Biologist suggests deer solutions

Established wildlife populations generally reach a fluctuating balance around the capacity of the habitat to support them. The size of populations depend largely on birthrate versus mortality. Urban deer currently have a high birthrate and low mortality. The population is increasing. Urban habitat seems not yet at capacity. Without management intervention, factors will ultimately temper increases in the number of deer. What will those factors be? Will those factors be planned management factors, or factors not

of our making? Will the deer density be tolerable at that balance? Without active deer management it seems that is not likely.

Having retired from a life's career as a government wildlife biologist I foresee managing urban deer over the long term being technically difficult, and, fraught with political consequences. As with feral rabbits, deer stir emotions of parental protection within many people. Other people, frustrated with deer, want them killed. Here I will proffer a couple options that might be considered as components in an urban deer management strategy.

Backgrounder:
Urbanites are in escalating conflict with deer. That conflict was earlier

experienced by apple producers. Some decades ago "old fashioned" trees, largely immune to deer damage, were being replaced with high density plantings of short, spindly apple trees. Fabulous for deer - terrible for apple producers; for deer abundant high quality food and few predators; for orchardists de-barking damage of bucks rubbing antlers, and in particular browsing that could damage the entire leaf canopies of these small trees.

An experimental deer hunting season localized within one community failed to help. Indeed, it seemed to exacerbate the conflict. Excluded by worried private landowners, hunters were forced into adjacent Crown highlands. The consequence: evermore deer migrated from those Crown lands down into orchards and urban areas seeking safe sanctu-

ary. Hunting in Crown land areas is not likely to be adequately effective in reducing deer populations in adjacent urban areas.

Some orchardists were given permits to kill marauding deer. However, shooting at night the high risk of stray bullets injuring people largely fettered that "cull" option.

Innovative deer repellents such as soap, hair clippings, predator feces (lion dung collected from a local zoo - the former Okanagan Game Farm, for example), ultimately proved insufficiently effective. Commercial repellents - odor repellents or taste repellents - were moderately effective in winter. Effectiveness diminished in summer when new leaf growth became vulnerable as it pushed through the

protective repellent barrier, and, when repellent potency was diluted by rainfall or irrigation. Further, if alternative food was not available, deer seemed 'to hold their noses' and eat regardless of repellents. Repellents work best when there are lots of other food choices for deer to select.

High tensile smooth wire fencing, and electric fencing also proved insufficiently effective. Ultimately, an economic analysis unequivocally showed solid barrier page wire fencing to exclude deer was the most cost-effective solution to minimize deer damage in high value fruit crops.

..... continued from Front Page for many adaptable wildlife species – of which deer are merely one. Food is abundant, and mortalities are low.

Ultimately, would urbanites tolerate deer enclosure fencing throughout their community? Many frustrated residents are resorting to that resolution. Although likely effective in especially vulnerable areas, excessive enclosure fencing may not be generally acceptable. Some folks liken such a fencing scenario to living in a POW camp.

Further, urban deer are becoming familiar with man-made structures, sometimes walking casually onto patios, up staircases, and even into homes. I think more the behavior of coyotes than deer as I watch a doe with two fawns intently digging in soft soil underneath a page wire enclosure fence!

Having taught her fawns the trick, each new generation of urban deer will become ever-more adept at

negotiating man-made structures. In urban deer populations there may be an ever-more developed 'culture' of living with people, making these urban deer ever-less able to fend for themselves in 'the wild' out of the city.

So, what can people do? To bring these deer populations into a tolerable balance with their urban habitat how can we moderate birth rates, and increase mortality?

A testament to the quality of the diet available in their urban habitat, many female deer are producing twin fawns. In 'the wild' food scarcity reduces birth rates. Can we reduce available food hence reducing the birth rate of urban deer by renovating our decorative landscapes; planting only varieties that deer do not like to eat? It seems the palate of urban deer is in flux. As the menu changes deer seem to be eating plants previously thought unpalatable. Plants deemed unpalatable today, may be great deer fodder tomorrow.

Further, it is unlikely people will abandon perennial favorite foods for deer: vegetable gardens, fruit trees, nut trees, flower gardens, cedar hedges as well as other favored shrubs. Deer also enjoy raiding bird feeders.

Of course, people should be discouraged from intentionally feeding deer.

