Council participates in team-building exercise

On January 11th Mayor Fred Thomas and Councillors Frank Armitage, Jason Earle, Marilyn Harkness and Kim Maynard along with senior staff, spent the day in a Governance Review session as part of the new council's training. The facilitator was Gordon McIntosh of the Local Government Leadership Institute.

The workshop provided clarity on council's primary role of representing the public interest through setting strategic direction and decision-making to maintain essential, sustainable services to the community. Council achieves this objective by defining formal policies and allocating finance and resources to the task.

Staff's role is to research and pro-

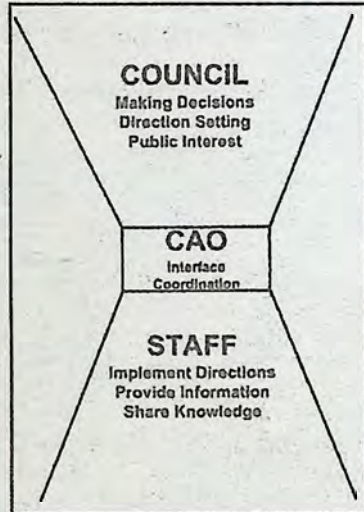
vide alternatives for council's policy setting and then to implement chosen policy in the most effective and efficient fashion possible within the constraints of the legislative system and the resources made available by council.

This "black and white" concept is depicted by an "hour-glass" (see the accompanying diagram). Council's chosen policies, directives and strategies are directed to staff via Princeton's Chief Administrative Officer.

McIntosh illustrated that in the world of "grey" reality, this two-way flow of information is negotiated constantly by the mayor and CAO to resolve issues. He provided some very useful and pragmatic governance strategies and tools for

managing this interface.

His key message is that informal procedures that evolve by default over time can define "policy" as much or more than the documented decisions of council. His techniques will be put into immediate use in Princeton to reduce this tendency.



Mayor Thomas explains, "Council and staff have been inspired by our leadership session on governance roles and responsibilities. The exercise was most beneficial and has left council eager to establish key priorities for our community for the coming term. The framework Mr.

The diagram illustrates the flow of information from Council to Staff for decided policy implementation and the reverse flow to Council for suggested policy alternatives that draw on Staff's knowledge and experience.

McIntosh has provided will assist council greatly in delivering cost effective quality services that Princeton deserves. At the same time, we drew on his expertise to perform a review and update of our formal appointment process. The new policy statement is available for public scrutiny at our website and the table that follows reflects the final consensus outcome for the interim appointments made earlier. These new appointments will be ratified by council at our meeting on February 6, 2012."

Mayor, council and staff will prioritize and focus council activities in February when they participate in a strategic priorities setting session also facilitated by the Local Government Leadership Institute.

DEVELOPMENT OF A PEST MANAGEMENT PLAN

File # 105-949-12/17

Gorman Bros. is developing an Integrated Pest Mgmt Plan under the BC *Integrated Pest Management Act and associated regulations*. The plan will describe a pest management program using Integrated Pest Management techniques.

The purpose of this IPMP is to ensure effective and safe vegetation control within an integrated pest management program on crown land within the Southern Interior Forest Region, Forest Licenses FLA18671 and Forest Permit A18669. This region includes Gorman Bros. operations on crown land and includes but is not limited to the surrounding areas of Pentiction, Kelowna, Keremeos, Summerland and Lumby BC.

Under this IPMP, the following are a combination of selectively applied techniques or methods that will be used alone or in combination with one another to suppress and control competitive vegetation. Our approach to prompt site prep and planting with quality seedlings on the best microsites enhances our efforts towards reducing the number of instances where there will be the need for vegetation control. Preventive measures, minimizing soil disturbance, and early recognition of vegetation problems are essential. Mechanical & Manual applications such as Hand Girdling, Brush and Chain saws, (brushing & weeding), Burning, Site Preparation, biological product Chontrol Peat Paste, Herbicide Application with ground foliar spraying, selective or spot treatment and basal bark. Herbicides proposed for use include, glyphosate (Vantage Forestry / VisionMax), and triclopyr (Garlon RTU / Release XRT).

