Court House: What now?

Service BC is moving from the Court House to a location in Princeton Plaza. As the Town owns the Court House, Council was questioned about the move during question period at the October 15 Council meeting.

Council said it was Service BC's decision to move their operation. Council did not ask them to leave, did not charge high rent, and has no plans for future use of the Court House facility. At this time, the building is under assessment as to what it could be used for and what

alterations or renovations may be required or desirable.

The Court House was previously occupied by a Court Registry, Forest Service office, and a Wildlife Branch office, as well as Service BC. It is currently still used for the monthly court services and Conservation Officer accommodation. The building is old, dating back to the 1920's, and was occupied originally by the court, the government agent, the gold commissioner, a magistrate, provincial police, and a jail in the basement.

Council changes Chamber deal

At the October 15 Town Council meeting, the terms for funding Princeton's Chamber of Commerce were changed. Rather than have a three year agreement with the Chamber, the Town will pay the Chamber a \$25,000 fee for service on an annual basis, subject to conditions for the Chamber.

The fee for service covers tourist information and promoting of Princeton and area. The service agreement outlines the standard of service expected by Town Council.

The Chamber of Commerce is expected to submit monthly financial statements and minutes as well as a copy of the monthly statistical information sent to Tourism BC. For the year of the term, the Chamber will provide Town Council with financial statements that include projects and actual budgets for the services the Chamber provides. Once a year, before April 30, the Chamber will appear before Council at a regular Council meeting and give a report on the prior year's activities and current projected activities.

The agreement includes a Schedule A which specifies the services the Town expects the Chamber to provide.

They are:

- Greet and assist visitors
- answer all tourism related enquiries
- provide accurate, high quality information
- satisfy visitor needs or interests to encourage longer stays

- encourage visitors to spend money and make return visits
- promote local attractions and events which can motivate visitors to stay longer
- collect visitor data to determine who visitors are, their origins, their

- activities, their length of stay and the activities or needs requested
 - provide visitor data to community businesses
 - encourage development of the tourism industry in the community

Council approves tourist \$\$\$

The Town of Princeton was approved for up to \$9,200 for tourism promotion, \$4,000 of which was allocated to the air show. In the meantime, the Town was a participant in the Thompson Okanagan Tourist Association project to develop a marketing strategy for the Similkameen Valley along with other communities in the valley.

The marketing strategy called for an image bank of photographs of the valley.

These were done by a professional photographer for specific photographs, and through a call for usable photographs taken by private individuals.

On October 11, Town Council considered a request for \$2,000 to hire a

photographer to take photographs in the Princeton area in the winter. Council proposed taking \$1,000 of the air show money and adding \$1,000.

Councillor Jason Earle questioned the need for winter photographs, asking whether the project had exhausted the supply of winter photographs offered by local people.

Councillor Kim Maynard replied that the photographs offered to the project were not what the image bank needed. Councillors voted to spend the money.

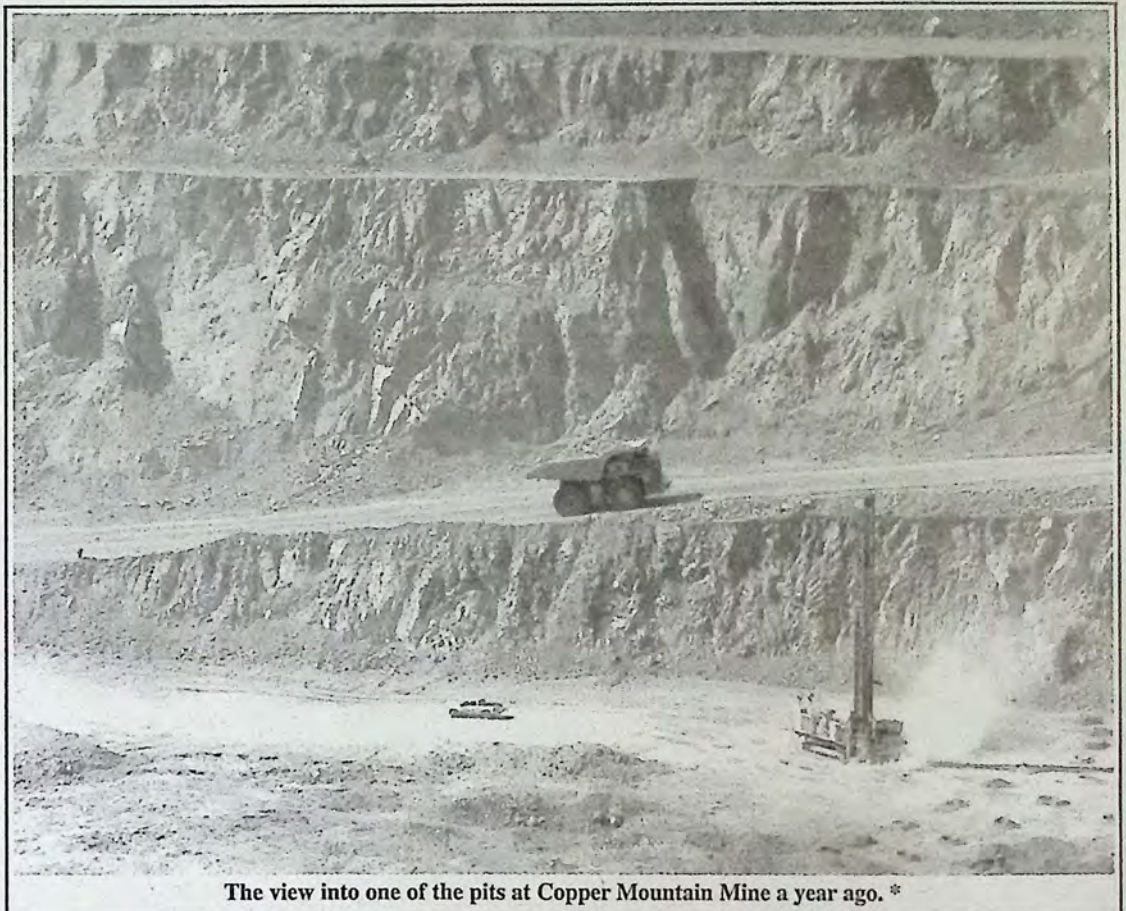

Copper Mountain Mine

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the "Company" or "Copper Mountain") announced October 16th production results for the third quarter of 2012 from the recently opened Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia.

