Local man shows zigzag flaws

Steve Brodie made a presentation to Town Council on May 22 showing his concept of how the zigzag trail should be upgraded. The trail has been on Council's agenda for the past two years since a pick-up truck went down the trail and ruined it. The trail joins Billiter Avenue to First Bench and can be seen at the rear of the Bank of Commerce and Shoppers Drug Mart.

Brodie, using computer drafting software, gave a three dimensional overview of his design for the trail, pointing out the design flaws of the plan Council intends to use and for which tenders have been called. Brodie's design calls for a covered, lighted stairway using metal construction.

His design includes containment uprights beneath the handrails and improved footings. As he went through his presentation, he indicat-

ed safety hazards in the design Council has approved.

Brodie told Council he could build his design within Council's budget.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness asked Brodie why he was bringing forward his proposal when the process had been underway for months and was now at the point when Council was calling for tenders.

Brodie replied he had not seen the design for the trail until the previous week, and had been appalled by what he had seen.

Councillor Harkness asked him if he had an engineering degree and whether he would be prepared to obtain liability insurance. Brodie stated he had no degree, but would obtain insurance if required.

Council thanked him for his presentation but said they would not deal with it during the public meeting.

The Fall Fair has had a lot of goods donated for a yard sale, and plans to use the proceeds to help fund the annual community Halloween party at the fairgrounds. June 16 was the date selected.

The ongoing problem of attracting livestock displays was discussed.

Efforts will be made to encourage livestock owners to bring their animals or fowl to the fair, if only for display.

Council reviews metal law

The sale of metals for recycling has come under some new regulations which go into effect July 23, 2012. These new regulations are designed to prevent buying and selling of stolen metals. The buyer will be required to ask for identification and in some cases, proof of ownership of the metals to be sold. This will not apply to beverage cans.

Buyers who purchase metals will provide regular reports to police of the type of metals purchased and

police will compare those reports with complaints of metal thefts.

Council denies bylaw variances

At the May 22 Town Council meeting, Council denied an application by Heinz Ebenau to vary the side setback and height requirements on his property. The request dates back to a prior denial of the same request. At that time, neighbours objected to his plan to build a garage with a suite on top of it.

During the time between requests for variance, Ebenau had proceeded

with construction without appropriate approvals and permits. During that same period, the building inspector had received complaints from neighbours about the construction and the inspector had told Ebenau on more than one occasion that he was not to proceed without approval and permits, and the struc-

ture was not to exceed what the bylaw allowed.

In a different case, a couple had requested a rezoning of their property on Westridge so they could put in a secondary suite. Council did not proceed with the rezoning as 20 neighbours had signed a petition asking that zoning not be changed.

Council praises citizens

During the May 22 Town Council meeting, as Councillors gave a report of their activities, they offered a lot of praise to local citizens. Councillor Kim Maynard reviewed the Rick Hansen Anniversary Relay held May 9, and praised the excellent citizen participation in that event.

He added kudos to Wayne Hooper, who painted the caboose. Councillor Maynard said Hooper was doing the work as a volunteer because Princeton had been good to him and his wife.

"What a wonderful volunteer!" Councillor Maynard remarked.

Deputy Mayor Jason Earle attended the Air Quality forum saying it was excellent as people heard the facts.

He was pleased with the citizen participation in the Mining Week celebration on May 8 and the Rick Hansen Anniversary Relay on May 9.

He showed the medal the Town received for putting on a great welcome to the relay and said it would go to the museum.

How are people in Princeton supposed to take it when they are told that the people who are paid to make decisions about their hospital have no clue on how to solve the problem

facing their hospital? I know how I feel about it. I feel upset, frustrated and think that if they can't do it then it is time to go over their heads and if that doesn't

work then maybe the people of Princeton need to find a way to solve the problem themselves.

The more you learn about the Interior Health Authority the more you shake your head. Princeton isn't alone in its problems with the hospital. Just about every one of the non-centralized locations is facing cut-backs, closures and staffing shortages. If it was one or two of the rural locations I could maybe understand why it might be hard to find a doctor or two but when it is everyone outside the main big hospitals and the solutions to fixing the problems are non-existent you have to wonder if they are just trying to save money by cutting rural services? After all the executives over at Interior Health like to say that centralization saves lives. Tell that to the people who have to travel over an hour by ambulance to one of those centralized locations.

The Minister of Health should fire the Interior Health board and executive. They have destroyed rural healthcare in the Heartland of British Columbia. They are putting rural residents' lives at risk. They are putting the lives of the people of Princeton at risk. The blame has to

go where it belongs. If the Minister of Health says it is not a matter of money then we need to take the Honourable Member of the Legislature at his word which means it must be a management problem. If the people who are managing the system can no longer manage the system then they need to be removed so someone who knows how to do the job can step in. Of course the Minister at the end of the day is the real boss of the Health Authority so maybe it is the Minister who cannot handle his portfolio. Maybe he should be replaced with a more competent MLA. Then again the Premier is the Minister's boss. Maybe this government just doesn't really care.

