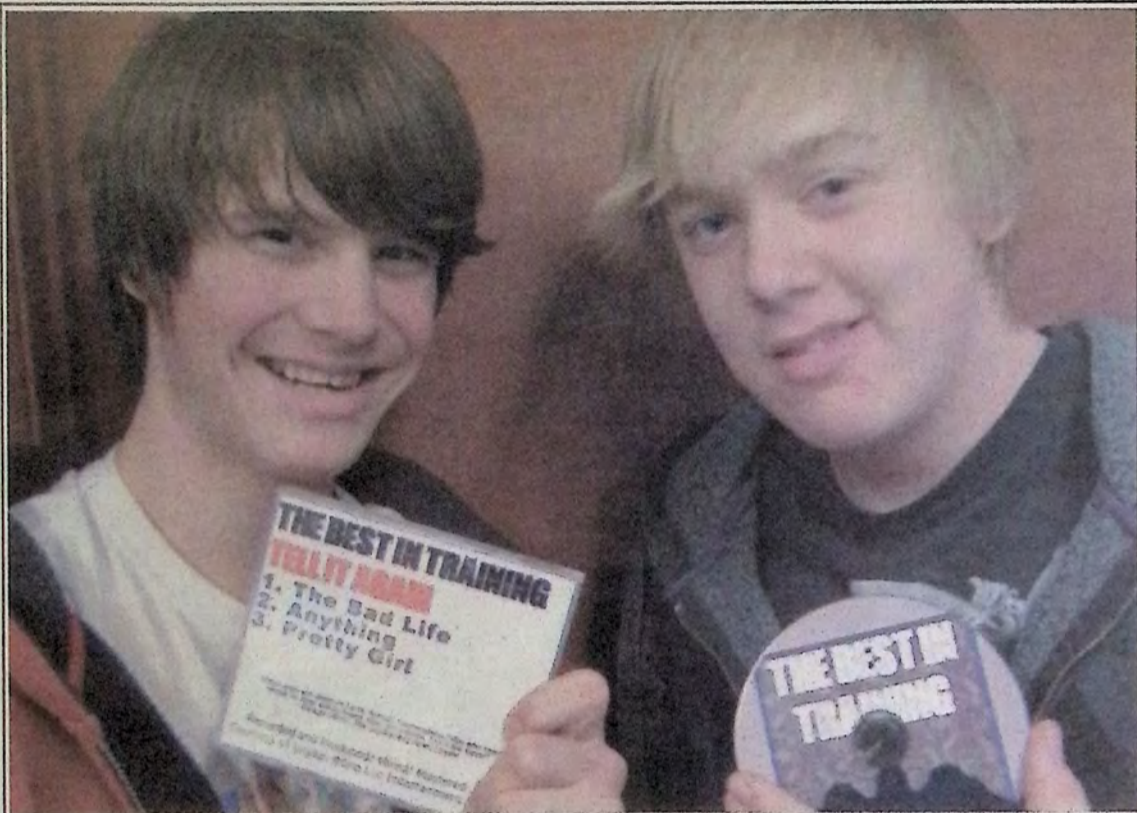

## Mystery shopper scam returns to Princeton

What would you do with a \$3,988.62 cheque?

Well, if you received it in a letter in the mail from a company called KatzGroup (KatzGroup Canada Ltd.) of Mississauga, Ontario, the smartest thing to do is throw it away.

The company exists and can be found easily through an online search on the internet but the mail offer is phony, and the cheque is part of an elaborate scheme to get you to empty your personal bank account of close to \$4,000.

Recently a local resident came to the News Leader with a letter from the group, which stated, "This is to inform you that based on a previous survey by our affiliate Consumer survey specialist, you indicated to be interested in an additional income on a part-time bases (sic). You are hereby selected to participate in a paid Consumer Research Program in your area of residence as a MYSTERY SHOPPER."

It went on to explain, "As one of the Research Personnel selected

under this program, you will be a Consumer Service Evaluator of the selected merchant outlets and service providers. This research program is fully paid and could potentially become a permanent position for a selected few that is able to distinguish themselves in the course of this program. Your starting salary will be \$450 and will increase to \$500 per week after 3 months of working with us. This is a self-training program designed to equip you with the right tools necessary to carry out your assignments which will be completed in two different locations."

