



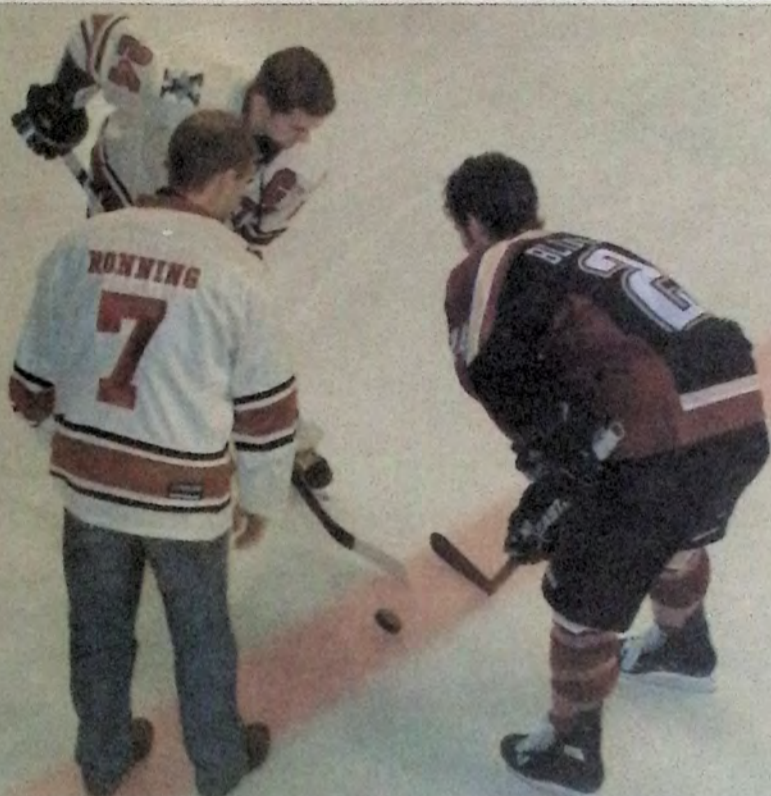

## Princeton Posse celebrate first decade

Junior B hockey was nothing new to many Princeton area residents as exhibition games in the KIJHL (Kootenay International Junior Hockey League) had been hosted in Princeton Arena in the late 1990s.

It wasn't until 2001 when word of a KIJHL team owner wanting to sell his franchise that the idea of bringing the team to Princeton was born.

There were meetings with Jim Harrison, owner of the Enderby Ice Kings, and a fundraising campaign started to raise enough to purchase the team and move it to the Similkameen Valley.

A contest was held to name the team and 'Posse' was chosen. The group working on the team purchase formed the Princeton Posse Junior B Hockey Club.

The Princeton Posse played their first season in the KIJHL in 2002/03 and had a handful of Princeton boys on the team roster.

The team won few games, but was probably remembered most in the early days for fights and penalties. Eventually the team improved and in the following years advanced to play-offs almost annually.

## Forest corporation completes first year

The Vermillion Forks Community Forest Corporation (VFCFC), a partnership of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, Town of Princeton, and Regional District Okanagan Similkameen is ending its first full year of operations.

Originally contemplated in a 2007 Memorandum of Understanding and a subsequent Partnership Memorandum of Understanding between the three partners, the partners spent three years preparing an application for a community forest license and on November 29, 2010 were awarded a license by the Province of B.C.

The license provides exclusive land management and harvesting rights over approximately 11,000 hectares surrounding Princeton.

During the lengthy application process for a community forest license, the three partners embarked on extensive research and management and business planning processes that resulted in the decision to apply for long-term tenure over Crown forest lands in close proximity to Princeton and to incorporate a company to hold the license. The area of tenure chosen had many benefits, including the ease to manage lands in close proximity to Princeton and the ease of conducting forest operations with close proximity to processing facilities.

The corporation's industry partner Weyerhaeuser, manages timber operations on behalf of VFCFC. Saw logs are either processed local-

ly at the Princeton Weyerhaeuser operation or sold to other forest companies. Post and rail material harvested is being sold to Princeton Post and Rail and Princeton Wood Preservers. The sale of timber by the forestry corporation will generate revenues for the partners to disburse back to their respective communities.

Although timber operations will be the main economic stimulus of the community forest, using other non-timber forest products and developing alternate land use opportunities will be long-term objectives of VFCFC. The community forest was intended to serve the social, economic and environmental needs of the community. In general terms, the VFCFC will be managing the forest for all of its product potential rather than just timber.

The forest corporation is working

with the China Ridge Ski Association on establishing a Memorandum of Understanding in order to establish a special management area in and around the China Ridge recreation area.

By establishing a special management area, recreation endeavors can be protected and enhanced. Undertaking these kinds of community partnerships is one of the key benefits of having local tenure over these lands; it enables local management and control of recreation and sensitive areas.