I hope that the Minister the executives and board members of the Interior Health Authority understand that if someone dies en route to Pentiction because there is no Emergency Room at Princeton General their blood will be on their hands. I am not trying to be dramatic. If these people cannot come up with real solutions and someone dies as a result of their inability to do their jobs then they have to be continued on Page 21

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

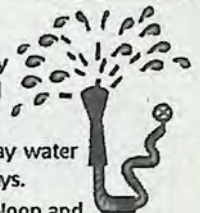
May 22, 2012

- Acting Mayor Earle, Council and staff attended the service for Mayor Thomas and reported that it was well attended.
- Council resolved to guarantee the float for Princeton Racing Days on June 29.
- The Rotary club received approval for its use of Veterans Square for the Taste of Ales and Chili Cook-off June 30.
- Council authorized a short term loan to the Kokanee Summer Swim Club to assist with operations.
- Approved the use of the Bridge of Dreams on June 23 for Vermilion Trails 2nd Annual Summer Dinner.

WATER RESTRICTIONS

Stage 1 Restrictions in effect May 15th.

- Even numbered civic addresses may water on Wednesdays, Friday and Sundays.
- Odd numbered civic addresses may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
- No watering is permitted between Noon and 6:00 pm.
- Watering is not permitted on Mondays.
- Washing of boats or motor vehicles with a hose is permitted only if using a hose with an automatic shut-off device.
- Public sector entities are restricted to three days per week at any time.

ER Solutions Already Published

Did you read the debate we published last week between Fraser-Nicola MLA Harry Lali and BC Minister of Health Michael de Jong?

I know, it was thousands of words in length and contained a lot of banter that reminded me of two kids whining in a sandbox, but if you managed to get past the cheap shots, finger pointing and blame shifting the answer to Princeton's ER problem was clearly revealed.

After the Minister states there has been \$10-million set aside to "facilitate additional emergency room coverage in rural areas of British Columbia" he gives the answer.

"A community like Princeton, for example, can submit a plan to say: 'With an extra \$100,000, this is how we plan to expand' – or maintain for that matter – 'emergency room coverage.'"

I understood that to be over and above the \$200,000 from the Ministry (and Town of Princeton) currently being used to pay locums and to pay rent on an apartment for locums to use while in Princeton.

How do I know that the Minister has given us the answer?

Later in the debate our MLA asks, with a long drawn-out preface, whether or not the actual plan is to just shut the doors on Princeton Hospital. There have also been rumours (note, they are rumours) hinting at the same fate.

However, in the debate of May 16, 2012 the Minister responds with: "There are no plans to close Princeton. None."

So what is the problem here?

Well, most of us seem to think that since the suits at IHA make roughly \$200,000 to 400,000 each that they should be coming up with the solutions.

I agree, but I also think that if the Minister of Health is saying one thing, and IHA is apparently saying something else, I'm going to bet on what is coming out of the Minister's mouth first.

We already have an incredibly strong lobby group in place fighting for the survival of Princeton hospital as a whole with the reduction in ER hours as the catalyst.

Maybe now is the time to put that energy behind building a plan that can be submitted to the Ministry and see what happens.

From where I'm sitting, I've had better success doing things myself rather than expecting others to do them for me and it's obvious to me that IHA is just covering their own bases.

How would you spend an extra \$100,000 on keeping ER services open 24/7 in Princeton?

Where Did Our Money Go?

I was talking to a friend about what is happening in the world economy these days. One nation after another is in big financial trouble. Even Canada seems to be tightening the belt. We wondered what happened to all the prosperity we had during the 1970's.

I remember the 1970's. Both my husband and I had good jobs, and most people we knew could find a job at the drop of a hat. We did not make big wages, but we could manage nicely on what we earned. News broadcasts did not mention homeless people or food banks. The government was always complaining about spending, but there were plenty of government jobs, and hardly anybody thought the government hiring people was a bad thing. After all, government employees paid income taxes just like the rest of us.

Our hospital was thriving. We had five physicians, two of whom were surgeons, and our hospital provided all but the most complex surgical procedures. We had no problem finding physicians to come to Princeton, even though it was a small town with only two indus-

tries, the forest industry and the mine. In those days, hardly any women went out of town to have a baby. Even if a Caesarean section was necessary, it was done right here in our hospital.

We still had train and bus services in Princeton during the 1970's.

We were not so environmentally concerned in those days. We were not so lifestyle concerned, either. We drank more alcohol and smoked more cigarettes in those days. We danced more, too, and had a lot more fun.

While life was not perfect in the 1970's, most of us did not worry about where our food was going to come from, and we did not worry much about paying bills unless we were old age pensioners. They got left behind during the 1970's and it took awhile for them to catch up a bit. Even though they were poor, they did not need to go to food banks like so many have to do today.

We had more stores in those days, but fewer services for families and children. We had more children then, too, and there was no declining enrolment. That was because young people could stay in town and find good jobs.

Nearly everybody who was over thirty had a mortgage, at much higher interest rates than we have today. If we could have obtained a mortgage at today's rates it would have seemed like striking gold.

One thing we did not have was credit cards and bank cards like we have now. People still used cheques and cash. Another thing we did not have was computers: people used typewriters and paper. Everything was in hard copy, and there was real cash exchanged when we were doing business. I

don't know if that is a significant factor. I wonder.

Everybody was a lot younger then. The percentage of people in the age group between 20 and 50 was much higher. This may be a significant factor - I don't know.

I am not saying families did not have to pinch pennies in the 1970's. Anybody raising a family had to budget, but it seems like we could afford more, and we were not frightened by the future.