Here's how the scam works:

There are details enclosed in the letter outlining two different tasks.

In the first one, called 'Assignment (1)' you are directed to spend \$100 on "any product of your choice from one of these retails outlets: Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Home Depot, Sears, J. C. Penny or Best Buy."

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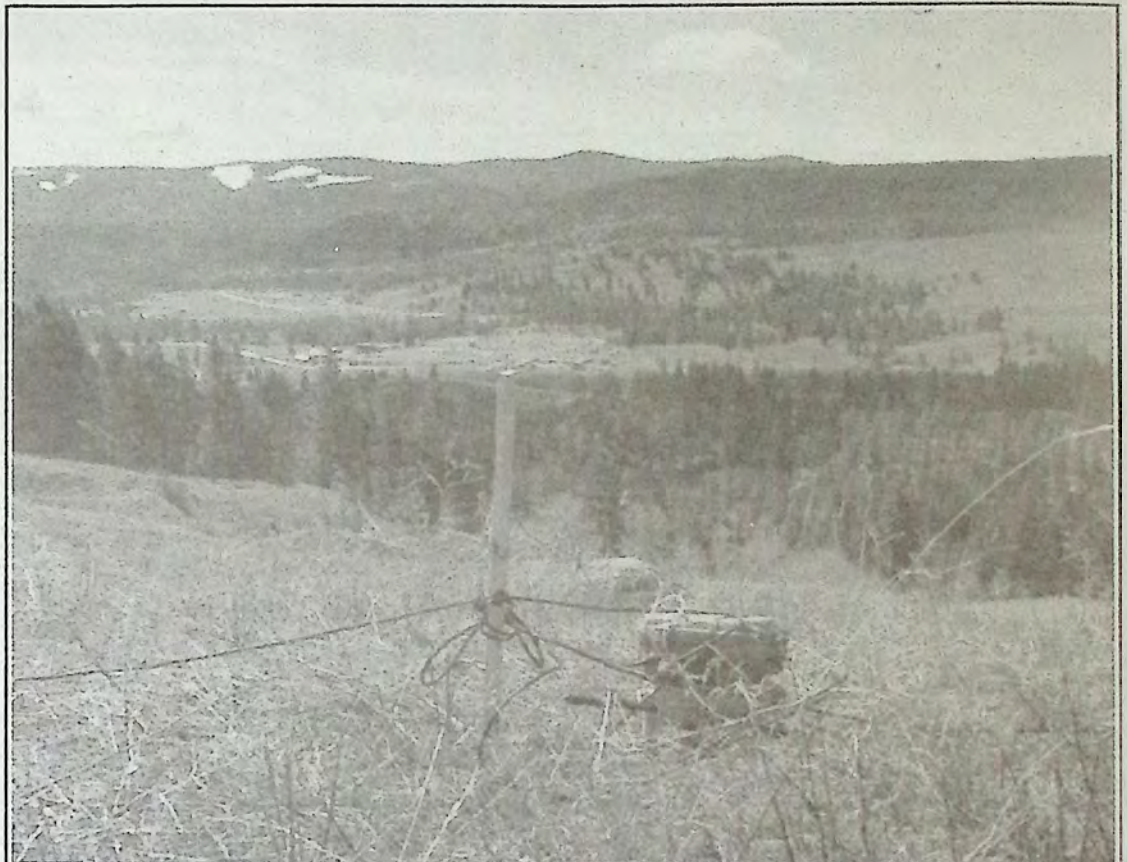
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Princeton Fairgrounds and Princeton Airport (upper left) are visible from the Sego Resources Miner Mountain Property. Photo: Sego Resources website

## Mining News

### Sego! Resources - Miner Mountain

Sego Resources Inc. ("Sego" or the "Company") announced last week that it has received fire assays from the Phase III percussion drilling program. The new Copper-Gold zone identified in Phase II (see NR November 28, 2011) has been extended to the southeast by 125 metres and remains open to the W, E, NE, SE, and at depth. This extension is part of the Cuba Zone IP anomaly which is 350m x 1,500 m. Assays show a gradation from Copper-Gold, Gold-Copper to enriched Gold across the zone. Most holes intersected intensely altered volcanics and microdiorite of the Upper Triassic Nicola Group.

