Museum receives gold rush records

The Princeton and District Museum and Archives is proud to announce the most recent addition to its collection. Brian Kennelly of Quesnel, presented the Museum with original mining record books that predated the discovery of Granite Creek in 1885. Brian's father, Brendan Kennelly, was Government Agent/Gold Commissioner/Mining Recorder in Princeton from 1953 to about 1972.

there wasn't a proper and secure place to store these valuable records so Kennelly decided to keep them in his possession. After his passing, the records went to his son, Brian. On a recent visit to the Princeton and District Museum and Archives, Brian decided that it was time the books he had so carefully looked after were brought back home to Princeton. Nurse practitioners to admit, discharge patients

New regulations will give health authorities the ability to provide nurse practitioners (NPs) with the ability to admit and discharge patients from health-care facilities, working in collaboration with physicians and other health-care providers, announced Health Minister Dr. Margaret MacDiarmid on October 11th. The regulations are expected to help enhance health services and meet patient need by easing congestion and reducing workloads, especially for rural regions. The majori-

ty of NPs in B.C. have the education and competencies required to admit and discharge, but did not have the ability legislated. British Columbia is the second jurisdiction in Canada to have qualified nurse practitioners admit and discharge patients from hospitals, after Ontario. Nurse practitioners were introduced to B.C. in 2005 to assist in improving access to primary health-care services. In fall 2011, the government of British Columbia passed legislation allowing nurse practitioners to work more fully within their existing scope of practice. In May 2012, the provincial government announced a \$22.2 million to fund 190 NPs over the next three years to provide better access to health care for British Columbian

families. NPs meet many health-care needs of the community, increasing access to quality primary and community health care. NPs provide services from a holistic nursing perspective, integrating elements such as diagnosing, prescribing, ordering diagnostic tests for treating most common medical conditions for patients throughout the lifespan. Nurse practitioners also work collaboratively in a broad variety of settings including acute care, residential care, continued on Page 2

Arts Council begins year

Princeton Arts Council President Marjorie Holland called the new Board of Directors together at a lunch meeting on October 11 at a local restaurant. This was the first meeting of the Board elected in September, and further Board meetings will be held as lunch meetings on the third Wednesday of the month. The meeting was primarily an organizational meeting to discuss administrative matters. Members reviewed the financial report, the budget to 2014, and there was some discussion of creating a policy for those groups or individuals wishing to use Arts Council equipment. The use of a store front downtown next to Sunflower Gallery was discussed, and members agreed to an arrangement to make the space available for specified periods of time to artists wishing to display their work, including students taking

Art at Princeton Secondary School. Merrilyn Huycke gave a report on the Artist in Residence Program adopted by various Arts Councils and communities in other areas of Canada. She outlined some of the ways others have established the program and there seems to be no definite specifications followed by these communities, each makes up its own program. Huycke will continue her research into the ways in which communities adapt the program. BC Southern Interior MP, Alex Atamanenko, believes the Minister of Agriculture continued insistence on allowing the meat packing industry to self-regulate is a flawed approach with serious implications to the health and safety of Canadians. "The government says it has hired more food inspectors but we do not know where they are and they certainly were not able to detect and prevent the E-coli breakout at XL Foods," stated Atamanenko on October 12th. "It also appears that serious food

safety issues that were raised in contract negotiations with the company by the United Food & Commercial Workers Union (UFCW) were not taken seriously." A recent statement by UFCW, local continued on Page 21

“Giving nurse practitioners the ability to admit and discharge patients from hospitals will help to both ease congestion and enhance patient quality within the health-care system. This will especially be helpful in rural and remote areas of the province, where recruitment and retention can be particularly challenging,” said Dr. Margaret MacDiarmid, Minister of Health.

“On behalf of the BC Nurse Practitioner Association, I’d like to thank the government of British Columbia for giving nurse practitioners the ability to admit and discharge patients. This will help to enhance health-care services around British Columbia,” stated Rosemary Graham, president, BC

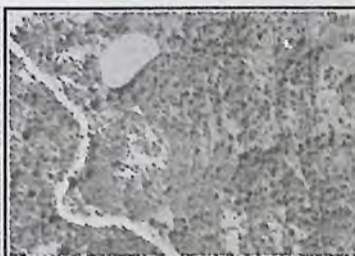

It has been hard not to listen to the news and not hear about this company Huawei and the security threat it might pose to national security. If

you listen to guys like Kevin O'Leary, then you might think the Americans are only being protectionists.

I don't think Mr. O'Leary and others like him are right. There are too many questionable things about Huawei and nearly every security

expert in the western hemisphere is saying the same thing about the company.

More importantly is what the American response will be to these concerns. America is our largest trading partner. If Canada embraces Huawei and America doesn't then we could see a loss in trade revenues or even worse. Canada and the United States share a lot of research and development both corporate and governmental. If Huawei is not treated the same in Canada as in the United States, we will be left in the dark. America will not want to play ball with us if they think that the Chinese government is watching everything we do.

Whether this company is or is not doing what the Americans and

other cyber security agencies are claiming doesn't really matter. It should matter, but it doesn't because the atmosphere in the United States is turning more and more anti-Chinese and the fear that the Chinese government is spying on them is driving the mistrust. As part of NATO, we will have to follow suit with the United States. If we don't we could see ourselves sitting in the cold waiting for the door to reopen again.

There could be a real opportunity for Canadian business with the anti-Chinese sentiment in the United States. At one time Canada was a leader in telecommunications and it could be again. It should be. We have some of the greatest minds in the world and one of the strongest economies in the world.