Highlights from 2011 operating year include:

- Adopt forestry operation management with Weyerhaeuser Canada.
- Adopt corporate governance and operating policies.
- Adopt 2011 forestry operating

plan. • Harvesting approximately 22,000 m3 of saw and post and rail logs generating gross revenues of \$900,000.

### BACKGROUND Community Forests in British Columbia

A community forest can be described as any forestry operation managed by a local government, community group, First Nation or community-held corporation for the benefit of the entire community. Community forestry involves the three pillars of sustainable development: social, ecological, and economic sustainability.

At its core, community forestry is about local control over and enjoyment of the benefits offered by local

# New board swears oath

School District #58 Secretary Treasurer Kevin Black conducted the swearing in ceremony of the new Board of Education on December 7. Most of the School

Trustees had served on the Board in years past. Leah Ward, Princeton area, was elected for the first time, along with David Laird and Tom Kroeker of Merritt area.

Gordon Comeau was once again elected Chair with Richie Gage as Vice-Chair.

The new Board got down to business immediately to consider a proposal for a child minding course for students at The Bridge, the alternate school in Princeton.

Four of the students have infants and two are pregnant. The child minding addition would keep the young women in school. The proposal is partnered by Leaders for Literacy, with Princeton Child Care Services as consultants. The Board supported the proposal.

Princeton Secondary School Principal Sandi Blair requested, and was granted, a \$20,000 loan from the district to purchase a 24 passenger mini bus for extra curricular transportation. A 15 passenger van has been in service a number of years but is wearing out and requiring more servicing. Comeau stated there have been safety issues cited about 15 passenger vans. The school has \$40,000 in savings and grant money for the purchase. The school will forgo \$2,000 a year in extra curricular funding to repay the

loan.

Princeton Secondary students were given a special sex education briefing on World AIDS Day. Students were given not only information on protecting themselves from sexually transmitted diseases, but were given a package containing a condom. Students were advised that not having sex was the safest way to protect their health.

Grade 12 graduation rates have climbed to 68 percent, but the goal is 70 percent. A change has taken place in who is dropping out of school. In the past, most drop-outs were boys, but in the past few years, most of the drop-outs are girls. School Superintendent Dr. Robert Peacock will be looking into why more girls are dropping out.

A Facebook site has been prepared for the school district. This new initiative provides one more way to communicate with parents, but traditional ways, such as news letters, will continue to be used. The Board gave approval to proceed with the Facebook project.

Vermilion Forks will be part of the Rick Hanson tour on May 10, 2012. The entire school will be participating. In other good news for that school, a \$4,709 refund from the purchase of playground equipment is on the way.

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..... continued from Front Page forest resources. These benefits are both monetary and non-monetary. The legal arrangements that permit the conduct of community forestry are varied. For example, community forests can exist where a municipality owns forest land, or where land is man-

aged through a covenant. In British Columbia, community forests are most often established when the government grants forest management rights to a community as a tenure arrangement, or timber licence. Examples include: community forest agreements, forest licences, and

tree farm licences. Community forest agreements are granted only to legal entities representing community interests. These may be a local government, an Indian Band (as defined under the Canada Indian Act), or a society, cooperative, or corporation that is community controlled and represen-

tative of community interests. They give the holder exclusive rights to harvest Crown timber on a specific land base (area based) and may grant the right to manage and charge fees for non-timber botanical products and any other prescribed forest products. Agreements are granted for a period of 25 years, replaceable every 10 years. Planning requirements are flexible enough to accommodate broadly based community objectives and allow for innovative and unconventional forest management practices. The benefits of community forestry vary from community to community as they each identify their unique goals, values and priorities. For the VFCFC, its goals include:

- Increases local involvement in the management of the Princeton area forestlands;
  - Assists in maintenance or enhancement of the economic diversity and quality of life for residents; and
  - Ensure that timber production and other natural resource uses and values are maintained in perpetuity.
- To achieve its goals the VFCFC has adopted the following guiding principles:
- Maintain a long term view for deriving benefits and managing the resource.
  - Provide for the highest return and best use of forestland resources using sound, environmentally responsible management practices.
- Balance the management of the timber resource with non-timber harvesting uses through ongoing input from various user groups so as to encourage other resource users to maintain or increase their use and benefit from the forested land base.

### WINTER SNOW REMOVAL AND PARKING REGULATIONS

It's that time again and we would like to remind residents of winter snow removal regulations.

The Town has a snow removal schedule that is based on a road priority system. Salting and plowing begins on the main arterial roads, followed by collector roads, and then moves onto residential streets and lanes as necessary. Please assist our crew when they are plowing by not parking on streets during snow removal.

During snow removal operations, plow operators cannot avoid leaving ridges of snow (called windrows) at the foot of driveways. Residents and business owners are responsible for clearing the windrow from their own driveways and entrances.

Residents and businesses are responsible for removing snow and ice from sidewalks in front of their homes and businesses. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to \$100.

Thank you for your cooperation in following these simple steps to ensure a safe winter season and remember, if you're out on the roads during a snowstorm, drive with caution and according to road conditions. Stay a safe distance from snow removal equipment. They need room to do the job safely!

