## CMMC ships three loads in Q2

CMMC, Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced July 3rd production results for the second quarter of 2012 from the recently opened Copper Mountain mine located near Princeton.

During the second quarter of 2012 the mine completed a total of three shipments of copper concentrate, to smelters in Japan, containing approximately 18.1 million pounds of copper, 5,600 ounces of gold, and 124,000 ounces of silver, an increase in shipped copper of approximately 14.8% over the first quarter of 2012. Gross sale value, based on provisional pricing is estimated at \$74 million.

From an operational point of view, the addition of the extra mining equipment announced earlier this year has assisted in increasing the mining capacity and has also allowed flexibility in mine planning. The Company is presently reviewing its 2012 mine plan with a view of further optimization to maximize

copper production. Mill production has been improving modestly during the quarter; however, operational challenges continue to hamper reaching design capacity on a consistent basis. As a result the Company has agreed to extend its completion guarantees with the project banks until June 30, 2013 or until project banking completion has been achieved.

In addition, during the quarter the Company also commenced its 2012 exploration program which forms the first part of a larger three year exploration strategy for the property. The objectives of the exploration program are threefold: determination of the potential long-term pit limits, conversion of resources to reserves in order to assist with near to mid-term mine planning and continued exploration of outlying or new areas of mineralization. There are currently three drills on the property (2 diamond drills and 1 percussion drill) which are working on a number of the target areas. Drilling ..... continued on Page 17

## The by-election race is on!

Nominations officially closed at 4:00 PM Friday, July 6th for the August 11th Town of Princeton by-election.

Although there were plenty of rumours, only four candidates have been declared for two different seats.

Frank Armitage and Rosemary Doughty are seeking the Mayor's seat with Doug Pateman and Rob Rubis vying for the vacant Councillor position.

General voting day is Saturday, August 11th with polls open from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM at the Royal Canadian Legion Hall, 170 Bridge Street, Princeton.

Advance polls will be open from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM on Wednesday, August 1st in the Public Meeting Room of Princeton Library at 107 Vermilion Avenue,

Princeton.

Chief Election Officer Shirley McMahon says resident electors, and non-resident property electors, will be required to produce two pieces of identification, one with a signature, to prove residency and identify.

The by-election became necessary following the passing of Mayor Fred Thomas. The additional vote to fill a Councillor seat resulted from the resignation of Frank Armitage who chose to run for

election to fill Thomas' empty seat.

The two successful candidates will serve the remainder of the three-year term that started December 2011 and will expire December 2014.

## Single vehicle accident closes highway

A single vehicle accident at around 3:00 PM on July 4th closed Highway 3 to all traffic until late the following morning and saw Old Hedley Road turn into a major highway.

Cpl. Dan Moskaluk says the chain of events that ended with the accident, and the death of the lone occupant, started in Osoyoos when

RCMP were advised to be on the look out for a vehicle and male driver connected to a reported domestic aggravated assault in that community.

"The associated vehicle was seen near Princeton and an attempt to stop the vehicle safely was unsuccessful," Cpl. Moskaluk explains.

"A pursuit of the vehicle was initiated, however, it was terminated due to the dangerous manner in which the suspect was driving combined with the road and traffic conditions observed by the pursuing officer."

Officers in Princeton tried to safely

stop the vehicle at a road check about a kilometre from the Similkameen River bridge at the East entrance to town but were unable as the driver drove on the highway shoulder and ditches to avoid the road check.

The vehicle was located moments later flipped over on the pavement ..... continued on Page 21

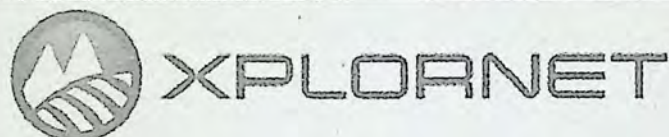

## Town awards monitor contract

Princeton Town Council awarded the contract for the construction of four groundwater-monitoring wells

at their July 3rd regular meeting.

The contract went to Robbins Drilling and Pump Ltd. for the tendered price of \$20,417.60, which includes HST.

The Town wastewater treatment and disposal facility is comprised of aerated lagoons, infiltration basins and a reclaimed water irrigation area, authorized by the Waste Management Permit (PE 01236) for the discharge of effluent from the municipal sewage treatment plant to the ground.

The installation of the groundwater monitoring wells and the implementation of a monitoring program fulfills the Town's obligation under the permit.

The project itself will include the drilling of four groundwater-monitoring wells to an average depth of

20-metres and the installation of 50-millimetre PVC casing complete with screen and surface cap assembly.

