Jarvis plans snow committee

At the November 21 Town Council meeting, he talked about the problems of disabled people, like himself, and senior citizens who cannot shovel snow and are housebound as a result. He described it as an accessibility issue, and plans for form a committee to try to find a solution to

the problems of seniors trapped by snow.

Councillor Frank Armitage agreed there is an issue of concern when there is a heavy snowfall. Speaking from a personal perspective, he said neither he nor his wife are capable of digging their way out of a big snowfall, and there are many older people facing the same problem. He plans to pursue the matter with Ray Jarvis.

Committee tackles local air quality

In response to concerns regarding air quality in Princeton and Area, a group of concerned citizens have formed the Princeton and District Air Quality Coalition.

The goal of the group is to form a partnership between concerned citizens, industry, business and local government officials from the Town of Princeton and Area H to address air pollution in our valley.

The group held its first meeting on Tuesday, November 22nd attended by Brenda Engel, Nienke Klaver, Brad Hope (Area H), Ed Staples, and Ralph Adams (air quality meteorologist, BC Ministry of the Environment). Adams was invited to the meeting to provide information on the preliminary findings of

an air quality monitor that has been taking ambient air measurements in Princeton since January 3rd of this year.

He reported that during winter months, levels of harmful particulate matter exceed provincial safe air standards. In Princeton the average over the first half of the year was an air quality index of 10. The current provincial objective for the annual average is an air quality index of 8.

Adams indicated that the two sources of the particulate matter are woodsmoke from wood stoves and woodsmoke from local industry. Adams emphasized that these results are inconclusive and a full report would not be available until

the end of the year, when the monitoring and analysis of data would be complete.

The Air Quality Coalition believes that clean air is the right of all Princeton and Area citizens. It is their intent to work with local industry, business and government

to address the concerns revealed by the preliminary report. The committee has made contact with representatives of local industry and initial conversations indicate a willingness to open a meaningful dialogue.

Wayne Terepocki is President of George Pearkes Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion (Princeton) for 2012.

Jim Turner is First Vice-President, with Wayne Cummings as Second Vice-President. The Executive Committee officers are Jean Bowles, Janet Neil, Jim Martindale, Bernadette Kelleher and Bob Paterson. They will be installed into office at a potluck

supper to be held December 16. At the November 20 meeting, Legion members presented a \$25 prize to Trisha Draeger for her poem of remembrance. The poem now goes to the next level for further judging.

Members voted to donate to the Chamber of Commerce light-up on November 25 (\$200), to the

Crisis Assistance Christmas hamper drive (\$1,000) and to provide Christmas and other comforts for the veterans' centre in Vancouver (\$1,000). Huldra Silver - Se-go Resources

Huldra Silver Inc. (TSX-V:HDA) (the "Company" or "Huldra") released the initial results from the 2011 exploration program at Treasure Mountain on November 18th. The results of assays from the first four holes received included 592.92 grams per tonne Ag, 4.28% Pb, 2.47% Zn and 5.80% Mn in hole TM11-9 that intersected the vein structure below the Level 1 drift, approximately 80 metres east of the Level 2 drift.

A total of 51 diamond drill holes were drilled over a total length of 5,073 metres on the main mine development, with the objective of further defining resources on the upper 150 metres of the mine.

Jensen Portal

The Jensen Portal is 400 metres west of the current underground workings. Surface sampling was conducted on vein exposures uncovered during the road rehabilitation program. 10 NQ sized diamond drill holes were completed to test for strike on the structures. The area has had limited modern exploration conducted on it and any information is prior to the implementation of National Instrument 43-101 ("NI 43-101").

The veins were historically reported being brecciated with Ag, Pb, and Zn and covered by a diorite cap. The location of the small underground workings is coincident with two intersecting faults. A drill program is being designed to follow up on historical results.

JK Vein

The JK vein was discovered during a trenching program late in the 2010 exploration program. Two shallow

holes were drilled on the western end of the structure. However, the material was partially oxidized close to surface. 8 NQ sized holes over a total length of approx 890 metres were drilled in 2011 with results still pending.

