RDOS amends then adopts building policy

A number of policies and bylaws were on the agenda of the September RDOS Board meeting. **Decommissioning Policy**
The Board amended Section 7.14 of all existing Zoning bylaws which pertains to the use of temporary secondary dwelling units and the decommissioning of dwelling units. The RDOS Board adopted the Decommissioning Policy, being a policy to guide use of buildings occupied as temporary residences

during the construction of a new dwelling and setting out the procedure for processing and enforcing the decommissioning and demolition of those buildings once their temporary use is fulfilled. **3157 Coalmont Road**—Electoral Area 'H' - application to vary the interior side setback for a principal structure from 1.5 m to 0.2 m. Development of a woodshed which is to be attached to the existing continued on Page 18

Community Services faces major concerns

Princeton and District Community Services Society marks its 40th anniversary next year, and it is still in good shape financially as well as continuing to meet its goals. With a budget of nearly \$3 million, the society has come a long way from its humble beginnings in the old Mine Rescue building rented from the government for a pittance. Despite local success, the society faces a number of concerns about access to health services.

Community Services plays many roles in the Princeton area. Housing for the elderly and the disabled is one of the functions, and the society owns and operates Mary Ann Court,

Vermilion Court, Mary Ann House and Victoria House. In addition, the society operates Aspen Court, a low income housing development. In a deal between the Town of Princeton and BC Transit, the society operates a bus service equipped with wheelchair access. This service takes passengers from Princeton to Penticton three times a week, offering an opportunity for medical appointments.

The question of transportation was raised again at the September 24 annual general meeting. A bus service to Kelowna is highly desirable, but has not been possible so far. One member stated he had to go to

Kelowna for a medical treatment, and as neither he nor his wife drive anymore, they are forced to hire a driver, pay motel bills and meals for all of them, for a total cost of nearly \$500. Many seniors and disabled people who do not drive rely on friends or others to take them to Kelowna for medical treatments, and the cost is an issue. Community

Services will continue to try to resolve the problem.

Community Services offers a total of 14 programs ranging from assisted living to home care to residential services, Meals on Wheels, counseling, recreation programs for adults, and Victim Services. More than 50 people are employed by Community Services. The volun-

teer Board of Directors establishes policy and evaluates the performance of the entire operation.

A major concern of Community Services is the reduction of emergency room services. Executive Director Lynn Pelly told the members attending the annual general meeting, "The increased pressure to continued on Page 22

Fire centre expands fire ban

Effective at 12 Noon on Friday, September 28, open fire prohibitions in the Kamloops Fire Centre were extended to help prevent human-caused wildfires and protect the public. Due to recent warm and dry weather, 70 per cent of the region remains at a "high" or "extreme" fire danger rating.

Clearwater and Salmon Arm fire zones: Category 2 and Category 3 open fires are prohibited at elevations below 1,200 metres in the Clearwater and Salmon Arm fire zones until October 15, or until the public is informed otherwise.

Kamloops, Vernon, Penticton, Merritt and Lillooet fire zones: Category 2 and Category 3 open fires are prohibited at all elevations in the Kamloops, Vernon, Penticton,

Merritt and Lillooet fire zones until October 31, or until the public is informed otherwise.

Specifically, these open fire prohibitions apply to:

- the burning of any material piled larger than a half-metre high by a half-metre wide.
- the burning of stubble or grass.
- using fireworks or burning barrels of any size or description.

Anyone found in violation of an open fire prohibition may be issued a ticket for up to \$345. Anyone who causes a wildfire through arson or recklessness may be fined up to \$1 million, spend up to three years in prison and be held accountable for associated firefighting costs.

The open fire prohibition covers all BC Parks, Crown lands and private

lands, but does not apply within the boundaries of local governments that have forest fire prevention bylaws and are serviced by fire departments. Check with local governments for any other restrictions before lighting a fire.

New project airs October 18

On Thursday, October 18, at 8:00 PM, CBC Television's The Nature of Things premieres "The Buffalo Wolves," a documentary about an epic life and death struggle of two amazing species in a stunning landscape, by acclaimed Canadian wildlife filmmaker Jeff Turner.

Over the course of a year, Turner followed and chronicled a pack of wolves in Wood Buffalo National Park, in Northern Canada - the only place in the world where wolves hunt wild buffalo in their natural habitat. The Buffalo Wolves provides rare insight into the hunting practices and family life of these wolves, and examines how they have survived in this ancient wilderness for so long.

By using new camera technologies, and applying his 25 years of experience filming wolves, the

Tulameen resident was able to get closer to the wolves and observe more details of their life in the wild than ever before. This documentary opens up a window into the world of wild wolves that has rarely been seen before.

The Buffalo Wolves features remarkable aerial footage that captures the incredible tenacity and endurance of the wolves as they pursue the buffalo over huge distances; it's wildlife filmmaking at its finest.

"It's hard to watch these predations, but death is a crucial part of the natural cycle - the young buffalo going to feed the young of the wolves," says Turner.

"Buffalo can weigh over a tonne and are 20 times the size of a wolf - yet the pack must kill one every week or so. The success or failure

of a wolf pack depends on their leaders. Just as in a human family the mother and father wolf are the ones that provide food and security."

Filmmakers Jeff and Sue Turner, River Road Films Ltd., are a Canadian husband and wife team who live in the Otter Valley. They have directed, shot, written and produced more than 25 documentary films for the CBC, BBC, PBS, Discovery and Animal Planet Channels in settings throughout the world. They have won numerous awards for their work and their films have been seen around the world in more than 40 countries.

The Buffalo Wolves is produced in association with CBC's The Nature of Things - Senior Producer Caroline Underwood and Executive Producer Sue Dando.

Flip Of The Coyne

If you follow politics in this province some days it is enough to make you want to bang your head

against the wall. Christy Clark and her Liberals watch as more of the top brass jump ship and the BC

Conservatives could be facing the end of the party before it even got started.

After 70 percent of party members voted against a leadership review of leader John Cummins, problems started to escalate. The only BC Conservative MLA, John van Dongan, left because he claims he can't stay if Cummins is leader. Then the Vancouver-Kingsway constituency association announced it would deregister from the party as soon as possible.

