

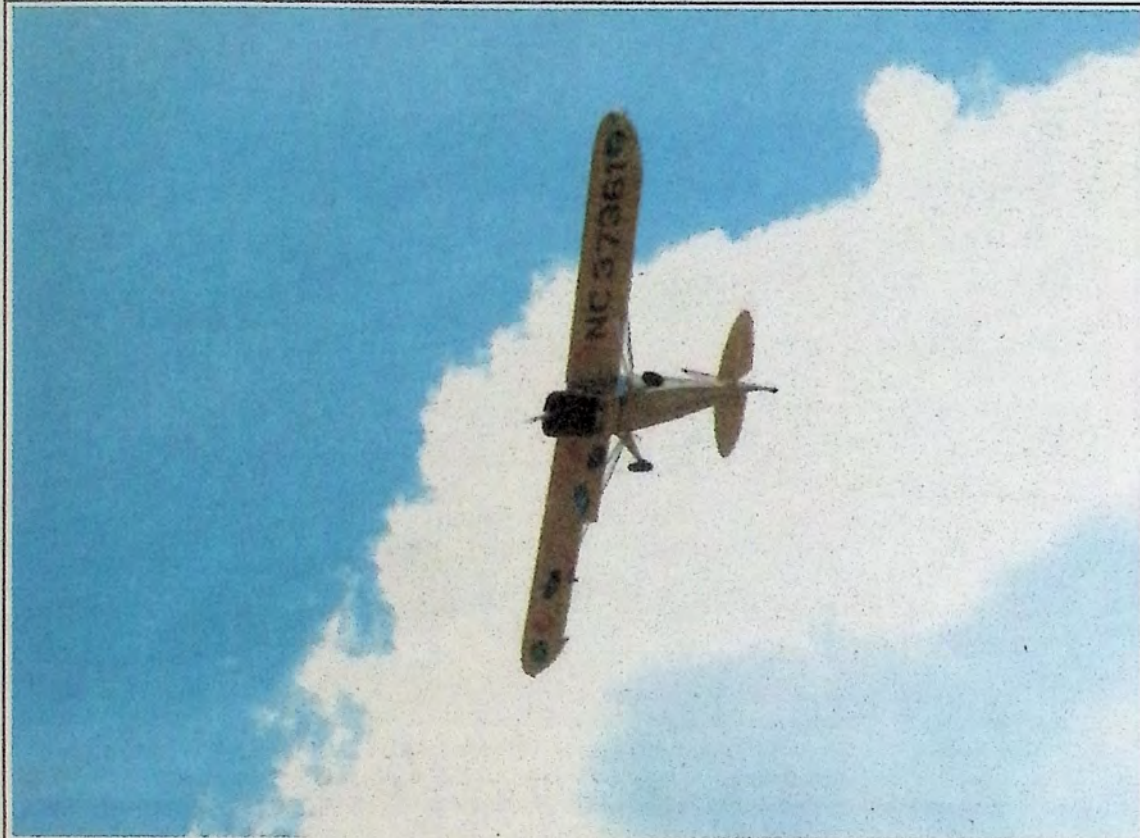

## Council announces ER deal

The Town of Princeton, in a 50/50 partnership with Area H, will lease a furnished residence for visiting locum doctors as part of keeping the Emergency Room staffed 24/7. The monthly cost of the residence is \$2,200, all inclusive.

In announcing the deal to keep the ER open, Deputy Mayor Jason Earle stated at the July 16 Town Council meeting, Council is 'incredibly pleased' with the efforts of local volunteers in pursuing the matter of keeping the ER fully operating.

Referring to leasing a residence for locum physicians, Council Marilyn Harkness commented, "Other rural communities have done this - Nakusp, Sechelt, Gibsons."

Councillor Kim Maynard remarked, "The community has spoken, this is their top priority."

He added he is pleased to have Regional District 'on board'.

In a related health matter, the Okanagan-Similkameen Health Board asked Princeton to give a letter of support for the construction of the tower planned for Penticton Regional Hospital.

The tower would include training facilities for physicians in the hopes that some of the new physicians would choose to stay in the Interior if trained in the area. Construction of the tower, which was to have begun next year, has been set back a further three years.

## PXA moves ahead

Little Britches Rodeo was a big success this year. A total of 75 youngsters participated and all went well despite 40 degree heat in the afternoon. Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), praised Jamie Payton for stepping in at the last moment to organize and manage the event. He added praise to local volunteers who left the grounds in good condition after the event.

