Local crime continues to drop

RCMP Cpl. Kevin McCracken presented a report on the second quarter of 2012 at the September 4th regular meeting of Town Council.

While local police responded to 429 calls between April and June of this year, it showed a decrease of 12% over the same period in 2011.

Assaults, vehicle thefts, break and enter, disturbances and mischief were all down from 2011 with thefts from vehicles the only serious increase.

"The statistics keep going down and that is a great barometer to us of success," stated Mayor Frank Armitage.

Drug enforcement is considered a priority issue at Princeton Detachment and RCMP investigated a total of six drug offences in the second quarter of this year. Two males were arrested May 8th after they were spotted conducting a drug

deal just off of Princeton-Summerland Road. One was charged with trafficking and the other faces charges of possession. Both are scheduled for an upcoming court appearance.

Traffic safety is another local police priority and one driver was charged with impaired driving between April and June of this year. An additional three drivers were given 90-day immediate roadside prohibitions with one more given a 30-day IRP, three other drivers received 24-hour suspensions for drug use and another was given a 24-hour suspension for alcohol use.

Cpl. McCracken credited numerous initiatives of local RCMP members, including foot patrols, as well as assistance from Citizens on Patrol and local residents calling into the Detachment as all playing a part in

The annual Princeton fair was well attended, with many activities for youngsters. Local business people and the United Steel Workers are generous in their support in funding children's entertainment, for which the Fair Board is most grateful. A number of local businesses provided gate prizes and many of those who attended went home with a free gift. on an excellent three hour show in the rodeo arena on Saturday, and Sandy Dixon and her group of riders gave a great demonstration of horse jumping skills on Sunday.

There were 41 adults who exhibited all kinds of items, from vegetables to flowers to hobbies to poultry. They won a total of \$1,388.00, with Glow Lemon winning the title of Top Exhibitor for the second year.

The Junior Fair welcomed 44 young exhibitors who earned a total of \$940 in prize money. The Top Junior Exhibitor was Piper Manning, who has won that title before.

Glow Lemon earned the highest points in Vegetables and in Fruit. In Home Canning, Lori Jwaszko earned top points. Rose Flegel had the highest points in Home Baking. Glow Lemon was the top exhibitor in Eggs. Melissa Manning earned highest points in Flowers and Plants, although Grace Kukler won Best in Show for her roses. Grace Kukler earned Top Exhibitor in

Leisurecraft with some ingenious work. There were no entries in woodwork this year (are the guys not building things anymore?).

There were dozens of entries in Photography, and Margaret Fraser

What's your explorer quotient?

What do we have that would encourage a tourist to come to the Similkameen Valley?

That is the question the Similkameen Valley Planning Society Tourist Council and stakeholders tried to answer on September 5 at a 'branding' workshop held at Snas'ist Centre in Hedley.

One of the first things participants did was identify their personal 'explorer quotient'. Through answering a series of questions about their own interests when traveling, they found that most of them were either interested in cultural activities or wanted authentic experiences.

Apparently, this is a characteristic of Thompson-Okanagan Region, and it was the regional Tourist Association facilitating the workshop. In short,

the kind of people who live here are the kind of people the region will attract. This finding will influence tourism development in the future.

Using the 'explorer quotient' is a pilot project for Tourism Canada, and how it is used in the Similkameen Valley will influence how it is used in other regions. The goal is to build authenticity, expand personal horizons of visitors, and reveal local history and local food to visitors.

The next step in the workshop was to have groups work on what words and images portray the Similkameen Valley, and then the groups identified what is unique about each community in the valley, from Chopaka to Eastgate. For Princeton, the tunnel, the trails and the ochre bluffs came to

mind immediately, and for Coalmont it was the old hotel. For Chopaka, participants thought of the church and for Keremeos, K Mountain and the pepper festival. So it went all through the valley.

The facilitating team asked everyone to vote for their top priorities. The results of the vote will be analyzed by the team and will be presented at the next workshop, where photographs will be included, along with descriptions of locations and valley history. All of this is part of developing a tourism strategy for the Similkameen.

