Council hears fire hall report

Fire Chief Eric Gregson attended the March 5 Town Council meeting to report on the past year's activities of the Fire Department.

The volunteer personnel attended 86 calls last year, of which only seven were structural fires. There were 10 grass, bonfire or campfire call-outs, four vehicular fires, 10 calls to assist BC Ambulance Service, two power line incidents, three chimney fires, two fuel spills and two carbon monoxide alarms. There were 16 investigations as a result of complaints, and sundry other minor incidents. One-third of the calls were rural sites.

2011 was not a busy year when compared with other years, in terms of calls. Volunteer fire department members were able to put in 687 hours of practice and several attended specialized training courses. The BC Fire Code inspection program is going well.

When an application is made to construct or renovate a building, the fire inspection is part of the process.

Personnel in the Fire Department participated in a number of community activities: the air show, Fall Fair, Racing Days parade, Christmas hamper drive, the "Get Out Alive" program, school education programs, and the community Halloween party.

Local volunteers held a retirement party for Tony Kirkland, who put in 32 years of volunteer service with the Fire Department, and is now living in his home town, Sechelt.

Council approved the officers elected for 2012. They are: Fire Chief Eric Gregson, Assistant Chief/Training Officer Rob Banks, Captains Dan Pippin, John Laursen and Kevin Sill, Lieutenants Ed Atkinson and Frank Currie, and Secretary Treasurer Rob Hicks.

Committee delivers cultural plan

On Thursday March 1st the Princeton Cultural Plan Implementation Committee met for the first time since the plan was accepted at the end of March 2011. In attendance were Councillor Marilyn Harness, Del Hall President of the Princeton Arts Council, Marjorie Holland representing the Princeton Arts Council Board, Robin Lowe Manager of the Princeton & District Museum & Archives, Nadine McEwen Princeton Community Recreation & Cultural Coordinator, Terry Malanchuk Princeton Rock & Fossil Club, Lyle Thomas Princeton Leisure Services Manager and the

facilitator was Vicky Jones.

The meeting was held to review what has already been achieved in the past year and to identify the actions to focus on in 2012.

The Princeton Cultural Plan was developed through almost a year of research and community consultation to identify the key arts, culture and heritage issues within Princeton and Area H. The aim of the accompanying implementation plan was to ensure that the plans recommendations were put into action to achieve goals important for the development of the local community.

The five goals identified to address

these key issues were to: increase visibility of arts and culture in Princeton; ensure sustainable events and organizations; showcase and celebrate our community heritage; reinforce arts, culture and heritage's importance to the growth and appeal of Princeton; and to improve inclusivity and accessibility.

Over the last year the community has begun a number of the plan's identified actions with some of the key actions detailed here. Headway was made in improving organization's skills and the sharing of resources through two events in Fall 2011. In September ArtsBC hosted their first Sustainability Seminar event in Princeton, which looked at organizational structure, capacity and forward planning. This resulted in a number of organizations, including the Museum, holding their own Strategic Planning sessions. As

Regional District explains budget

Warren Everton, Finance Manager for Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, attended the March 5 Town Council meeting to outline the budget for 2012. He briefly described the process leading to the March 31 annual deadline. The Regional Health budget is part of the process.

The good news is this: the costs are down this year, due to some changes in how the costs are allocated. Some savings were generated by moving 911 dispatch to Kelowna, others were made through moving electoral administration costs to the electoral area. The total budget is \$52,510,160.

The Regional Health budget is

\$7,656,000, up slightly from last year. Regional Health funds 40 percent of capital projects in regional district.

Princeton General Hospital receives part of this funding when capital projects are undertaken. Interior Health plans to expand the regional hospital in Penticton by 2020 and some of the increase is in the form of funds being reserved for that expansion.

Regional District will requisition the Town of Princeton \$151,359 for 2012. Of this amount, \$102,551 is the one-third share paid by the Town. Area H ratepayers pay 2/3 of the cost of the arena.

