Valley looks at tourism

The March 14 tourism workshop sponsored by Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) brought together 35 people, the largest workshop Thompson Okanagan Tourist Association has ever held. Joan McMurray of Keremeos welcomed everyone to the workshop. She represented the funding body, SVPS and its Tourism Advisory Council. She introduced the people facilitating the workshop: Laura Plant,

Simone Carlisle-Smith and Steve Nichol. After a welcoming prayer from a First Nations participant, the work began. There were so many tips on how to successfully market tourism that it would take a lot of newspaper space to outline all of them. Among the 35 in attendance, there were organizations and businesses, but there were some businesses not represented. Although they were invited, the accommodation businesses, service stations, fruit stand owners, events

organizers, organic farmers, restaurants and resorts were not in attendance, despite the fact that they benefit most from increased tourist numbers. The goal of the workshop held at Snazist Centre in Hedley was to put together a marketing plan for the entire Similkameen Valley. One of the first problems identified was that tourists do not know where the Similkameen Valley is located. They pass through it, but few are aware of the Similkameen Valley, let alone its attractions. The valley stretches from Manning Park to the international border, but most tourists see it as merely a corridor from Hope to the Okanagan. Suggestions about raising the awareness of "Similkameen"

included every business and community incorporating the words "in the Similkameen Valley" as part of their identity. For example, the Town of Princeton could put up signage saying "Welcome to Princeton, in the Similkameen Valley" or a business could say "X Cafe, Princeton, in the Similkameen Valley". Putting a brand label on the valley was difficult to pin down, but it is

one of the first steps to marketing. Let me give an example. When we think of Nova Scotia, we think Confederation or Anne of Green Gables. When we think of Virginia, it is ham, and Georgia is peaches, Tennessee is country music, and Kentucky is blue grass and horse racing. Those places are successfully branded. We need to think of that continued on Page 22

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Urban deer workshop attracts council

A major conference dealing with urban wildlife problems has attracted the attention of Princeton's Town Council. At the strategic Council meeting held March 12, Council agreed to send Councillor Jason Earle and Recreation Director Lyle Thomas to Cranbrook in mid April to attend the two-day conference.

Two days may seem a long time to discuss wildlife problems in urban areas, but there are communities having problems with bears, bats,

geese, two species of deer, coyotes, rabbits and elk, although raccoons were on the list of wildlife with the potential to cause problems. There was no mention of marmots or cougar as urban problems.

One of the problems with all of the urban wildlife is a people problem: people who feed wildlife continue to attract the wildlife to their downtown and residential areas. Fences will be mentioned and other means of deterring wildlife.

Flip Of The Coyne

I am pretty passionate about our food system. I write about it, I garden, and from time to time I speak about it. When I read about a substance called pink slime that is being added to hamburger in the United States I just about got sick.

Pink slime is a meat by-product (if you can actually call it that) from all the stuff that a butcher would normally toss out or turn into dog food. It contains all sorts of nasty things like salmonella and E. coli, the things that make you really sick.

The big food processing companies have come up with a way to turn that waste that would have gone to make cheap dog food and turn it into food for people. They grind it up and then they add an ammonia and water solution to wash it, killing anything

that might be living. Then it is drained and minced.

In the United States they are allowed to add up to 15% of this substance to any sort of hamburger product. This product is so scary that people who know what this stuff really is won't eat store bought hamburger anymore. I need to make one thing clear. This product is not currently used in Canada so make sure the beef you buy is Canadian beef.

