SVPS/TOTA launch joint project

In a groundbreaking joint initiative, the organizations representing the tourism industry in the Similkameen Valley and the Thompson Okanagan region are launching a pilot project to develop leading-edge tourism materials that will promote travel to the Similkameen and will also serve as a case study demonstrating best practices while developing resources for other communities.

The Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) has awarded contracts to a group of branding, marketing and website development professionals – co-ordinated by the Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association (TOTA) – to create a compelling new tourism brand, image bank, and website for the Similkameen.

These marketing materials will follow the priorities set out in a new Tourism Action Plan adopted by SVPS in June following a six-month process that received broad input from dozens of stakeholders throughout the Valley. The Action Plan was developed with support from the Community Tourism Foundations program of Tourism BC, part of the provincial Ministry of Jobs, Tourism & Innovation – and the new initiative to implement the Plan is partly supported by \$23,000 in matching cooperative marketing funding from

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Tourism BC's Community Tourism Opportunities program.

Implementation of the Action Plan is being spearheaded by the Tourism Advisory Council (TAC) of SVPS with Thompson Okanagan Tourism's Community Development Specialist, Simone Carlysle-Smith.


This tourism development project is a breakthrough for the Similkameen Valley's tourism industry, which has come together in recent years to identify the essential features that attract visitors to the area. Creation of a coordinated brand, image bank, and website will boost the strategic marketing of the beautiful Valley which stretches along Highway 3 from Manning Park to Richter Pass – including the communities of Eastgate, Manning Park, Tulameen, Coalmont, Princeton, Hedley,

Keremeos, Olalla, Cawston, Chopaka, and the Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands. Current visitor sites and attractions include Manning Park, Snaza'ist Discovery Centre, Mascot Gold Mine Tour, recreation on the Similkameen River, the Keremeos Grist Mill, hiking and biking the Kettle Valley Rail Trail, the China Ridge Recreation Area, as well

It is hard not to think about the consequences of our buying habits when you listen to the radio these days. On Country 100.7 there is an announcement that seems to play just about every commercial break for emergency meetings for fruit farmers. It has been a hard year for fruit producers with the crazy weather and now the dumping of cheaper products from the US into our markets. I know when I go shopping I make sure to check the sticker to see where the fruit I buy actually comes from.

When we are blessed to live in a region like ours we should be taking advantage of what it has to offer: Fresh locally grown fruits and vegetables, cheese producers, a couple outstanding regional dairies, meat producers, world class wineries and some great breweries. Why would anyone want to buy something made outside our region? The taste and quality that comes from what is produced in the Thompson Okanagan is easily among the best in the world. When we shop we should think local first, and only if it can't be found locally should we look outside our area.

It takes a conscious decision to not buy an apple from Washington State when there is an apple from BC on the same shelf, but we should be doing just that. When we choose the American apple over the one grown in BC we are putting our domestic fruit industry at risk. If you consider that most of our orchards are situated on some of the most sought after real estate in the province it makes little sense for a farmer to continue farming at a loss when he could subdivide and sell his property and retire. At first you might think "so what if we lose our orchards?" If we lose them now they will be gone forever. Once agricultural land has been turned into residential property it will never be returned. We have seen our tree fruits taken out and turned into vines for wine. We have seen, as urban sprawl has taken over farm land all over the Okanagan and it isn't slowing down, the pressure to expand on these farm lands is not going to stop. The only way to protect our farms is to support the farmer.

Buy their fruit, buy their vegetables and their wares. If we do that we help that farmer pay the wages of the pickers, pay for their insurance, their overhead and other costs associated with farming.

It doesn't take much to support BC farmers. You can make the decision at the local grocery store. Check labels and make the decision to stay away from fruit and vegetables not from BC. On your next trip to Penticton stop at one of

the fruit stands in Keremeos and stock up on fruit. Not only will you be getting the freshest product possible you will be getting great prices and the money goes straight to the farmer. Another great way to support local agriculture is to visit the local farmers' market. Princeton has a market every Saturday throughout the growing season where you can get vegetables grown locally. If you aren't at home on the weekend there are great farmers' markets across the Okanagan valley including Penticton where their market closes down a significant part of Main Street every Saturday.