Then came the big recession of the early 1980's and our lives have never been the same since. The government started cutting its employees and privatizing. Then we saw more and more jobs moving overseas to low wage countries, and we heard more about leveling the playing field so we could compete. It seemed to me that was just another way of telling us we had to get used to being poorer than we had been. It seemed to me that, rather than protecting Canadian industries and Canadian producers, our government was telling us we could not count on being able to sustain our own economy.

The net result of all of this level playing field is that the richest nations in the world seem to be getting a lot poorer, while those nations desperate to ensure their people have jobs are getting richer.

I don't know the answers, but I would like somebody to tell me why we did so well 40 years ago and now we, as a nation, can no longer afford to feed and house and provide medical care for all of our people, and why towns like ours, where we produce the raw materials that sustain our economy, can no longer find physicians or be sure our hospitals will not be shut down.

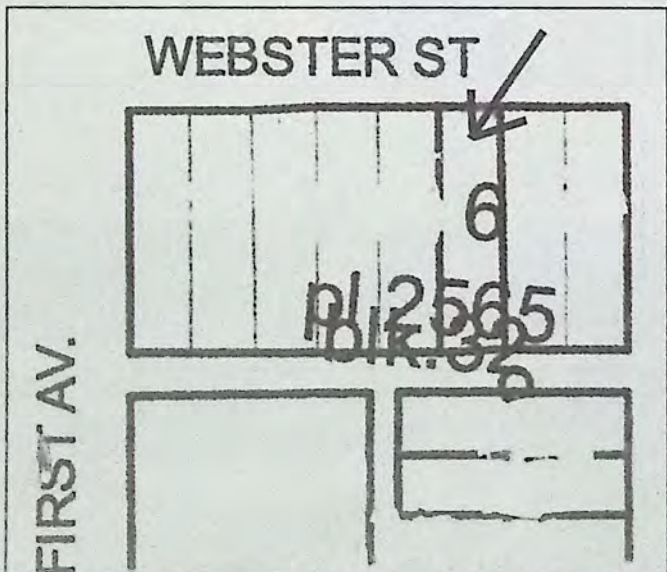

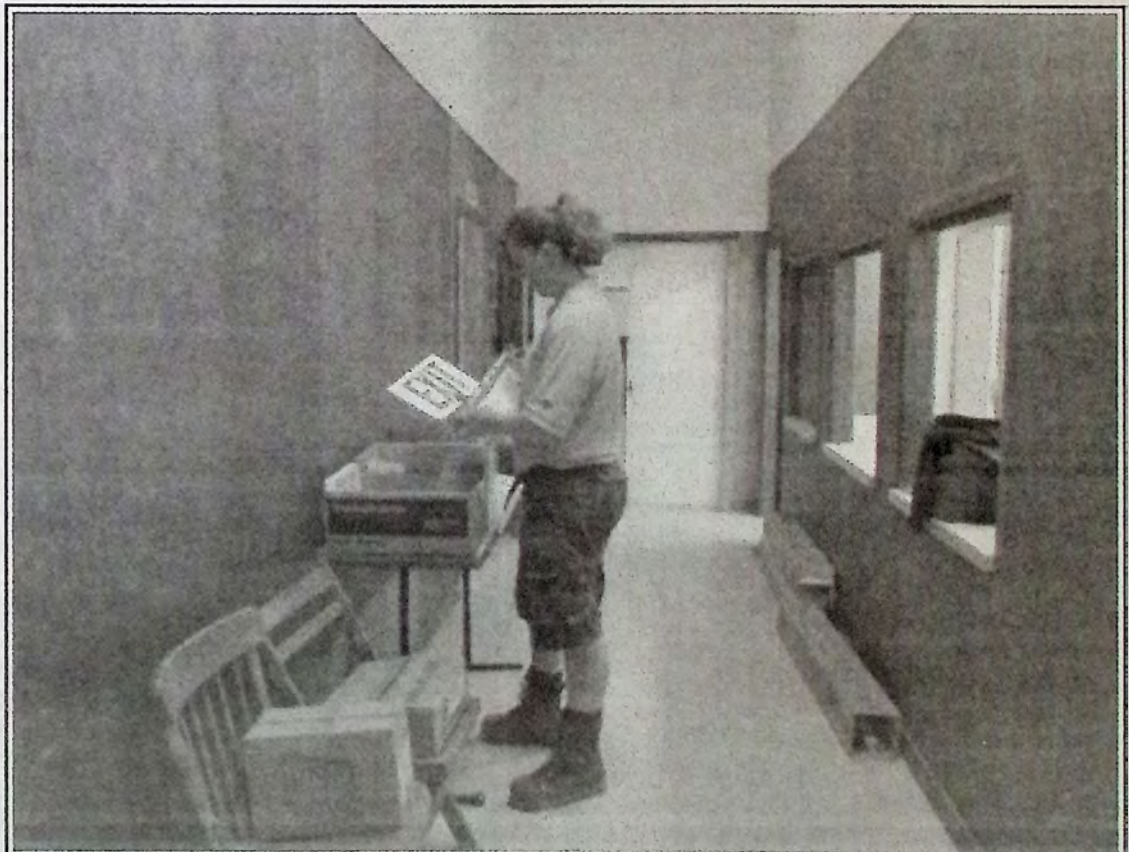

Goldcliff Resources - Tulameen Project

George Sanders, President of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (TSX:V-GCN), reported May 16th that Goldcliff has acquired the Goldrop claims and, consequently, the Goldrop copper-silver-gold-lead-zinc showing. The claims adjoin Goldcliff's 26,333 hectare Tulameen Project, the company's 100 per-cent owned holdings in the Copper Mountain district near Princeton.