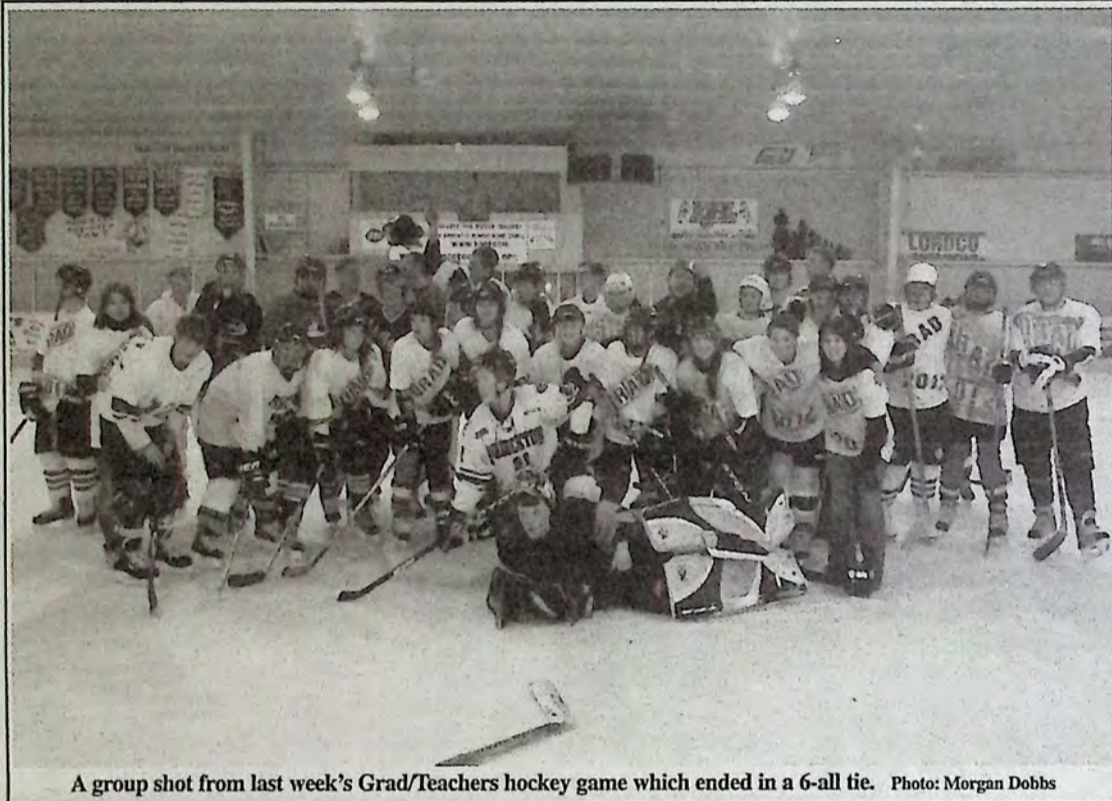
Just because we don't use pink slime in our meat does not mean that our food supply is perfect. Right now we have a recall on cheap no-named hamburger patties because of E. coli. Our food system isn't even our food system anymore. We are just a small part of a global system a system that is under more and more stress all the time to produce more for less.

The need to produce more and cheaper has allowed companies like Monsanto and Dow to supply the agricultural industry with chemical fertilizers that allow farmers to keep farming mono culture crops over and over again without having to worry about soil depletion since all you need to do is add more fertilizer. They have also made it cheaper to

deal with weeds, fungus and other diseases and problems with chemical sprays. It turns out there are negative effects to adding all those petroleum based chemicals to the fields that eventually leech into the water table below.

Monsanto is not only a chemical company. They also create genetically engineered seeds. In the United States Monsanto has been given the green light on a multi-state experiment that will stretch from South Dakota to Texas. They will be planting a new type of corn that is supposed to do better in drier climates and areas that corn normally wouldn't grow. So what happens if these plants cross pollinate with non-genetically modified corn? Besides Monsanto suing those farmers for patent infringement it could reshape the entire face of corn in the United States and if it changes there it will only be a matter of time before it changes across the world.

We still do not know what the effects on the human population these genetically engineered crops will have and most of us don't even know when we are eating these foods because they don't need to be labeled.

To The Editor;

I recently received a brochure, LIVING WITH URBAN DEER, from the Town of Princeton, created at taxpayers' expense, I expect. If it wasn't such an affront to many residents of Princeton, I would say it is laughable. I am incredulous that Council would now present this approach for such longstanding concerns of the citizens of Princeton. I find this yet another way for Town Council to defer taking the much needed action to deal with the continuing problems of 'urban deer'. Was this a new problem, I could be inclined to patiently wait for a forthcoming recommendation.

However, this issue has been noted for several years, perhaps as many as six or more. How could Council have the audacity to only now offer that it is "considering the creation of an Urban Deer Management Advisory Committee" to "examine the issues..." and "develop recom-

mendations" for the "creation of an Urban Deer Management Strategy?" This suggests past negligence and the proposed process will result in virtually no timely action at all. To delay progress further, volunteers are asked to serve on the committee — more delays — when there has been much discussion already and the most acceptable options have already been proffered. This bureaucratic sequence just postpones the accomplishment of needed results.