Unfortunately Nortel collapsed and RIM is on its knees, but with the right investments and the right business plan, we could have another Nortel. Maybe RIM's glory days are over but it could capitalize on its mobile network to strengthen the business application end of things putting it back on top with the business community. WHEREAS, there is a large extent of abandoned Mining Ground at Channel Harvie, of Granite Creek, in the Southwestern Division of Yale District

and such ground cannot be worked effectually without a very large expenditure of money. AND WHEREAS it is requisite that any persons who shall make such expenditure should be enabled to take advantage thereof by having secured to them the exclusive right of extracting for their own benefit, the precious metals contained in the ground rendered workable by their outlay: and whereas the said lessees have applied for a lease for mining purposes

This Mining Lease agreement, dated January 8, 1892, was in one of the original mining record books from Granite Creek recently donated to Princeton Museum. The documents trace the original gold rush at Granite Creek. *

Talk About Your Average Gold Mine

Last Friday Princeton Museum Operations Manager Robin Lowe invited me to view some 'historic documents' recently donated to the facility.

Knowing that I like that sort of thing she wanted to share with me what will ultimately, in my opinion, prove to be the most significant pieces of local history ever preserved.

The hardbound, hand-written records of the mining activity at Granite Creek, in five books, were handed over to the Museum almost a month ago.

I read the very first entry, noted as simply 'Record #1', which detailed the mining activity of five miners working the banks of Granite Creek in the early 1880's. It was signed by Princeton's first white settler J. F. (John Fall) Allison.

I have to admit I got somewhat tingly as Robin shared these documents with me.

In my own search for the mining history of Princeton the best I could find out was that it all started along the banks of Granite Creek.

The first time mining in the area is noted is in the 1885 Annual Report from the Ministry of Mines where Assistant Gold Commissioner J. F. Allison states: "The following returns are from personal knowledge. Granite Creek \$49,000. Tulameen River \$60,000. Similkameen River \$3,500. The above estimate, I think, is far below the actual amount taken out the past season. In the present state of excitement and exaggeration I cannot get reliable information."

No kidding. Miners in those days, much like today, didn't give details away about how they were doing to avoid a lot of things.

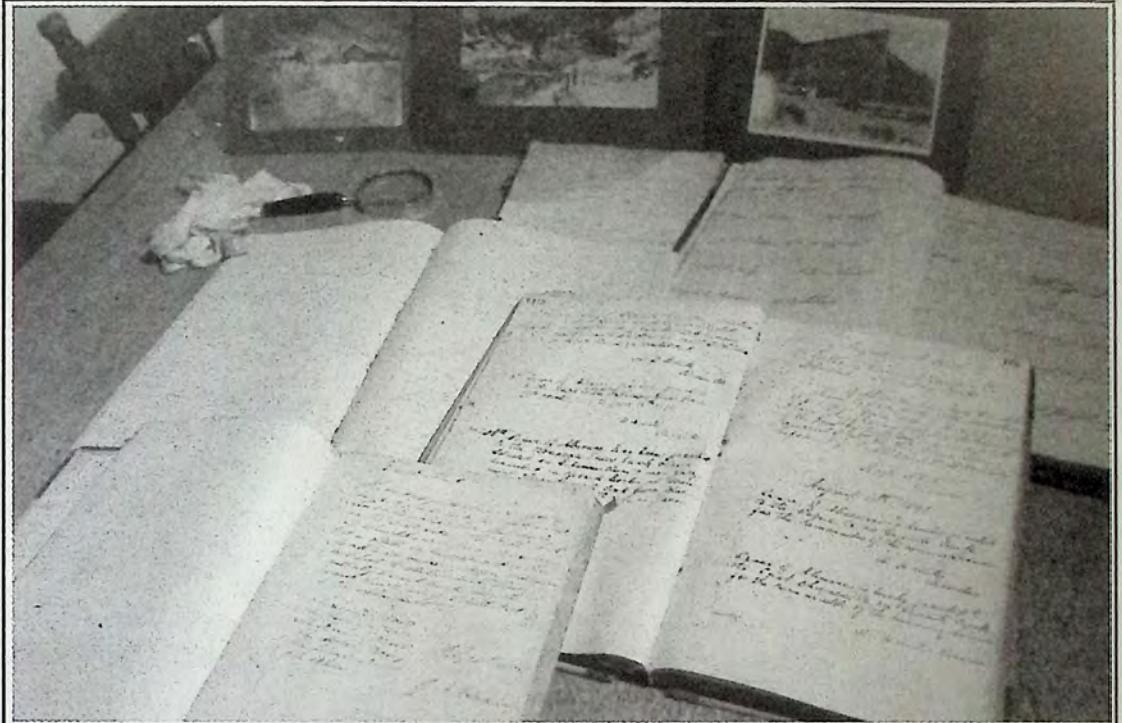
"Discovery claims have been granted on Collins Gulch, Slate Creek, Hines Creek and Eagle Creek, but the season is far too advanced to test the value of these new creeks (the report was dated November 21, 1885). They are tributaries of the Tulameen," Allison stated.

Historians will soon be pouring over the original mining record books looking for verification of much that has already been written about the Similkameen Valley.

As a result, the museum has already started to transcribe the documents into written files so that the information can be available, with the original documents being locked away safely.

I know I can't lay claim to any of the history Robin shared with me last week, but I can say I was able to see proof of what set off the gold rush that lead to the development of the region. I also got a chance to see it before it sets off another rush of activity in the area.

And believe me, these documents will bring more interest to our area.

Are The Feds Real Canadians?

The bid by the Chinese government owned oil company to buy Nexen, one of the companies operating in the tar sands, has raised a lot of questions in the minds of real Canadians. Our federal government has quietly made a trade deal with China without any of us knowing the wording of the deal. Government owned enterprises from other countries have expressed interest in buying Canadian corporations, especially resource-based industries. The questions Canadians have begun asking relate to just how much do we sell to other governments?

