CMIMC announces 2012 Q2 results

The Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced August 13th gross revenues of \$75.3 million or \$60.7 million after pricing adjustments and treatment charges for the three months ended June 30, 2012.

Highlights include:

- 31,700 dry metric tonnes of copper concentrate was delivered to Japan containing approximately 18.1 million pounds of copper, 5,600 ounces of gold, and 124,000 ounces of silver.

- Gross revenues of \$75.3 million or \$60.7 million after pricing adjustments and treatment charges.
- Gross profit was \$6.1 million.
- Adjusted¹ earnings were \$7.8 million or \$0.08 per share².
- Net loss for the period was \$7.9 million or \$0.07 per share³.
- Adjusted EBITDA for the period was \$18.0 million.
- Site cash costs were US\$1.50 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits.
- Total costs were US\$2.15 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off site charges.
- Provisional⁴ pricing for concentrate shipments averaged US\$3.44 per pound of copper and the cash margin was US\$1.29 per pound sold for the

second quarter of 2012.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO of Copper Mountain, remarked "although the concentrator operating time continued to improve early in the quarter, downtime due to SAG mill grates and tailings line wear posed challenges in the last half of the quarter resulting in lower than planned production for the quarter. Recently a planned shutdown has allowed us to complete outstanding maintenance issues and install the newly designed SAG mill grates which is an important step forward towards us achieving our production goals".

O'Rourke continued, "Looking to the third quarter, management's efforts are fully focused on optimizing mine and mill operations to incrementally increase the daily tonnage, working towards the concentrator design capacity of 35,000 tons per day. Production during the quarter totaled 16.6 million pounds of copper, an increase of 21% over the prior quarter production. We are encouraged by continued progress in 2012 towards reaching the mill's design capacity on a consistent basis".

Copper Mountain Mine

The Copper Mountain Mine produced 16.6 million pounds of copper during the quarter ended June 30, 2012. During the quarter, the mine completed three shipments of concentrate containing approximately 18.1 million pounds of copper to Japan for smelting and recorded revenues, net of smelter charges and pricing adjustments, of \$60.7 million, realizing a gross profit of \$6.1 million.

The total cash cost of copper sold for the three months ended June 30, 2012 was US\$2.15 per pound of copper after gold and silver by-product credits. There are no comparative numbers from the prior year since the concentrator began operating in mid-2011.

Mining activities continued in the Pit 3 area with the push-backs on the western and eastern walls during the quarter averaging approximately 160,000 tonnes per day, an increase of 16% over the previous quarter.

The Company mined a total of 13.5 million tonnes of material, including 2.5 million tonnes of ore and 11 million tonnes of waste during the quarter, resulting in a 4.5 to 1 strip ratio. The projected life of mine strip ratio is 2.0:1 but higher in the early years.

Mill production continued to improve early in the quarter with mill feed coming entirely from Pit#3. SAG mill operating time in April reached an average of 91.6% availability as compared to a budgeted availability of 92%.

However, down time due to a scheduled SAG mill discharge liner change, ball mill motors electrical issues, tailings line maintenance, and BC Hydro power interruptions from lightning strikes that knocked the concentrator off line on four separate occasions affected operating time during the last two months of the quarter, resulting in lower than planned production for the quarter.

The mill treated a total of 2.3 million tonnes of ore at an average grade of 0.404% Cu during the second quarter. The Company has resolved the outstanding issues and continued on Page 23

Siberian smoke chokes valley

There is no doubt that this is forest fire season, but smoke that filled skies in the South Okanagan and Similkameen Valleys last week was not from a local wildfire.

The hazy cloud was from Siberia. Kamloops Fire Centre information officer Keven Skrepnek said the smoke is from the same wildfires that were burning in Siberia over a month ago.

"It's actually getting caught in the jet stream and then once it hits our shores, it starts to do an inversion and gets trapped in the valley bottoms."

"We had calls at our office from residents complaining about eye and throat irritation in some cases," says Similkameen News Leader Owner/Publisher George Elliott.

"It reminded me of the Tatoosh Forest Fire of September 2006 with how it blanketed the area in smoke for days and days, but this was a different kind of haze and the next day it was gone."

The Kamloops Fire Information Centre was first alerted to the smoke by residents of Tulameen and Princeton early in the afternoon of August 13th and reports the smoke is moving west to east and is expected to continue into Alberta and beyond over the next few days.

Skrepnek says forestry conducted air patrols throughout the interior to ensure the smoke was not coming from a wildfire burning within the area.