The Town of Princeton 2012 approved budget includes \$400,000.00, funded through the Federal Gas Tax Regionally Significant Projects program, for improvements to the Princeton sewage treatment facility with this project being part of the total project.

A total of five tenders were received with Robbins Drilling and Pump Ltd. submitting the lowest. The highest tender was for just over double the lowest one received.

While the project is included in the 2012 Financial Plan, there was no indication of when the work would start or be completed.

"Our goal for this meeting was to find immediate solutions in the short term of having our emergency room open 24/7," says Acting Mayor Jason Earle.

"And I am confident working with the Ministry of Health and the Interior Health Authority that we will be able to and then we can continue to work on medium - long term solutions."

"We were very pleased that Minister Michael de Jong and Dr. Halpenny were available to meet with us on very short notice," says Area 'H' Director Brad Hope.

"It shows that they too are taking this situation very serious."

### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS POLICY

### Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To the Editor,

A year ago I wrote to then-Mayor Randy McLean, with copies to RDOS Director Brad Hope and MLA Harry Lali, proposing that Princeton and District could likely solve the Doctor recruitment issue by purchasing three nice houses and offering them to Doctors in exchange for their services. The first three doctors who applied and were accepted would be able to move into the houses free of charge, and taxes paid. For each year they provided service in the area, they would receive a 10% interest in the house, so that after 10 years they would own it, free and clear.

If the houses were \$500,000 each, the cost to Princeton and Area H would be \$1.5 M plus interest, one

quarter of the cost being proposed for the Aquatic Centre at the time. Based on the same calculations, The cost per household would only be about \$32.40 per year over 20 years - one quarter the cost of the proposed Pool.

This proposal was not even considered worth discussing by the politicians of the day, their glib answer was that financial incentives to attract Doctors would not work. Fast forward one year. All over the TV this evening was the exciting news that the town of Nakusp (pop. 5000) had bought a house for \$280,000 and was providing it rent free for the first year and at reduced rent the second year and by doing so had attracted a Doctor to sign a two year contract.

All he has to pay the first year is

the utilities. RENT FREE was enough to attract him - not the prospect of OWNING a home after 10 years. YUP!.... bad idea - no merit in it at all.... You can't attract Doctors by offering a monetary incentive....

## Will Depression Lead To Global Control?

Think of a science fiction scenario in which a few men see the potential to control the whole world. Some financial experts are saying the crisis in the European Union will lead to making the science fiction become a reality.

Predictors of the direction of the economy, who call themselves financial realists, are saying some of the world's biggest banks are in deep trouble. These banks, like Goldman Sachs, HSBC, JP Morgan, are insolvent. In Argentina, people are taking their foreign money out of banks and moving it into American dollars. In Greece, there seems to be no way to ensure the nation will ever be back on its financial feet. Spain's banks have asked for a \$125 billion bailout from the European Union.

An American who gives financial advice to major investment corporations, author of the Grant report, says the Euro will collapse and launch global financial depression. Kaiser, who says banks are already insolvent, agrees with Grant, but goes one step further. Grant predicts certain governments will use

the global depression as an excuse to launch a global financial control system that would tell every government and every bank what to do with its money. In short, he who rules the banks rules the world.

Kaiser says the ruling bodies will say it is the fault of the people that they are suffering, but Kaiser tells people it is time for them to stand up and tell 'authorities' they do not intend to put up with these conditions any longer.

All this is very well, but it will not solve the reality that the world is undergoing a financial crisis that may involve all of us in a depression like the Dirty Thirties. I shudder to think what will happen to my grandchildren and their families. Young people today have little idea of how to do without things, and to be fair, there are a lot of things they will not be able to do without, such as electricity and heat in the winter.

When my parents went through the Great Depression, they did not cook on a gas or electric range. They had a kitchen range that burned coal and wood, not just a place to cook, but an appliance that heated the house. They had candles and coal oil lamps, and people in those days often did laundry by hand as a regular thing. People had gardens in which they grew a lot of their food, and even in town, people had chickens or even a cow.

What do people do if they live in an apartment and cannot afford to pay the power or gas bill?

What will happen when half the people cannot buy food or pay rent?

