Harkness says use common sense

Responding to a letter from Ken Carlson, Councillor Marilyn Harkness stated, at the June 18 Council meeting, people using the zigzag trail have to use their common sense.

Carlson's letter gave his opinion of the design of the zigzag trail to be reconstructed soon, and pointed out some flaws that would make it difficult for people using a cane or walking stick, and added people could catch their heels on the steel stairs.

He pointed out the handrails were not at a height appropriate for children.

Councillor Harkness noted the zigzag trail may not be appropriate for people who need to use a cane, and certainly people should not be wearing high heels while using the trail. She said the trail is designed for use by more able-bodied citizens.

Councillor Kim Maynard will speak to the Princeton Accessibility Committee about the zigzag.

Car thefts increase

Sgt. Dave Clare gave his quarterly report to Town Council on June 18. Statistics from Princeton RCMP detachment show a marked increase in thefts from automobiles, mostly from cars left unlocked. There was a slight increase in other thefts, and more complaints of people causing a disturbance. Assaults were up slightly.

Drug crimes show a decrease. There were nine investigations, eight for possession and one for trafficking crack cocaine.

Drivers under the influence totaled nine, with three of these receiving 24 hour suspensions for drug use.

The detachment members have

been very involved in community activities ranging from the DARE program to Grad hockey, anti-bullying programs in schools, search and rescue, the Restorative Justice Committee, and numerous community events.

Patrolling school zones is a top priority in the region, providing a daily presence in the morning and afternoon.

Sgt. Clare told Council how much the RCMP appreciates the support from Citizens on Patrol.

The report was comprehensive, and concluded with the report that there have been no serious crimes in the detachment area during the first quarter of the year.

"There is nothing more impressive than watching these little kids on their little horses doing all kinds of riding," he said. "They will be doing it for themselves, but it would make them happy to have people show their appreciation."

Although Payton is doing this out of his own pocket this year, he mentioned he would be grateful for a few sponsors.

Peacock ended with a reminder that we are all these things in other people's lives, "the key is to not be a weed to someone else."

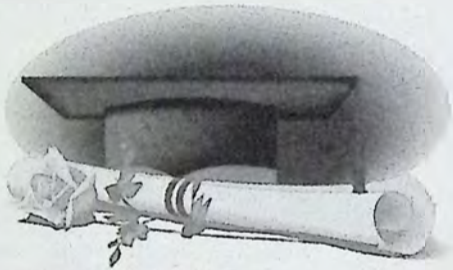
Vice Principal Patrick Kaiser was the guest speaker for this year's graduation ceremony.

Thank you Princeton! Although the Save Our Hospital Coalition hosted the public forum it was the people of our community that gave the forum its legitimacy. We may form coalitions, have meetings, have round tables, and talk to officials but at the end of the day it is when the community stands united that it illustrates that when we go to a table, any table, we not only speak for ourselves but come with the weight of the entire community behind us. When the community supported our first rally on May 1 when the closures started, it showed that it was the community that was upset.

When everyone came together and rallied again on May 22nd as Save Our Hospital Coalition, industry, Area H and the acting mayor met with IHA representatives, it showed them that the people in those meetings had a loud voice behind them and the support of the community.

Then again on May 28th, when IHA representatives came to town, we were there and this time for the first time they gave our local elected officials a sign that they were serious about looking for a solu-

tion. Twenty-eight days after the closures started, after three rallies, numerous meetings and provincial wide media coverage, we saw the first sign of movement.

If you ask me the people of this community made those in a position of power a little nervous. If you ask me it was the people of our community who made so much noise that it was beginning to resonate in the halls of the legislature and in the board room of IHA.

We need to be proud of the fact that we have stood united since the beginning of this struggle and should be even more so that as time goes on our unity has not wavered it has only strengthened. The longer this emergency takes to solve, the more people stand up to be counted.

We have over 3,000 signatures that we sent to Victoria.

Letters of support for the need of 24/7 Emergency Room services have been coming in from local organizations, First Nations, local government, industry, small business and people like you, the people who the closures affect directly.

When I say thank you, I mean it. No matter what work Save Our

Hospital Coalition does, or our partners in this struggle do, it does not carry the weight it would without your voice to back us up. It is the community's support that keeps our forward momentum alive. When we have a packed house at a public forum it is hard for anyone, IHA representative, MLA, local government representative to ignore that the community is worried, but it also shows that we want solutions and we are ready to make ideas become reality. I have said it before and I will say it again, when our community is being threatened we stand united and when we do stand united there is nothing that can stop us.