The proposed effective term of this IPMP is from May 30, 2012 to May 29, 2017.

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced January 30th production results for the fourth quarter of 2011 from the newly opened Copper Mountain mine located near Princeton.

The mine produced 22.2 million pounds of copper, 7,800 ounces of gold, and 161,800 ounces of silver during the four months of operations in 2011. Since start up of production in September 2011 the mine has continued to make one shipment of concentrate per month to the smelters in Japan.

As of December 31, 2011 the mine completed a total of four shipments containing approximately 17.4 million pounds of copper and precious metals generating an estimated \$80 million in gross revenue. On the last day of the year of 2011, the mill treated 35,500 tonnes of ore and achieved in excess of design capacity of 35,000 TPD.

However, this rate has not yet been achieved on a consistent basis as mill throughput continues to be limited due to start-up electrical and mechanical interruptions that have affected the operating time. Mill throughput was initially limited to approximately 20,000 to 25,000 tonnes per day because of grate openings in the SAG mill that were too small.

New modified thicker grates with increased strength and larger openings were ordered and installed by mid December. These new grates provided an increase in throughput to the designed level and the Company believes this limiting fac-

tor appears to be resolved. Operational challenges have continued in the mill, but the Company is optimistic that a 35,000 tonnes per day capacity is achievable on a consistent basis.

Mining activities continue at the rate of approximately 140,000 tonnes per day. The Company's new mining equipment fleet consists of two Komatsu PC 8000 hydraulic shovels, thirteen - 240 ton capacity haul trucks, a Komatsu WA 1200 loader, two Komatsu D375 dozers, and two Caterpillar 16 G graders. In addition, the Company recently purchased 5 used 260 ton haul trucks, a Hitachi EX5500 Hydraulic Shovel with a 27 m³ (35.5 cubic yard) bucket, a Pit Viper 351 Drill, and a Komatsu D375 dozer. The recently acquired equipment will be operational by mid March 2012 and will allow the Company more flexibility in staging of mining activities in the future.

As reported in the Company's third quarter earnings, preproduction mining activities started later than planned in 2010 and as a result of mobile equipment delivery delays. Consequently, the Company is behind plan in waste removal from the Pit 3 area by approximately 9.9 million tonnes. The net result is a timing change in accessing the higher grade material from the lower benches in Pit 3.

What was originally scheduled to be mined in the 2012 year is now scheduled to be mined in part during 2012 and partly during 2013. The net result of the delay in getting to the higher grade material is a reduction in the average ore grade for the cal-

endar year 2012, which is now anticipated to be approximately 0.35% Cu. Under the current mine plan the Company has deferred the mining of ore from the higher grade Oriole pit pending receipt of a mining permit for this deposit which is expected shortly.

Copper Mountain is forecasting its first year of production for 2012 from the newly opened Copper Mountain mine. Production guidance for 2012 for the mine is estimated to be 85 to 90 million pounds of copper, 25,000 to 30,000 ounces of gold, and 580,000 to 600,000 ounces of silver at a site cash cost (incl. mining, milling, maintenance, admin, and engineering) of \$1.15 - \$1.20 per pound of copper net of precious metal credits. (Calculated at \$1,500/oz Au and \$28.50/oz Ag). Total cash costs (incl. site costs, smelting and refining, transportation, interest and taxes) are estimated between \$1.77 - \$1.82 per pound of copper net of precious metal credits.

Mining efficiencies have improved throughout 2011 and management believes further improvements are achievable in 2012. With the addition of the recently acquired equipment the Company is now reviewing its current mine plan in order to further optimize operational activities and maximize copper production.

The Company has continued to experience higher than predicted precious metal grades in the ore being processed. The Company is reviewing the precious metal relationship with copper and will incorporate new information into its review of its current mine plan.

Flip Of The Coyne

My friends and family know that I take history and patriotism pretty seriously. 2012 marks the 200th

2012 DOG LICENCE

2012 Dog licences are available at Town Hall at a cost of \$10.00 for spayed or neutered animals and \$30.00 for non-neutered or unspayed dogs.

Town of Princeton Bylaw No.782 regulates the licencing of dogs, and states that any dog over the age of eight weeks must wear a valid licence for the current year. A fine of \$75.00 will be charged for an unlicensed dog.