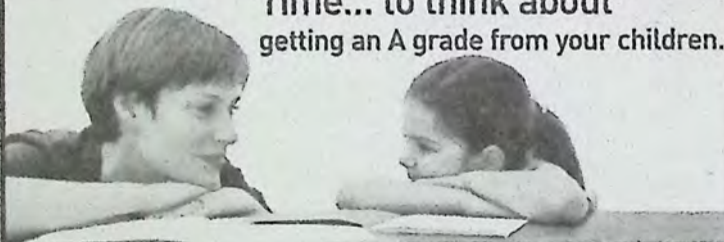

Flip Of The Coyne

When do you say "enough is enough" and throw in the towel? Premier Christy Clark has to be asking herself that right now. With MLAs and ministers jumping ship almost daily it must be feeling a little lonely at the top right now. In a way I feel sorry for Christy, I think she really thought that she had a chance at turning around the Liberal Party's fate and winning another election. Unfortunately for her the party was already a ship with a breeched hull.

Premier Clark isn't going to let on that she is shaken. She has appointed new ministers, giving some a promotion. You have to wonder what is going through the minds of the newly minted ministers. I think an old friend of mine phrased it the best when he tweeted, "Do Christy's new ministers feel like one of Darth Vader's new Admirals?" I know it is one job people aren't jumping up to volunteer for these days.

One thing is for sure with the exodus from Christy's ranks is that the momentum is picking up for the BC Conservatives. They are moving closer in some polls to the BC NDP, especially in the interior where the Liberals once held power. The BC Conservatives are a real dark horse in the next provincial election. They are gaining support from disgruntled Liberals, and those corporate backers who once kept Gordon

Campbell's political machine alive are starting to line up behind John Cummins and his Conservatives.

Don't think that all is just peachy within the ranks of the BC Conservatives. There are more and more calling for a leadership change.

According to a piece in the straight.com, an online news source from Vancouver, former Liberal leader Gordon Wilson is warning that if the corporate powers to be on Howe Street had it their way, Cummins would be gone and someone like Stockwell Day would be leading the new flagship of BC's conservative movement. This isn't sitting well with many within the party who have worked from the ground up to get the BC Conservatives where they are today, especially after Stockwell's support for Christy Clark. If Cummins can't get his own party members in line, the May election will most likely be his last and the BC Conservatives will just become the BC Liberals with a new name.

The one thing that has really gotten me is that everyone has already come to the conclusion that the NDP will form the next provincial government. May is a long way off and anything can happen between now and then. If the New Democrats really want to win the next election, they cannot allow themselves to fall into this trap.

When politicians and parties get too sure of their upcoming success, anything can happen. Adrian Dix will need to run a tight ship, keep his MLAs in check and candidates on message. With Liberal voters leaving and joining the Conservatives, it will split the conservative vote, but if enough of them do it they will win seats, and if they win enough and the Liberals win enough, I would not be surprised if there was a Conservative-Liberal coalition that would block a New Democrat government from ever forming. The New Democrats are doing well in the polls but they have been pretty quiet on some major issues, the main one being rural healthcare.

The party that will address rural healthcare will most likely win rural BC. The political leaders don't seem to grasp the reality of living in a rural community with limited health services. Services, all of them in rural BC, have been eroded so badly that they are almost no longer recognizable and the party that will address this with real solutions will have the support of Rural BC.

Town provides fire protection to RockRidge Canyon

Town Council approved a Fire Protection Agreement between Young Life of Canada (RockRidge Canyon) and the Town of Princeton at the September 4th meeting of Council.

The purpose of the three-year agreement was to extend fire protection services to the RockRidge facility within the RDOS Area H Fire Protection District, which was originally requested in February of this year.

The RDOS gave their consent to the Town of Princeton to enter into a fee for services contract with Young Life of Canada and the Municipal Insurance Association

has confirmed the Town's insurance coverage will apply to the provision of this extra-territorial service.

The fee for services contains two components: an annual fee of \$1,200.00 as well as an hourly response rate to calls. That rate will be determined from the current Office of the Fire Commissioner Reimbursement Rate Schedule.

The motion to approve the agreement with RockRidge Canyon was moved by Councillor Maynard and seconded by Councillor Earle. Documentation provided at the meeting did not indicate when the agreement would take effect.

The \$20,000 Question

Maybe you noticed a little ad in the past couple issues of this newspaper regarding a cash amount of \$20,000.

Then again, maybe you didn't.

Princeton Racing Days turned to the Town of Princeton to guarantee the amount needed as a float for the betting windows during the races. This is nothing new.

In fact, when I became President of Racing Days in 1990, one of my duties was to meet with Town Council and request they guarantee the float. At that time we had races on Saturday and Sunday and the float was considerably larger.

I recall being told at the time that it had always been done that way. I stepped down as President in 1998 and still to this day the Town of Princeton guarantees the betting float.

