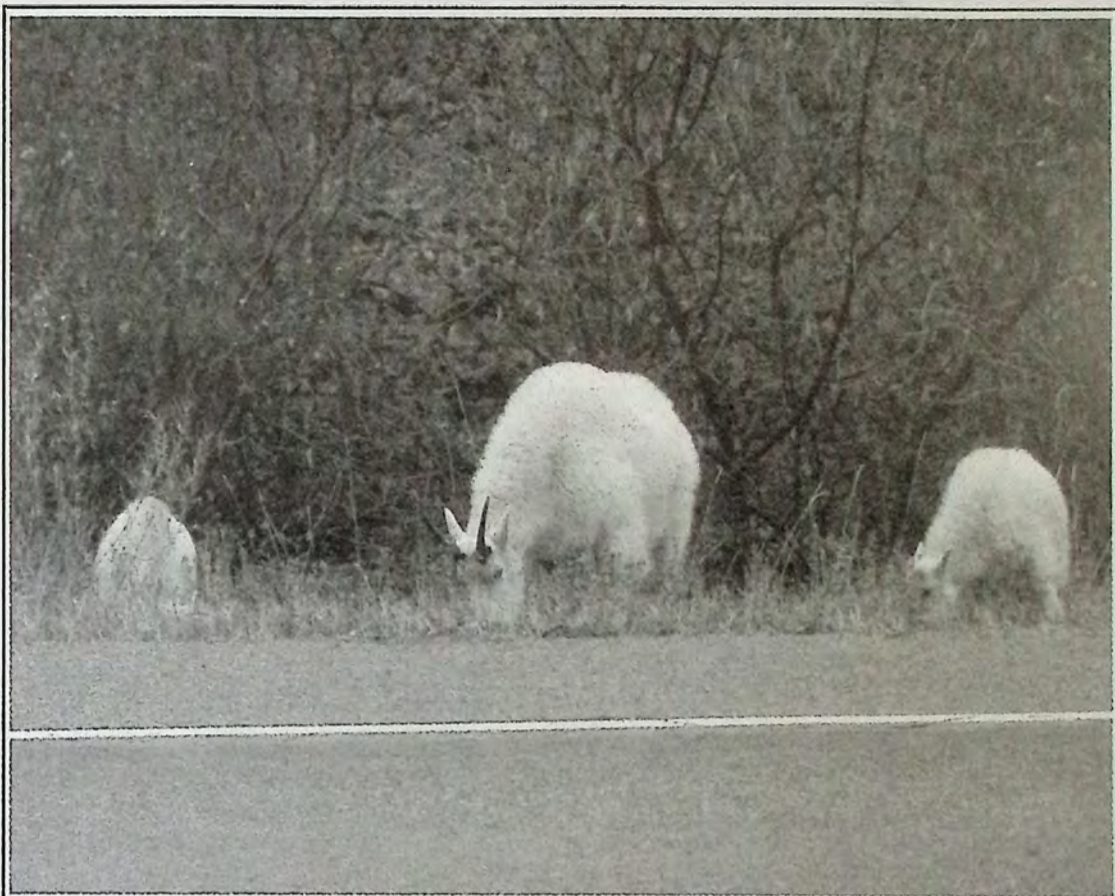

To The Editor;

We are going to have another referendum of sorts, our municipal elections but, dam it, where is all the interest and buzz that surrounded the pool referendum? What is this election about?

This summer out of the blue a referendum was announced for a deluxe expensive Aquatic Centre and the pool committee went on a charm offensive. The proposal voted on was chosen in 2008 by the then mayor McLean and council plus a group of insiders after totally non-transparent "consultations with the public."

The timing appeared to be trying to catch the excitement and optimism surrounding the opening of the new mine. Fortunately voters had more sense that council and defeated the referendum.

Now Mayor McLean's election plans are to talk to us about a more modest proposal. Too bad the Mayor and Council didn't talk to their citizens before they brought in the high priced consultants from the city who filled them with grand ideas. It's time for a change.
The Library

The Town purchased the Goldion property for about \$275,000 because the museum folks wanted the library space in their building for an expanded exhibits area. The

Goldion building was below code in almost every respect and had to be nearly totally gutted. This included cutting through the concrete floor with a diamond saw to get at the plumbing. The architects were engaged to make the place look good so now we have across front and back, floor to ceiling windows (who cares about the heating cost in the winter and the cooling cost during the summer). I don't know of any figures having been released on the renovation cost but it is probably as much, and likely more, than the purchase price of the property and all this expense for a public space which is only open 20 hours per week.

Also:

- If our present council had been even slightly aware of the digital take-over of the world they would have known that as the internet continued to improved the buying and reading of books has been in steady decline. In addition e-books are rapidly gaining popularity. We needed a smaller library not a larger one!
- The Goldion building could probably have been demolished and rebuilt for the same or less money and we would now have a new building.
- The Town has property elsewhere which could have been

used to build a new library.

- Since the Town bought private property, no property taxes are now collected and no water and sewer fees are payable, so of course, we remaining tax payers have to pay more to make up the difference.
- P.S. The Goldion building is big enough to be the new Town Hall that council says we need. This would save us \$2 million plus.

The Industrial Park and the Airport

Who knows what the situation is, as capital expenses, revenue etc. are lumped in each sector with all other Town expenditures of the same type. Doesn't council want to know what the return is on our tax money? Are we getting a positive or a negative return?

Health Care in Princeton

This is the most important issue in this election. A small but steady number of people are leaving Princeton because of the uncertainty around the future of the hospital and doctors, etc. Little or no progress has been made over the past three years and I have the feeling that if we don't break the trend soon that Interior Health will squeeze us until the hospital is shut down. If we could get the operating room open again, hopefully, that would attract enough doctors to get our on-call and other needs covered.

We need new leadership on council to add energy and new ideas to rev up the ongoing effort to get our hospital back on a solid footing.