CURBSIDE GARBAGE PICKUP

Princeton residents have a two bag/can garbage limit per week. A limit of TWO standard size garbage cans or bags will be allowed each collection week.

Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To The Editor;
Regarding the motorized vehicle usage controversy on the Trans Canada Trail.

The very mention of motorized vehicles using the Trans Canada Trail can stir a heated variety of emotions both for and against it. The fact is, at present, there is absolutely no law against the use of motorized vehicles on the Trail. While the Vermilion Trails Society (stewards of the trail from Brookmere to Osprey Lake) does not officially condone such usage, it's members are committed to supporting the Directions and Laws, as they pertain to the Trail, by the Provincial Government and Trans Canada Trail. As stated, at present, there is no law that bans motorized

usage of the trail. Bill Allinott, the Trail Maintenance In Charge and a Director of the society, on January 11, 2012 spoke with Sgt. Clare of the Princeton R.C.M.P. who confirmed the matter had been looked into extensively and that there is no authority to enforce usage by A.T.V.'s or other motorized vehicles - that includes the portion of the Trail in the Town of Princeton. The usage of helmets, proof of insurance, a maximum speed of 20kph, and crossing of roadways (while riding a vehicle) that intersect with the Trail are enforceable.

Trans-Canada Trail has eliminated funding in other provinces where the Law is permitting and promoting motorized vehicle usage, but to our knowledge there is no official

direction to cut off funding to stewards of the trail that abide by the Laws pertaining to Trail usage in British Columbia, as long as the society is not promoting motorized usage. Until we see an official change of policy from the BC Government and Trans Canada Trail, it is the position of several of our Directors and members that we should maintain our current position with regards to usage, which is neither promoting nor forbidding their use. The recent adoption by the Town of Princeton to designate the urban portion of the trail as non motorized is premature in our opinion. While it's intention was to ensure funding, and possibly deal with other issues, we agree with statements from the Mayor, Fred Thomas, that the decision was made in haste and more homework should have been done. The request to designate the trail non-motorized did not come from the Vermilion Trails Society, and is not the correct way to proceed in the opinion of several of it's members.

The society members are stewards of 113 kilometers of trail which they receive funding for. The VTS section of Trail covers various areas

Cuba: Lessons For Renewal

So did the hotel cleaners, waiters, and others at the bottom end of the wage scale. Nearly everybody walked, because the price of gas and diesel became too high.

True, many people rode bicycles, especially those workers whose jobs depended on mobility, such as delivery people and messengers.

Most people working downtown walked because there was no place to lock up a bicycle where they worked.

Ten years later, Cubans were still on foot, but a big change had taken place in them. There were few obese people, few with high cholesterol and high blood pressure. Cubans were suddenly much healthier than they had been during the years they shared with Soviets.

The change in their health was not entirely due to walking. Cubans were forced to eat a new diet. Most people think of the islands of the Caribbean as some kind of paradise, but the truth is this: there are few livestock kept in the islands, and if you want a wide variety of vegetables, you will have to import them, because most of the arable land in the islands is used for cash crops like sugar cane, tobacco and pineapples.

Cuba had imported nearly all of its vegetables, dairy products and meat. When Cuba became suddenly poorer, the average Cuban could not afford the cost of imported food, at least not on a daily basis. Enter urban farming.

The city of Havana now has urban gardens everywhere and produces half the vegetables the city requires. Cuba has always had fruit trees: now it has more fruit trees. Vegetables and fruit grown close to home are affordable.

The daily diet of the average Cuban relies on beans and rice as staples, enhanced by fish and vegetables. In many ways, this diet is monotonous, but it is

healthy. Local fruit, local fish, local beans, local chickens and local vegetables contribute to a healthy diet that is affordable. Beef or pork at a meal depends on a family's level of income, but it is clear that Cubans are not starving.

As for the rest of what Cubans need in terms of clothing, shelter, furniture, and so on, most of it must be imported. However, people are clever. They learn to make do, make it themselves, re-use, or find substitutes. That is what poor people have done forever.

