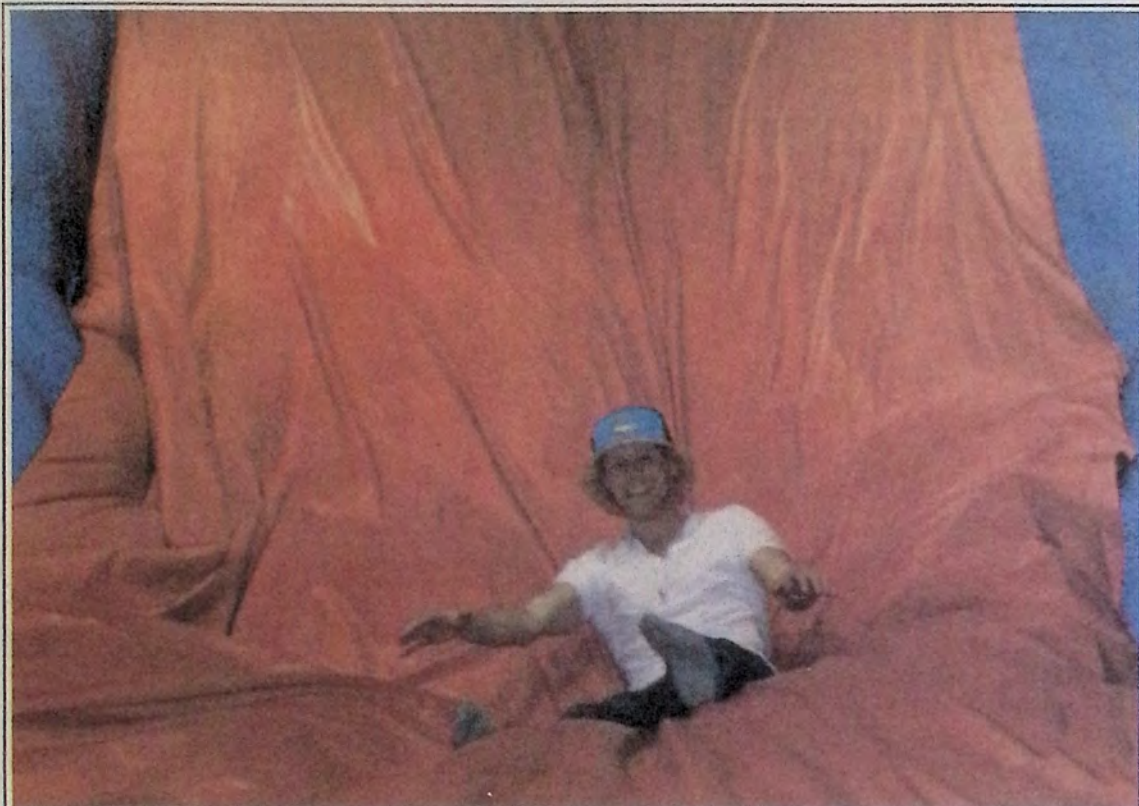

## Princeton Arts Council receives funding

Princeton Community Arts Council has received a \$15,000 operating grant from the BC Arts Council, and a \$5,000 grant in aid from Town Council. The members will review priorities at a strategic planning session this month.

Members met on May 30 to review and pass an important amendment to the Arts Council constitution making it conform to the requirements of all societies having charity status.

The theatrical group of Arts Council members is putting on a play this weekend. It is a comedy called "Glorious" and tells the true story of a wealthy woman who truly believed she had a star quality singing voice. The play will run June 7, 8, and 9, then on June 15, 16 and 17. Fridays and Saturdays will feature evening performances at 7:00 p.m. but Sundays will have a matinee at 2:00 p.m. The Father's Day matinee will have two door

prizes for a couple of lucky fathers.

Doreen Paulson reported to members that the Garden Club is making progress on its book on gardening in Princeton area. The club has received a \$250 grant to assist in compiling the book. Paulson said the club would like input from any gardeners in the community, particularly humorous anecdotes about local gardening.

The Rock and Fossil Club has a campout weekend on June 22, 23 and 24. It will be held in Coalmont and will include some treks around the area to find fossils and important rocks. ## Study says rural hospitals are better

Canada is not the only country in which small hospitals are being closed in favour of regionalized or centralized hospitals. Rural Australians are experiencing the same government policy. Australians call it 'delocalization' and have fought it tooth and nail with no better results than Princeton. However, a study done in the United States may save rural Americans the same battle.