D-Vein

The D-vein was previously uncovered 20 metres into the hanging wall of the open cut at the top of Treasure Mountain. However, the surface expression was re-exposed during mechanical scaling. 8 samples were taken across the structure over a total length of 107 metres. The D-vein is not included in the current NI 43-101 resource estimate.

Underground Exploration

Underground sampling is progressing with new samplings from the existing drifts on Level 1 and Level 2 as well as the underground raises. There are 3 complete raises being sampled from Level 1 of the mine to the surface as well as 3 partial raises from Level 1. There are 3 additional raises from Level 2 that are also being sampled. Only samples from one raise between Level 1 and the surface were included in the current NI 43-101 resource estimate.

The current underground development consists of 2,750 metres of drifts and raises on 4 levels. The total vein indicated resource, estimated at 11.02 ounces silver per tonne (10.0 oz silver per ton) cut-off grade, is reported as 33,000 tonnes with 26.68 ounces silver per tonne, 4.16% lead and 3.80% zinc, containing 880,000 ounces silver, 3,030,000 lbs. lead and 2,760,000 lbs. zinc. Total vein inferred resource, estimated at the same cut-

off grade (11.02 ounces silver per tonne) is reported as 120,000 tonnes with 29.76 ounces silver per tonne, 2.79% lead and 4.36% zinc, containing 3,580,000 ounces silver, 7,370,000 lbs. lead and 11,540,000 lbs. zinc.

Geochemical Testing

The Company conducted a geochemical sampling program consisting of 671 samples focusing on two primary targets the MB Zone and the Camp Zone. The MB Zone is approximately 800 metres north-west of the current mine workings. Surface samples were taken from an exposed area of fractured argillite in 2010 and assays were reported as high as 9,221g/t Ag (August 25, 2010 press release).

The Camp Zone is in an area where a geochemical testing program conducted in 1996 identified a large soil anomaly below the Jensen Portal, near the base of the mountain that was followed up with one drill hole that did not penetrate the overburden and a second drill hole that may have missed the target. Results from the soil program will be compiled and released as soon as they are received from the laboratory.

Laboratory Procedures and Quality Assurance

Drill core is logged by a geologist and cut at predetermined intervals using a diamond saw. One half of the sample is archived on site and the other half is trucked to Acme Analytical Laboratories Ltd's facility in Vancouver, BC, where the sample is crushed, split and pulverized to -200 mesh. A 0.5 gram portion of the pulp is then digested in

Museum gives year end report

Museum Society President Robert Wicks and Manager Sharon Anderson presented Town Council with a year end report from the

Museum Society.

There was no doubt that 2011 was a benchmark year for the Museum Society. Anderson showed facts and

figures, along with photographs, of the tremendous undertaking of redecorating the museum building after renovations were completed.

The project took 1500 hours of volunteer time on top of the paid time of those hired to give the museum its new look. A lot of money was spent, but it was really a shoe-string budget considering what had to be done.

Without a grant from the Forest Corporation, and donations from the Stout family, Thompson Rivers University, Town of Princeton and Copper Mountain Mining Corporation, as well as "in kind" donations, the project could not have been done.

It is still not complete, and generous private donations have brought the fund to \$3,300 toward the next phase, which will require a total expenditure of \$60,000.

The new look at the museum was received enthusiastically from the public. Despite the delayed opening, 2,700 people visited the museum between July 1 and October 31 this year.

Museum members are currently working at unpacking and putting away the collection of artifacts that

have been in storage for a year. There is still a lot of work to be done, including organization and management of the archives. It is a huge job.

Town Council expressed their appreciation for the hard work and dedication of Sharon Anderson, who is leaving her position as museum manager.

Councillor Frank Armitage said the museum is "a lasting legacy to the community" and added his appreciation for the work of the museum executive and Lyle Thomas, renovations project manager.

Mayor Randy McLean remarked on the importance of the museum as a tourist attraction.