Cuba has a government health care system, which has cost less since everybody had to walk and lose weight. The health costs of prescription drugs for chronic conditions like heart and circulatory disease has declined in the past 20 years. I don't know about their diabetes rate, but I'd bet it is lower than ours.

This is what a big recession can do for your health, but maybe we should do it ourselves anyway. How about walking to work? I am not suggesting mine workers do so, as it is a long way to the mine, but how about the workers at the sawmill and pellet plant, or the firewood factory? My dad walked to work from Princeton to Allenby for years. He lived to be 87 years old. Walking is good for you!

How about eating a more-reasonable daily diet? We Canadians can afford meat products and probably eat too much meat. We could grow our own vegetables during the summer, and we can grow our own fruit, even if it is crabapples or saskatoons.

As for the rest of what we consume, we can be clever about that, too. We can make it ourselves, make do, re-use or re-purpose, or we can make a point of buying things made close to home. When times are tough, we need to adapt in order to thrive. That is what the Cubans have done.

Area G - Rural Keremeos (Hedley, Olalla) Director's Update:
Board Meeting - January 26
Olalla Water Report:
 So a \$25,000 grant obtained by Elf Christensen was spent on an "Onsite Consulting" report completed in November 2011 and presented at the January 26 RDOS meeting.
 A deficiency of the report is that while recommendations are made with analysis of outcomes, there is no price tag attached. No one single "Action" is clearly outlined or recommended.
 Prior to that January 26 Board meeting, I had a conversation with one of the residents most involved and impacted by the flooding, during which we agreed on the limits of the report and that there was not much it could "do" at this point.
 I took it on good faith that I could represent our opinions at that meeting without any recrimination, since our mutual understanding was based on our both having read the dismally under exciting

\$21,000 analysis.
 At the RDOS meeting, many directors gave input based on their own experience as long-time residents about what "could be done" about a historic cataclysmic event - which was, in the end, nothing. Motion made at that meeting to accept the report.
 After the January 26 meeting, I contacted Liisa (sic) Bloomfield, Engineering Technician with the RDOS, who explained that \$4,000 is left over from the report project. We can either pursue further funding to work on the creek (for an undefined amount of money, since those numbers were not included in the report); or we could use the remaining money to figure out how much it's going to cost to pursue any of the options laid out here.
 Bear with me, folks. I too am furious that this is as far as \$21,000 gets us to solving the problem. So the problem still exists, though it is well identified - and now we must work to get together some MORE money to fix it.

 Gas Tax Dollars
 I was wrong in my belief that the

RDOS Board would be voting on a motion to either allocate the Gas Tax dollars to Trails Development OR a set of pre-determined projects, selected by the Board out of pre-existing submissions for funding (projects submitted 2011 and earlier). I thought this vote was scheduled for after our budget is determined at the end of March 2012. I misunderstood direction which was given in our early January budget meeting by our CAO Bill Newell.
 On January 26, the Electoral Area Directors were asked to vote on a motion which was made in November, 2011 by the PREVIOUS Board, which simply divided the fair share of each Electoral Area's dollars between ONLY TWO Electoral Areas, those of Allan Patton and Tom Siddon.
 Seven RDOS Directors voted against this motion, but it should be noted that those who voted in favour were Directors whose areas WOULD benefit from the Regionally Significant Gas Tax Dollars.
 In debate around the projects which should be funded under this program it was never denied that the projects put forward were of value or need, simply that giving them money was not actually achieving much of REGIONAL

SIGNIFICANCE. A bit like putting money away for your kid's University tuition and the kid cashing it in to go travelling - Yes, the kid will learn a lot by travelling, but that's not really what the money was FOR!!!

Proponents of the Keremeos Reservoir project seem to believe that the taxpayers who will supply the money for their project should just "button up" and do what they are told is necessary - whether those residents think it's needed or not.

From the information which I have been provided by the KID, I believe that the reservoir is long overdue, but much like Hedley's New Fire Truck (debate which ripped the small town apart, disintegrated the Fire Department for a time, and caused a LOT of anger and frustration) there are people who simply cannot afford it and therefore do not support its development. I think to be fair that does need to be taken into consideration when determining any further action.