Fire Assays results can be found on the Sego website at [www.segoresources.com](http://www.segoresources.com).

Phase III consisted of 25 percussion holes drilled on a 30 m x 30 m grid of 200 m x 150 m. PDH-11-94 is located 385 metres Southeast of PDH-09 and 123 metres Southeast of PDH-77.

The Granby-Cuba Zone is 350 m x 1,500 m and is being drilled on a 30 metre grid basis. Thus far 102 percussion drill holes of Phases I, II, and III, totalling 7,280 metres have been completed.

#### 2012 Diamond Drill Program

The 1,500 metre 2012 diamond drill program, designed to test the zone at greater depth, is now underway. Sego will be twinning PDH 09 (from 12 to 64 m 1.264% Cu 1.061 G/T Au, 3.79 G/T Ag, including 12 to 44 m 1.845% Cu, 1.628 G/T Au 5.569 G/T Ag including from 16 to 24 m 3.681% Cu 5.256 G/T Au and 15.975 G/T Ag which includes from 18 to 22 m 3.999% Cu 6.925 G/T Au and 23.450 G/T Ag. Bottom of Hole 64 metres), PDH 02 (From 60 to 70 m 0.355% Cu, 0.446 g/t Au, 1.2 G/T Ag. Bottom of Hole 70 metres), see News Release April 5, 2011; PDH 77 (From 4 to 14m 10m 0.215% Cu with 0.148 G/T Au, 20 to 36m 6m 0.218% Cu with 0.185 G/T Au, 38 to 93m 54m 0.342% Cu with 0.473 G/T Au, including 7m

0.76% Cu with 1.508 G/T Au (see News Release November 28, 2011); and PDH 94 (18-100 metres 82 metres 1.006% Copper, 0.576 G/T Gold, 1.69 G/T Silver, end of hole 100 metres). A location map of all percussion drill holes can be found on our website.

These holes will be drilled to a depth of approximately 300 metres, one hole will be held in reserve with its location to be determined after completion of the twinning holes.

Sego Resources is permitted for five years of exploration.

This News Release was reviewed and approved by V.A. Preto, Ph.D., P.Eng., a Qualified Person under National Instrument 43-101.

Sego Resources Inc.'s sole project is the Miner Mountain Project, a Copper Gold Porphyry project near Princeton, 15 kilometres north of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation's Copper Mountain Mine, now in production. The Miner Mountain Project is situated within the Traditional Territory of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, with whom Sego has a Comprehensive Memorandum of Understanding.

# Flip Of The Coyne

I was talking with friends the other day about how social media has changed our world and the subject of Town Council came up, more accurately the lack of presence Town Council has in the social media world. I know social media and the internet are not for everyone, but in an ever-growing connected world, if you or your business is not part of the social media scene you are going to be left behind.

Now just to be clear, Facebook is not the only social media platform for getting your message across. It is just the most popular with 800 million active users and an average of 400 million logging in daily.

Although I believe Town Council should be on Facebook, I think more importantly they should be on Twitter. Twitter is a social media platform but it is also known as a micro-blogging site which simply means you have a limited number of characters to get your message across.

I'll bet you didn't know that the cities of Kelowna and Penticton are on Twitter. They post important updates, job postings and other municipal information in their feeds. I don't expect everyone to run out and get a Twitter account, but it would be nice to see elected officials using these types of free services to get the word out, to not only locals but a possible audience of 300 million users.

The one social media platform that people seem to forget is a social media tool is YouTube. More and more I hear people saying "wouldn't it be great if council meetings were recorded and posted on YouTube?" I couldn't agree more.

It is not possible for everyone to make a council meeting, but if the

meetings were recorded and then posted to YouTube we could watch council meetings when we get home from work, away from town, or when it is more convenient. Sometimes when there is a meeting people just don't want to go, but then something is said or a decision is made and people want to know all the details.

By posting the meetings on YouTube, people could see what was actually heard verbatim and they could get the information straight from the source. It would be great for openness and transparency and great for public relations.