Added to the list of un-natural urban enhancements of deer habitat is our winter maintenance of roads. Compared to backcountry areas, in urban areas roads are not only more abundant but also more rigorously

salted due to safety of high traffic volumes. Deer foods in urban neighborhoods has extra potassium. Metabolically potassium must be balanced with sodium. Balancing extra potassium versus sodium could be a contributing reason deer lick roadside salt accretions when succulent vegetation is available. Dietary salt is not likely a limiting factor for urban deer.

To conserve water deer compress their feces into pellets. For example, deer need less water than cattle. Cattle do not pelletize their feces. And yet, water seems to be more readily available in urban areas compared to semi-arid back country habitats.

Supplemented by sources such as irrigation overrun, decorative water features, and storm water catchment basins, deer seem to be finding adequate water in the city. Water is not likely a limiting factor for urban deer.

As an aside, here I would like to put in a plug for xeriscaping. Renovating our decorative landscaping to native plants, shrubs and trees would not only reduce irrigation water use, but also be somewhat more 'natural' for deer.

As well as changing their dietary habits, urban deer seem to be changing their activity patterns.

Relieved of the threat of predation they are becoming unafraid of people, and, more nocturnal. Urban deer stay up all night. A cull of deer using gun or archery hunters could not access the problem deer within neighborhoods of dense housing continued on Page 22

New Beginnings continues to be "the Hub" where persons served, staff and community members come together for a number of learning experiences, activities and camaraderie. We currently serve twenty-four people in our various programs – New Beginnings Day Program, Self Help Program and Employment Development.

New Beginnings is open Monday through Thursday from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Meetings are held once a month to plan the activity schedule, with input from everyone to ensure we are running a program that fulfills goals and meets expectations on how they wish to spend their leisure time in this social program. Friday closures have made it possible for staff to accompany individuals to various cultural, sporting and out of town activities during the evenings and on weekends.

During this past year, participants travelled out of town to enjoy dances, softball tournaments, swimming, picnics, hockey games, live plays, musical concerts and shopping. Participants enjoy "heritage day", where, with the help of their support worker, they do a presentation describing their family history; who they are, where they came from, occupations, customs, culinary preferences and other related topics. Life Skills covers many areas of interest, such as problem solving, manners, appreciation, hygiene, dental hygiene and various scenarios re: personal safety.

The Self Help program has had great success in the area of helping individuals reach goals identified on their Person Centered Plans, such as:

- hosting an art show
- learning to sew and make quilts
- attending the gym to achieve better health and lose weight
- operate a digital camera and learn how to transfer pictures
- host a dinner party

This program is very important as its purpose is not only to help individuals achieve their goals, but to also gain skills and knowledge that will enable them to live indepen-

dently or semi-independently in the community.

The Employment Development program provides job coaching in a variety of jobs, with the main focus being that one day the client will have the skills to seek, gain and retain meaningful employment. To date, persons served are working at many sites, such as the arena, golf course, restaurants, Tolko, Riverside Theatre and private residences doing yard maintenance. Although not all attempts have been successful, as George Edward Woodberry once said, "Defeat is not the worst of failures. Not to have tried is the true failure."

Our vision at New Beginnings is to experience a world where everyone

belongs, is accepted for who they are and are treated with dignity and respect, enjoying the opportunities and challenges available to all. Thank you to all who continue to support, encourage and show the true meaning of living life to the fullest, to the people we serve.

New Beginnings was proud to use the platform of Community Living Month to raise money for Princeton's Christmas Hampers. Masson, Arianna D'Aoust, Phil D'Aoust and Paul D'Aoust.