SIBAC - Southern Interior Beetle Action Coalition (sibac.com)

This coalition of Regional Districts and Tribal Councils extends a great distance, representing folks from as far west as Lillooet, as far north as Thompson-North Okanagan, and as far east as the Kootenay-Boundary region.

There are three "Beetle Action Coalitions" in British Columbia, and SIBAC, which I have been appointed to, will function as a funding body until 2013. The primary focus of SIBAC is to mitigate the damage to communities and economies once

the Pine Beetle has gotten into the forests. It is recognized within the coalition that Pine Beetle is not the only problem, and that general forest health has been and is being impacted by a number of other "bugs", viruses and more.

What is interesting about the Beetle Action Coalition is the emphasis on funding projects which can function as templates to be used with success in other areas. There is a strong momentum to make things happen, document, teach and learn from the projects. The intention is that the funding will have a lasting effect in impacted communities.

Strong support is being given for initiatives which either use beetle-impacted woods or which are "clean energies" or "green projects". Diversification from forestry economies is also encouraged, so projects which emphasize tourism or other economic or social development are given priority.

Please be aware that although I represent the Okanagan-Similkameen, the Board of SIBAC is most interested in supporting initiatives which help out "AT RISK" communities, with the Princeton area having been strongly identified so far.

Do you ever have a day which is so inspirational, so exciting and so thought provoking you have a hard time sleeping that night? Those days are few and far between but for me, but the day I saw Burkhardt Fink's

bio-mass boiler set-up in Enderby BC was absolutely one of them.

I cannot do the project justice in describing it other than to say it is a great example of someone having the courage of conviction to get something done, and doing it well beyond the expectations of anything those around him might have had. Without help and against all odds.

Burkhardt Fink had been asking the Enderby Town Council for permission to lay his heating lines throughout the small industrial park where his machine shop is situated for the last five years, with no real action or support from the Council. Then at the end of April 2011, Enderby Town Council told Fink that he could "do his project" IF he was also able to get the public pool, close to his proposed circuit, heated by the May long weekend - that same year.

Apparently there is nothing a stubborn imaginative Austrian likes better than a challenge. Burkhardt Fink was able to excavate the trenches, plumb the lines, and hook up both the pool and six other industrial users of his low-emission bio-mass burner heating system in three weeks' time. He must have been thinking about it in advance, no? He has hooked up meters and has replaced the heating utility for a number of his friends in the industrial park, as well as halving their heating bills. All this to make a point.

My kind of guy, and thank you Burkhardt Fink. And with a name like that you readers are either never going to remember it or its burned into your brain forever.

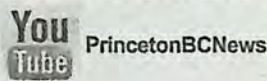
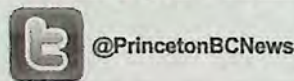
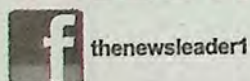

The Okanagan Shuswap District of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is creating its list of registered Equipment for Hire for the fiscal year of 2012/2013, which begins April 1, 2012. This area geographically covers the area from the United States border, east to Osoyoos, west of Princeton and north of Salmon Arm.

All individuals or companies registered in 2011 will have received invitations by mail to re-register hired equipment for 2012. If you have new equipment to be added to your profile, you can register online at www.bcbid.ca or contact the District Office in Kelowna to obtain the appropriate forms. Any individuals who were not registered in 2010/2011, but wish to have equipment listed are hereby invited to contact the District Office, either in person or by phone, to obtain the appropriate registration forms.

Note that while you do not need to have Commercial (Comprehensive) General Liability Insurance or up-to-date WorkSafe BC coverage to register, you will have to meet these requirements prior to working on any ministry projects.

Only owned or lease-to-own equipment is eligible for registration. Equipment may only be registered in one area in any given year. Seniority is not transferable from area to area.

The deadline for new registrations is midnight on Thursday, March 22, 2012. Late registrations will be accepted, but may appear at the bottom of the open list. Note that there is no charge for registering new equipment, or for changing or deleting equipment information already listed.

Snowy Days Enhance Harmful Rays

(NC)—There's nothing more Canadian than braving the winter weather to spend a day outdoors at a local pond or ski hill during the winter months. Whether you're pulling on a pair of ice skates, ski boots or snowshoes, or strapping on a snowboard, most Canadians aren't afraid

to enjoy outdoor activities, despite the chill. What you don't know about the dangers of the winter, sun, however, might leave you cold.