"We're known for our history," he said, describing how many times he has had people from out of town remark on the history of the Princeton area.

Mayor McLean praised everyone involved in the museum project, saying, "You pulled it off and you did a hell of a job."

The Town has a snow removal schedule that is based on a road priority system. Salting and plowing begins on the main arterial roads, followed by collector roads, and then moves onto residential streets and lanes as necessary. Please assist our crew when they are plowing by not parking on streets during snow removal.

During snow removal operations, plow operators cannot avoid leaving ridges of snow (called windrows) at the foot of driveways. Residents and business owners are responsible for clearing the windrow from their own driveways and entrances.

Residents and businesses are responsible for removing snow and ice from sidewalks in front of their homes and businesses. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to \$100.

Thank you for your cooperation in following these simple steps to ensure a safe winter season and remember, if you're out on the roads during a snowstorm, drive with caution and according to road conditions. Stay a safe distance from snow removal equipment. They need room to do the job safely!

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

District says report cards will look different

High school students attending classes at SESS (Similkameen Elementary Secondary School) in Keremeos received their first report cards of the 2011/12 school year last week.

Each student received the following letter from Bev Young, Superintendent of Schools for School District 53 (Okanagan Similkameen).

"Dear Parents/Guardians:
Re: First Report Card - Secondary
On September 6, 2011, the British

Columbia Teachers' Federation (BCTF) commenced Phase 1 strike action. In British Columbia, strikes in essential services industries are governed by the Labour Relations Code. Essential services are those services related to the health, safety or welfare of BC residents or to the provision of primary or secondary educational programs. The BCTF, in an essential services industry, is entitled to engage in strike activity; however, the union is required to maintain certain essential services

during that time.

"As outlined by the Labour Relations Board, during Phase 1 job action, BCTF members need not perform certain duties including preparing or distributing report cards. However, administrators are obliged under the School Act to issue the reports with information available that may assist parents. For these reasons, your child's first report card will be different than those you have received in the past.

Top 10 Home Safety Tips for Snowbirds

(NC)—When Snowbirds finally make their way down south for their annual vacation away from our brutal Canadian winters the last thing they need to worry about is the safety of their home.

According to Patrice De Luca, vice president of marketing and business development for Reliance Protectron Security Services, there are several key steps Snowbirds should take to ensure peace of mind when away from home. The following Protectron home safety tips for snowbirds can help you plan important safety measures before your departure:

1. Suspend your newspaper and mail delivery; or have a neighbour collect them for you.
2. Make sure your home looks lived in. Try not to draw the window treatments in every window leave it looking somewhat natural.

Living Past 100

How To Be More Creative

This is the time of year when many people go to work on creative hobbies. These hobbies can be very therapeutic, helping to pass the dark days of winter. What happens if you cannot stir the creative juices you need?

hot aqua regia and analyzed for 31 elements by ICP MS method. Over limits for Ag is by fire assay with gravimetric finish, and for Pb, Zn and Mn by multi-acid digestion and ICP ES finish.

Jon & Rika perform in Kelowna

A drill makes the music that rings in his ears

But a candle's the charmer to drive away fears.

Down deep underground where grim shadows are thick -

Here's to you always, my old candlestick.

So said an underground miner in Princeton back in 1900. This and other voices of BC pioneers were unearthed by Jon Bartlett and Rika Ruebsaat and are included in their new book of songs and poems made up by Similkameen Valley pioneers.

The tradition of "home made" song formed part of the cultural capital brought to the new southern interior towns by workers in the early years of the twentieth century. The song tradition of the British Isles transformed to a degree by the popular commercial songs of the music halls, formed the musical vocabulary. There was, too, a widespread knowledge and appreciation of Robbie Burns, for example, and many a Burns supper was held with poems, recitations and songs contributed by the attendees.