During the third quarter of 2012 the mine completed a total of three shipments of copper concentrate, to smelters in Japan, containing approximately 12.1 million pounds of copper, 3,400 ounces of gold, and 81,800 ounces of silver. Gross sale value, based on provisional pricing is estimated at \$48.3 million prior to pricing adjustments. Production from the mill during the quarter was 12.5 million pounds of copper, 4,315 ounces of gold, and 77,166 ounces of silver, the higher gold content is the result of increased ore from Pit #2.

As previously announced on September 17th the ramp up to full production has taken longer than expected. Mill operating time was negatively impacted during the third quarter due to SAG mill grate replacements and extensive tailings line maintenance, both of which are now complete. Following the

planned mill maintenance shutdown at the start of August; whereby the recently received newly designed grates were installed in the SAG mill, and electrical modification to the ball mill motors were made, as well as repairs to the tailings line, unscheduled downtime has been decreased providing confidence that the mill can operate at the planned 92 percent availability. Subsequent to the planned maintenance shut down in early August, the Company has attained design mill throughput.

From a mining point of view, the addition of the extra mining equipment announced earlier this year has assisted in increasing the mining capacity and has also allowed flexibility in mine planning. Mining in Pit 2 has been accelerated to be developed in parallel with Pit 3, as part of the new mine optimization plan. Mine production is continuing above the planned rate of 160,000 tpd.

In addition, during the quarter the Company continued with its 2012 exploration program which forms the first part of a larger three year exploration strategy for the property. The objectives of the exploration program are threefold: determina-

tion of the potential long-term pit limits, conversion of resources to reserves in order to assist with near to mid-term mine planning and continued exploration of outlying or new areas of mineralization. There are currently two diamond drills on the property which are focused on mineralization at depth in the southern end of Pit 3 and around Pit 2. Results will continue to be released as drilling progresses. *About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:*

Copper Mountain is a Canadian resource company managed by an experienced team of professionals with a solid track record of exploration and development success. The Company's shares trade on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the symbol "CUM". Copper Mountain owns 75% and Mitsubishi Materials Corporation owns 25% of the Copper Mountain Mine.

The 18,000 acre mine site is located 20-kilometres south of Princeton. The Copper Mountain Mine has a current resource of approximately 5 billion pounds of copper and recently commenced production. Additional information is available on the Company's new web page at www.CuMtn.com.

2012 FLUSHING OF SEWER LINES

The Town of Princeton will commence a sewer line flushing and video inspection program within the municipality starting the week of October 23rd, 2012. Periodic flushing is undertaken to prevent the buildup of sediment which may result in blockages. This work will take approximately two (2) weeks to complete.

Sewer line flushing may result in some splashing from the toilet if the sewer system in your building is not adequately vented. To avoid any inconvenience, it is suggested that you place your toilet lid in the down position, with a garbage bag or piece of plastic placed beneath it.

Call Before You Dig, Stupid!

I live in a Strata in Keremeos. We - the original six - are three duplexes, constituting six homes. We - the original six - have natural gas fireplaces. There is a visible, flimsy plastic sign marking the gas pipeline on the street at the west end of our complex and another flimsy but visible sign outside the fence at the east end of the complex.

Ask any child who can read if they know what "Call Before You Dig" means. They have likely seen the sign somewhere in their own neighbourhood. Warning signs are to warn us. ALL OF US.

There is another Strata immediately north of my Strata. Recently, Harris Transport of Keremeos was contacted by the "other" Strata to locate and repair a small, perpetual

water leak in the irrigation system of the "other" Strata. On October 17th, an employee of Harris Transport asked a couple of people in the "other" Strata whether they have gas appliances. The apparent reply was in the negative. In that vein, it could reasonably be assumed that no-one in the "other" Strata has gas appliances.

As the story goes (I wasn't home at the time, but I checked with three of my neighbours, one of whom was witness to the event in question), the employee of Harris Transport decided on his own accord that it was safe to dig with his backhoe.

Some history: The same General Contractor built both Strata complexes between 2003 and 2007. When the gas pipeline was installed, it was brought into the vacant lot that he owned immedi-

ately north of me. That same General Contractor built the "other" Strata a couple of years later on that vacant lot. The units were built without incident, even with the gas pipeline running beneath their property.

Plans change. Even though the units in both Stratas look exactly the same to the undiscerning eye, and even though I believe the intention was to service both Stratas with gas, the "other" Strata was built with electric, not gas fireplaces (the latter are more expensive to install). The homes in the "other" Strata also don't have big, bulky, grey, cast iron meter boxes with pipes attached at the back of their homes.

Back to recent history: Those big, bulky, grey, cast iron meter boxes would have been clearly visible to the Harris Transport employee had he looked over the fence between the properties. In fact, as he dug, he was a mere 20 feet from one of those big, bulky, grey meter boxes. He was 30 feet from the big, bulky, grey meter box at the back of my house. Perhaps there is a reason why the grey boxes don't get painted to match the homes that the boxes service. Perhaps they are supposed to be "noticed".

