There was a very poor turnout for this meeting, and it is clear the women are taking over, as only two men attended.

Ken Crompton noted the lack of members, saying how important it

is for more people to become involved in the Rodeo Club, not just on rodeo weekend, but in the planning stages. Lyn Melnechenko and her daughter, Dusti Henwood, are not going to be available to organize the Little Britches Rodeo next summer, and a Little Britches Committee is desperately needed if there is to be a Little Britches Rodeo.

# CYC hears youth point of view

Eight students from Princeton Secondary attended a forum hosted by CYC, a community group dedicated to providing services for children and youth in the community. The purpose of the forum was to listen to concerns of students regarding conditions affecting them in the community.

Local students appear to feel safe nearly everywhere in Princeton, but are more cautious after dark. One of their safety concerns is online bullying. They said most students see it on Facebook, and most know who is doing it. They did say the worst form was photos being circulated, but admitted that most of those who do the bullying are inclined to back down when confronted face to face.

The students said Princeton Secondary is a good school, with plenty of activities, although they would like to see more sports, including football and rugby. The school appears to be doing a good job.

They feel students are being adequately educated about drugs and alcohol, although they acknowledged that many students will do drugs or drink alcohol. They said they think those who do this may want to look 'cool' or have anger issues. They felt that the students doing drugs and alcohol may need somebody to talk to. They talked about bush parties, and how adults, many over 30, crash the parties and usually arrive drunk. The students

did not feel safe when that happened. They do try to ensure there are designated drivers to take them home from parties.

When it comes to sex education, most will turn to internet for answers, but the boys would really like to have a trusted male counselor to talk to about personal matters.

There was a great deal of discussion about recreational opportunities. Some admitted not knowing where to look for information about what is going on, such as date, time, place and cost. They say they do not read newspapers and rely on Facebook to provide information. Transportation is always an issue for students living out of town.

When it comes to seeing more of the world outside Princeton, most students are dependent on their parents taking them. Although there are

trips to Europe and bus trips to a variety of places, family finances are often too strained to allow every student to take advantage of the opportunity. They said they would appreciate some kind of subsidy for those students whose parents cannot

afford these trips.

One student expressed the concept that adults in the community do not listen to the ideas of young people. Two adults assured them that the community has a history of listening to the concerns of youth.

## "And The Wait Goes On" A Tribute to CIC

Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) is a large department that deals with a wide range of situations, in Canada and around the world. According to their website (www.cic.gc.ca), they are charged with:

- Developing and implementing policies, programs and services that:
- facilitate the arrival of people and their integration into Canada in a way that maximizes their contribution to the country while protecting the health, safety and security of Canadians;
- maintain Canada's humanitarian tradition by protecting refugees and people in need of protection;
- enhance the values and promote the rights and responsibilities of Canadian citizenship; and
- reach out to all Canadians and fos-

ter increased intercultural understanding and an integrated society with equal opportunity for all, regardless of race, ethnicity and religion.

Advancing global migration policies in a way that supports Canada's immigration and humanitarian objectives.

Unfortunately, since the Conservatives first became government, already lengthy application processing times have become even longer. Sponsoring parents and grandparents as permanent residents was taking five to seven years so this program has been suspended for the next two years in order to catch up on the backlog.

Although the new multiple-entry Super Visa has been created to allow visits to Canada of up to a total of

two years over a ten year period, I wonder how many will be actually issued.

Currently, many people already have great difficulty meeting the criteria to enter Canada for short visits at times of family crises or celebrations.

Many people also have first-hand experience of the long waiting times for bringing dependent children to Canada. These kinds of applications should be processed immediately, as lengthy separations from parents can have negative effects on children, including a profound effect on their ability to develop healthy attachments.

Surely the government can find a better solution for meeting public safety requirements while making family reunification a priority.

The Conservative government's business-friendly emphasis has created explosive growth in the numbers of temporary foreign workers

# Atamanenko leads non-partisan effort

Alex Atamanenko, MP (BC Southern Interior), was joined at a press conference November 30th by fellow peace advocates, along with Elizabeth May of the Green Party and Liberal Jim Karygiannis to herald the introduction later in the day of his Private Members Bill to create a federal Department of Peace. May and Karygiannis are co-seconding the Bill.

Atamanenko's bill is a slightly amended version of retired NDP MP, Bill Siksay's bill from the last parliament, notable for the non-partisan support it had gathered.

Karygiannis says this is one issue where party politics should not get in the way.

"It is time for Canada to serve the global constituency by committing to the creation of a Department of Peace."

Elizabeth May stressed her party's continued support of this initiative. "Peace is more than the absence of war. Non-violent solutions, 'waging peace,' requires a focused investment and shift in consciousness. Even talking about a Department of Peace helps in that shift," she said.

Representatives for Canadian Department of Peace Initiative (CDPI) at the press conference described the bill as exemplifying a

global movement in 30 countries promoting infrastructures of non-violent peace within governments, with Peace Ministries and Departments in three countries, most recently Costa Rica.

"The bill illustrates the need to prepare for peace in the same way as we prepare for war - with adequate resources and expertise," stated CDPI Co-Founder, Bill Bhaneja.

"This is an opportunity to unify the millions of voices expressing a will to follow a new path where our road markers are not fear, anger and vengeful killing but rather prevention, empathy and justice for all of humanity," declared Theresa Dunn, co-Chair for CDPI.

Doukhobor writer and historian Koozma J. Tarasoff said the need for the architecture for peace is urgent at a time when nuclear and robotic weapons are posing a threat to the world community.

