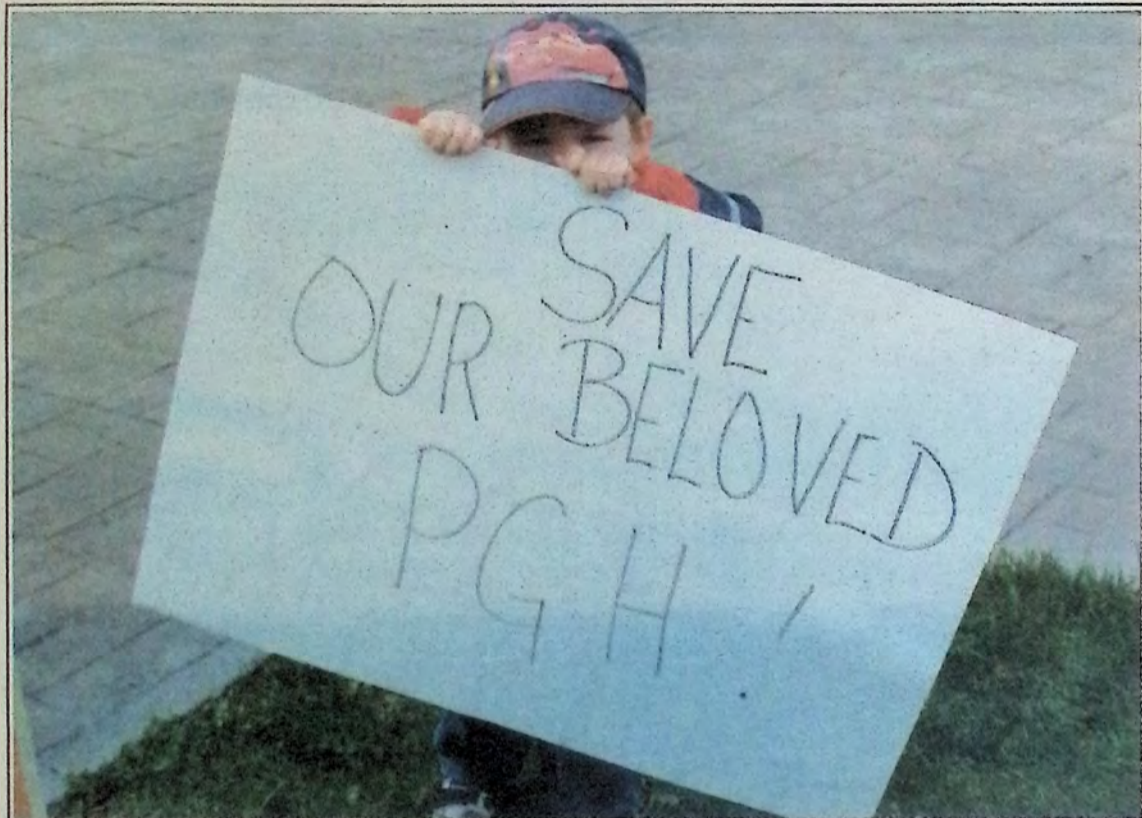

Mayor Thomas passes

Town of Princeton Mayor Fred Thomas passed away at 4:00 AM on Friday, May 4th. He was recovering from prostate cancer.

Acting Mayor Jason Earle says Thomas passed quietly at home with his wife, Lynne by his side. While Thomas had been recovering from treatment in recent weeks, the news of his passing caught most residents by surprise.

"I was so looking forward to his return," Earle told the News Leader later that afternoon.

"I was hoping to finally see some of his ideas become reality," Earle added.

"We are all saddened by this. On behalf of Town Council, the Town Staff and Crew, we extend our deepest sympathy to the family."

Thomas capitalized on his low profile and relative anonymity in the community with a successful election campaign last November built around the catch phrase 'Who is Fred Thomas?' and immediately started to win over non-supporters with his dedication, determination and drive.