Due to health care legislation brought in by the federal government in 2010 which expanded Medicare benefits to more Americans than ever before, the government decided there might be a need for health care reform. A company called iVantage Analytics did a nationwide study comparing small rural hospitals with urban hospitals. The recommendation after

the study was to keep rural hospitals because they are better. The study was released to the public in April 2012 and is titled Rural Relevance Under Health Care Reform. It is on the net.

Rural hospitals in the study closely resemble the hospital Princeton had before the 21st century. The rural hospitals had surgical facilities for common surgical procedures and offered maternity care and acute care. Only complex cases requiring a specialist were referred to another hospital.

The study found rural hospitals are more efficient. Rural hospitals kept fewer people in the hospital, offering more outpatient care. Outpatients are those who are admitted for a treatment and then go home the same day. Higher outpatient statistics mean higher savings. At the same time, this did not mean patients were receiving inferior care. The study checked to see how many patients came back within 30 days, and it was no worse than the

city hospitals.

Patients entering rural hospitals were seen by a physician in half the time it took a patient in a city hospital.

## BC funds more nurse practitioner positions

The government is funding 190 nurse practitioner (NP) positions over the next three years to provide better access to health care for British Columbian families.

The announcement, made May 31st, will see the \$22.2-million Nurse Practitioners for BC (NP4BC) initiative begin this fall. NP4BC will provide opportunities for existing nurse practitioners, as well as new graduate nurse practitioners, to be fully integrated in the health-care system. The majority will be working in primary health-care settings, which can include public health offices, medical clinics, residential care or other community settings.

The 190 positions will support existing qualified nurse practitioners

who have not been able to secure a nurse practitioner position, as well as ensuring that opportunities are there for newly-qualified nurse practitioners graduating in the future. Currently, 225 nurse practitioners are registered with the College of Registered Nurses of B.C. About 72 are presently not practising within their chosen profession, with the expectation of another 30 graduates this year.

B.C. has the ability to train up to 45 nurse practitioners a year, 15 at each of the University of British Columbia, the University of Northern British Columbia and the University of Victoria.

The health system is faced with increasing demands and costs driven by an aging, growing popula-

tion and a higher prevalence of chronic diseases. This requires the Province to look for new and innovative approaches to service delivery, including nurse practitioners.

Nurse practitioners were introduced to B.C. in 2005 to assist in improving access to primary health-care services. In fall 2011, the Province passed legislation allowing nurse practitioners to work fully within their existing scope of practice.

"Nurse practitioners want to fully participate in the health system within their full potential, and the government of British Columbia shares this goal. Today's announce-

## Better than a band-aid solution

It's becoming clear to me that the system being used by Interior Health Authority to deliver health care services to the Southern Interior of British Columbia is failing.

How else can you explain the failure to come up with a better solution than shutting the Princeton ER four nights a week?

I received a phone call early last week from IHA in Kelowna explaining to me that the temporary service reduction implemented the weekend of May 25th to 27th was much different than the four night per week closures.

When the hospital ER is in 'LLTO Status' (life, limb, threatened organ)

things are pretty much situation normal with the exception that unless your emergency doesn't fall under the category of 'very serious' as the term LLTO suggests, you will probably not see a doctor.

The closures mid-week after midnight at Princeton hospital were explained as being something other than LLTO status.

I was told that although the doors to the building, and most importantly the entrance to the ER, are all locked, there is a nurse in the building. All you have to do is buzz the buzzer at the door to get attention. Then your emergency will be assessed and depending on the severity, you may find yourself being shipped off to another medical

facility out of town for treatment.

If it sounds complicated, confusing and maybe a touch convoluted to you, then I'm not the only one thinking those things.

So in other words, when the Princeton ER is closed after midnight four nights a week, in the middle of the week, it really isn't closed. The doors are locked, and there is someone there, but expect service to be altered somewhat from what you may have had emergency ward activity pictured in your mind.

With IHA reporting a maximum number of patient visits of two in any given mid-week night after midnight, they chose to shut the ER four nights a week between mid-..... continued on Page 23

## My Turn

### Broken Tools Or Unskilled Labour

It was another interesting conversation over the breakfast table the other morning with my wife. She asked me a question I'm not so sure of the answer so maybe I'll be able to fumble my way around to an answer here.

She asked me if I were one of the 'top level' executives working for IHA, would I do the job for \$50,000 per year or less rather than the average current wage of about \$225,000 (not counting bonuses and expense account).