It takes a conscious decision to not buy that tomato from California or Mexico when there is a BC tomato sitting beside it, but it is a decision we should be making. If the grocery store you visit doesn't carry BC produce when it is in season ask them why they don't and ask them to bring it in. Our farmers need our support and our economy needs our money to stay inside our country. Support local agriculture. Shop local.

I attended the Inaugural meeting of Princeton Town Council on August 22nd, which was basically a meet and greet with snacks and handshakes. I left before the party part of the agenda was launched, so I think I was there for the important part of the gathering.

Both Mayor Frank Armitage and Councillor Doug Pateman read their Oaths of Office and were officially sworn in as the newest members of Council.

The Mayor had a speech where he pointed out that his top three priorities were "healthcare, doctors and healthcare" which actually means there's only one priority the new Town Council will focus most of their energy on. We've been hearing this for a while and I am glad to see the issue is still considered a top priority.

I've also been following the developments at the Granite Creek Cemetery.

The recent windstorm last week caused some damage at that site with dead pine trees now taking up residence on top of a number of graves rather than providing shade to them.

For some residents in the Coalmont area this is a high priority situation that has been brewing for at least as long as the healthcare issue in Princeton.

Members of the RDOS are scheduled to look at the site later this week and we'll see if they make a public announcement stating that their top three priorities will be "cemetery clean up, removing dead/problem trees from near the cemetery and cemetery clean up," or in other words, looking after the cemetery.

What ties the Princeton and Coalmont issues together is that residents in both communities are doing the work of someone else.

The Ministry of Health/IHA is responsible for the delivery of healthcare services.


The Provincial Government is responsible for the Granite Creek Cemetery as it, and the historic town site is Crown Land.

Do I have to explain the connection to you any further?

What impresses me most about both situations, and many others like them, is that the driving force behind them is private citizens - in most cases volunteering their time and energy - who have taken ownership of these issues.

By taking ownership of these issues residents are fighting for what they believe in and are trying to right a wrong for the benefit of others. Let's hope that the powers that be will respond favourably to these and other issues identified by Princeton (and area) residents.

cemetery beetle attack hits e

On August 21st a massive dead pine tree fell at the Granite Creek Cemetery, destroying part of a fence and landing across several gravestones. Since the pine beetle swept through the Cemetery about three years ago, volunteer caretakers Diane and Bob Sterne of Coalmont have been pleading with the RDOS, through Director Brad Hope, to take the initiative and fell the trees before something like this happened.

Over the past 8 years, the Sternes have brought the Cemetery back from a dingy, overgrown disgrace where you could barely see the

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picket fences surrounding the graves to a bright, open reminder of past times, and wildflowers are now thriving where the sunlight filters through the trees.

Unfortunately, their pleas were unanswered, and only after this damage occurred did RDOS indicate that they have no jurisdiction over the site, and can do nothing to help with a cleanup or to prevent further damage. The site, and the adjacent townsite of Granite Creek, are Crown land, owned by the Provincial Government, and neither are protected by Heritage Status, again despite numerous requests over a period of several years.

Apparently in 2007, at the stroke of a pen (likely from someone who has never visited the area), the Granite Creek Cemetery was declared "Inactive" by Consumer Protection BC, who is responsible for the Cremation/Internment Act. With this status, one must presume it is the intention of the Provincial Government to allow the Cemetery to become overgrown and return to nature unless it is maintained by the families of those interred there. Since the majority no longer live in the area, unless local volunteers step up to the plate, with no Government funding available, it would appear that the Granite Creek Cemetery will face its final indignity.

There is something RDOS can do. They can place the Granite Creek Townsite and Cemetery on their Heritage Registry, along with other sites in Area H like Allenby, Blakeburn, the pictographs on the Old Hedley Road, and many others. This is a necessary first step towards having the Provincial Government give these areas protection as Heritage Sites.