"Fred had a real focus, a vision of where he wanted Princeton to be," says News Leader Owner/Publisher George Elliott.

"He was organized and goal-oriented. Fred also wanted to see everyone working together to achieve those goals."

There will be a by-election to fill

Thomas' seat. According to the Local Government Act, Section 37 (1) An election must be held to fill a vacancy in an elected local government office that occurs (c) when the person holding the office dies.

The date for the by-election will be announced soon, but until then, it's business as usual at Town Hall according to Earle.

"We will continue on with myself as Acting Mayor until such time that a new Mayor is elected."

Thomas was elected to his first term in office on November 19, 2011 with 539 votes to incumbent Randy McLean's 377.

Thomas was officially sworn in, with the rest of Town Council, on Monday, December 5, 2011.

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Deal saves Fields

"The goal is to bring in the merchandise that makes the most sense for each community we serve, and we're looking forward to bringing in a selection of great products and merchandise to communities across the West. Our stores will be focused on more everyday low prices, providing more value through deals on a regular basis and will continue to provide an assortment of those everyday items customers have always expected as well."

FHC considered a number of factors when determining which stores to purchase from HBC. Once the remaining Fields stores operating

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Princeton Fall Fair President steps down

At the April 24 Princeton Fall Fair meeting, President Keith Olsen stepped down, citing personal rea-

sons. Vice-President Dan Kastor was given full support for taking the President's job. Olsen will stay on

the Board as Past President.

The meeting was a review and second-guessing of the fair this year. Olsen suggested perhaps a spring fair in May might bring out the public.

Then he suggested there be no fair this year, as there did not seem to be much public support and a small group to do the work.

Olsen did not receive much support for either of these suggestions, and the Fall Fair will be held on Labour Day weekend this year. Laser tag for the teens and inflat-

able play areas for the younger people have been booked.

One of Olsen's biggest concerns is the lack of exhibits (entries). He noted there are few animals anymore, despite the fact that many people raise chickens, sheep and beef cattle. He said it is time for a major overhaul of the fall fair.

There was some discussion of resurrecting motor sports and/or logger sports. Apparently there is a group of local men who would like to see motor sports happening again. Members said it could be planned

for next year, but the group should be writing to the Fair Board or coming forward to make a proposal. The Board needs to know who is interested.

The issue of alcohol at the fair was argued again, and the consensus was in favour of having no alcohol. The focus this year is on returning to the fair as a family event.

There will be a dinner on the Saturday evening, and children will be able to be with their parents. Local musicians will be contacted to provide entertainment at the fair.

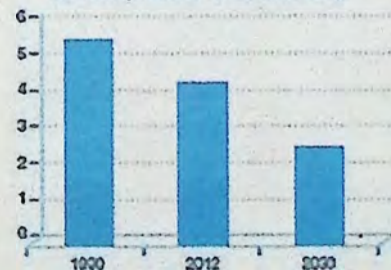

To The Editor;

It has been recognized on both government and local levels that there is a unique problem with the medical care in Princeton. We apparently have enough doctors to cover the local and area populace; however, there are not enough physicians to man the Hospital Emergency Room.

For years, the government has been running in circles, hiring "recruitment" officers, etc. and no solutions have been forthcoming. Now the area is in the midst of unacceptable 4-night-a-week closures in the Emergency Room. The government would like to "centralize" the health care in British Columbia, but that has its

obvious flaws in emergency situations.

To solve this unique problem, the government must create a "unique" job position. Our government has a long history of creating new job positions, so this should not be difficult.

As I understand it, doctors work on a fee for service basis. If they don't have enough patients, they won't make enough money to warrant their practice. The current Princeton doctors all have sufficient numbers of patients. To solve our "unique" problem, the government must create a salaried Emergency Room Doctor position. This doctor would be hired to only work the Emergency Room.