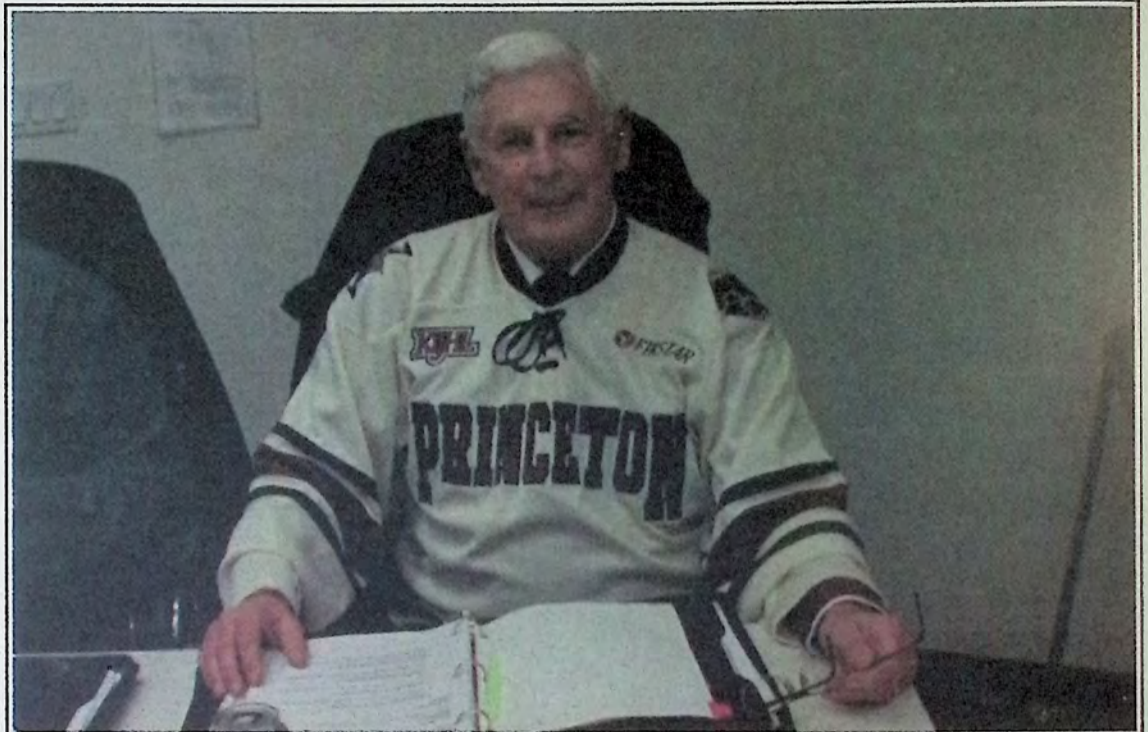
The resolution by Town Council to stop the erosion of services in rural areas was unanimously endorsed by Regional District. The resolution will continue to climb the government ladder.

Mayor Thomas said he would like to see all of the people who work in the Princeton area living in the Princeton area.

The mayor is interested in the Lower Similkameen Indian Band's revival of a plan for a grasslands national park in the area between the Similkameen Valley and the Okanagan Valley near Osoyoos. There appears to be more support for this proposed park.

Councillor Kim Maynard displayed paper replicas of bright green and white signs slated to go up near the gateway to the TransCanada Trail showing people where the KVR section of the trail begins.

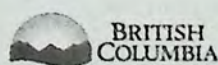

Flip Of The Coyne

When I was in university my economics professor (a very conservative free market type of guy) told us all that the role of government was to protect citizens and business from foreign threats. Being a diehard free market supporter, he didn't believe the government should be involved in much else. My question is this: Shouldn't our government block Monsanto and other biotech giants who threaten, not only the health of the people of Canada, but our entire agricultural sector?

A recent study in Germany has found Glyphosate in urine samples that were 5 to 20 times the allowable limit in drinking water. What is Glyphosate? It is a carcinogenic chemical used in Monsanto's Roundup weed killer. The same chemical has been discovered in ground water.

What's the big deal? A little chemical is making its way into the water system, but the problem is that there are links between this chemical and mental illness, infertility and a number of other issues.

In agriculture it is said to create superweeds that are resistant to the product and is taking over farmland. Not to only pick on Roundup there is another weed killer called Atrazine that is used regularly in Canada. This compound has been found to castrate male amphibians. One in ten frogs tested in the lab actually turned into females! Atrazine contaminates drinking water.