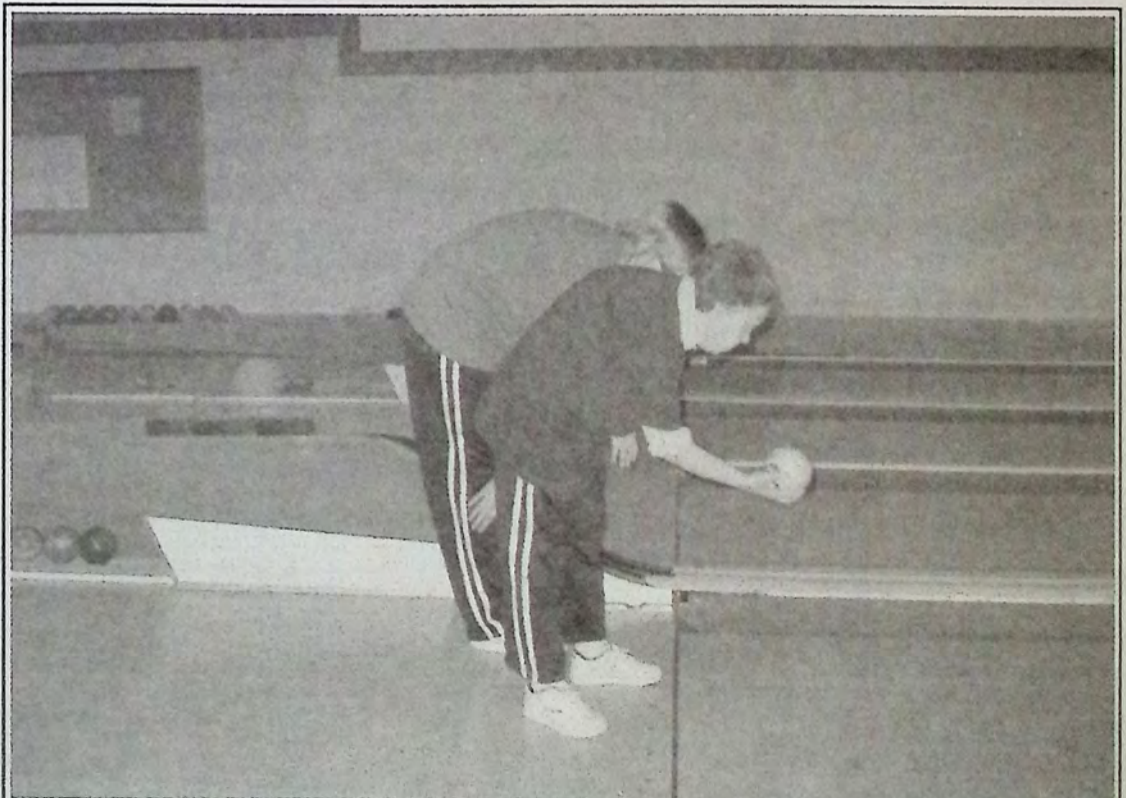

RCMP charge man with murder

RCMP reported early last week that a 63-year-old man had been charged with the first-degree murder of a Princeton woman.

The man, Roger Badour, allegedly killed Gisele Duckham, 56, in her home on Osprey Lake Road approximately 20-kilometres from Princeton on November 8.

RCMP said Badour was originally stopped for a traffic violation in downtown Penticton that same day. Badour apparently lied about who he was and when officers determined his real identity, they realized there was a Canada-wide warrant for his arrest.

Police also seized three guns, two of which were loaded, and some marijuana. Badour was then taken

into custody.

RCMP spokesman Cpl. Dan Moskaluk said the investigation into Badour's real identity during the traffic stop led officers to do a "well being check" on Duckham at her home. The residence was secure, but she was found dead of gunshot wounds.

"We can't disclose the ties of evidence," Moskaluk said. "It's my understanding they (Badour and Duckham) were known to each other."

Badour, was wanted for violating parole condition. He had been convicted of sexual assault with a weapon, forcible confinement and uttering death threats.

According to police in Victoria, he

has a history of "targeting adult females who were alone and befriending females whom he believed were socially vulnerable."

Victoria police spokesman Cst. Mike Russell said Badour had been staying in a halfway house in Victoria earlier this year when he disappeared in late April. Badour is considered a high-risk offender.

At the time, he had been serving a seven-year sentence for sexual assault and had been released on a court-imposed long-term supervision order.

Badour will appear in Penticton Law Courts to answer to the first-degree murder charges on November 23rd and remains in custody.

Fight Flu Hotspots In The Home

(NC)—Fitting cleaning into a hectic family schedule can be a challenge—but during winter months it's essential to help control the spread of germs and the influenza virus.

A virus can survive on surfaces like faucets, the fridge, doorknobs, telephones and children's toys so it's important to keep your house clean, especially in high traffic areas.

"Like all moms, I want to keep my family healthy and one of the best ways is to make sure my home is clean and disinfected," says Sarah Morgenstern, the founder of

SavvyMom.ca, one of Canada's top websites for helping women manage modern-day motherhood.

Morgenstern suggests that Canadian families should be especially vigilant during flu season, "We all have a role to play in helping to prevent the spread of the flu during the heavy flu season from November to April."