He/she would not have the overhead of a private practice. They would not have to worry about patient numbers. They would be paid a set amount of money (salary) per year to work 40 hours per week in the Princeton Emergency Room. Hopefully this would help alleviate some of the stress placed on the current physicians who must try to fit in ER hours on top of running their busy practices. While they would still have to put in some ER hours, it would be to a much lesser extent.

As an added incentive to new graduates, the government could offer to pay their student loans at a set percentage per year that the doctor works in the Princeton Hospital. I am sure this idea is shocking to you as doctors aren't supposed to have a salary - however YOU have a salary as do the thousands upon thousands of government employees.

Is it really so incredulous an idea as to pay someone a set wage to look after our hospital's emergency room and save lives?

Mr. de Jong stated that "the government has provided ten million continued on Page 23

will bring the special dedication of the rodeo as the Stan Thompson Memorial Rodeo. I remember when Stan got the bright idea of having a rodeo in Princeton. He pulled together a group of like-minded people and they built the rodeo arena. The first rodeo at the fairgrounds was in August 1982, thirty years ago.

Thirty years ago the members of the Rodeo Club were young, strong and full of energy and ideas. They did some amazing things, from a cattle drive down Bridge Street, to a black powder shoot-em-up near the Post Office, to a hold-up of Premier Vander Zalm's stagecoach, to a train hold-up on the Kettle Valley line, and their outstanding cooperation with the Tonasket Comancheros which resulted in the International Pony Express Friendship Ride.

Back then, we thought we were having a lot of fun! We certainly made news, positive news for Princeton and area. The Pony Express Ride to Tonasket made a center spread in the Vancouver Province, a big spread in the Seattle daily, and some excellent television coverage.

The problem was that those men and women who made the Rodeo Club so much fun are now old (or dead), and younger people have not stepped forward.

Nearly every organization in town has the same problem, and it is not just Princeton's problem. One of the few places where the younger folks are stepping forward is in Tulameen. That community has a very strong community spirit. In most communities these days, it is the retired people who are stepping forward to carry

on the special events.

It makes me wonder what people want to do for fun. I have belonged to local groups for years. It is a place where I meet people, become involved in doing things I think are good for the community, and where I have learned a tremendous body of knowledge about how organizations function and how to make them function well. Although I do not consider myself a 'mover and shaker', I do the best I can to support the groups I belong to.

Thanks to my experience with groups, I know how much effort they put into doing things to make the quality of social life better in our community. By joining together on projects, we make friends with each other, and nobody can have too many friends. I can honestly say I have had a lot of fun, too.

A couple of weeks ago, I talked to two young men who were staying in Princeton for a couple of days. They saw how quiet the streets are by early evening, and wondered, "What do people do for fun in this town?"

We have a rodeo this weekend. We will see some cowboys and cowgirls competing for points on the provincial circuit. I like rodeos. It is part of my heritage, and dear to the hearts of most westerners, but I wonder if Princeton can come up with the support needed to ensure there will be a rodeo next year?

The great thing about a rodeo is that it is more than just a chance to see a sport. A rodeo is a sports event where socializing is half the fun, yet it seems it is a hard sell in Princeton. Have we put ourselves so far from our past? Or is the world changing too much?

Really, there is just a handful of people who do all of the planning for the rodeo, and I commend them, as well as the many volunteers who pitch in during the event to make it run smoothly. This year

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

This Mother's Day Walk for Peace, May 13th marks the 29th consecutive year that American and Canadian peace activists have met at the Osoyoos-Oroville border park.

They meet to share stories, to sing, to renew old acquaintance, to welcome new friends and to celebrate their continuing peace and justice activities in their home communities.

It all started in 1983 when some South Okanagan and Similkameen

activist opposed to US Cruise Missile Testing at Cold Lake in Alberta created a mock up of the missile and arranged to deliver it to American friends at the border.