Our Society Encourages Bullies

We live in a society in which the acceptance of bullying has been part of the fabric of how things have been done. The law of Canada bullied our indigenous people by placing them on Indian Reserves, sending their children to residential schools where the children were bullied, and bullying them by denying our native people the economic means to survive. This was legislated bullying on a major scale and most Canadians calmly went along with the law. If any of them saw it as bullying, then there were few who raised their voices in objection.

Unions know all about bullying by employers, and until Canada adopted good labour legislation, employers often hired people to bully union members, even to the point of killing them. Behind the labour movement and the formation of unions was the bullying by employers through economic means. Pay the people so little they cannot afford to live barely above survival level. Meanwhile, make the highest profit you can and use influence to control politicians and legislation. Bullying on

the job took many forms in addition to inadequate wages. Often, the form of bullying was physical and for women, sexual. It was the way things were, and most people accepted it and went along with it.

Our society today is just barely emerging from this legacy in which bullying was acceptable. Today, bullying still exists in the form of economic power and influence, such as lobbyists who influence legislators on behalf of some giant corporation, and unions who use the voting power of their membership to influence politicians. It is all a form of bullying.

The basis for bullying is the need for the power to influence and/or control others. Our society has been established on the basis of "who's the boss?" We see it in the patriarchal family, where the man rules the wife and children, and his word is not to be questioned. We see it in classrooms where teachers or professors do not permit any questioning of any authority. We see it in religions where questioning of the faith or failure to adhere to the rules of the religion can result in being cast out and in some religions, death (Jesus found out how dangerous it is to question religious authority!). We see it in the military, where authority is not to be questioned.

These are the obvious forms of bullying built into the structure of our society. There are more subtle forms of bullying, such as flaunting material success by having the biggest, most elaborately decorated house or the most expensive car or the biggest boat or the most snowmobiles. These are material things that give a show of power.

If we think children do not pick up on these subtle things, and do not learn from them, then we are being deliberately blind. The ability to hurt the weakest member of the group gives the strongest or meanest member the opportunity to display power over others. It is this need that the structure of our society encourages.

In some societies, the development of inner power takes precedence over the display of power over others, but from what I have seen of our society, until we change the way our society is structured, we are going to have bullies among us as individuals and groups seek to display their power over others.

A recent teenage suicide has inspired many rallies against bullying, but I doubt it will stop bullies because our society is structured to not only accept bullying, but even to encourage it.

What I have just stated may offend many people, but I can defend my statement with many examples of the kind of bullying we encourage. I have had teachers who were bullies, employers who were bullies, neighbours who were bullies. I have seen husbands who bullied their wives and children, and youngsters who bullied each

"If you become ill, phone 911. Contact the ambulance service. Let the health care system work for you."

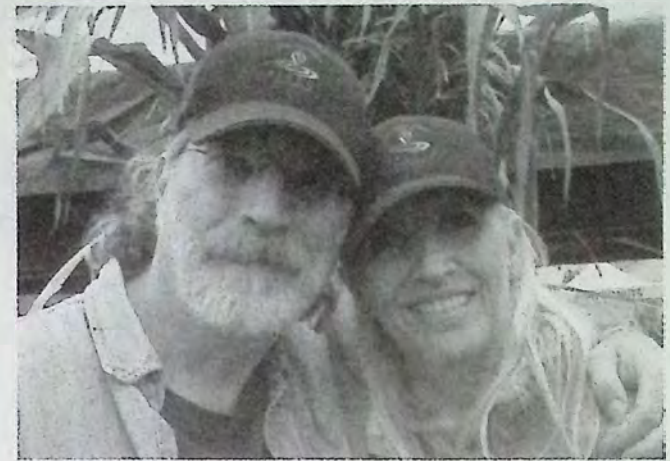
A meeting at Princeton Co-Gen was another unusual gathering which the mayor was specifically requested to attend.

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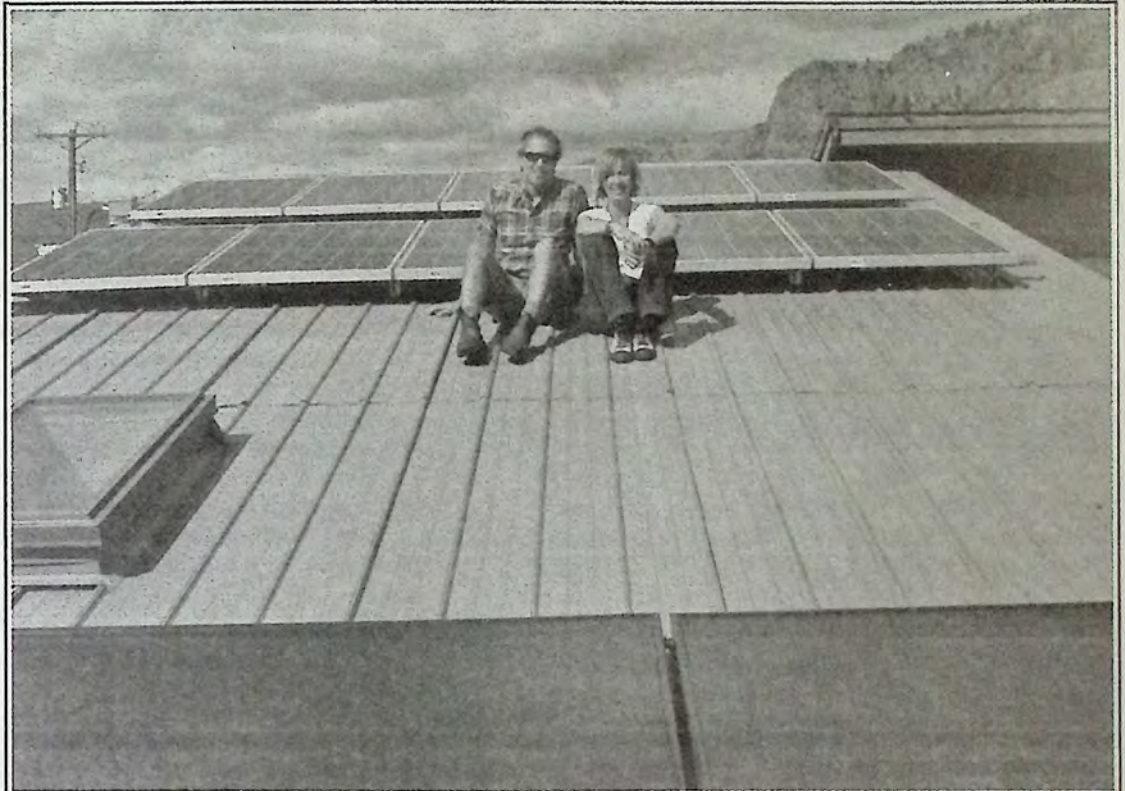