Men who are exposed have a low sperm count and women have irregular menstrual cycles and low levels of estrogen. I don't think I need to tell you what this equates to.

The two examples above are just two of many. The Canadian government has allowed these large chemical and biotech companies access to our markets. We still do not know the full environmental and health impact of genetically modified crops.

When Roundup first came on the market we were told it was safe and today we know it isn't. What are the side effects of genetically altered sugar beets, the sugar that is used most in Canada, or corn, soy, and canola? Those 4 crops that are the only 4 currently grown in Canada for public consumption are in nearly every processed product on the shelf. Every box of cereal has sugar in it. That sugar comes from genetically engineered sugar beets. It is scary when you read the ingredients on the side of a package of processed food. They all nearly have sugar, soy or corn in them.

If the government is supposed to

be for the people and its primary role is one of protecting the citizens within the national boundaries, shouldn't Ottawa be saying no more to these companies and their toxic chemicals and genetically engineered seeds? Shouldn't the government be fighting to keep the public safe? I think so, but unfortunately they aren't. They are allowing more and more research and they may be allowing even more genetically engineered crops to be grown in Canada.

Plants that have fish proteins in them, these " Frankenfoods " could pose an even larger threat to our health than the chemicals they spray on them. Canada should follow the lead of European countries that are banning these chemicals and the genetically modified seeds. Until we know there will be no adverse effect on our food system, we cannot allow the contamination for the sake of corporate profits.

The rest of the money requisitioned from the Town goes to cover other shared services such as 911 dispatch and weed and pest control, fire protection and landfill costs.

The tax rate works out to be about 37 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Everton said the value of the assessment of Area H has gone up about 10 percent, mostly due to the development of the mine.

Life After Death: The Japan Quake

This week marks the anniversary of the terrible 8.9 earthquake and tsunami that hit Fukushima prefecture in Japan and set off the explosions in the Dai-ichi nuclear power plant. The tsunami that followed the quake killed more than 15,000 people outright and a combination of tsunami destruction and radiation from the power plant displaced 340,000 people.

Scientists are now saying the effects of the radiation were not so serious physically for most people, but the mental stress compounded with the stress of being forced from their homes has had a far more serious immediate health effect. Heart attacks, depression and suicides escalated rapidly. Being forced to leave their homes and worrying about radiation poisoning was bad enough for their health, but among those 340,000 displaced people were those who lost not only their homes, but their loved ones. In some cases, only one member of a family was left. Many chose to commit suicide rather than live on without a home or family.

The people who died of heart attacks did not die immediately. They died from the ongoing stress of discovering family members, friends and neighbours were gone. They died from being placed in the stressful situation of emergency shelters, and they died from worry about radiation exposure. Many suffered from the loss of their livelihoods.

Imagine trying to make a life for yourself when you have lost your home, your family, your friends and neighbours, and your job. In one hour, those who lived through the tsunami had their lives changed forever, and for the majority, it changed for the worse.

The ongoing worry about radiation affected not only the people of Japan, but all of the people in the North Pacific. Clouds of radioactive particles swept across the ocean to our shores, then across Canada and particularly across the United States. Little is said officially about the contamination of seafood, radioactive rain, and the increase in infant deaths throughout North America following the nuclear power plant fire and meltdown. Little is said about the huge mass of radioactive flotsam gradually moving toward the coast of North America, but it is there and we will have to face it one day, probably this year. It is a mass covering a portion of the ocean as big as the island of Manhattan.

The Japanese assessed what went wrong, and have shut down most of the nuclear power plants on their island. They would rather do with less electricity than deal with another nuclear disaster. Some people have shrugged it off as a natural disaster, but the Japanese realized it was really a man-made disaster because they are in a place prone to having earthquakes and tsunamis, which are bad enough without adding radioactive contamination.

At the time the Japan disaster was in the works, there were plans for several more nuclear power plants to be constructed around the world, but most of those plans have been shelved for the time being. People in many nations objected strongly to the idea of building more nuclear power plants. The plans for an additional nuclear power plant in Ontario may go ahead, but not quickly, as there is another concern in southern Ontario. It is part of the New Madrid fault line, and there have been numerous small quakes

along that line during the past year. Just a month ago, the United States underwent an emergency exercise in a number of states to refresh emergency systems in case of a major quake on the New Madrid fault.