"As Canadians, let's regain our status not only as a peacekeeping nation, but also as a non-killing one."

"The notion that there can be peace in the world may be a utopian ideal but each generation owes it to the next to make a dedicated attempt to get as close to it as humanly possible," concluded Atamanenko.

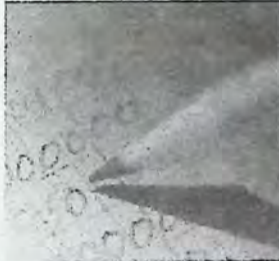

## Getting To The Bottom of Food Intolerance

(NC)—There's a reason food intolerance is known as the "hidden" condition: Triggers and symptoms can be difficult to identify and nearly impossible to solve without proper testing and guidance.

Lactose and gluten intolerance are well-known triggers, but there are over 100 more food triggers to consider. It's important to understand that the path to relief is a lifestyle change that can change your quality of life for the better.

"I recommend beginning a food intolerance program which tests the blood for problem foods and gives patients the tools to put those results into action," says Dr. Gordon Ko, director, fibromyalgia integrative treatment clinic at Sunnybrook Hospital.

*There is a difference between food allergy and food intolerance.*

Food intolerances are different from food allergies. Unlike food allergies, food intolerances are not life-threatening. However, they can be the cause of chronic pain and discomfort.

Food allergy symptoms have a short reaction time whereas food intolerance symptoms can take hours, or even days, to appear. This is where it gets tricky. When symptoms don't occur right after eating, patients may attribute pain to the wrong foods or not even realize they are related to food.

Common symptoms of food intolerance include bloating, headaches and migraines, eczema and fatigue, which can be attributed to any number of medical issues.

*Guessing your food intolerances can be nearly impossible.*

In order to identify food intolerances, patients must be committed to cutting problem foods out of their diet for at least three to four weeks. Problem foods can range from fruits and vegetables, to nuts, fish and meat.

"Food intolerance programs like the YorkTest FoodScan begin by testing patients for more than 100 different foods," says Dr. Ko. It only takes a few minutes to collect a simple finger-prick blood sample, and this test can be done by the patient from the comfort of their own home.

Imagine how long it would take you to cycle through all the foods in

your normal diet using a trial and error method.

*Identifying your intolerances is the first step on your road to recovery.*

"It's important to begin a food intolerance program that also includes counselling and nutrition sessions that teach patients how to put their test results into action," says Dr. Ko. A proper food intolerance program should guide patients as they implement their new diet plan and track progress over a four-to-six week period.

"I have seen success stories in my practice. One of my patients that suffered from chronic lower back pain found relief by simply identifying and cutting out problem foods from his diet," says Dr. Ko.

## Living Past 100

### Science And Healthy Living

There is so much research into what we eat and what it does for us that just trying to keep up with the latest news on health is a real chore. Often, the news about what we should eat and what we should take as supplements or medications seems too confusing. The one thing we do know is there are a few basics that seem to apply no matter where people live.

The people who live the longest, healthiest lives do not necessarily all eat the same foods, but they do have a few things in common. First, they do not eat a lot of sugar and salt. Some of the people who live the longest do not eat meat, but most of the long-lived people do eat meat. Those who live longest tend to eat what is grown in their own environment, and cannot afford to eat imported foods or exotic foods, although they may consume coffee and tea.

The longest lived people are physically active. They tend to walk more and continue to do physical work well into old age. Although the physical work is not at the same level as that of a young worker, these oldsters continue to do what work they are capable of doing.

Another thing the longest lived people have in common is their environment. They tend to live in small villages at higher elevations (500 - 900 meters above sea level) where the air is cleaner and the climate is less humid. They tend to enjoy a sunny environment due to elevation.

Another interesting thing about these pockets of long-lived people is that they do not have a lot of doctors and hospitals nearby. They are not constantly being tested for cholesterol levels, blood pressure, and other symptoms of aging, nor are they treated for these ailments. Perhaps they do not need it because they are so healthy.

The longest lived people do have another thing in common: they live simply. They have what they need, and they are not big consumers of material goods. Their primary concern is their social life, their connections to others. They do not consume drugs, and although they make alcoholic beverages, being drunk is frowned upon. This simple life may contribute to their well-being and their long lives.

Despite all of the advances in medical science, none of it seems to have affected the lives of those who live the longest.