What has happened in Greece is this: people look for handouts. People in Crete sent a boatload of food to Athens for the poor. People

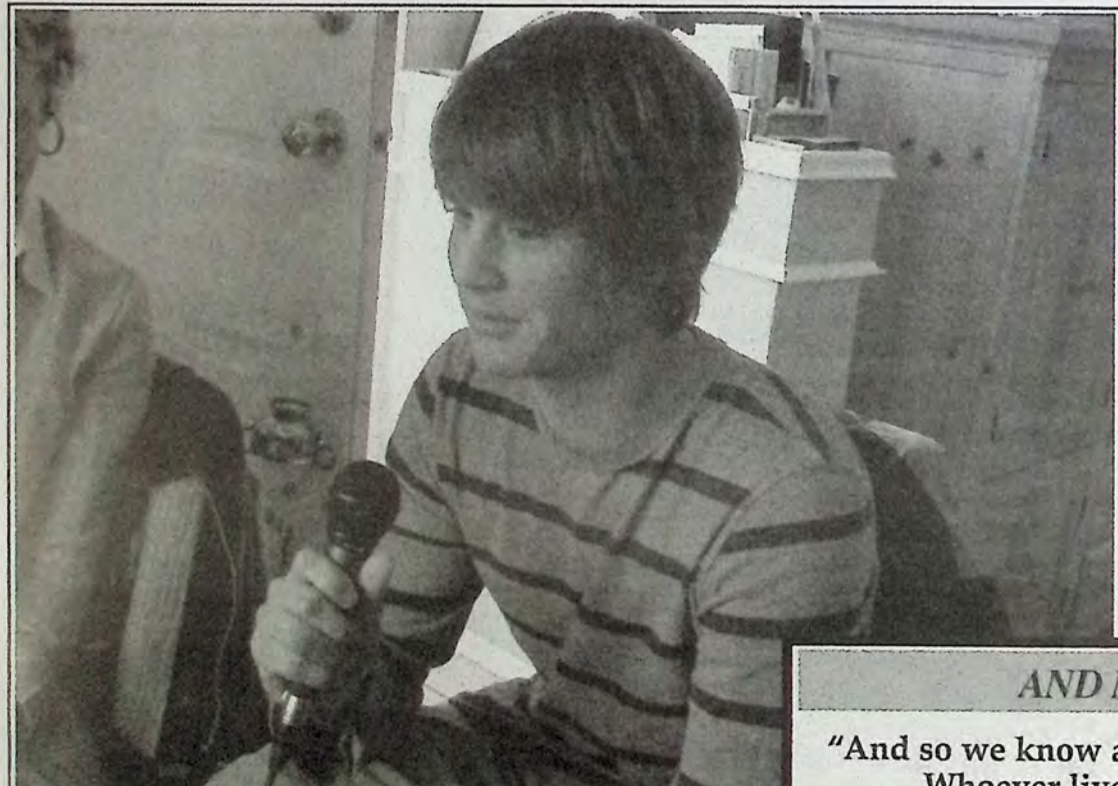
are dying due to lack of health care. Families are pooling their resources, moving in together so that the one person with a job can support all of them. This is after less than two years of austerity.

I look at the situation of the world banking system today and wonder how these banks and these countries managed to place themselves in jeopardy. People in Spain are losing their homes, just as Americans lost their homes in 2008. In Spain, the jobless rate is 16 percent of the work force. Italy is beginning to feel the pinch. It does look like the world's financial structure has started to collapse.

If it does collapse, are we willing to establish a world government that controls all of us? Will we succumb to a notion that if big governments failed, only one bigger will be better? Would I be wrong in saying it would be forced upon us by war, and then suddenly there would be money for weapons and soldiers and prisons, just like there was after the Great Depression? Am I wrong in wondering if this is some kind of set-up by those people who have always pushed for a one world government? Will we become so desperate that we will submit to even more human indignity?

There is one positive effect of global financial collapse - all of us will be more equal. I say this because the rich will be hit hard, too, because they depend on the financial world more than the poor person. The poor person does not worry about hedge funds, stock markets or brokers. The world will have changed for everyone.

What we see in the weeks ahead may give us pause for thought about our future.

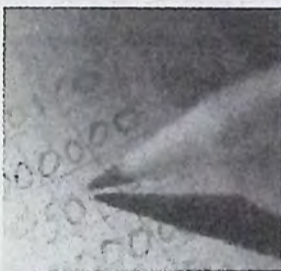

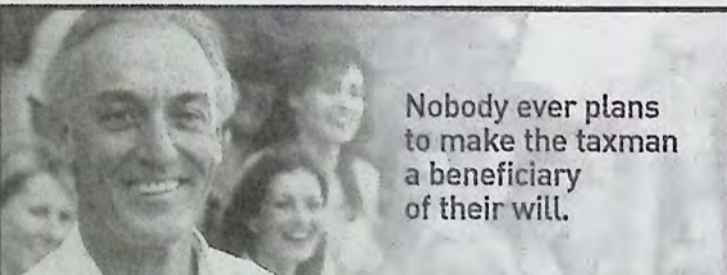

## SOHC tours Keremeos health facility

The Save Our Hospital Coalition believes that research is central to the development of a sustainable health care model that will best serve the needs of the community.