I think the most important thing to come from the public forum is that the members of our community are united. They are firm in their resolve for the need of a solution to this problem but I think we as a community have shown that we are ready and willing to make those solutions a reality.

One of the things that Andrew Neuner from IHA said stuck with me; he mentioned that they need our help. I am grateful Mr. Neuner came to the forum considering he

was walking into the lion's den, but why did IHA not make this public long ago? Why did IHA not say in a public letter or meeting two years ago when these problems started that they wanted our help? Did they ask council at the time and did they think that that may have been enough? I don't know.

Maybe it is water under the bridge now, but it is frustrating that it took this long, that it took until grass-

roots started yelling in the streets to get any real attention to this issue.

It makes me frustrated that for two years nothing progressed forward until the community started demanding answers.

I hope and want to believe that we have turned a corner and from here on out we are on the road to solving the problem not only with our Emergency Room but with our hospital facility as a whole.

Council affirms right to be angry

Town Council met with Interior Health Authority (IHA) last week, and are committed to meeting with IHA once a month. Councillor Marilyn Harkness reported at the June 18 Town Council meeting that IHA and Council are working on both short and long term solutions to Princeton's health care problems and are committed to 24/7 emergency coverage.

Deputy Mayor Jason Earle referred to IHA's efforts to find physicians for

Princeton, stating, "Everything they are capable of doing, they're doing."

Deputy Mayor Earle says he has confidence in the dedicated group of local citizens who have made every effort to ensure Princeton's needs will be met.

Councillor Kim Maynard added, "We all agree the community has a right to be angry."

IHA has a new website called betterhere.ca in which Princeton's situation is described.

I've been watching the game of chess being played between the residents of Princeton (and area) and Interior Health for the past several weeks.

It's been an interesting match.

It was announced at a recent Town Council meeting that work is continuing on the recruitment of new doctors to Princeton by IHA.

That may be true, but when you visit the IHA 'recruitment' website it doesn't take long to see how out of touch with Princeton Interior Health really is.

On the community profile page on Princeton there's two glaring errors I picked up on right away. Under the heading of 'economy' it states "Forestry, agriculture, tourism, cattle ranching" but there is no mention of mining. By my last count there were no less than three mining companies setting up shop in the area.

However, probably the biggest blunder made by IHA in their attempt at marketing Princeton to doctors is related to education.

On the community profile it says we have two elementary, one intermediate and one secondary school. In case you've forgotten, the intermediate school is now Riverside Centre – a local cultural and social community centre.

And there's no mention of the Skills Centre or The Bridge for additional educational opportunities.

So when Interior Health says they are working hard to resolve local issues it's pretty clear to me they have little knowledge of our community.

When you have little knowledge of a product, you can't effectively promote it.

So what is IHA really doing for Princeton?

Philips' donation will help save lives

When representatives from the Philips Company learned that one of their HeartStart Home Defibrillators saved the life of Coalmont's Bob Sterne, they decided they wanted to meet the man. Francesca Infantine of Philips invited Bob and his wife, Diane to visit their plant that produces home defibrillators.

On April 24, Bob and Diane drove to Bothell, Washington where they were wined and dined by a welcoming group of folk from Philips. After a tour of the plant, Bob and Diane retold (to a group of Philips employees) the events of December 30 when Bob suffered a cardiac arrest while shovelling snow. Francesca explained that it was an important morale booster for their family of employees to personally meet someone whose life their product saved. A question and answer session followed and then Bob and Diane were present-

ed with an AED (defibrillator) complete with training pads (valued at over \$2,000). Philips General Manager Bob Peterhans hoped it would be appropriately donated to someone in this area.

Bob immediately thought of the Princeton and District Highway Extrinsication Society and contacted them. President Doug Pateman said he would be thrilled to accept the AED as they did not yet have one. AEDs are crucial for treating anyone who has suffered a cardiac arrest.

It is important that first responders such as the Princeton and District Highway Extrinsication Society have their own machine.

Ventricular fibrillation has a good prognosis when it is treated quickly with CPR and an AED. Without fast treatment it results in sudden death. Minutes count! After only 5 minutes the victim's chances of survival begin to drop dramatically.