You would think that a 70 percent support for your leadership would bring the party together, even if it is only a small handful of very vocal sourpusses who are crying the blues because they didn't get things the way they wanted. It is doing more harm for the BC Conservatives than good. The optics of the situation are that the BC Conservatives are in the middle of a civil war that is ripping the party apart at its very foundation. Is this really happening? I doubt it. The media likes to cling onto stories like this and run with them.

This election really has turned into the NDP's to lose at this point. Recent polls have the BC NDP at 46 percent, BC Liberals at 25 percent, BC Conservatives at 19 percent and the Greens at 8 percent. Depending on what happens with the BC Conservative Party and how much damage the infighting does, we could see centre right voters start to go back to the BC Liberal Party allowing Christy Clark to close the gap with Adrian Dix and the NDP. Would it be enough to bump the NDP? Only time will tell.

Adrian Dix's recent announcement that he would repeal the province's balanced budget law is getting mixed reviews and it should be only a matter of time before the opposition starts attacking the NDP on being "tax and spend liberals." It doesn't matter that he wants to repeal the law because it hasn't been followed, and in fact, the BC Liberals have been running a deficit continued on Page 22

Maybe I Should Be Thankful For Goop

I don't really consider myself a picky eater, but I do have a couple of simple rules I like to follow.

My first rule of food consumption is this: Never put more food on your plate than you plan to actually eat.

I think that's a pretty simple, common sense guideline that I carry with me from growing up in a lower middle-class home where we were taught to be thankful for what was on our plates and that we best eat it all. That's not to say the servings were large, it was just a reminder from our parents that we better not waste anything.

To this day I'll carefully watch the amount of food I put on my plate when I attend a potluck or buffet meal. I know there's going to be seconds, so I'll get more then. Even at home I don't overload my plate. I can always get more, so why try to cram it all on my plate at the first sitting?

My second rule of food consumption is this: Adding more sauce, gravy or juice than necessary creates goop.

Goop to me is not always waste, goop is something that takes away from the actual taste of the food I'm trying to eat.

The other morning I had pancakes. I put only enough syrup on them to be soaked up by the pancakes rather than pouring so much that the bottom of the pancake ends up swimming in it. That's when goop is bad, especially when it turns food soggy.

As we approach Thanksgiving it is as good a time as any to share my two simple rules of food consumption. I don't do it as a joke about overeating; I do it to remind you that we live in a time and in a place in the world where we can stack food as high as we want on our plates. It is also a reminder that we have access to no shortage of food in our area and that if we really wanted to, we could bury all of it in a river of goop and fill ourselves for days and days and not ever be bothered by how much we've eaten and how much partially eaten food gets tossed at the end of our day.

But the part I'm personally thankful for is that many of us have the sense to not do these things and choose instead to share some of the extra with others.

And, yes, it also makes me thankful for all the goop.

Community Forests - Part 1

BC's forest based communities are facing dramatic changes due to a range of ecological and economic factors. Rural communities and First Nations are looking for alternatives that will help stabilize their local economies and provide long-term employment opportunities. An increasing number of these see community forests as way to meet many of the challenges they face.

At its core, community forestry is about local control over, and enjoyment of, the benefits offered by local forest resources on crown land. Community Forest Agreements are managed by local governments, First Nations, not-for-profit societies and cooperative organizations interested in the environmental, social and economic health of their community.

A Community Forest Agreement allows communities to determine the values and objectives for management of the land surrounding their communities, the methods to achieve those objectives and the benefits that derive from management. The forest tenure in turn leverages unique opportunities for community economic development and diversification.

The benefits of community forestry vary from community to community as they each identify their own values and priorities. For example, one rural mountain com-

munity has identified water protection as their highest priority, while a First Nation community forest sees education and long term employment of band members as their key priorities. With community forests typically located in the land surrounding a community, interface planning and fuel management to reduce risk of wildfires is often a management priority.

Province-wide, there are 47 operating Community Forest Agreements and an additional eleven communities and First Nations in the application process. While the program has grown significantly, the combined annual harvest represents only 1.5% of the provincial total. To put this in perspective, one company holds licenses for an annual harvest of 2.7 million cubic metres in the Prince George area alone. This is almost double the total amount allocated to the Community Forest Program.

The Legislative Assembly of BC's Special Committee on Timber Supply is considering ways to address the pine beetle epidemic related loss of timber supply in the Central Interior. These recommendations are to be examined with due regard to maintaining high environmental standards, protection of critical habitat and key environmental values for the optimal

health of communities in as orderly a transition as possible. The Committee has asked some fundamental questions including: "How do we support communities with a falling timber supply? How do we do more with less? Can area based tenures help mitigate this issue?"

Despite their small footprint, community forests have shown they can provide a range of benefits to communities, First Nations, and the province as whole. They are a valuable tool to help communities to become more resilient and self-reliant. By increasing the size of existing community forests and making more of these tenures available to additional communities, the contributions of community forests can be much greater.

Karrie Crucil and Jen Bernard will attend the BC Fairs conference in Kamloops this month.

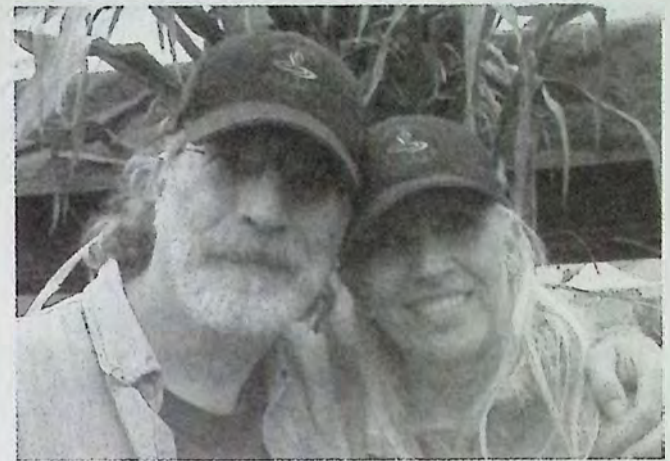
Both the Agricultural Fair and Princeton Exhibition Association are members of the province-wide association of fairs and exhibitions.

A major part of Apple Day is the

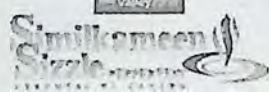

Electoral Area 'G' Report

Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) AGM and Convention held in Victoria, BC from September 23 to 28.