Councillor Marilyn Harkness who hinted at the September 4th Town Council meeting that this is a matter that has her a bit concerned and I share that feeling.

I would never suggest the Town 'pull the pin' and turn Racing Days down in the future simply because you have to admit the event has a huge appeal (even if not always supported by area residents) and is a big part of the tourism offerings from this area.

I'm just thinking there has to be another way of doing this without getting the Town of Princeton involved in a guarantee.

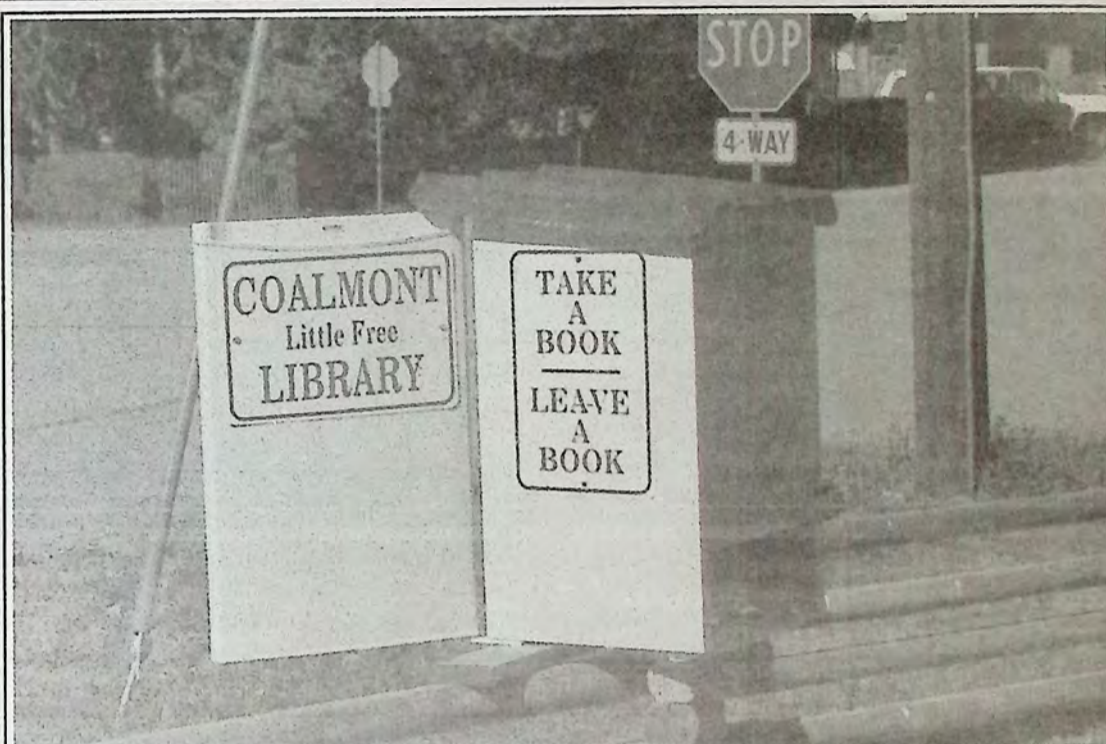
I've been on committees in Princeton where the Directors have had to back up loans or lines of credit themselves. It's a risky move, but it shows a major commitment or a different level of accountability.

Maybe the Town of Princeton and Racing Days need to sit down together and hammer out a different arrangement. I can tell you that in the years I was involved I doubt we had anything near \$20,000 in the bank so maybe that's where the focus should be.

Instead of the Town of Princeton providing a guarantee for the float, maybe they should be entering into a different kind of agreement with the user groups at Princeton Fairgrounds. A different arrangement that would see the property owners (the Town) spend more money on the repair and maintenance of the facility so the user groups can actually bank the profits they see after their events instead spending most of it on what I would consider 'landlord stuff.'

At least this way the possibility exists that in three or five years Racing Days would have enough money in the bank to cover the float and leave the Town of Princeton out of it.

Just a thought.

If you see a book you want to read, simply take it. When you are finished with it either return it to the Little Free Library or share it with someone else. Users are encouraged to give books and leave notes in them. Was the book an interesting read? Who passed it on to you? What did they say about the book?

The Little Free Library program supports reading for children, literacy for adults and libraries around the world and thanks to the Sternes, they have connected Coalmont to this worldwide library network.