PAD (public access defibrillation) is the practice of placing AEDs in public locations. Many communities in the United States are promoting the placement of AEDs in office buildings, community centers, apartments, stores, hotels, residential facilities and businesses of all kinds and training the public in CPR and the use of AEDs. Home defibrillators are easy to use because the machine prompts the operator on what to do. Even if the shock button is accidentally pushed, it will not shock the patient unless a shock is required.

Thanks to the generosity of the Philips Company, the Princeton area is now one AED richer. Hopefully the Princeton and District Highway Extrinsication Society will be able to save lives with the use of this amazing machine.

The Downfall of a Community

I know many people who do things to make our community a better place to live. They may do it in a public way, by being on the executive of an active organization, or they may do it in a quieter way, as a neighbour. What amazes me is how much of this effort is taken for granted, and worse still, how many of these efforts are criticized!

Because of things I've been hearing lately in the form of criticism of people who do good things for the community, I decided to devote this column to the idea of community. I would like to go back several thousand years to a time when the great hairy mammoth roamed North America. Although people are well aware that mammoths were all over Siberia, most do not know that the very biggest mammoths lived in North America. These enormous animals were hunted for food by one of nature's smaller, weaker mammals: humans.

As astonishing as it may seem, these little humans were capable of

bringing down an animal twice the size of today's elephants, and these puny humans did it with Stone Age weapons. Think about getting up one morning and deciding to go hunt a creature that would barely fit into a two bedroom apartment. Think of going with nothing more than a spear. If you intended to do it all by yourself, you would have to think long and hard about it, wouldn't you?

However, if every man in the village was going with you, the group would have a lot of spears to throw, and enough spears would bring down a beast big enough to feed the whole village for a couple of weeks, maybe longer if enough mammoth was preserved. You think they didn't preserve things in those days? Five years ago, a crew constructing a new bridge across the Potomac River (Washington, D.C.) unearthed a permafrost storage cave containing mammoth meat from 12,000 years ago. So, not only did these puny humans hunt and kill a huge beast, they went to the trouble of preserving some meat for future use.

When we look at village life at a survival level, we see community action, and that community action is a survival mechanism. By working together, humans survived in what is a remarkably hostile environment. Not only have humans survived, we puny creatures, without tough hides, without fangs and claws, we have flourished to become a dominant species on this planet. We survived and flourished by working together, knowing our individual survival depended on

others.

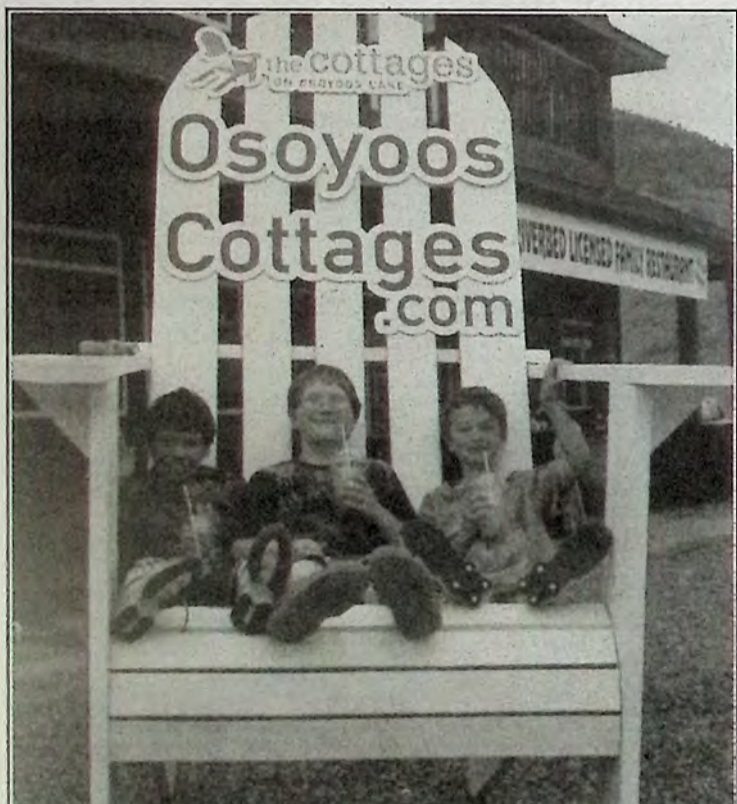
I say this despite what I see happening in our world today. We are now people who tend to forget we are a community. We do stupid things to our environment, we do nasty things to each other, as in Syria and Afghanistan, but even there, people who live in small villages care for each other and try to remain unaffected by war, or try to help those who are suffering. In every crisis situation, we see people reaching out to each other to provide assistance. That is the instinct for survival.