My answer was no, but let me explain. In my view, there is not enough money to pay me to implement IHA protocols which are actually cuts to rural health care. I could not sleep at night knowing that I was one of the people behind, for example, the reduction of operating hours at a small rural hospital emergency department. Especially when common sense would tell me I could be putting the residents of that community a greater risk of a disaster waiting to happen. I couldn't handle the stress, first off, then to top it off I don't think I could handle the verbal abuse directed at myself and my fellow board members for making those decisions.

The IHA protocol manual, I imagine, is very much like the guidelines set out for mechanics by Chilton. If it takes you 20-minutes to do an oil change, but Chilton says it's 45-minutes, you charge the 45-minutes in labour because that's what the manual tells you to do.

I see some of the 'top level' IHA officials in the same light. I'm sure at least one of them has the common sense to see what is happening around them in rural health care in British Columbia, but they are just doing what the manual is telling them to do.

So why are things falling apart for rural health care? I think there are a couple of reasons. Firstly, I think since our population is aging, and let's face it, thanks to medical science, we're all living longer lives, I don't think the IHA manual was prepared for the extra pressure it would experience with more seniors tugging at the system. Secondly, I think as a result of more seniors living longer, the system requires a serious overhaul to address that issue. I suspect that the chapter in the IHA manual titled, "After Age 65" is either an unfinished chapter, or has nothing in it past the title page.

Or maybe, just maybe, the 'top level' officials at IHA can't implement the program because they don't know how. Maybe they are in over their heads, which means, of course, they are the wrong people for the job.

You decide.

I'm sticking with my original answer that no amount of money would be enough for me to make sweeping changes to a system that isn't working.

Dear Editor,

I have several questions regarding the reconstruction of the Zig Zag trail. First, what is the historical purpose of the Zig Zag trail? I always presumed it was to provide a shorter route for people to walk between the First Bench and downtown.

Now, perhaps to gain funding grants, the planning and major financial emphasis seems to be on the "Princeton Grind". This name refers to the metal stair system that will go straight up the hill with five view point, rest areas. Most everyone knows that it is easier to move up a hill in a zig zag pattern, so why invest so much in a stair system that does not provide for ease of movement?

In the plans, the new Zig Zag path will remain a dirt trail meeting with the straight stairway at the five rest points. The straight stair trail will be too strenuous for many of the

intended users, and the Zig Zag path, being dirt, mud, or snow, will not provide reasonably secure footing in any season, not good for those who cannot handle the "Grind" stair system.

As for safety, the more strenuous straight stair system, even with rest levels, provides a much increased chance for a long tumble. The metal steps include holes that are large enough to catch heeled shoes, canes, and walking sticks and the grating, should one fall, is more than sharp enough to cause serious damage. Is there a provision for benches at the rest areas? No. Is the stairway wide enough to allow for these benches? No. Is the lighting of the stairway adequate? No. Are there handrails at a child appropriate height? No.

Regarding maintenance, our hard working Town Crew is already pushed to the limit with regular seasonal maintenance and is over-

whelmed during snowfalls. What will be the priority of snow removal on the stair system? This seems like yet another safety and liability issue.

Town Council has lost sight of the primary purpose of the Zig Zag trail. Let's be real, tourists are not going to stop in Princeton to climb our "Princeton Grind" stair system or to see the Town from the viewpoints. It is a trail intended to provide safe passage for local folk. Let us not work to a bare minimum standard. Put the stairs in a zig zag pattern to make them easier to use, follow ADA standards to make the stair system safer, and cover the stairs with a roof. Princeton has one chance to do this, so let's get it done right.

And for the record, I am not running for a position on Town Council.

Recently Princeton Hospital had a visit from Dr. Robert Halpenny, CEO - Interior Health Authority. He spoke with various organizations and business leaders and then addressed citizens of Princeton who were rallying on the road outside the hospital. We were hoping for some solutions to our problems with the closing of the ER four nights per week and the lack of doctors to man the ER.

I was incensed by his attitude towards our situation. He said that we were not the only hospital with problems and that we should make Princeton more attractive if we

wanted more doctors to come to our community. How insulting, how uncaring, how offensive to suggest that our community was not attractive enough to warrant 24/7 ER services. What was he thinking?

We live in a area with working mines, lumber mill, ranching and other businesses which work 24 hours a day, not to mention the number three highway which is a main truck route to the southern Okanagan. Mining, lumber and ranching are the basis for the wealth of British Columbia. Apparently it is OK for Princeton to supply these services and contribute to the economy of the province but we do not deserve a fully functional hospital.