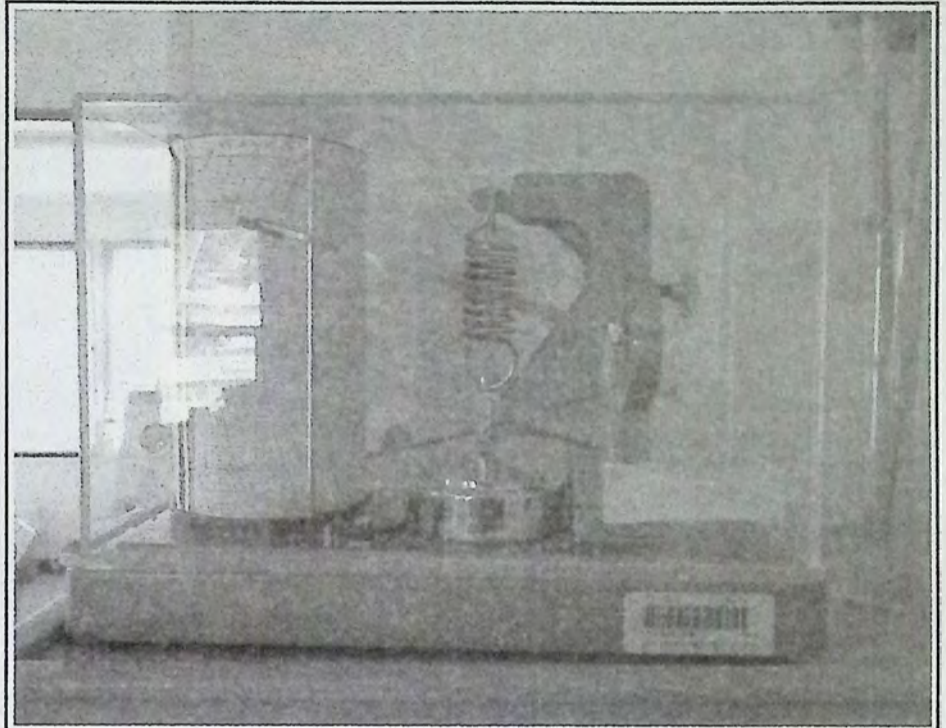


# Zoe's Turn - Princeton Weather Station

## Certified Weather Observers...

Rain or shine, storming or calm, one of the three Certified Weather Observers venture out at the Princeton Airport Weather Station to take an hourly reading of a combination of four different thermometers from the Stevenson Screens, that information along with all of the other numerous measuring devices is uploaded immediately to Environment Canada, which instantly uploads it for the Princeton, BC weather reference.

The hourly observations broadcast on the Weather Network on TV and online throughout the country come from weather observers from weather stations across Canada.

The trio of women gathering this data for

Princeton are Lois Funk Manager (13 years experience), Sue Delatour (9 years experience) and newcomer Vicky Jones.

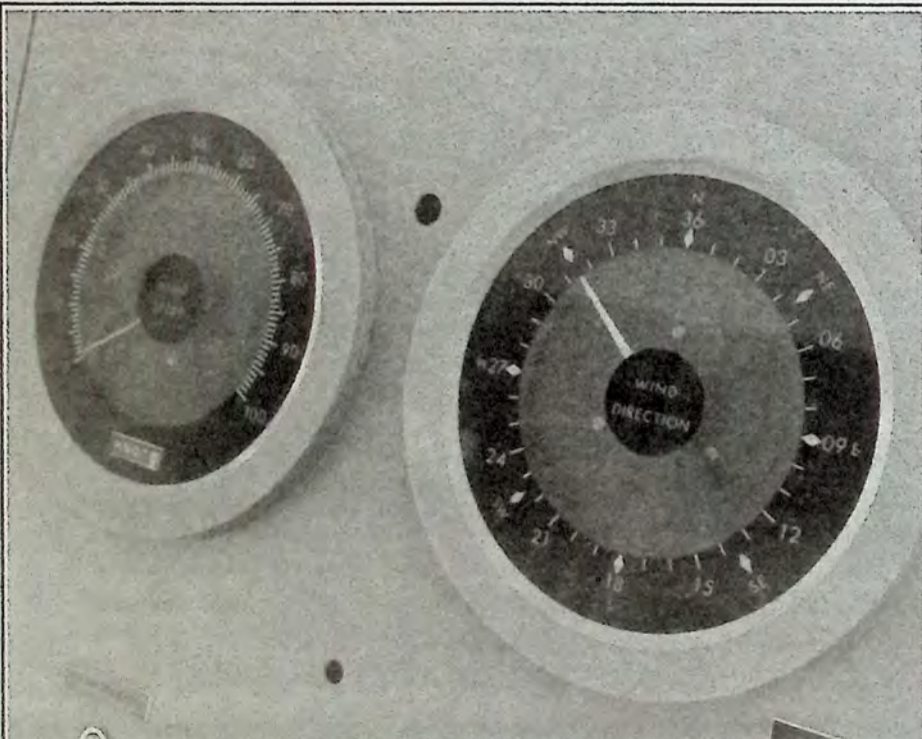
If anything unusual happens between the hourly readings it's noted for the incoming pilots. If this was a career choice that you would be interested in, consider that you would need to take a 5 week course in Cornwall, Ontario. But at the end of it you would be a Certified Weather Observer.

The Weather Station in Princeton operates every day of the year, although it does not provide 24 hour observations, the facility does operate from 6:00 AM to 6:00 PM daily in the summer and from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM in the winter.

..... continued from Page 3 coming to Canada. Their legitimate standing in our country is very limited and if they wish to stay, they must endure the stress and expense of regularly applying for work permit extensions.

Due to processing backlogs, many foreign workers only have "implied status," allowing them to continue working pending the decision on their extension application. In the process, some lose their legal status, forcing them to incur significant costs to restore it. In the interim, should they need to leave Canada for any reason, they risk not being granted re-entry.

In response to complaints about immigration fraud, it has been suggested by the government that, when a spouse is sponsored to

come to Canada, she or he would enter with a conditional visa that would be converted to Permanent Resident (PR) status after two years. I trust that any new requirements will include provisions which will be responsive to genuine cases of marital dysfunction or abuse.

Breaking news: effective November 8, 2011, CIC will no longer process incomplete applications for Canadian Citizenship, Proof of Citizenship (citizenship cards) and PR Cards - these will be returned to the applicant. Serious

complications could result, given the already long waiting times in the queue before these applications are opened.

It is my hope that all changes to immigration policy, now and in the future, will be consistent with Canadian laws and Canadian values.

In spite of the problems in the system, my staff has found that many workers at CIC, whether here or abroad, go out of their way to help people in difficult situations. I want to thank them for the work they do on our behalf.