The disaster in Japan was not the only nuclear scare we had last spring. Two nuclear power plants in the American Midwest were in danger of being inundated by floodwaters in the upper Missouri River system as an unusually deep runoff occurred due to heavy snowfalls in the Rockies, particularly in the Yellowstone area which feeds the Missouri River. This situation could occur again this year.

As we go through this year and next, we continue the solar system anomaly of passing through a particular place in the galaxy of which the Mayans warned. They warned we are going to have to stop separating ourselves from each other and we are going to have to work together. They do warn there will be earth changes. Right now, we are in the midst of one of the most serious earthquake swarms since the 1970's. There are more than 20 volcanoes blowing off steam at the same time and the number just keeps growing. Two new volcanoes have formed, one in the Atlantic and one in the Red Sea. There are areas of the world where earthquakes have become a daily event. Some places experience just ongoing mild tremors.

For others, the quakes are far more noticeable. In Indonesia, big quakes and volcanic eruptions have become weekly events. Major earthquakes have hit the seas circling Antarctica, and there have been numerous minor quakes circling the Arctic Ocean. Fortunately, most of this activity has occurred where there are no nuclear power plants.

As we look back at Japan's big quake and its aftermath, it marks the beginning of our awakening to the dangers of what we build. Scientists say the seismic effects of that big quake will continue to be felt through this year and possibly next year. That quake rocked the planet on its axis and moved Japan 14 feet closer to us, all in a few minutes, but the echo of that massive quake continues in seismic activity throughout the planet. We need to be aware of what we build, where we build it, and where we live.

In the middle of February, I travelled to Kelowna for another meeting of SIBAC. The first night of the meeting was a chance to meet other members from as far as Lillooet, Merritt and Bralorne who had not been at the January meeting. We had a presentation from a past CBC Radio reporter who talked about communication strategies and recommended ways for the group to improve its dialogue with both public and government officials.

The second day was devoted to reviewing grant applications, debriefing the earlier workshop, and brainstorming about the most effective ways to work with the province to ensure that the "slow-moving natural disaster" of beetle kill does not completely decimate rural British Columbia.

- RCMP and Fire Dispatch visits in Kelowna

Because I was already in Kelowna, and unable to attend a regularly scheduled tour of the RCMP and Fire Dispatch centres scheduled for later in the week, I made arrangements to tour these facilities on my own. I was warmly received and

was amazed to see how calm and collected the people in these facilities were while working with very high-stress circumstances of accidents, injuries, crime and fire.

While the staff at the Dispatch centres showed me their computerized systems, we discussed various problems along Highway #3 due to irregularities in the numbering system, as well as poor signage and high accident locations, often due to out-of-towners driving in a menacing way in semi-residential areas.

I have put together a simple map for Dispatch, and worked with them to come up with some easily implemented strategies to enable faster response times in emergency situations. I am also working with the Ministry of Transportation to address a number of issues respecting signage which impact public safety.

As these strategies become a part of the daily routine for Dispatch, we will work toward my campaign promise to improve our Emergency Services by creating a more integrated system.

- Highway numbering irregularities

Long time Similkameen residents probably already know there is "something funny" about the numbering along Highway #3, especially close to the town of Hedley. Numbers travelling east from Princeton are by kilometre, so that an address 10km from Princeton is continued on next page

1000 Highway #3. This makes sense.

Alternatively, the numbers traveling west from Keremeos also increase in size, but they are not measured from Keremeos. These highway addresses are sequential, as one would expect; however, as a traveler passes Hedley going west, the numbers continue to rise to 6247 Highway #3 UNTIL they reach the Stirling Creek Bridge. Here is where it "gets funny." At the bridge, the addresses change direction, and a traveler will be confronted with addresses numbering in the 3000's.

So a driver coming from Princeton would be rightfully confused if they noticed addresses around Stirling Creek Ranch were around 3500 and then they travelled less than a kilometer and found addresses in the 6200 range. There is no indication that the bridge is where the "switch"

occurs. This is an issue for new RCMP, rookie ambulance drivers, and an ever-changing volunteer rescue force out of ALL our highway communities, from Keremeos to Hedley to Princeton.