Most of the July 17 meeting was devoted to discussing upgrades to

the buildings and equipment at the fairgrounds. Repairs are needed on the old barns and on one of the buildings used by the Fall Fair Association. An extension to the grandstand is required, and the fencing project must be completed, removing the old wooden fence and replacing it with chain link fencing.

Members described a safety concern that resulted from a storm this summer. Branches were torn off pine trees and one of the branches damaged the roof on the concession building. Fortunately, no events were taking place at the time. President Bedard stated the trees are over-mature. Members voted to have the trees removed as soon as possible, despite the expense, as they have become a safety issue.

## Town Council in brief

The July 16 meeting of Town Council included several items of interest.

Council had asked for proposals from local real estate agencies to market industrial lots owned by the Town. After reviewing the proposals, the contract was awarded to Realty Executives.

The former Bugnut business location at 107 Vermilion Avenue was flooded during the July 9 cloudburst and requires some repairs. This site is owned by the Town, and Council invited the Arts Council to use the building to display art until a suitable tenant can be found.

During Question Period, Al Kovaltsenko advised Council that the Crisis Assistance shop, located a few doors from 107 Vermilion Avenue, was also flooded in the downpour, and there was damaged to items donated for sale. Kovaltsenko asked that the Town find a solution to the backflow of rainwater at that location as this is

not the first time excessive rainfall has flooded the store.

The BCGEU sent a letter asking for support for their opposition to the sell-off of the provincial Liquor Distribution Branch warehouses and other assets. Council decided to receive and file this letter, meaning Council would take no action. At the same time, Deputy Mayor Jason Earle remarked he is sure the matter will be a 'hot issue' at the UBCM conference in September, and he would like to hear the government reasons before Council makes a decision.

# Flip Of The Coyne

of Princeton, but that of the Similkameen Valley.

So many are unaware of the historically rich region in which they live.

From John Fall Allison's settlement in the valley to the Royal Engineers laying out the town site of Princeton on the orders of the Province's first

governor James Douglas. Princeton is old in relation to the development of our province and our history reflects that.

Princeton has had its share of colourful characters come and go from our streets from the famous train robber Bill Miner to the labour organizer Slim Evans, but our history is not just that of Princeton.

We must not forget our ghost towns like Blackfoot, Granite City or other boom towns like Coalmont and Copper Mountain. Although the community of Allenby is now gone except for some ruins, some of the houses make up the landscape of our downtown and are still lived in today. We may forget that during the thirties the struggle for workers' rights took place right here on our streets but our newspaper archives are a testament to the struggle.

At one time we relied not only on the Welby Stagecoach. Our goods came in on pack trains over the mountains or by train on the Kettle Valley Railway. It is the history of our community that has shaped our character. We have been through some dark times but as a community we have always come through them. We need to celebrate our past.

We need to look to it for inspiration as we forge forward.

The pioneering spirit of our community has gotten us through boom and bust times. When the gold vanished from the rivers we diversified. We persevered and we are the legacy.

I have always been a believer that we need to know our past to know our future. We as a community need to understand our past and need to use it to forge our future. We as a community are standing at a crossroads and it will depend on the direction that we take now that will determine the future of our community.

The struggle to restore Emergency Room services is proof that our community stands before a major decision point in our history. We stood up and as a community. We would not allow politicians and bureaucrats to ignore the problem any longer. We waited for nearly two and a half years in vain for them to come up with solutions, but when the residents of our community took to the streets the problem could no longer be ignored.

### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS POLICY

Council recognizes the significant value of volunteers, volun-tee groups and agencies to the spiritual, educational, social, cultural, and physical well-being of the region. A property tax exemption is a means for Council to support organiza-tions within the town that further Council's objective to enhance the quality of life while delivering services economi-cally to the citizens of the town.

To be eligible for a property tax exemption an organization must comply with all of the eligibility criteria as follows :

- qualify for an exemption under the provisions of the *Community Charter* general authority for property tax exemptions. (Section 224)
- be in compliance with Town policies, plans, bylaws, and regulations (i.e. zoning);
- be a Non-Profit Organization;
- not be in competition with for-profit business.
- provide services or programs that are compatible or complementary to those offered by the Town. When a service or program is offered by a non-profit group or club, the community benefits from a more cost-effective provision of services;
- provide a service that fulfills some basic need, or other-wise improves the quality of life for residents of the Town of Princeton.