Orofino launches solar power project

Co-owners John and Virginia Weber of Orofino Winery in Cawston are proud to announce the completion of a significant solar project that will convert all power consumption of its public tasting building from traditional power sources to solar power.

The project uses a unique hybrid system of solar photovoltaic panels and a solar thermal water heating system. The system was designed and constructed by Swiss Solar Tech from Summerland who are leaders in solar technology implementation in the province.

"Orofino is Canada's only strawbale constructed winery," says Virginia Weber.

"Energy and eco-efficiency has been on the top of our mandate from the beginning. We have always thought that solar power would work really well in our valley and this project reflects our goals of significantly reducing our energy footprint. This building will run on 100% renewable energy."

"We are focussed on producing premium wines that reflect this special valley where they are

grown. The Similkameen sunshine helps to grow our grapes and now it helps produce the power we need to run the winery as well," noted John Weber.

The project was initiated after Orofino undertook a voluntary energy assessment through the Livesmart BC Energy Advisor Program where the winery was ranked in the top 10 out of 450 assessments completed by Livesmart.

The Webers were encouraged to apply for the Livesmart BC Champions Program after discussing their goals of implementing solar power to reduce their carbon footprint. The project was designed and submitted for acceptance by the BC Ministry of Energy and Mines and partial funding was awarded under the Innovations category.

About Orofino

Orofino Vineyards is a six-acre property on the sun-drenched Cawston bench in the Similkameen Valley. Owners John and Virginia Weber produce handcrafted small lots of premium wines from some

of the oldest vines in the valley. The natural beauty of the desert surroundings is reflected in Orofino's unique strawbale buildings, the only one of its kind in Canada.

The wines have garnered numerous medals from the top wine competitions in the country. The winery is also known for hosting the annual 1.6 Mile Dinner featuring a fine dining experience celebrating the world class food and wine all grown in its own Cawston neighbourhood.

About the Strawbale Buildings

The conception of the winery began in the spring of 2003. After months of researching and debating alternatives, the decision was made to build Canada's first strawbale winery. Building design incorporated function and eye-pleasing detail.

The Orofino winery, Canada's only strawbale winery was constructed in 2004/2005. The ecofriendly design consists of two buildings adjoined by a breezeway. They chose this building method after much research and planning. "Earthy" 21 inch thick walls provide superior insulation qualities - ideal for manufacturing constant barrel room temperatures and for keeping things cool in the desert heat. The buildings are beautiful and very unique.

Strawbale design has been around for over 200 years. The energy efficiency is unparalleled as walls are rated at up to R-60. This results in a building that is naturally cool in the hot desert summer and retains heat well in the winter.

The B.C. government is looking for Expressions of Interest from agencies, societies and business people with innovative ideas, business knowledge and experience, and a love of B.C. history, that would like to get involved with the future operation and management of one of the province's heritage sites, the Grist Mill in Keremeos.

Current and aspiring entrepreneurs interested in operating and managing the Grist Mill site are asked to submit their business ideas to the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations' Heritage Branch before Tuesday, October 30 at 2:00 PM.

Copies of the Requests for Expressions of Interest package are

available on the BC Bid website: at www.bcbid.gov.bc.ca (click 'Browse', then choose 'by organization', click '#72', then 'Operation and Management of the Grist Mill at Keremeos').

The Grist Mill is one of 23 heritage properties owned by the Province.

It is currently managed as a publicly accessible historic site museum by a third-party manager. Arrangements with the current operator expire March 31, 2013.