There is also something YOU can do. If you have the expertise and/or equipment to assist in removing the trees threatening the graves in the Cemetery, you can visit, have a look at the problem, and volunteer your services. Perhaps one of the local Forestry companies could consider this? - submitted

This Is A Great Town for Big Events

I have lived in a number of places, cities and small towns, but I have never lived in a town with so many events as there are in Princeton.

We have had, so far this year, a Spirit Festival with a powwow, hockey tournaments, curling bonspiels, an ice skating carnival, cross country skiing events, a week of celebrating the arts, any number of concerts, several plays, two rodeos, horse racing, the annual racing days events at the park, a dinner on the Bridge of Dreams, a number of golf tournaments, weekends of nature walks or rock hounding, and a music festival.

There are five more big events: the annual fair on the long weekend, horse racing on September 8, a community Halloween party on October 28, Remembrance Day and Christmas Light-up.

The way groups get together and put on events is astounding, People who volunteer to put on these events or help with them are not only from Princeton. Many come from surrounding communities and some come from communities further away. People volunteer because they want to join in the fun of these events. These volunteers deserve a lot of praise and far more recognition than they publicly receive.

Much as I would praise all of the efforts of those who provide us with so many things to do in Princeton, I feel I must add that these groups will die if there is not

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more interest in the work that must be done before the events. These events do not happen by themselves. They take months of planning and some really hard work at the time of the event.

I am speaking from experience. I belong to the Arts Council and the Fair Board, and have involvement with Racing Days and Rodeo Club. We always have a lot of volunteers for our events, but it seems those volunteers run away when the event is over. They tend to forget it is the dedicated volunteers who attend the meetings and do the planning and prep work for the events.

I know people hate to attend meetings, but meetings are where the decisions are made, where the budget is set, and where the foundation is built for the next event. I do not know how it is for every group, but the groups to which I belong are suffering through lack of participation in the planning process and the prep work. I understand, from talking to people in other organizations, they experience the same thing.

Whether it is the fair, Minor Hockey, Minor Ball, the music festival, or the golf or curling clubs, the question of sustainability arises each year.

The lack of people to do the planning poses another threat to the sustainability of these major events.

To do what is needed, and to be a responsible, recognized organization, these groups form a society which is governed by the Society Act of British Columbia. To maintain this status, the organization requires a Board of Directors that takes on the responsibility for managing the money and ensuring that members behave in a responsible manner. Without sufficient people to serve on the Board, the society will cease to function. At that point, it must dispose of all of its money and other assets. To revive the society and restore the event becomes highly unlikely.

What it boils down to is this: if we want to continue these events, we, the people of our community, must be willing to step up, go to the meetings, and make sure the organization is sustained. In the coming months, many organizations will advertise their annual general meeting. This is the time in any organization when it elects a Board of Directors for the coming year, and this is the time when those of us who want to see an event continue to step up and make a commitment.

We have seen an election for Town Council recently. Those who ran for office made a commitment to stay on the job for three years. Yes, things can happen that may change their ability to meet that commitment, but it is rare for a Mayor or Councillor to have to be replaced before the three year term is completed.

These people have taken the responsibility to meet the commitment they made, and as a reporter who has attended Town Council meetings for the past 30 years, I can assure you that the commitment is not taken lightly, and our mayors and councillors work very hard to do what they promised to do.

I wish the same spirit of commitment could be generated among more of the people who like to attend the events organized by volunteer Boards of Directors. When I was in the audience of around one hundred people at the music festival, I wondered how many of them had actually taken the time to attend the meetings and do the preliminary work. If people enjoy an event and want it to continue, then they owe it to themselves to become part of ensuring the organization can be sustained and the event continue.

I learned a long time ago if you want to see something happen, then you have to be part of making it happen.





Bridge repair closes Ashnola FSR

Travellers are advised the Ashnola Forest Service Road will be temporarily closed at 39 kilometres from Tuesday, September 4 to Tuesday, September 18, due to a bridge replacement.


The announcement was made August 23rd by Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations. Ministry staff will be dismantling an old wooden bridge that is deteriorating and will replace it with a steel girder concrete deck bridge with a longer lifespan.