You residents can do your part to help us find you by specifying "east" or "west" of Hedley. Remember that Dispatch is in Kelowna and they are NOT familiar with this stretch of highway. Also remember that Highway #3 is a long highway, with recurring instances of the SAME number. There are probably as many as fifteen locations numbered "3000 Highway #3" between here and the Crow's Nest Pass.

- Fortis Korp

Fortis has begun its Environmental Assessment process with both the Provincial and Federal government. A working group has been established with an eye to representation

by all the stakeholders in the region affected by this proposed natural gas pipeline. Once the government is satisfied that all of the stakeholders identified by the proposed project outline have been considered, the pipeline could be underway within a year's time. Detailed maps and information packages have been left at the OAPO hall in Hedley for the month of March. Details on a Keremeos location TBA.

- SILGA

The Southern Interior Local Government Association is holding its AGM in Revelstoke from April 26-28. This organization works to promote the needs of the citizens throughout the Southern Interior, which differ from the needs of the citizens of the Lower Mainland, at the Conference held in September by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

These conferences are where ordi-

nary people representing you come together and work out strategies for approaching our provincial leaders about the things you have told us matter.

It is with great humility I say that I would not be able to pull off the work I am doing without all of your help. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

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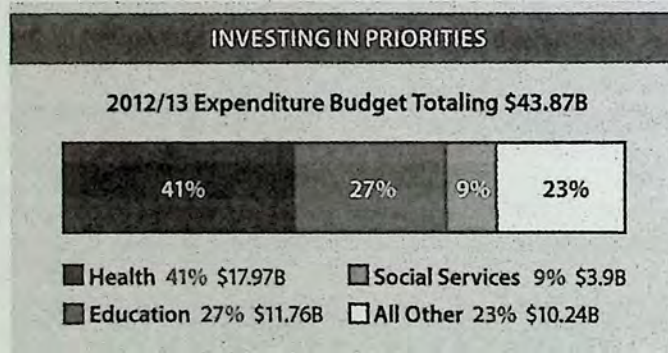

Living Past 100

How To Avoid Cataracts

Cataracts are proteins that accumulate inside the lenses of your eyes. Cataracts impair vision. When you cannot see properly, there are a lot of things you cannot do.

Two ways to avoid cataracts are 1. Wear sunglasses and 2. Do not smoke.

There is a third way to avoid cataracts: eat fruits and vegetables in abundance. There is a substance in most fruits and vegetables that prevent cataracts. These substances are called carotenoids. Yes, the word is related to carrots. It is an old wives' tale that carrots improve vision, but like many old wives' tales, it is true, because carotenoids are found in carrots.

Carrots are not the best source of what is good for vision. Spinach, kale and broccoli are even better. These dark green leafy vegetables contain carotenoids called lutein and zeaxanthin, two substances that concentrate in the fluids in your eyes, where the cataracts will form.

Fruits and bell peppers contain large amounts of Vitamin C which also plays a role in preventing the formation of cataracts. Vitamin E, found in almonds, whole grains and mangoes, helps prevent cataracts. Researchers at Harvard University found that those people with the highest amount of Vitamin E in their eyes were less likely to develop cataracts.

Another good source of protection from cataracts are foods you would not expect on this list. Eating milk, yogurt and chicken helps prevent the formation of cataracts. These foods contain a B vitamin called riboflavin. The University of New York researchers found that people who get the most riboflavin in their daily diets are less inclined to develop cataracts. Your body uses riboflavin to produce glutathione, a substance that fights free radicals that make your eyes more likely to form cataracts.

Why worry about cataracts in your eyes? First, just because surgery can now correct eyes affected by cataracts does not mean you will not go through a period of vision loss. Cataract surgery is not done until vision loss is serious. Second, this surgery will cost you thousands of dollars, as well as the inconvenience of traveling to a center where the surgery is done, and going through a period of time when you must be very careful after the surgery.

Posse win despite suspensions

A total of five Princeton Posse players, plus their Coach, were assessed suspensions following a ten person fight in the final seconds of Game 7 Sunday, March 4th against Penticton Lakers.