This year's UBCM convention theme is "in conversation"; elected officials in local government from all over BC have gathered under one roof to engage, to dialogue, to discuss and to learn. Throughout our communities, many emerging issues have inspired passionate feelings from our friends and families, which has certainly been translated into heated debate at this convention.

The convention program has been divided into debate sessions, educational workshops and clinics, resolution sessions and panel discussions with our various provincial Ministers. In addition, I have been able to attend a number of meetings with Ministers in order to support our community's calls for increases in funding for health care for both the ER in Princeton and the building addition in Penticton.

For me, as a newly elected official, the access to information provided by these sessions has been invaluable. Many of the speakers have provided insights and innovative solutions to the trying times we are in, and during debate it has often been clear that both sides of each argument have merit worthy of consideration.

Below is a recap of the activities I've taken part in since Monday morning, with a few of the most salient points made at each presentation:

Monday, September 24 Study Session: Marijuana Decriminalization Debate

This session started with a panel of speakers: two worked in law enforcement, one was a doctor, one was a sociologist. First of all, there was complete agreement by all the speakers that marijuana use by minors was harmful and not to be encouraged. There are numerous reports which show that developing minds are adversely affected by chronic pot smoking, and that an addiction to marijuana, like alcohol and tobacco, is harmful to human health.

Most participants did not care if adults wanted to smoke pot, whether they personally voted "for" or "against" decriminalization. It was clear that there is a huge distinction for most between the growing of marijuana for personal use and the presence of organized crime in our communities.

PRO

- Decriminalization could redirect dollars which are currently spent enforcing small-scale drug busts of young offenders into education and prevention.

- Arresting and jailing young offenders essentially puts them into

"gang school" (jail) during their formative years.

- Our current "prohibition" stance causes the black market and fascination - think back to Al Capone's gun-running days...

- Regulation could create a safe supply for those who will use the drug no matter what.

- A well considered regulatory scheme could become a source of revenue to local governments.

- With our current lack of regulation, municipalities are being challenged to provide safety around issues like fire hazards, moulds, building violations - with decriminalization, acceptable standards could be entrenched and enforced.

- With a crumbling economy, one of BC's best-valued commodities should be supported in order to keep our communities afloat.

CON

- Organized crime uses pot as a commodity to trade for guns and coke; this would increase with decriminalization.

- Possession charges are currently one of the only tools which law enforcement has at its disposal in order to make our communities safe.

- No amount of regulation will prevent organized crime from continuing to profit and they are not likely to submit any taxes.

- Addiction to marijuana is increasing in our school-age kids and should not be encouraged.

- Unless marijuana is decriminalized world-wide, the "safe haven" provided by decriminalization would increase the presence of organized crime in our communities.

This debate was scheduled in order that attendees could consider the different sides of this issue in anticipation of the Resolution session later in the conference.

On Wednesday September 26, a resolution was put forward to the UBCM membership for consideration, which asked for the Decriminalization of Marijuana. When it came to a vote, the membership was almost equally divided, with the resolution passing (the "pro" vote won) by a very slim margin (2%).

My "pro" vote came not without a struggle; I do see that we may be endangered by organized crime in our communities; on the other hand, there are many "mom and pop" growers who should be able to make a living without fear of incarceration. In BC it is unrealistic to imagine that marijuana use or growing will go away any time soon, it's one of the things we are best known for.

Tuesday, September 25
7:30 AM - Forum Clinic
BC Ideas: Solutions for
Stronger Communities

This clinic offered a heads-up to a great new web-based tool for social

innovation. It takes the best from web-based sharing (like Facebook) and venture capitalism (like Dragon's Den) and puts them together in search of solutions coming directly out of our communities in order to deal with our social problems.

"BC Ideas" grew out of 2010 Legacies Now, with the idea that this web platform could be developed to pair philanthropy with great ideas, sort of a dating service for social innovation in our communities. One of the most promising things that is happening with BC Ideas is that people with entrepreneurial ideas are coming up with projects, many of which may need "tweaking" to really work. Because of the open format of the site, viewers can check out each other's projects and ideas and build and improve the projects that work. The first run of this program had a very short turn around time, beginning in July and ending in September.

Now that the first intake has been completed, another will begin. The competition element to this program will be judged over the coming weeks, but Bruce Dewar, CEO for the project, says that the impressive continued on Page 8

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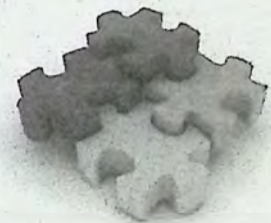

 scope of submissions has meant that the philanthropists are interested, and the organization has been granted more money to follow up with another round of solutions.  I went as support for Area "H"

Director Brad Hope for his presentation on the ER closures at the Princeton Hospital. We are hopeful that as a retired GP from Trail, the Minister will be aware of the challenges and the area we live in. She has promised a visit to our region which we look forward to.

Janice Perrino made a submission to the Health Minister regarding the expansion of the Ambulatory Care facility in Penticton, which was built to serve a population of 10,000 more than 50 years ago. Now that hospital serves a population of 90,000 which explains why patients are often found lining the hallways. We look forward to Minister McDiarmid touring this facility during her visit.

Tuesday, September 25
9:15 AM - 12 noon
Electoral Area Director's Forum
 This forum began with a presentation by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI). Most questions posed to MoTI were respecting roads falling into disrepair

and/or nobody servicing or repairing them. The MoTI representative had to explain that in order to take care of our roads and resource roads, the province has a fixed budget: this means that increasing the numbers of roads cared for decreases the quality of all existing roads.

Then a presentation was made on the Federal changes to our Riparian Area Regulation (RAR) and the use of Qualified Environmental Professionals (QEP's) to do Environmental Assessments.

This deregulation and offloading of government oversight is VERY SCARY. Regulation by Department of Fisheries and Oceans, no matter how onerous it could be, did mean that fish bearing streams and waterways were protected. This, in turn, protects our drinking water supply. With these shifts in regulation we now see the "QEP", hired by the developer, writing the recommendations to develop or not. Whose best interest do we think that QEP will satisfy? If he or she wants work they will obviously write the kind of report that supports development. Some call them biostitutes....