On the technical end, it really wouldn't take much for council meetings to be recorded and uploaded. They can even be added to the Town's website. All the hardware the Town would need can be picked up at The Source. For a few hundred dollars you can get a High Definition digital video camera and then you would only need a small mixing board (7 or 8 channels), some microphones and an extra patch cord to run from the mixer's output to the camera's external microphone's input.

Uploading it to YouTube takes a laptop or any computer that is up-to-date and uploading is free. Since the Town's website is a Joomla site, there are numerous free extensions and plugins that will allow you to import YouTube videos or you could purchase a premium one that would give you extra customization. So for no more than \$500 dollars council could have every one of its meetings recorded, uploaded and accessible to everyone.

As a former councillor I would have jumped on the opportunity when I was on council to have our meetings recorded and accessible to

the public.

It would have allowed constituents to see not only what I as an elected representative did but it would have helped to educate the public as to what council really did. Who knows, Town Hall might already possess most of the hardware needed to get meetings online. Either way, all that is really needed is for council to make a decision.

### GENERAL CONDITIONS

- The applicant may be required to currently own or control a land base which is presently commensurate, or will be developed within 5 years, for any Crown grazing tenure currently held, as well as for the vacancy applied for.
- The applicant must own a minimum of 50 per cent of the cattle required to fill the opportunity he/she is applying for.
- Successful applicant(s) will be obliged to upgrade or maintain, at their own cost, any existing range developments. Some material supplies may be available from the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations. The applicant is required to contain cattle within the proposed tenure area. Investment into the Crown range will be considered in the awarding of these crown vacancies.

And to be honest with you, I don't blame Town Council for pussyfooting their way through this one. There really isn't a right answer if you ask me.