It is my understanding that there was a councilor appointed several months ago to spearhead, investigate and make recommendations on appropriate solutions to reduce the number of deer in the town. The municipal election subsequently intervened and it has become evident that there has been no meaningful progress since. Also, I am not aware that there was ever any publicly disseminated information on the matter. It seems that there

has been little past political will to give priority to the concerns of many of our townspeople.

I wonder whether the current council would be in place had the people known how Council would apply itself to the task since the All Candidates meeting. Indeed one of the mayoral candidates, now the sitting mayor, had shown willingness at that time to address the issue. Is this the best we can expect from our new Council?

I also note the use of "Urban" as if we could draw a line around Princeton and then minimize any deer concerns that might even be a metre outside of the line. Town residents must travel to many locations outside Town limits, and no doubt deer move from within town limits to areas beyond the borders. There are numerous incidents involving deer and vehicles on roads and highways outside of Town limits. It also can be expected that deer will move from outside of the town to within Princeton to create problems. We cannot think of urban deer in isolation, separating them from those in the extended area. We may need to work with other government jurisdictions, if necessary, to resolve the issues and to enact suitable measures.

There are those who do not want to see any action taken against the deer for such reasons as that they

Citizens Sue For Interest-Free Loans

There is a lawsuit in Federal Court demanding that the Bank of Canada start issuing interest-free loans to municipalities, provinces and the federal government. This lawsuit has received almost no press. The lawsuit was filed on December 12, 2011, and demands that the original purpose of the Bank of Canada be restored. Two elderly citizens, William Krehm and Ann Emmett, represented by their lawyer, Rocco Galati, filed the suit. William Krehm is somewhat of an expert on the role of the Bank of Canada, having written many papers, articles and books on the Bank of Canada.

The Bank of Canada was founded in 1935. Until it was founded, Canada had no central bank. Until then, the Treasury Board of Canada dealt only with private banks and had no responsibility to ensure that advances made to the private banks were sufficient to meet the needs of Canada's economy. Due to the problems exposed during the Great Depression, the Bank of Canada was established "to regulate credit and currency in the best interests of the economic life of the nation, to control and protect the external value of the national monetary unit and to mitigate by its influence fluctuations in the general level of production, trade, prices and employment, so far as may be possible within the scope of monetary action, and generally to promote the economic and financial welfare of the Dominion...."

Originally, the Bank of Canada was owned by shareholders, but the shares were purchased by the federal government in 1938. From that time forward, the Bank of Canada was used to the benefit of the nation by the federal government.

The lawsuit launched by Krehm and Emmett points out the problems in today's world in which government borrowing is from private banks. The argument presented in favour of restoring the Bank of Canada as lender is the impact of interest rates paid by government. The impact is on taxpayers at all levels, who are paying \$60 billion dollars every year to cover the cost

of interest paid to private banks, often foreign banks, which affects our sovereignty. In short, we Canadian taxpayers are helping bank shareholders become richer and richer while we become poorer and poorer. The lawsuit is an effort to help Canadian taxpayers get a tax break.

I did some simple math. If you divide \$60 billion by the total population of Canada (34 million), you discover that every man, woman and child in Canada is paying \$1,765 in interest payments every year. If you are a family of four, you are paying \$7,060 interest every year. If you multiply the individual amount by the population of our area, as a community we pay more than seven million dollars in government interest every year!

Suppose we kept our taxes the same, and then the government returned our share back to every community for infrastructure and social programs, just think what we could do with seven million dollars a year! Would we worry about the cost of extra snow removal? Would we say no to an aquatic centre? Would we wonder how we can pay for a new landfill 20 years from now? Would we worry about our health programs? Could we employ more people? Would we worry about the cost of educating special needs children? You know the answer.

The only article I could find that commented on the lawsuit was in a magazine called The Economist. The writer briefly reviewed the lawsuit's goal and dismissed it as "socialist". I have a real problem with critics who do not go into a genuine explanation of their criticism and slap a label onto something as if the label describes everything you need to know about the situation.

The fact of the matter is this: the formation of the Bank of Canada and its role in our economy lifted Canada out of the Great Depression and paid our way through World War II. If that was socialism, then it was a damned good thing, in my opinion.