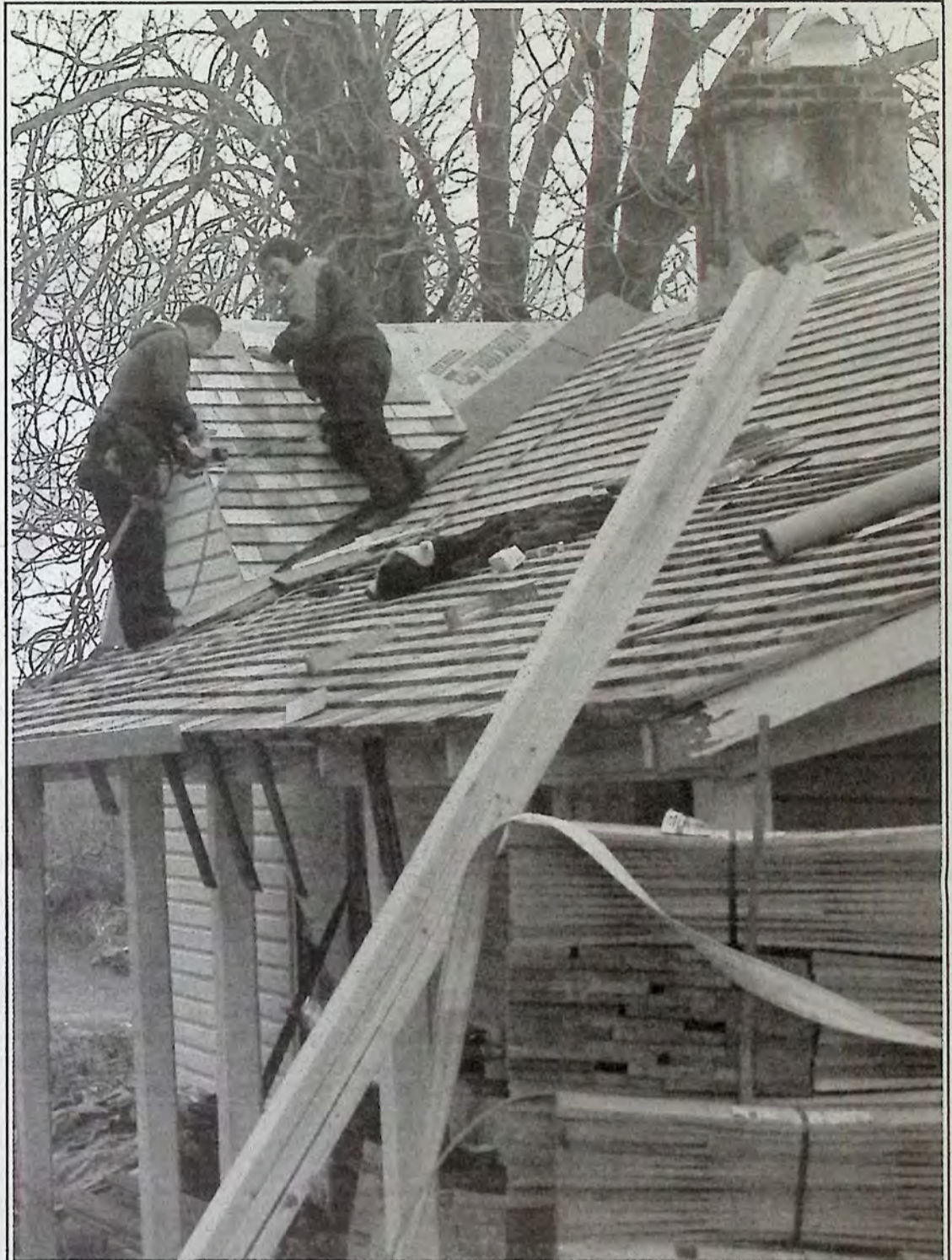

**White House receives new roof**

Progress in preserving the Keremeos Grist Mill and Gardens Historic site continued this past week.

The Heritage Branch of the BC Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations has found dollars for the re-roofing of the White House which has been variously a trading post, store, residence and storage shed over the past 125 years.

In the 1990's the White House became the present exhibition centre for artifacts and demonstration models of the 1877 water driven millworks.

Roof work is being done by Let It Rain Roofing of Cloverdale under the direction of operator, Jim Millar of Millar Heritage Enterprises who have managed the site since 2008.

The roof shakes are sawn rather than split. One workman quipped that although sawn shakes are not exactly heritage style that 'they were cut with a very old saw'.

Upon tearing up the 1979 shake roof, early sod was uncovered along with a shed snake skin.

This past Summer, energy efficiency improvements at the Grist Mill Visitors' Centre were funded through the offices of Area G of The RDOS. Director Elef Christensen

was the lead in this.