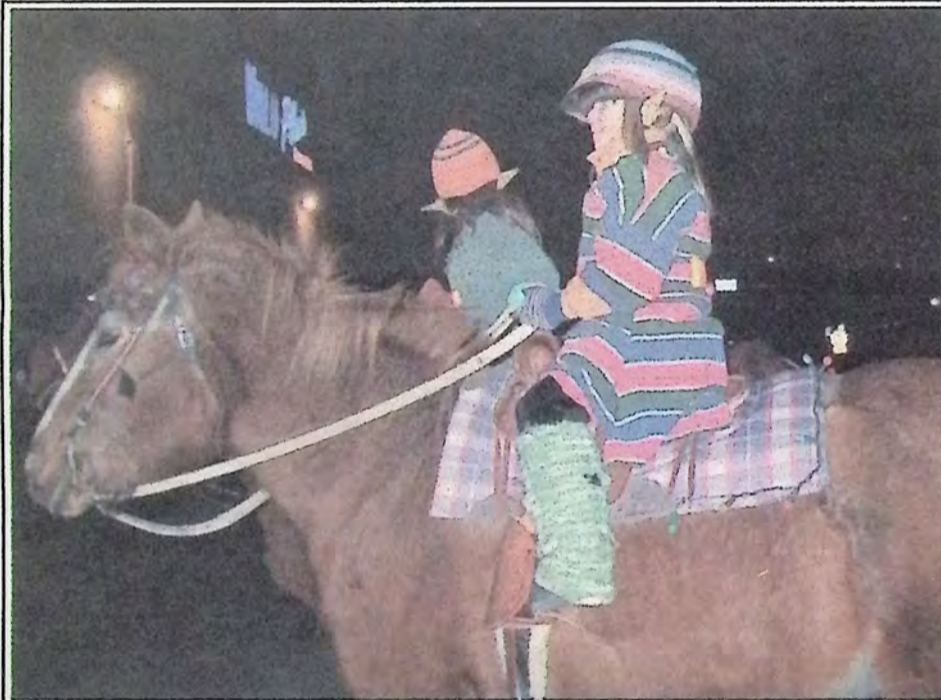

# Carols on a harp: Wonderful!

Harpist Ingrid Schellenberg brought the sounds of Christmas to Riverside Community Centre on November 27. Schellenberg is a member of the Okanagan Symphony Orchestra but she likes to come to Princeton and this concert was a prelude to the Christmas season.

The harp produces what are probably the purest musical notes of any

instrument. When Schellenberg played "Silver Bells", the distinct sound of the bells pealed. Christmas carols on a harp took Christmas music to a new level. Schellenberg played a wide selection of favourites, from the old English to the modern. It was easy to understand why heaven is imagined to have angels playing harps.

Schellenberg did not limit herself to Christmas carols. She played

"Girl in the Red Skirt", a piece bringing forth the image of a flamenco dancer.

She added the theme from the children's television program "The Friendly Giant" and another favourite theme, "It's a Wonderful World".

Other pieces reflected a broad range of musical sources, but the most remarkable was her rendition of Steel Guitar Rag, an unlikely candidate for a harp, but true to its country origins.

Ingrid Schellenberg's concert consisted of just her and her harp, but her sparkling wit and her harp keep the audience engaged in the performance.

She brought an interesting bit of local history to her show as she described a harpist who once lived in Coalmont and was written about in Diane Sterne's "White Gold, Black Diamonds", a book about the history of Coalmont. Apparently this oldtime Coalmont resident owned 13 harps. At the recent World Harp Congress, a photo was shown of him on the back of a camel with a harp slung on either side of the beast.

This was the second concert in Princeton for Schellenberg. There is no doubt she will be invited back in the future.

**Potato-Crusted Mushroom Pizza**

(NC)—This makes a terrific brunch or light supper dish and is great for those people that cannot eat a regular flour pizza crust.

Preparation Time: 20 Minutes / Cooking Time: 25 minutes

Crust:

- 4 cups (1 L) frozen shredded hash brown potatoes, loosely packed
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) sliced green onion or diced cooking onion
- 2 tbsp (25 ml) each grated Parmesan cheese and flour
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) black pepper
- 2 large eggs, beaten

Filling:

- 1 tbsp (15 mL) olive oil
- 1 1/2 pkgs (227g) pre-sliced crimini or white fresh Mushrooms
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) diced red pepper
- 2 large cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/4 tsp (5 mL) dried Italian seasoning
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) crumbled feta cheese
- 1 cup (250 mL) finely shredded mozzarella cheese

Preheat oven to 475°F (240°C). Coat a 12"(30 cm) pizza pan with non-stick cooking spray. If potatoes are clumped together break apart with a fork. In a large bowl mix potatoes, onion, Parmesan cheese, flour, pepper and eggs until well blended. Spread and press the mixture evenly in and up sides of pizza pan. Bake 15 minutes or until golden brown on the edges. Remove from oven and reduce temperature to 375°F (190°C).

Meanwhile in large non-stick skillet heat oil over medium—high heat; sauté mushrooms, and red pepper for 5-7 minutes or until mushrooms liquid is evaporated. Add garlic and seasoning, sauté 1 minute and remove from heat and stir in feta. Sprinkle one half of mozzarella cheese over crust and spoon mushroom mixture over potato crust; press into crust. Sprinkle with remaining mozzarella cheese. Bake 10 minutes.

Let stand 5-10 minutes before cutting. Makes 4 main course servings.