2012 AIR SHOW THANK YOU

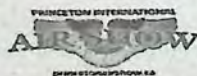

Who's Driving The Bus?

The ER situation at Princeton hospital has been the major issue of note for the past several weeks/months. It was acknowledged as such during the recent election campaign and will likely become the focus of the 'new' Town Council as it was for the 'old' Town Council prior to this month's election.

The recent public meeting to review progress to date (and to clear the air of some nagging rumours) revealed some very interesting information.

Everyone on this side of the table is facing the same direction when it comes to restoring 24/7 ER coverage at PGH. When I say everyone I'm including elected officials, business and industry representatives, advocacy groups, area residents and the doctors.

With the doctors onside you know you've done something pretty significant and yet IHA (the people on the other side of the table) appears to keep enforcing the moving roadblocks placed by the Ministry of Health.

The public meeting stated clearly that IHA is not the 'bad guy' in this situation as bureaucracy bogs them down. That tells me that the policy makers are the problem and I still don't totally buy that IHA (forced to follow the policies) can't find ways to better support rural healthcare.

My gut feeling is that IHA (and the Ministry) did not expect a fight from area residents when they started to make deeper cuts to local healthcare services. They first chose to ignore it thinking that possibly we were going to give up or that maybe we were reacting out of anger and that it would eventually fizzle out.

I think that the powerful force put together by SOHC and SOS, which includes the groups I mentioned above sitting on one side of the table (and doctors!) threw them off slightly.

The moving roadblocks tell me that the Ministry is not prepared to admit there is something wrong with centralization of health services and rather than righting that mistake they keep trying to add to the degree of difficulty in completing that task (in this case, a mountain of paperwork and organizing taken care of by local volunteers) with hopes we will eventually give up and walk away.

I think that is the most insanely stupid way to resolve an issue.

Typically, if someone points out you've done something wrong you own up to it, apologize and either try something else or try to incorporate the suggestions of those who corrected you in order to keep everyone happy.

IHA is stuck in the sandbox built by the Ministry of Health.

Princeton is in a sandbox monitored by IHA, who keeps taking away our toys because the Ministry tells them to.

It doesn't take long to figure out who the bully is.

I just wonder how much longer the bullying will continue before someone steps in and scolds the Ministry for their actions because until then none of us will be able to get along in the sandbox.

So bravo Dr. Halpenny and IHA for your latest green award. It is further proof that you continue to use our tax dollars to serve your own good.

As for us, it is time we face the fact that the IHA has no intention to help keep the Princeton ER open. It is time to fight to get a salaried physician who will take charge of Princeton General and return it to the functioning hospital it once was. We are only fooling ourselves if we believe and are optimistic that IHA will ever "step up to the plate" and help us.

The Dangers of Health Care Cutbacks

The situation regarding health care in Princeton has worried me a great deal. I am opposed to what has happened to our hospital, because it is no longer really a hospital, it is just a place to go to see if you really need to go to a hospital. If you need any special attention, you drive to Penticton or go by ambulance.

During the 30 years I have been a reporter in Princeton, I have been to an abundance of accident scenes. I have seen some horrendous accidents in which people have been killed and several seriously injured. I remember one at Stirling Creek Bridge in which one person died, her three children were injured, and in the other vehicle, two adults were critically injured, and their infant was badly shaken up. Thanks to the expertise of one person following the collision, one of the two adults was saved. If they had had to wait for an ambulance to arrive, that person would have been dead. In those days, we had a real hospital, and although one person did have to go to Kelowna, the rest were treated in Princeton.

Another accident scene I attended involved three cars and a transport

truck on the Hope-Princeton Highway. Eleven people were injured, two died.

Both of these accidents occurred during daylight hours, when we had a real hospital. Despite the distance and time it took for the ambulances to arrive and return to the hospital, lives were saved because we had a real hospital.

Those are two accidents I attended. Others occurred in the early morning before our ER today would be open. The Hope-Princeton Highway is unforgiving of driver errors. Should any of these accidents occur today when the ER is closed, I have doubts those involved would survive. On a long weekend when the Hope-Princeton is busy, it bothers me to think of what would happen to people in an accident even when the ER is open.

Are travelers expendable these days?

There are other aspects of our situation that make me angry. I have learned that small rural hospitals are efficient, thanks to a study done in Washington State, where the government has considered following our regionalization model. Recently I learned Penticton Regional Hospital staff have complaints about the added pressure on them due to people coming from Princeton and other small rural communities. What it boils down to is a lack of commitment on the part of both the provincial and federal governments to ensure good health care, including good emergency care, is available in rural areas.