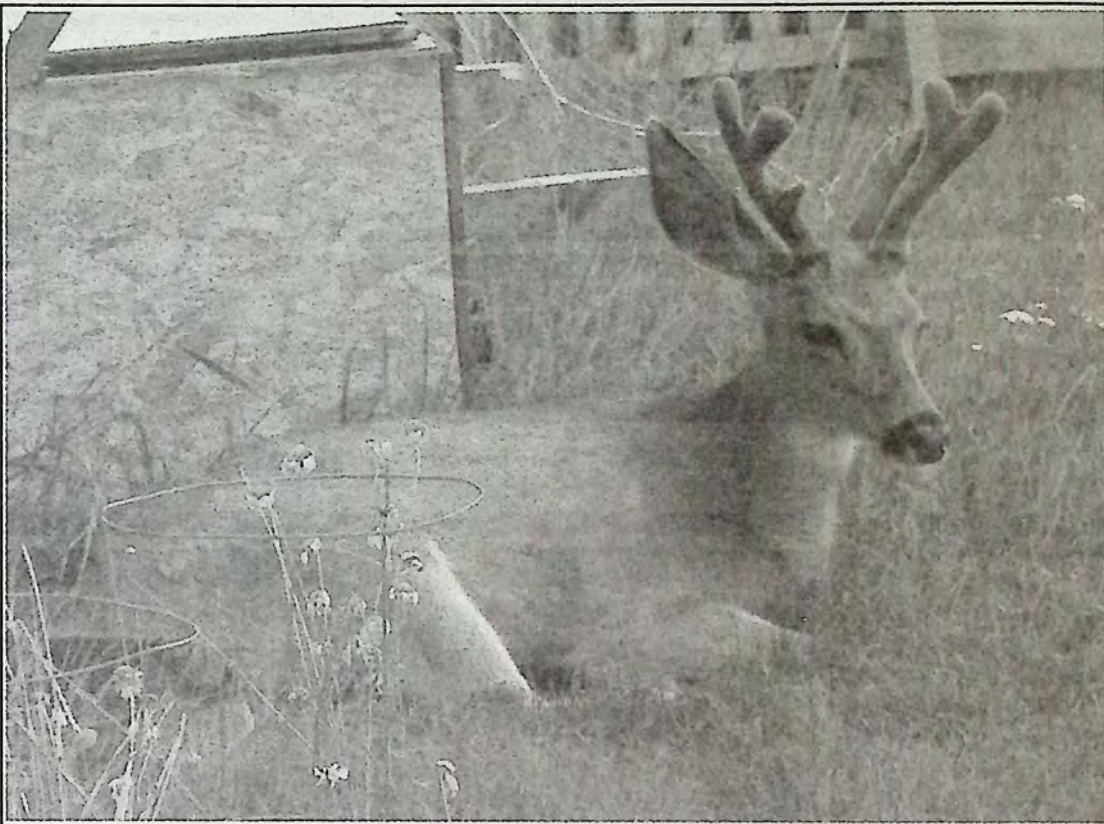

## One More Reason To Shop Locally

A major think-tank group announced recently one more reason the global economy is fragile: natural disasters. While the European Union struggles to find a solution to man-made economic problems, this group of thinkers looked at what had happened to the global economy due to Mother Nature in the past two years. Their conclusion was this: the economy can cope for one week, then it begins to fail rapidly.

The think tank looked at a number of disasters and examined the cost of the disaster, not in human terms of damage and loss of life, but what the effects were on the global economy. Few of us think in those terms when we hear of a volcanic eruption or a flood or an earthquake, but think about this: the big volcanic eruption in Iceland a couple of years ago cost airlines over five billion dollars.

The big flood in Thailand last year slowed down delivery of computer

parts to a major computer company in the United States. No computers were sold for nearly two months. The company and shops in the United States had to suck up the loss of business due to a flood thousands of miles away.

The earthquake and subsequent tsunami that hit Japan last year had a severe effect on Japan's economy and on companies importing goods from Japan. All of the nations around the North Pacific will be paying the costs of the contamination from the spread of radioactive materials resulting from the explosions at the Dai-ichi nuclear power plant.

The volcanic eruption in southern Chile last year spread ash over ranches in Argentina and Uruguay that contaminated water, covered the grass, and was killing the livestock. The cattle and sheep had to be trucked out of the area, cleaned up and fed clean food and clean water.

The loss to sheep and cattle ranchers was huge. The contaminated land area was equal to the entire south Cariboo and Thompson-Okanagan ranchlands. The volcano from another country heavily impacted the economy of two countries for much longer than one week.

I recall problems we had in the first two years at the News Leader, before our TV guide was delivered by email. One time, it was a snowstorm in New York that prevented delivery of the package. Another time, it was a snowstorm between Princeton and Vancouver that

slowed down delivery.

Going back even further, to Christmas 1980, flooding caused closure of half the highways in B.C., preventing people from returning home after Boxing Day. A bridge washed out in Manning Park, parts of highways north and east of Princeton were either washed out or under water. I had guests who could not return home because the bridge they relied on near their home town was closed for repairs to its foundation. These are little, local problems, nothing like the scale of big earthquakes and volcanic ash, but they have a cost.

The think-tank people stated most companies are not prepared to deal with major disruptions caused by natural disasters locally, let alone hundreds or thousands of kilometers away. Nevertheless, in a global economy in which so many companies rely on source materials manufactured elsewhere, or mined elsewhere, or built elsewhere, these companies need to start looking at what would happen if a major natural disaster hit them or their supply source. They might want to consider what would happen if a natural disaster interfered with transportation from the supply source or to the market.

This concern, along with the effects of global financial instability, should cause our politicians to take a second look at strengthening our own economy so it can withstand a major natural disaster. Nobody can assure Canadians they will not have a severe storm, because we have had such conditions. We cannot guarantee we will not have a major earthquake in our two earthquake zones, the BC coast and the St. Lawrence River basin. Nobody can guarantee one of our Yukon volcanoes will not spread ash all over the northern prairies and disrupt the polar flight routes.

Not only does our civil defense and emergency service have to be prepared, our economy has to be prepared for a natural disaster. One of the ways we can avoid being too dependent on other nations for essentials is to make sure those essentials are produced close to home.

To make sure of that, we have to build up our own industries and our own local economies, to ensure that the people who produce goods we need stay in business in our own country.