Turkey and Roasted Beet Salad

Ingredients:

- 3-4 medium beets, washed well, ends trimmed
- 1 tsp (5 mL) canola oil
- 1 small red onion, diced
- 1 large avocado, diced
- 1 lb (500 g) cooked turkey breast, chopped
- 4 cups (1 L) arugula
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) crumbled reduced-fat Feta cheese
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) walnuts (optional)

Raspberry Vinaigrette:

- 3 Tbsp (45 mL) canola oil
- 3 Tbsp (45 mL) balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tbsp (25 mL) raspberry jam
- 1 Tbsp (15 mL) lemon juice
- 1 tsp (5 mL) Dijon mustard
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) salt
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) fresh ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 400°F/200°C. Spray baking sheet with cooking spray. Rub beets with 1 tsp (5 mL) canola oil, place on baking sheet and roast until tender (30-60 minutes). Let beets cool; slip off skins and cut beets into bite-sized chunks. Set aside. Mix salad ingredients in large bowl.

Raspberry Vinaigrette: Combine dressing ingredients in medium bowl and whisk until jam is dissolved and dressing is smooth. Pour over mixed salad and serve.

Farm workers campground is no more

There will be no farm workers' campground in the South Similkameen this year. George Bush, Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen Area B Rep advised that there is little support for it: "At this time there is no interest to have a campground in Cawston either from the farmers or from the Community. We are working on a plan to educate and promote farm camping and facilities at each farm."

Director Bush will instead work with farmers, fellow members of the RDOS Board and MLA John Slater to address the need for adequate accommodation for seasonal workers.

Most farms that employ workers throughout the growing and picking season have accommodations avail-

able for their workers. In fact, farms who wish to bring in foreign workers from Mexico, for example, must be approved by government inspectors before the foreign workers will be brought in.

Small farms and small orchards that only need workers intermittently are less likely to provide adequate accommodation for seasonal workers. Short-term rental facilities in the summer are hard to find because motels and hotels cater to summer travelers. The result is that some domestic workers arrive in the valley and find no place to stay or camp. In addition, drifters who enjoy the free-living lifestyle of farm workers are drawn to the valley for the fun.

In and near Keremeos, the result was an undesirable mix of indifferent and inconsiderate domestic migrants

who contributed little to the wholesome Similkameen landscape and little to the local economy. Efforts at providing a formal campground for the migrant workers ended with bad feelings. On one side were the seasonal workers and transients, on the other side were residents and those whose efforts at pitching in for the farm workers was unappreciated. At the end of the 2011 farm season, the campground originally located in Area G just east of the Village of Keremeos was permanently dismantled.

Director Bush is also concerned about the loss of the WorkZone facility in Keremeos. The Keremeos WorkZone is slated to close at the end of March. WorkZones began a few years ago as a federal initiative and became part of the Canada-

British Columbia Labour Market Development Agreement in February of 2008. Federal funding from the Canada-British Columbia Labour Market Development Agreement runs out March 31, 2014.

Changes in the funding allocations in each region resulted in Keremeos becoming a low priority for an ESC (employment service centre). In fact, when the YMCA-YWCA of the Central Okanagan submitted what would be the winning proposal to operate employment services in the Okanagan and Similkameen valleys, they did not even visit the Keremeos WorkZone. Instead, under the new program called "Employment Program for British Columbia", Summerland, Penticton and Princeton are slated for full ESC's. There will be no employment ser-

vices office in the Lower Similkameen.

For prospective employees, computers to access the job bank and physical bulletin boards where notices are posted will be available in Penticton instead of Keremeos. For seasonal workers relying on hitch-hiking to get to the nearest employment centre, the round trip might well be a one-day task.