Her advice to moms: think about items in your home that your family touches frequently and keep them disinfected and clean. Some of her favourite flu prevention tools that she keeps handy for this important task are the disinfectant liquids and sprays from Mr. Clean.

Here are areas to watch and wash:

- Toys—especially if young children are placing them in their mouths, be sure to wash toys with soap and water.
- Television remote controls—because everyone in the family likes to have their hands on these.
- Telephones and cell phones—most family members use the tele-

phone on a daily basis—especially land lines. Add another step to your cleaning routine by giving telephone receivers a thorough wipe with a disinfectant liquid.

• **Faucets**—after washing, wipe and dry hands gently with a paper towel or a clean towel. Then, use the same towel to turn off the tap so you don't re-contaminate your hands. Go the extra mile and give faucets a wipe with disinfectant liquid at least twice a week to keep them germ free.

• **Toothbrushes**—keep extra toothbrushes in the house in case someone gets sick and needs a new one.

For hard surfaces such as door knobs, counters and floors, Morgenstern recommends choosing a cleaner like Mr. Clean with Febreze freshness disinfectant liquid which disinfects and smells good, so you're not discouraged from cleaning often.

Country & Blues Review
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Exposure to sunlight has become a major cause for concern during the past few years, and sales of sunscreen creams have skyrocketed. Now, researchers in Russia and Norway have evidence that disputes the risk of skin cancer and are encouraging citizens to expose their skin to moderate levels of sunshine.

The new research shows a deficiency of Vitamin D, which our bodies manufacture from sunlight on our skin, is more likely to cause internal cancers than it is to cause skin cancers. Even tanning beds have been deemed unlikely to cause skin cancer unless the tanned person is overexposed to the natural rays of a tanning bed. In fact, Russia is installing tanning beds in prisons to improve prisoner health.

Weird as this may seem after all of the hype about the need for sunscreens, there have always been physicians who have said sunshine is good medicine providing you do not get sunburn. One American doctor pointed out that the most dangerous skin cancer, called melanoma, rarely occurs on skin regularly exposed to sunlight. Maybe sun bathers have been right all along.

All of this concern about sunshine can be good whether promoting sun exposure or promoting sunscreen. It is obviously a case of reasonable versus too much. There is absolutely no doubt that over-exposure to sunlight damages the skin. At the same time, absence of sunlight has a negative impact on the human body. Vitamin D deficiency is a factor in poor bone development in children and loss of bone in the elderly. Vitamin D deficiency is linked to neurological disorders, depression (SAD) and cancer.

Moderate exposure to sunlight is good for us. Because most of us Canadians live through very dark winters, we are urged to take Vitamin D in the form of supplements during the winter months to keep our immune systems strong, and to avoid bone problems. A bright sunny day during winter should lead us outside even if the temperature is extremely low. Vitamin D supplements are good, but not as good as 15 or 20 minutes of sunlight.

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Tyson: The legend is still the legend

Whistles, yells and enthusiastic applause greeted Ian Tyson at Riverside Centre on November 16 as he stepped on stage for his third concert in Princeton. Older, his voice more gravelly, Tyson is still the consummate entertainer.

Accompanied by Lee Wharton and Gordon Maxwell on their guitars, Tyson showed he composes and sings a variety of music styles although he sticks to his western theme. He did a number he called his "cowboy rap" and another cowboy song in blues. Later in the show, he

sang a song about the Californios, giving a Spanish lilt to the music.

Ian Tyson has developed an extensive body of knowledge about western North American culture, sometimes called the cowboy culture. He knows the history of the West, and demonstrated it with stories he told

about the songs he has written.

A lot of people look down their noses at the culture of the West, as if it were not a true culture in its own right. I am not one of those people, because I know the culture of the West developed in a historical framework that belongs to North Americans and to no one else. I thoroughly appreciated the story and song about the graveyard of Charles Goodnight and his family near Amarillo, Texas.

Tyson explained to his audience that Charles Goodnight was the first to trail cattle from Texas to Kansas on a trail now known as the Goodnight Trail, and he was the man who created the first chuck wagon. Thousands of Texas longhorns, hundreds of cowboys, and many chuck wagons would follow that trail. The Goodnight graveyard is surrounded by a chain link fence, and today's cowboys stop there and tie a bandanna to the fence. Tyson's song was about those bandannas and the tribute to Charles Goodnight, still remembered by those who know the bravery of this trail blazer.