I am a member of the Princeton Hospital Auxiliary and we raise

funds for the Princeton hospital, the Ridgewood facility for senior residents who require care as well as the hospital in Penticton. We have a thrift store to raise funds and the citizens support the auxiliary by donating clothing etc. and shopping in the store. We have contributed nearly \$100,000.00 over the past ten years to the Princeton hospital alone allowing them to obtain essential equipment for the hospital. In other words we do the work which should be done by the government thus saving the government money.

We certainly do not deserve to have Dr. Robert Halpenny come to our town and arrogantly and scornfully suggest that we do not deserve emergency services 24/7 or doctors as we are not attractive enough. He is obviously not interested in doing his job of making sure the rural residents of British Columbia's interior have adequate hospital facilities.

The residents of Princeton and area are demanding that Interior Health do their job and hire people with the intelligence and skills as well as forward thinking who can do the job they are hired to do.

## Is Anybody Doing Anything?

The exposed fuel rods at Fukushima #4 are a danger to all of the northern hemisphere. They are deteriorating and could cause a massive explosion that would further contaminate all of the air, water and soil of the northern hemisphere. This threat is not being addressed as far as I can tell. The owner of the property, TEPCO, says it is impossible to keep equipment working at the site as radiation levels are so high.

For the sake of the health of everyone, but particularly for the health of children, the site must be contained, yet there seems to be no international outcry, and no solution offered. For the past 14 months, that site has continued to give off radioactive material into the air and water. All of us have been exposed, not at the levels to which the people of Fukushima prefecture have been exposed, but certainly higher than normal levels of radiation, according to the sen-

sors operating on the west coast of the United States.

The major media has said little about this threat to our health, although Global TV, online, has informed the public. This crisis should be on everyone's lips, not just in Canada, but in every country in the northern hemisphere, yet we hear next to nothing about it.

Contamination due to radioactive fallout from Fukushima is two and a half times higher, overall, than from Chernobyl. In some places where people were NOT evacuated, the contamination at Fukushima was worse than at any place around Chernobyl.

What the government did at Chernobyl could be done around Fukushima. The government of the Soviet Union dusted the land with 2.5 centimeters of zeolite, a clay substance that absorbs radiation and holds it. In this way, the Ukrainian farmers around Chernobyl were able to return to their farms and live somewhat normal lives again, although they must carefully watch their health.

Nothing has been done around Fukushima. Everything from the evacuation zone remains contaminated. In fact, contamination has spread to Tokyo Bay, and is an indication of the level of sea water contamination which has spread during the past 14 months. Still, nobody seems to be addressing remedial action.

In addition to the problem posed by the exposed fuel rods, nobody appears to be addressing the problem of a Manhattan-size island of

tidal wave flotsam heading for the shores of North America's west coast. Some of it has arrived already, certainly one motorcycle. We are not being told of the extent of radioactivity of the tidal wave material floating toward our shore, and we are not being told whether it needs remedial action. If this floating material is contaminated, we are not being told what to do with it when it arrives on our beaches. We are not being told whether our seafood, particularly our salmon, are contaminated.

It seems to me there is a high level of irresponsibility on the part of both our provincial government, who should be concerned about the immediacy of the flotsam problem, and our federal government, who should be concerned about the threat of radioactive contamination from the exposed fuel rods, as should all other northern hemisphere governments.

For the past 14 months, the world appears to have chosen to ignore the Fukushima disaster, behaving as if it were Japan's problem and leaving Japan to deal with it alone. Maybe appearances are deceiving, but I really wonder. I began to wonder two weeks after the Fukushima disaster when I learned that Canada's response to the radioactive threat was to shut down the stations that detect radioactive contamination. It is as if our government has chosen to adopt the attitude "if we ignore it, it will go away". Unfortunately, having our collective heads in the sand leaves our collective asses exposed.

I write today to bring to your attention concerns which are being expressed by Fred Danenhowe, of the Similkameen Okanagan Organic Treefruit Growers Association (SOOTGA), in a submission to the CFIA, regarding the request for approval of the sale/distribution of the genetically modified (GM) Arctic tree/apple.

While I will not reiterate all the issues he has raised, you will see by the attached that SOOTGA is

mainly concerned that the Arctic Apple, if commercialized, will inevitably lead to cross pollination with neighbouring orchards. Mr. Danenhowe makes it very clear in his submission how this would have a catastrophic impact on organic and conventional growers, the local economy as well as the integrity of the BC brand.