The Bank of Canada has changed its role somewhat. Krehm, in his book "A Power Unto Itself", written in 1993, has a lot to criticize in the role the Bank of Canada has taken in the past 40 years. He blames the Bank of Canada for restricting our economy on occasion, but his latest assault on the role of the Bank of Canada is far more important to the average Canadian. He argues that the Canadian taxpayer is burdened unnecessarily by paying interest on loans governments have borrowed from private banks when the Bank

of Canada could have given interest-free loans to governments at all levels.

According to the Bank of Canada Act of 1934, the Bank of Canada may provide interest-free loans for infrastructure, and social programs of benefit to Canadians, such as health and welfare programs. Actually, the Bank of Canada could have issued any loans to any level of Canadian government at prime rate, which would have been a tremendous saving to Canadian taxpayers. Instead, the Bank of Canada reserves prime rate to the loans it makes to private banking corporations and then governments borrow from private banks and pay much higher interests. Correction: governments do not pay those higher interest rates, you and I and every other taxpayer foots the bill.

Isn't it amazing how little we hear about the Bank of Canada lawsuit in the major media? When the lawsuit was filed, lawyer Rocco Galati and his clients Krehm and Emmett, called a press conference. Very few people attended, but you can see the press conference on internet. Google Bank of Canada lawsuit, or Krehm or Galati or Ann Emmett.

You will discover William Krehm has been the author of a newsletter called Economic Reform which is published on behalf of the Committee for Monetary and Economic Reform (COMER). For years, Krehm has been a strong critic of federal government borrowing outside Canada instead of borrowing from the Bank of Canada. You might be interested in reading some of his articles and books. You can go to COMER on internet and read about the lawsuit, and you can even show your support if you choose to do so.

When I think what \$60 billion dollars a year in savings could do for Canada, it boggles the mind. Our country could be debt-free in no time. Our taxes could stay the same and provide better social programs. We could beef up health care, provide more university grants to students, we could build better national highways, and on and on..... Instead, what is the big project our federal government wants to do? It wants to build more prisons when Canadians crime rates are very low. This government wants to put more people in prison! Why not start using the Bank of Canada the right way and do more good for Canadians?

New team services valley

Last week Interior Health launched their new High Acuity Response Team (HART); based in Penticton the team will also serve the communities of Princeton, Keremeos, Oliver, Osoyoos and Summerland.

"The launch of a HART team in Penticton is great news for surrounding rural communities," said Penticton MLA Bill Barisoff. "Through their collaboration with the BC Ambulance Service, this new HART team will provide a

higher level of care to those patients who require it during transport."

The Penticton HART team consists of six highly trained critical care nurses responding with a BC Ambulance Service (BCAS) basic life support ambulance team to provide ground transport for acutely ill and injured patients from outlying rural and remote communities to higher levels of care. When required, a respiratory therapist will be called in to assist.

"Interior Health is committed to providing the highest quality patient care," says Norman Embree, Chair, Interior Health. "With the launch of the Penticton HART team, we're not only providing increased support to very sick and injured patients during transfers, we're also providing additional clinical support to the health-care team at Penticton Regional Hospital."

HARTs support the high acuity needs of the patient at the local rural site and during transport to a regional referral facility such as Penticton Regional Hospital or a major hospital in Kelowna or Kamloops.

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

No zone for backyard containers

Town Council will be adjusting residential zoning to deal with requests of people who want to place shipping containers on residential property for the purpose of storage. At this time, the zoning does not address whether or not these are acceptable in a residential area.

The matter was discussed at the Town Council strategy meeting on March 12. Council members did not appear to be in favour of shipping containers in residential areas. There is another concern about allowing shipping containers anywhere in town: is the container safe and secure?

Town staff will research how other communities deal with location of shipping containers and the topic will be addressed in the future.

The capsaicin in peppers blocks the formation of blood clots, reduces cholesterol to a slight extent, and coats the stomach, preventing ulcers. Peppers are famous for their high Vitamin A and Vitamin C content, too. Eating a raw green pepper is as good as eating two or three oranges.

Where hot peppers are an ingredient in food on an almost daily basis, such as southwestern United States, people swear by the healing powers of hot peppers. Most homes keep a bottle of hot pepper sauce to add to soups, sauces, stews and even tea to feed to a sick person.