With a score of volunteers and support from Keremeos Valu Plus and the Sign Wizard, the Grist Mill Heritage Club netted over a thousand dollars from a food concession on a cold day at a November 19th farm auction in Keremeos. The club devotes itself to preserving 'our heritage treasure' at the old grist mill.

Both MLA, John Slater, and federal MP, Alex Atamanenko are members of the Grist Mill Heritage Club.

The club recently placed itself under the administration of the Grist Mill Foundation which will seek charitable status in the new year. The foundation will be looking to private sources to supplement a beleaguered provincial heritage budget.

## R.D.O.S. News

### Cawston Community Hall

The RDOS (Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen) recently discussed the matter of Bylaw No. 2518, 2011 - the Cawston Community Hall Maintenance Cost Contribution Conversion and Service Establishment Bylaw.

During the RDOS internal audit, all services were reviewed to ensure they were in compliance with the enabling legislation.

Due to an increase in maintenance costs at the Cawston Community Hall the Director for Electoral Area 'B' has proposed to increase the tax

requisition limit of \$1,500 per year to \$3,000 per year.

This would result in an average levy of \$3.45 per property. As this is a continuation of a regional district service, the Regional Board may

proceed in accordance with LGA section 802 as if it were a bylaw amending an establishing bylaw. The RDOS Board gave third reading to Bylaw No. 2518 at a recent meeting.