In pioneer days, people appreciated their neighbours. Despite the wild west novels and movies, the gunfights were the exception, not the rule. Pioneers knew their survival depended on having good neighbours. If a house burned down, or a farmer was sick or injured at harvest time, or a job was too big for one man, then help had to come from neighbours. That is community.

I have nothing but praise for people who take the time to do things for others and for the community at large. What bothers me are those other people who have no words of praise, but only criticize. What is their problem? Are they so self-sufficient they think they don't need a community? Or is their vision of community limited?

Some people see their community as only those who belong to their church, or as only those who belong to their own ethnic or racial origin, or as only those people in the same financial bracket. That is very limited thinking, because if your house burns down, the fireman may not be a member of your church, your race, or your financial bracket. If you are in a car accident, the first person to help you may not be of your faith, your ethnic background nor of your social position, but you are going to depend on that person.

So, if anyone reading this column is one of those people who offers criticism instead of praise, I hope I have given you a better understanding of community. For the final word, I will refer to psychology and the study of human development. They say the first stage of life is being dependent, the second stage is being independent, and the third, mature stage, is to be interdependent. To be fully mature, you have to become, and function as, part of a community.

Council adopts bylaw amendment

Village of Keremeos Council adopted Bylaw No. 795-1, 2012 at their June 18th regular meeting.

The Fees and Charges Amendment Bylaw has an interesting history having coming before Village Council this past January as the Fees and Charges Bylaw.

It is common practice for local governments to adopt a consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw so that the information is readily accessible to the public and to staff.

"It is also the preferred format for Council's review of its current fees and charges each year during budget discussions," explains CAO Laurie Taylor in her report to Council.

The Bylaw in effect repeals eight previous fee-related bylaws, the oldest dating back to 1996 and amended five addition ones, dating back to 1994.

The January 2012 Fees and Charges Bylaw set rates on the following categories of service: Planning and Development Fees, Building Inspection Services, Administration, Public Works, Bylaw Enforcement and Freedom of Information.

The Bylaw Amendment adopted last week focused on Schedule 6

'Freedom of Information' and sets out fees for six categories and nineteen subcategories such as the fee for 'locating and retrieving a record' to 'copying records - video cassette (3/4-inch) duplication' and everything in between.

"The Village has been working on this consolidation over the past couple of years and as part of this process, staff has also identified a number of amendments to the existing fees and wording that are recommended for Council's consideration," Taylor concluded.

BC seniors support Princeton request

The British Columbia Old Age Pensioners Organization hosted its annual convention in Agassiz, B.C. on June 11th through 13th. In addition to conducting regular business, the OAPO also celebrated their 80 anniversary. Founded in 1932, the OAPO has championed the rights of seniors for eight decades and is primarily responsible for founding the Old Age Security program in Canada.

Today their role is very diverse and they are involved in myriad issues, advocating on senior's behalf on many of the concerns and issues facing an ever-growing elderly demographic.

One of the core functions of the Annual Convention is to consider resolutions that have been submitted by individual provincial OAPO branches. Most locations are represented by attending delegates and after discussion and evaluation, the resolutions are considered for adoption by a vote from the floor.

Most resolutions address health and financial issues that affect seniors and when adopted by the OAPO, become part of their mandate for future support and advocacy. One of the resolutions dealt with the internal issue of the organization's name and a motion was carried to change our name to 'British Columbia Pensioners and Seniors Organization'.

Princeton Branch #185 requested consideration of an emergency res-

olution on the issue of Princeton General Hospital cutting back on Emergency Services. It was agreed that the area serviced by PGH is too large not to have 24/7 ER services and the resolution passed unanimously.

Although only one step in moving towards addressing this important issue, having the support and backing of the provincial body of the OAPO gives significant credibility and weight to the local branch's voice.

Other convention business included the election of a new executive, with former president Fred Coates stepping down and Jennifer Coburn being sworn in as his successor. It is worthy of note that Fred Coates served as president for three years and appreciation for his talents and leadership echoed throughout the entire group.

Numerous awards were given out acknowledging provincial branches who are also celebrating milestone anniversaries, and a cup was awarded to the McBride B.C. branch #118 for greatest membership growth.

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Health/Lifestyle News**Know Your Health Care Rights**

(NC)—When it comes to health care, do you know your rights?