The Americans took 'the missile' to the Boeing Plant in Seattle and created a ruckus outside the gates in an effort to deliver it from the Canadians.

Since then, the Canadians and Americans have made the Mother's Day Walk an annual observance.

Both Canadian and American

Customs Authorities have been consistently helpful over the years, right though the recent heightened security established since the 2011 attack on the World Trade Centre in New York. Uniformed Border Guards keep a friendly and watchful eye on the proceedings.

Numerous American and Canadian politicians have made the trek over

Canada's Transformation Under Harper

Over the past 6 years under the Conservative government led by Stephen Harper, we have seen a relentless transformation of our country to one that is more closely aligned with the 'corporate business agenda' than ever before. This shift is taking place against a backdrop that has seen a progressive loss of investment in our country by the same corporate sector that has reaped the benefits of massive tax breaks, set to reach a staggering \$220 billion by 2013-14.

Amidst this decline in federal revenues there have been outrageous spending increases in our military budget to finance the war in Afghanistan and to purchase F-35 stealth bombers. Inexplicably, and for the first time in history, the Conservatives are spending \$30 million to commemorate the war of 1812!!

At the same time, the 2012 budget has cut \$66.7 million to Veteran's Affairs. It is shameful that a government so eager to send young people to war is shirking its responsibility to provide the care they and their families need at the end of their service. With many veterans of the Balkan and Afghanistan wars

needing help the Conservative government is shutting down veterans hospitals and downloading costs to the provinces.

Seeking to emulate the failed US justice system, the Harper government's crime legislation, Bill C-10, will result in billions being wasted to build super prisons at a time when the national crime rate has been decreasing for years.

To further Canada's dismal performance on the international stage, the government has cut \$377 million out of Budget 2012 to international aid and effectively ended our country's participation in a number of international organizations. I find this embarrassing as Canada is already among the lowest international aid donor as a percentage of gross national income.

The Prime Minister has also decided to raise the Old Age Security (OAS) eligibility from 65 to 67 even though experts are advising that this move is unnecessary as the current plan is entirely sustainable.

The CBC is also being targeted with a \$115 million cut over the next three years as has the National Film Board which will lose \$6.7

million and Telefilm \$10.6 million.

I find it reprehensible that the government has withdrawn its funding commitment to Katimavik. A number of communities in our riding have benefited from this nation-building program. What better way can there be for young people to get to know their own country than to live and work together on community projects and helping people in need right across Canada. I will bet that a lot of those young people from Quebec, who had a chance to live and work in Trail, Castlegar, Nelson, Princeton or Keremeos under this program, will think twice before succumbing to separatist propaganda.

In the face of so many of the government's outrageous and wrong-headed spending and policy priorities, I am inclined to believe there is something 'sinister' going on in our country. Our government is giving the rich and powerful money to play with while gradually cutting all the threads of our caring and compassionate society.

Those of us in all the opposition parties are doing our best to push back against this assault but it is not enough. We need your help!

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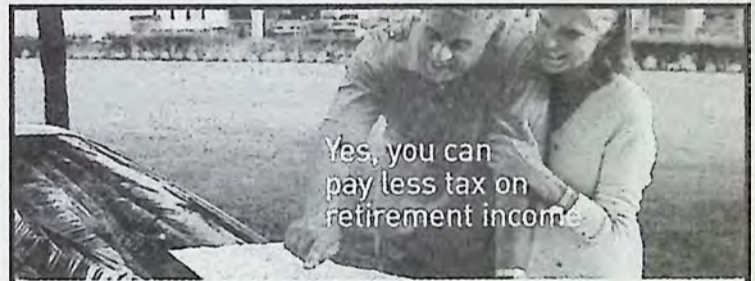

Living Past 100

Cutting Fat With Fibre

You see those advertisements and articles that tell you your cholesterol will drop and you will feel better if you have more fibre in your diet. That is true, but not all fibre is equal. Some sources of fibre are a lot better than others.