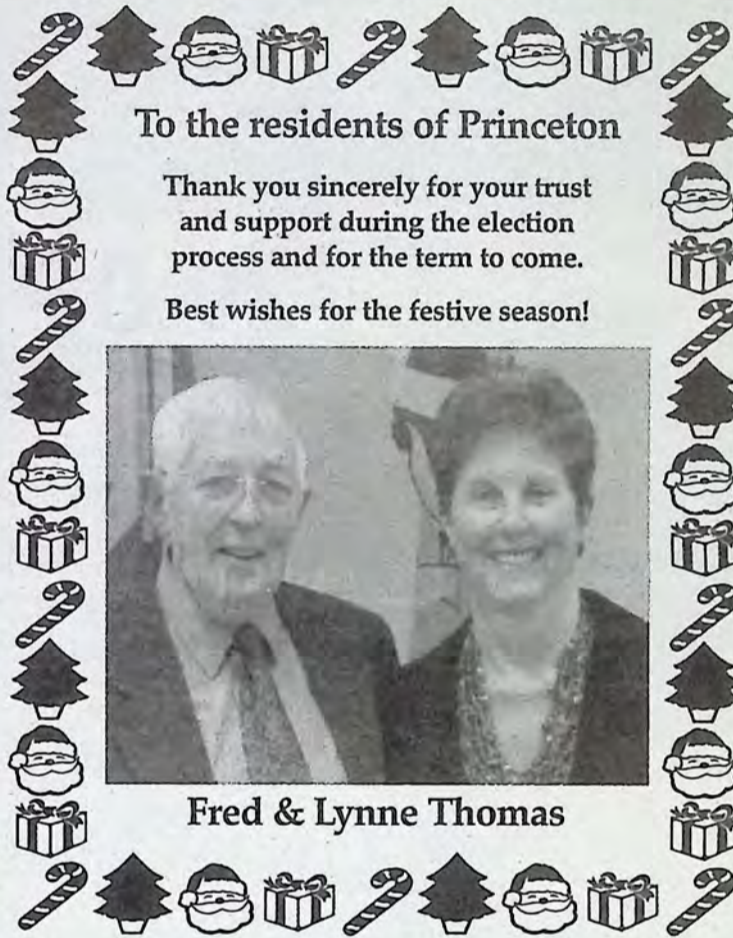

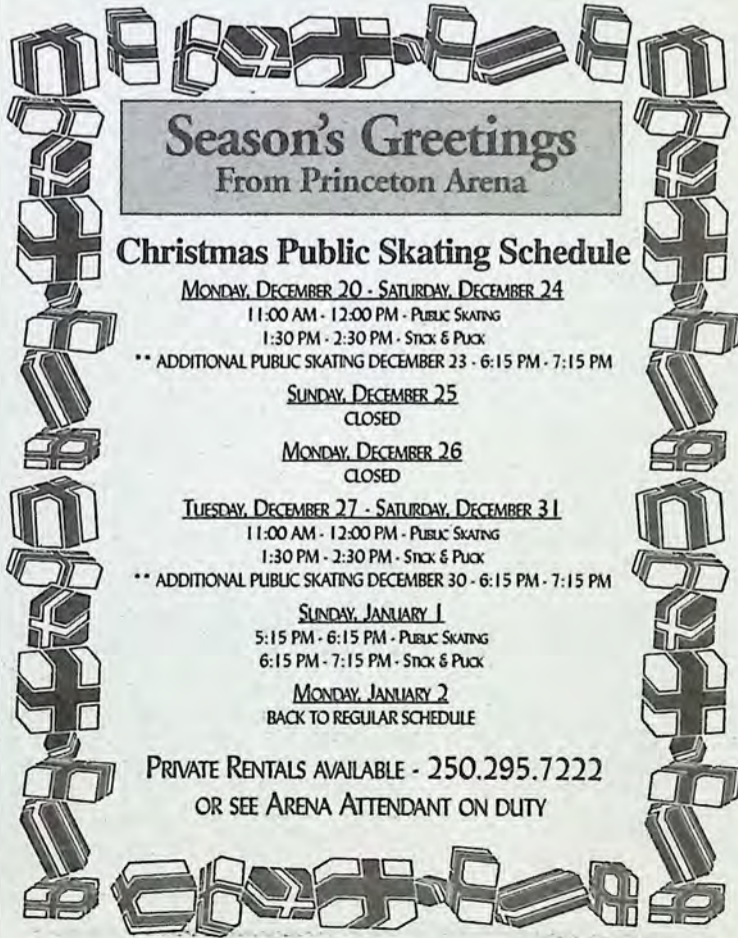

### Stress Busters!

(NC)—Stress can get the best of us for many reasons, whether it's positive stress such as starting a new job or negative stress such as moving a household. Stressful situations often lead to changes in sleep, exercise and dietary habits, all of which affect your health.

### Five ways to avoid a hysterectomy

(NC)—Women who want to avoid a hysterectomy should talk to their doctors about these alternatives:

1. Watchful waiting until menopause.
2. Tranexamic acid tablets, also known as Cyklokapron, which can reduce heavy menstrual bleeding.
3. A levonorgestrel-releasing intrauterine device, known as the Mirena, which lasts for five years, and can reduce heavy menstrual bleeding.
4. Endometrial ablations. Office-based, or operating-room-based, ablations char the lining of the endometrium and can reduce or stop periods altogether. One type, known mostly by its brand name NovaSure, takes only 90 seconds and is done under local anaesthetic on an outpatient basis.
5. Hysteroscopic myomectomy. Gynaecologists remove only the tissue that causes heavy bleeding such as fibroids, and leave the uterus intact. There are no incisions.

Fertility is an issue for some of these procedures so best to ask your doctor.

Holly Bridges, who had a hysteroscopic myomectomy and hysteroscopic ablation for her heavy periods, is writing a book about minimally invasive alternatives to hysterectomy and would like to hear from women who are also suffering from abnormal uterine bleeding.

## Living Past 100

### What Sugar Does To Our Bodies

This is the season of sweet, sugary cookies, cakes, and candies. If you are smart, you will be very careful about how much sugar you and your family consume during this holiday season. There is a direct link between colds and flu and sugar consumption.

We know winter is the time when people catch the flu and colds, but few of us make the connection to sugar consumption. Sugars come in many forms, from the fructose in juices to the cane sugar used in baking to the high-fructose corn syrup used to sweeten everything from sausages to candy. Microwave dinners are laden with sugar. Our bodies convert carbohydrates (pastry, potatoes) into blood sugar. When we consume a lot of sweets, our level of insulin rises and our level of growth hormone drops, and our immune system takes a dive.

It is important to keep your immune system in excellent condition. Your immune system protects your entire body from infections to colds to cancer. The more sweets you eat, the more damage you do to your entire body.

Some sweet things are less dangerous than others. For example, maple syrup is a sweetener that takes a long time to digest, so it has what is known as a low glycemic index, which means it does not cause a big spike in insulin. The worst sugar is high fructose corn syrup, which causes a huge spike in insulin within minutes of eating it.

The sweetness of fruit is midway between the two noted above, but be aware of the amount of sugar in fruit juices. Juice is concentrated fruit, and many juices have sugar added. Always read labels!

What is the best way to handle the season of sweets? Fill up on the good stuff. Have plates of vegetables with a dip, fruit, and nuts. Serve herbal teas instead of punch, and avoid soft drinks, which are loaded with sugar. Cook creatively and eat sensibly.

The dinner at RockRidge Canyon saw a PowerPoint presentation on the history of the Princeton Posse, as presented by Lyle Thomas, and short speeches from Randy McLean, Brad Hope, Dale Hladun and Blair Noel.

The event wrapped up with words from Guest Speaker Cliff Ronning. Ronning's NHL career extended 18

years as a pro player with St. Louis Blues, Vancouver Canucks, Phoenix Coyotes, Nashville Predators, Los Angeles Kings, Minnesota Wild and New York Islanders.

Ronning, who was born in Burnaby, was selected in the 7th round of the NHL entry draft in 1984 and was 134th overall. Ronning has retired in Vancouver but keeps busy with Base Hockey, a business he co-founded with Ron Kunisaki and sits as Vice President of the company that manufactures high-end, custom-built hockey

sticks. Base Hockey also provides a mobile analysis program where they video record, with high-speed cameras, players shooting pucks from two different angles in a test setting.

The videos are examined, players are custom-fit with a Base Hockey stick and receive technique critiques from Ronning.

Each of the Princeton Posse players were provided a one hour one-on-one session with Ronning during the week prior to the 10th Anniversary Banquet.