I just got off the phone with someone calling from the BC Liberals looking for a \$200 campaign contribution. He had a well-written script which highlighted all the wonderful free enterprise forward moves made by Christy Clark and the BC Liberals.

I waited for my chance and when he finally took a breath, I said I'd really like to help if they were to help us with our hospital situation. I told him how disappointed I was that Premier Christy Clark hasn't responded to our pleas for help, nor has Minister of Health Mike de Jong. ## Foolish Government Spending? No Wonder!

I have often thought the Members of the House of Commons went there with no notion of how to spend tax dollars. Turns out I was on the right track.

A recent study done by a parliamentary committee found that most Members of Parliament feel they cannot make good financial decisions because they receive budget information too late and with too little time to make informed decisions. This problem is compounded by not receiving the cost estimates until well after the budget is presented. Making a decision based on budget alone is like paying an employee with a blank cheque before any work is done.

This peculiar situation in the House of Commons exists because of a batch of old-fashioned rules set sometime when nobody was paying attention to the real requirements of sound financial management of the nation. It is no wonder the Canadian Taxpayers Federation is able to poke fun and express disgust at the way our federal government wastes money.

I can think of one current waste - the \$25 million set aside to celebrate

the war of 1812. First, I doubt there are more than a handful of Canadians who give two hoots about the War of 1812. The reason I say this is because it happened 200 years ago and was not a Canadian war, it was a war between Britain and France. At that time, there was no nation called Canada. What we call Canada today was then a chunk of land claimed by the British. British subjects in North America were bound to resist France's allies, the Americans. The British won the war when Wellington defeated Napoleon in a battle in a shallow valley in Belgium called Waterloo. There were no Canadians present.

At a time when Prime Minister Harper is telling us we have to be cautious with spending, he is ready to blow \$25 million on fun and games that really have nothing to do with Canadian history. In fact, many of the soldiers who fought for Britain were not even British, they were mercenaries imported from various places in the world. One of my late husband's ancestors was just such a mercenary. He was Swiss and was hired in Sicily to fight for the British in a colony called Canada. As a reward for his service, he was given a homestead near Fergus Falls, Ontario, and is buried in the Fergus Falls cemetery. So much for 'Canadian' history!

That \$25 million could have saved the Coast Guard station at Kitsilano, or could have saved the jobs of the people studying fresh water pollution, or helped the CBC do its job. Instead, people working for the federal government are losing their jobs while some dingbats in Ontario dress up in historical costumes to re-enact some long-forgotten battles in the Great Lakes

region.

I watched a program about the International Monetary Fund and how it wrecks havoc on poor nations (like Greece). When a government borrows money from the IMF, that 'bank of last resort' sets down some rules for how the government shall manage the finances of the borrower nation. The first thing the IMF demands is cuts to social welfare programs such as health care, pensions, and civil service jobs. Sound familiar?

There is a prevalent notion among the well-paid elite, which includes bankers and the financially secure, that government jobs and social welfare programs are bad for the economy. This is a load of crap, but they believe it, just like some people choose to believe the Holocaust never happened, despite all evidence to the contrary.

Civil servants, health care professionals, social workers, people working to protect the environment, people working to keep us safe from all sorts of harm, all of these people pay taxes. When it comes to health care, a healthy population does more work and therefore pays more taxes, and is worth every cent we spend on it. Pensioners may take money from the government, but pensioners spend their money and help keep our economy alive and well. Furthermore, a high percentage of pensioners pay taxes. All of these people keep money circulating. They pay for goods and services.

Rather than fuss about civil servants and health care costs, I suggest the Harper government, and any other government, start presenting a clear financial proposal at budget time so parliamentarians can make sensible decisions.