Underlying this research is the understanding that each rural British Columbia community is different and requires a unique model. Other communities in BC have encountered health care problems that are similar to those in Princeton and some of these communities have found solutions that work for them.

Through research and in cooperation with these communities, SOHC intends to determine which strategies were most effective in the

development of these models and incorporate those components that best suit Princeton's unique needs.

Based on a recommendation from Janice Perrino, Mayor of Summerland, the SOHC Executive visited the Keremeos Health Centre on May 29 and was given a tour of the facility by Walter Despot, former mayor and chair of the committee that developed the health care model for their community. Following this visit, Despot extended an invitation to Princeton and Area elected officials and business representatives to tour the facility. Subsequently, Brad Hope, Area H Regional Director and David Rainier, representing Princeton's

business community, toured the facility on June 11.

It is with good reason that Keremeos Health Centre was recommended as a successful model of quality health care. Over a period of 14 years, Despot and his committee developed and implemented a model of health care that meets the needs of their community, incorporating Assisted Living, Residential Care, Mental Health, a Diagnosis and Treatment Centre, Physiotherapy, Laboratory, Public Health, and Educational facilities all under one roof. Despot described the facility as a "one stop shopping centre for health".

**Ask For A Copy Of Your Health Records**

(NC)—Whether it's organized neatly in a file or stuffed in a shoebox, people can usually find their own financial paperwork.

But when it comes to our health records, who owns them, and how do we get a copy?

That's important to know. Consider just some reasons why you might want to get those records from a health care provider or institution:

- **New provider:** You're switching care providers and need to forward the information.
- **Easy reference:** You want to read and understand them privately, consolidate records from various providers/facilities in one place, or provide the details to other family members.

- **Questions about care:** You have a concern about your care, want to check or confirm the accuracy of the information, or you're involved in a legal proceeding around your care.

"The reasons don't matter—what matters is that you have the right as a health care consumer to ask for a copy of your record," says Linda Gough, president of the Federation of Health Regulatory Colleges of Ontario (FHRCO).

For more on being an informed health care consumer, visit [www.regulatedhealthprofessions.on.ca](http://www.regulatedhealthprofessions.on.ca) and look under "about your care".

FHRCO is made up of Ontario's 26 health regulatory colleges, which govern more than 260,000 health professionals. The colleges hold their members accountable for their conduct and practice, and support your right to safe, competent and ethical health care.

Accessing your health records is a right too. Health records belong to the provider or hospital that created them, but the information in them belongs to you.

Whoever holds the record must provide a copy to you upon request, and in a timely manner. The same right of access applies to electronic health care records.

Individual providers or institutions may charge you a reasonable fee to reflect the cost of preparing and forwarding the material.

Interest in all sorts of accessible

health records is growing. In fact, Canada Health Infoway (an independent organization funded by the federal government) recently certified an application called mihealth. The personalized web portal allows patients to enter, track and access health data such as drug histories, lab test results, allergies, etc.

"As Canadians continue to become more engaged in their care, they're interested in viewing the information in their records," says Gough. "That can be an important part of taking charge of their health."

**Living Past 100**

**Keeping Skin Beautiful**

## Music Festival draws near

Anyone walking down the streets of Princeton on the weekend of August 17th to 19th shouldn't be surprised to hear fiddle tunes wafting across Bridge Street. Looking west onto Veterans Square they'll see a big tent with a stage and people sitting in chairs tapping their feet or maybe even dancing in the street. Walking down Vermilion Avenue towards the Museum they may hear accordions or ballads, or perhaps a song about sailing on the tall ships.

All of this and much more is the kind of music featured at the Fifth Annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival. Over 160 musicians will be in town that weekend, some of them local, many of them from the coast, and some from as far away as California.

The dance will feature a live band with fiddle, guitar and concertina. Everyone is welcome. There will be a caller to teach the dances so no experience is necessary and people don't even need to bring a partner. On Saturday and Sunday there will be music from

10:00 AM until 6:00 PM on two stages - one in Veterans Square and one in front of the Museum.