The Goldrop showing is highlighted by surface and drill sample values of 0.77% copper, 1.30 grams per tonne silver, 0.14 grams per tonne gold and 8.85% zinc. Favourably comparable to the mineralization of the Copper Mountain porphyry mine system located seven kilometres to the northeast, the Goldrop mineralization adds to the discovery potential, on surface and to deeper depths, of the Whipsaw target area copper porphyry systems.

The Whipsaw target is host to several mineralized showings that are important to the overall exploration potential of the Whipsaw porphyry

copper target area. The interpreted exploration surface area is estimated to be 2.5 by 4.5 kilometres. The 3D-IP chargeability response at Whipsaw indicates disseminated sulphide mineralization down to depths of 500 metres. The dimensions of the Whipsaw target are also similar to the Copper Mountain mine target.

In addition to the Goldrop, there are several other surface mineralized showings associated with the Whipsaw target that enhance its exploration potential for a new porphyry copper discovery in the Copper Mountain district. The Trojan copper showing, which was discovered in 2011, is highlighted by 0.655% copper, 4.8 grams per tonne silver and 0.08 grams per tonne gold overlying a deep chargeability anomaly.

The Eagle showing, discovered in 1974, is located up slope from the Trojan and is highlighted by 0.175% copper and 1.0 grams per tonne silver. The Nev and Raven showings, also discovered in 1974, are located

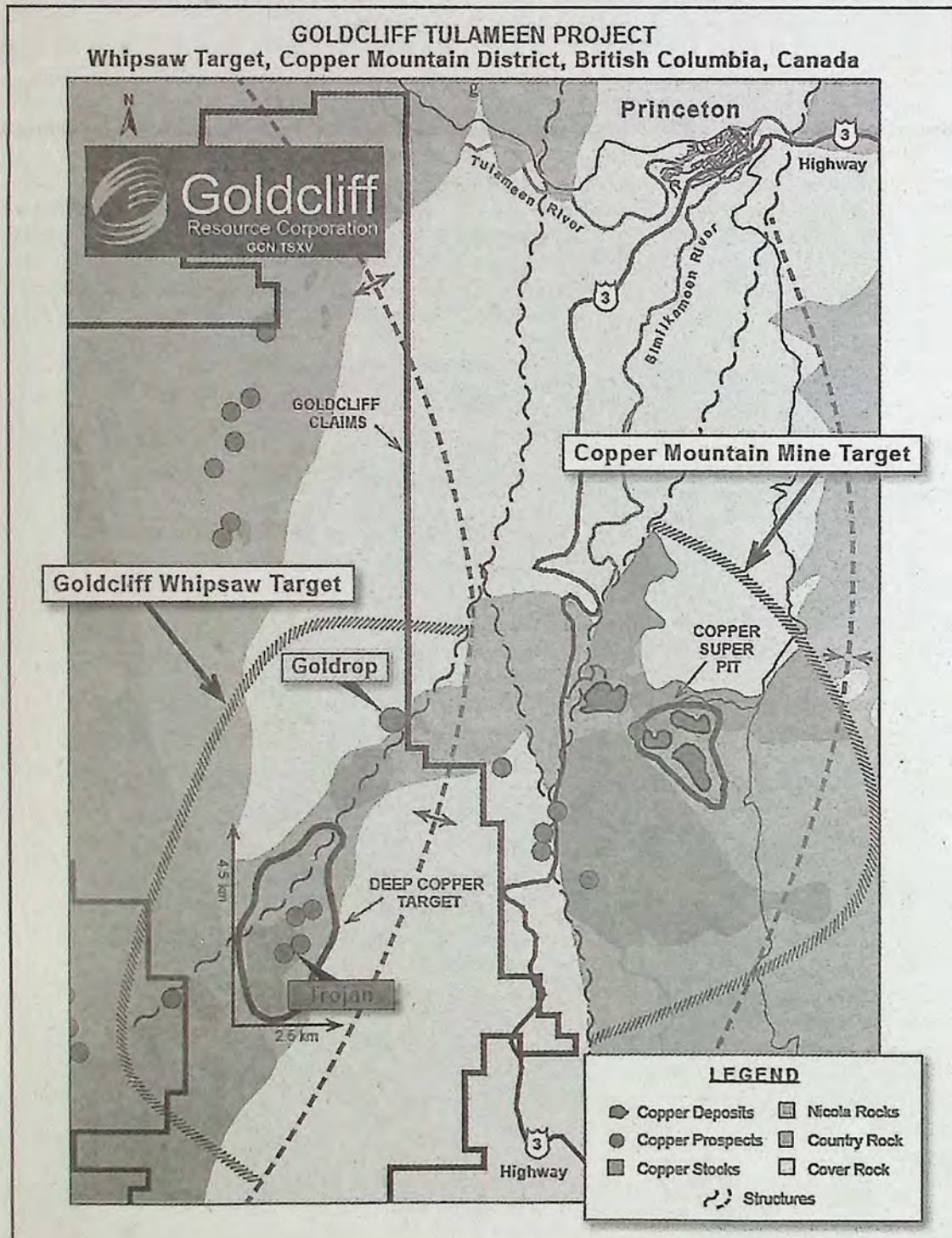
north of the Trojan and Eagle showing. The Nev is highlighted by 0.231% copper and 0.2 grams per tonne silver. The Raven is highlighted by 0.353% copper, 0.8 grams per tonne silver and 0.165 grams per tonne gold.