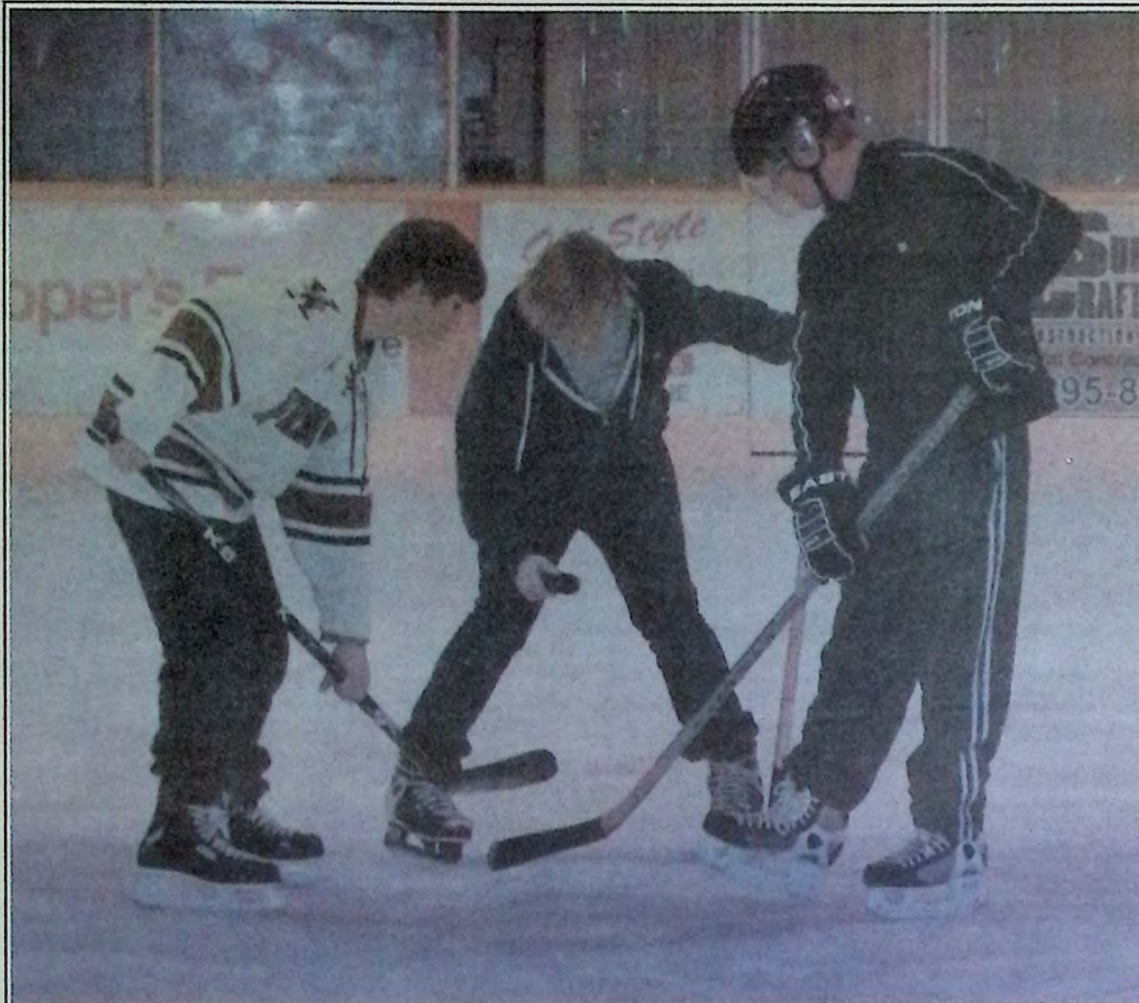
This year's level of employment service for the Lower Similkameen is currently unknown. It is possible that satellite services for Cawston will be provided out of Oliver, and satellite services for Keremeos will be provided out of Penticton. If you have comments or input relating to the farm workers or employment services, Director George Bush would like to hear from you.

Committee delivers cultural plan

..... continued from Front Page an extension of this 'Let's Talk', a dinner and meeting organized by the Town of Princeton and the Princeton Arts Council, took place in October. This yearly event was established to bring community organizations together to discuss their events, prevent duplication, share skills and develop a community calendar for the year.

Progress has been made on increasing the visibility of the arts in Princeton through the improvement of websites for the Town of Princeton, Princeton Arts Council and the Princeton & District Museum & Archives. A joint initiative between the Town of Princeton and community organizations has also begun to develop branded promotional materials including a new Museum leaflet and an arts and culture pamphlet including a public art map, which will be out in the Spring. Important progress was also made last year in developing partnerships within the community, including the relationship established with the Upper Similkameen Band. This relationship continued throughout the year and has resulted in the second annual Upper Similkameen Spirit Festival taking place this

April.