Signs point to a rising sentiment in Canada for empowering patients. Numerous patient rights groups are emerging, and an Ipsos Reid survey found that over 80% of Canadians want a patient health "charter of rights" as part of the governments' next health care funding agreement. As well, 86% want an independent ombudsman that allows citizens to complain about poor health service.

The fact is that Canadians already have many rights as health care consumers, says Linda Gough, president of the Federation of Health Regulatory Colleges of Ontario (FHRCO). FHRCO is made up of 26 regulatory colleges and more than 260,000 health professionals.

When dealing with any care provider, the colleges say to remember your right to:

- Receive safe, competent and ethical care.
- Have health problems and treatments explained clearly, ask questions, and participate in health care decisions.
- Give or refuse consent for any procedure (any reason, any time), learn about treatment options/alternatives, and request a second opinion.
- Be assured that personal information remains protected and confi-

dential.

- Know the education/training of the care provider.

- View and obtain a copy of your own personal health information.

- Have any fees/costs explained.

- Formally raise concerns through a regulatory college.

"Knowing what you're entitled to is important, as people view health care more as a partnership with their providers," says Gough.

Ontario's health regulatory colleges stand up for the rights of patients by holding their member professionals accountable for their conduct and practice, setting standards for the profession, and administering quali-

ty assurance programs.

You can learn about the standards for any of the regulated health care professions, and your rights to address concerns, at the colleges' websites.

"The public can have confidence that regulated health care professionals have not only the appropriate training and skills, but also the accountability for their actions," says Gough.

"That helps to ensure the right to a high level of care."

Living Past 100**How About A Pot Of Medicine?**

Many home gardeners plant herbs in pots or directly into a garden. Most grow them for their tasty qualities, but these common herbs have medicinal value as well as taste. For example, sweet basil, an easily grown herb, is great in salads and essential in pesto. At the same time, basil is soothing to the digestive system and the nervous system.

Dill is another common garden herb, great in potato salad and essential in dill pickles, but few people add dill to a dish to prevent flatulence or increase mother's milk, but those are two of its traditional uses. Dill has been used to dispel colic in infants (don't try this on your own) and to stimulate the appetite in the elderly. Dill in a garden encourages lady bugs which eat aphids.

Parsley is used in a wide variety of dishes, from salads to stews to soups. It is easy to grow and very hardy, resisting both frost and drought. Parsley should not be used merely as a decoration for a plate of something else, as it is loaded with Vitamin C, Vitamin A, B vitamins, calcium and iron. Parsley has been widely used as a traditional medicine to improve kidney function, but remember it has a diuretic property and should not be eaten in very large quantities as it can harm the kidneys. Dry parsley can be used as a tea, which is a moderate diuretic.

Use it raw in salads, and add to stews and soups, although not enough to dominate everything else. For home preservation, parsley is better frozen than dried. If you are planting parsley for the first time, do not be discouraged if nothing appears even a month past planting. Parsley seeds take six weeks to germinate!

Fennel is a favourite among most European gardeners. It tastes and smells like licorice, and is great in chicken dishes, including chicken soup. It is said that fennel curbs the appetite, and fat people chewed fennel seeds to lose weight and stay lean.

The fennel stem is much like celery in appearance, and can be eaten braised in chicken or beef broth. The fern-like leaves can be added to a salad, and goes particularly well with fish. If you have never eaten fennel, rub a tiny leaf on bare skin. If you get a rash there, perhaps you should avoid fennel, as some people are allergic to it.

All herbs you can grow in a pot or your garden can add to your enjoyment of your food, but using herbs for medicinal reasons should be done only by consulting those who are very knowledgeable, such as herbalists and naturopaths.

The majority of culinary herbs, used in moderation, add healthy properties and zest to meals.

screen remained unsold, to the surprise of the yard sale volunteers. A lot of housewares, VHS videos and DVD's remained, although a lot were purchased.

