


Posse host 'showcase' event

Seniors raise \$1,500+ for \$0\$/\$0HC

"I was absolutely blown away," was how Save Our Similkameen (SOS) Chair Solana Allison described her response to the final tally in cash donations collected from the fundraising event held August 29th at the Branch #30 Seniors Drop-In Centre.

The event, promoted as an opportunity to provide financial support for the volunteers working on the 24/7 ER Campaign, included live entertainment, a silent auction, raffles, door prizes, goodies and some down home fellowship.

"The seniors have been an important driving force throughout all this," Allison told the News Leader.

In addition to the fundraising event, local seniors have provided the SOS/SOHC (Save Our Hospital Coalition) office on Vermilion Avenue with volunteers, coffee, cookies and snacks.

The over \$1,500.00 raised last week serves a greater purpose

according to Allison.

"It gives us two months of uninterrupted run time."

While the storefront location has been provided rent free, there are other costs associated in running the office, which includes utilities, phone, postage and photocopying. Allison says they go through 700 sheets of photocopies in an average four-day stretch.

"The seniors' assistance takes a tremendous weight off our back."

SOS will be sending our a Healthcare Survey to all residents in Princeton and Area H this week.

The survey contains a total of 14 questions related to the delivery of healthcare services in the region. Data collected from completed surveys will assist the group with their efforts in protecting health services in the area.

Completed surveys can be returned to the post office, no postage required.

If you have seen Michael Prentice or know of his whereabouts you are requested to contact your local RCMP Detachment or call Keremeos RCMP at 250.499.5511.

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

Shop Local and Shape the Economy

All Canadians want a thriving economy, but we'll never have one if we don't all share the responsibility for achieving it.

Every one of us, consumers and business owners alike, makes choices every day that impact the strength of our economy, now and in the future. Until we acknowledge that each choice we make, however small, has a consequence, we won't see the kind of prosperity we seek in our communities. Making a commitment to shopping local whenever possible is a great place to start.

When it comes to shopping local, many challenges and barriers exist for both consumers and business owner/operators—the problems are on both sides of the cash register. Economic leakage is happening more every day across the country as a result of online shopping, crossborder shopping or visiting distant locales.

So what does it mean to shop local? Shopping local can stretch past the limits of our corner grocery store. It may be showing our economic support for the community 20 minutes down the road or looking at broader regional initiatives. What's good for the community next door is good for the communities that we live in, too.

Here's just one example of how where we spend our money can shape our future: one locally spent dollar can turn over in the community about six times. In the sixturnover scenario, the benefit is that the equivalent of about \$1.65 for every dollar spent remains in the community, providing a sustainable economic climate for local business. Consider what our communities will look like if those dollars are regularly spent outside of the local economy. Making informed purchasing choices in the long term is one way we can all contribute to maintaining and developing thriving local economies.

Local store owners have tough decisions to make about how they can best give back to the community. Businesses are often asked to support and assist in fundraising efforts for youth sports, community events and charitable organizations. Pragmatism dictates that the consumers who support their local businesses will be the ones rewarded with commercial support.

Small businesses also struggle to be competitive when faced with competition from corporate purchasing power. Pricing structures are passed on to the consumer not because of a business mark-up, per se, but as a reflection of wholesale cost. (Mark-ups are quite comparable in Canada and the U.S., by the way)

Consumers may struggle to support small business when they feel that the customer service is poor or the selections are inadequate. As consumers, it's important for us to play a role in effectively communicating our concerns and needs to the business we frequent. Commerce is anything but a one-way street, and it's up to business owners to ensure that those needs and concerns are heard and, wherever possible, addressed.

Taking ownership of the impact of our purchasing choices and servicerelated decisions will help to shape what our local communities will look like in the future. Many local chambers of commerce are actively involved in shop local campaigns, as are labour unions, advocating for their business members through building positive community awareness. With that awareness, commerce and consumer can be brought together in a way that ensures our communities' economic potential moves from dream to reality in the years to come.

Let's all work together to support the economic vibrancy of the places we live in

The amazing race

fter a lifetime of competing in middle distance events and duathlons, American Matthew Russell learned how to swim properly in 2010 so he could add triathlon to his athletic resume.

Less than two years later he can call himself an Ironman champion, the extreme distance sport which combines swimming, cycling and running.

Russell, a 30-year-old from Scottsdale, Arizona and former occupational therapist, won the 30th running of Subaru Ironman Canada, finishing in 8:48.30, nearly six minutes ahead of his nearest rival.