There is one parliamentarian who has raised the question long and loud in our House of Commons. Elizabeth May (Green Party) was heckled to resume her seat by, of all people, the New Democrats. Finally, she did receive support from the NDP, but one has to wonder

why a lone voice from a one-woman party was the only voice raised to question making deals with foreign governments allowing them control over Canadian natural resources.

Elizabeth May has raised an issue that goes to the grassroots of what real Canadians think. We ordinary Canadians feel we were stung by the NAFTA (read SHAFITYA) deal. May has raised concerns, in her blog, about the possibility of similar dangers when foreign government-owned corporations want to buy into our natural resources. All of us regular Canadians have begun to wonder whether Ottawa sees all our assets as something Canada can sell to foreigners or assets to make more trade deals to our disadvantage.

I believe it is time we started to question our politicians as to whether they are real Canadians or merely puppets whose strings are being pulled by foreign interests. I know lobbyists are willing to provide a lot of perks to Members of Parliament who vote for bills the lobbyists want passed. This is no secret, and sometimes the pay-off does not come while the politician is in office, it comes after the next election in the form of well-paid seats on corporate boards of directors. If the lobbyists represent the interests of foreign governments, is it in the best interest of Canadians to give them what they ask for?

A few months ago, I wrote about

revelations made in a book called Confessions of an Economic Hit Man. One of the nations he wrote about was Iceland, brought to its knees in the economic downturn of 2008. Iceland's response is a lesson to all of us. The Icelandic people called for an election and turfed out the government that sank them into the economic mess, then made some changes to their constitution to prevent foreign investors ever ruining their economy again. In the meantime, they refused to bail out their banks and charged a number of bank officials with crimes related to fraudulent conduct of banking business.

Iceland borrowed money from IMF to help their economy. The money went to paying off debts, but it also went to helping ordinary citizens pay off debts, offering them mortgage protection and other economic incentives to keep the economy going. Today, Iceland is well into recovery. The government has put the people of Iceland first, assisting them in developing their own businesses and resources. The anticipated growth of their economy this year is 2.8 percent, better than most industrialized nations.

Putting the nation's citizens at the top of the government agenda was good for Iceland's economy. Our federal government should be doing the same thing, but we really have to wonder whether they really understand what it means to be a real Canadian citizen.

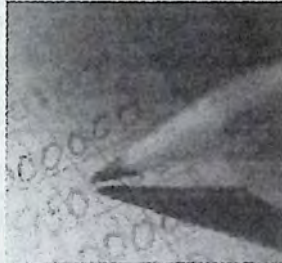

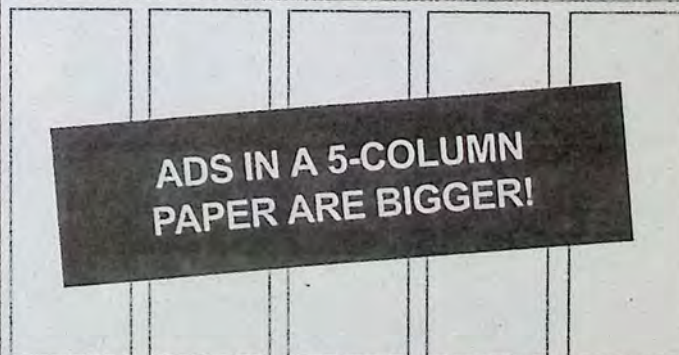

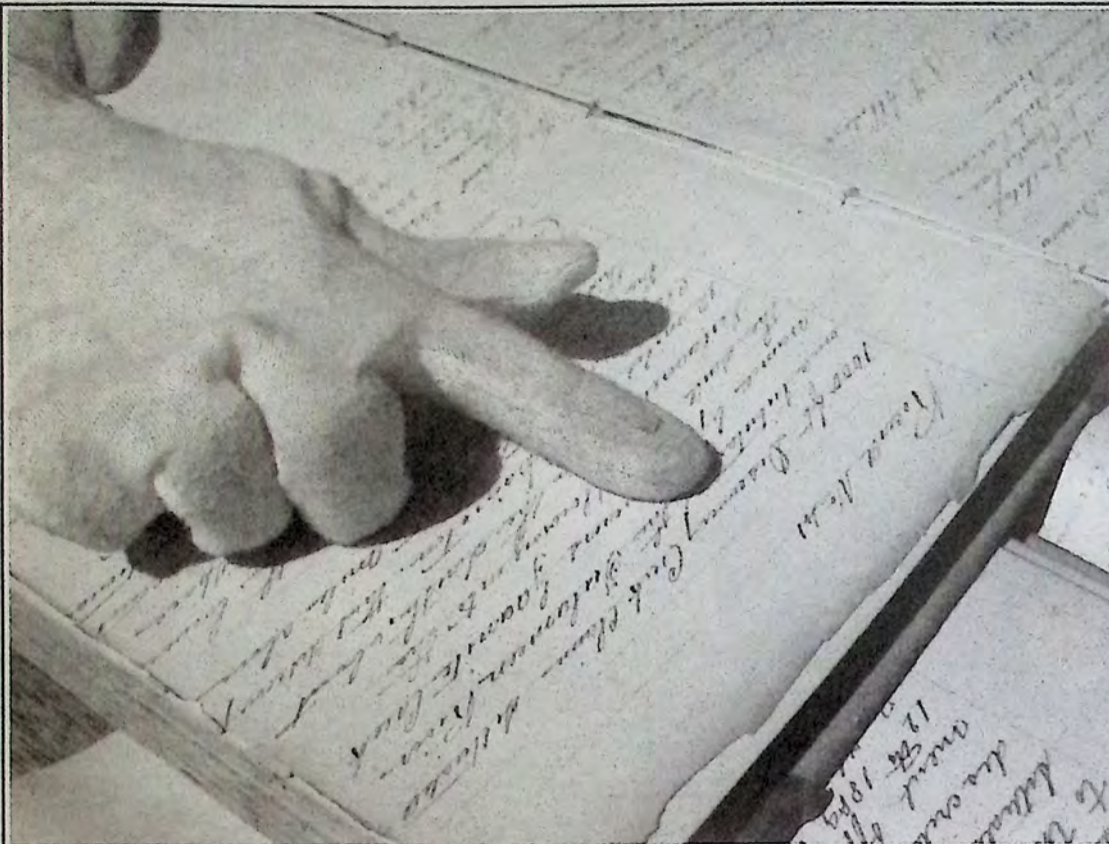

This is a significant find!