Health Experts say the sun can be damaging and potentially dangerous to your skin during the winter months, with snow and ice reflecting up to 80 per cent of UV radiation—eight times more than water. Canadians need to keep this in mind, as the incidences of melanoma—the most aggressive and deadliest form of skin cancer—has more than tripled over the last 30 years and continues to increase.

Canadian Olympic Ski Cross athlete, Julia Murray, knows firsthand the devastating effects winter sun can have on the skin. In 1990, her father Dave Murray, famous Canadian skier and member of the Crazy Canucks, passed away from a deadly form of skin cancer called melanoma. Her message now to Canadians: winter sun poses a real risk, so protect yourself.

If you have a fair complexion, you are at greater risk of skin cancer. It's important, however, for everyone to protect their skin and eyes during the winter season.

Be sure to apply a full spectrum sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher and reapply it every two hours. In addition, as well as wearing sunglasses or sun protective goggles, health experts advise to check your skin regularly for abnormal, new or changing moles.

Living Past 100

Happiness Leads To Longer Life

If you examine the lives of the increasing number of people who are over the age of 100 years, you will discover they have lived through tragedies and terrible times. You will also discover they have been happy people. This sounds like a contradiction, doesn't it?

Look at what people born in 1910 went through. In their childhood, they probably lived much harder lives than we do now. Most of them did not live with electricity, running water, indoor plumbing, or furnaces. As children, they would have been expected to work at carrying buckets of water or armloads of wood. Chances are they did not ride around in automobiles, but walked or rode a horse.

Before their childhood was over, they had lived through World War I and may have lost family members in the Spanish flu. They probably lost a brother or sister or parent due to the flu, pneumonia or other infection. There were no antibiotics. In their late teens, they entered the beginning of the Great Depression, and by their late twenties, they entered the years of World War II. They probably lost loved ones during those years. They had lived through 15 years of high stress by the time the second big war ended. Five years later, the Korean War began, and the Cold War was in full swing.

That generation of people learned to adapt to rapid change, and to survive. They had to learn all kinds of new skills as technology developed new machines. They had to adapt to new styles of living and new information about the world they lived in. They went from horse and buggy days to a moon landing, from radio to television to computers. There was stress every step of the way. Despite all of the stress, these centenarians have been happy people. How did they manage to stay happy? They learned to enjoy the company of others while being comfortable with themselves. They learned many lessons of survival. They learned to value what is most valuable in our lives: the people we love and the people in our community. They learned to appreciate their lives. They also learned to maintain their physical health through working hard.

There is no doubt medical science has contributed to the increasing number of people living past 100, but it takes something extra on the part of each person to maintain good health and a zest for life. A long life is as much a matter of mind and spirit as good genes, good medicine and a healthy diet.

Cream of Mushroom Soup

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp butter 25 mL
- 2 lb fresh Mushrooms, thinly sliced 900 g
- 1/3 cup flour 75 mL
- 6 cups chicken broth 1.5 L
- 1/2 tsp dried Italian seasoning 2.5 mL
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/4 cup chopped green onions 50 mL
- 2 large egg yolks
- 1/2 cup 5% table cream 125 mL
- salt & pepper to taste
- 2 tbsp minced parsley (optional) 25 mL

In large heavy soup pot, melt butter over medium heat; sauté mushrooms for 5-6 minutes or until most of the moisture from mushrooms has evaporated; sprinkle flour over mushrooms and cook 1 minute. Slowly stir in broth; bring to boil, stirring constantly. Add Italian seasoning, bay leaf and green onions; reduce heat and cover. Simmer 15- 20 minutes. Remove bay leaf. In small bowl whisk egg yolks with cream; stir 1cup (250 mL) hot broth into cream mixture and then return all to saucepan. Heat over low heat until hot, about 5 minutes, do not allow to boil. Using a hand blender (or food processor), blend soup until it has reached the desired consistency. Add 2 tbsp of water if soup is too thick. Add pepper to taste. Serve sprinkled with parsley, if desired.