These songs have been called "folk songs", but the term "folk" has been so completely annexed by the professional music industry that it now means almost anything. We could use the word "traditional", with its suggestion of how the song moves

through the community (most often orally), but the word "vernacular" is the best one to describe this type of song. It emphasizes that the speech used is ordinary everyday speech, and not the elevated language of "poetry" or the image-laden pop or folk song.

On Thursday, December 1 at 5:00 PM the ongoing Okanagan Institute Express series at the Bohemian Cafe, 524 Bernard Avenue, Kelowna presents Verse Vernacular: Songs from the Southern Interior. Jon Bartlett and Rika Ruebsaat will introduce their research work, and perform songs and poems made up by Similkameen Valley pioneers.

Their book Dead Horse on the Tulameen: Settler Verse from BC's Similkameen Valley brings the abandoned mines and ghost towns of the area back to life as voices from the grave tell their stories in verse.

These voices lay silent for decades until Jon and Rika discovered them in the Princeton archives. Like prospectors panning for gold, the authors sifted through the fragile pages of old newspapers going back to 1900 until they hit "paydirt" in the form of poems about daily life in the Similkameen valley - how did it feel to leave the fields and hedgerows of England and come to the BC interior wilderness? What tools did our

early miners use? Why did it take so long for the railway to come to the Similkameen?

At this presentation Jon and Rika will answer some of these questions by singing songs and reciting poetry made up by Similkameen valley pioneers. The songs and poems together with projected historical photographs as well as Jon and Rika's historical narrative will paint a vivid picture of pioneer life in the valley.

Jon Bartlett and Rika Ruebsaat from Princeton have been working together for over thirty-five years. The focus of their work is history through song, that is, how do the songs Canadians have made and sung reveal their lived history? They have presented on this topic at events and conferences across North America.

Their love of the songs has involved them in every aspect of folk music - singing, collecting, publishing, educating, producing radio programs, and organizing folk music societies and festivals. They have produced four CD's of Canadian songs, the most recent being Now It's Called Princeton: Songs and Poetry from the Upper Similkameen, a collection of mining, ranching, logging and settling songs.

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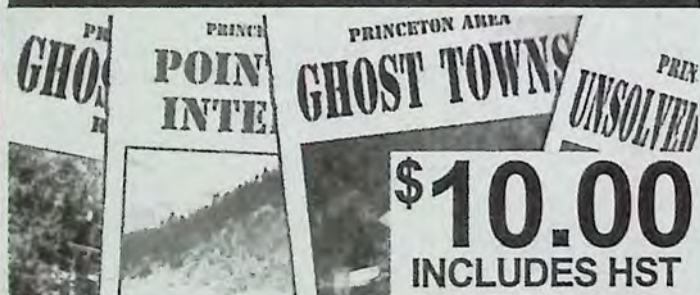

(NC)—The combination of goat cheese and sundried tomatoes creates a tasty cheese that could not be more ideal for entertaining. If you're having just a few guests, halve the recipe using a small log of goat cheese. More great recipes can be found online at www.peanutbureau.ca.

Prep time: 10 minutes / Refrigeration time: 1 hour / Makes 1 log

Ingredients:

- 1 300 g package goat cheese, at room temperature
- 1 lemon
- 1/4 cup (60 mL) sundried tomatoes, patted dry and finely chopped
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) black pepper
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) each finely chopped parsley and minced chives
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) finely chopped peanuts, preferably toasted

Directions:

1. In a medium bowl, mash goat cheese. Finely grate peel from lemon and add to goat cheese along with sundried tomatoes and pepper. Stir to combine. Form goat cheese into a log measuring about 9 inches (23 cm).
2. In a small bowl, stir herbs with peanuts. Place peanut mixture on a piece of plastic wrap large enough to roll up goat cheese. Roll and sprinkle goat cheese log with herb and peanut mixture to coat, then seal in the plastic wrap. Refrigerate about 1 hour. Serve with sliced baguette or crackers.