Last month Brian Kennelly of Quesnel donated a few volumes of records to the Princeton Museum.

His father, Brendan, was the Government Agent, Gold Commissioner, Mining Recorder in Princeton from 1953 to the early 1970s and in the building he worked out of on Vermilion Avenue were five hardbound record books dating back to the early 1880s. As there was no secure place to store and preserve these volumes of written history, the senior Kennelly kept them stored with his personal possessions and after his passing were inherited by his son.

The records document each and every mining claim recorded during what became known as the Granite Creek Gold Rush.

To give you an idea of where these books fit into the puzzle of the history of Princeton here is a short lesson on the history of Princeton:

In 1858 an Englishman named John Fall Allison was a miner who traveled from California to British Columbia seeking his fortune in the Fraser River Gold Rush. By 1860 he was one of close to 100 white miners who wintered in the Similkameen Valley.

Later that year, Allison pre-empted 320 acres at Vermilion Forks (later Prince Town and Princeton) and in doing so became the area's first white settler. He was appointed Justice of the Peace in 1876 and was the first Gold Commissioner of the newly designated Similkameen Mining District, first mentioned in Ministry of Mines Annual Reports in 1885.

The Similkameen Mining District was established primarily "in

response to the Tulameen Gold Rush at the emergent boomtown of Granite Creek."

When gold was found in the Upper Similkameen River in 1860 it attracted miners from the Fraser River and California who were looking for richer fields to explore which lead to the development of Blackfoot, located about 11-kilometres southwest of Princeton. At the time, 100 miners were there.

The discovery of gold in Granite Creek in 1885 set off a gold rush that saw 900 miners in the area six months later and a year later Granite had a population of 2,000 – the largest city in British Columbia at the time.

That 'chance' discovery has always been credited to a prospector by the name of Johnny Chance. Other names connected to Chance and the start of the Granite Creek Gold Rush were E. M. Allison, 'Wild Goose' Bill Jenkins and Thomas Curry.

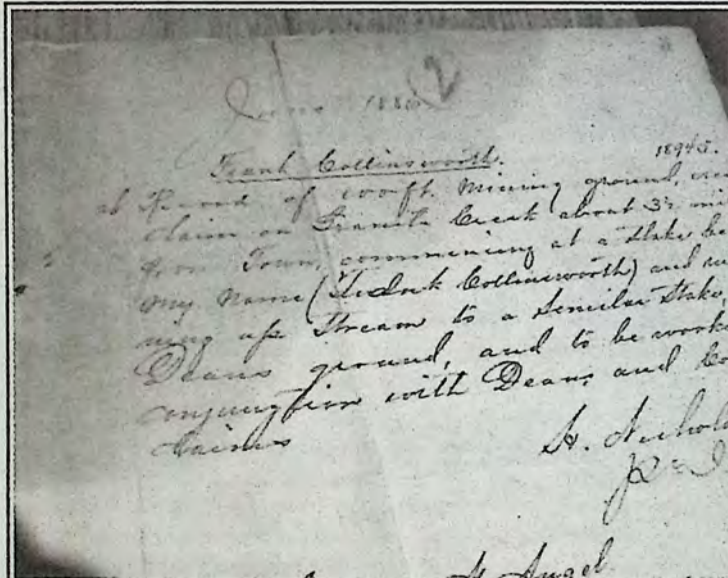
Record #41 in the mining records gifted to Princeton Museum is that very claim with the names listed with their mining certificate numbers: "Thom. Jenkins 20466, J. M. Chance 20465, Thos. Curry 4093, E. M. Allison 20479."

The entry is dated July 8, 1885 and is signed by J. F. Allison.

Record #1 is for a claim two and a half miles above Princeton on the North Fork of the Similkameen River granted to five Chinese miners dated July 28, 1883.

The significance of these original mining records will likely not be realized until the word gets out that they are now housed in Princeton Museum.

Expect another gold rush to take off once it becomes common knowledge as historians and more will seek out the volumes of hand-written history. They will explore and seek out details of the history of the area and start a rush of information mining.

Get The Facts About The Flu Shot

Flu season is approaching and public health nurses across Interior Health are gearing up for the launch of this year's influenza (flu) vaccination campaign.

Public flu clinics will begin in some communities the week of October

15th.

"There are many myths and misconceptions about the flu shot so it's important for people to get accurate information to help them stay healthy," said Dr. Rob Parker, Medical Health Officer with Interior

Health.

"For example, the flu shot cannot give you the flu. The vaccine used in B.C. contains dead influenza viruses that cannot cause infection."

Influenza is a highly contagious infection and can be very serious, especially for those with heart, lung and other health problems. In years when influenza is widespread in B.C., hundreds of people may die from influenza or its complications, such as pneumonia.

"The two most important ways to protect yourself from getting the flu are to wash your hands frequently and get your flu shot," said Dr. Parker.

"Flu vaccinations are a proven, safe and effective way to reduce your chances of getting the flu. The flu shot also lessens the severity of symptoms for those who do get the flu."