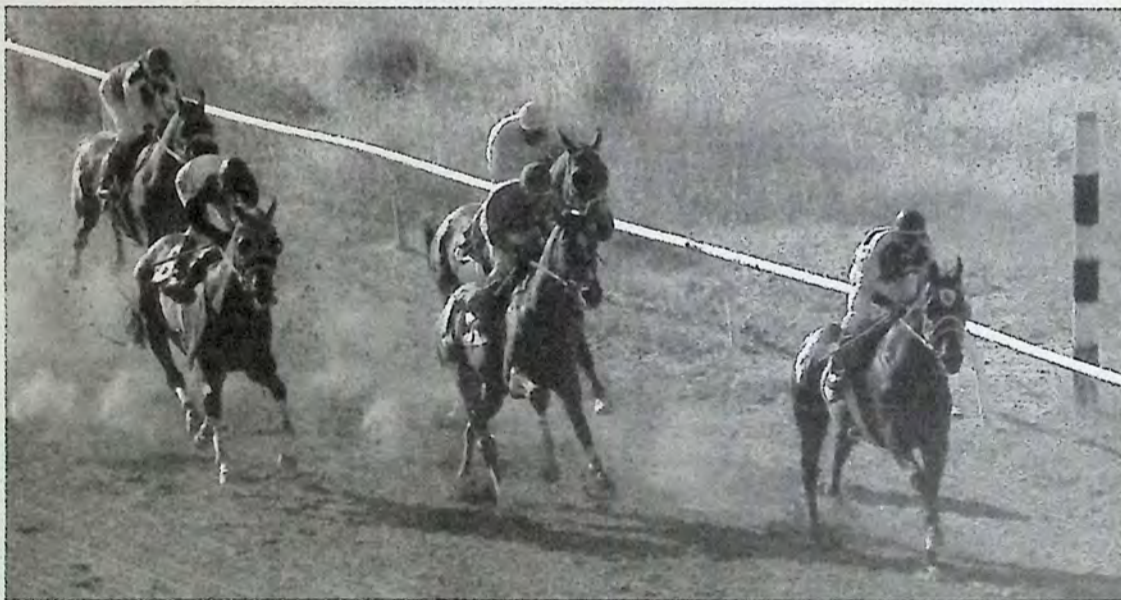

Buffalo Chicken Potato Salad

(NC)—Choosing local vegetables is not only a great way to eat healthy but it's also fun for the whole family. For this recipe visit your favourite farmer's market to find the seasonal potatoes, red onions and cucumber.

Serves: 6 / Prep Time: 15 minutes / Cooking Time: 10 minutes

Ingredients

- 1 pound red potatoes, cut into bite-size pieces
- 700 mL (3 cups) cooked chicken, cut into bite-size pieces (about 3 cups)
- 230 mL (1 cup) peeled and chopped cucumber
- 120 mL (1/2 cup) Hellmann's Real Mayonnaise
- 120 mL (1/2 cup) chopped red onion
- 120 mL (1/2 cup) chopped celery
- 35 mL (2 1/2 tsp) cayenne pepper sauce
- 30 mL (2 tsp) crumbled blue cheese

Instructions:

Did you know?

Mayonnaise is a great substitute for traditional cooking oils since it locks in flavour and moisture, giving you juicy, tasty chicken breasts with the added benefit of omega-3, a polyunsaturated fat. Since Canada's Food Guide recommends eating a small amount (30-45 mL or 2-3 tsp) of unsaturated fat each day, mayonnaise is a great ingredient to add to your dish or meal.