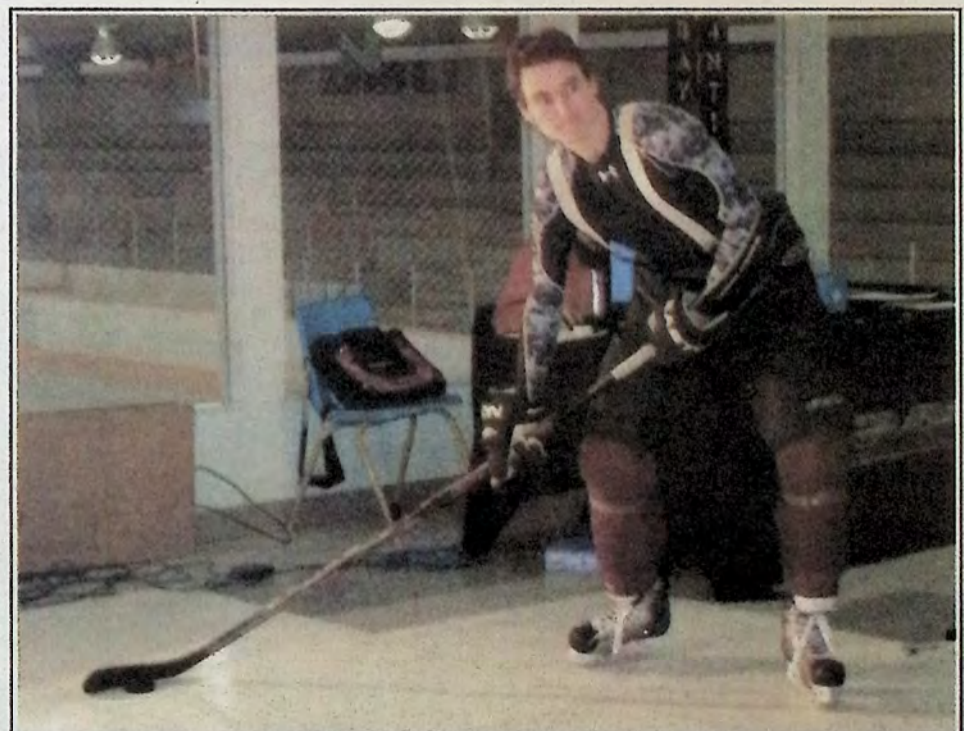

"Stan, thank you for conducting the swearing-in ceremony.