Two fruits are especially good: prune plums (and dried prunes) and pears are excellent. You would need a whole pear and at least five prune plums a day. All berries are top notch sources of fibre, including grapes. You need at least half a cup of berries or a full cup of grapes every day.

Apples and apple sauce contain pectin, which is great for reducing cholesterol, but don't get the idea a glass of apple juice will do the trick. It will not!

Green beans, peas, and all root vegetables are good sources of fibre. Potatoes are a good source of fibre but may be too starchy. Starch turns to sugar after digestion, and may stimulate the production of more cholesterol.

Almonds, walnuts and Brazil nuts are excellent sources of fibre and of the kind of fat that counterbalances cholesterol. However, do not eat more than a handful a day, as they are fattening.

Oatmeal is a good source of fibre, especially if you add oat fibre. Again, like potatoes, oatmeal is starchy, so half a cup is enough.

There is another good source of fibre that washes out cholesterol. Psyllium fibre is 70 percent insoluble fibre, and picks up the cholesterol, preventing it from being absorbed into your blood. Just as pears and prunes do. This fibre can be purchased in powder form and stirred into a glass of juice.

By adding all of these above to your weekly diet, you should be able to keep cholesterol under control, and be much healthier all round.

Provençal Poached Salmon Dinner

(NC)—Mushrooms, tomatoes and herbes de Provence add flavour to the poaching sauce for salmon fillets. Serve over mashed potatoes to complete the meal and absorb the delicious sauce.

Preparation Time: 15 minutes / Cooking Time: 15 minutes

- 1 tbsp (15 mL) olive oil
- 12 oz (375 g) mixed Mushrooms (crimini, white, shiitake), thickly sliced
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped onion
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) dry white wine or chicken broth
- 2 medium tomatoes, chopped
- 1/4 tsp each (1 mL) salt and pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp (7 mL) herbes de Provence
- 4 salmon fillets (5 oz/150 g each)
- 2 cups (500 mL) mashed potatoes (see below)
- Chopped parsley or pea sprouts (optional)

In large 12-inch (30 cm) non-stick skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Sauté mushrooms and onions for 3-5 minutes or until just starting to brown. Add broth, tomatoes, salt, pepper and 1/2 tsp (2 mL) herbes de Provence; bring to boil. Arrange salmon in single layer on top; sprinkle remaining 1 tsp (5 mL) herbes de Provence evenly on salmon. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer over for 10 minutes or until fish flakes readily with a fork. Spoon mashed potatoes onto dinner plates; flattening slightly. Top with salmon and spoon mushroom sauce over all. Sprinkle with chopped parsley or pea sprouts if desired.

Makes 4 servings.

Mashed Potatoes: Peel and quarter 4-5 (1 1/2 lb) medium Yukon Gold potatoes. Place in 1 1/2 qt. (1.5 L) microwave bowl with 1/4 cup (50 mL) water. Cover and microwave on HIGH, about 10 minutes, stirring once, or until tender. Drain. Mash potatoes with 1/4 cup (50 mL) light sour cream; mix well. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

