RCMP report rubber rustlers

In the past week Princeton Kal Tire has been the victim of two break and enters.

Princeton RCMP state that on each occasion the culprits entered the tire compound stealing large truck tires and wheels.

They also note during this same time period Kal Tire in Penticton and Merritt were also targeted with similar tires being stolen from these locations.

Police are asking for assistance from the public in solving these crimes by calling the Princeton RCMP at 250.295.6911 or CrimeStoppers at 1.800.222.TIPS (8477).

Princeton RCMP would also like to advise the public about an internet

scam.

"People have been receiving pop up windows on their computer from 'Police Cyber Crime' stating that your computer has been locked due to pornography, terrorism and gambling," explains Princeton RCMP Sgt. Dave Clare.

"In order to unlock your computer you must pay \$100 to Ukash. The scamware program will then turn on your webcam. This is a scam."

Do not open any of the pop up windows. The best way to protect your computer is to make sure your anti-virus programs are up to date.

Fall Fair board hears report

Jen Bernard and Karrie Crucil attended the annual BC Fairs conference at Sun Peaks on October 20 weekend. At the October 23 Fair Board meeting, they gave an enthusiastic report of the many things they learned at the conference, and will present copies to members at the January planning session for 2013.

Representatives from fairs around British Columbia have experienced many of the same problems: declin-

ing membership and lack of help in putting on their fairs. This is particularly true in small communities. Princeton's Fair Association will hold its annual general meeting on November 27 at the library conference room, and members hope more people will join. Having a good group of members in on the planning process is essential for a good fair.

The Fair Board has set a tentative date for the 2013 fair: August 24/25 weekend. This date has been selected in hopes that the Little Britches Rodeo Association will agree to hold their rodeo in conjunction with the fair, which is a win-win situation for both groups. The Fair Board must await confirmation of those

dates from the Little Britches Rodeo Association.

Among the many good ideas brought back from the conference were a couple of warnings. First, no persons under age 19 may be associated with the selling of 50/50 draw tickets. This is a regulation of the Gaming Commission.

BC Assessment seeks updates

BC Assessment is requesting updates from property owners who have experienced property damage as a result of the heavy rains and flooding that occurred earlier this year in the Columbia-Shuswap, Central Okanagan and Tulameen recreational area.

"Owners of property substantially damaged by flooding are asked to contact us before October 31," said Okanagan Deputy-Assessor Tracy Wall.

"BC Assessment may reassess an impacted property's market value so its current condition is reflected in the 2013 Assessment Roll released next January."

Applicable properties include those that have substantially dam-

aged structures and/or an eroded land base as a result of the 2012 floods. Changes in assessments as a result of substantial damage that are not reflected on the 2013 Assessment Roll can also be made through the Property Assessment Review Panel process that occurs from February 1 to March 15, 2013, and will be reflected on revised assessment notices to be mailed in April, 2013.

"We understand this is a difficult time for impacted property owners and we are working with local governments and other organizations to ensure that any necessary property assessment revisions are made in advance of the 2013 Roll," added Wall.

Fashion show draws crowd

More than 75 people attended the October 22 Hospital Auxiliary Tea and Fashion Show. So many attended that extra tables were set up at the last minute. The audience enjoyed tea, coffee and plenty of treats, as well as a fashion show featuring

exceptional selections from the Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Store, and the most amazing number of door prizes.

The event was organized by Ruth McLeod, a long time Auxiliary member. Laila Bird was the commentator, filling the gaps between fashion models by offering information about what the Auxiliary has contributed to the community.

The Hospital Auxiliary is 102 years old, having been formed to usher in the first Princeton General Hospital. Their contributions to patient care are immeasurable. During just the past two years, the Auxiliary has given \$1,120 for quilts for Ridgewood Lodge, \$848 for books and equipment for the health clinic, \$10,000 to the medical foundation for heart care, \$5,500 to Ridgewood Lodge for a 'wander guard', \$488 to Ridgewood Lodge for cushions and umbrella for the garden, \$6,428 for equipment for Highway Extrication, \$1,568 for equipment for Ground Search and Rescue, \$15,000 to the Medical Foundation for cancer diagnostic equipment, and \$2,200 to the Meals on Wheels program run by

Community Services. These add up to a total of just over \$53,000.

As anyone in the Hospital Auxiliary will tell you, it is the ongoing donations to the Thrift Shop combined with the ongoing consumer purchases, that keep the money coming in. The Thrift Shop sells women's, men's and children's clothing, bedding, shoes, drapery, knitting equipment and wool, remnant fabrics, small kitchen equipment and crockery, framed pictures and other decorative items for the home, handbags, and jewelry.