There was also a presentation by the Ministry of Community, Sport and Development which developed a Regional District primer since there are so many things to learn about the legislation and regulations governing these large rural areas between municipalities. This document is aimed primarily at CAO's who must administer staff and assist elected officials who, together, look over numerous small water systems, sewer systems, waste management, parks and recreation, libraries, community centers, trails, building, planning, and bylaw enforcement.

Tuesday, September 25

Community Poverty
Reduction Strategies

This provincial policy session introduced UBCM members to an initiative which was introduced this year by the Ministry of Children and Family Development. A pilot program in five communities was begun this year to see if families would benefit from having a single "navigator" assigned to them to help guide them through the system, enabling them to access services available.

Mayors from these different communities had varying responses to the success of programs. In the cases of communities with large First Nations populations, there was a lack of trust and an unwillingness to engage with the government program. Since many of these families have had negative experiences with governmental interference in their lives or those of their parents or grandparents, it is not surprising that they were less willing

Living Past 100

Enjoy That Pumpkin Pie

Pumpkin pie is the traditional finish to Thanksgiving dinner, and although we eat pumpkin pie as a treat, it is well worth eating on a regular basis. Pumpkin is one of those vegetables packed with good things and although most people would not eat it plain, turn it into pie and hardly anyone turns it down.

A pumpkin is loaded with beta-carotene, a vitamin compound that can stop cellular damage and prevent disease. Eating one slice of pumpkin pie can give you pretty much all of the beta-carotene you need in one day.

Two other wonderful substances in pumpkin pie could save your eyesight if you ate pumpkin pie regularly. Lutein and zeaxanthin are found in the lenses of the eyes and in pumpkin. Researchers believe eating foods rich in both lutein and zeaxanthin can prevent cataracts in the eye. A study done in Maine found that people who eat foods rich in lutein and zeaxanthin are far less likely to develop macular degeneration, a condition of the elderly that leads to blindness.

Not only does the high level of beta-carotene protect your eyesight, it protects you against cancer and heart disease. The effect of prevention of cancer is very important, as beta-carotene is not the only substance in pumpkin that protects the body. Another pumpkin substance is phenolic acid, which binds with cancer-causing substances to prevent them being absorbed by the body.

Pumpkin flesh, from which we make our pumpkin pie, is high in fibre. One slice of pumpkin pie will give you half your daily requirement of fibre.

Anyone who suffers from lack of iron should eat pumpkin pie frequently, as pumpkin is a good source of iron. Eating pumpkin seeds is an even better source, although pumpkin seeds are high in calories due to the fat in pumpkin seeds. On the other hand, the fat in pumpkin seeds is good fat, not saturated fat like the fat you find in bacon.

Milk is one of the essential ingredients in pumpkin pie, which makes the pie a good source of calcium. The whipped cream we put on top of pumpkin pie and the pastry are not so good for you, as they contain a lot of saturated fat. Maybe you could do without the pie crust and serve just the filling as pumpkin pudding?

If you have never processed your own pumpkin, do not despair. Pumpkin is easy to cook. Cut the pumpkin in half, remove the seeds and loose fibres, put in a roaster with a little water in the bottom, and bake until the pumpkin flesh is tender (about one hour at regular baking temperature). Be sure to bake the pumpkin with a cover on it so the flesh does not dry out. When it is cooked, cool it and scoop out the pumpkin flesh. Toss out the skin, and use the flesh in your favourite pie recipe. If you have more pumpkin than you need, freeze the leftover pumpkin for use at a later date (more pumpkin pie or pudding!).

Save the seeds to be dry roasted and used as a snack, as you do with sunflower seeds.

Mushrooms with Mediterranean Tuna Dip

Ingredients

- 1 cup (250 mL) packed Italian parsley leaves
- 1 cup (250 mL) light mayonnaise
- 1 can (170 g) flaked or chunk light tuna (packed in water), drained
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) lemon juice
- 3 tbsp (45 mL) drained capers
- 5 anchovies, chopped (or 2 tsp /10 mL anchovy paste)
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 lb (500 g) fresh Mushrooms (thickly sliced, small whole or halved large)
- Garnish: fresh parsley, minced

Method

- In food processor combine parsley, mayonnaise, tuna, lemon juice, capers, anchovies and garlic; process until smooth.
- Transfer to serving dish, garnish with parsley, cover and chill until serving.
- Place on tray or in a basket and surround with mushrooms for dipping.

Makes 1 3/4 cups (425 mL) or 10-12 servings.

Variations

Add 1 tsp Dijon mustard and 2 hard cooked eggs.