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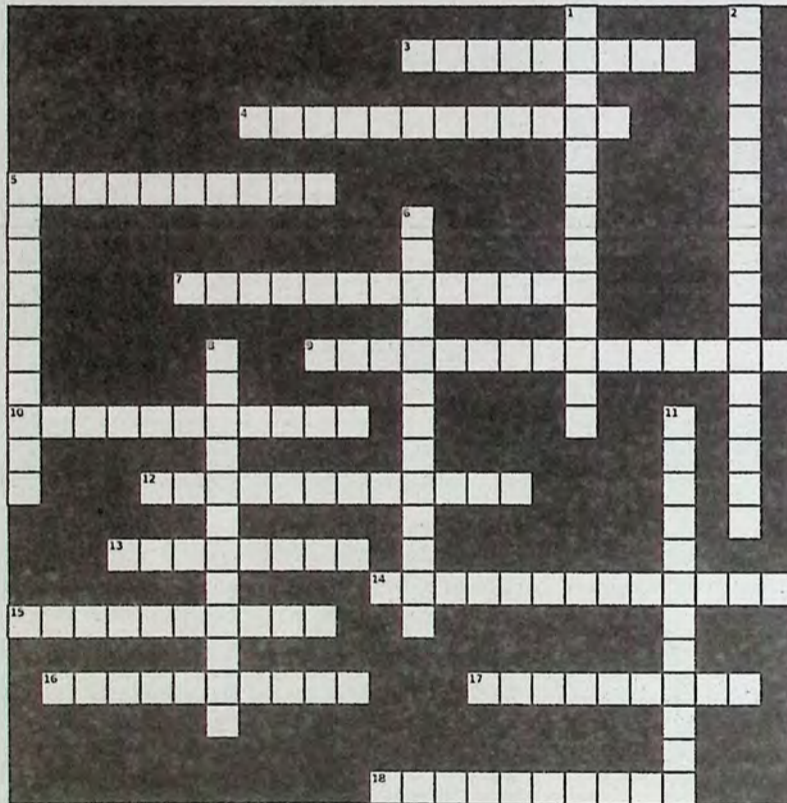

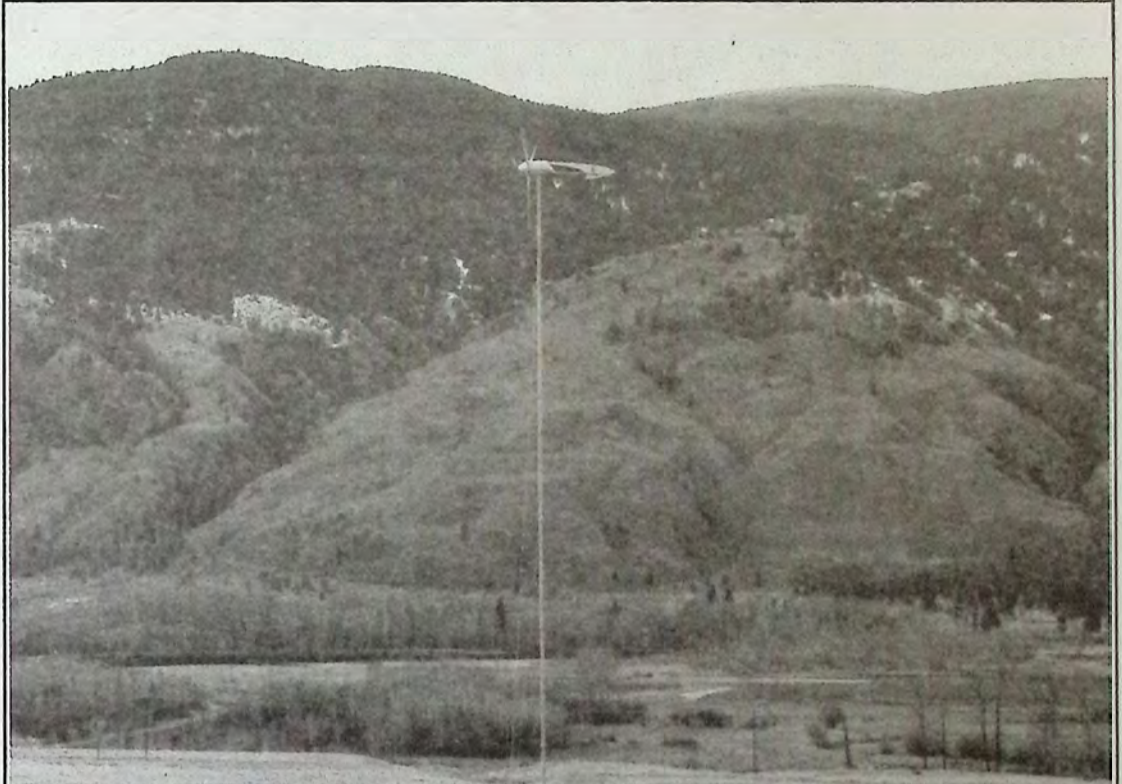
The point is, for many, they are feeling something.