In B.C. the flu vaccine is free for:

- People 65 years and older and their caregivers/household contacts,
- All children age 6 to 59 months of age,
- Household contacts and caregivers of infants age 0 to 59 months of age,
- Children and adults with chronic health conditions and their household contacts,
- Aboriginal people,
- Children & adolescents (6 months to 18 years) with conditions treated for long periods of time with Aspirin® or ASA and their household contacts,
- Residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities,
- Pregnant women who will be in their third trimester during influenza

GM Corn And Breast Cancer: Are They Linked?

A research group in France recently made world news with the release of a study done by feeding laboratory rats a diet of genetically modified (GM) corn, with a control group of rats fed with no GM corn. Their study claims the rats fed GM corn developed cancers, particularly mammary (breast) cancers. This study created a lot of alarm.

GM corn has had its genes changed so the corn does not die when the field is sprayed with a weed killer called Round-Up. The corn contains the weed killer because it is able to absorb the weed killer without dying from it. Therefore, when livestock or humans eat GM corn, the weed killer is part of what is eaten. The fact that the rats developed mammary cancers from this diet was what caused the public concern.

Another research group in France has criticized the study and says it fails to prove the diet is the cause of the cancers, despite the fact that the control group of rats, eating no GM products, did not develop those cancers. However, Russia accepted the study and immediately put a ban on importing any GM corn.

Whether or not GM corn will cause breast cancer in female humans has not been proven.

Although the production of GM corn is not allowed in Canada, the government of Canada has so far refused to demand labelling of GM products, Canadians have no way of knowing whether the cornstarch or corn flakes they buy are not produced from GM corn, although buying strictly from health food stores and insisting on an organic product may be one line of defense.

People who have pets or livestock may be feeding products that include corn, but without labelling, there is no guarantee that there is no GM corn in those products, as corn is sold as a commodity and may go through several transactions before being included in products we buy.

Each Canadian is going to have to make an individual decision about what they buy.

Peanut Butter and Roasted Strawberry Canapés

(NC)—This reduced-sugar twist on the classic peanut butter and jelly sandwich was created for those who live with diabetes—and for those who simply love this lunchtime classic. More tasty recipes can be found at www.peanutbureau.ca. Makes 24 canapés.

Ingredients:

- 3 cups (750 mL) strawberries, hulled and sliced
- 2 tsp (10 mL) cornstarch
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) maple syrup
- 2 tsp (10 mL) balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) freshly ground pepper
- 1/4 tsp (1 mL) sea salt (optional)
- 34 whole grain baguette (about 1/2 lb/250 g), sliced into 24 thin slices
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) natural smooth peanut butter

Directions:

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F (180°C). Line a large, rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Toss the strawberries with the cornstarch. Stir in the maple syrup, balsamic vinegar, pepper and salt (if using). Spread evenly on the prepared sheet.
2. Roast the strawberries in the oven for 30 minutes or until softened and juices have thickened on the sheet. Scrape the strawberries and any juices into a bowl.
3. Meanwhile, bake the baguette on a second baking sheet for 5 minutes, or until lightly toasted, turning once. Cool to room temperature.
4. Spread about 1 tsp (5 mL) peanut butter on each slice of toasted baguette. Top each with a spoonful of the strawberry mixture.

Per serving (2 canapés): 146 calories, 6 g fat, 1 g saturated fat, 0 mg cholesterol, 124 mg sodium, 18 g carbohydrates, 3 g fibre, 7 g sugars, 5 g protein. Source of fibre. Note: If you add the optional sea salt, the sodium increases to 158 mg per serving.

Tips:

- If strawberries aren't in season, substitute 3 cups (750 mL) unsweetened, individually quick frozen sliced strawberries. Spread out on a baking sheet lined with paper towel until thawed. Roast for 20 minutes.
- Reserve any leftover roasted strawberries in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 4 days. The toasted baguette can be stored in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 2 days.
- The strawberries are also delicious when spooned over a yogurt parfait or frozen yogurt as an occasional treat.

Museum receives gold rush records

..... continued from front page numbers and descriptions of various claims in the Granite Creek area. Of significant importance is the very first claim – the Discovery Claim by Johnny Chance, William Jenkins, Thomas Curry and E.M. Allison – on Granite Creek in 1885. The records appear to be relatively complete except for one month which is missing in 1886.

Brian Kennelly also donated a 40 page book of hand-written court records of decisions mostly pertaining to small claims court and mining infractions including some recorded at Granite Creek on June 16, 1886. Bound copies of the Government Gazettes for 1914 and 1915 were also given to the Museum.

So what can be gleaned from these 127 year old records? We can learn the names and numbers of all the miners (including the elusive

Chinese miners) from the early Granite Creek days, their claims, company and stakeholders' names, location of claims and money that changed hands. We can also learn the original names of some of the streams and creeks in the area.

With this information new maps can be created to accurately illustrate where all the original Granite Creek mines were. These valuable books will allow us to glimpse back into the past and learn more about the rich mining history of the Granite Creek area.

In order to prevent further deterioration, volunteers will carefully transcribe all the records into a database which will eventually be available to researchers and families interested in the history of Granite Creek.