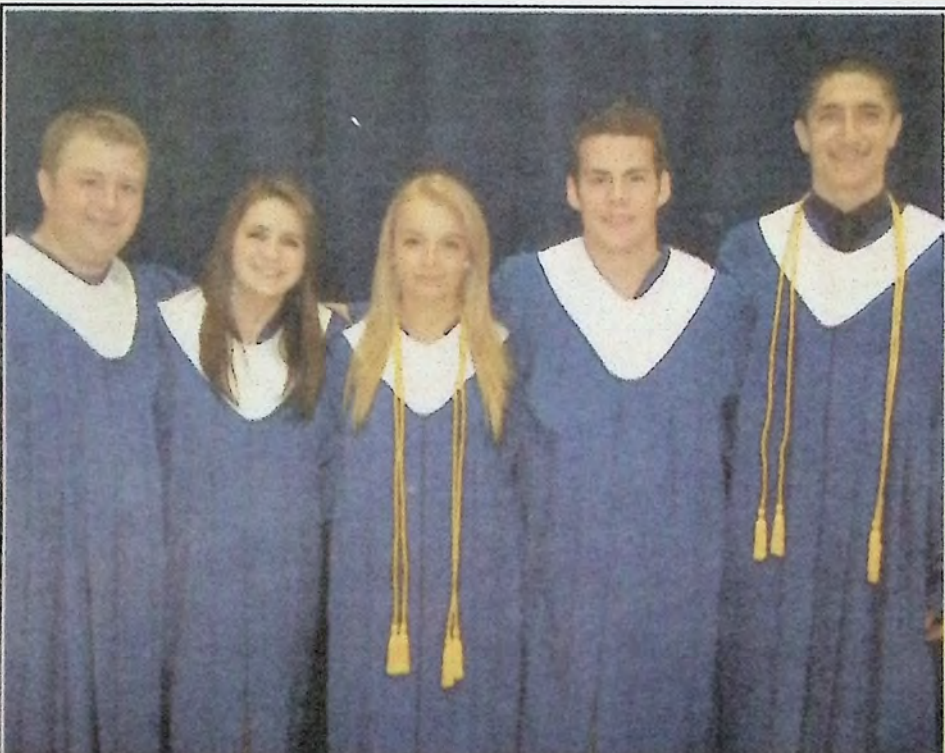

A letter circulated around Princeton and Area H is spreading like wildfire.

The Similkameen News Leader was handled a couple of copies only last week, although they have been

out there since the beginning of June. The purpose of the letter is to be signed and hand delivered to Princeton Town Hall.

According to Town Hall several have been dropped off and all are being gathered in a file for Town Council to deal with as they see fit.

If you haven't seen one yet, this is what the 'form' letter says:

We the residents of Princeton request the Town Council publicly address the growing health care services crisis at Princeton General Hospital. Representatives from across the community, and our local officials have all met with Dr. R. Halpenny and Interior Health officials. As yet, no one from Interior Health can provide solutions to our ongoing crisis of Emergency Room closures.

Town Council had a closed-door meeting with IHA officials. To date, residents are not aware of any avenues that IHA or Council may be

in the process of pursuing in the name of Princeton General Hospital.

We have been living in the shadow of Emergency Room closures since early 2010, and it is only a matter of time before a Senior citizen, who has lived in this town and made it their home for years, or a child will not be able to last the hour and a half drive to Penticton during an emergency.

We implore you to consider the platform of transparency as promised, further to cease and desist closed meetings with IHA. In short the constituents of this Municipality require direct participation in the future health care of Princeton and District municipality.

We expect your written reply to this urgent matter.