Doomsayers Drive Me Nuts

There is a large body of people who seem to take great joy in predictions of doom. I have no patience with these people, especially when they start feeding us a lot of crap instead of facts.

Here is a wonderful example: the world's population hit the seven billion mark this month. The dire predictions coming from this fact would send a worrier into deep depression. Apparently there is not enough land to support us, and not enough water to slake our thirst. We are going to run out of resources.

I heard all of this when I was in high school more than 50 years ago. We were told that when the population of earth reached five billion it would be the end of the world. Well, here we are, and we passed five billion a long time ago.

Here's a fact my grandson came up with: if every person on earth was given an acre of land to live

on, the total would not quite cover the land mass of Australia, leaving the rest of the world vacant!

Of course, we know that not every acre of land is productive, but defining population versus land mass as my grandson did has put the whole 'not enough' argument into better perspective. The reasons behind starving people have little to do with land mass and a lot to do with distribution of food. For example, there are farmers in Iowa who are being paid a subsidy to let their fields stand idle. They could be growing more wheat or barley or something, but more food production would bring down the prices. Lower prices would mean less profit for the big agribusinesses.

Right here in BC we could see increased production if it were not for marketing boards. Marketing boards set prices and limit production. This keeps prices high enough to guarantee profits. This activity gives the false impression that we could not produce more. In fact, we have a shortfall in productivity.

As for the shortage of fresh water, there are ways to solve that problem. In sub-Saharan Africa, a young man found a simple solution to water shortage. He stretched a sheet of aluminum at a slant with a small V-shaped trough at the base. Every morning, dew ran down the sheet of aluminum into the trough which fed water into a bucket. Enough of those in a village, and there is enough water.

Desert people in Israel and Jordan collected water in natural basins or reservoirs inside cliffs, providing themselves with drinking water year round.

The greatest threat to our water supply is not so much a shortage as the fact that we persist in contaminating the water we have!

For every problem we humans encounter, we can find a solution if we put our minds to it. Believing in the doomsayers just gives a feeling of hopelessness that prevents us from looking for ways of solving problems and improving our lives.

There are some problems, like storms, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions, that cannot be solved, but we learn to adapt through cooperative behaviour, or by planning ahead. For example, we know our river is going to flood in some years, so we build dikes. We know winter is going to be bitterly cold in Canada, so we build houses and cars that can withstand the cold. It is the human ability to solve problems and adapt that has helped us survive despite the fact that we are small and weak. Most extinct species are extinct because they could not adapt.

Although we humans have superior brains and are able to adapt well, we have immense powers of imagination, and it seems to me we devote a lot of that imagination to fantasize doomsday scenarios instead of imagining how we could make the world a happier, healthier place to live with abundance for everyone.

Biologist suggests deer solutions

In the wild, predators remove deer. A principal predator of deer is cougars. A few cougars in urban neighborhoods would likely reduce deer numbers. With inherent risks to public safety would people tolerate cougars in urban areas, or perhaps even less-effective deer predators such as bears and coyotes? Probably not.