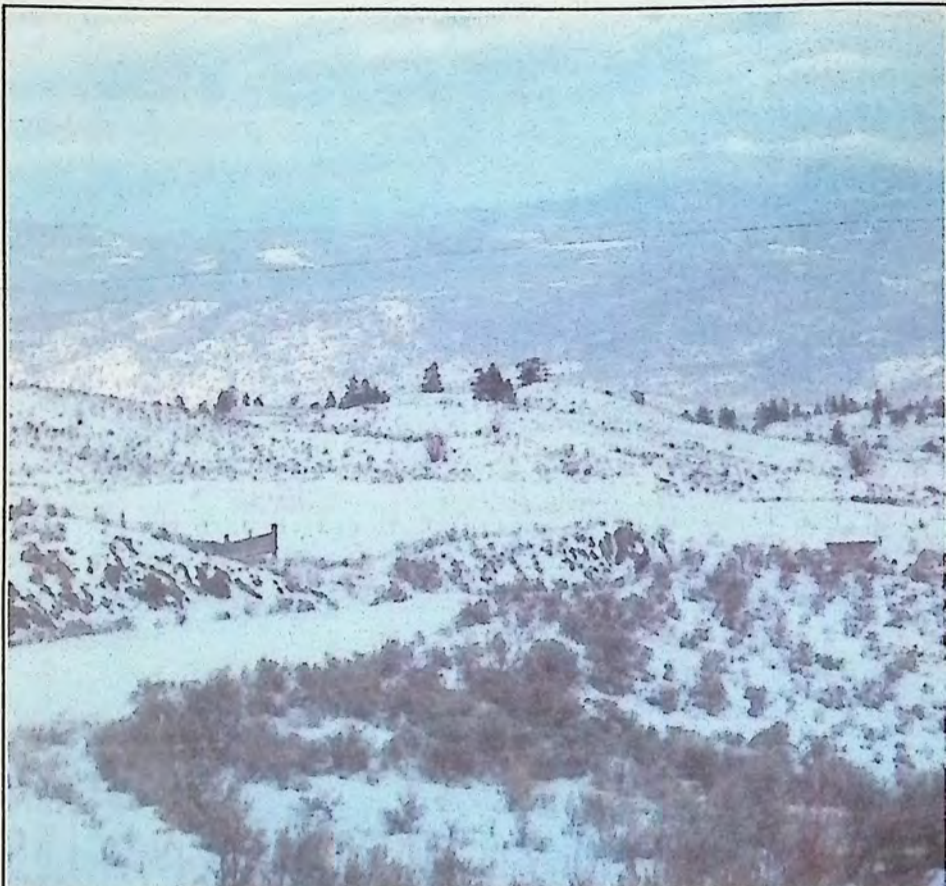

those hobbies, too.