"This race started in 1983 and that was the year I was born," he said. "This is the oldest Ironman event in North America and one day I hope to have children and I'll bring them back here to Penticton and show them the flower garden over there where every Ironman winner, both male and female, have their name, time and country written down. It's ingrained in history forever."

Russell left the water at one hour, two minutes and played catch-up for the remainder of the race, finally taking the lead for good at the 14 mile mark of the marathon run passing hometown favourite Olly Piggin, who settled for second.

"I was probably 12 minutes back of the leader after getting out of the water but I kept plugging away. The mental aspect of this sport is so challenging because it's tough to be playing catch-up all day."

Russell attended a small high school in New York state, graduating in a class with only 40 students. He played basketball, soccer and baseball — the only sports offered — but later switched to cross-country running and the steeplechase when he attended the University of New Hampshire earning top honours in steeplechase for the New England states. From there he explored duathlons winning several national championships in the running and biking event.

Like Ironman, steeplechase athletes are often stereotyped as being eccentric, but Russell doesn't mind.

"You're gonna have to be a bit crazy to be doing this for sure. I enjoy the challenge but more importantly it's the relationships and the people you meet along the way that makes this journey special."

He described the feeling of winning as, "blessed, thankful, ecstatic and speechless those words all sum up how I feel right now."

Sunday was his second trip to Penticton finishing seventh in 2011 in a race hindered by a flat tire on the bike course. Even with Ironman being replaced by Challenge Penticton (a different distance triathlon organization) for 2013, Russell said he'd like to return to defend his ti-

"I'd love to," he said. "It's a great place to train and race and it's still going to be a great race and on the same weekend. The climate here is great and the atmosphere is wonderful because the whole town seems to get in to it and that's what makes it special."

Flanked at the finish line by his proud girlfriend Gillian, he was uncertain about what he would do to celebrate but promised to return to the finish line by 10 p.m. to cheer on the last group of athletes striving to obtain an official time before the course closed down at mid-

While the racing weather was great, the sport itself had a dark cloud cast over it with the news that Lance Armstrong would have his Tour de France titles taken away due to doping allegations. When asked his thoughts about the controversy, Russell didn't pull any punches.

"He did a lot for cycling and for triathlon but the testing shows he was positive and we don't need that in our sport. It is what it is and that's now in the past but maybe it will be a wake-up call to everyone to play fair and not cheat."

Piggin finished second in 8:54.17 and German Christian Brader third at 8:58.59. Denver's Kendra Lee was the top woman in 9:44.58 and Vancouver's Gillian Clayton the top professional woman in 9:46.07.



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Possible outcome of gum infection

dvanced periodontal (gum) infection can leave a patient facing the loss of one or multiple teeth and, sadly, this invasive disease can develop without you realizing it's happening.

Periodontal disease affects one or more of the periodontal tissues: the alveolar bone, periodontal ligament, cementum or gingiva. While many different diseases affect the tooth-supporting structures, plaque-induced inflammatory lesions make up the vast majority of periodontal diseases.

This is generally divided into two categories - gingivitis or periodontitis.

When gingivitis is not treated, it can advance to "periodontitis" (which means "inflammation around the tooth.") Gums pull away from the teeth and form spaces (called "pockets") that become infected.

The body's immune system fights the bacteria as the plaque spreads and grows below the gum line. Bacterial toxins and the body's natural response to infection start to break down the bone and connective tissue that hold teeth in place. If not treated, the bones, gums, and tissue that support the teeth are destroyed.

The teeth may eventually become loose and have to be removed. The damage periodontal disease causes to the gums cannot be reversed, however, the infection and deep pockets it causes can be controlled and we can help stop advancement of the disease. As explained in my recent articles, once pe-

riodontal disease is diagnosed, dentists primarily aim to control the infection.

This may include deep and thorough cleaning, often one quadrant at a time. This may be performed by a hygienist at your general dentist, or by a periodontist a gum specialist. Various medications such as prescription mouth rinses, antiseptic chips, antibiotic gels or capsules are also likely to be utilized.

When periodontal disease has progressed to advanced stages, or when inflammation and deep pockets remain following deep cleaning and medications, surgical treatment may be recommended.

A dentist or periodontist may perform "flap" surgery to remove tartar deposits in deep pockets and/or reduce the periodontal pocket to make it easier for the patient, dentist, and hygienist to keep the area clean.

This common surgery involves lifting back the gums and removing the tartar. The gums are then sutured back in place so that the tissue fits snugly around the tooth again. After surgery the gums will heal and fit more tightly around the tooth. This sometimes results in the teeth appearing longer.