Amidst the growing demand for organic food and the ongoing farm crisis certified organic farmers as well as conventional farmers should be supported rather than left to live under the constant threat of losing crops to contami-

nation from genetically engineered plants. The one-sided regulations which govern this science continue to be stacked in favour of the biotech industrialists and against farmers who prefer to service the lucrative non-GMO market.

Tree fruit growers in BC and across Canada are counting on you to ensure that any threat from Arctic Apple to their industry is removed once and for all. I trust you will not disappoint them.

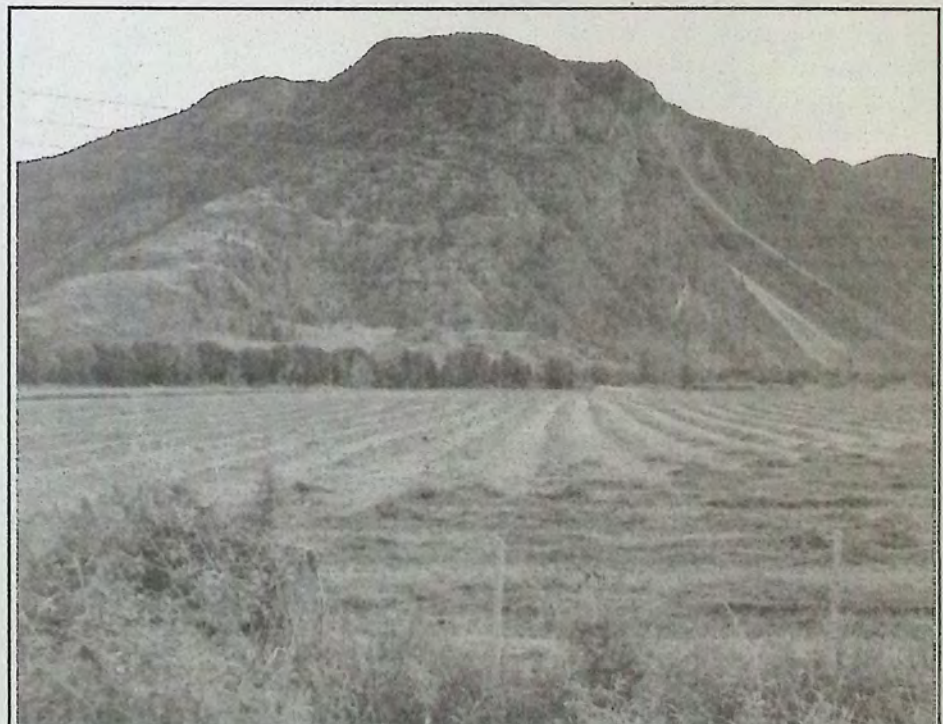

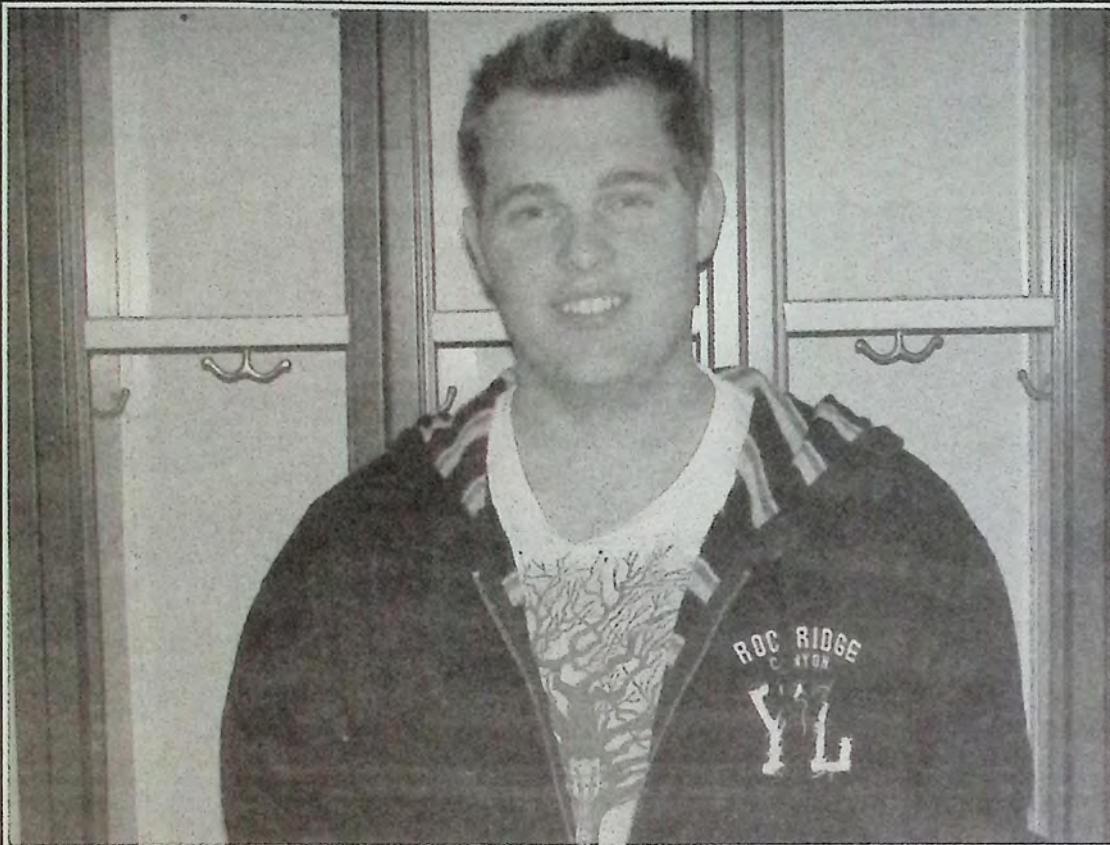

## Two New Solitudes - Part 1

There was a time when we talked about the "two solitudes" in Canada, referring to a divide between French and English Canada. Although differences still exist between our two founding cultures, they are now more often celebrated than not.

Over the past few years, however, I have seen "two new solitudes" emerge. Let's call them "Neo-Conservative" and "Progressive." Though we may speak the same language, we really do not understand each other. I notice this in the House of Commons, particularly. There are major differences in how these two new solitudes perceive the world and I would like to discuss these over my next two columns.

One solitude sees for Canada a role on the world stage that is a significant shift from the values that our country has traditionally represented. The current Conservative government wants Canada to become a proud military nation that makes major contributions to war efforts in areas such as Afghanistan and Libya. This focus means that our military must be equipped and trained to engage in more combat

missions throughout the world, usually at the side of the US in NATO-led missions. The latest military technology, like the F-35 first strike jets, needs to be in place to fit into this version.