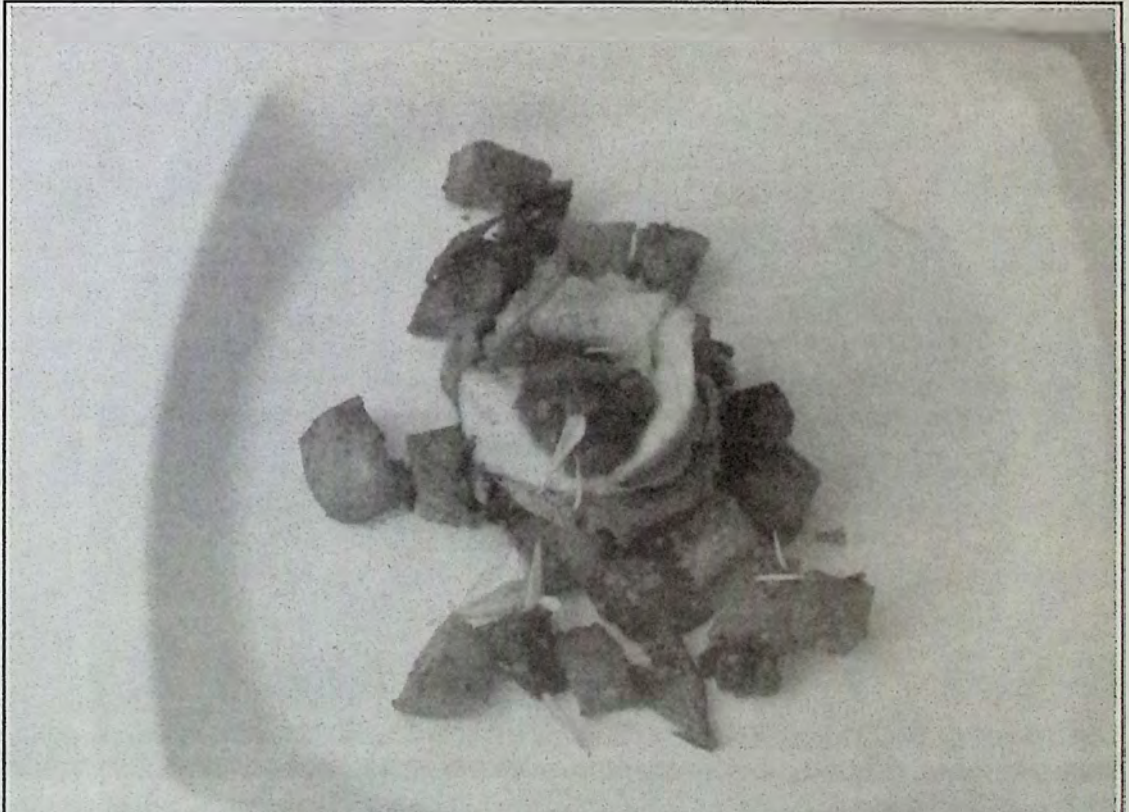
**Local takes 'BBQ king' crown**

## Nothin' but the blues

This is the third in a series of articles about the fifth annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival, which is taking place August 17 to 19. As well as the regular concerts by individual performing groups there will also be workshops. A workshop is focused on a particular topic and is presented by a group of singers and musicians who are on the stage at the same time. Over the next few weeks this column will feature descriptions of some of the workshops being offered at the Festival.

The Blues is music created originally among the African-American communities of the Deep South at the end of the 19th century. It grew out of spirituals, work songs, field hollers, shouts and chants. During

the early years of the 20th century many African-Americans took to the road and became professional Blues musicians playing in bars and speakeasies. It is from these musicians that the Blues most people are familiar with comes. Big Bill Broonzy, Robert Johnson and Tampa Red are some of the legendary names whose music is still played today. The Festival is fortunate to have six Blues musicians who will get together onstage and share their music in The Blues Workshop.

Mike Ballantyne from Victoria will be hosting this session. Mike has been playing music for over 45 years and is both a great singer and guitar player as well as being an expert in Blues from the 1920s and

30s. Joining him on stage will be Rick Van Krugel, a mainstay of the folk music scene in southwestern BC for many years.

Together with Mike and Rick will be Henk Piket and Barry Truter from the coast, who sing with the group Fraser Union who are appearing at the Festival, and Mike and Nakos Marker from Bellingham. A unique feature of this session is that there will be two dobro guitars onstage, one played by Henk Piket and one played by Nakos Marker.

This is just one of the workshops being presented on August 17th to 19th at the fifth annual Princeton Traditional Music Festival. And the best thing about it is, it's free!

The reason it's free is because it's run entirely by volunteers and the

performers are donating their talents. To make the festival a success the organizers will need lots of volunteers.

# News Leader Recipe 512

## Spaghetti with Mushrooms, Garlic, Chili & Lime

### Ingredients

- 12 oz (375 g) whole wheat spaghetti
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) extra virgin olive oil
- 1 lb. (500 g) thinly sliced fresh mushrooms
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1/2 -1 tsp (2-5 mL) hot red pepper flakes
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) thinly sliced green onions
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) finely grated lime rind
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) fresh lime juice
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) salt
- 2/3 cup (175 mL) minced cilantro

### Method

Cook the spaghetti in a large saucepan of salted boiling water according to package directions until al dente drain reserving some of the pasta water.