In addition to flap surgery, your dentist or periodontist may suggest procedures to help regenerate any bone or gum tissue lost to periodontitis. Bone grafting, in which natural or synthetic bone is placed in the area of bone loss, can help promote bone growth.

A technique that can be used with bone grafting is called guided tissue regeneration. In this procedure, a small piece of mesh-like material is inserted between the bone and

gum tissue. This keeps the gum tissue from growing into the area where the bone should be, allowing the bone and connective tissue to regrow.

Growth factors - proteins that can help your body naturally regrow bone - may also be used. In cases where gum tissue has been lost, your dentist or periodontist may suggest a soft tissue graft, in which synthetic material or tissue taken from another area of your mouth is used to cover exposed tooth roots.

Since each case is different, it is not possible to predict with certainty which grafts will be successful over the long-term.

Treatment results depend on factors such as how far the disease has progressed, how well the patient keeps up with oral care at home, andrisk factors such as smoking, which may lower the chances of success.

Ask your dentist or periodontist what the level of success might be in your particular

Warning signs such persistent bad breath, red, swollen or tender gums, sensitive teeth, pain on chewing or receding gums may be attributed to other dental or health concerns and may be overlooked by the patient.

However, the sooner periodontal disease is diagnosed, the higher chances are of stopping its advancement - another good reason to see you dentist regularly.

BC-SPCA looking for good homes for adult cats at shelter

Tracey Westmoreland, manager for the South Okanagan Similkameen branch of the BC-SPCA in Penticton said the shelter has about 130 cats and kittens at the shelter.

"We find that during kitten season which lasts all spring and summer everyone who visits the shelter are looking for kittens and the adults cats are essentially ignored during that time. We have probably 50-plus adult cats looking for homes."

Westmoreland said some of those cats have been living at the shelter for more than a year. She noted that in many cases mature cats are easier to be integrated into a family and won't be prone to getting into mischief as most kittens

"We're taking calls everyday from people wanting to surrender adult cats but we're barely able to cope with the number of stray adults coming in so we have a very long waiting list," said Westmoreland.

Lorie Chortyk, general manager of community relations for the BC SPCA, said it takes in more than 17,000 homeless cats and kittens each year and summer is the peak season where shelters are filled to capacity.

Chortyk said people who adopt cats from the SPCA are getting exceptional value, even without a special promotion.

"Our average cost to care for a cat during its stay is \$784, which includes vaccinations, spaying or neutering, an identification tattoo, preventative treatment for internal and external parasites, any medical care or rehabilitation required, daily welfare monitoring, sheltering and feeding."

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


























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Penticton up for a Challenge

From this moment on, should the words Penticton and Ironman be used in the same sentence it will be a Freudian slip.

The City of Penticton officially parted ways with Subaru Ironman Canada following the announcement that they've signed a significant contract with Challenge Family, a distance triathlon organization based in Germany.

It was announced days prior to Ironman Canada that Challenge Penticton will take place Aug. 25, 2013. Challenge Family is a series of 12 long-distance triathlons held world-wide which includes Germany, New Zealand and Spain. This will be the first event of its kind in North

"Triathlon is what we do in Penticton and we are a prime destination," said Penticton Mayor Dan Ashton, who also serves as chair of the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen.

"It's not because we have a one-loop course, gorgeous lakes and a wine route. Triathlon is successful here because of the local people."

The City previously had a contract with operator Graham Fraser which ends after Sunday. The race known as Ironman Canada reverted into the hands of the World Triathlon Corporation which has events that include the legendary Hawaii Ironman World Championships in Kona.

The 30th annual Subaru Ironman Canada race, scheduled for Sunday at 7 a.m., will be the final event in Penticton with the name Ironman attached to it. The race started from modest roots in 1983 with a field of 23 competitors and grew exponentially to the 3,000 athletes that took part in recent years.

Ashton said that while he's always been satisfied with what Ironman Canada delivered, switching to Challenge Family "is a much better opportunity for the citizens of Penticton."

Depending on the study it's estimated that over \$10 million was generated into the local economy on the week of Ironman Canada.

Race director Felix Walchshofer said Challenge Penticton will offer a more affordable entry fee to the athlete (\$675, tax included) plus a more substantial prize board for the professional athletes with a total purse of \$61,500.

He said creative ideas such as a relay where a team of three may enter with a different athlete each doing a leg of the triathlon will be offered with staggered starting times.

There are also planned improvements to the course itself.