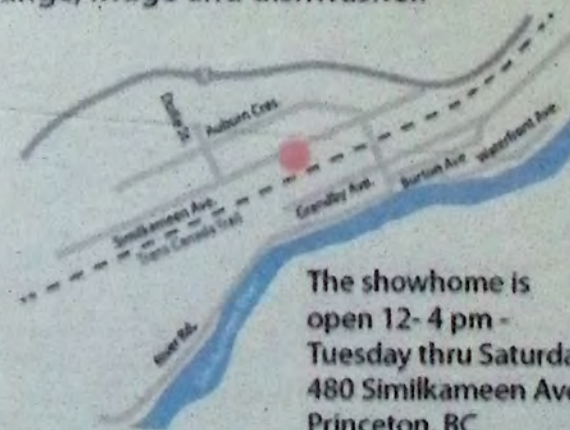

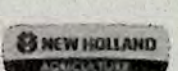

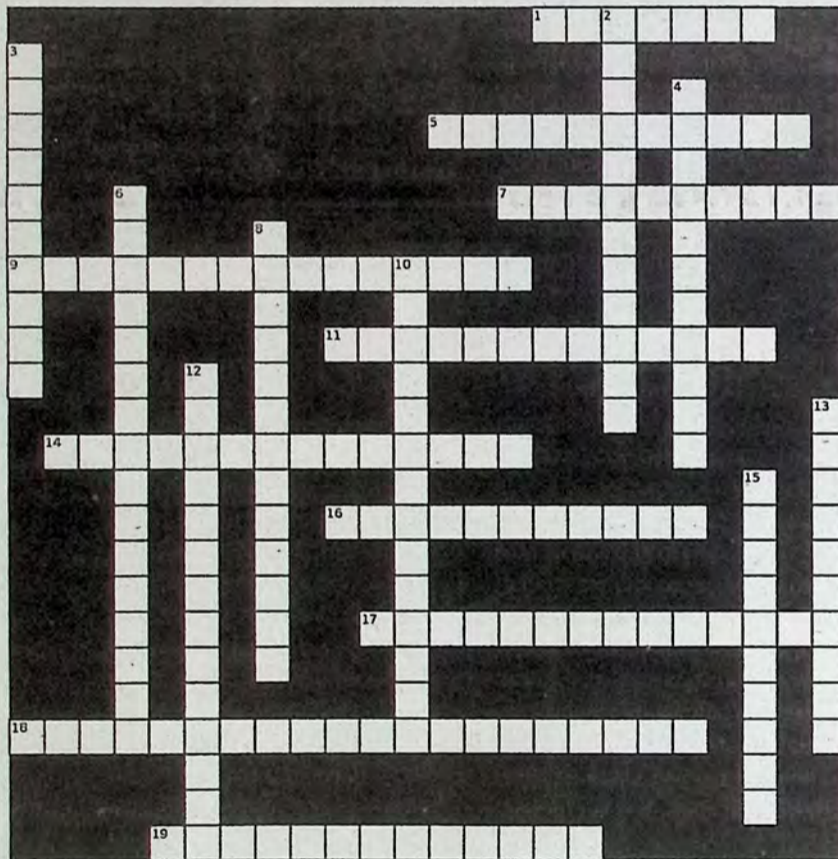

The April meeting of the CCA was another great success. We're on a roll and the community is coming together.

The main discussion of this meeting was centred around the currently topical KVR trail usage. It seems that many locals are effected - one way or the other. The main issue seems to be the use of motorized vehicles, mostly quads. Although not unanimous, it is clear that many in this community use quads on the trail for both recreational and non-recreational use, and would like to continue doing so.

Everyone is effected by disrespectful users, noise, and dust. In fact it is important to note that not only the few people who would like to see all motorized use (besides cars and trucks) disappear from the area are complaining about this. Also the regular users, and even the ATVBC and clubs, are concerned about this. Since motorized vehicle use is the backbone of tourism in this particular area there is also a confusion of interests there.

In Osprey Lake they have attempted to tackle this issue head on by both welcoming quads and discussing the problems and how people can help solve them.

Nevertheless, the people who came to our meeting were overwhelmingly in favour of dealing with the issues and requesting that the KVR remain multi use. In light of all this, it was also decided to discuss solutions for our area at the next meeting.

I personally think that it is important to note that although there is historical precedent, we should all be interested in moving forward. We have to. As we come to conclusions about how we can do this, it is also good to keep in mind that no community statement can represent everyone, nor should a minority be ignored. The majority is not always right any more than the minority is always wrong. Only insight and understanding can help us sort that out.