And it's all free! No admission will be charged. The reason for this is that the Festival is run entirely by volunteers and the musicians are donating their talents.

This year's Festival is special because it features lots of music from Eastern Europe. This is in honour of the many immigrants from that part of the world that came here in the first half of the twentieth century.

Miners from many parts of Eastern Europe, including Slovakia, Croatia, Slovenia, Macedonia and Galicia, came to the valley, particularly Hedley and Princeton, to make a new life for themselves in a new country.

They worked in the Hedley Mascot gold mine, the numerous coal mines in and around Princeton, Coalmont, Tulameen and Blakeburn, and the Copper Mountain Mine. Many came from mines to the east at Phoenix and Greenwood, and some came direct from their homeland. They all brought with them elements of their cultural background, including music, dance and song.

## Town awards septic pit contract

Princeton Town Council awarded the contract for the construction of a new hauled liquid waste facility at their July 3rd regular meeting.

The contract went to 582138 BC Ltd. for the tendered price of \$29,898.40, which includes HST.

Under the provisions of the Waste Management Act, the town is authorized to receive the discharge from septic tanks and sewage holding tanks at the site of the liquid waste disposal facility (sewage treatment lagoon).

This allows for processing waste from the Klargester plant in Westridge, the sewage holding tank at the campground as well as waste from septic tanks in the town and Area H (hauled by local contractors). The existing facility is in need of replace-

ment; the town issued an invitation to tender for the construction of a new hauled liquid waste facility (septic pit) at the liquid waste disposal plant.

The project consists of an access road to the site, comprising a length of about 300-metres, the construction of two cast in place concrete septage receiving chambers and flumes along with final grading and slope trimming.

As the existing hauled waste facility was constructed in 1998 it has reached the end of its useful life, which is why the invitation to tender was announced.

This is the first portion of the total project of improvements to the Princeton sewage treatment facility, which is funded through the Federal Gas Tax Regionally Significant Projects program and is included in the Town of Princeton 2012 approved budget of \$400,000.00.

While 582138 BC Ltd. was the lowest of the four bids received, the highest was just almost double the winning bid.

It was not announced at the Town Council meeting when the project would begin or when it was expected to be completed.

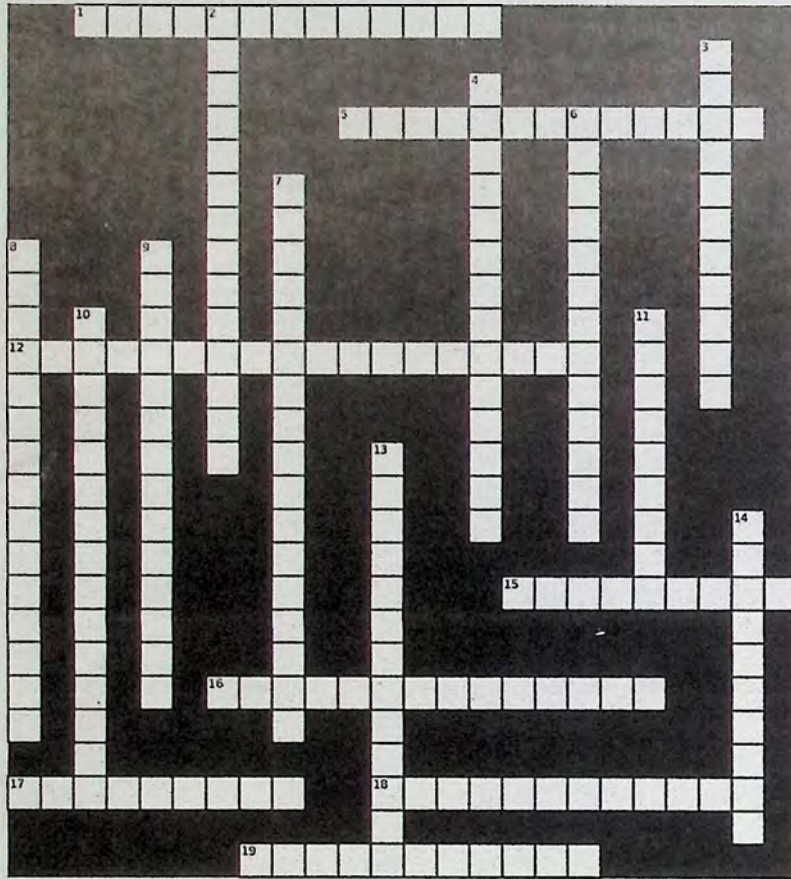