The copper mineralization associated with the showings is chalcopyrite and malachite accompanied by pyrite and pyrrhotite along with magnetite.

The Whipsaw target area is located along the Copper Mountain southwest copper trend, approximately seven kilometres southwest of the Copper Mountain ore bodies. For 2012 exploration, trenching and drilling are scheduled on the Whipsaw target.

(NC)—Have you ever thought about becoming a human rights activist? This is how thousands of people across Canada are choosing to spend some of their time and helping to make a real difference for a better world.

There are many, many ways for you to take action. It really all depends on

you—your interests and how much time you have. But whether you have five minutes a week or five hours, there are ways for you to get more involved.

Many people who are new to human rights start their involvement by contacting Amnesty International, joining Amnesty's Urgent Action

Network and writing letters to protect people whose lives or safety are at immediate risk. This is a great option wherever you live in Canada. Across the country, there are approximately 100 local and regional Amnesty Groups and Action Circles. Groups work on current human rights campaigns, participate in letter-writing appeals and take part in special projects. Some local Amnesty groups work on long-standing appeal cases or campaign on specific regions in the world.

Amnesty International also has a large network of over 400 youth and student groups in schools and universities across Canada. If you're a student, there may already be a group in your school that you can join; if there isn't, Amnesty's national office can give you all the help you need to get a group started.

Too much red meat can promote colon cancer, the experts tell us. Experts say alcohol consumption should be limited to no more than two alcoholic beverages per week. Try telling that to the guy watching the Stanley Cup play-offs.

To avoid colon cancer, calcium and magnesium should be adequate. Maybe there are fewer women with colon cancer because they take a daily calcium supplement after age 40 to avoid bone loss, and those supplements contain magnesium, too. Perhaps men should consider building up more calcium and magnesium?

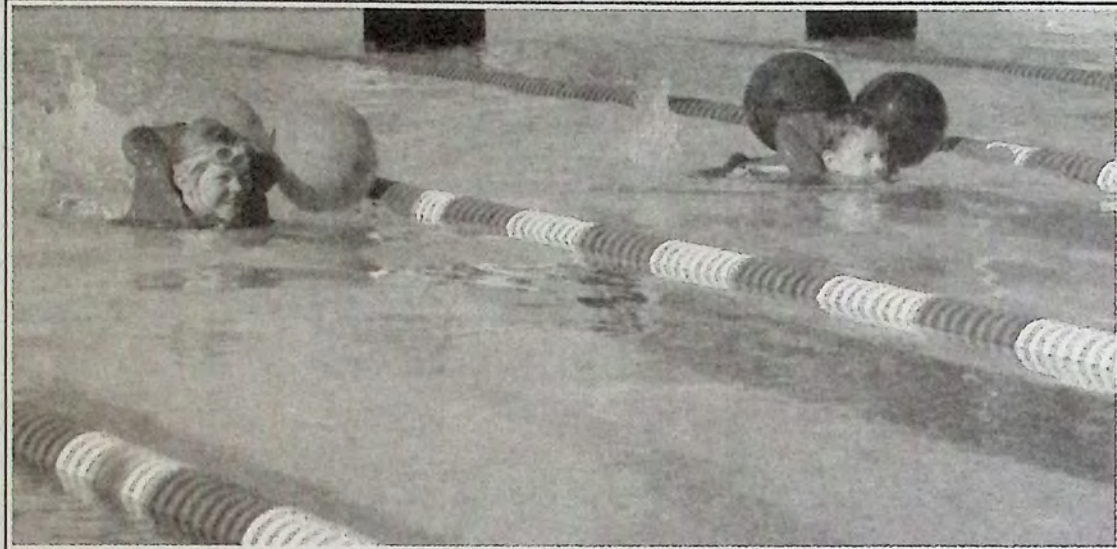
We know most men will not read this, and are not likely to pay heed, but if you have a man in your life, read it to him and help him change his lifestyle before it is too late.