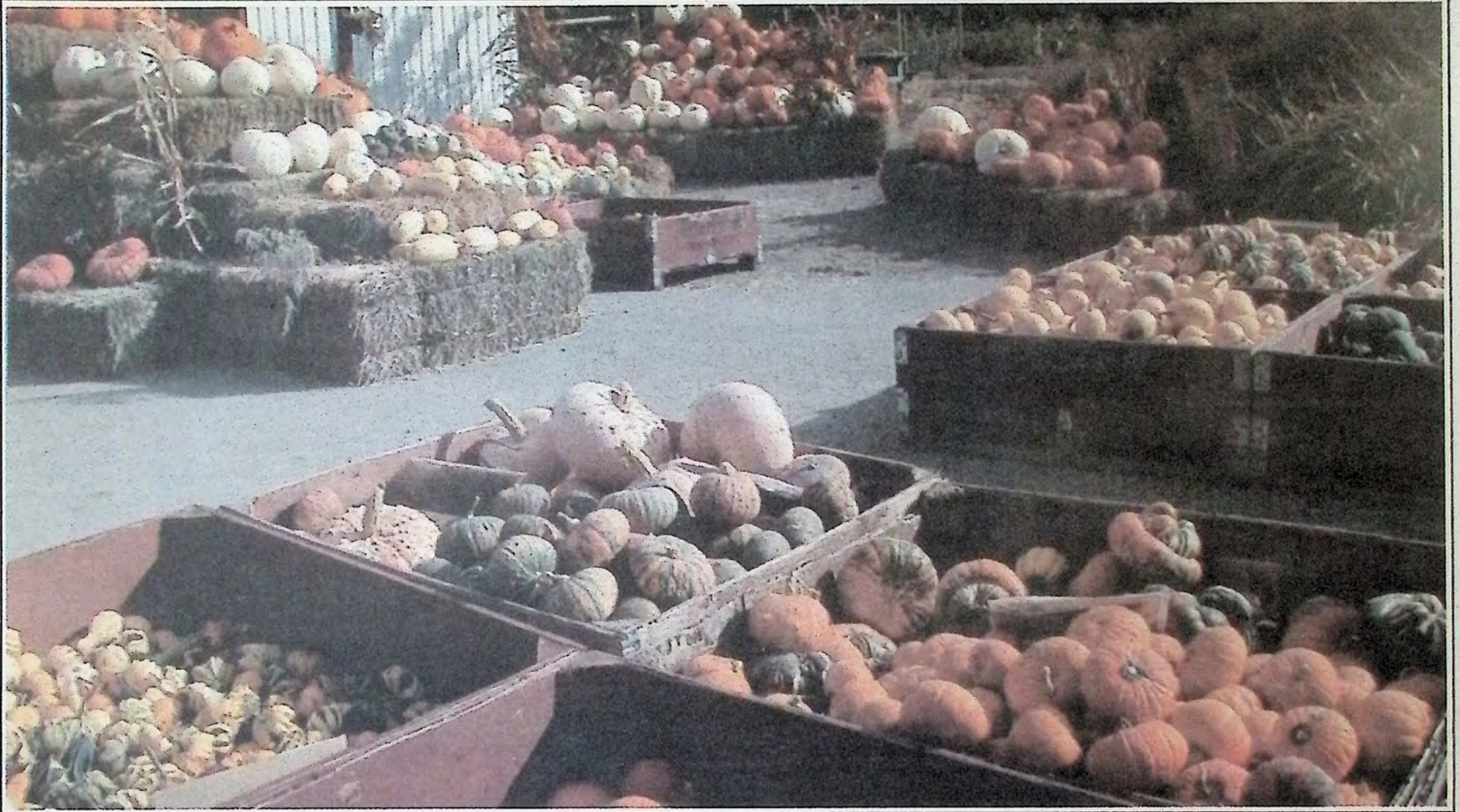

PUBLIC NOTICE

RECALL AND INITIATIVE ACT

This notice is published pursuant to section 4 of the *Recall and Initiative Act*.

Approval in principle has been granted on an application for an Initiative petition. The petition will be issued to proponent Dana Larsen on Monday, November 19, 2012 and signature sheets must be submitted to the Chief Electoral Officer by Monday, February 18, 2013.

The Title of the Initiative is:
An Initiative to amend the *Police Act*.

Summary of Initiative:
The Initiative draft Bill entitled, "Sensible Policing Act" proposes to amend the *Police Act* to no longer use provincial police resources on the enforcement of current laws in relation to simple possession and use of cannabis by adults. The draft law would prohibit the use of provincial police resources for this purpose, would require police to report in detail to the Minister of Justice any actual use of resources for this purpose and why it was necessary, and require the Minister to publish that report. The Bill also proposes that the Province would call upon the Federal Government to repeal the federal prohibition on cannabis, or give British Columbia an exemption, such that British Columbia is able to tax and regulate cannabis similar to the regulation of alcohol and tobacco. As well it proposes that British Columbia shall establish a Provincial Commission to study the means and requirements necessary for the province to establish a legal and regulated model for the production and use of cannabis by adults. Last, the Bill would make non-lawful possession and use of cannabis by minors an offence similar to possession and use of alcohol.

Opponent Registration:

Individuals or organizations who intend to incur expenses as opponents must apply for registration with the Chief Electoral Officer by Monday, October 22, 2012. Registration applications for opponents are available from Elections BC.

Initiative Advertising:

Individuals or organizations who sponsor Initiative advertising, other than the proponent and registered opponents, must register with the Chief Electoral Officer before they conduct or publish Initiative advertising. Registration applications are available from Elections BC.

Who May Sign the Petition:

Registered voters as of Monday, November 19, 2012 may sign the Initiative petition. Individuals may only sign the petition once, and must sign the petition sheet for the electoral district in which they are registered at the time of signing. Signed petitions are available for public inspection.