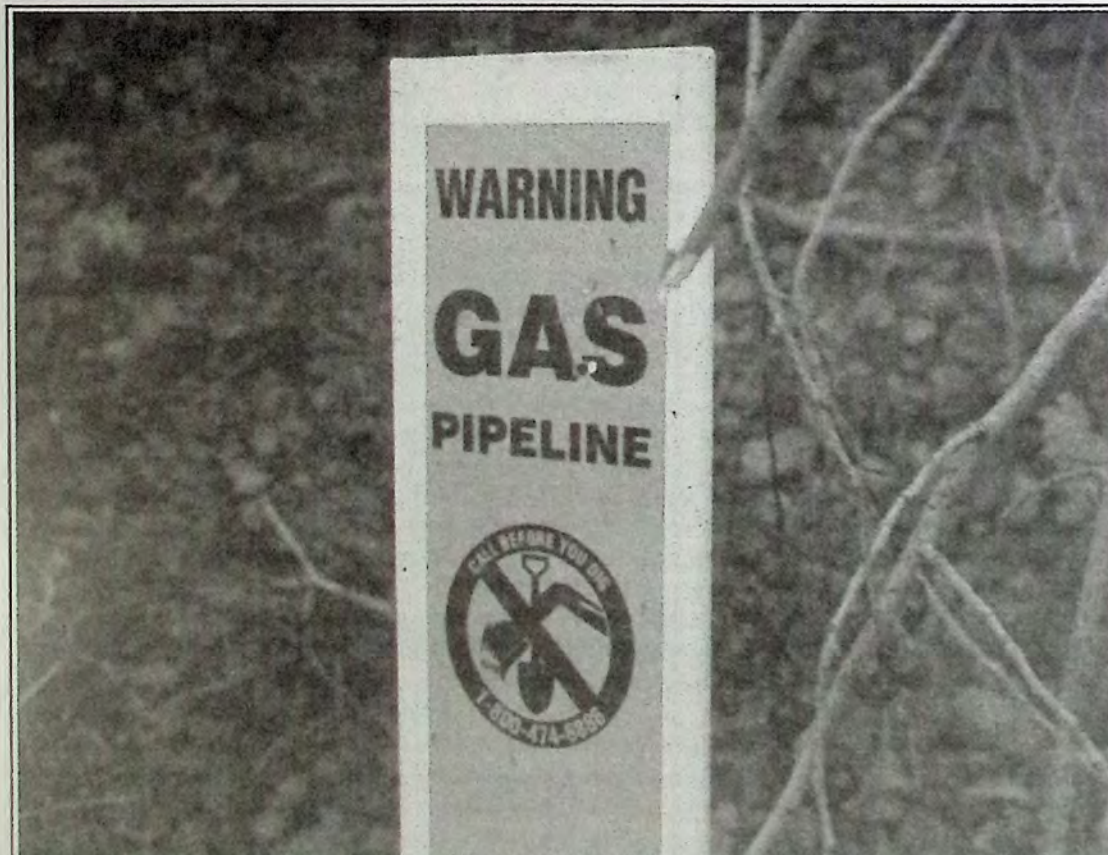
Proposals may include, but are not limited to, the site's current function as an outdoor museum. The Heritage Branch will consider new uses for the site as long as they consider the site's heritage values.

This process will allow ministry

staff to review innovative concepts that would increase financial viability and self-sufficiency of the Grist Mill site.

Opened in 1877, the mill and store served the needs of local ranchers, First Nations, miners and travellers on the historic Dewdney Trail. The 6.9-hectare (17-acre) site includes organic gardens, three historic buildings, a modern building currently used as a visitor centre, as well as some bare land. The site also has an heirloom apple orchard and a small plot of heritage wheat growing on the upper fields.

Hayes Creek Fire Department Thanks RDOS

Hayes Creek Fire Department has a hall, two fire trucks and a medical first responder unit and twenty trained fire fighters and medical first responders and has a ratio of 80% medical calls and 20% fire calls in their area of operations. Early medical intervention is critical as the arrival time in the area for an ambulance from Princeton or Summerland is about an hour. Hayes Creek has about 200 paying member households (\$50/year) and training/fuel/maintenance/heat and light and equipment costs exceeds monies brought in. "The generosity and support from Brad and the RDOS allows us to keep our doors open and providing this so needed and important service to our community," says a Fire Department spokesman.

Living Past 100

The Challenge of Staying Healthy

Many people today are living past 100 years. When they are consulted about why they have lived so long, most do not talk about the advances in medicine, surgery, and public health, but those are certainly factors related to living longer, healthier lives. When we hear of people dying from contaminated water or food supply, we become outraged because we have grown accustomed to having our food and water made safe enough for us to remain healthy. This was not always the case. During the past century, we have changed our methods of staying healthy. There are many people who look at the methods of farming, fishing, and handling drinking water and find there has been some deterioration in health standards. Such people are whistle blowers who alert us to unsafe or sub-standard conditions in our food and water supply. These whistle blowers should be heard and we should accept the challenge of correcting situations that can threaten our health. We cannot take for granted others will safeguard our food and drinking water. Due to use of pesticides, herbicides and artificial fertilizers in major agricultural operations, many contaminants have been introduced to both our food and water supply. Some practices, such as spraying liquid manure on crops, has proven to contaminate both the foods receiving the spray and the water into which the spray runs off, so it is not only chemical additives that can contaminate, but natural processes. Other contaminants can be 'natural' but just as deadly, such as E. coli and listeria. Although we rely heavily on health legislation to protect us from unsafe foods and drinking water, we have an obligation to protect our own health and the health of others through constant vigilance to ensure contamination is not occurring. In addition, we need to pay attention to the rules of safe handling of foods in our own homes, making sure our homes are clean, free of mildews and other fungus, and ensuring we and our families are not in contact with pests and parasites. It is worth noting that the majority of people who live past 100 today are living in industrialized countries where public health, and a public educated to protect health, are part of everyday life.

The Hayes Creek Fire Department has not received financial support from the provincial government for the past two years. "A big thank you to Brad and the the RDOS and our paying members households for much appreciated continued support, and the dedicated volunteers who make it possible."