The group has identified several items to focus on in 2012 including the continuation of an art in public places program, improving existing marketing materials, expanding accessible programming and developing resources to help organizations with their succession planning. The Princeton Community Arts Council will continue to lead the process by overseeing the implementation.

The planning process was made possible by funding from 2010 Legacies Now's Creative Communities program, Princeton Community Arts Council, the Town of Princeton and the Regional District of the Okanagan-Similkameen who see the cultural framework as an important part of Princeton's plan for the future.

Curling Club reports to Council

Shirley Campbell and Lloyd Wilson attended the March 5 Town Council meeting to report on the activities of 82 year old Princeton Curling Club. The club has been working on a seven year plan, and this year purchased a \$20,000 dehumidifier for the rinks. The ice is affected by too much humidity, and when the club hosts bonspiels, visitors come because the ice is so good.

The club is hosting three adult bonspiels this winter in addition to regular season play. There is a strong junior program in place in addition to adult curling. The juniors learn

some of the moves at school then go to the rinks and enter the sport.

All of the work of maintaining the building and the ice is done by volunteers. The building is in operation from the autumn through to July. When the curling season is over, the ice is maintained to provide a storage area for seeding trees until tree planting season is past. Volunteers put in about 1,000 hours of work each year.

The present goal is to increase club membership, have good signage in place and improve the appearance of the property.

Town approves air show budget

Town Council gave approval on March 5 for a \$20,000 budget for the fifth annual Princeton Air Show. The Town will spend \$17,500 and Area H will contribute \$2,500. The Town will be looking for sponsors to help cover the costs of the air show.

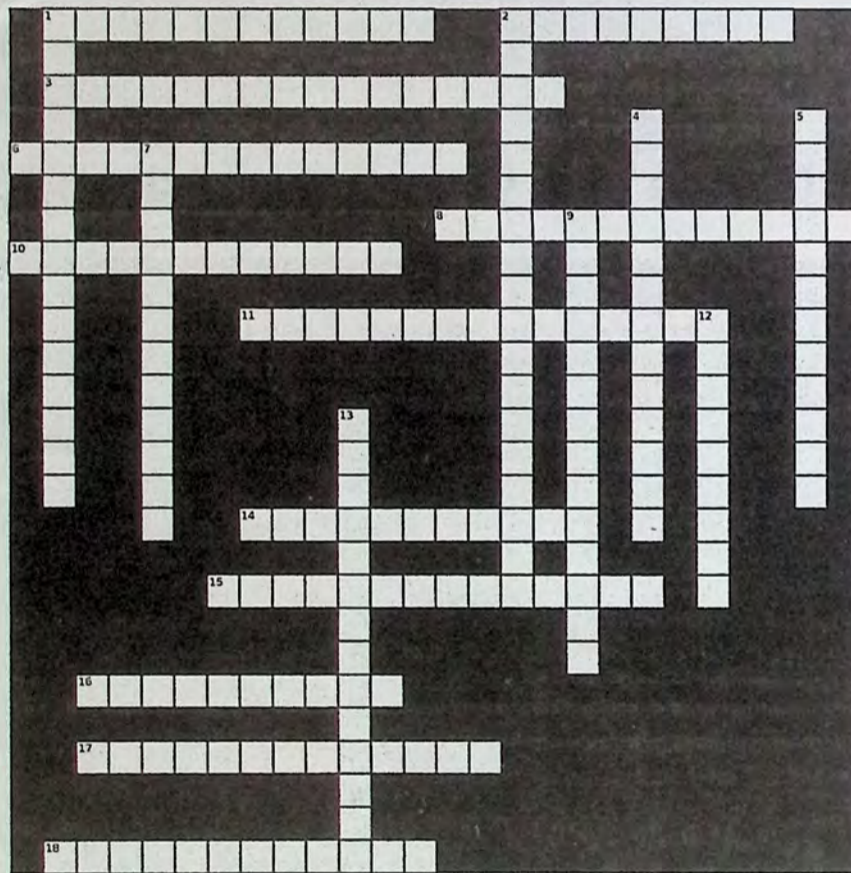
A T-33 World War II fighter jet is being mounted at the entrance to the airport at a minimal cost, \$750, as