Walchshofer, a former distance triathlete, said athletes don't need to fear a completely different look, but it's his goal to make as many improvements as possible.

"We will be doing a lot of detail work on all of the small things from the (participant's) bag to the medals to the finisher shirts. Athletes, this is your event and we want to hear from you."

He's hoping to attract 3,000 individual racers to next year's race in Penticton plus an additional 500 three-person teams. Challenge Family's event in Roth, Germany is now capped every year at 5,600 participants.

Ashton said the week prior to the race will also be known as Triathlon Week with special events throughout the week similar to what was done in the early years of Ironman in Penticton.

Canadian Peter Reid, a two-time champion in Penticton who is now an airline pilot, was introduced as the race's official ambassador. Reid said

the new company will focus on making the event "all about the athlete" and that he welcomes suggestions on ways an event in Penticton can be im-

"We want this to be the best event in North America. We have the best course, the greatest volunteers and I'm very excited about what's about to happen in Penticton," said Reid, who staged an epic battle with Thomas Hellriegel in 1996 when both athletes broke the Ironman Canada course record.

Ashton said he and city council were in an exhaustive series of meetings this week with Challenge Family. He did not divulge the terms of the contract only to state that it's a far better deal which involves a true partnership and that it will be for a "significant" number of years.

"It was very stressful at times but we are all on the same page," said Walchshofer of the latenight negotiations.

Tim Chesnutt, race director for the Subaru Epic Dartmouth, was in Penticton for the 30th Subaru Ironman Canada on Aug. 26. His wife, Stacy was among 22 Ironman competitors from Nova Scotia.

The Epic Dartmouth, the first Iron-distance triathlon in Atlantic Canada, made its debut on

Chessnutt said when he learned of Penticton's decision to become the first North American community to host a Challenge race in 2013, he was

"It's a brilliant, ballsy, courageous (move) and ultimately, I think, it has the potential to be one of the best things that's happened to long distance triathlons in North America," he said.

Chessnutt noted Ironman is a brand owned by the World Triathlon Corp., which is owned by Providence Equity Partners, a venture capital company. There are now dozens of Ironman and half-Ironman (70.3) races held around the world, including the new Mont Tremblant Ironman in Quebec.

"I think it has been run more by the numbers and less by the heart," he said. "I think what Penticton has managed to retain is the heart."

Chessnutt said the community is what made Ironman Canada so special.

"It's the people here in Penticton, it's the effort, it's the history, it's everything that goes into it from this community," he said. "It's the geography, the course - that's what makes Penticton special."

"Whether it's a Challenge race, an Ironman ra or an ABC race, it will still be one of the pinnacles of long-distance triathlon in North America."

Chesnutt said it makes little difference who

"Ironman is like Kleenex. It's just a trade name - it's not what the product is," he said. "It's a tissue and when you blow your nose, it works just as well whichever one you use."

However, brand recognition still remains a huge factor for many competitors. Some even get the Ironman logo tattooed on their body.

Rory Bass of Kelowna was among several hundred triathletes waiting in line Monday to buy Ironman merchandise at Okanagan Lake Park, after completing his 10th Ironman Canada.

He said although the Ironman brand is not a critical factor for him, it is for others.

"Some people, especially those who have done many or any, I could understand that they want to do an 'Ironman' specifically," he said. "I've got the tattoos, so I know the mentality.'

However, Bass said living in Kelowna, the Penticton race is so convenient and accessible. He might enter the inaugural Challenge race next year, but has yet to decide.

Sylvia Mackay, who grew up in Osoyoos and now lives in Edmonton, said she had wanted to enter Ironman Canada for several years and competed in her first last month.

"I'm happy I was able to complete it under the Ironman brand," she said. "But going forward, it's the location. I'm from here, I know the route and all of that. I'd come back regardless after this."

Officials from the World Triathlon Corp., based in Tampa, Florida have been unavailable for comment this week as Hurricane Isaac continues to threaten the Gulf Coast.

The WTC says it plans to announce a new location for Ironman Canada prior to the Ironman World Championship in Hawaii on Oct. 13.

RDOS satisfied with salvaging concerns

The Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen says it's satisfied with measures taken to resolve concerns over metal "salvaging" at the Campbell Mountain landfill.

Questions arose earlier this year, after allegations arose than an employee of landfill operator SSG Holdings had been taking copper from the Penticton landfill's metal recycling area in 2010 and selling it for personal profit.

Although the regional district contacted the RCMP about the complaint earlier this year, no charges have been laid.

In response to recent renewed media coverage of the allegations, the regional district issued a news release this week.