When you eat a bowl of chili con carne, you are doing your heart a favour. It is one of the healthiest meals you can eat, providing you with a huge dose of vitamins, minerals from the beans, especially calcium, and protein from both the beans and the meat. When you take a taco chip and plunge it into salsa, you are doing yourself a favour. This is a healthy snack, even healthier if you make fresh salsa. This is when eating food you love is good for you, so enjoy it.

WARNING! There are many kinds of hot peppers to enjoy, but all have one thing in common: they require careful handling when fresh. Wear surgical gloves while cutting or chopping the peppers and do not touch your nose or anywhere on your face. Avoid getting any pepper juice in your eyes. When you finish cutting or chopping, use plenty of soap to clean up the area, as capsaicin is an oil and sticks to skin and other surfaces and can sting and burn.

- 2 tbsp white wine vinegar (30 mL)
- 2 tsp Indian curry paste, your favourite style (10 mL)
- 1/2 tsp granulated sugar (2 mL)
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil (50 mL)
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh coriander (125 mL)
- Naan or lettuce leaves (optional)

Directions:

1. Place chicken, asparagus and grapes in a medium bowl. Stir to mix.
2. In a small bowl, whisk vinegar with curry paste, sugar and oil. Toss with chicken mixture. Stir in coriander.
3. Scoop and serve with naan or over lettuce leaves.

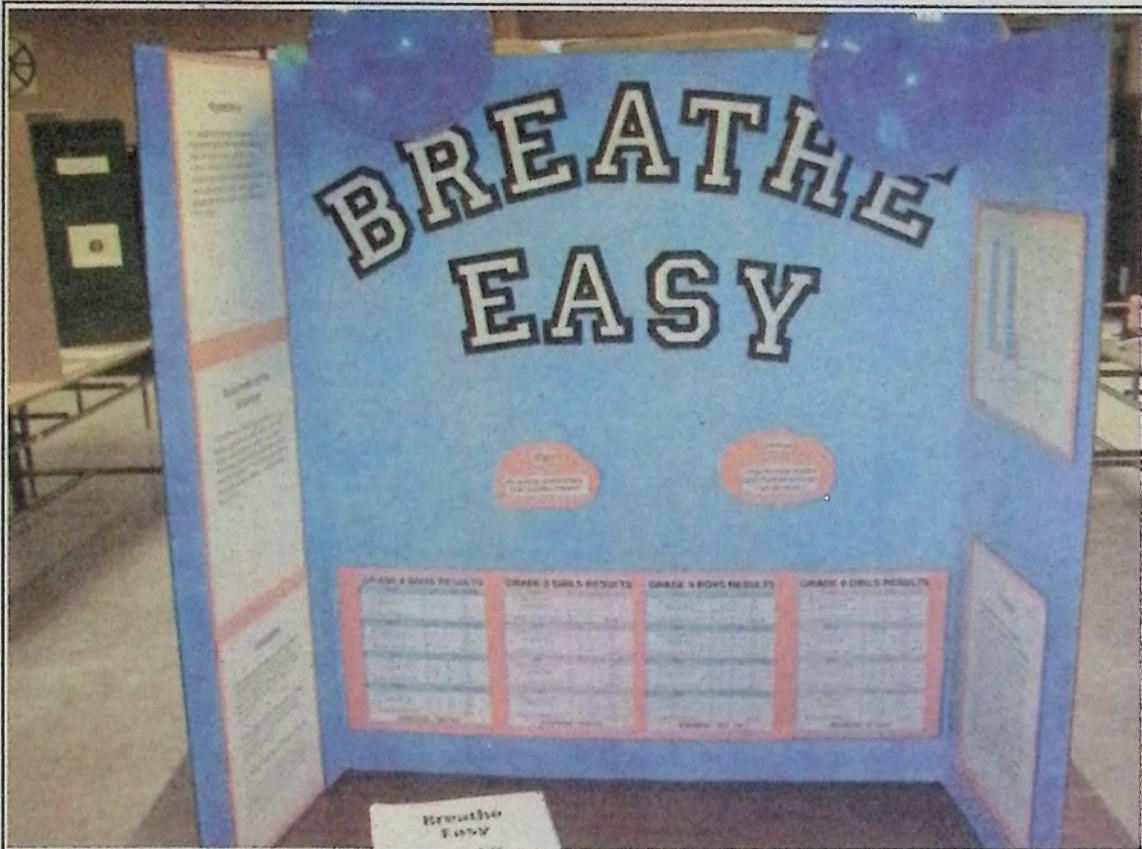

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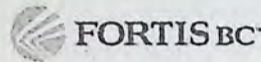