Tips:

- Substitute equal parts dried basil and oregano for Italian seasoning OR 1 1/2 tsp (7 mL) dried thyme.
- Fresh hash browns may replace frozen and are found in a refrigerated area of supermarkets.

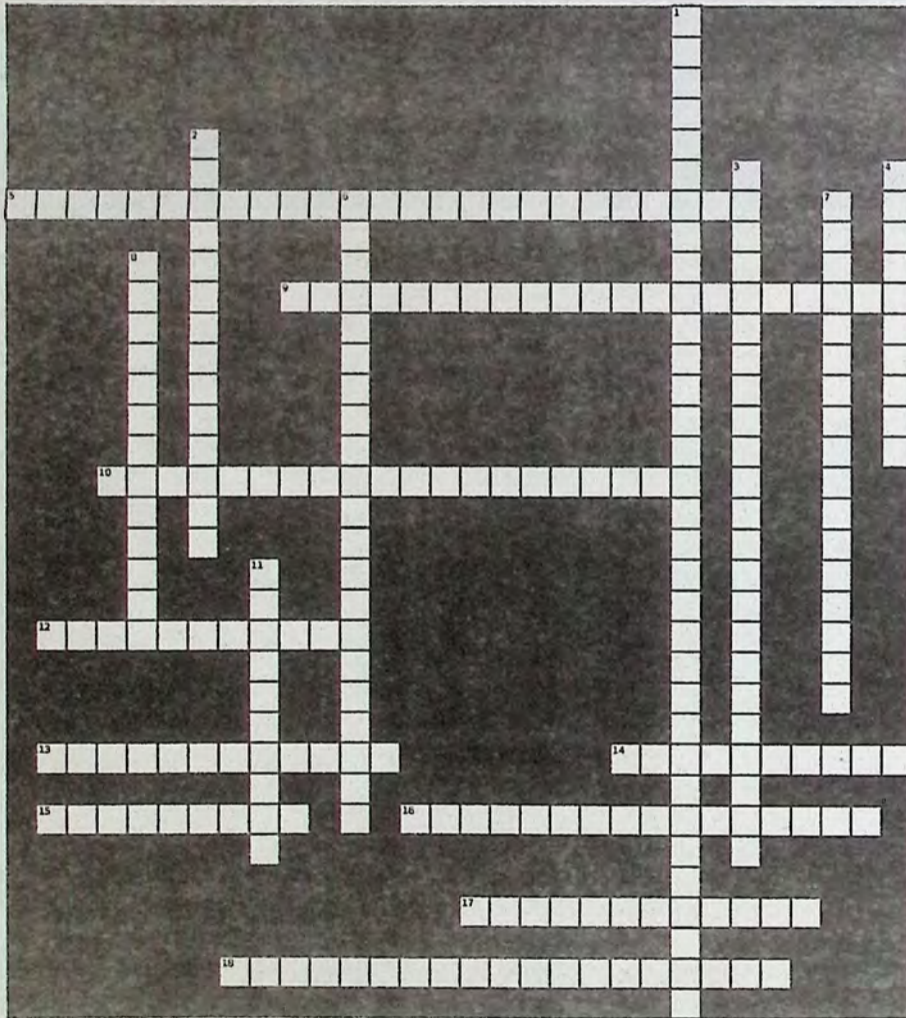

It was at about this time in the conversation I started to look around my office just in case there was a hidden camera recording this for some stupid reality program because I was really beginning to doubt this call was for real.

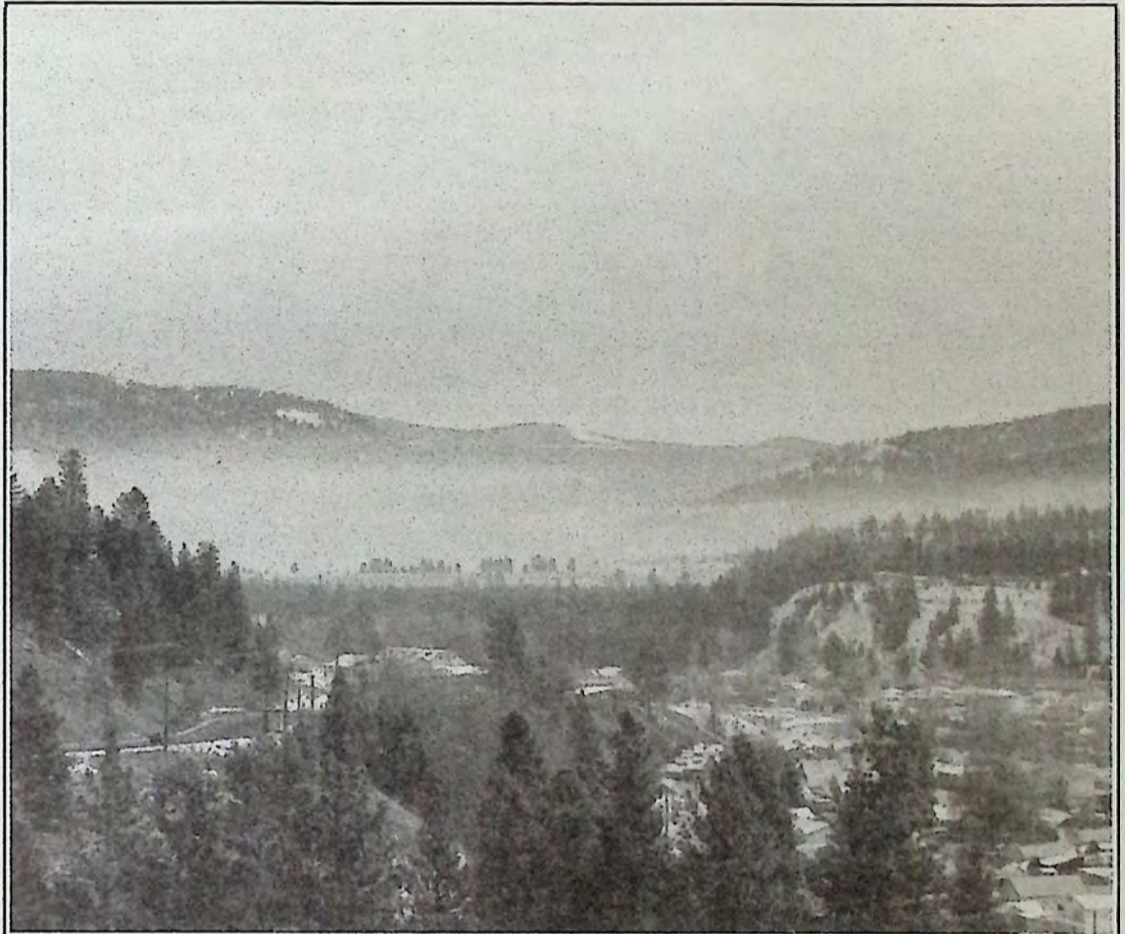
Then he told me what sort of business he was trying to put in Princeton.