Other meeting topics were much less controversial. A motion to encourage RDOS to apply the name Walt Smart Road to Walt Smart Road was passed. That may seem obvious, but the official address of the Smart residence is Coalmont Road. This could, and has, caused ambulance drivers to end up on the wrong side of the river. That is why we request that the real name be applied officially. It is also fitting that Walt Smart, who is so important continued on Page 23

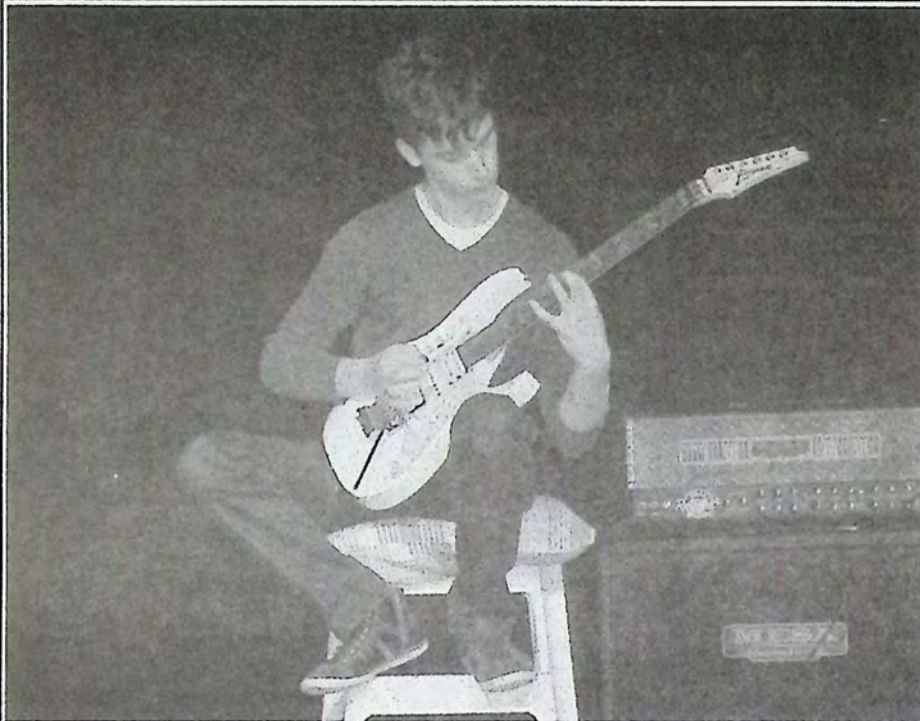

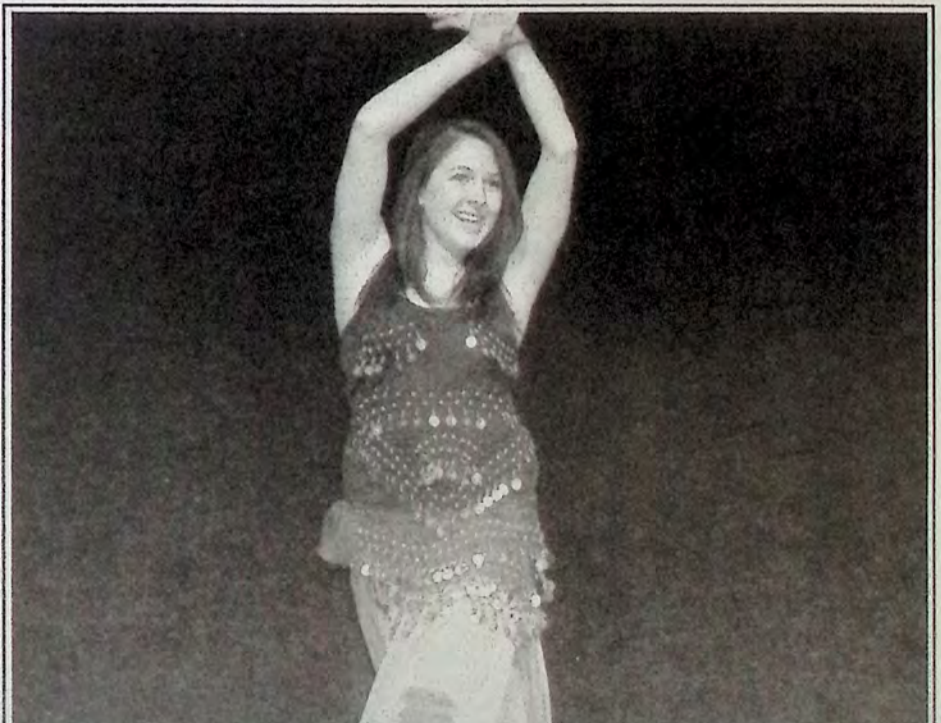

..... continued from Page 4 additional dollars to assist with the recruitment of physicians to rural ERs."

That money could be put toward the salaries of Emergency Room doctors. I am sure that Princeton is not the only rural community in British Columbia with this problem.

It would also be time to do some housekeeping at the Interior Health Authority to get rid of those who feel Princeton is a "hole" to live in (see Dawn Johnson's article in the April 24, 2012 edition of the Similkameen News Leader), and those who were hired to recruit doctors but have not been successful. In the private field, if an employee has a 0% success rate, they are released from their position. This should help the government gener-

ate money to help pay for the doctors who will be filling this new Emergency Room salaried position.

The solution is simple. The question is, will the government put their money where their mouth is and actually fix our problem now that a solution has been presented? A telephone outside the Princeton Hospital Emergency Room does not qualify as "health care". I am speaking from first hand experience as the wife of a man who suffered a cardiac arrest at our home in Coalmont.

He literally died before my eyes and without the help of our neighbours, our home defibrillator (which I had purchased years before because I was well aware of the poor medical response time in our area), and Dr. Eva who was working in the Princeton Hospital's

Emergency Room that day, he would not be here today. Even though my neighbours and our defibrillator were able to revive my husband, without Dr. Eva's work to stabilize him for the 2 hour trip to the Penticton Hospital, he would not have survived.