Conservatives Need A Sanity Check-Up

Sometimes I am convinced our government is batty, that is, bats occupy the belfry, or to express it another way, Parliament is a few bricks short of a load. The most recent deal the Harper Conservatives are still working on is the Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement, better known as CETA. Many Canadians are very much opposed to CETA, for good reasons, but my reasoning is based on good business sense.

Conservatives are supposed to be business leaders, but they want us to do business with the European Union, a union of nations that are coming apart at the borders. People are rioting in Spain because they are losing their homes, one in four working people are unemployed, and the government is insisting on austerity measures. Sound familiar? That is a repetition of what happened in Greece, and people have been suffering terribly in that EU country. In short, the European Union is going broke, and the banks that serve them have admitted to falsely reporting the interest rates they pay for inter-bank loans. How many of us would do business with a trading partner who is obviously

going broke and whose banks cannot be trusted?

Most of us would step back from dealing with a trading partner whose financial situation had become chaotic, but not our current government. You would think they might have learned a few lessons after all the trouble we have gone through with NAFTA, but no, it is like they are addicted to trying to find bad deals.

There is nothing good for Canada about the proposed deal with the European Union. The most frightening part of the deal is the demand that European corporations have the opportunity to buy and run our public water services. Yes, if you think it means privatizing our household water, you are right. However, it does not work the other way. They will not let Canada move in and buy the rights to water services that supply drinking water. In short, the EU says 'we want to control your drinking water services but you can't control ours'. Will we still say yes to the deal? I hope not.

According to the Council of Canadians, an organization of private citizens who work hard to protect Canadians from government's plans which adversely affect Canadians, we need to tell our government loud and clear that we do not want the CETA deal.

The Council of Canadians (anybody can join) points out the impact the deal would have on many parts of our daily lives, in addition to owning the right to distribute our water.

The Council of Canadians says the deal would increase the cost of drugs. CETA will increase Canada's trade deficit. Under CETA, any EU corporation could bid on any government contract at any level of government. No municipality or province could

demand a bidder for a contract be from the municipality or province.

There are other implications in the deal, which does not protect Canadians in the areas of health care services. The Council of Canadians says the CETA deals literally throws the door wide open to allowing an corporation to challenge any government about any government regulations that can be shown to limit free trade, and the deal will allow corporations to sue governments for any perceived limit, that is regulation, that cuts into profits.

The danger to our health, education, labour laws and social services comes from placing the rights of corporations in opposition to the needs of citizens and the rights of governments to meet those needs. Furthermore, imagine what deregulation would do to our environment!

Why would any Canadian seriously consider doing business with a group who not only can't seem to hold their own act together, and wants to take over our lives and try to run it their way? You really have to question the sanity of a government that would agree to this kind of deal.

It seems to me that the governing body of the European Union has forgotten who runs countries. They seem to be letting corporations decide what goes into trade agreements instead of reminding corporations they exist by the grace of a government permit. The whole deal stinks of corruption of the purpose of government, which makes me wonder how many politicians have been purchased. I sometimes think major corporations are moving quickly to replace the feudal lords of the past. It is not a comforting thought.

What are we going to do to stop CETA from being signed?

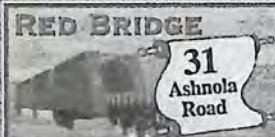

The History of the Keremeos Pepperfest

It all started with a program called Opportunities in Agriculture a dozen years ago.

It was awarded to Keremeos and the task was to deliver a community event that would become part of a larger promotional event in conjunction with the South Okanagan Circle Tour Association.

The 'new' local event was meant to bring tourism to the region in the months between summer and Christmas and following much consultation with community members, and the Village Council at the time, Similkameen Country chose to develop an event that centered on peppers.

Similkameen Country hired Bernice Power as Community Event Coordinator on July 31, 2002 and her ten-week contract put her in control of the development of Similkameen Sizzle and that year's Taste of Our Valley.

The first pepperfest was built around a Guinness Book of Records attempt under the category of 'Most Jalapeno Peppers Eaten In One Minute' and the full day of activities in Keremeos Memorial Park included vendors, chainsaw art demos, family games and entertainment and the Guinness Book attempt (won by Princeton's Steve Kovacs) and wrapped up with an evening dance.

The unusual idea for a community celebration ended up being the most successful event held that year in the Lower Similkameen.

In 2003 Judy Egli volunteered to be the Event Coordinator and more new events were added to the celebration including a pig roast dinner to complement an evening dance and numerous organized children's games.