Note the closure is near the end of the forest service road and access to all recreation sites along Ashnola Forest Service Road will not be affected. The Ashnola Forest Service Road is located approximately 27 kilometres southwest of Keremeos, and is part of British Columbia's 55,000-kilometre Forest Service road network that provides access to British Columbia's backcountry.

Lee and Zhang win BC Juveniles

Henry Lee and Janet Zhang capture the British Columbia Juvenile Boys' and Girls' Championships at Princeton Golf Club.

Lee, a fourteen year old from Coquitlam and member at Swan-eset Bay Resort and Country Club, completed a wire-to-wire victory, holding off Vancouver's Trevor Yu and Dewdney's Jake Scarrow by three strokes.

Coming into the day, Lee held a four-stroke lead on the field and admitted he wasn't gunning for any more.

"My game plan for the final round was to keep it steady and shoot even for the day," stated Lee. "I made a bad shot coming into 17 and wasn't able to get up-and-down, then made a double on 18. I was nervous I wasn't going to win but relieved when I did."

By shooting a three-day 213, -3 total (68-71-74), Lee made the Championship closer than it should have been, slightly opening the door for Scarrow and Yu to sneak into the mix before they finished with bogeys on 18 and made Lee's first provincial title official. Scarrow (70-73-73) and Yu (72-72-72) would both shoot 216 totals, good enough for even-par on the Championship.

"I didn't really expect to win coming in. The course was tough because you had to keep it straight and if you miss, you were in trouble," said Lee. "I am just happy to be called the Juvenile champion."

Looking ahead, Lee knows his practice for 2013 is very important.

"My year is done after this tournament. I need to practice harder so that I can come out and repeat as champion."

At fourteen, Lee has the opportunity to play in two more Juvenile Championships until he loses eligibility due to age. No player has ever captured three B.C. Juvenile Boys' Championships.

In the Girls' division, first round leader Janet Zhang, 15 of Richmond, came from behind to top the field and capture her first provincial Championship with a three-day 222, +3 total (73-75-74).

Heading into the day, Zhang sat three-strokes behind Annie Lee, 16 of Surrey, before mounting a seasaw comeback that saw six birdies, three bogeys and two double bogeys for a final round +1, 74 and four shot victory.

When asked of how it feels to be a Juvenile champion, Zhang was humble.

"I didn't think I even had a chance to win coming into the event so to pull it off feels amazing."

At 16, Zhang wins the Juvenile Championship in her last year of eligibility, something she is very pleased with.

"To be able to call myself a provincial champion is special. I now feel that going into other tournaments, I can place in the top-5. This is going to give me great confidence for next year."

Rounding out the top-3 were course-record holder and second round leader Annie Lee at +7 (75-70-81-226) and Victoria's Naomi Ko at +13 (80-74-78-232).

Both champions had great things to say about the Championship and Princeton GC, especially Zhang.

"This course was playing very difficult all week and British Columbia Golf did an amazing job at hosting this tournament. It was a lot of fun."

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Potato Lasagna

(NC)-Tastes like the Italian-style favourite, except that instead of pasta this version uses sliced Ontario Yukon Gold potatoes. A satisfying meal that's quick and easy for kids and parents to prepare.

Adult peels and slices potatoes. Older kids can par-cook potatoes in microwave and cook ground beef. All kids can layer ingredients in baking dish.

- 1 lb. (500 g) lean ground beef
- · 1 tsp (5 mL) dried oregano
- 1/2 tsp (3 mL) chopped garlic (pre-chopped from jar or chopped by adult)
 2 lb. (1 kg) Ontario Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) tomato sauce
- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) cottage cheese
- · 1 egg
- · 1/3 cup (75 mL) grated Parmesan or Romano cheese (optional) · 1 cup (4 oz. /100 g) grated Cheddar and mozzarella cheeses

Preheat oven to 400 F (200 C).

In fry pan, cook ground beef on medium heat, breaking up pieces with back of wooden spoon or spatula. Stir in oregano and garlic. Remove from heat. Set aside.