RDOS administrator Bill Newell said it has been determined that this was an isolated incident and did not involve any material stockpiled in the recycling area.

"We thought initially it was a theft. But it turned out that it was one fellow who works for SSG, two years ago picked some material up off the face of the landfill. Instead of putting it on the recycling pile, he put it in his truck," he said in an interview.

"It's just material that would have been landfilled if this character hadn't picked it up."

Newell said when it became aware of the situation in 2011, the RDOS advised the contractor to follow the nosalvaging policy included in the operating contract.

In addition to advising the RCMP, the RDOS conducted its own investigation. Newell said he feels the situation was taken somewhat out of context.

"It was one incident two years ago and there hasn't been any egregious action since then, so this matter is over for us," he said.

The employee involved continues to work for SSG. The company has operated the Campbell Mountain landfill for the past 18 years.

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John Slater surprised by Falcon's decision

Boundary-Similkameen MLA John Slater admits he was caught off-guard by Finance Minister Kevin Falcon's decision to step down from cabinet and not run in the next provincial election.

Still, Slater said he fully intends to seek a second term in office in the May 2013 vote. A B.C. Liberal nomination meeting in his riding will be held this fall.

Although Falcon said he will complete his term as MLA for Surrey-Cloverdale, his resignation as finance minister and deputy premier is seen as a blow to Premier Christy Clark.

Slater declined to comment on the leadership situation, but said lie can understand Falcon's desire to spend more time with his family.

Veteran Penticton MLA Bill Barisoff recently announced he will not be seeking re-election next spring, after 16 years in office, including the last seven as House Speaker.

Education Minister George Abbott, who Slater supported in last year's B.C. Liberal leadership race, is expected to soon announce his plans for the future as well.

"The cabinet ministers that are resigning have been in government for a long time. They certainly have contributed to the province and we're all better off for it," Slater said.

"I'm a little concerned with some of the guys that aren't going to be there," Slater said. "We've got until May 14, basically, to get everybody back on board and make sure we have a right-wing government."

Slater said the Liberals have to ensure their economic plan for the province is in place.

"We need to make sure that we keep our fiscal policies moving forward. We don't want to start giving away the province and spending more than we have," he said.

Marji Basso, the NDP candidate in Boundary-Similkameen, said although she has been watching the Liberals' situation with interest, she is concentrating on her own campaign.

"My primary goal is to focus on the communities of the Boundary-Similkameen, discuss concerns and viable alternatives to ensure that rural communities are represented at the provincial level," Basso said.

"I find it intriguing, but it really doesn't change the way that I'm going to continue with my campaign and the way the NDP are going to continue with theirs as well. It's a non-factor."

Both the Liberals and the NDP have yet to choose their candidates in the Penticton riding.

Former Okanagan Skaha school board chair Connie Denesiuk and Summerland businessman Mark Ziebarth are the only two declared Liberal candidates to date. A nomination meeting is tentatively scheduled for late October.

Former Summerland council member David Finnis and well-known naturalist Dick Cannings have indicated their candidacy for the NDP nomination, to be determined on Nov. 18.



What If There's A Depression?

There are numerous financial gurus saying the industrial world is on the verge of another Great Depression, that era of the 1930's, often called the Dirty Thirties. On one program, people who had lived through the Great Depression, people who are really old now, were interviewed about what people could do to survive.

There is nothing like living through something to know what it is like. Experience is the best teacher if you can learn from it. One of the lessons these oldsters had learned was that people who lived in rural areas were better off that people living in cities.

I never lived through a Great Depression. It was over by the time I was born. However, during my years of growing up, my parents and their friends often spoke of how they survived during those years. One thing all of them had in their favour was a strong work ethic. They did whatever job there was available, and did not turn up their noses if the job was not of the status they had done before or did not use the skills they had been trained for. It was work for pay, and they did it and were grateful to have a job.

My father had a bad few years. He had come to Princeton in the good times, working in the mines as a steam engineer. By the time the Depression hit, he was a single parent with three children to raise. Whenever the mines were working, he was working, but there were long periods when the mines shut down. During those periods, my father did any kind of job. He never went on "relief" as welfare work was called because a person doing a relief job and being paid by the government was denied the right to vote. My father would not give up his voting rights for any-

The family rented a house on Halliford Avenue. The entire back yard was garden, which was true for nearly every back yard in town. My elder brother told me stories of going out to hunt for deer and grouse to extend the family budget, and there was nothing unusual about that. What was different from today is that they walked. My father could not afford a vehicle. Even many people who had had a vehicle could not afford the gas or repairs, so they walked, too. When the Copper Mountain mine opened up and my father got a job in the Allenby power plant in 1937, he walked from Princeton to Allenby and back for every shift, regardless of weather.