Another song that touched my heart was about one of my favourite artists, the renowned Charles M. Russell. I have been to the Charlie Russell museum and gallery in Great Falls, Montana, and I know how important

Russell's paintings are to anyone who wants to see what the West was like in the early days. Tyson's song was in the form of advice to Russell to "paint it all before it's gone".

No audience would forgive Tyson if he did not include a few old favourites. While he did not do his "Coyote" song, he did sing "Sometime Soon" and "Summer Wages" before he left the stage. There was an Ian Tyson classic missing and this did not sit well with the audience, who gave him a standing ovation and enough applause to bring him back for an encore. We finally got what we wanted, and sang along to "Four Strong Winds".

When the concert was over, Tyson sat at a table in the theatre and signed CD's for his many fans.

The Ian Tyson concert was the second in a series of three, brought to Princeton thanks to grants from the Town of Princeton, Area H, and the provincial government. The concert series was organized by Princeton Community Arts Council, who received a lot of praise from Mayor Randy McLean before the concert began. The final concert in the series features Ingrid Schellenberg, a comedienne who plays the harp. Her show is on November 27 at 2:30 PM. Tickets are still available at Thomasina's or Vermilion Gallery.

Posse special teams bring victory

Princeton Posse hosted Kelowna Chiefs in a mid-week game November 16th.

Prior to the game the evenly matched teams had met three times previously in the season with Princeton winning two of those games. Goals scored against each other were tied at 14 apiece.

After coming off a two-game losing streak over the weekend against Kootenay teams, the Posse, with most of their injured players mended and dressed, were ready to rumble.

And that's exactly what they did. Kelowna snapped in the first goal at 15:35 (Shayne Welker from Alex Fortin) and were virtually handed control of the game with no less than four back-to-back power play

opportunities in the following ten-minutes.

The Chiefs capitalized on one of them and snatched a short-handed goal with 1:08 left in the period (Kyle Clerke from Braeden Hikichi) to finish the frame leading 2-0.

The second period saw a shift in power with Princeton scoring their first goal on the power play at 19:21 (Mitchell Hewson from Cody Williams and Keenan Fordy) and barely two-minutes later Princeton tied the game with a short-handed goal at 17:03 (Kevin Raimundo from Curtis Bellamy).

Kelowna responded with another power play goal at 16:37 (Phil Bamber from Mark McDougall and Scott Renner) to take back the lead.

Princeton tied the game again on the power play at 4:06 (Eric Kubis from Devon Grossler and Kurtis Bond).

Then Princeton took the lead for the first time in the game with 1:28 left in the period with a goal scored by Eric Schmidt with assistance from Adrian Coulter and Cole Weber.

The third period saw the ice tilted in favour of Princeton as the Posse widened their lead at 6:28 (Keenan Fordy from Kurtis Bond) and added to that lead at 5:16 with another short-handed goal (Devon Grossler from Adrian Coulter).

Final score: Princeton 6, Kelowna 3. Shots on goal: Kelowna 39, Princeton 32. Penalties in minutes: Both teams had 11 for 22-minutes.

This is the last stop on her Kettle Valley Tour, which began in Cranbrook. McNeney has been stopping in communities on and off the Kettle Valley route, talking about