The fashions on display at the show included some very wearable, attractive outfits for day, evening or dressy casual occasions, all on sale at the Thrift Shop. Models for the show were Lynn Boyd, Sharon Rose, Joy Linder, Grace Rice and Doreen Paulson. The servers were dressed in outfits from the Thrift Shop and were asked to show their clothing as they circulated. WINTER SNOW REMOVAL AND PARKING REGULATIONS

It's that time again and we would like to remind residents of winter snow removal regulations.

The Town has a snow removal schedule that is based on a road priority system. Salting and plowing begins on the main arterial roads, followed by collector roads, and then moves onto residential streets and lanes as necessary. Please assist our crew when they are plowing by not parking on streets during snow removal.

During snow removal operations, plow operators cannot avoid leaving ridges of snow (called windrows) at the foot of driveways. Residents and business owners are responsible for clearing the windrow from their own driveways and entrances.

Residents and businesses are responsible for removing snow and ice from sidewalks in front of their homes and businesses. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to \$100.

Thank you for your cooperation in following these simple steps to ensure a safe winter season and remember, if you're out on the roads during a snowstorm, drive with caution and according to road conditions. Stay a safe distance from snow removal equipment. They need room to do the job safely!

Facebook Provides Political Comment

The friendly face of Facebook was meant to bring people together to share information about themselves, but it has morphed into a way of sharing political comment and news you will not hear on the increasingly inadequate television news.

One of my favourite political comments is in the form of a letter to Prime Minister Harper outlining what he should have done during the financial crisis.

The letter begins with telling the Prime Minister the alternative to spending billions of dollars on bailing out the banks. The author tells the Prime Minister he should have given a million dollars to each person over 50 in the work force. This would solve the unemployment problem.

Each person receiving the money would have to agree to pay off their mortgage or buy a house, ending the housing crisis. Then each retiree would have to buy a car, ending the car industry crisis. In addition the retirees must send their kids to college, thus reducing the crime rate, and finally, each must spend \$50 a week on alcohol or tobacco, so the government

could get its money back in taxes. As silly as this may sound, there is still a lot of common sense behind it. In any case, it was worth a laugh.

Other political comment on Facebook is not so humorous, which is too bad. There is no surer way to remove unwanted politicians from their seats as laughing them out of office. It seems people want to fight because they are angry, but the one attack no politician can be defended against is an attack of ridicule.

Using social media as a means of not only expressing one's political views, but telling others of political action not commonly known is linking together people who might not otherwise have connected. When they share their opinions, they become the beginning of a critical mass of people who will instigate change.

This may be a good thing if the cause involves real justice, but in the case of groups like the neo-Nazis, that could be a really bad scene.

Some governments want to have the power to shut down some groups. Who decides? What I might see as justified political action could be just as threatening to the government as the neo-Nazis.

The other thing which needs protection from government intervention is the spreading of real news about what is happening around the world. Let me give you an example: you heard all about the presidential debates in the United States, but you did not hear that the Green Party presidential candidate, Jill Stein, was shackled to a chair in a police station to prevent her from attending the debate and making her presence known. This

is how democracy works in the United States: there is a corporation (yes, a corporation) set up to make sure only the two major parties are invited to a debate. There are actually, at this time, five presidential candidates: Ron Paul, Gary Johnson and Jill Stein.

There is a whole lot of news that is not reported on television these days. I recall news broadcasts during the 1970's when world news took most of the one hour allocated three times a day to news. Today, on at least one channel, the news hour lasts two hours, and the amount of world news on that channel takes perhaps five minutes. These days, internet and social media are filling that gap.

I used to watch the morning news. Now I go to my computer to find out what is happening in the world. I go to CBC, BBC world news, the Princeton forecast at weather.office.gc.ca, and rabble.ca, which is a news website supported by Canadian unions and the Council of Canadians. There are some alternative sites I go to on occasion, some of which I question their reliability. I also go to Elizabeth May's blog, as she seems to be able to tell us what is really going on in our House of Commons.

I am not alone, by far, in seeking to find news reports away from television or radio, although radio is still great when traveling. I have gone to the Arab world's news channel, Al Jazira and to Russia Today, as well as to newspapers from here and there.

It is amazing how different the same news story will be covered in other countries!

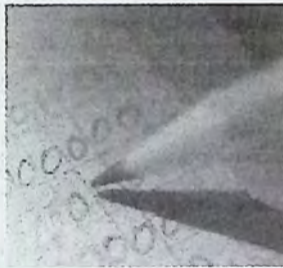

Police warn residents of scam

Princeton RCMP would like to caution the public of an ongoing scam known as the 'Mystery Shopper' Scam.

If you have received a letter in the mail stating that you have been hired by Vuisay Industries to participate as a 'customer service evaluator' police advise that this is a scam. "The mystery shopper scam is still victimizing Canadian consumers," says Princeton RCMP Sgt. Dave Clare.