My father and brother walked for miles hoping to bag a deer or a few grouse. People in those days would have been delighted to have the deer walking right into town!

My mother lived in the city, attending secretarial school, and graduated just in time to learn there were no jobs for people with her skills. To support herself, she went to work as a part time kitchen helper/servant for a rich family. The woman she worked for did not allow any leftover food to be served in her house. This proved to be a boon for my mother and her sister, with whom she lived. My mother would take the leftovers home with her to supplement the family food supply. Her sister had a huge garden and two apple trees, raspberry bushes, and about a dozen chickens. My aunt went fishing in the Fraser River, so they had salmon, so they managed, even though my aunt had two children and no husband.

My mother became very ill and my aunt remarried, so my mother moved back to Princeton to live with her father. Her father had a farm, and they lived well on what they produced.

When my parents married, conditions in my father's house improved considerably, as my grandfather brought chickens, eggs, milk, cream and butter. During the good months, everybody pitched in on the farm and

reaped the benefits of the big garden and the potato field. The produce was stored in two big root cellars on the farm, and during the winter my grandfather would bring potatoes, turnips, cabbages, carrots, squash and onions. In the summer, my mother canned everything that would not keep, such as corn, tomatoes, beans and

My family considered themselves fortunate.

Often, my grandfather had a hired hand working for him. He did not pay much in wages, but he did provide room and board, and many additional men who stopped by to see if there was a job received a meal and a hayloft to sleep in, and a chance to take a bath and wash their clothes. Many country people offered little more than that to the many men walking through the rural areas seeking any kind of work. Although they might not find a job, they were grateful for the chance to have a meal or two and a safe place to sleep under a roof.

Today, things would be much different. We rely on gas and electricity to heat our homes and cook our food. We rely on a grocery store to provide our food. On the farm, and in town, most people had coal and wood stoves, and wood around here is free if you are willing to go out in the woods and pick it up. I heard stories of people who could not afford coal, and walked along the railroad track with a sack to gather lumps of coal that spilled over the coal cars. I heard stories of people walking to known exposed coal seams to dig out the coal and carry it home in a sack.

What would people do today, especially if they lived in a city? What happens when a family cannot afford to pay for heat and electricity, or for water and sewer services? What happens when there is no money for food and rent?

We take a lot for granted in our way of life, but most of us live on the edge, with nothing to fall back on. Worse still, millions of us are in debt. Few of our younger folk have the skills to make a garden, go hunting, fishing, or can food when it is plentiful and cheap. In my own neighbourhood, I see apple trees loaded with apples that will probably go to waste. Perhaps it is time for younger folk to listen to some of the older people and learn some of the skills?




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If all of that weren't enough reason

to lace up your walking shoes, setting goals and creating a sense of achievement is a great way to motivate yourself to exercise more.

Adding steps to your day comes down to a change in your behavior and being aware of your actions, explains Dr. Shannon Bredin, a behavior specialist and assistant professor in the University of British Columbia's School of Kinesiology.

According to Dr. Bredin, tracking is

an effective form of self-monitoring that can help motivate a person. Tracking can measure and help regulate your behavior. But it isn't easy to accurately quantify your physical activity.

Great little tools are also available to help track your activity. For example, there's a new and affordable device from a Canadian company that's a digital pedometer, and much more. Take a look at www.tractivityonline.com to see how it works. Tractivity is lightweight and easy to use. A digital sensor conveniently attaches to your shoe or inside special insoles and records your steps. The Tractivity software securely stores your activity information, including your goals and walking history. It illustrates your progress by showing a record of your steps, distance travelled, time active, and the calories burned in a fun and motivational manner. It also presents you with virtual awards as you reach milestones.

Tracking how many steps you take each day may surprise you. This includes your walk from the bus to work, the walk to the corner store, taking the stairs, gardening, and even a few trips to the office water cooler. Be aware however, that many people don't have a good understanding of whether or not they get enough physical activity every day.

A common mistake, experts say, is using the scale to measure the progress of a fitness regime. Dr. Bredin advises that you would get more accurate information by measuring your level of physical activity - like the steps you take in a day than you would from a number on the scale.

Tracking your activity is like signing a contract with yourself, she explains.

It objectively measures your exercise and increases your understanding and perception of what you are doing.