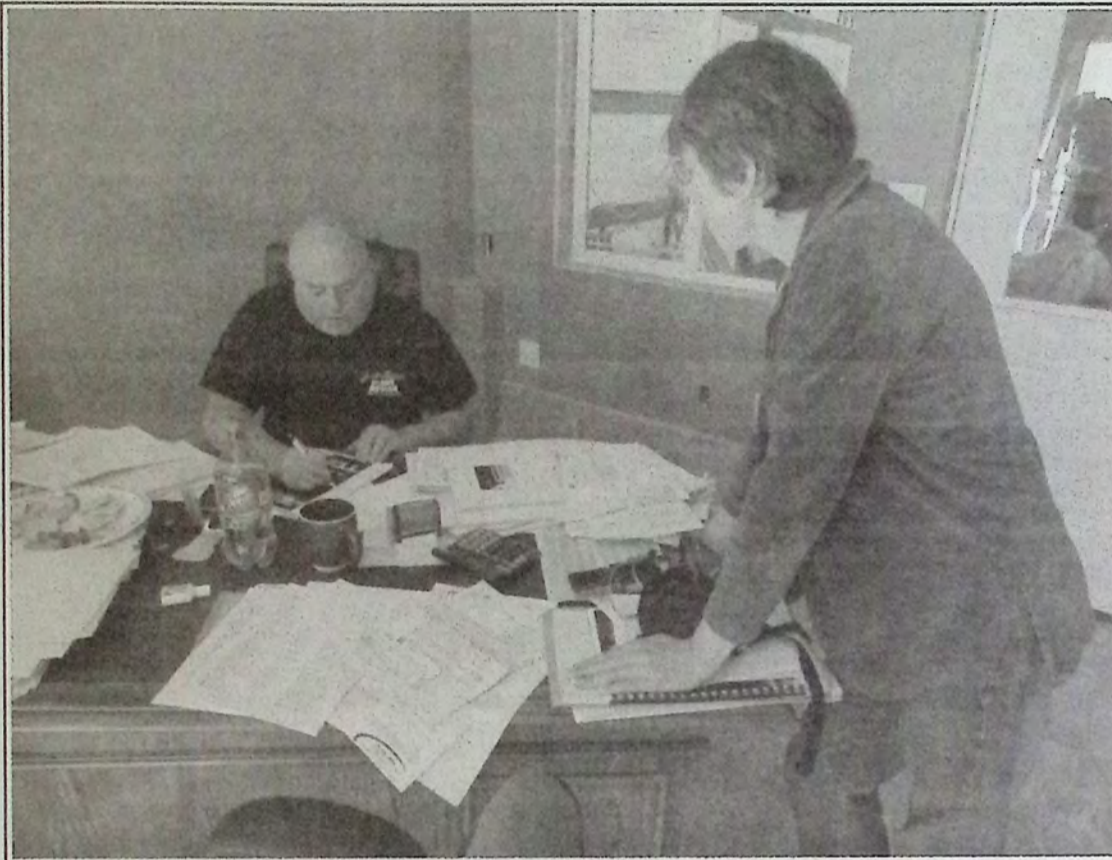

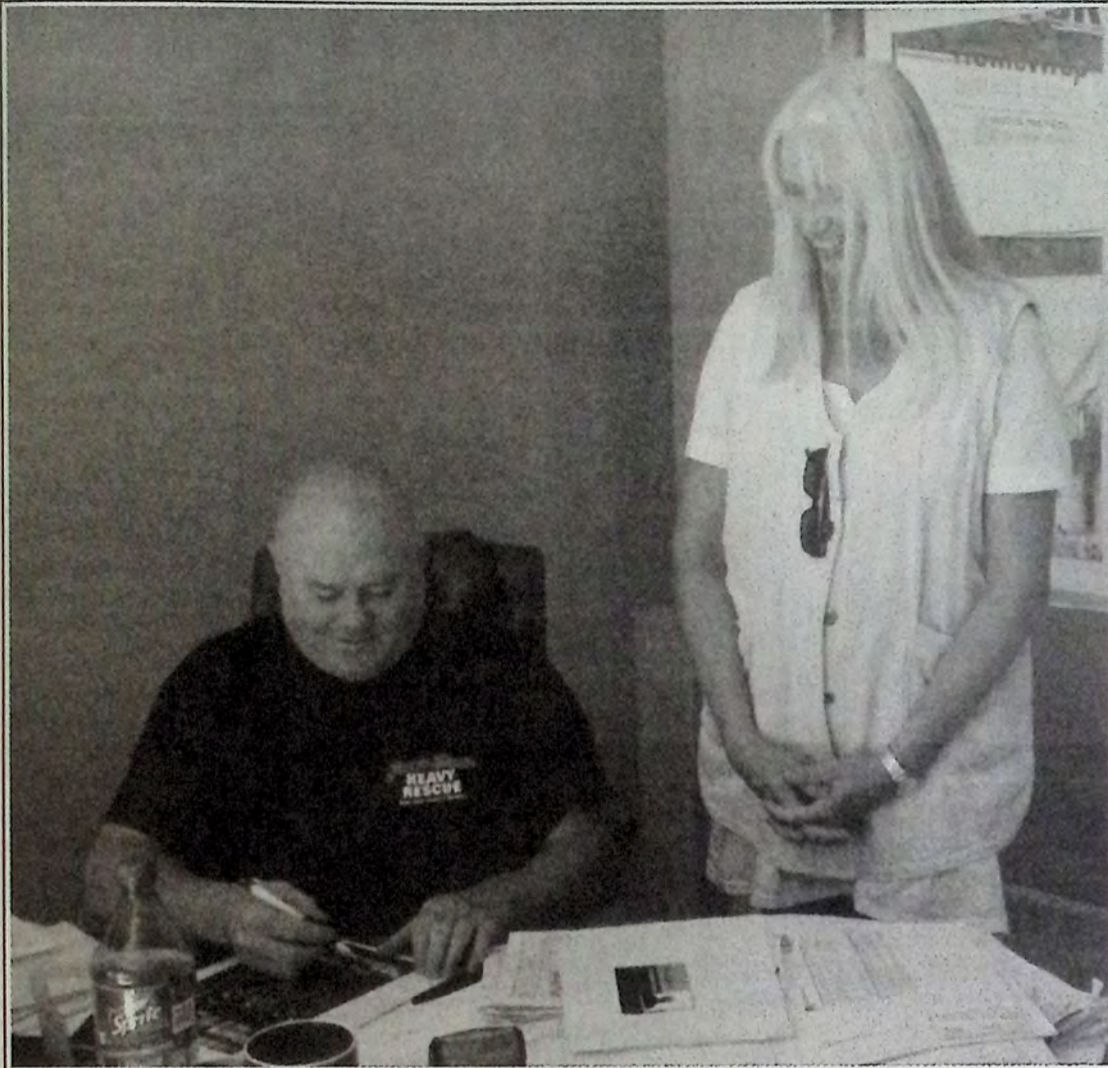

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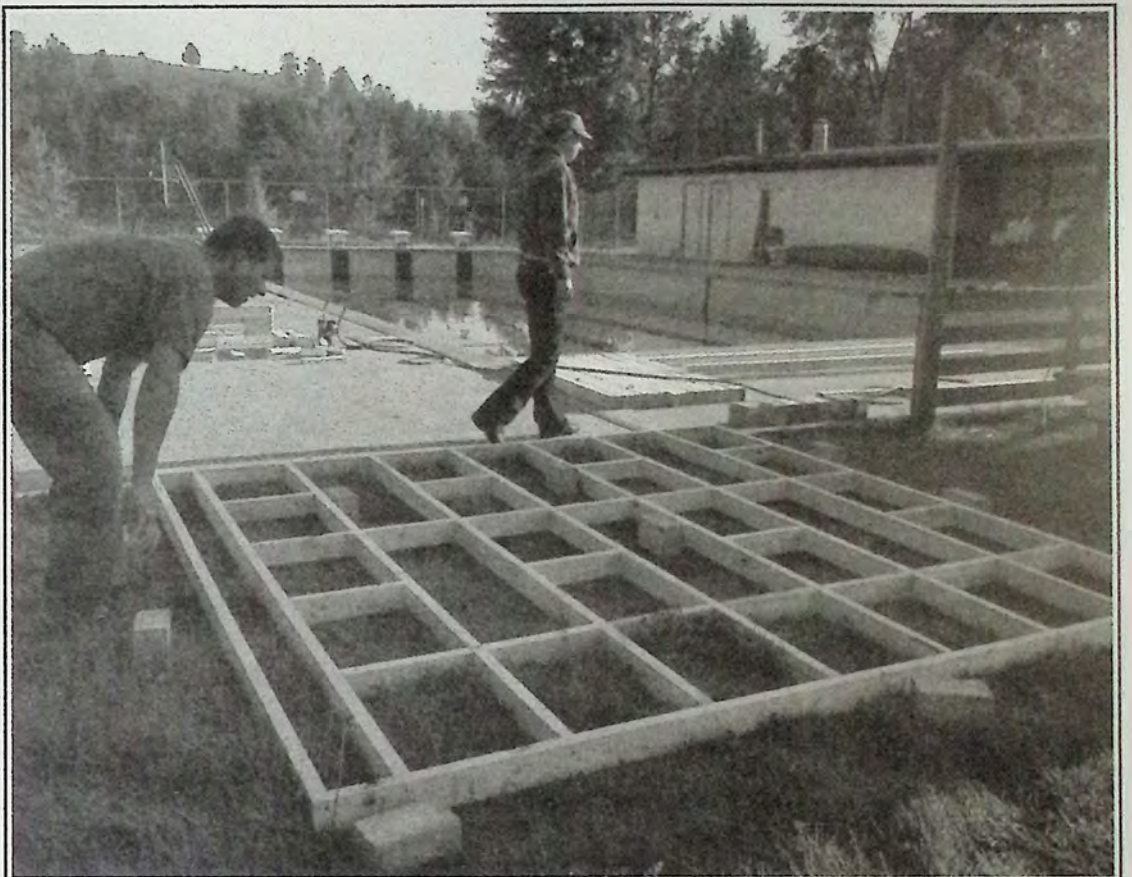

to engage than in some other places. One mayor, whose city includes a high number of immigrants, found that the program really helped her constituents, many new to Canada, and unfamiliar with what services might be available to them.

This initiative is seeking communities to add to the program; a diverse representation is encouraged in order to see if this targeted approach can have a profound effect on those wishing to get out of poverty.