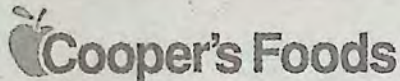

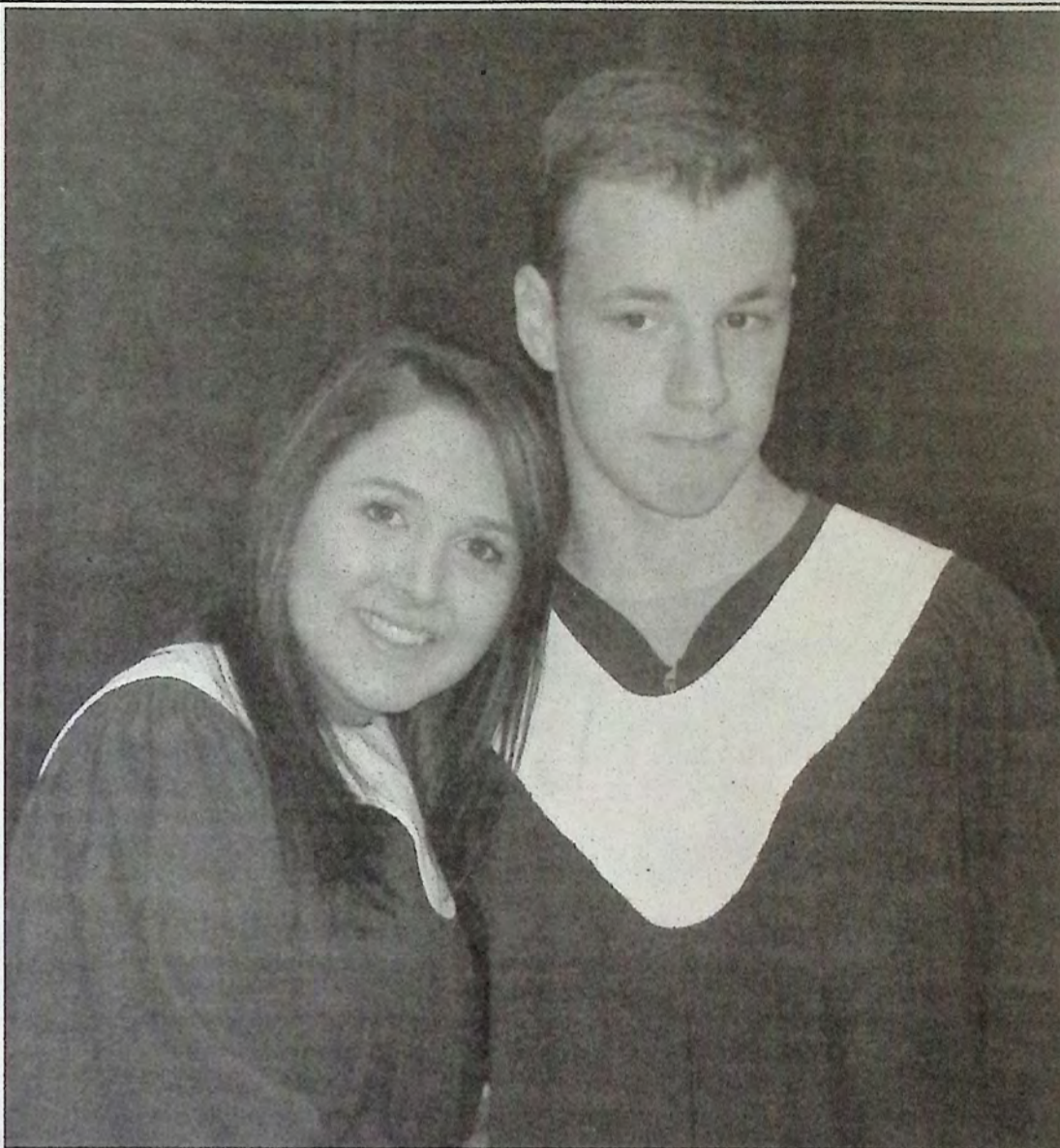

The event goes from 7:00 to 10:00 PM in Veterans Square right after the Rotary Parade. Come on out and enjoy an entertaining evening.

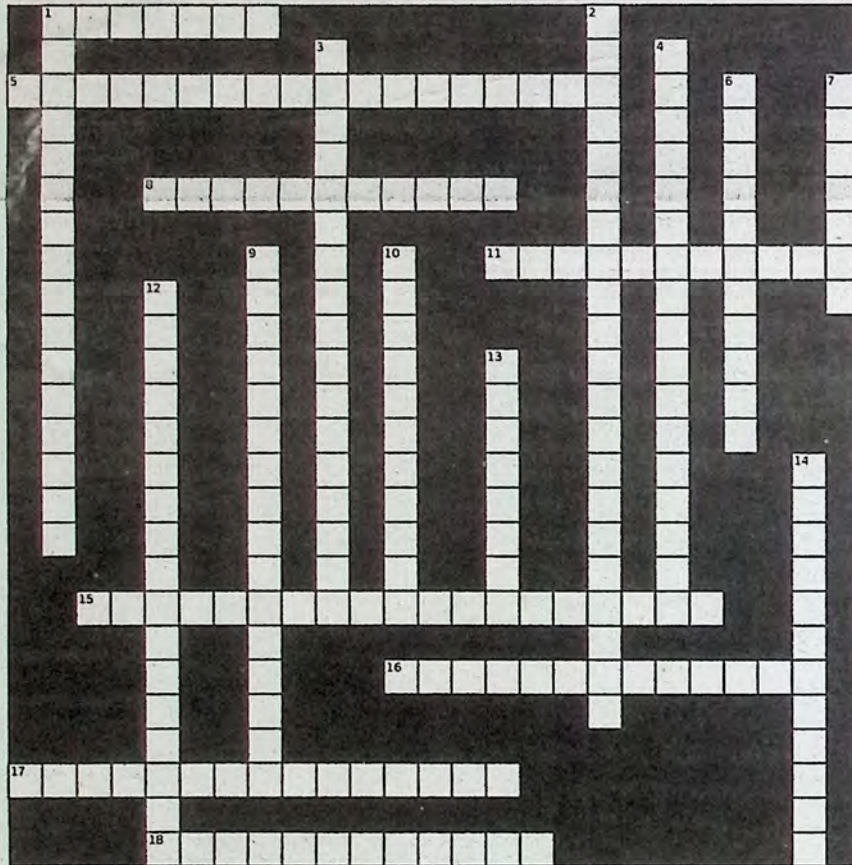