"Tracking is one tool that allows you to be accountable to your goal."

Dr. Bredin says it's also critical to set the right goals and measure the right

"You don't want your goals to be too easy so that there is no satisfaction in fulfilling them, but you also can't make them so difficult that they frustrate you. The secret to setting goals is to strike a balance between achievability and creating a real challenge

Enjoy Summer's Sweet Spice

Living Past 100

Among the many good foods North America has given to the world is the plant family known as the capsicum plants, which we call peppers. Christopher Columbus wrote about the hot, spicy variety in describing what the new world people ate. He described how they added a 'sharp' taste to fish and bird dishes and added a hot spice to meat to help them stay warm in win-

The bite or sizzle of pepper comes from a substance called capsaicin. People who love to eat hot peppers are enjoying a rare pleasure: when capsaicin hits the tongue, it triggers the brain to release a lot of endorphins, natural painkillers that promote a sense of well-being. You might say chili pepper lovers are addicted to the substance because it makes them feel good with no side effects and no hangover. For a really great feeling, try a few ounces of chocolate spiced with chili peppers!

Cayenne pepper is an old remedy for rheumatoid arthritis. Initially, the pain of the condition will increase briefly after taking the pepper, but it will decrease a lot a little later. Substances in the cayenne block pain signals to the brain. Homeopathic physicians recommend taking two capsules of cayenne three to four times a day with milk or apple juice.

Cayenne and other hot peppers help balance blood sugar. Three capsules a day will bring down blood sugar. If you have low blood sugar, stay away from peppers.

One of the foods popular in Mexico is chili con carne. Mexicans tend to have healthy circulation, and part of the reason is the chili pepper. If you want a quicker more measured use of pepper to reduce cholesterol, take a couple of capsules of cayenne with any greasy foods.

Cayenne pepper powder is a good home remedy to stop bleeding. There is a stranger fact about hot peppers: while they will make a wound stop bleeding through clotting, when you eat them, they prevent blood clots in the cir-

You have heard of the benefits of chicken soup for colds and flu. What you may not know is that the best chicken soup for curing colds and flu contain garlic and cayenne. To really make it work well, take a Vitamin C tablet with the soup, because cayenne boosts the healing power of Vitamin C.

Hot peppers stimulate your body to give you more energy. If you are feeling really drowsy when you should not be drowsy, take a cup of coffee, no cream, and sprinkle liberally with chili pepper. You will be wide awake in a few minutes after drinking a cup of this eye-opener! In fact, many of the expensive energy drinks contain cayenne or paprika. You can make your own drink for a lot less and get the energy you need.

This is the season for peppers, and you can get some real bargains at fruit and vegetable stands. Peppers freeze well. Just chop them into bite-size pieces, lay them on a cookie sheet, put them in the freezer, and when they are frozen, put them in a plastic bag, seal the bag, and put it back in the freezer. Dip into the bag when you want a little more heat in a stew or soup!

Tex-Mex Potato Coins

(NC)—Crunchy on the outside, tender inside, this snack has just a hint of the Tex-Mex spice that kids love. For added pizzazz, serve with tomato salsa, green onions, sour cream, even chili! A fun way to eat red or white potatoes.

- 1 1/2 lb. (750 g) Ontario white or red potatoes, unpeeled
- · 2 tbsp (30 mL) olive or vegetable oil
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) Tex-Mex spice*
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) sour cream
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) tomato salsa
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) chopped green onion (optional)
- 1 cup (250 mL) canned chili, heated (optional)

Available in supermarket spices section.

Preheat oven to 450 F (230 C). Line two baking sheets with parchment paper.

Cut potatoes into 1/4-inch (0.5 cm) thick rounds. For young kids, a parent should slice the potatoes. Either place slices in heavy plastic bag with oil and Tex-Mex spice, close bag and shake well to coat potato slices with spices, or mix potato slices in large bowl with oil and spice.

Spread potato slices on lined baking sheet. Bake in oven about 35 to 40 minutes or until slices are crisp-edged and browned. Turn baking sheet around if some coins begin to burn before others have browned. Transfer to serving platter.

Serve immediately with sour cream, salsa, green onion and chili, if using.





With a mostly sunny day and a high temperature outside in the mid-twenties, Princeton Posse started their 2012/13 KIJHL exhibition season August 31st in a chilly Princeton Arena against North Vancouver Wolf Pack of the PIJHL.

While pre-season games typically mean nothing in regular stats and are not much more than warm-up games for coaches still deciding on who to sign and who to cut from their team, Princeton fans did have reason to celebrate - a total of three local boys were on ice in the trademark burgundy road jerseys of the home team.