In order to give fair coverage of all the subsequent sessions I have attended, I will stop now and write you a part two later! Suffice it to say that there is an enormous amount of learning to be done at a conference like this one, and to simplify any of these complex issues which lie at the heart of the health and capacity of our communities would do a disservice to the many individuals who are working on all our behalf daily, with the intention of making our communities better places to live.

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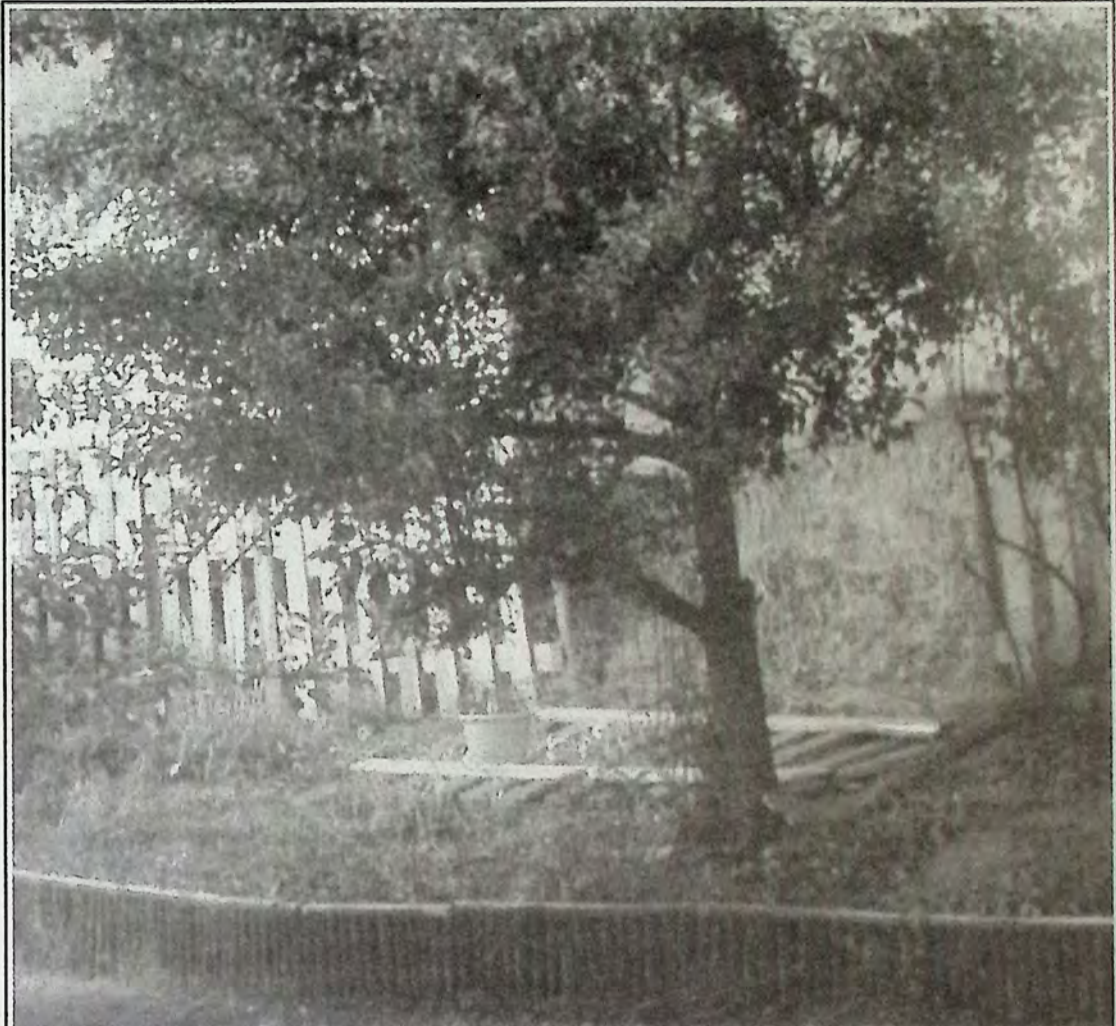

This year we are performing a special feature for the evening - Black Gospel Christmas Musical called "Rejoice". We actually don't need black people - only enthusiastic