The other solitude believes that Canada has lost its leadership role in world peacekeeping and that we should return to our role of working within the United Nations and concentrate on making defence a priority for our armed forces. This change would require that Canada leave Afghanistan and decline other missions with NATO, an organization originally set up in 1949 to protect Europe from communist aggression. Canada should play a greater role as a broker in peaceful settlements in the Middle East, Africa and other areas of conflict. Military purchases should provide the equipment to get the job done and keep our troops, and civilians, safe.

This past November I introduced a Private Member's bill to create a federal Department of Peace. Bill C-373 passed first reading in the House of Commons on November 30, 2011.

The work of a Department of Peace would be to strengthen non-military means of peace-making by developing policies and programs that promote national and international conflict prevention, non-violent intervention, mediation and peaceful conflict resolution. Bill C-373 outlines wide-ranging objectives for a Department of Peace that would tackle domestic and international responsibilities in the areas of human security and education.

The notion that there can be peace in the world may be a utopian ideal but each generation owes it to the next to make a dedicated attempt to get as close to it as humanly possible.

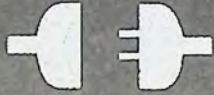

(NC)—If there were ever a reason not to lace up your shoes for a walk, the arthritis pain experienced by more than four million Canadians would seem to be it.

Research shows, however, that walking is one of the best forms of physical activity for people with arthritis. It puts less stress on your joints and is considered safer than

running.

Walking also allows you to stretch those back and leg muscles and joints that can become stiff from sitting.

*Before hitting the pavement, here are some tips from The Arthritis Society:*

- If you have hip, knee, ankle or foot problems, you should confirm with your health-care provider that walk-

ing is an appropriate activity for you.

- Start slowly. Take on a routine that is manageable for you. You can gradually increase how fast and long you walk. By starting small and increasing intensity over time, you can gain motivation by achieving realistic results.

- Wear supportive and comfortable shoes. They should have flexible soles, good arch supports and inside cushions to absorb shock and space for your toes.