The trio, Lindsay MacLellan, Drayden Larsen and Kraig Leochko, saw a lot of ice time in the game.

Princeton scored first at 19:16 of the opening frame when Lincoln Lane took a pass on the stick side of Wolf Pack goalie Johan Peterson and sailed across the crease tapping the puck gently with a one-handed pat off the back of his stick. The puck moved in slow motion through a small hole between Peterson's legs.

The unassisted goal ended up a reoccurring theme as the Wolf Pack tied the game at 14:45 of the second (Jamie Creamore) and took the lead at 12:23 (Brandley Crompton) with two unassisted goals.

At 6:03 the Wolf Pack took a 3-1 lead with a goal scored by Taylor Tanti with assists going to Max Metzner and Bret Gough.

The first penalty of the game wasn't until 3:56 when North Van's Makoto Oliver went off for tripping and moments later Marcus Houck went off to serve a too many men on ice call giving Princeton a two-man advantage for 50-seconds but they couldn't capitalize on it.

With only 15-seconds left in the

period, the visitors added another goal (Evan Morris from Taylor Bowman and Mark Spong) to take a 4-1 lead. It was clear that the Wolf Pack came out stronger in the second, but the final period saw both sides of the rink spring into action with Princeton slowly eating away at the Wolf Pack lead.

Jaydon Gilding scored Princeton's second goal at 17:38 with assists going to local boys Kraig Leochko and Lindsay MacLellan.

Posse veteran Cole Weber (who was wearing the 'C' for the game) added another at 9:45 with assistance from Sam Ernst.

Then Princeton's Jaydon Gilding was penalized for a delay of game puck flip at 1:51 and the Wolf Pack finished the Posse off with a power play goal at 1:37 (Taylor Tanti from Keith Bendall).

Final score: North Vancouver Wolf Pack (PIJHL) 5, Princeton Posse (KIJHL) 3. Shots on goal: Wolf Pack 39, Posse 37.





Hugelbuilder Angelique Wood

Tuesday, August 21st seemed like the heat was finally "breaking", and the muggy air suggested a rainstorm was coming. We were lucky enough that the rain held off until our Hugelbuilding was finished for the day, so it watered in the layer of dry grass and garden trimmings which we were applying to the top and sides of the Hugelbeet.

The amazing thing about the piles of clippings and leaves which have sat waiting to be placed atop the Hugelbeet since May 2012 is that they have already begun to decay in place and become a rich humus layer. As we add this rich topping to the web and mesh of branches and twigs it sinks into the cracks and stabilizes. -We are also finding all sorts of plants which have survived being dumped into the sorting pile and are growing... we'll see how they do now that they are exposed. Found plants include irises, bergenia, convallaria, and sempervivums, so we are experimenting with letting them live, to see how well they can do under the hot conditions of the "beet".

The pile can be walked on, and the "springiness" which it first had while the branches were pliable is now much more solid - they are breaking down quickly in the summer heat. We have regularly added enough material to make the pile more than 8 feet tall, and yet by the next week's build we find the pile has sunk at least a foot. This is a good sign that the microbial activity is high and that things are breaking down.

The Hedley Volunteer Fire Department has watered the Hugelbeet two times in the last 10 days, which is great during this dry summer heat. We Hugelbuilders are very grateful that the Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department assisted in watering the "beet" on August 14th when they came to do a workshop to teach new members of the Hedley Volunteer Fire Department the technique of using a tanker, a water bladder and "drafting" a firetruck off the water in the bladder. More than 2,500 gallons of water deluged the hugelbeet that night.

The "drafting" technique is used

when there are no useful hydrant hook-ups close by to the fireground: while the pumper truck parks close to fire and lays out its attack lines, the tanker empties its contents into a giant rubberized and aluminumreinforced bowl. The stationery firetruck, with its hose lines all run to different places, acts as a giant manifold sucking the water which the tanker dumps into the bladder. After emptying its tank, the tanker drives to the hydrant and fills up, and continuously refills the giant bladder for the pumper to use in its lines.

This technique is really important to understand and use for dry areas like the Similkameen; and the town of Hedley has a number of locations, including the areas near the Gold Dust Pub and the houses near the transformer station, the Colonial Inn and old "Gold House" B&B, and the upper subdivision of the Upper Similkameen Indian Reserve, all of which are not serviced with enough water pressure to hook up our new fire truck to their water delivery lines without the possibility of cavitating them.