## What Is The Money Doing?

I studied Economics in Grade 12. At that time, it was the equivalent of first year university Economics of that time. Our teacher was rather eccentric, but he did say one thing that stuck with me: if you want to know what is really going on, follow the money.

As a result, I have always kept an eye on stock markets, bank interest rates, real estate values, and politics. When I could not grasp what motivated certain political or economic trends, I looked at where the money was going and I could see the picture emerging. Right now, I cannot see any clear picture because money is not behaving the way Economics has dictated.

One of the truths of Economics is this: when something is scarce, you will pay more for it. This has proven true time and again. Right now there is a scarcity of grain, and grain prices are quite high. Those of you who like to bake or eat cereal know how much the price of a bag

of flour or a box of cereal has gone up in the past year.

Money is a commodity like any other. During the 1970's, obtaining a loan from a bank cost in the double-digit interest rate. People were borrowing a lot of money and paying high rates for it, and the reason for the high rates, so we were told, was that everybody wanted to borrow money and therefore the rate had to be higher. In short, money was scarcer and therefore the interest rate was higher. That fact conformed to what I had learned in Economics.

Something completely different is happening now. According to what we hear and read on the news, money is scarce again. There is a shortage of money that is causing a major problem in the European Union because some countries cannot pay their debts. At the same time, interest rates are low because we are in a world-wide recession. To me, this makes no sense. If there is a scarcity of money, then interest rates should be much higher.

If you have put some of your money in savings, then you know just how low the interest rates are. The rates are ridiculously low. This says to me there is a lot of money waiting to be invested and no demand for it, so there is no real scarcity of money. It would appear that there is a scarcity of borrowers who want to use the money.

At the same time, we are told there are too many people who owe too much money on their credit cards and they need to reduce the total credit card debt. We know what

credit card interest rates are: they are really high! This tells me there is still a shortage of money for consumer spending. Is this true? I doubt it, because automobile manufacturers are giving the best credit deals I have ever seen. If money for consumer spending is really scarce, then the interest rates should be higher on a new car credit line.

These contradictions in the money market lead to a lot of confusion in my mind. I suspect there is a lot of confusion in the minds of anyone who wants to invest these days.

One thing I do know is that there is a real slowdown in the amount of money being invested in real production. When I say real production, I mean production of real goods, things we really need, like food, minerals, housing, fuel.

I know there is still scarcity out there, because the number of really poor people is climbing steadily. The number of people unable to find a job is high, the number of homeless is high, and the number of people using food banks is high. This means money is scarce. There are cities and counties in the United States that cannot pay their debts and are declaring bankruptcy, yet the interest rates stay low.

What I suspect is going on is there is too much investment in things that are not real except on paper or in a computer, but I am not an expert in Economics, I am just an ordinary person with a little bit of education. It would be nice if somebody could explain to me just why the rules of Economics do not seem to work in today's economy.