- Check out your planned route before walking it. Look for the best places to cross streets, stopping points for rest and landmarks that give you an indication of the distance you've travelled.

- Remember to warm up and cool down by strolling for a few minutes before and after your walk.

- Pace yourself. The speed with which you're most comfortable will depend on how you feel.

- Flat, firm, level surfaces are ideal. Steep or uneven surfaces might aggravate hip, knee or foot pain. Walking paths, malls and sidewalks are the safest way to go.

### What To Do When Eurozone Collapses

A strange warning was issued on internet regarding supplies after the Eurozone collapses. There is every indication it will collapse and the world's stock markets will undergo a series of chaotic responses. The warning was to householders to hoard goods they need which are not produced in their own area.

England has already taken steps to prevent immigration from Europe when the European Union falls apart and a Great Depression strikes Europe. This seems sensible, and warnings about food shortages and possibly parts shortages in Europe seem to have some sense. As for North Americans, the shortages are likely to come in the form of reduced, or highly expensive, transportation costs.

One of the things we may have to take seriously is the need to shop for things within our own region. Europe, while the Eurozone was growing in wealth, began to import a lot of food from Africa. Foods commonly grown in back yard gardens, such as salad makings, were suddenly being flown into European airports on a daily basis. Foods commonly grown in European fields in highly intense farming operations were in competition with foreign grown foods. A Great Depression in Europe means there could be scarcity in food supplies.

Other household commodities such as detergents and cleaning products could become very scarce, but it is possible to live without expensive cleaning products. The same is true for cosmetics. Food and shelter are always the top essentials of survival. Europeans have survived world wars and economic depressions by going back to home gardens and small scale farming at home, such as raising their own chickens, pigeons and rabbits.

For North Americans, food shortages have always been about transportation stoppages and food distribution. Whether the European Union collapses or not, perhaps we should take a harder look at buying or producing close to home and preserving those foods for future consumption through canning, freezing, drying, or root cellars.

Thai Peanut Chicken Pops

Prep time: 15 minutes / Marinating time: 2 hours / Barbecuing time: 5 minutes / Makes 20 to 24 pops

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup (125 mL) natural peanut butter, preferably crunchy
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) soy sauce
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) lime juice
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) Thai curry paste, red or green
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 20 to 24 small 6-inch (15-cm) wooden skewers
- salt to taste
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) chopped peanuts
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) chopped coriander

Directions:

1. In a medium bowl, whisk peanut butter with soy sauce, lime juice and curry paste until well blended.
2. Slice chicken lengthwise into 1/2-inch (1-cm) thick strips. Add chicken to peanut butter mixture and stir to coat well. Refrigerate chicken in marinade mixture for at least 2 hours before skewering, but preferably overnight.
3. Soak skewers in water. Oil grill and preheat to medium. Remove chicken from marinade and roll each strip into a spiral, inserting a small skewer through each spiral to hold like a lollipop. The end pieces will be smaller, so roll with another strip. Sprinkle with salt.
4. Place on grill and barbecue, turning once, until cooked through, about 5 minutes. Serve on a platter, sprinkled with peanuts and coriander.

The study estimated that keeping rural hospitals would save Medicare \$7.2 billion per year.