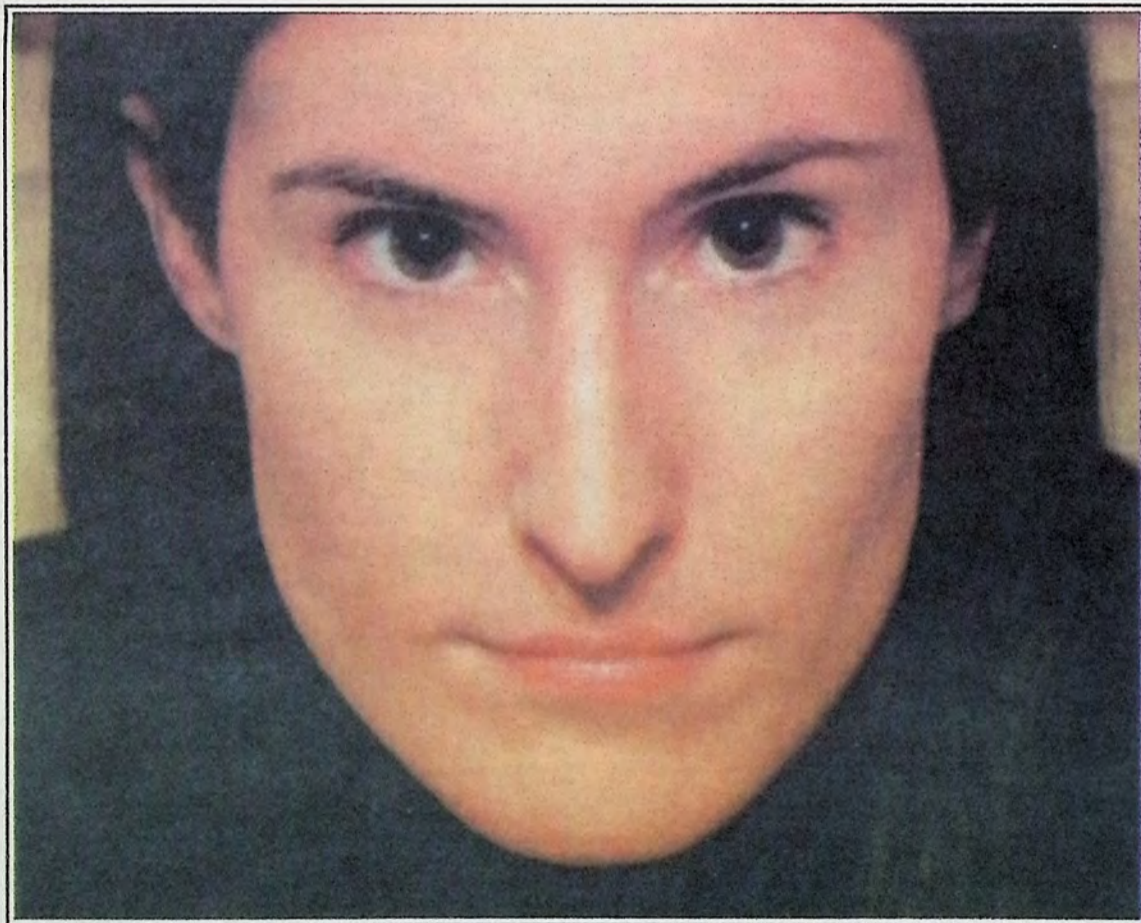
historical fiction and some of the real BC places and events which shaped her novel *The Time We All Went Marching*. About the book...

Storm-stayed on a Kettle Valley Railway train, bound less for glory than for an uncertain welcome, Edie attempts to wrestle down her demons. Suffocating in a bad marriage in 1940s British Columbia, Edie's running back to the one place she couldn't wait to leave behind. Seduced by her husband's stories of Depression-era work camps and the doomed On To Ottawa Trek of '35, Edie followed Slim from mine to mine for a decade, caring for their son, Belly, beneath the flimsy shelter of canvas tents.

Vivid and evocative, with rich, convincing characters, *The Time We All Went Marching* is an episodic novel of storytelling, memory, and imagination — set in a period in history rarely explored in fiction. Skillfully deploying the history of the On To Ottawa movement, when over a thousand men from relief camps attempted to protest their brutal conditions, Arley McNeney illuminates the human struggle to fight for survival — no matter what the cost.

Arley McNeney's first novel, *Post*, was a finalist for the Commonwealth Writer's Prize, Best First Novel, Canadian and the Caribbean, and was long listed for both the Saskatchewan Best First Novel and for the ReLit awards. An elite athlete, McNeney played on Canada's national wheelchair basketball team from 2001 to 2007, winning two World Championships and a bronze medal at the 2004 Paralympics.

Sweet and Spicy Cajun Roasted Peanuts

(NC)—Drop-in guests are the best, but it's nice to have something on hand to serve with a drink. These dressed up peanuts go perfectly with beer or cocktails. More great recipes can be found online at www.peanutbureau.ca.

Prep time: 5 minutes / Roasting time: 20 minutes / Makes 2 cups (500 mL)

Ingredients:

- 1 egg white
- 1/4 cup (60 mL) granulated sugar
- 1 tsp (5 mL) Kosher salt
- 1 tsp (5 mL) dried thyme leaves
- 3/4 tsp (4 mL) each cayenne and garlic powder
- 2 cups (500 mL) unsalted peanuts

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 300°F (150°C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a medium bowl, whisk egg white until frothy. Then whisk in sugar and seasonings (if you only have garlic salt, add only 1/4 tsp (1 mL) salt) until blended. Add peanuts and stir to coat.
2. Spread peanuts out on prepared baking sheet. Roast in preheated oven, stirring a couple of times until nuts are golden brown and mixture is barely sticky, 20 to 25 minutes. Taste, adding a little more salt if needed. Cool completely, breaking up nuts as they cool. Store in an airtight container for a couple of weeks.