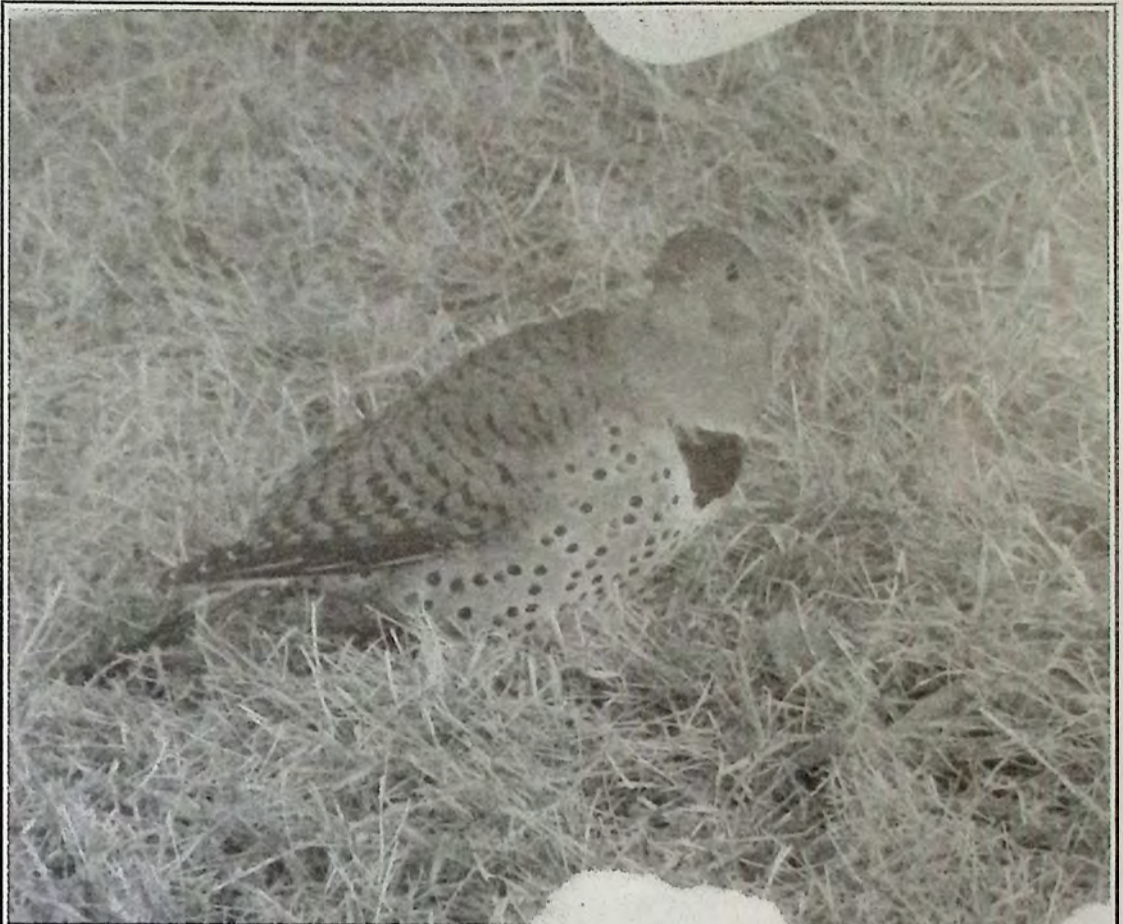

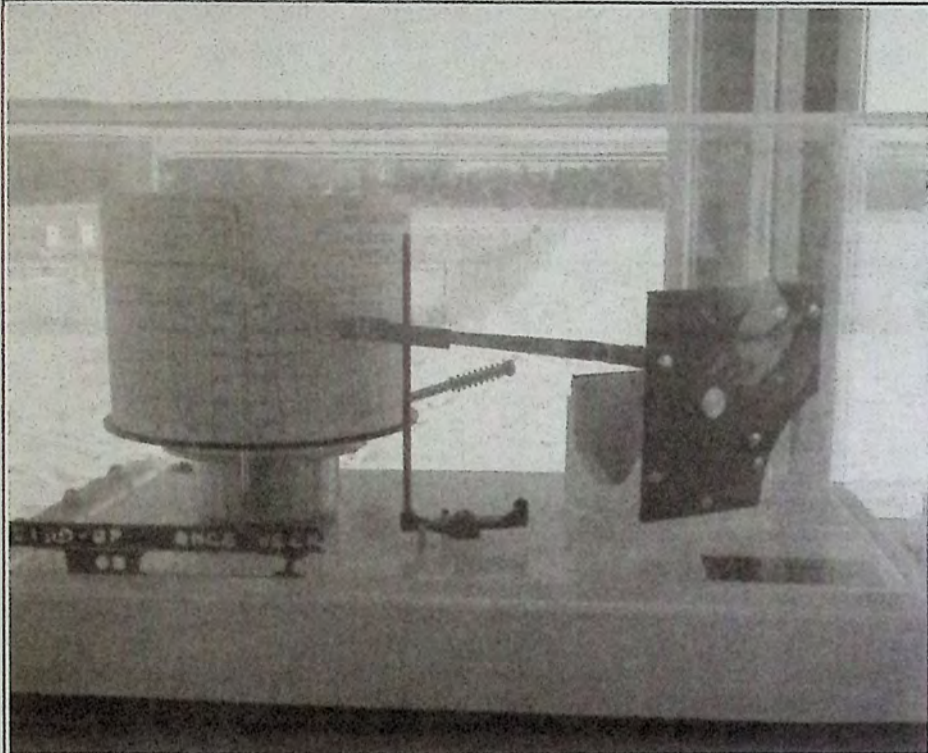

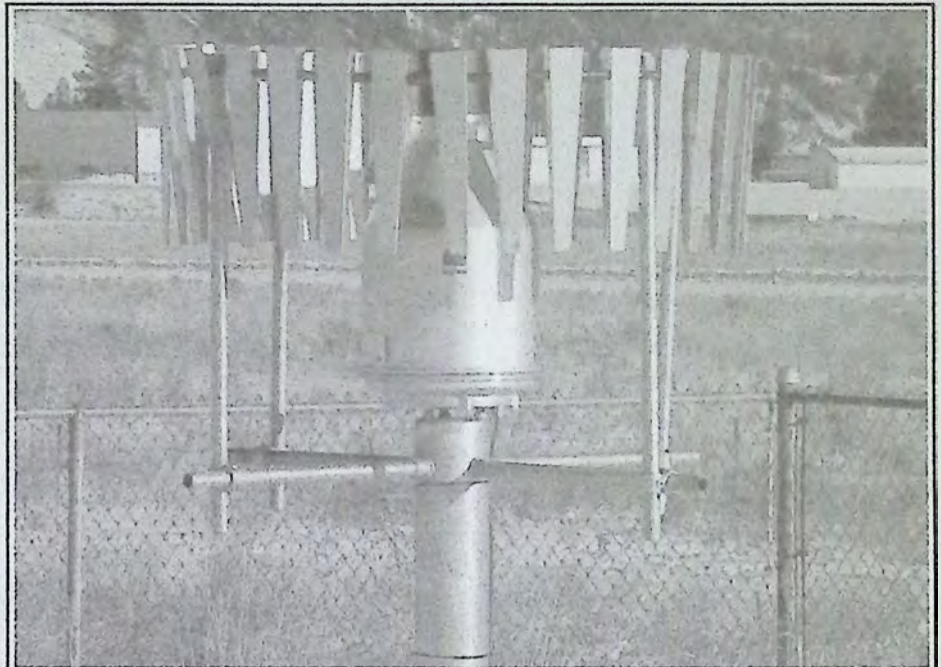

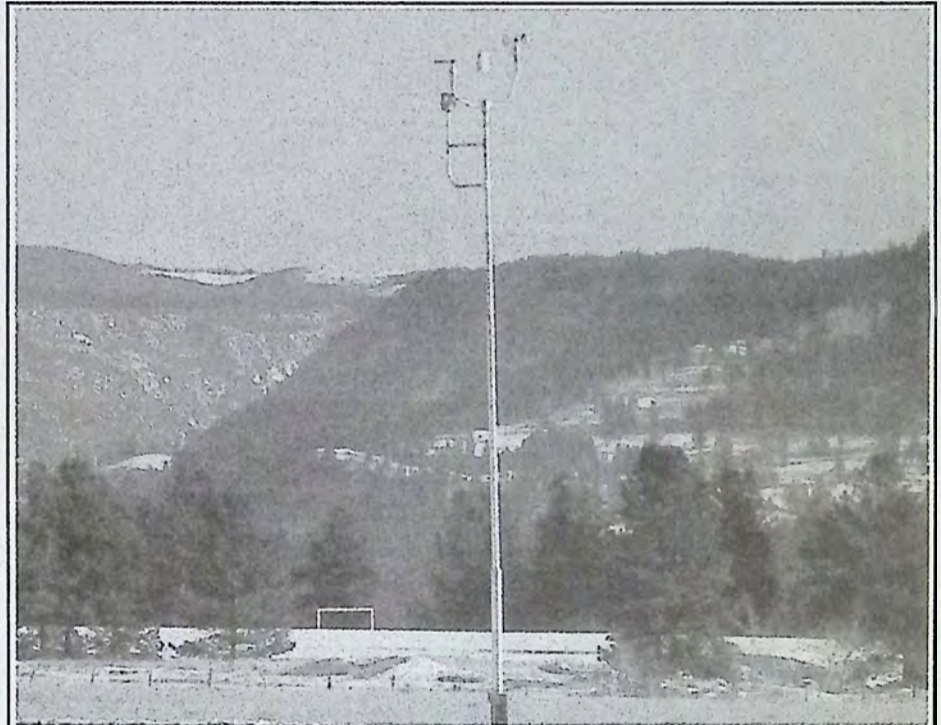