Meanwhile, in large skillet heat the oil over medium heat. Add the mushrooms and sauté 3-4 minutes or until starting to brown; add garlic, red pepper flakes and onion, cook stirring constantly, for 30-60 seconds. Remove from heat and mix lime juice, rind and salt. Pour over hot drained spaghetti; toss to coat well. If upon standing it seems too dry gradually add a little pasta water. Taste and add freshly ground pepper if desired. Stir in cilantro.

Makes 4 servings.

### Variations

Stir-fry or boil shrimp and asparagus pieces and toss in at the end. Try substituting parsley or basil for the cilantro.

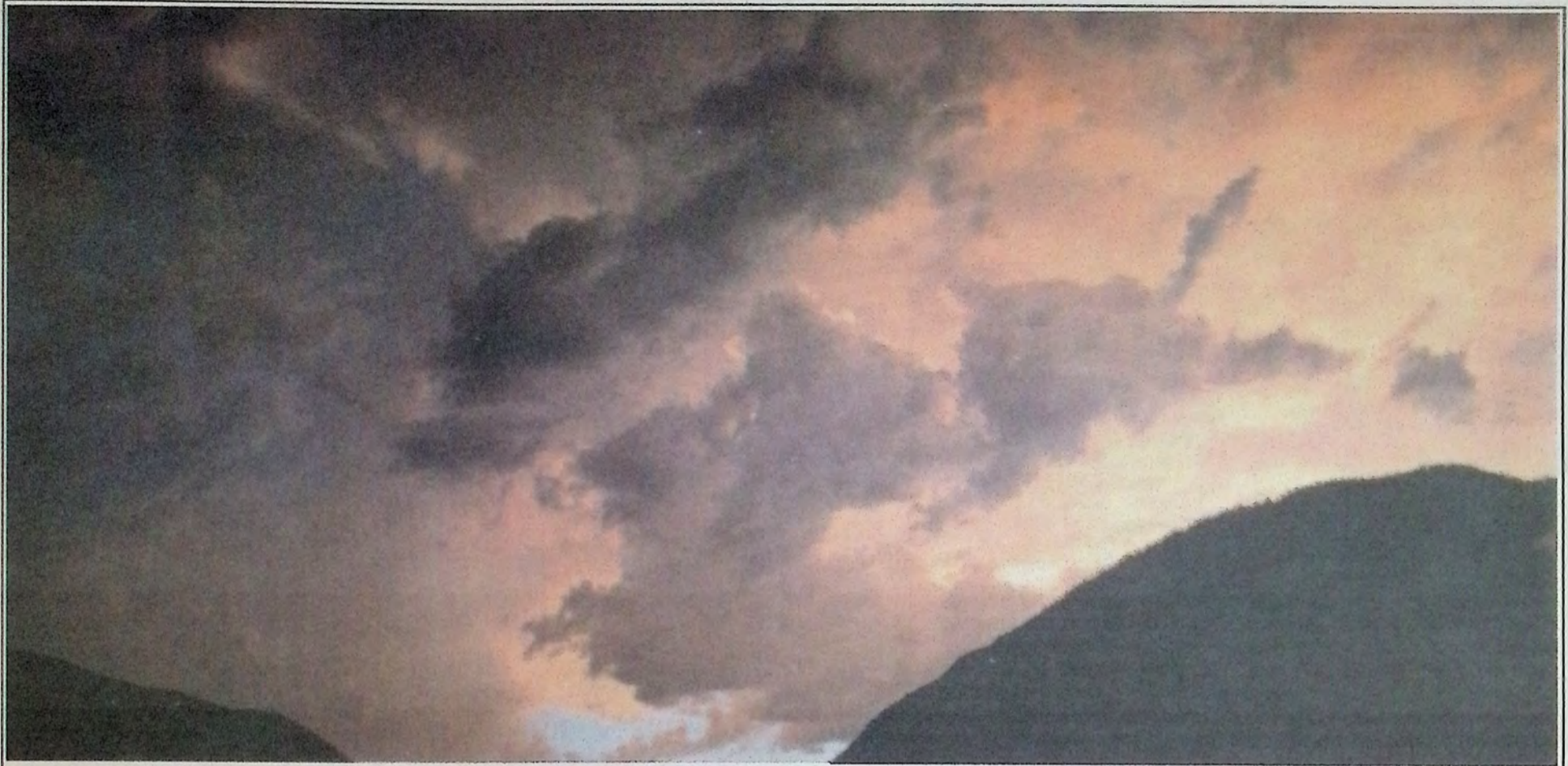

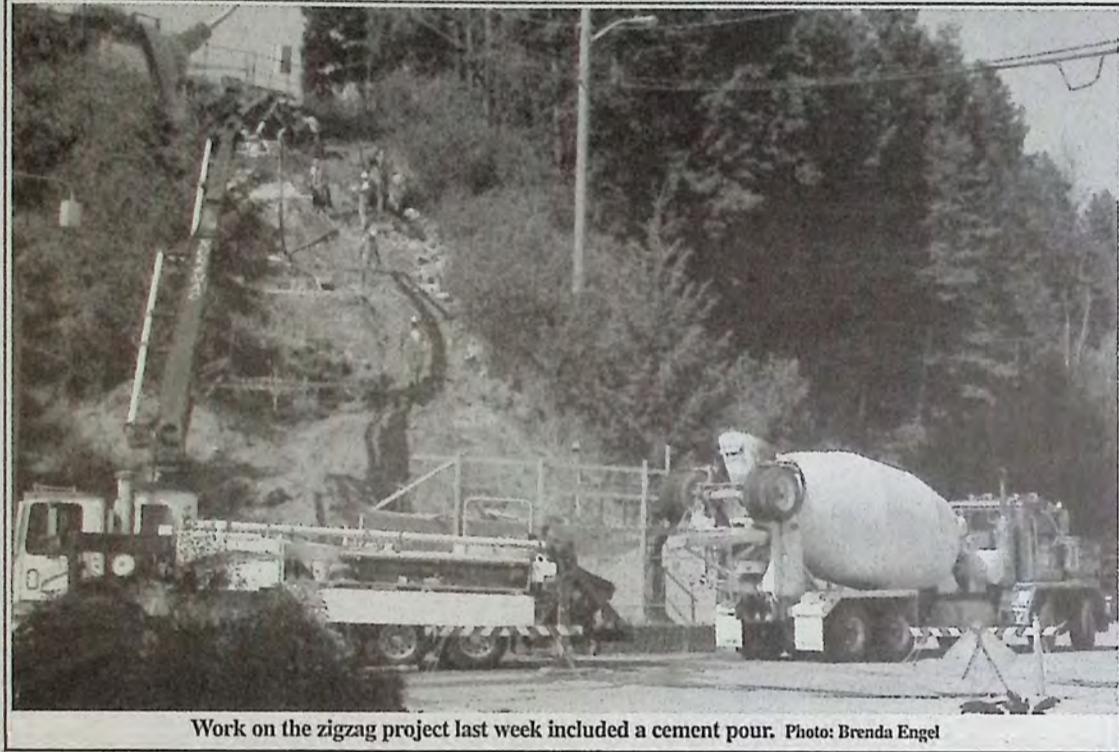

SIBAC Director Angelique Wood (Regional District Okanagan Similkameen Area G) said, "The SIBAC Board viewed this application for funding support as an opportunity to assist in a vital long-term planning process that address one of the key concerns from the Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic, which is our drinking water source."

The SIBAC funding will be directed specifically to completing phase 1 of the project, which is to complete a study that examines the forest cover of the catchment and impact to the watershed.

The funding is intended to support projects approved by the Beetle Action Coalitions that will create business partnerships, diversify local and regional economies, find innovative and value-added uses for forest resources and explore new industries to assist rural interior communities through this transition.

Council was not aware of any complaints. Business owner Ed Muckle informed Council that he had heard complaints of lack of traffic control and the number of streets blocked, and hinted Council may hear the complaints in the future.

"The Regional District of the Okanagan Similkameen is appreciative of the funding from SIBAC", states Chair Dan Ashton. "Approval of the funding will allow us to proceed immediately with

The Arts Council is booking a concert series for autumn with a string quartet, an African group, and two other groups. Local residents can look forward to a lively autumn of entertainment.