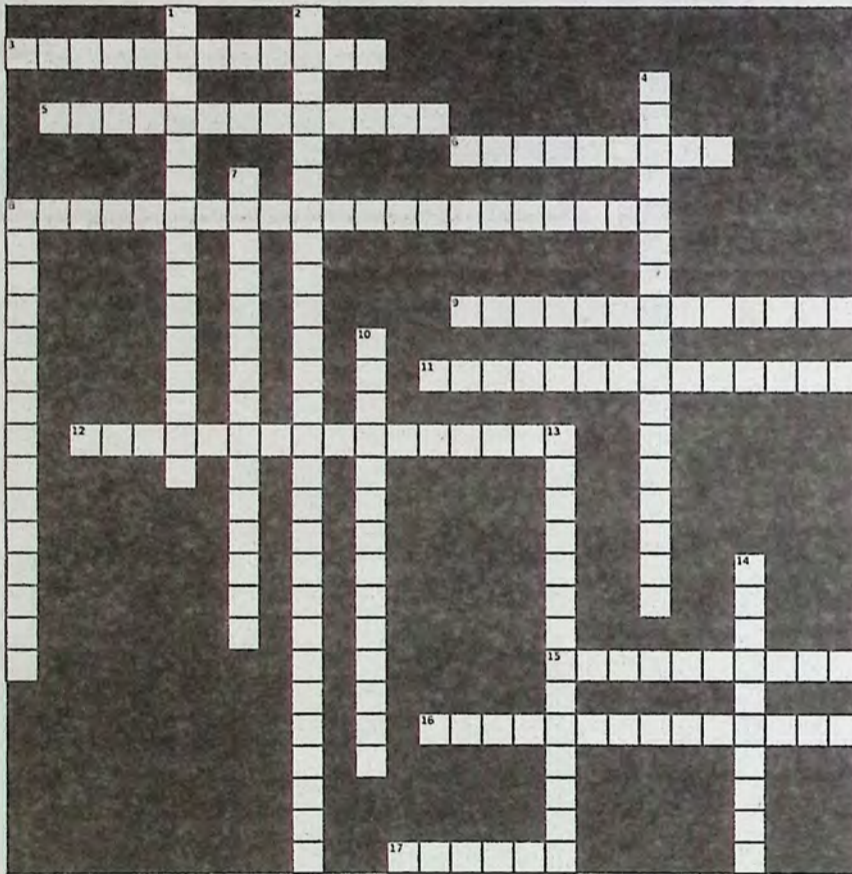

Election By The Numbers

The ballots have been counted and the unofficial results released.

In the Similkameen Valley there has been a mini wave of change with two new Mayors, three new faces (including one former Councilor) on Councils and two new Regional District Directors.

Looking closer, of the 13 local government seats in the Similkameen Valley (five each on Princeton and Keremeos Councils plus three Regional District seats) a total of 7 of them are newly elected to their positions. That's a change of 53.8%.

Breaking it down further, Princeton elected a new Mayor and one new Councilor for a change of 40%. Keremeos elected a new Mayor (the incumbent retired) and added two new Councilors (one incumbent retired, one former Councilor returned to office) for a change of 60%.

In the Regional District, Princeton returned the incumbent with two new Directors elected in Hedley/Keremeos and Cawston (the incumbent retired) for a change of 66.6%.

What's this mean?

It's obvious to me that if there had been more choices, there could have easily have been a greater number of new faces elected to local government seats.

Taking a look at voter turn out, there was slightly more interest in elections in the Similkameen Valley than other places in B. C. For example, Richmond recorded about 23.9% voter turn out. In Princeton a total of 964 votes were cast from a pool of 2,134 eligible voters. That a voter response of 45.2%. Not record setting, but far better than Richmond.

In Keremeos there was slightly more interest shown with 537 of 1,065 eligible voters marking ballots – or 50.4%.

For comparison to other communities in the region, Merritt had a voter turn out of 33.6%. Penticton was 33.5% and Kelowna had 33.1%.