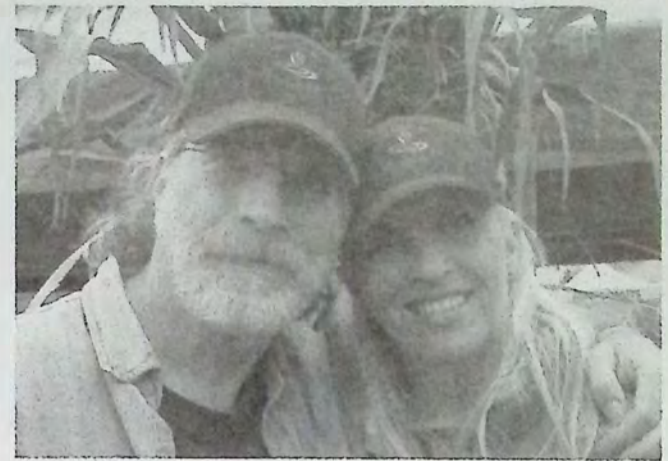

Parents and Community members are invited to an exciting evening of big band jazz music put on by the District's Secondary schools and directed by Jonnie Bridgman and Lisa Ante.

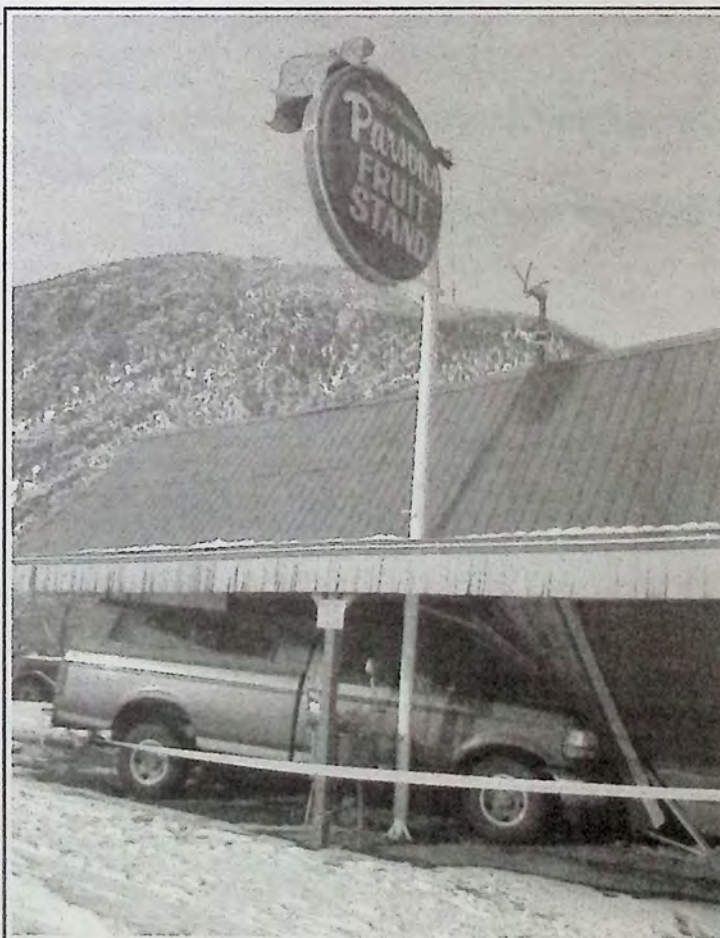
The School District Jazz Band Concert is planned for 6:30 PM on

proven helpful to so many over the years. It includes video dramatizations that lead into discussion.

The S.T.E.P. program draws on the approaches to child-rearing that were developed by Dr. Alfred Adler and then advanced in the 1960's by people like Rudolf Dreikers in his classic book, Children the Challenge.

The program works on things like encouraging children by supporting their progress. Mostly, it offers some practical approaches drawn from ordinary family life.

"It's about getting our young ones to learn and accept that there are rea-

sonable and logical consequences that come from behavior, both good and bad", says Dave Cursons at Lower Similkameen Community Services. Cursons is organizing the group.

**Info System Vital To BC Pharmacists**

(NC)—Linda Hunt is a pharmacist in Richmond. With 42 years of experience, she has worked in the industry both before and after the arrival of health information technology. As far as Hunt is concerned, prior to the technology "we might as well have been working in the dark. I really can't overstate what an advantage this is to our practice."

Hunt is referring to PharmaNet, the British Columbia drug information system (DIS), which enables doctors, nurses, pharmacists and other authorized health care providers to view a patient's medication history securely online.