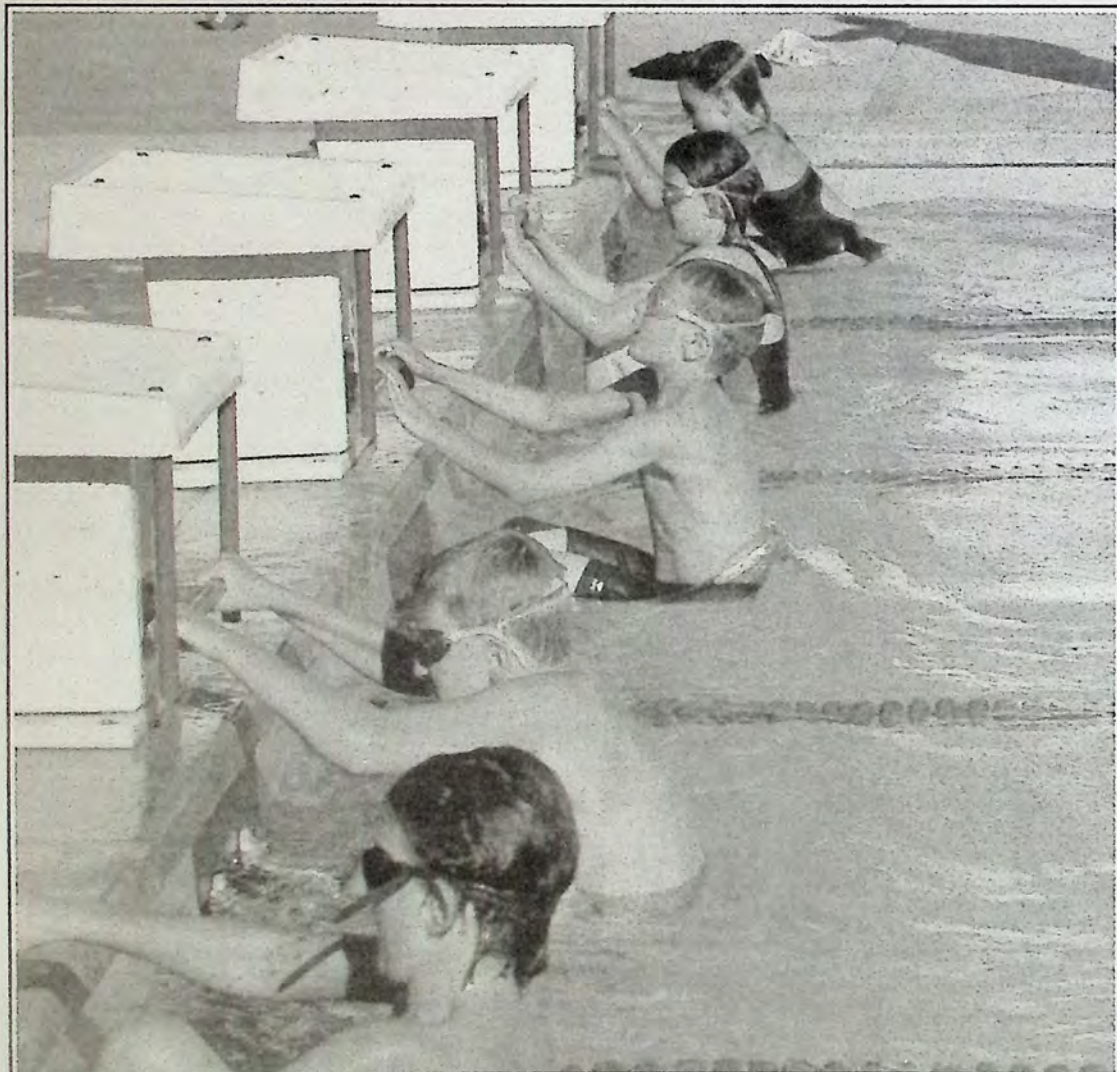

Cheesy Peanut Puff Pastry Straws

(NC)—Don't feel guilty about the simplicity of these hors d'oeuvres—they're sure to be a big hit and get devoured in a flash. It's important to finely chop the peanuts so they adhere to the pastry. More tasty recipes can be found at www.peanutbureau.ca.

Prep time: 15 minutes / Baking time: 15 minutes / Makes 44 to 48 straws

Ingredients:

- 2 cups (500 mL) old cheddar cheese, grated
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) salted peanuts, finely chopped
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) cayenne pepper
- 1 package frozen puff pastry, thawed (14 oz/397 g)
- 1 egg, lightly beaten

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C). Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. In a bowl, combine cheese, peanuts and cayenne pepper.
2. On a lightly floured surface, roll out half of the puff pastry into a 12-inch (30-cm) square. Trim to size if needed. Brush egg all over surface. Sprinkle half of the cheese and peanut mixture over lower half of square, leaving about 1/2-inch (1-cm) border on three sides. Fold top half of pastry over bottom half, pinching edges firmly to seal. Using rolling pin, lightly roll over pastry to seal layers together. Brush with egg.
3. Using a sharp knife, cut rectangle vertically into 1/2-inch (1-cm) thick strips, each 6 inches (15 cm) long. Twist each strip several times and place in a single layer on prepared pan.
4. Repeat with remaining pastry and cheese mixture. Bake in centre of preheated oven, rotating pans halfway through, until straws are puffed and golden, 15 to 18 minutes. Once made, straws can be kept in an airtight container for a couple of days or frozen for a month.

Dr. Halpenny and his team all agree that Princeton General should have 24/7 Emergency Room coverage but cannot provide the answers to bringing this situation to an end. Princeton residents have been living in the shadow of Emergency Room closures since 2010. The only difference between those closures and the recent closures is that before we played a game of chance going to the Emergency Room. Now we know that Monday to Thursday there is no Emergency Room service after midnight and we take our chances on the 1.5 hour drive along the highway to Penticton.

We the residents of Princeton respectfully request that the Minister of Health come to Princeton, talk to the people here, ease our concerns and tell us that the Ministry is working on solving the crisis facing rural communities like Princeton. People are leaving our community. Families and seniors do not want to move to our community. We are in desperate need of immediate solutions.