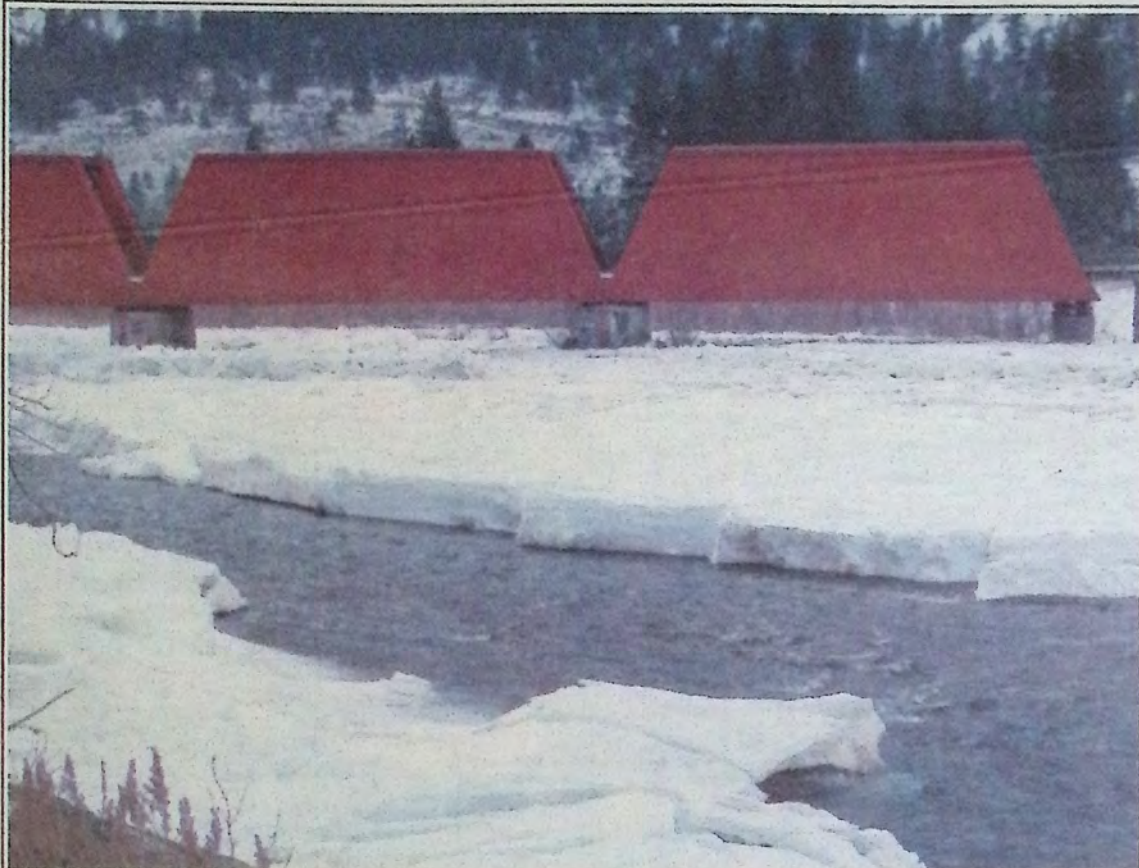

 - Thompson-Nicola Regional District, Town of Princeton, and Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen. The funding that is received from Trans Canada Trail covers all sections of the trail. Until the government of B.C. officially designates the Trans Canada Trail (in B.C.) as non-motorized, the 5 kilometers of trail (approximately) in the Town of Princeton will have no bearing on whether or not the Vermilion Trails Society receives funding.

Indeed, by informing the public of false positions on usage, it can lead to problems such as Mr. Hassell reported about a child being slapped for riding an A.T.V. on the Trail. Current signage present in many locations that show motorized vehicles other than snowmobiles being banned already creates friction.

These signs are posted under the direction of Trans Canada Trail who oversees the trail system. Although they are not reflective of the current law, they mandate they be posted on the trail system. Encouraging the public to police the trail with a mistaken understanding of the Law encourages some vigilantism,

which will only result in well meaning members of the public being charged for trying to enforce a law that doesn't exist. This is a position no one wants to find themselves in, and one we personally would hate to see develop.

Education and common sense is the key to ensuring a harmonious usage of the Trail. When walkers, bike riders, or riders on horseback are present, slow down, pull over, or stop and show some courtesy. Hikers should walk single file when bikers approach so there is room for all to pass safely. Noise levels should be kept to a minimum to allow all users to be able to enjoy the natural wonder of the trail. The trail surface should not be damaged by irresponsible actions. Litter should be placed in trash cans or packed out. Dust should be kept to a minimum.

It is hard enough for our police to try to enforce the current laws to control discourteous drivers on our highways, so enforcing the remote and urban areas of the Trail would be a daunting challenge, especially when we are asking them to enforce a law that doesn't exist. It is even more absurd for us to encourage the

general public to police the trail against those who use it within the letter of the law. It is still important for the general public to observe and report anyone they see vandalizing the trail, or endangering others.

It is our hope that the Town will reconsider this issue and abandon their position until the Government of BC officially changes their designation on the remaining (and much larger) section of the trail outside of the Town of Princeton. We feel this will alleviate a lot of the tension that is being felt by the diverse user groups of the trail, as they will not be given confusing information that leads them to believe the rules of usage are different from what the law actually states.

This letter reflects the opinions of the undersigned in response to the recent information and actions that have resulted in the mistaken perception that the request to ban motorized vehicles came from the Vermilion Trail Society.