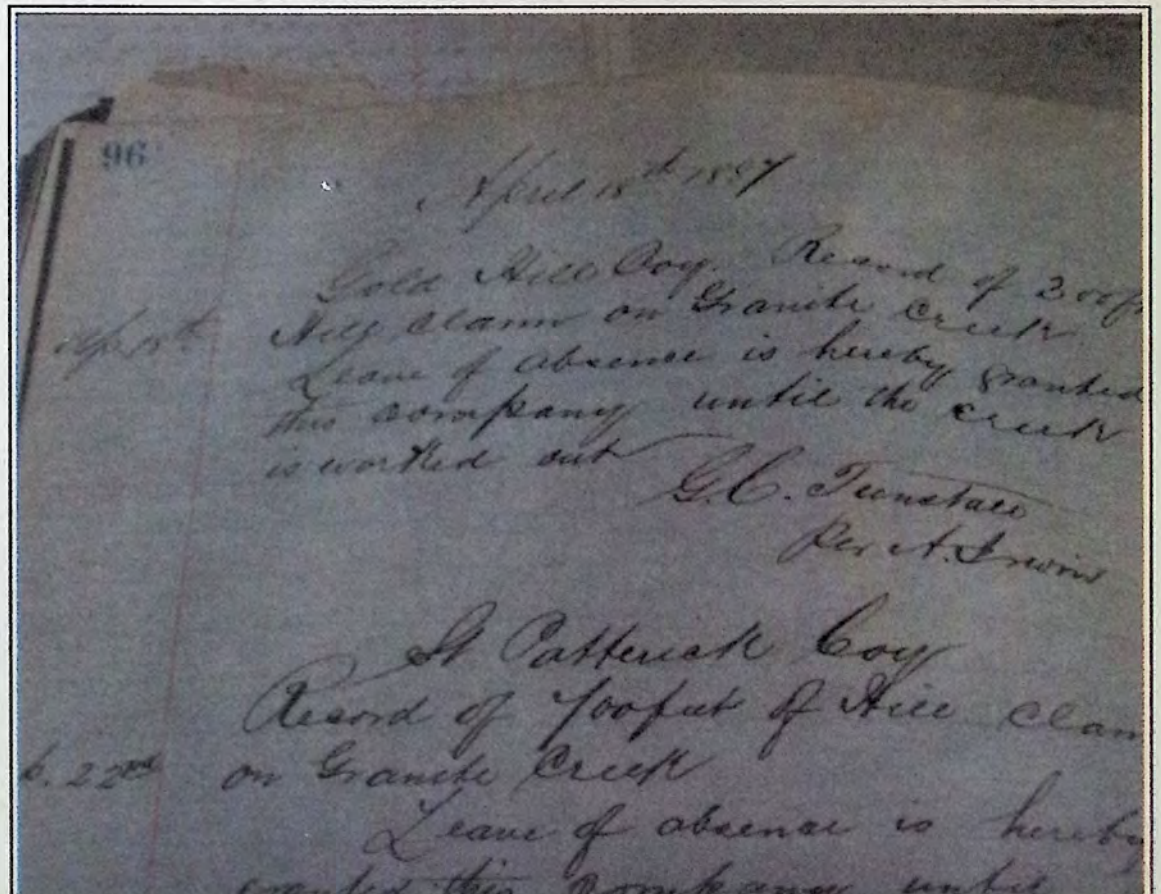

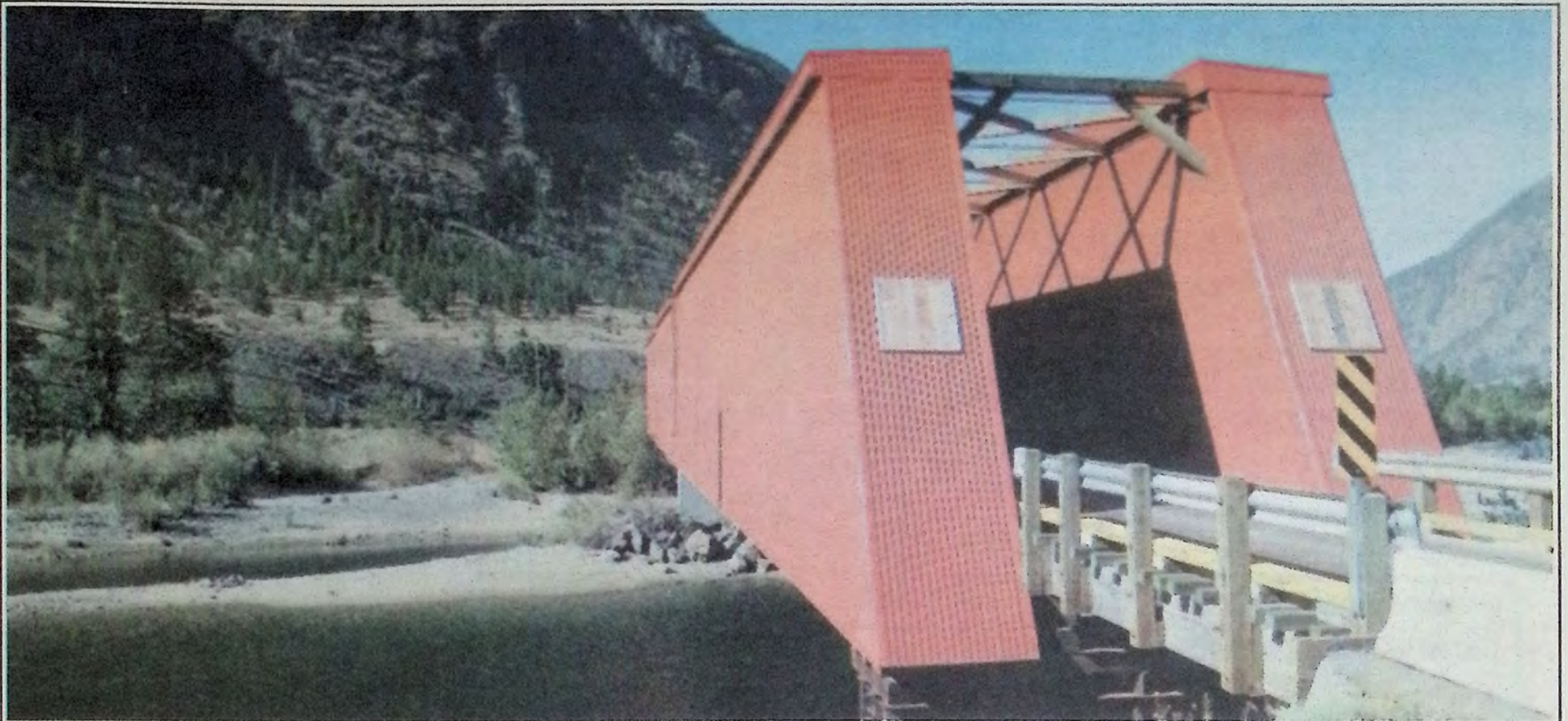

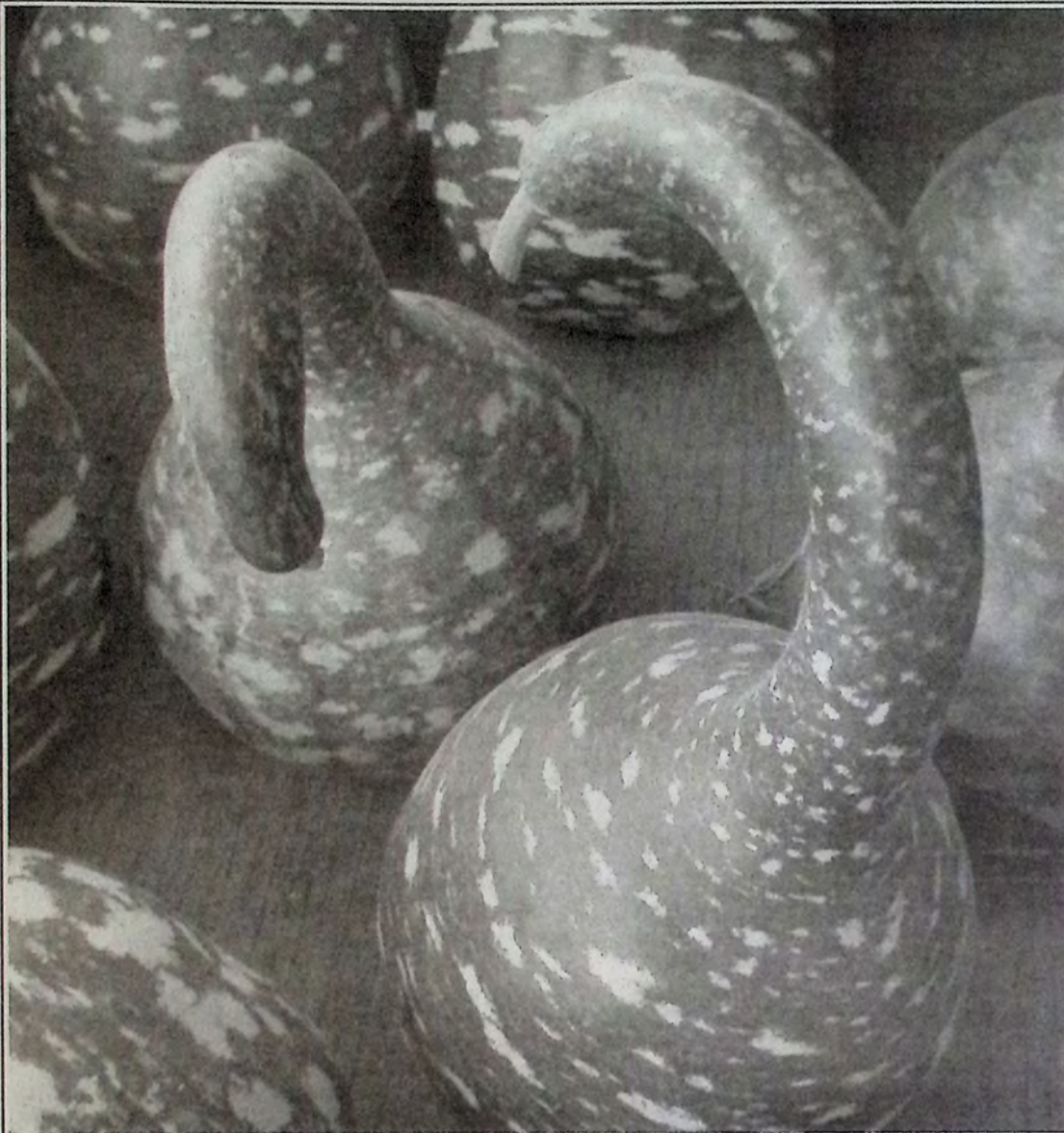

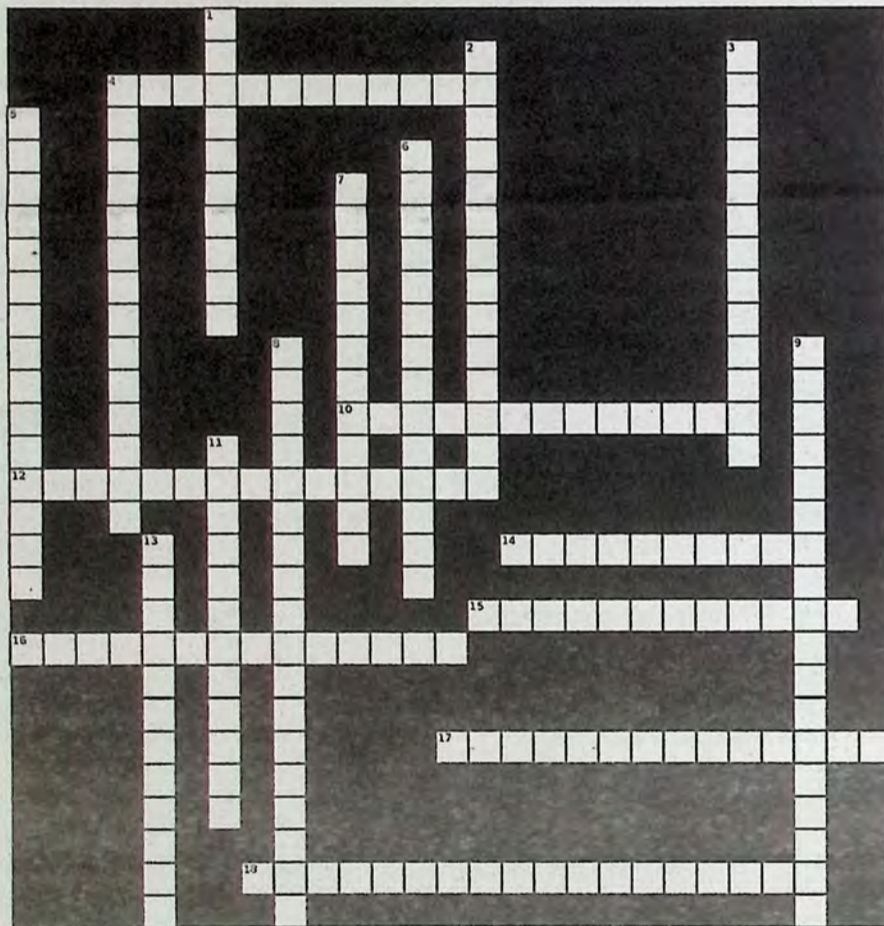

..... continued from Page 8 season and their household contacts (pregnant women who are in other high risk groups can be immunized at any time during the pregnancy).

- People who are very obese (BMI > 40),
- Health-care and other care providers in facilities and community settings who are capable of transmitting influenza disease to those at high risk of influenza complications,
- People who provide essential community services (First Responders, Corrections Workers),
- Inmates of provincial correctional institutions,
- People who work with live poultry and/or swine,
- Individuals who provide care or service in potential outbreak settings housing high risk persons (e.g., crew on ships).

"Everyone can benefit from a flu shot. Even if you don't become severely ill, getting the flu can mean several missed days of school or work and you may pass it on to someone who is at greater risk," said Dr. Parker.

"The flu shot is anywhere from 60 to 90 per cent effective in preventing

influenza and if you don't get it you can't spread it."

People not eligible for the free flu vaccine through the publicly-funded program should contact their physician, local pharmacy, walk-in clinic, travel clinic or private provider.

To find a flu clinic near you, watch for local announcements on dates and times in your community, visit www.interiorhealth.ca (under Your Health > Immunization > 2012 Seasonal Flu Campaign /SeasonalFluCampaign/Pages/default.aspx) for a complete listing or contact your local public health office. Many physician offices and pharmacies also provide vaccines free to those who are eligible.

MP speaks out on food safety