Epizootic diseases are wildlife's equivalent to epidemic diseases in people. There are a few wildlife diseases that might remove large numbers in the urban deer population, leaving carcasses scattered throughout neighborhoods. Some years ago the white-tailed deer population of south-central BC suffered an outbreak of EHD, a hemorrhagic virus that kills dramatically and very quickly indeed.

Many deer carcasses littered the landscape. Other species of wildlife were largely unaffected by the virus but the deer population

was decimated. However, for management of urban deer intentional infection with disease agents is not ethical.

Some would say the best long-term resolution of urban deer conflicts is to enhance backcountry habitats to provide a better place for deer to live, perhaps imagining if those habitats were improved deer would move out of the city into the country.

While in principal enhancement of natural habitats is good for the environment, based on the attractions urban habitats, and, an apparently growing 'culture' of urban deer familiarity of with people, I am ever-more discouraged that enhancement of non-urban habitats can out-compete the attractions of our urban habitats. In the city, there are just too many good things for deer, even with people's best efforts to make it less so.

Options:
Based on this past wildlife management experience options for managing urban deer populations are very limited, both technically and

politically. It's difficult to foresee a long-term resolution of the conflict.

People want an urban deer population that is tolerable; - in balance with a public consensus to have some around, but not so many that conflict is intolerable. To meet that objective over the long-term a sustainable program will be required. How do we decrease the rate of new deer entering the urban deer population while increasing the rate of excess deer being removed from the population? Musing on the urban deer conflict, here are a couple options that occur to a wildlife biologist.

Deer are inherently fearful of dogs. A dog confined to a landowner's property, either by rigorous

 training or by an 'invisible fence' (An 'invisible fence' consists of a wire buried underground that activates an escalating shock collar as the dog approaches the wire), could stand guard to keep deer away from a specific property.

Trained sheep-herding dogs, such as border collies, under control of a professional dog handler, could restore aversion of specific urban neighborhoods. However, dogs could not be allowed to roam freely. Dogs chasing wildlife on Crown lands are in violation of law and can be destroyed.

In comparison to management methods dismissed above, it is possible that energy conducting dart guns - 'stun guns' - might be a safer alternative in urban areas. There is a diversity of stun gun brands. A Taser stun gun is purportedly safe for humans. Unlike drug filled darts, Taser darts can never be lost - they remain attached by a wire to the gun. There would be little risk to public safety from a lost Taser dart.

By vehicle, or on foot, after sunset deer can be approached very closely, perhaps as close as a couple meters or so, easily within range of a trained shooter using night-vision goggles and a Taser stun gun. It is likely a stun gun with the energy level used by police, would effectively stun a deer.

Options are several once a deer has been immobilized by Taser, hobbled

and blindfolded:

1. Safe and humane killing (perhaps a bolt gun); or,
2. Package for transport elsewhere (to an abattoir, vet clinic, or remote release site in the wild); or,
3. Made infertile by chemical or surgical sterilization; or,
4. Collared for future tracking then released

As others have suggested, deer transported to a certified abattoir for butchering could produce high quality venison as a commercial product that income thus defraying costs of the program (An example of a program commercially harvesting problem species is the mysid shrimp harvest on Okanagan Lake), or, gifted to food banks to feed needy people. In contrast to deer captured using drug-loaded darts, I believe venison following stun gun capture would be suitable for human consumption.

I have no knowledge of how cost-effective Taser capture of deer would be. On the web, the cost of a laser-sited Taser stun gun suitable for night-time use appears to be less than a thousand dollars.

Currently in Canada Tasers are a prohibited weapon. Each Taser sale is registered and tracked, much like a handgun. They can only be sold to law enforcement agencies. BC's Conservation Officer Service (AKA our 'Game Wardens') is a law enforcement agency.

A deer capture program using stun guns after nightfall could result in relatively low public profile for curious neighborhood residents. I suspect a team of a certified shooter with one or two ranch-hands experienced with cattle (Could also be status aboriginals with special rights and privileges regarding hunting), could blindfold, hobble and load into a pickup truck a mule deer in

about one minute.