The federal government is planning to cut health care funding to the bare bones in the next few years, yet they are spending a bil-

lion dollars to buy surveillance drones. For those of you unfamiliar with what these devices are, let me explain. Our federal government is going to buy little remote controlled airplanes that spy on landscapes to see what is going on in these locations. I have no idea why we need to have these little spy planes flying overhead. It is not as if we regular Canadians are plotting a violent revolution. In fact, the only time we Canadians get really unruly is when our favourite hockey team loses the Stanley Cup playoffs.

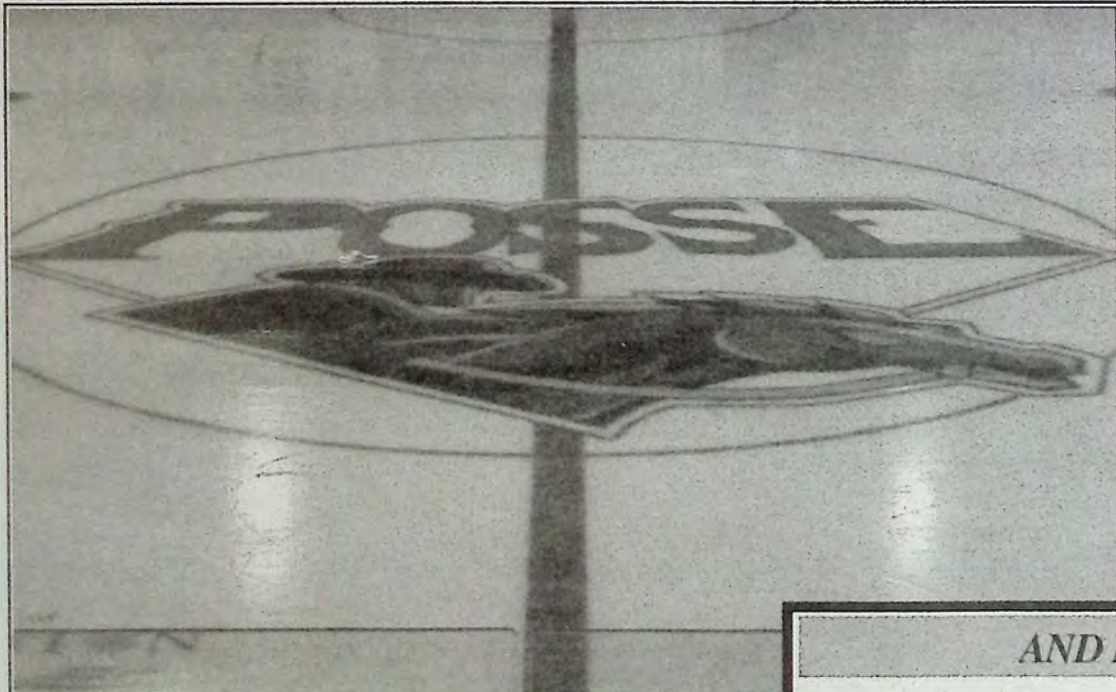
Of course, this is the same federal government that bailed out the banks, to the tune of \$75 billion. You can easily tell this is the government that puts bank health ahead of citizen health.

Maybe it is time we started asking our provincial and federal representatives to tell us the real agenda behind regionalization. Surely it cannot be to save money, because there is money for a lot of other things, like spy planes that cost an arm and a leg.

You see, I look at what our hospital was, and I think we could have used it to relieve pressure on Penticton Hospital, or we could have saved our hospital by allowing surgeries that the medical insurance does not cover. That was proposed but denied. Why? There must be some long term planning to which we, the stakeholders, are not being told about. We were told, "This is how it is going to be," and that was that.

For you younger folk or newcomers, we did object, we did protest, but our protests were ignored. What we have now is what our government decided we should have, whether we like it or not.

That makes me really angry!

BC's Top Juvenile Golfers Come To Princeton

Summer Can Be Dangerous

Most of what we are told about the dangers of summer include warnings about too much sun, too little water, and the danger of drowning. Very little is said these days about the danger of bacterial infection from the foods we eat.

There are several bacteria that may be clinging to your food, and you could become very ill or die from being infected. Cooking food thoroughly is the first step to maintaining safe food, but even more important is washing raw food thoroughly. People worry about bugs being on food plants, but they show less concern for the unseen microbes which are far more dangerous.