A number of Canadian provinces have had these types of systems since the mid-1990s. In 2010, approximately 32 per cent of community pharmacists in Canada used a DIS along with 51 per cent of all hospital emergency departments.

A report, commissioned by Canada Health Infoway and compiled by Deloitte, found that Canada's investments in drug information systems generated an estimated \$436 million in cost savings in 2010, an amount that is expected to rise to approximately \$1 billion per year as these systems become more widely used.

The advantages of the DIS are

numerous; the number of adverse drug events is reduced; provide pharmacists and physicians with tools to combat medication abuse; and the dialogue between pharmacists and prescribers is improved.

"Pharmacists are seeing technology and their drug therapy expertise working in concert to transform the delivery of patient care," said Jody Shkrobot, president of the Canadian Pharmacists Association.

"By providing health care professionals with the information they need to support their clinical decisions, drug information systems are improving medication safety and effectiveness."

In B.C. all pharmacies, as well as 28 per cent of the province's doctors, are linked to PharmaNet. Stan Crowell, a practicing pharmacist for 43 years, says the day the program was introduced 15 years ago was a great day for health care in the province.

"I cannot picture people operating without it," Shkrobot continued. "With the number of potent medications we have now it would be dangerous to practice as a pharmacist without a system like PharmaNet. I would not practice in any province that did not have it. That's how strongly I feel."

That sentiment is echoed by Linda Hunt. "It is just such a great safeguard for all involved. It allows health care providers, whether they are emergency room doctors or community pharmacists, to get the information they need to do their jobs better, and that means better, safer care for patients."

**Living Past 100**

**The Benefits Of Herbs**

Most cooks use herbs to improve flavour, such as the mix of Italian herbs used in spaghetti sauce, but few of us think in terms of the health benefits of having herbs in our cooking. Herbs have medicinal benefits that protect us from disease.

There are many sources for what we call "herbs". Some are leaves or stalks, some are in the form of seeds or roots. All fall into the classification of herbs.

One of the most common herbs used in cooking and served raw is parsley. Many people leave it on the side of the dish when it is used as a garnish, but they should eat it. Parsley improves kidney function, preventing accumulation of water in the tissues. Parsley tea (made from dry leaves steeped in boiling water) acts as a diuretic, and is particularly helpful for women who bloat before menstruation (PMS) and for the elderly who retain fluids.

Dill is another herb we use to flavour foods, but it has medicinal properties. Fresh dill fronds are excellent in salads, chopped and served with baked potatoes and sour cream, and makes a tasty vegetable dip flavouring. Dill seeds are used to flavour pickles. What most people do not know is that dill reduces flatulence, stimulates the appetite, and settles the stomach. Two teaspoons of dill soaked for 15 minutes in one cup of boiling water is a great way to make dill water, an antidote for colic in babies.

Garlic is a favourite flavouring, but it has tremendous medicinal value in fighting infections of all kinds, and is one of the few natural protections against viruses. Garlic fights yeast and fungus infections, and is strong enough to combat athlete's foot. Foods liberally flavored with garlic can protect from typhus, staph and strep bacteria, and the bacteria that cause dysentery and enteritis. Many people dislike the scent of garlic on another person. In self-defense, eat your own garlic.

Horseradish was used as a traditional medicine for centuries. Fresh grated horseradish was made into a compress for neuralgia, stiffness, and pain in the back of the neck. A cough syrup made from grated horseradish, honey and water was used as a treatment for hoarseness. If you need to clear your sinuses, grated some fresh horseradish and inhale deeply.

There are many more herbs we use in our kitchens that do more for us than just tickle our taste buds. There are many fine books about herbs. Go to your library and learn how to improve your health with herbs.