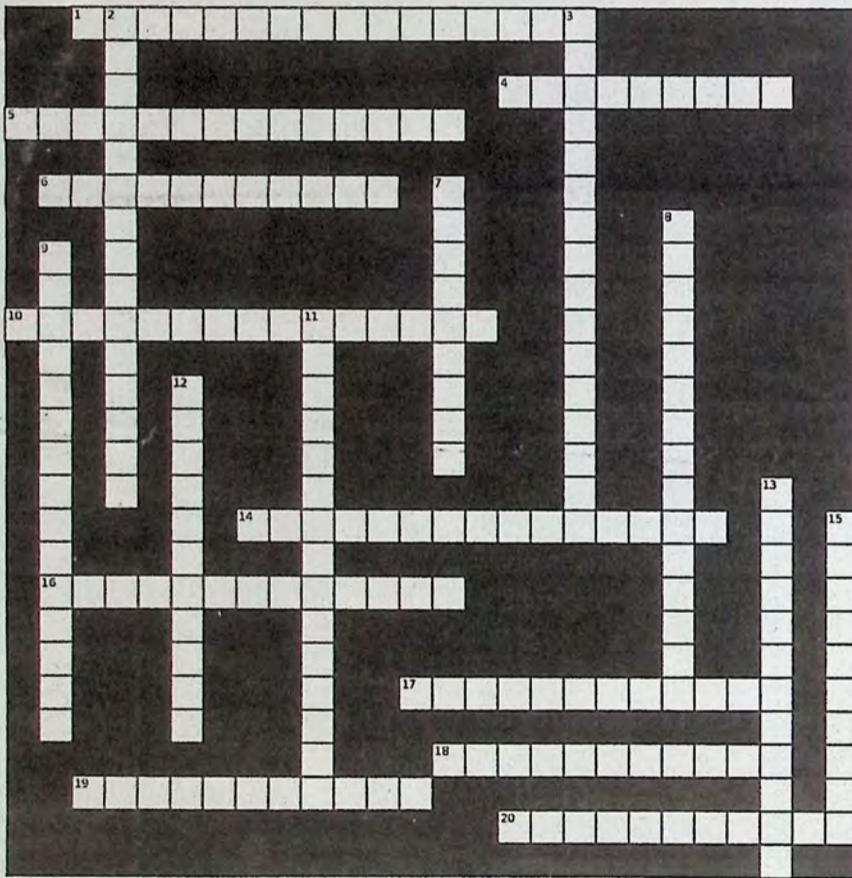
A recent decision by Town Council to invite the Arts Council to use the former Bugnut premises for additional art displays has brought a lot of excitement to Arts Council members.