Many activities from the first year continued including pepper garden tours, vendors and live entertainment. The Guinness Book Record attempt turned into the Sear Factor pepper-eating contest, which saw Preet Lidder and Kelly Dennis, both of Cawston, tie for First Place.

The event turned a profit and plans were underway for a 3rd annual pepperfest soon after.

In 2004 Similkameen Sizzle expanded to a full day format adding a pancake breakfast to the schedule of events as well as the first chili cook off, which in actual fact is more of a 'taste off' than a cook off. Event Coordinator Judy Egli served her

second year in the position and was joined by a solid volunteer board of directors. The giant red pepper signs you may have seen at the three main entrances to Keremeos were purchased in 2004 and have fulfilled the original purpose of being a year 'round reminder of Similkameen Sizzle.

Sizzle that year also had a 'mystery event' planned for the afternoon of the celebration which turned out to be the wedding of Sizzle Board member George Elliott and event volunteer Brenda Engel. It was also the only year Similkameen Sizzle was forced indoors due to weather. A storm saw a scaled down pepperfest fill the Keremeos Legion and although a number of vendors packed up and left town, those who toughed it out in the cramped space enjoyed themselves.

Cawston's Kelly Dennis took First Place in the pepper eating contest, Dave Egli of Keremeos won First Place in the first ever Chili Cook-Off and despite the weather there were other successes of note: 52 Mexican breakfasts were served and 163 people attended the evening dinner and dance at Victory Hall.

Judy Egli served her third year as Event Coordinator for the 2005 Sizzle which saw many events from the previous year become fixtures in the 4th annual celebration and many years after including the pancake breakfast and chili cook-off. Another dinner and dance was planned although early in the planning stages it was noted that more volunteers were needed to keep the event moving smoothly.

A total of 277 ballots were cast in the People's Choice category of the Chili Cook Off in 2005, which saw Patricia Peart take the top prize. Cawston's Kelly Dennis earned a 'three-peat' winning the Sear Factor pepper-eating contest. The dinner/dance attracted 200 people.

In 2006 Similkameen Sizzle adopted a shorter schedule with Judy Egli still at the helm. Volunteers were getting burned out working an eighteen-hour day so the pancake breakfast and dinner/dance were dropped from the event. Another new feature, Celebrity Chefs, was added with a small handful of chefs sharing pepper-related recipes (and samples!).

A total of three 'chefs' were featured in the cooking demonstrations including Tuesday MacDonald,

MLA Harry Lali and Chef Chris Remington.

A pancake breakfast was added to the schedule late in the planning and was run by the local Firemen, some retired, others not so tired, and served 250 plates of food.

WorkZone Keremeos took First Place in the Chili Cook-Off, which had 13 entries, and Henry Maktaak of Penticton won Sear Factor. Three-time Champion Kelly Dennis of Cawston finished second.

Duncan MacArthur became Similkameen Sizzle Event Coordinator for the 6th pepperfest in 2007.

Changes to the event saw a joint Lions/Firefighters pancake breakfast, Latin dancing demonstrations, the return of Celebrity Chefs and another attempt at a dinner/dance.

The day saw a few glitches (mechanical failure delayed the arrival of the afternoon live entertainment), but was still a success. Princeton's Brenda Engel won the Chili Cook Off. Her vegetarian chili recipe had won Second the year before and Third the year before that. Cawston's Kelly Dennis took back his crown in a First Place finish in the

pepper-eating contest. A review of the day showed that although only 90 dinner/dance tickets were sold the Sizzle still earned a profit.

In 2008 Carroll MacLean came on board as Committee Chair and along with him came some fresh ideas. One of the best was to sign corporate sponsors for three-year commitments to Sizzle. A small committee was formed to develop a package for presentation to potential sponsors. The success of that plan continues to this day.

The daylong event continued with the familiar format of a pancake breakfast at the start and a dinner/dance at the end with numerous established activities filling the

space between in Memorial Park. Princeton's Durby's Hilbilly Chili (Dana Stevens) took first in the Chili Cook Off and Sandor Kolejzak of Cawston won the Sear Factor event. A new feature saw a Restaurant Chili Challenge, which had a handful of entries from local restaurants.