## California Shortbread Bars

**Ingredients:**

- 1 cup (250 mL) butter
- 1 cup (250 mL) light brown sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 tsp (5 mL) vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) grated orange peel
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) almond extract
- 2 cups (500 mL) flour
- 1 cup (250 mL) chopped natural almonds, toasted
- 1 package (12 oz, 360 g) semi-sweet chocolate chips

**Preparation:**

- Cream butter with brown sugar until light and fluffy.
- Beat in egg yolk. Beat in vanilla extract, orange peel and almond extract.
- Stir in flour and 1/2 cup (125 mL) almonds. Spread dough into well greased 9 x 13-inch baking pan.
- Bake at 350°F (180°C) degrees for 25 minutes, or until golden brown.
- Remove from oven; sprinkle top evenly with chocolate chips.
- Return pan to oven for 30 seconds. Remove from oven and spread melted chocolate evenly over surface. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 (125 mL) cup almonds.
- Cool. Cut into bars to serve.

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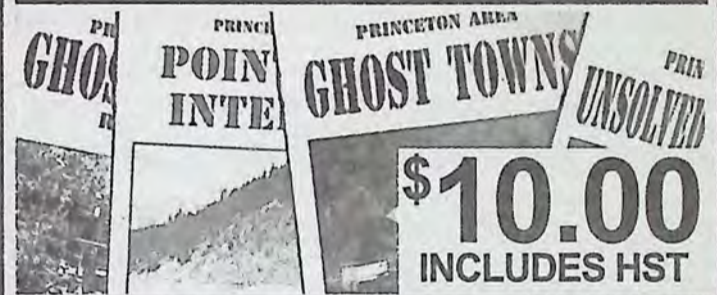

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
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

ation Tool, or survey, related to the products or items purchased is to be completed (it's included in the package containing the \$3,988.62 cheque) with the purpose explained as providing information for comparison purposes, "all items purchased with the \$100 are yours to keep."

The point of the first 'assignment' is to build your trust but the second part, or Assignment (2), is designed to dig into your bank account.

The task outline is explained in this manner: "You will be trained in a financial transaction by evaluating various banks and other money transferring agencies like Moneygram or Western Union." It goes on to explain that since the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center, Western Union or Moneygram agents have been instructed to request identification for any cash transfers over \$1,000.

"The purpose of this assignment is to investigate if agents follow the guidelines as stipulated by law concerning the transfer of funds over \$1,000."

Simple enough?

Section B of the mail-in survey form outlines that exactly \$1,598.62 is to be transferred to a person identified by name and referred to as a Mystery Shopper in Atlanta, Georgia and a further \$1,600.00 to another Mystery Shopper in Atlanta, Georgia. Both names of the shoppers are likely made up.

If you've done the math, you are correct in assuming that the \$3,988.62 cheque will more than cover all costs. In fact, a chart breaks it down this way: \$450.00 for Probationary Training Pay, \$100.00 Funds Needed For Shopping, \$3,198.62 Funds For Transaction at Moneygram or Western Union and \$240.00 Service Charges at Moneygram or Western Union.

The sneaky part of the scam is that KatzGroup hopes you already have more than \$4,000.00 in your account before you cash their cheque, or before their cheque clears and have followed their instructions before finding out their cheque is fake.

The reader who brought the KatzGroup Mystery Shopper scam to our attention last week confirmed the local branch of CIBC had told them the \$3,988.62 cheque did not clear. It was also fortunate that she did not proceed with the two 'assignments' as she would have lost all of that from her account.

The News Leader tried to contact KatzGroup in Mississauga, Ontario. A call to the toll free number on the paperwork (1-877-575-6612, ext. 1) returned a recording that informed us that the phone service had been temporarily suspended.

A search online located the KatzGroup headquarters in Mississauga at 5965 Coopers Avenue (as stated on the mailer) but a call to that phone number (905-712-3384) was not answered.

The KatzGroup actually operates over 500 corporate, banner and franchise drug stores in Canada and the United States.

Why would they be scamming people?

It's very likely not the company doing it, but they ended up being 'used' as a name on the letterhead to make the Mystery Shopper offer seem real.

A further online search for 'Katz Group mystery shopper scam' uncovered a number of complaints with the exact same amounts on the original cheque sent to 'selected' Customer Service Evaluators quoted as well as the two amounts to be sent by wire to two different, and likely non-existent, Mystery Shoppers.

So if you, or anyone you know, receive a legitimate looking letter in the mail with a cheque in the amount of \$3,988.62 and instructions involving a Mystery Shopper program, throw it away.

The News Leader stresses that while there are a variety of good Mystery Shopper programs out there, this is not one of them.