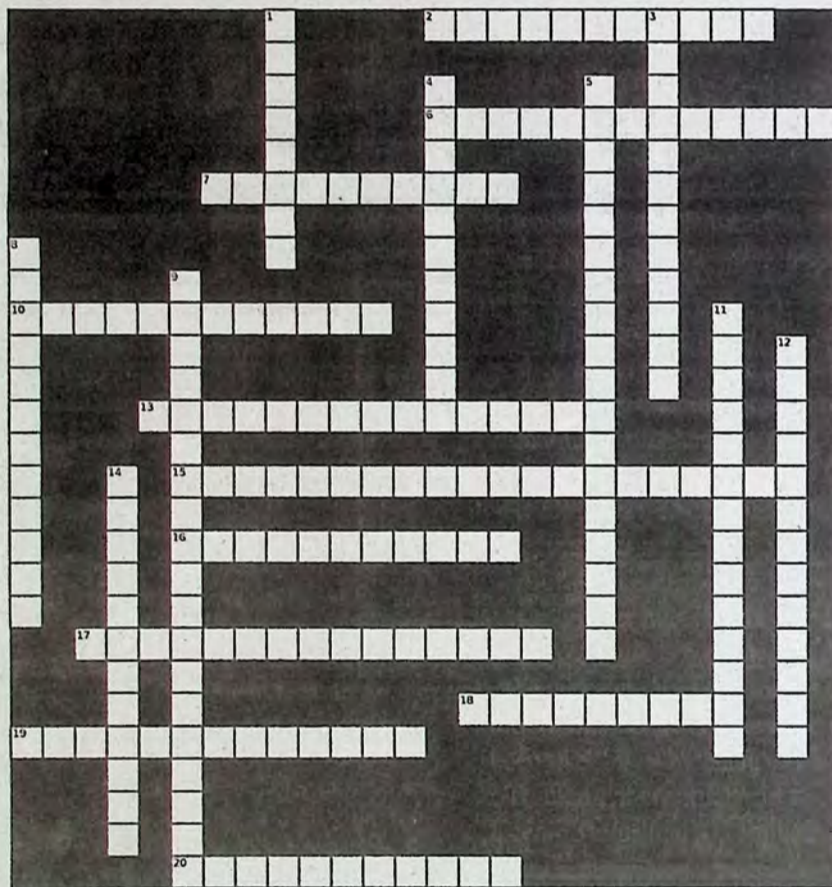

Man loses license

In Provincial Court in Princeton on March 15, Justin Gee entered a guilty plea to a charge of driving while prohibited. He was ordered to pay a \$500 fine and will be prohibited from driving for one year.

The same morning, Aaron O'Grady, of Penticton, was fined \$1,000 for driving without due care. He was initially charged with impaired driving.

David E. Groff entered a guilty plea to refusing to provide a breath sample to police in Whitecourt, Alberta. The 42 year old Princeton man was ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine and is prohibited from driving for one year.

Robin E. Steen-Massot, of Lumby, entered a guilty plea to a charge of

obstructing a police officer. The offense occurred on August 21, 2011, when a police officer stopped Steen-Massot on Highway 3 because his vehicle had no tail light. Despite being asked repeatedly for driver's license and vehicle registration, Steen-Massot would not hand these documents to the officer.

Eventually, with back-up on scene, the officer broke the driver's window and the driver was pulled out of the vehicle. Steen-Massot's father attended court and apologized, saying he had been telling his son not to provide the documents. Steen-Massot was given a conditional discharge, put on probation for nine months, and was ordered to do 25 hours of community service.

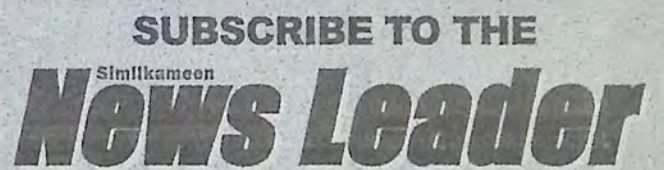

sort of identity for the Similkameen Valley.