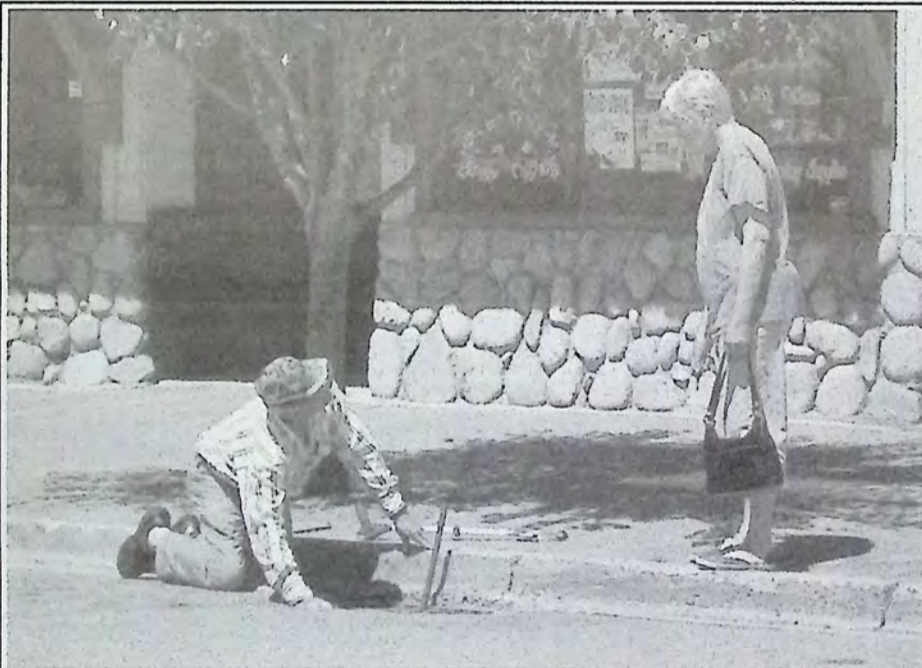

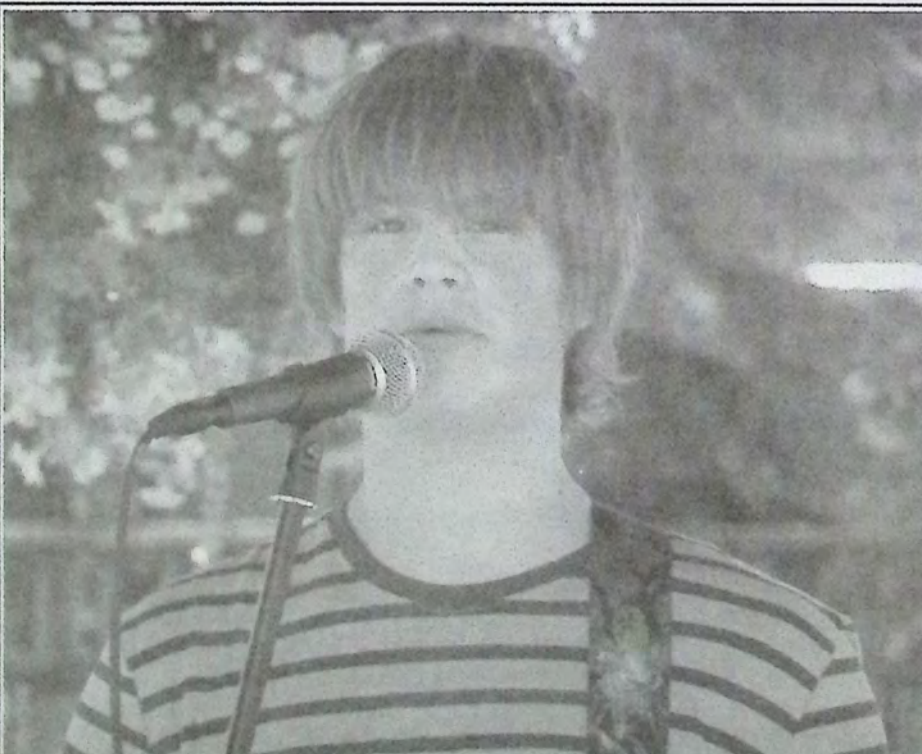

## Local 'indie' paper receives grant

Princeton's only locally-owned and operated weekly community newspaper received word last week they were the recipients of a grant from the Government of Canada's Canada Periodical Fund (CPF).

The grant was originally designed to assist with costs associated with mailing papers through Canada Post and in recent years has been changed into funding to be used on publishing activities.

"The 2012/13 grant is the largest one we have received from the CPF," states Similkameen News Leader Owner/Publisher George Elliott. "We are one of just a few independently-owned newspapers left in all of British Columbia and as a result we don't have a large corporation running things. We rely heavily on local advertising support and newspaper sales to cover our costs. The grant announced last week will assist us greatly in continuing to provide our readers with local content."

The Government of Canada CPF program requires an annual application and examines such things as ratio of Canadian content per published page and how much content per page is 'farmed out' to other sources.

"I am lucky, in that, with very few exceptions, the majority of the Similkameen News Leader contains local content from throughout the

Similkameen Valley," Elliott says. "That was my plan when I took over the ownership of this paper in February 2004 and thanks to the federal government's support through CPF, we can continue to keep our content local in nature."

The Similkameen News Leader was established in 1998 by Princeton residents Dawn, Bary and Sharon Johnson. The business was purchased February 2004 by employee George Elliott and is operated by Elliott and his wife, Brenda Engel. Former owner Dawn Johnson assists with news gathering to this day. The Similkameen News Leader is the only independent weekly newspaper in the Similkameen Valley and one of two in all of Southern British Columbia.

"I wish more residents were aware of how fortunate they are to have a locally-owned newspaper in their community. It is a very rare item in

today's economy, and - quite honestly - a challenging business to manage at times," Elliott adds.

The grant announcement falls on the twelfth anniversary of Elliott's hiring on at the News Leader.

"I was originally hired in July 2000 as the Advertising Sales Manager by Dawn and Sharon and they really set me up in business. I have them to thank for allowing me to stay in Princeton."

The Similkameen News Leader has a Facebook Fan Page, a YouTube Channel, a Twitter feed as well as a website (www.thenewsleader.net) and blog site (www.princetonbcnews.info) and various other products such as the popular "Princeton Area Ghost Towns" DVD.

The Canadian Periodical Fund was designed to ensure that Canadians have access to diverse Canadian magazines and non-daily newspapers.