Carroll MacLean continued as Committee Chair in 2009 and the event schedule saw more fine-tuning with the elimination of the dinner/dance. Instead of a dinner/dance, local restaurants were encouraged to feature Sizzle Saturday menu items to help cross promote the pepperfest in August and early September. Three-year sponsorships were being signed which helped considerably as annual cash donations

had dropped from the previous year. Princeton's Durby's Hilbilly Chili (Dana Stevens) took first in the Chili Cook Off for the second year in a row and Cawston's Kelly Dennis took First Place (again) in the Sear Factor pepper-eating contest.

The 2010 Similkameen Sizzle, chaired by Carroll MacLean, saw few changes to the now regular schedule of events at Memorial Park. There was a slight drizzle during the day, which had an affect on attendance, but the day was still a success with 200 people starting their morning at the pancake breakfast. A total of 175 people voted in the Chili Cook Off with Collin Shore Farm of Cawston winning. Ash Bund of England walked away with the Sear Factor Championship.

In 2011 Vickie Morgan became Sizzle Chair and with a number of corporate sponsors entering the final year of their three-year sponsorship the push was on to resign them and add to the list of Sizzle sponsors.

The tenth annual Sizzle was another success with perfect weather and a full Memorial Park. With only a few entries in the Chili Cook Off 200 people still tasted and voted with Riverside RV Park taking top honours with their Caribbean Chili. The Sear Factor event saw the number of entries limited for one of the first times as the popularity of this event continues to grow. Daniel Melnyk of Vancouver won the pepper-eating contest.

Carroll MacLean came back to chair Sizzle for 2012 which will see the 11th annual event this Saturday, September 15th. There will be few surprises as the schedule of activities has proven to be successful in the current format.

The major reoccurring theme that has tied all eleven years of Similkameen Sizzle together, aside from it having a lot to do with spicy food, is that there has never been a charge to enter Memorial Park to enjoy the afternoon. The Sizzle Committee pays for all the entertainment so that there is no cover charge to attend.

Living Past 100
The Squashy Goodness of Fall

As summer wanes toward fall, one of the major crops coming to maturity is squash and pumpkins. Although we associate pumpkins with Halloween, we tend to forget the importance of the pumpkin-squash family of foods. Winter squash has a hard skin and keeps for months at room temperature. Winter squash and pumpkins are very high in nutritional value, and are well worth buying. When the price is right, stock up.

Pumpkins and squash originated in North and South America and were first introduced to Europe when the Spanish brought them back after enjoying eating them in the New World. These plants had long been staple foods of the native people of North America. Pumpkins were dried and ground into flour, and squash was roasted and often was one of the few sources of sweetness. Among the native Americans, it was one of the three sacred foods.

Pumpkins and squash are low in calories, a good source of fibre, Winter squash is loaded with Vitamin C even after it has been cooked, and is a great source of beta-carotene, that wonderful vitamin that prevents cancer.

There are many varieties of winter squash: acorn, hubbard, buttercup, butternut. What they have in common is rich yellow or orange flesh. The best and easiest way to cook a winter squash is to make no effort to remove the tough skin. Just roast it in its skin after the seeds are removed. You can dry and roast the seeds, crack them open, and eat the seeds, too, which are great for men to prevent prostate problems. Men should eat plenty of pumpkin seeds.

If you have roasted a very large squash, you can freeze the cooked flesh, eat it as is, or make soup from it. There are numerous recipes for squash or pumpkin soup, and it is delicious. Of course, everybody knows about pumpkin pie, but you could try roasting a pumpkin and eating the flesh. Add a little butter and salt and enjoy it.

One word of warning about handling squash and pumpkins: do not drop them, they will split. Handle them with care. Although the skin is tough, it is not flexible enough to withstand impact.

Local wins Tulameen Cup

The Princeton Racing Days Association hosted their second race meet of the season September 8th at Sunflower Downs.

With a total amount wagered at just \$8,954, the largest payout at \$98.00 and a total of six races on the card, those in attendance still enjoyed a hot, sunny day of live horse racing.

Race 1 was the 440-yard Northwest Speed Stake Quarterhorse Allowance race for 3-year olds and up, but a mechanical malfunction combined with a horse breaking through the starting gate forced race officials to declare the unfair start a 'no contest' and money wagered on the race was refunded.

Race 2 was a 4-furlong Thoroughbred Allowance for non-winners of two races lifetime. Boogie Butt won the race in 46.41-seconds (\$4.60 win, \$3.20 place, \$2.10 show) with Westwood Breeze second (\$4.60 place, \$2.10 show) and Brianville third (\$2.10 show). Other payouts: \$9.60 quinella, \$33.20 exactor and \$23.90 triactor.