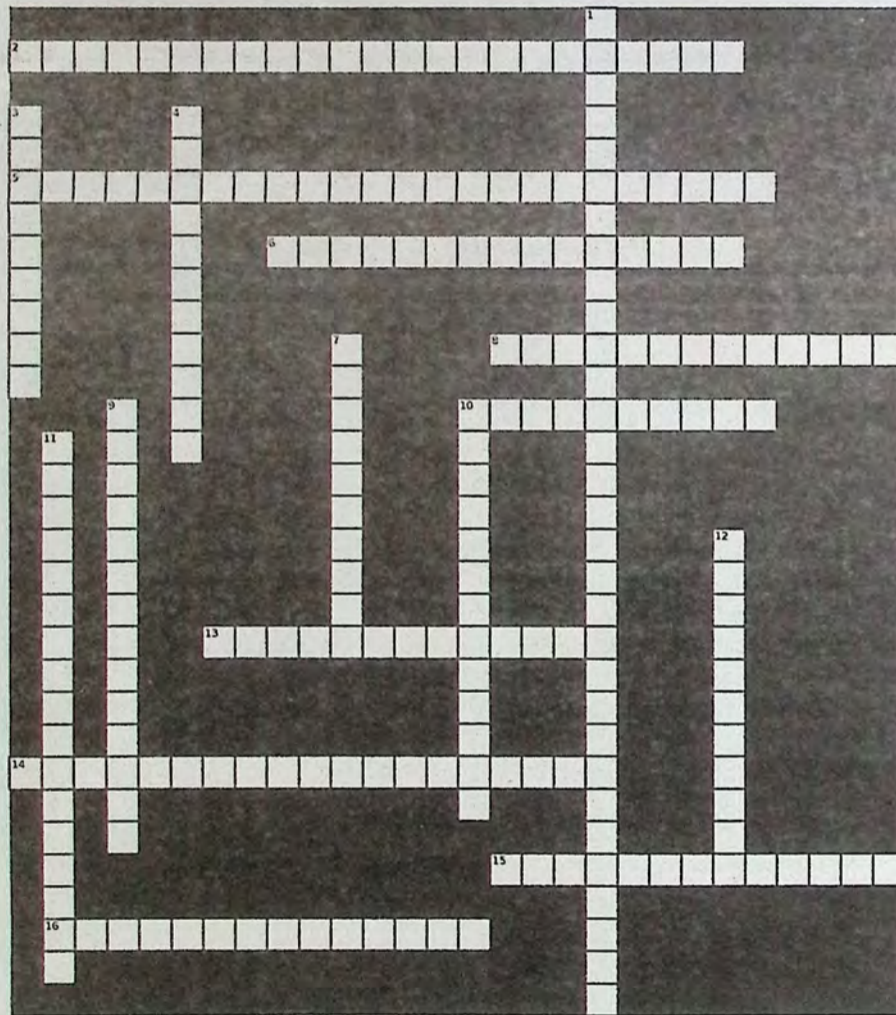

## Pay Attention: There May Be A Paper Tiger Loose

Last week, I expressed wonder at the low interest rates coupled with shortages of money. It was a contradiction of the rule of supply and demand. This week, I am still puzzled, because Canada's big banks have declared high profits due to lending so much money this year. If money is scarce, then lending a lot should lead to higher interest. This is a very peculiar situation.

The "Occupy" groups have gone to ground due to opposition to their camping on public lands and creating an eyesore. Much has been written about how the Occupy movement is all about homelessness and drug addiction. This is likely a major media way of down-playing what the Occupy organizers have been saying. When we look at the big profits of the banks, then we are closer to understanding what the Occupy movement is all about.

Occupy is really about the gap between what the rich have and what the poor have. It is about social justice. When we look at the situation in Attawapisket, a poor northern Indian Reserve community, then the gap between the economic level of the rich and the poor becomes glaringly obvious. When we read statistics about food banks, then we see more evidence of the gap.

Nearly one million Canadians use food banks every month. That means at least one out of every 34 Canadians cannot afford enough food to keep them going for a month. If you look up the number of children living in poverty in Canada, then you understand who suffers most from social injustice in this land of ours.

The United States Congress recently passed a law saying their military can arrest anyone suspected of terrorist links, in any country where the Americans have troops. Will this law be used to detain Occupy protesters? Are citizens of other countries supposed to sit back quietly while U.S. troops detain anybody they feel might cause any kind of trouble? I wonder why the rest of the world is not objecting.

There is a lot of high-handed decision-making going on that smacks of increasing loss of freedom as well as increasing aggressiveness from North America. For example, the sanctions being imposed on Iran. The story goes out that Iran is

making nuclear weapons, but there is no evidence that this is the case. The international regulatory body that monitors such developments issued a report at the beginning of the month stating there is no evidence in Iran of the development of nuclear weapons. This looks an awful lot like George W. Bush's bellowing about "weapons of mass destruction" that led to the war in Iraq.

In Israel, a nation which does have weapons of mass destruction, there is an increasingly aggressive stance toward Iran. Of course, Israel is always hand in glove with the United States, Britain and Canada. Yet rabbis in Israel are saying the average Israeli wants no part of war. The rabbis are protesting the promotion of aggressive behaviour toward Iran.

The sanctions imposed on Iran are an echo of sanctions imposed on Iraq and Libya, which led to war. I feel ashamed that Canada has gone along with this move to weaken Iran. I believe this whole scenario is just to create a war, but this time it is much more dangerous, because China and Russia have taken an opposing stand.

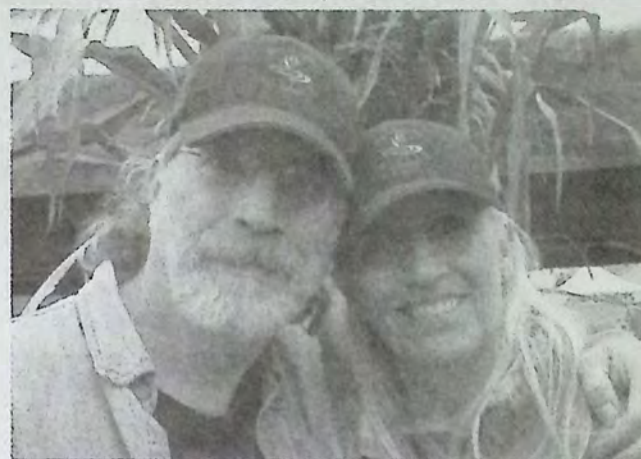

The 'Deer Issue' continues to pick up steam in Princeton. \*

To The Editor:  
 Deja vu – the 2006 deer wars are back!  
 With minor changes, here is what I wrote in 2006 – and I stand by my words!

**THE PRINCETON LAMENT**  
*Oh Dear – Oh Dear – those dreadful deer,  
 What can we do if they come near?  
 Our kids and dogs must run in fear!  
 Those wretched deer are out to get us  
 Our roses, tulips and our lettuce.  
 They lay in ambush – attack our cars!  
 Put these scoundrels behind bars!  
 Fence in the town to end the threat  
 If that doesn't work – just shoot them dead!*

I can't believe we are again contemplating yet more public meetings to contemplate the fate of the local deer population.

Let me be clear – I love the deer. They are part to the reason we moved here! They are a natural resource – and as much mine as they are yours.