Had the Princeton Emergency Room been closed on that fateful day, I would be a widow today. To you we may just be "numbers" who live in a backwoods "hole", but trust me when I say that we are all human beings with spouses, children, grandchildren and friends.

I have just given you a very simple solution to our problem. It is time to "man up" and heal the critical condition of our rural medical care. I anxiously await your response.

You may have noticed in the last issues of both our local papers in town that Save Our Similkameen donated funds to the Save Our Hospital Coalition. Why would we do this? after all, isn't S.O.S. an environmental organization?

Of all the work the S.O.S does, we can not forget why we do advocacy. It's simple, and selfish really, we advocate for people who choose to live rurally.

So our kids have a healthy environment to grow up in. So future generations have a choice. Let us make no mistake and be clear, that, underneath the heated debates over healthcare in rural BC that rural residents right to choose where we live is being unfairly dictated by the

withdrawal of medical services. If you are a senior citizen with any kind of medical condition you know what I'm talking about.

If you are an expectant mother, live with a chronic condition, if you have ever had an accident that required emergency medical services, or require a doctors attention, you know that it is almost impossible to live where you can not access fundamental and vital medical services.

As most of you may have heard, the emergency hours of our hospital have been cut back. In 2000 we heard phrases like over-utilization, cross-coverage and creative solutions.

What PGH had then and now: 20 beds. Proposed cuts: 8 beds

Beds cut: 14. Actual remaining as of 2012: 6 beds. 24/7 ER coverage. Proposed cuts: 32 hours per week. Cut: 128 per month. Actual remaining run time: 82.8 %. Doctors on Call: 4. Doctors on call as of 2012: 2.

Will small townships that service the rural residents of this province be able to economically survive with regionalization of our healthcare?

So folks, speak up now, or watch our rural hospitals become another extinct species.