Race 3 was a 4-furlong Thoroughbred Allowance which saw Salty Scholar take the win with a time of 44.51-seconds (\$4.20 win, \$2.10 place), Blood and Diamond second (\$2.10 place). With three scratches in the race it left only three horses in the field so there was no show betting. Gil finished the race in third. The quinella was \$3.80 and exactor paid \$9.60.

Race 4 was a 4-furlong Thoroughbred Maiden Allowance race which was won by Slews Lucky Lee with a time of 45.99-seconds (\$8.10 win, \$2.70 place, \$4.50 show), Spirit Wandering was second (\$2.10 place, \$2.10 show) and Starabella third (\$3.90 show). Race 5 was the 5 1/2-furlong 40th running of the Luke Gibson Memorial Thoroughbred Allowance for fillies and mares. Andthatsthe truth won the race with a time of 106.04 (\$4.20 win, \$2.10 place, \$2.10 show), Missis Caldwell was second (\$2.70

place, \$2.10 show) and Regal Promise third (\$2.10 show). Other payouts were: quinella \$8.90, exactor \$28.60 and triactor \$11.10.

Race 6 was the 7-furlong 40th running of the Luke Gibson Memorial Thoroughbred Allowance for fillies and mares (second half) which was won by Maida Vale with a time of 125.84 (\$2.20 win, \$2.70 place, \$2.50 show). Recalled was second (\$2.90 place, \$2.10 show) and Joey La Bamba third (\$2.10 show). The quinella paid \$5.70, exactor \$7.50 and triactor \$10.70.

Nutty Pesto Personal Pizzas

Information: Serves 6 / Prep Time 30 minutes

Ingredients

- 4 Tbsp (60 mL) olive oil, divided
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) red onions, thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 lb (455 g) ground turkey*
- 6 whole wheat pitas
- 1 Tbsp (15 mL) coarse salt
- 1 Tbsp (15 mL) dried oregano
- 6 Tbsp (90 mL) pesto
- 1/4 cup (60 mL) pine nuts, toasted
- 1 cup (250 mL) Asiago cheese

Directions

- Pre-heat oven to 400°F (200°C). In a large skillet on medium, heat 2 Tbsp (30 mL) oil. Add onions and saute for 5 minutes. Add garlic and saute 2 minutes more.
 - Add ground turkey and saute approximately 10 minutes until completely cooked and starting to brown. Remove from heat and set aside.
 - Brush each pita with remaining olive oil. Season each pita with salt and oregano.
 - Spread each pita with 1 Tbsp (15 mL) of pesto. Divide turkey mixture evenly between the 6 pitas. Repeat with pine nuts and cheese.
 - Transfer pizzas to a baking sheet and bake for 10 minutes or until cheese is melted and golden.
- *Use leftover cooked turkey instead of ground.