Food contaminants come in many forms on vegetables. While you may worry about pesticides and shop strictly organic, how much do you worry about thoroughly washing your fruit and vegetables? Every piece of fruit and every vegetable needs to be washed. Soaking in chlorinated water is a good way to clear some of the dirt and bacteria, but there are washing solutions that do a better job. These are expensive additions to your grocery list, but old-fashioned bleach can do just as good a job for a lot less. When you use a bleach solution, it should not be too strong, and you should rinse the vegetables and fruit to remove the bleach taste and smell if there is any.

Many people who are very careful to wash fruit and vegetables forget to wash countertops and utensils, especially cutting boards, as carefully as they should. A bleach solution will do the trick to keep countertops and cutting boards free of microbes.

The most important thing to wash is the hands that handle food, and those hands should be washed thoroughly and frequently.

To avoid any contamination after preparing food, remember this rule: keep cold food cold and hot food hot. It is as simple as that.

Food safety in summer can be a major concern, but food safety should be a concern all year round. Summer is more of a concern as we tend to eat a lot of cold foods and raw fruits and vegetables, but food safety rules should apply to every season.

Parents of young children should be especially careful, as the infection that can make an adult ill can kill a child. The majority of those who die from food bacterial infections are young children.

Because music should be free

The Princeton Traditional Music Society has just finished their fifth music festival, held from August 17th to 19th.

It started with dance performances by the Vancouver Morris Men on Veterans Way Friday night, which transitioned into a casual opening celebration with words of welcome from Acting Mayor Jason Earle, Area H Director Brad Hope, Fraser-Nicola MLA Harry Lali and BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko.

Following the formalities, the Psycho Acoustic Ceili Band took the stage firmly planted in the middle of the street and the evening turned into a giant street dance and celebration of the universal language of music.

The theme for this year's edition of the festival was 'Eastern European Music' and if you planned your trip just right you could enjoy the sounds from both the stages on Vermilion

Avenue (one at Veterans Square, the other at the Museum).

The event is planned annually by a small group (ten in total) of music fans that, with assistance from dozens of other area residents are able to provide accommodations for the dozens of performers who fill the two-day event schedule.

The performers play their music at no charge to those who attend the event because, in the words of Jon Bartlett, "music should be free."

Barlett, along with his longtime partner, Rika Ruebsaat, are probably best known locally for their interest in searching documents for historic musical heritage. The pair has concentrated their efforts on mining and logging songs, which connects with the history of the Pacific Northwest, British Columbia and the Similkameen.

Their many finds have been recorded on CD and in print and provides the footing for the traditional music

festival.

Funding for the event comes from donations, proceeds collected from the sale of their CD "Now It's Called Princeton," advertising in the festival program and generous grants from the Town of Princeton, the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen and the Federal Government's Building Communities Through Arts and Heritage Program of Canadian Heritage.

Some of those funds pay for advertising and promotion of the music festival, food and beverages for the performers, sound equipment rentals and associated costs.

Local restaurants accept food vouchers from musicians, which keeps the local economy humming.

- Preheat the grill. Place the muffins, cut side up, on the grill rack and toast on both sides. Place cut side up and spread some of the tomato chutney on each muffin. Top with the mushrooms and a sprinkling of cheese.
- Cook the muffins under the hot grill for 1-2 mins until golden brown and the cheese is bubbling. Serve hot.