..... continued from Front Page 401 outlined ongoing safety concerns at XL Foods including, production line speeds, carcasses stored too close together in coolers, workers being discouraged from sterilizing their knives between cuts, an overemphasis on quantity and a lack of support for workers in Quality Control positions. The Union representing workers at the XL plant in Brooks have also confirmed that workers have been scared into refusing to report food safety issues at the plant.

"With a government ideology to promote self-regulation and a culture of fear in a company that disregards the safety concerns of its workers we have the perfect recipe for disaster", added the NDP MP.

"Front line workers should not have to worry about being punished if they come forward with information to protect the safety of our food."

Atamanenko says it is ironic that in the name of safety, regulatory changes in recent years have forced the closures of many small slaughter facilities who could not afford the cost of new infrastructure requirements.

"As a result, the Canadian packing business is largely concentrated in 3 major plants. Two of these - Maple Leaf Foods and now XL - have since been associated with listeriosis and E-coli outbreaks that have led to illness and even death for some Canadians."

The NDP Agriculture critic, Malcolm Allen says the Minister of Agriculture, Gerry Ritz, needs to understand the problems at this plant and should be more honest with Canadians.

"Canadians have lost confidence in the Minister. They're tired of Conservative excuses and inaction and it is time for him to step down," stated Allen. - submitted

Chiefs/Posse game ends two streaks

Princeton Posse hosted Kelowna Chiefs October 13th in a game that could have extended the 4-game winning streak of the home team. It could have also added to the 4-game losing streak of the visitors, but that did not happen.