We understand how busy the Minister is but we respectfully request that you meet with us by the 14th of June. We also respectfully request that you provide us with at least 1 week notice so that we may book a venue large enough for the occasion.

Thank you for your time and understanding of the urgency of the situation. We look forward to hearing from you.

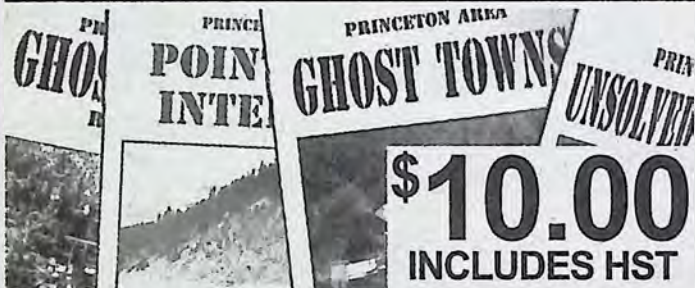

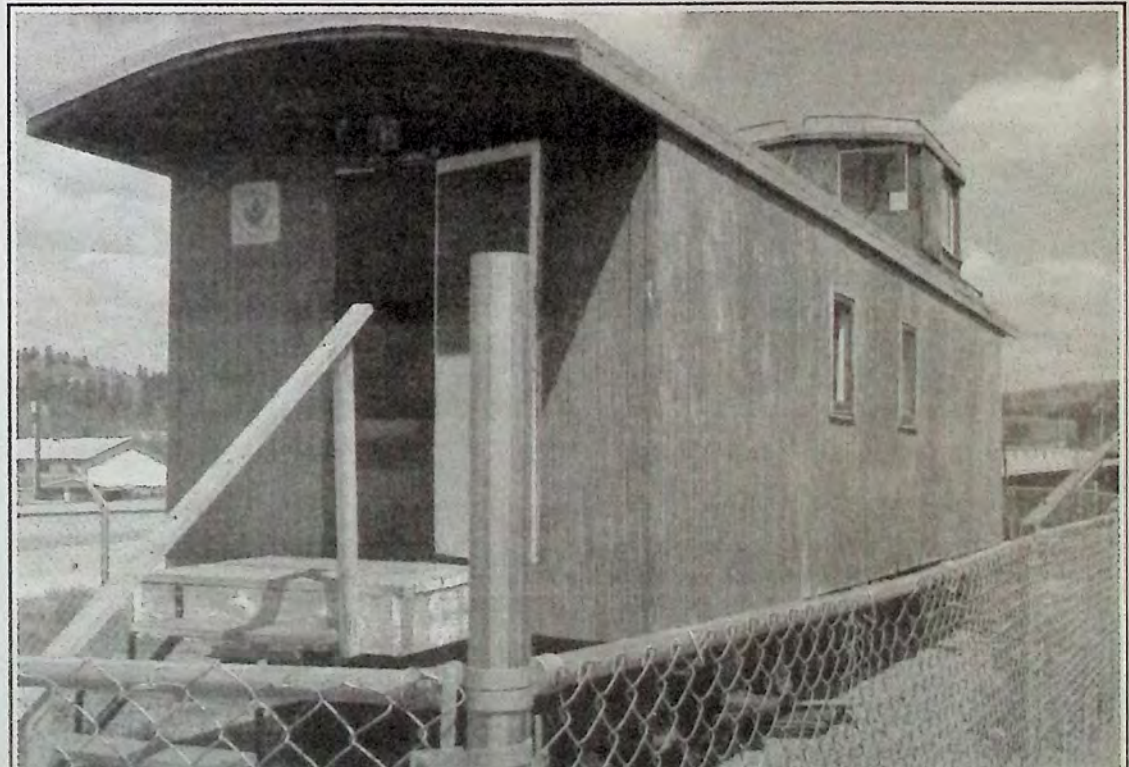

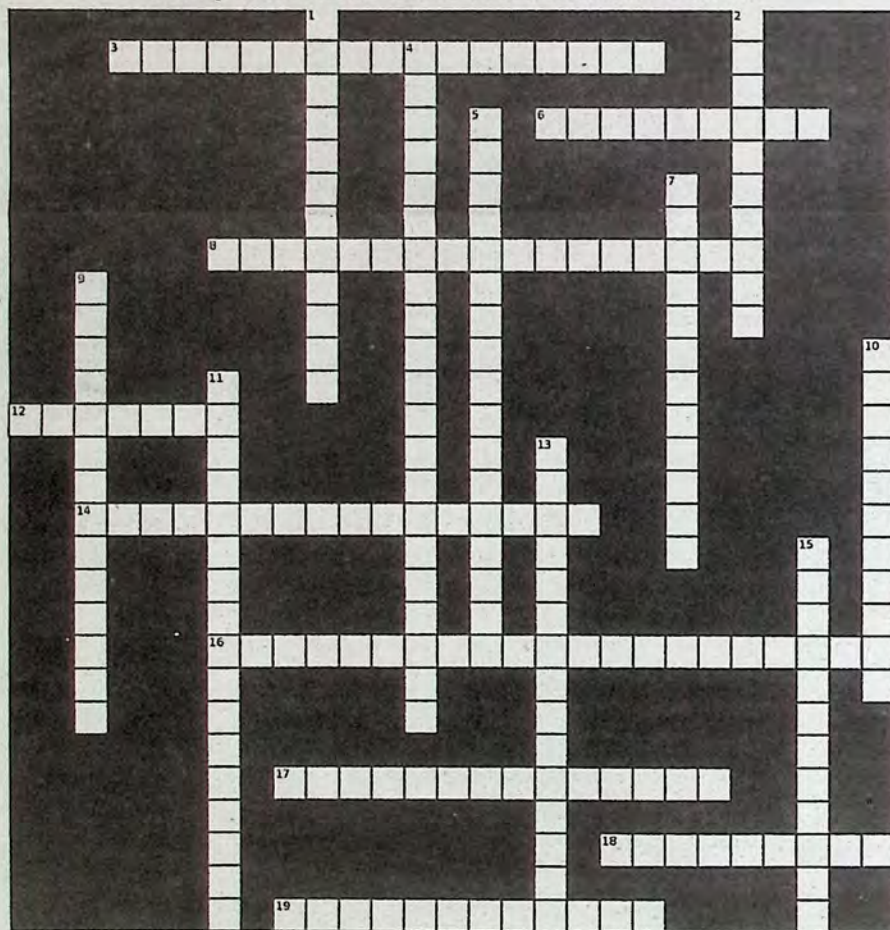

A debriefing was held May 24th in Princeton Senior's Hall Branch 30 to sort through the many meetings local groups had with IHA regarding ER closures.

In attendance were:

- 150 concerned Princeton citizens as well as representatives from:
- Save Our Similkameen (SOS)
- Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen (RDOS)

- Save Our Hospital Coalition (SOHC)

- local Businessmen's Association
The conclusion was not conducive to progress. Industry asked directly about worker's safety and protection. IHA told us that there were "helicopters on standby" in Kelowna, a half an hour's travel time.

Dave Rainier, Chairperson of the Businessmen's Association, pointed out that choppers did not fly at

night, to which IHA President and CEO Dr. Robert Halpenny agreed and began talking about HART Team based out of Penticton.

Industry again pointed out that the travel time from Penticton to Copper Mountain or the back hills of Princeton was dangerously long and well beyond the guaranteed "Golden Hour".

The HART Team (High Acuity Response Team), is only for transport from hospital to hospital, NOT

for emergencies. When SOHC asked about the STARS helicopter, Dr. Halpenny responded by saying "The STARS helicopter is a Cadillac service" and "you get better care in ambulances".

It is common knowledge in the Health Care industry that helicopter care has a higher quality.

Time and again it was clear that IHA had no interest in ER restoration. In fact, there was an overall tendency to ignore the need until after the next election in May.

RDOS representative, Brad Hope,

was told perhaps the problem could not be solved. Grassroots organization representative, Spencer Coyne, was told to "make the town more attractive".

In response, SOS has decided on a new approach, joining forces with outside organizations in pursuing legal action.

Another rally is planned to send the message to IHA "No More Talk" starting at 3:00 PM on Monday, May 28th at Veterans Square in the centre of downtown Princeton.

Who Is Dr. Halpenny?