So I don't buy the argument that nobody cares about what happens in the Similkameen as the numbers are there and they don't lie. There's a lot more interest in a small town election in Keremeos than in the big city election in Penticton, just a 20-minute drive down the road.

I'm not sure what that tells you, but from where I'm sitting it says a lot.

The Impact of OWS

A lot of editorialists and economists have made fun of Occupy Wall Street (OWS), but the "Occupy" movement has had an impact. Such protests always have an impact and in my opinion, those who dismiss OWS as a passing phase should reconsider and start taking it seriously.

I say this as a person who was an adult during the 1960's and 1970's. I watched the civil rights movement in the United States grow from a few minor protests to a nationwide movement that overcame huge odds and succeeded. It is a case of "when you're right, you're right". Efforts to stop the

movement just made it stronger. Even murder of the leaders strengthened the cause.

During the 1970's, the women's equality movement was the big social change, and although it was not as successful as the civil rights movement, it did result in some positive change.

The key to understanding why OWS needs everyone's attention is that it will not go away. Right now, winter is against the protesters, along with the fact that they are not well organized. Give them a few more months, and they will be able to clearly define their objectives, and they will receive much more support. The United States faces a presidential election next year. Those seeking office should pay attention to OWS and what the protesters are saying, because the person who wins is going to be somebody who understands the issues that brought the protesters to the streets and who offers some solutions to the problems protesters have identified.

With any movement of protest, the strength of the protest comes from the sympathy of the majority. For every protester who took to the streets, there are probably a hundred sympathizers. Sympathy may

not mean much until the sympathizer casts a vote. The ballot box may be the place where the "fat cats" are defeated.

OWS is about economic injustice, and Canada is just as vulnerable as the United States. We have people living in poverty. We have homelessness, soup kitchens, food banks. We have some very rich people whose income as CEOs or corporate directors stem from the greed of corporations. We taxpayers have bailed out the Canadian automobile industry more than once, yet we see the profits and bonuses given to the same corporations still alive due to our tax dollars.

My final word on the power of protest movements involves the protest against big banks in the United States. The protest began when the Bank of America advised its depositors they would pay a monthly fee of five dollars to possess a bank card. For one woman, it was the last straw. She went onto Facebook and expressed her feelings and urged everyone to take their money out of the big national banks and put it in small local banks and credit unions. Nobody realized what an impact this would have. As of November 1, 2011, American depositors had withdrawn \$4.5 billion from big banks and put their money into small banks and credit unions. The biggest credit union in the United States, the Navy credit union in San Diego, saw a 38 percent increase in the number of new accounts opened.

If you think that bank protest had no effect, then consider this: last month the Bank of America told its depositors the five dollar card levy will not be imposed.

The annual Christmas hamper campaign is beginning. Remember we have poor people right here in our community. We have people on disability pensions who cannot make ends meet and need to visit Crisis Assistance for a little extra food monthly. We have single parents who can barely make ends meet. Canada has a terrible record for children living in poverty. I ask you to remember charity begins at home, and do all you can to help provide Christmas hampers. At the same time, I want you to think about what you can do in January and the months that follow to bring greater economic justice to Canada, and to our world.

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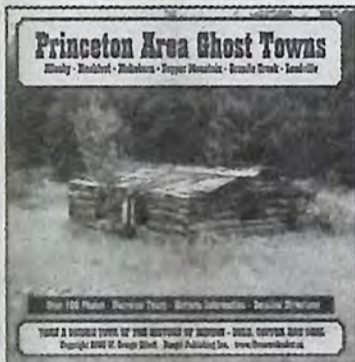

Biologist offers deer solutions

..... continued from Page 2 without high risks to public safety - especially when light is low.

Similarly, darting deer with immobilizing drugs is not likely to be effective. Darts can cause significant injury to the deer, as well as making the meat unsuitable for human consumption.

Worst of all is the prospect of the shooter missing a shot and loosing a drug-loaded dart subsequently picked up by a child and accidentally self-injected. Darting could not access the problem deer within neighborhoods of dense housing without substantive risks to public safety.

Individual deer traps could safely capture a few deer but are unlikely to be adequately effective over time as deer become ever-more 'trap-wary'.

Drop-net traps have been used relatively safely to capture many bighorn sheep at one time. However, food would have to be used to bait urban deer under a net, increasing rather than decreasing the population's food supply, thus increasing the birth rate of 'escapees'. Further, baiting to concentrate deer under a net would increase damage to adjacent neighbors.