The workshop lasted all day. Everybody had to work hard. The flow of information and discussion was non-stop.

Participants had to evaluate the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats that would affect tourism in the Similkameen Valley. Then they had to create a vision of what the Similkameen Valley could

be five years from now, and develop targets for what could be achieved in those five years. After these discussions and sharing of ideas from the discussions, participants were sent back to the drawing board to decide what should be done in the coming year. So many goals were identified that the next step was to set priorities. The tasks seemed never-ending.

In terms of what was accomplished during the workshop, we could say a great deal or very little, depending on viewpoint. A huge amount of information is being gathered, summarized, and organized. That task will be done by the facilitators and will be sent back to the participants, who will then have to move on to the next step: action plans.

There is money available through matching grants, meaning money from the community or SVPS will be matched for specific action or projects.

is to increase tourism in the Similkameen Valley, with the objective of sharing costs to maximize advertising.

For example, it would be less expensive if there were a valley tourist brochure, a valley website linked to all of the other websites for the valley, and a combined effort to advertise the entire valley's attractions.

Participants talked about educating local tourist service businesses about the valley's attractions and events. The province has estimated five percent of a community's income comes from tourism. Therefore, increasing that percentage makes good economic sense, not just for tourist services, but for the sustainability of that income source for the valley's communities and hopefully increasing the valley's share of that income.

CUPE, School District settle

School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) has been in contract negotiations with the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) in what Board of Education Chair Gordon Comeau describes as "friendly and cooperative" discussions.

The negotiations were delayed for some time while both sides waited

for the provincial government to establish a framework for negotiations.

CUPE voted 96 percent in favour of the agreement reached. On March 14, the Board of Education trustees voted unanimously to ratify the agreement. The new contract covers 2010 to 2012 and falls within the net zero mandate.



 may not be sufficiently affected, are animal lovers, or simply think the deer are "cute". I am also an animal lover but I do have to set my priorities. We must consider the safety issues and property damage that have to be dealt with by many of the town residents. Forays into the town by cougars in search of food have been a major worry to many citizens.

It is also ludicrous and irresponsible to suggest that it is practical to attempt to negate or significantly reduce the incidence of deer in our yards by taking the measures presented.

These measures include:

- *Landscaping with deer resistant plants:*

This is largely ineffective because, in my experience, when hungry, the deer will eat almost anything, including touted deer resistant plants. Also, while looking for food, they will walk across a yard, trampling plants, etc. under foot.

- *Fencing:*

It would seem that a fence has to be over 2 metres in height to ensure that the deer cannot jump over it. Were a resident able to afford the significant cost of an adequate fence, and many are not, we can be sure that there are few people who would want to have their property look like some nineteenth century military fort or other compound.

- *Frightening/Deer Repellents:*

These are hardly credible suggestions. Who is going to be standing out in their yard at 5:00 AM, or perhaps just after dusk, when the deer are on the move, to attempt to frighten them? Deer repellents may have some limited use but they are only a temporary solution at best. I am particularly disturbed because

I see this as an apparent attempt to pass expenses and residents' concerns onto the populace, when resolution of the problem is clearly the Town's responsibility. To suggest that more committees are needed to 'consider', 'create', 'examine' and 'develop', and then only come up with a 'strategy' that will still have to be implemented, is patently unsatisfactory. This simply extends the timeline for an appropriate undertaking, and stretches the credibility of Town Council even further.

Some solutions to this issue have been proposed previously and many of us consider them to be quite viable. Deer culls, or, the transport of the deer to another location, are among the best. Even if these were carried out over time, it would show political will to alleviate the situation.

Of course there would be a cost associated going forward with them but what would the collective costs be for quite obviously ineffective solutions, to the many citizens who are affected by the deer if Council's recommendations were followed? These recommendations are evidently offered in part to minimize Town Council's culpability for inaction.

But what essentially is the Town, if it is not the people who reside here? Council is elected to represent us, and as such, the voice of the people should be heard and respected, and their wishes not ignored or evaded.

It occurs to me that the current local political climate may be similar to that which we see provincially and federally in that if there is a minority of people against a decision or action, we must not 'offend' them by acting on the considerations of the majority.

If any of these comments and suggestions resonates with Council, then instead of continued delays in enacting a workable solution, we should expect an early response before the spring and summer seasons when the deer impact will be greater.