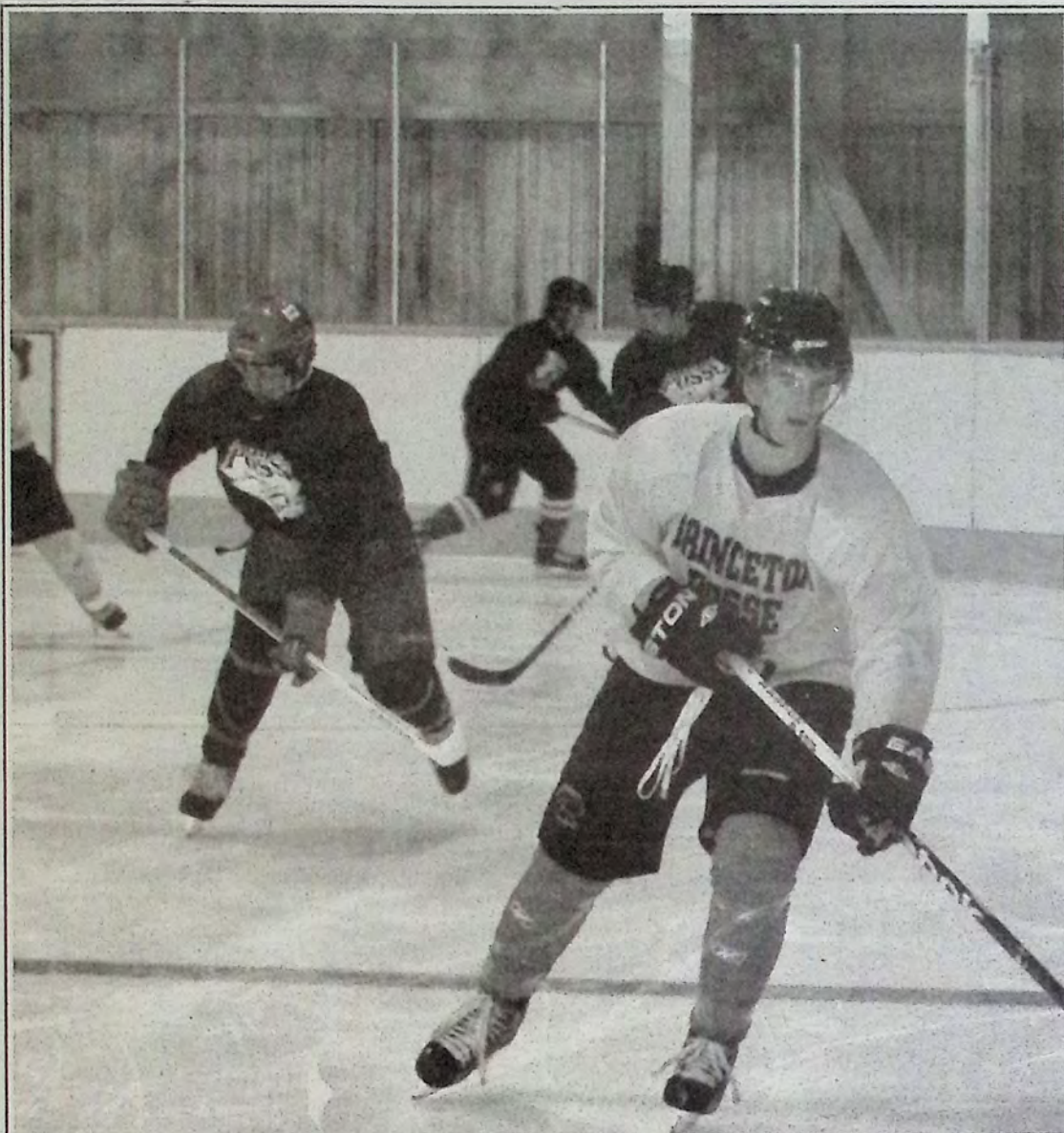

District issues campfire ban

Effective at 12 noon Friday, August 17, all campfires were banned in all areas of the Kamloops Fire Centre except the Clearwater Fire Zone.

This step was taken to help prevent human-caused wildfires and protect public safety. The fire danger rating is currently "high" throughout the

Kamloops Fire Centre, with scattered pockets of "extreme."

With the current trend of warm and dry weather, wildfires in the region have displayed very aggressive behaviour and required additional fire suppression resources. Human-caused wildfires can divert critical resources and crews from responding to naturally occurring wildfires.

RDOS adds fire ban

Due to the current condition of "high" fire danger rating in our regional area, the regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) is implementing a TEMPORARY FIRE BAN.

This ban does not restrict fires in stoves using gas, propane or briquettes, but does restrict fires in portable wood burning fireplaces and campfires.

Open burning is prohibited throughout the Kamloops Fire Centre. This prohibition applies to open fires of any size, fires with a burn registration number, industrial burning, fireworks, tiki torches and burning barrels. The prohibition does not apply to cooking stoves that use gas, propane or briquettes, or to a portable campfire apparatus with a CSA or ULC rating that uses briquettes, liquid or gaseous fuel, as long as the height of the flame is less than 15 centimetres.

Effective at noon on Friday, August 17th, 2012 and until further notice, all open burning, including campfires, fireworks, will be prohibited in the RDOS in conjunction with the municipalities of Penticton, Summerland, Oliver, Osoyoos, Princeton, Village of Keremeos, Hedley Improvement District and the Ministry of Forest and Range, BC Forest Service - Kamloops Fire Centre.