I have no knowledge of chemical sterilization of deer, but anticipate research has been done.

Alternatively, surgical sterilization is straight forward.

Envisioning sterile deer allowed to live out their life-span released back into the urban environment might discourage newly arriving deer from filling that vacant habitat opportunity. Without them, new deer may more quickly fill that void.

Further, these released deer would be 'rehabilitated' by 'aversion training'. Tasered deer would be fully conscious and aware of being handled by people. The unpleasant experience of being captured and handled should reinstate their fear of people.

Collars with light-reflective numbers would be useful to identify sterile deer, and, for monitoring their subsequent movements around the community. By increasing night-time visibility profile, light-reflective numbers could also reduce collision accidents with cars. I favor attaching a small bell to the collar, as an audible alert when deer are in the proximity.

Such a hypothetical scenario of capture of urban deer by Taser might also be acceptable to people that enjoy seeing deer in urban areas, as well as people concerned about the well-being of deer individuals, not wanting them killed.

It is even possible tourist visitors would enjoy exploring a neighborhood populated by 'Santa's deer' - those sporting a Christmas bell?

Such a program could be sustainable over the long term. With the birth rate thus diminished, and excess deer being removed, urban deer may ultimately reach a population density managed to a level acceptable to people.

Town receives grant-in-lieu

On November 15th a total of 64 communities across British Columbia shared \$16.9 million in compensation for municipal property taxes. The Town of Princeton received a \$1,082.38 grant-in-lieu of property taxes.

Grants-in-lieu of property taxes are distributed as a way to reimburse municipalities for services that benefited government properties, such as sewers, roads and fire protection. The amounts paid are based on the assessed value of the properties and the municipality's tax rate.

In accordance with the Municipal Aid Act, a grant-in-lieu is payable on land owned by the provincial government, such as courthouses, provincial government office buildings, ambulance stations and warehouses.

It is not provided for highways, forests, parks or land under the control, management or administration of a Crown corporation. Schools and hospitals are also exempt from

paying municipal property taxes and will not receive a grant-in-lieu.

Since 2002, the Government of British Columbia has distributed more than \$173 million as grants-in-lieu to B.C. municipalities. Each municipality distributes a portion of

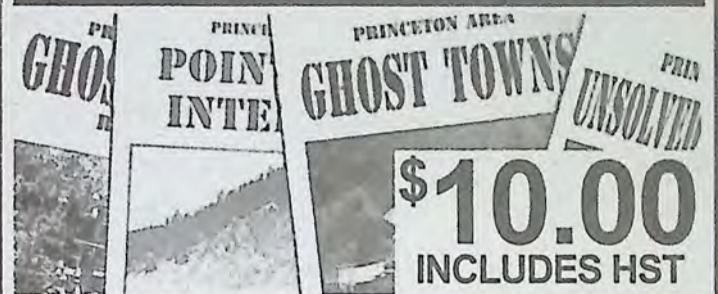

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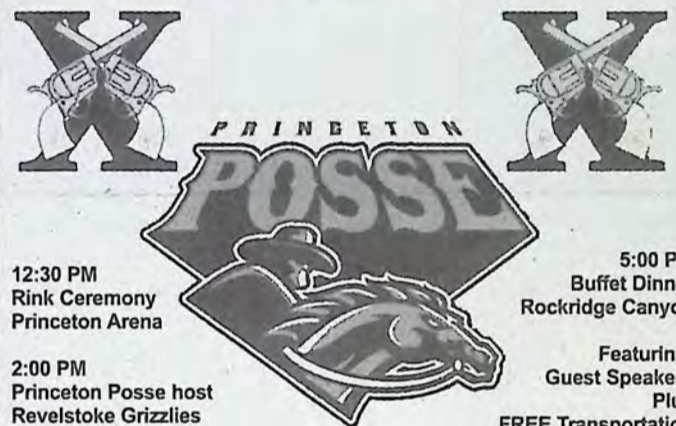