Before anyone launches a campaign to kill my deer they had better be prepared with solid figures that prove without doubt that the deer population within the Town limits is

highly disproportional to the surrounding wilderness. Do not include the garbage dump because it represents a flagrant case of feeding the deer and hence, entrapment.

I would love to know just where this multitude of threatening deer is roaming. I live as close to wilderness as you can and still be in the city limits. A deer or two might wander through my front yard once a week and occasionally I see one or two along Tulameen Avenue and other residential streets – hardly an invasion!

Last summer a group of four deer showed up on the little lawn at the Chevron station and caused a sensation – two tour buses were in the parking lot. Dozens of Oriental tourists rushed out to take their pictures! They will take home this treasured memory of Princeton and show them excitedly to their friends – publicity you could not buy!

My sentiments in this issue are obvious. Some individuals have irrational fears - of dogs, bees, and yes - deer. I have empathy for these folks! Last Halloween evening some teens were in front of my house, trick or treating. Suddenly the two girls began to run and scream hysterically – deer, deer!

Two deer were peacefully walking on the other side of the road! Was this a deer attack?

There are, however, some among us who stir up public sentiment by throwing out one red herring after another. In 2006 the red herrings were the threat of Lyme disease and ticks – neither a local threat. I am not really sure what has set off this new anti-deer campaign!

Deer are NOT naturally aggressive. Aggressiveness is simply not a characteristic of deer you will find in any literature on wildlife. Failure to run away does not equate to aggression – neither does standing your ground in defense of your offspring; as any good mother would.

If individuals learned to use common sense when they encounter a deer, much distress could be averted! If you encounter a deer, on a hike or in your garden, for Heaven's sake, stay calm and move along quietly. If the deer paws the ground and lowers its head it is upset. Stop whatever you are doing and back off!

DO NOT – As I have witnessed - yell and make threatening gestures and do not allow your dog, regardless of size, to harass a deer. To do ..... continued on Page 23

..... continued from Page 22 so is both illegal and risky. Dogs are canines. In the wild, canines like wolves and coyotes hunt deer. To a deer your dog is just another canine. The deer will probably run BUT it may strike out in panic and injure the dog.

I have spent hours on the Internet searching for serious human physical injuries and deaths caused directly by deer. Roughly a million deer die on North American roads every year and - yes - these collisions take a small number of people with them. Whose fault is that?

Yes, I found two fatal attacks by male deer in rut. In one case a pet deer fatally gored its owner - in a similar case a man suffered an injury to his face and died of a related infection. I found about fifteen other reported injury incidents - one significant head injury and various bumps and bruises. That is all I could glean for the entire North American continent with a population of 331,473,276 million or more people. If we assume half of these people live in metropolitan areas and have zero chance of encountering deer, your chance of being injured or killed by a deer appears to be one in about 10 million.

On the other hand, a recent study showed that 1,000 Americans per day are treated in emergency rooms as a result of dog bites. In 2010 there were 34 fatal dog attacks in the

USA. Most of the victims who receive medical attention are children, half of whom are bitten in the face. Dog bite losses exceed \$1 billion per year, with over \$300 million paid by homeowners insurance. So, who should your fear more, a deer or a dog?

The landscape and gardening complaints irritate me the most. This is NOT the Lower Mainland! It took me one season to learn that tulips and tea roses, peas and beans, are deer catnip! There is an abundance of marvelous shrubs, perennials and annuals of equal beauty that thrive here - of absolutely no interest to deer. If you don't have landscaping success here do some research or visit Don and Anna's Garden Centre in Keremeos. They are wonderful about explaining what survives and thrives in Princeton. I truly don't understand what people are complaining about. All this gardening

distress can only be explained by a stubborn addiction to plants that don't work. To me Princeton seems like gardening heaven - no slugs, few aphids and lots of sun!

Once when the gate was left open a deer nibbled on some of the beans and peas in my fun garden - so what! Would I support the death of even one deer over my veggies and roses - absolutely NOT!

Princeton is just a small blip in an immense deer range. From the deer perspective, it is inconveniently located where they, since time immemorial have come to look for food and water. I suspect deer will be coming here for the rest of my days, and yours - so - let us hope we can come to a state of comfortable co-existence. Even better - let us embrace them as the novel, and absolutely free, tourist attraction they can be!

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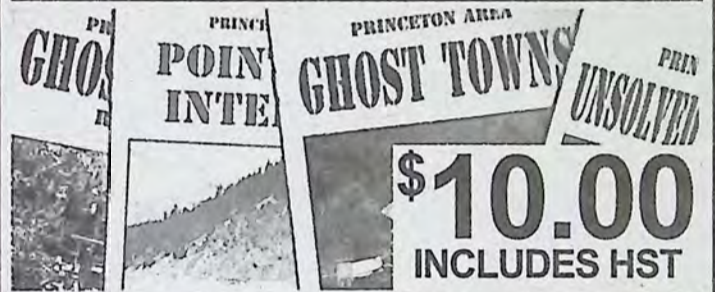