Anyone found in violation of an open fire ban, including campfires, may be issued a ticket for up to \$345.00 per incident. Anyone who causes a wildfire through arson or recklessness may also be fined up to \$1 million, spend up to three years in prison and be held accountable for associated firefighting costs.

The open burning prohibition covers all BC Parks, Crown and private lands, but does not apply within the boundaries of local governments that have forest fire prevention bylaws and are serviced by a fire department. Please check with local governments for any other restrictions before lighting a fire.

This open burning ban is in effect to protect public safety and to limit the risk of person-caused wildfires.

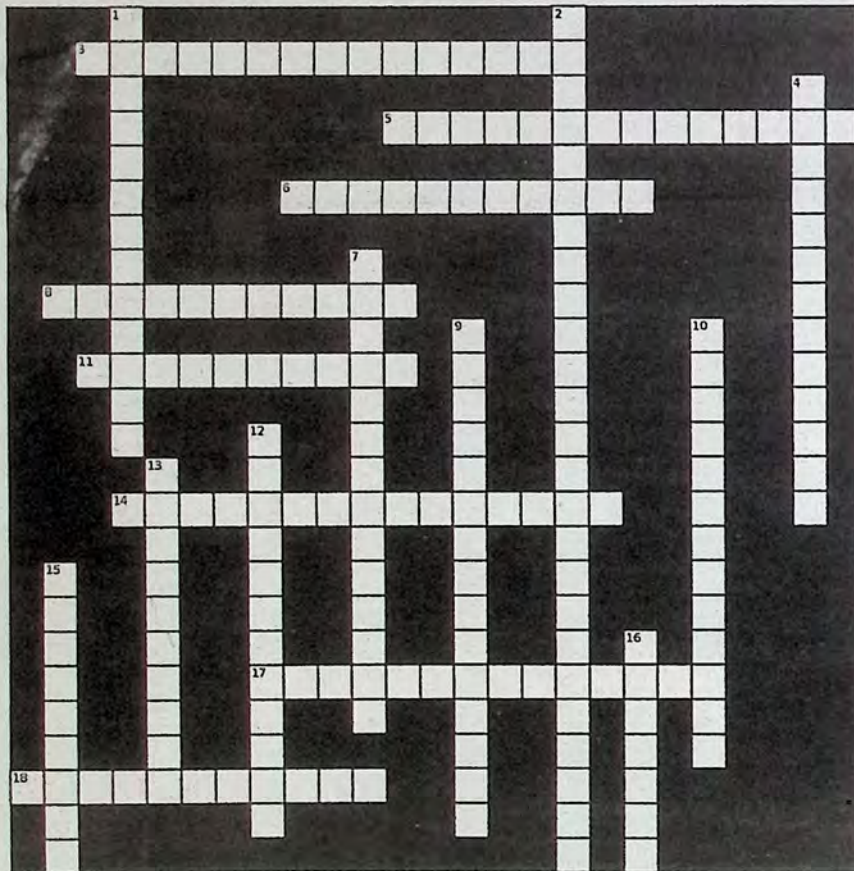

 is confident that it will reach targeted production rates on a consistent basis in the near term. Copper concentrate production during the quarter totaled 16.6 million pounds of copper, 4,500 ounces of gold, and 113,500 ounces of silver. During the first six months of 2012 the mine completed a total of seven shipments containing approximately 33.9 million pounds of copper, 11,300 ounces of gold, and 248,500 ounces of silver generating \$131.7 million in gross revenue net of pricing adjustments.

Exploration Update

The company initiated an exploration drilling program in mid-May with the objectives of: 1) converting inferred blocks to the measured and indicated categories, within and peripheral to, planned mining areas; 2) testing depth extents of known mineralization; and 3) testing mineralized areas that are currently outside of the mine plan. Approximately 9,800m of drilling has been completed in 45 holes. A majority of the drilling (6,000m in 28 drill holes), in both shallow and deep holes, was conducted around and below the Pit 2 area, primarily to infill gaps in the block model and to extend the mineralization to depth and to the north.

Other drilling was conducted at depth below the south end of Pit 3 and on local geophysical targets. Additionally, close-spaced shallow percussion drilling was carried out along the north side of Pit 2 in order to complete the block model in the near surface areas for mine planning. Drill results are currently being compiled and the exploration program will continue to complete the planned 20,000 meters of drilling for the 2012 exploration program.