The last place in their division Kelowna Chiefs battled the second place Princeton Posse as if the game was between two teams that were more evenly matched than they were.

And it was the weaker team (on paper) that came out on top.

Kelowna scored first on the power play at 15:12 of the first period (Bryce Koch from Jordan Salahor).

The visitors added to their lead with another goal at 5:33 of the second period. Credit for that one went to Kevin Lenzin with assists going to Jordan Lingel and Riley Stewart.

At the end of that period amid a crowd of players in front of the Princeton goal, Kelowna's Kevin Lenzin was assessed a minor for cross checking.

Chief Head Coach Ken Andrusiak didn't like that call and waited until he was only steps away from leaving the ice surface when he turned around and aired his disgust at the officials, who were about the same distance from their dressing room at the opposite end of Princeton Arena.

Andrusiak's comment was made loud enough that not only did every person in the building hear it; it was likely audible on the Posse webcast, in the parking lot and as far as parts of downtown Princeton.

Just before the puck dropped to start the final period in the game, referee Lyle Hinds issued a game misconduct to Andrusiak, which prompted a repeat of the first comment, only this time from the players box.

When the game of hockey resumed, Princeton scored at 15:17. Kurtis Bond got the goal with assists going to Tyler Roberge and Jonathan Forrest.

The last five to eight minutes of the

period were the most exciting of the entire game with Princeton frantically trying to tie the game and Kelowna frantically trying to prevent that from happening.