Dr. Robert Halpenny received his BSc (Physical Education) from the University of Guelph and then played professional hockey in Vienna, Austria, and Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

He received his Medical Degree from the University of Saskatchewan, completing his Family Practice Residency from the University of British Columbia before starting private practice in Vancouver.

Dr. Halpenny was Vice-President of Medicine at St. Vincent's Hospital in Vancouver, where he participated in the merger of five Catholic hospitals. In pursuing his interest in health care administration, Dr. Halpenny completed a Master of Science in Health Administration from the University of Colorado in 1995.

He was Vice-President of Medicine at St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Junction, Colorado, where he accomplished a joint venture between investing physicians and the hospital to build and operate an Ambulatory Surgery Center. Returning to Canada in 2002 as the Vice-President of Medical Affairs for the Fraser Health Authority, he then became the Provincial Executive Director of Cardiac Services for British Columbia (BC).

Dr. Halpenny has also been the Senior Medical Director of Interior Health based out of Kelowna and, in January 2010, became its President and CEO. Dr. Halpenny sits on the BC Medical Services Commission, the BC Emergency and Health Services Commission, and on the Management Board of Health

Shared Services BC.

The Senior Executive Team Structure and Functional Responsibility Chart from IHA shows Halpenny does not sit on the very top, although he has nine various vice presidents below him, he also has an Executive Assistant and Coordinator of Strategic Initiatives as board equals and an Internal Auditor. They all answer to an unnamed Board of Directors and the Board Resource Officer.

IHA was formed in 2001 as one of five geographically-based health authorities in British Columbia. IHA is responsible for providing publically-funded health services to over 742,000 residents in the Southern Interior of the province.

The footprint services from IHA offers covers a total of 216,000 square kilometres and includes the larger communities of Kamloops, Kelowna, Cranbrook, Trail, Vernon, Penticton and all surrounding communities.

IHA has an \$1.8-billion budget with over 18,000 employees and 1,600 physicians working within the IHA territory.

In an article published last month by Hospital News Dr. Halpenny states: "As Interior Health heads into it's the next ten years, the question we're asking ourselves is, 'What more are we capable of achieving?'"

Princeton area residents will likely have a few suggestions for Dr. Halpenny to consider.