Council will look at energy strategy

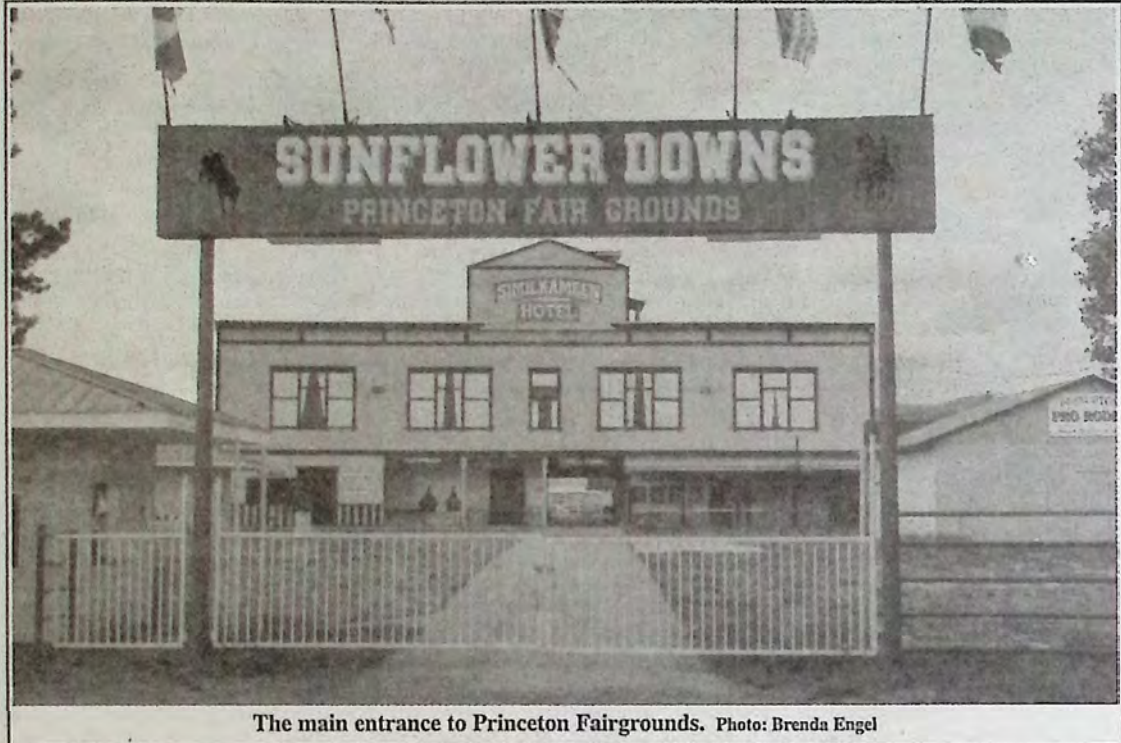

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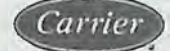

Zigzag bill climbs

Town Council voted on October 15 to spend an additional \$48,000 on the zigzag project.
 The project has been delayed for a number of reasons, beginning with a need to have a boundary survey done. A problem arose with lighting, as Fortis does not allow private fixtures to be attached to their existing poles.
 A new pole must be installed, and solar lighting was recommended. A further problem was the discovery

of a storm drain which spilled over the hill. Now a storm drain to the bottom of the hill must be installed.
 There are a number of other unanticipated expenses such as additional fencing and an additional step, as well as additional engineering costs due to the drainage problem.
 The total cost of the project now will be \$252,857 to replace a trail damaged when a pick-up truck rolled down the trail two years ago and tore out handrails.