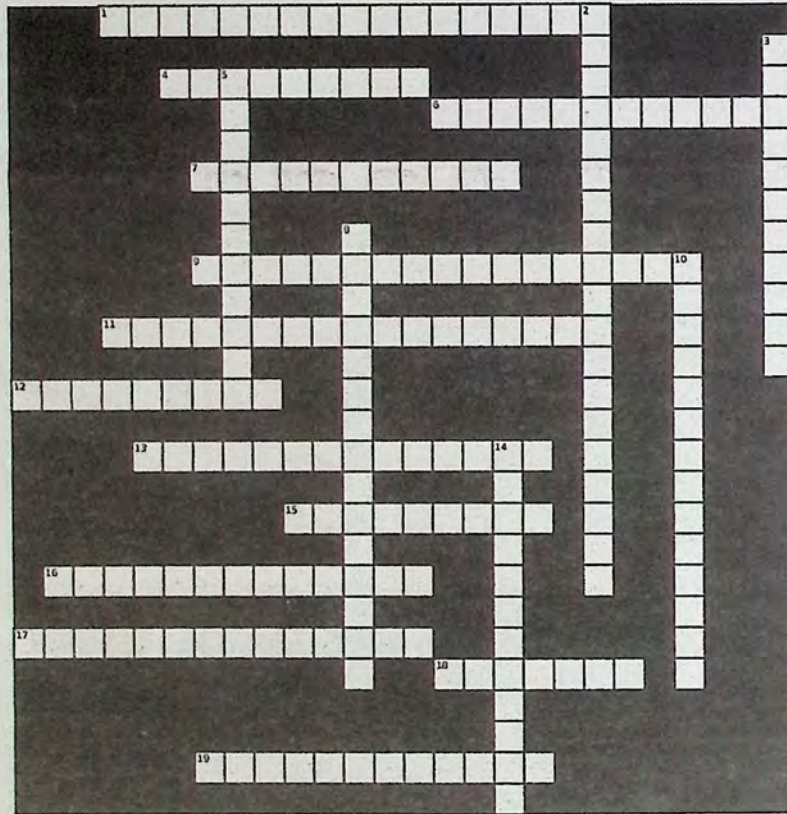

Similkameen Coalfields

Petrobank and two other companies owned coalbed methane rights in the Princeton Coalfield. From 2001 on, residents of Princeton and the surrounding area, objected to coalbed methane development in the coalfield. The company drilled one well in 2005, and a second was postponed because of local protest in 2008. PetroBakken Energy, a Petrobank company, announced June 30, 2011 it was concluding its coalbed gas evaluation program in the Princeton area. A comprehensive evaluation of the results of that first well plus an analysis of existing production technologies showed that the appropriate technology does not yet exist to commercially produce natural gas from this reservoir, so they abandoned the Princeton project. On September 29 crews began to seal off the test well located in a hayfield West of Princeton. In simple terms, a giant 'plug' was placed in the well at a depth of 900-metres. Water and another 'plug' near the surface will act to remove all evidence of the project in the area.

rely on call centers to access key services has also proven to be a huge barrier for many of our clients and staff. Difficulty in making contact and then being left on hold for long periods is difficult for many to cope with and results in financial and emotional distress."

Regionalization of hospital care, Pelly stated, "has also created a significant barrier for those without resources to access services outside the community."

An ongoing problem for the society has been finding and retaining qualified employees for the various programs. The society has made use of some on-line training resources related to diabetes dietary requirements, CPR and medicine administration. A number of work-

shops were offered on a variety of training or educational areas pertinent to staff and volunteers.

Home care is an increasing demand on Community Services because the number of seniors continues to grow. The goal of home support is to keep people living in their own homes as long as possible. As Community Services operates in an area stretching from Tulameen to Hedley, providing home care is a challenge for the society and its workers.

Vermilion Court, an assisted living facility, provides residents with two meals a day as well as activity programs to stimulate the mind, provide social interaction, recreation, health information and physical activity. Residents of Vermilion Court may invite guests

to lunch or dinner (guests pay), which makes having friends over to visit much more like any home environment. Residents also go out to dinner or lunch as they choose, or go on outings or attend community activities such as the music festival or dramatic productions.

During the past year there has been a sharp increase in the number of people receiving meals delivered at home. Meals on Wheels now serves nearly double the number of people in the previous year. Those receiving meals at home pay for one good meal at noon each day.

It is clear the needs of an ageing community are increasing, but they are being met locally, sometimes with difficulty, by Community Services.

This could bring some new life into a struggling party.

It could change if the Conservatives can get their own rising stars. The fight for the centre right vote could really heat up depending on who runs in what riding, and with so many veteran provincial politicians stepping, down the NDP may be the only party with experienced candidates going into many of the ridings.

Any way we look at it, May will be exciting for provincial politics. We still have a lot of time for a lot of missteps and, depending on what happens, we could see the total implosion of one of the parties. All I really know is I wouldn't want to be one of Christy Clark's advisors right now, and I really wouldn't want to be on the executive of the BC Conservatives.

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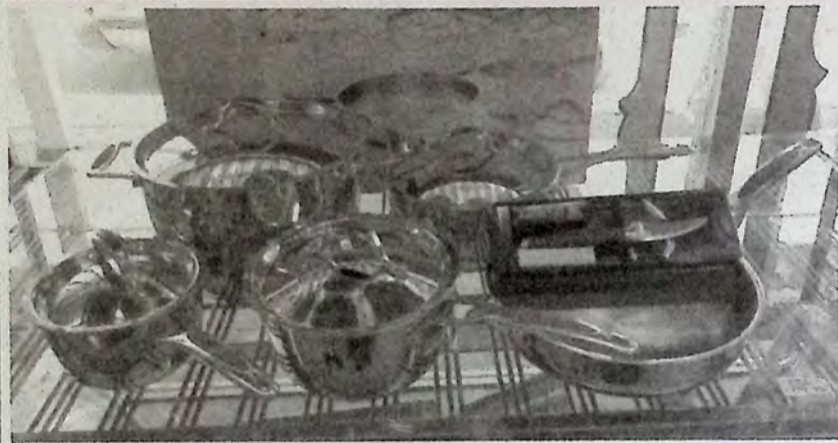