The Tipping Bucket Rain Gauge Recorder does exactly as the name implies. Photo: Brenda Engel



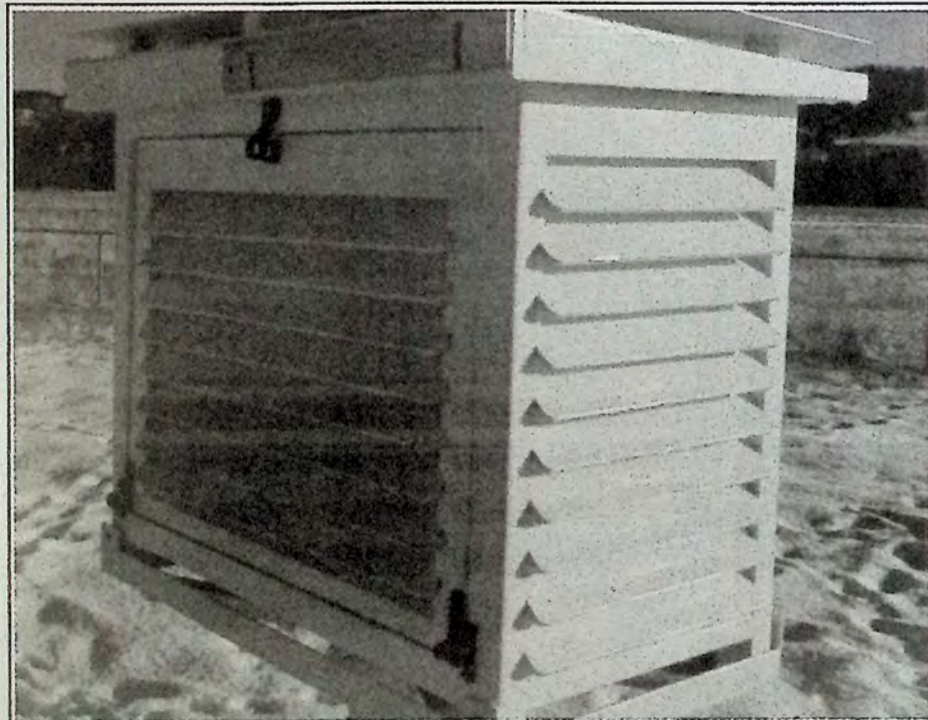