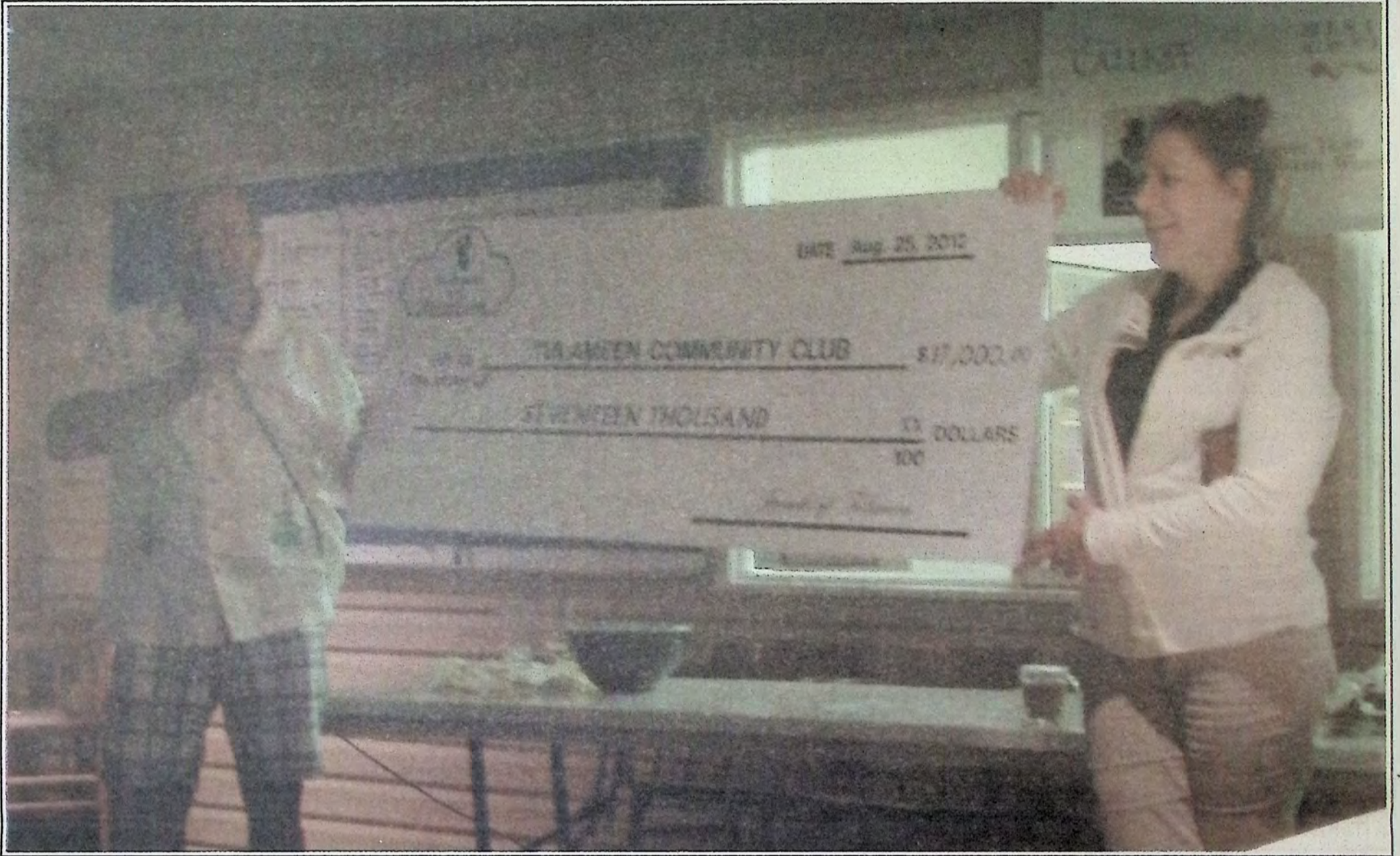

The first annual Friends of Tulameen Golf Tournament held August 25th at the Princeton Golf Course was a huge success! Everyone had fun, prizes galore, winery sponsorship, limited edition wine glasses and lots of laughs! Best of all, the tournament raised \$17,000.00 for the Tulameen Community Club's 'Raise The

Roof' project.

Earlier this year, the Regional District Okanagan Similkameen, working with the Tulameen Community Club, submitted an application for a Provincial Government grant that had been made available for capital projects for recreation in BC.

The grant had a long list of criteria

that the successful applicant would have to meet. The application was studied, compiled, edited, re-edited, finally completed, submitted...and awarded!! The RDOS received a grant for \$240,000.00 to construct a roof over the existing outdoor arena in Tulameen earlier this year. "Raise The Roof" project had begun!

The funding was based on a budget for just the roof and the engineering and site prep that it would require. In order to have a facility that would be able to host hockey tournaments, there would need to be change rooms, a score clock, penalty boxes and bleachers with safety glass. The Tulameen Community Club has been holding fundraisers for the Raise The Roof project to supplement the RDOS grant to make this facility in Tulameen truly one of a kind outdoor experience in BC!

For the Friends of Tulameen golf tournament, a hired bus for the tournament came to Tulameen at 11:00 AM, picked up a full load of cheery folks with their golf clubs and delivered them to the golf course. There was plenty of time to get registered, purchase your 'mulligans', collect your golfers bag which

included personalized tees and ball marker, Hester Creek coupon for each golfer and a snack for the course. Tee off for a shotgun start was at 1:00 PM and the tournament was a best ball format. Golfers were able to enjoy all 18 of the sponsored holes, but especially nice on a hot August day was the 10th hole where Okanagan Spring had supplied ice cold beer for every golfer!!

Back at the clubhouse, chef Peter was individually grilling steaks to each golfer's satisfaction and had prepared a feast to go along with it. Prizes were being awarded and every golfer got to go home with a bottle of wine from one of several Okanagan wineries and a specially designed commemorative wine glass, etched with Friends of Tulameen logo.

Weeks and weeks of preparations went into planning this tournament, and organizers Mark and Barb Jones from Tulameen deserve a very hearty thank you for an amazing event.