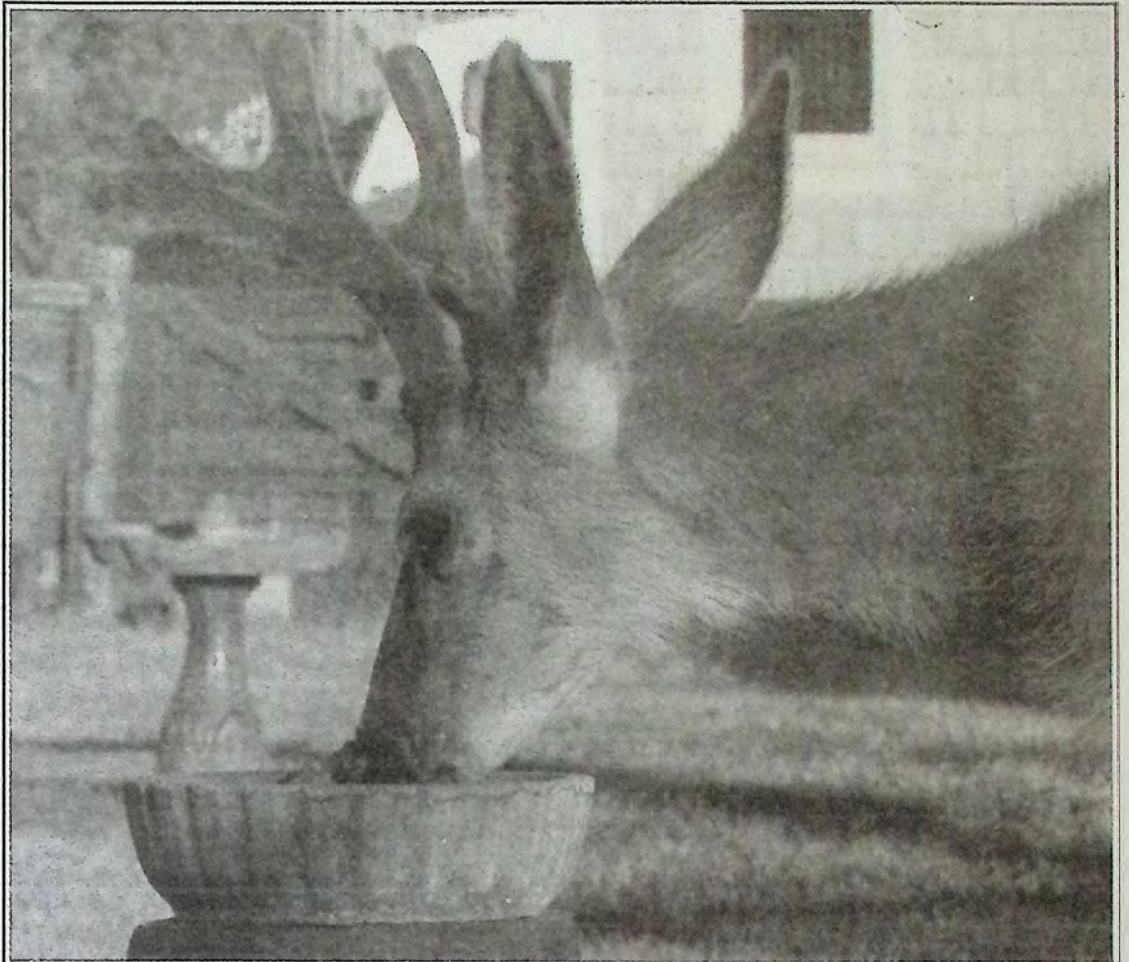

Telus expands cell service along Highway 3

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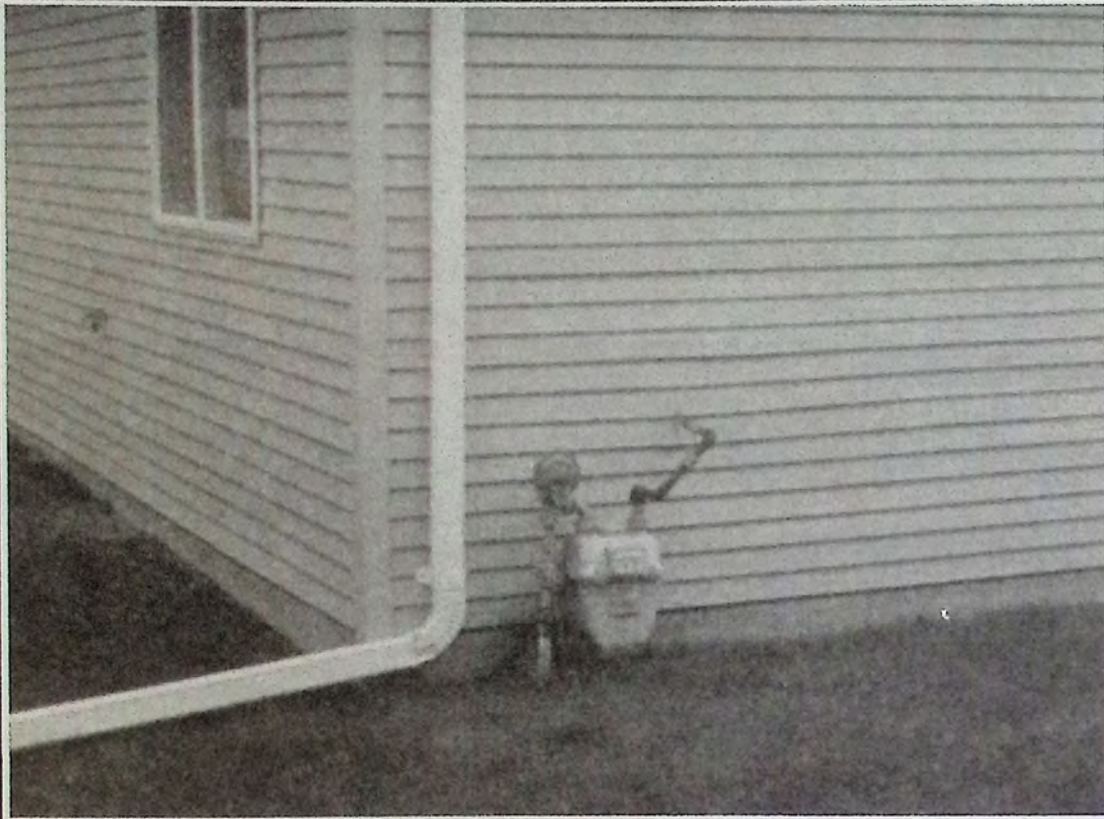

And so, because not much happens in my neighbourhood, someone with a backhoe is worth leaving the comfort of the house and the TV remote to watch real life as-it-happens. Which places my neighbor – two doors down – a mere ten feet from the excavation when the backhoe struck the gas pipeline and all H*-L-L broke loose. Dirt, pavement, bricks and pressured gas spewed from the excavation. It seems that the situation was accompanied by the sound of an explosion.

Apparently, the Harris Transport employee understood the complexity of the situation, because the gas was somehow subsequently turned off at the street and the houses were evacuated. My two house cats were probably alarmed, but none the wiser. Ultimately, a Fortis employee came from Princeton (a 50-minute drive) and turned off the gas to each of the homes of the original six, right at those big, bulky, grey, cast iron meter boxes that are supposed to get "noticed".

Fortis came to visit me, too, even though I wasn't home. I had a nice doorknob card hanging from my front door when I returned from work in the early evening. The nice doorknob card hanging from my front door states quite calmly and politely, "Dear resident: We visited your home today, but no one was home. The reason for our visit is indicated below: Temporary gas service disruption in this neighbourhood." There are other options to check off on the doorknob card, but apparently the one chosen seemed the most appropriate.

The nice doorknob card hanging from my front door went on to say, "To ensure your safety, it was necessary to shut off the gas service to your home." The card goes on to say that Fortis will personally come and light my gas appliances. The time on the card was written as 5:15 PM.