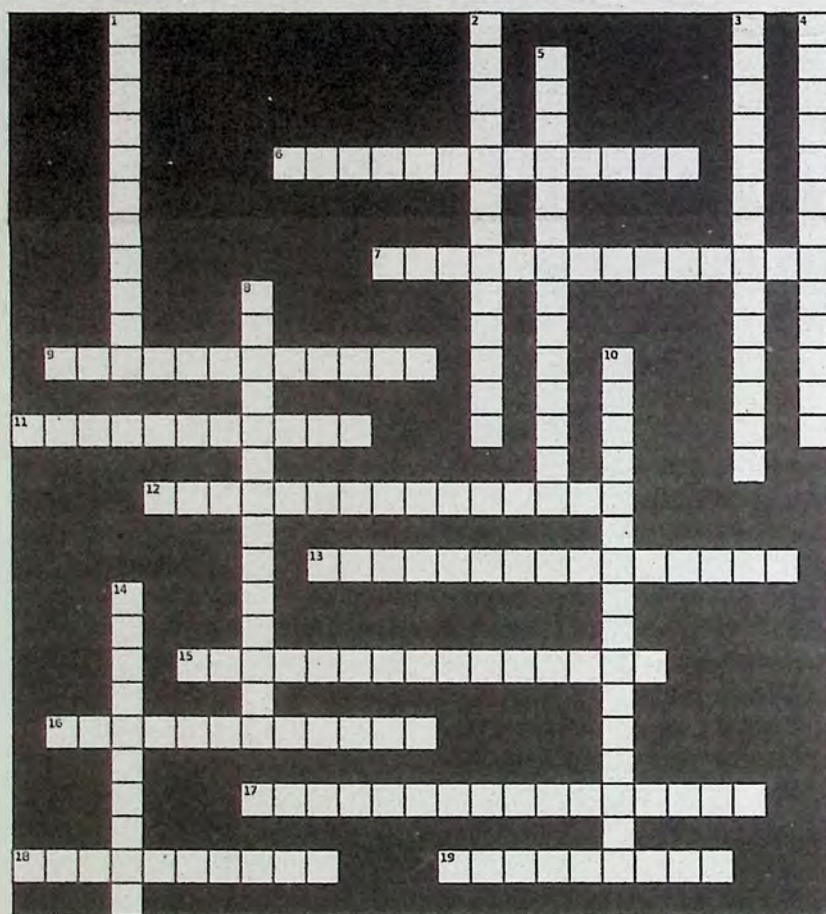
The authors of the study openly challenged the "misunderstanding that rural hospitals are more costly, inefficient and have lower quality and satisfaction".

..... continued from Page 2 night and 8:00 AM. From a business standpoint it makes good business sense, why keep your store open when you only see two customers during the late shift - if you're lucky?

But I never really looked at medical services as a business.

I think if our medical services were provided on a user fee per visit system maybe I could see it, but the last time I checked, I was paying an annual medical services fee so that I could have access to the service whenever I needed it.

Instead of taking my chances with the buzzer at the closed, sorry, locked doors at Princeton's ER, I think I'd rather just stay home, call 9-1-1 and hope there's an ambulance available between here and Manning Park.

That being said, I suspect there are a lot of factors having various effects on the system with which IHA is bound.

I think one is the fact that Canadians live longer than we used to a couple decades ago. Demographics show there has been a shift where seniors outnumber

those of us still under 55. That has got to tax the system somewhat.

Another factor I believe is that because everything is about money, the delivery of health care, which was once a service, has become a big business generating big money if cuts are made based on level of use and return on investment.

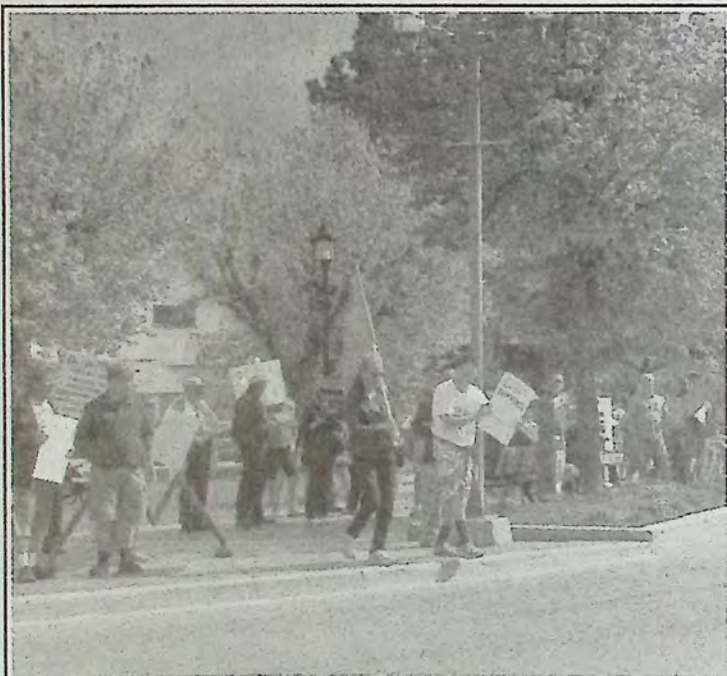
Probably the biggest issue for those of us in the Southern Interior is that I'm fairly convinced the model used by IHA is outdated and requires either a serious overhaul or the people in charge of implementing the service delivery are not capable of doing that job.

I say these things because logical solutions to rural health care can't be to reduce services forcing extra costs to those in need of medical attention who now have to travel out of their community for those services.

If there were a simple solution, you'd think it would have revealed itself by now.

I'm starting to think there is no simple solution.

I hope I'm wrong.