Place sliced potatoes in bottom of 2.5-quart (2.35 L) baking dish. Cover with plastic wrap. Heat on high 8 minutes or until potatoes in middle of dish are tender when pierced with a fork. Use oven mitts when removing cover. Be careful, steam from bowl is hot.

Sprinkle flour on top of potatoes. In a bowl, mix cooked ground beef mixture with tomato sauce and spread over top. In bowl, mix cottage cheese, egg and Parmesan cheese. Spread over tomato sauce layer. Sprinkle grated Cheddar cheeses over cottage cheese layer.

Bake uncovered 25 to 30 minutes, until cheese is lightly browned and sauce is bubbling at edges. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Makes 8 to 10 servings.



as numerous wineries and fruit stands.

SVPS Chair and Keremeos Mayor Manfred Bauer says, "The Similkameen Valley Planning Society is pleased to have this opportunity to work together with Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association. This pilot project will put us at the forefront of tourism development and is further evidence of the benefits of pulling all our resources together for a common goal."

Joan McMurray, Chair of the SVPS Tourism Advisory Council (TAC), adds, "TAC is excited to move forward with our Tourism Strategy for the Similkameen. We are doubly pleased that our key initiatives will be the basis for a pilot project for TOTA's new Regional Tourism Strategy. The Council's focus on behalf of our 90 stakeholders is to showcase the unique features and flavours of the Similkameen as a vibrant destination within the region." TOTA President & CEO Glenn Mandziuk notes that the project is a major step forward both for Similkameen Valley tourism and for implementation of the new 10-year Regional Tourism Strategy throughout the Thompson Okanagan.

"We are excited that in this project TOTA and SVPS will apply the new Regional Tourism Strategy - which includes the Canadian Tourism Commission's world-class researchbased 'Explorer Quotient' (EQ) marketing principles - and will integrate it into the Similkameen Valley's tourism materials," Mandziuk says.

Carlysle-Smith, the senior TOTA staff member who will lead the project team, says, "Using this project as a case study, TOTA will develop many resource materials which it will make available through its website to all tourism organizations in the region. This will help them to incorporate the Regional Strategy and EQ into their tourism planning, branding and marketing."

The Similkameen Valley has a diverse geography ranging from arid valleys to snow-capped mountains. Its landscape supports a vibrant outdoor recreation and nature-based tourism sector. The Valley is equally rich in First Nations heritage as well history. The warm, sunny climate makes the lower part of the Valley one of the finest fruit, vegetable and wine growing areas in North America, with a high concentration of organic farms.

The Similkameen's Tourism Action Plan, adopted in June, is the first such plan to be developed for all local and regional governments and First Nations in a sub-region in the Thompson Okanagan. It lays out a two-year plan for developing a tourism brand and identity for the entire Similkameen Valley, along with a tourism website and image bank.

Its aim is to promote better strategic development and marketing of tourism and the many destinations throughout the Valley, attract more visitors, encourage them to stop and see the beautiful area and its local attractions, and generally grow the tourism industry and the Valley's economy.

SVPS is a non-profit organization composed of the municipalities of Keremeos and Princeton, Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen Electoral Areas 'B', 'G', and 'H', and the Lower Similkameen and Upper Similkameen Indian Bands.

TOTA set the detailed requirements for the project, as a start to development of best practices. Work on the six-month project is set to begin immediately focusing on development of an inventory of tourismrelated destinations and activities in the Similkameen Valley, a creative new brand for tourism in the area, new photography for an image bank displaying Similkameen tourism attractions and activities, development of website design and content, a proposed online Business Directory, and other supporting materials including planning for a new Visitor Guide for the Valley. The new tourism brand and website are scheduled to be launched by next March. The project implementation team includes:

· Simone Carlysle-Smith who has extensive experience in tourism with more than 30 community tourism projects including tourism planning and marketing specializing in branding and implementation of marketing plans, she has taught community



tourism plans for Tourism British Columbia, and currently works as TOTA's Community Development Specialist. Her passion is working directly with community stakeholders to implement tourism plans and providing mentorship to those in tourism management. Carlysle-Smith is also leading the Resource Centre project for TOTA.