I hardly EVER have anyone come

visit. Had I known Fortis was going to come "visit", I most certainly WOULD HAVE BEEN HOME. But then again, had the situation erupted more tragically, I WOULD-N'T HAVE A HOME TO COME HOME TO, and my cats would be in kitty heaven.

Fortis repaired the leak after all the excess gas had drained back into the excavation from the homes of the "original six". At 9:00 PM, my back yard still smelled of gas. I wandered over to the 3-foot deep excavation (thoughtfully left open) in the dark and listened and sniffed. The bricks are neatly piled. The wayward pavement is piled. The water leak has hopefully been fixed. My good neighbor beside me took the time to explain the whole situation to me and helped me figure out how to turn the gas on at the big, grey, cast iron meter box at the back of my house. I know the rest of the drill so lighting my fireplace was the easy part.

You are probably amused by now. I, however, am not so forgiving. Perhaps it is because I helped direct traffic around the scene of a similar tragedy in Dawson Creek, BC, in and around 1984.

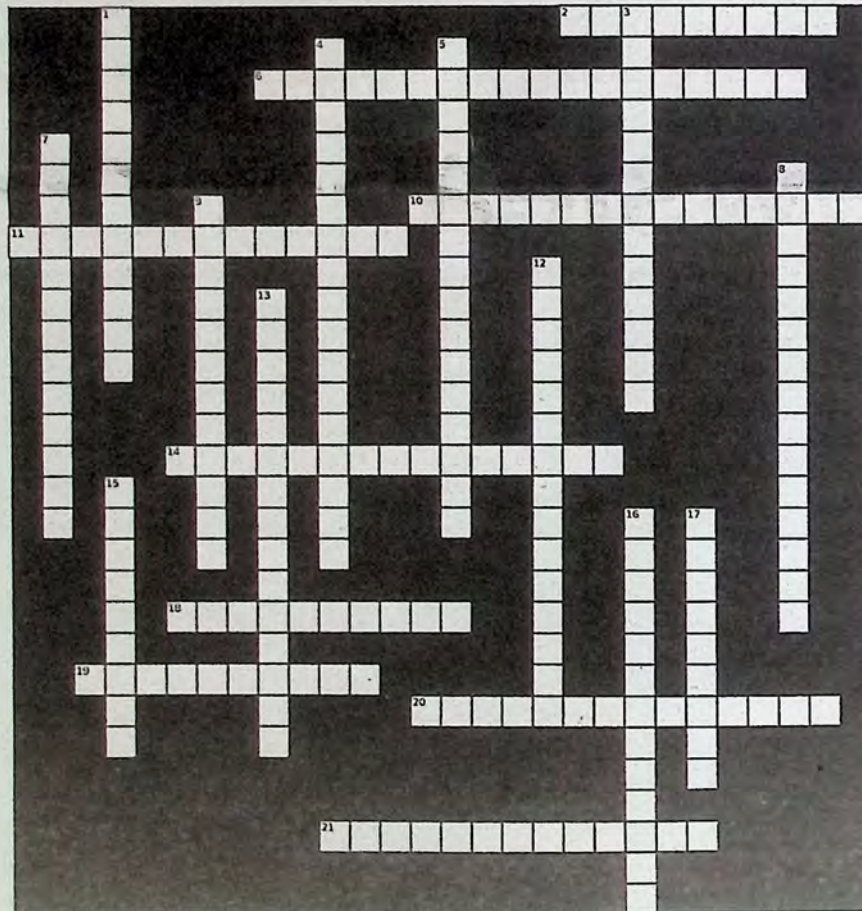
Yup, some guy on a backhoe was digging in the (front) yard of a home, and yes, he struck a gas pipeline. The house was blown off its foundation. Two-by-fours were propelled THROUGH the walls of the two homes immediately adjacent. The house burned to the ground. Fire fighters contained the blaze and for the two adjacent homes, repairing holes where there shouldn't have been holes in their exterior walls and replacing melted siding were all that they had to endure. No-one died. No-one was home. I expect the gas company came to visit then, too.

"Call Before You Dig". If someone on your property is going to dig, maybe YOU should check for gas pipelines: Apparently trained professionals don't have to!

I'm writing you today, hoping you will take this message to Adrian Dix on behalf of all PWD's in British Columbia who are living below poverty level.

I have also written to Mr. Dix, but have not received a reply.

I also wrote to Moira Stilwell re: this issue. She DID respond, only to tell me that persons with disabilities in this province must continue to live at a subsistence level, as it would cost too much to bring us up to a decent level of living.

I live in Princeton.

Until last year, I existed on \$700.00/month. When I questioned this, my rates were bumped up to the current \$940.00/ month. I am grateful for the taxpayers largesse. At one time, I was a taxpayer. Now

I can no longer work and am slowly drowning in debt. I have tried to find employment that I can do, to no avail.

I would like to know if the NDP government plans to make PWD allowances equal to those given to people in Alberta.

If this is a concern and an NDP government promises to raise the rates, how will the increase be implemented? What will cause the NDP to take this issue seriously, and keep their word, if they give it, to increase rates for persons with disabilities?

As well, what will the NDP do

about formulating a strategy that WORKS for helping people on a PWD allowance find/keep employment?

For example, there are no provisions for helping people find valid at-home work. Little help for training, though we are now allowed to keep \$800.00/month, and, as of January 2013, allowed to average that amount over a year.

News flash: most of us are on PWD in the first place because we can't work. I would appreciate a reply to this letter.

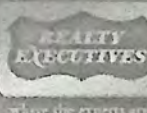