"The victim answers an enticing ad to become a mystery shopper. The 'employer' sends a letter, with mystery shopping tasks to be completed, and a cheque to help the victim fulfill their mystery shopping

tasks. the victim will first cash the cheque they were given. One of the tasks will be to use the money transfer company and wire a large portion of the money to a name provided, in order to test the company's procedure and customer service skills," Sgt. Clare explains.

"The victim will find out later that the cheque is counterfeit, thus making the victim accountable to pay for the funds they wired."

RCMP warn you should not try to

cash the cheque enclosed in the Mystery Shopper mail package as it is not a valid cheque.

Anyone with questions or concerns or has received such a letter are asked to contact the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre at 1-888-495-8501 to report this scam. The best time to call this number is between 8:30 AM and 9:30 PM.

Reports of such scams surface and resurface periodically in the Similkameen Valley.

Get Your Vaccine, Not The Flu!

It's Flu Season. Don't delay. Get the vaccine instead of the flu urges the BC Lung Association.

Mid-October through November is the best time for immunization.

It's important to get your vaccine early because the flu vaccine becomes effective about two weeks after it's administered, once the body generates antibodies to protect against the flu.

The vaccine provides protection for up to 12 months.

Everyone six months and older is recommended to get a flu vaccine. A flu vaccine offers the best defense available to protect against flu.

The Association also suggests those over 65 years of age get a pneumonia shot as well.

Anyone can get the flu, but some people are at greater risk for serious

flu-related complications, like pneumonia, that can lead to hospitalization and even death.

This includes adults 65 years and older. This is because the body's ability to fight illness drops as you age.

Over a normal flu season, one in 10 adults and one in 3 children will come down with the flu.

According to the Public Health Agency, between 2,000 and 8,000 people will die from pneumonia and other flu-related complications.

Living Past 100

Canadians Need More Sunshine

This is the time of year when darkness descends on Canadians. It is the time of year worst for our health because we receive so little sunshine. Many illnesses are related to a lack of Vitamin D, known as the sunshine vitamin. Canadians need to take a Vitamin D supplement during the winter months. Some people may need to take the supplement year round.

Vitamin D is essential in bone-building, which includes teeth. Taking calcium on its own will not do the trick unless the person taking it is exposed to enough direct sunlight. For post-menopausal women, taking both calcium and Vitamin D is recommended by all physicians as well as Health Canada. However, older women are not the only people who should be concerned about proper bone growth. At one time, all children were given cod liver oil from Halloween to April 1 to ensure proper bone development. Today, parents can buy Vitamin D in capsules and tablets if the children do not like the taste of fish oil.

Recent studies have shown lack of Vitamin D is a factor not only in bone loss but in increased risk of developing cancers. Taking Vitamin D in the dark months is now recommended for all adults as well as for children. Taking Vitamin D supplements may not be required during the sunny months for most people, but many people work indoors four or five days a week and may not be exposed to enough sunlight. There is a simple blood test which shows whether or not a person has enough Vitamin D. If the test shows a deficiency, a physician will recommend Vitamin D supplementation.

Many people find they feel greater fatigue in the dark months. Many say they feel somewhat less enthusiastic about life, feel tired or bored, or simply lack energy. These feelings and lack of energy could be directly related to having insufficient Vitamin D. There are ways to get more sunshine, such as wintering in a sunny climate or buying a full spectrum light, but Vitamin D supplements are far less expensive and more accurate in maintaining an adequate level of Vitamin D in the body.

High risk groups

The Lung Association and health officials suggest everyone should get the shot, but especially seniors 65 years or older, residents of care homes, children under five, people with chronic illness, pregnant women, individuals of aboriginal ancestry and people who are severely overweight or obese. Care-givers and health-care givers are also urged to get their shot.

Stay healthy and prevent the spread of influenza by taking the following simple steps:

- Ensure you and your family gets an annual flu shot.
- Wash your hands properly, and often. Twenty seconds of hand washing with warm water and soaps helps remove bacteria and viruses.
- Cover up when you cough or sneeze. If a tissue is not available, raise your arm up to your face to cough or sneeze into your sleeve. If you use a tissue, dispose of it and wash your hands immediately.
- Keep shared surfaces like door-knobs, light switches, and telephones clean as bacteria can live up to two days on hard surfaces.
- And, if you get sick, please stay at home so that you do not spread your

PLACE four slices of raisin bread in a single layer in a buttered 9-inch (2.5L) square baking dish. Top with bananas and remaining four slices of bread.

BLEND milk, cream cheese, eggs, sugar, flour and vanilla in a blender or food processor until smooth. Pour over raisin bread. Let stand 5 minutes or refrigerate overnight.

BAKE 40 to 45 minutes (50 to 55 minutes if refrigerated) until set and top is toasted. Let stand 10 minutes.

CUT French toast into diagonal halves and remove with spatula. Dust servings with powdered sugar if desired.

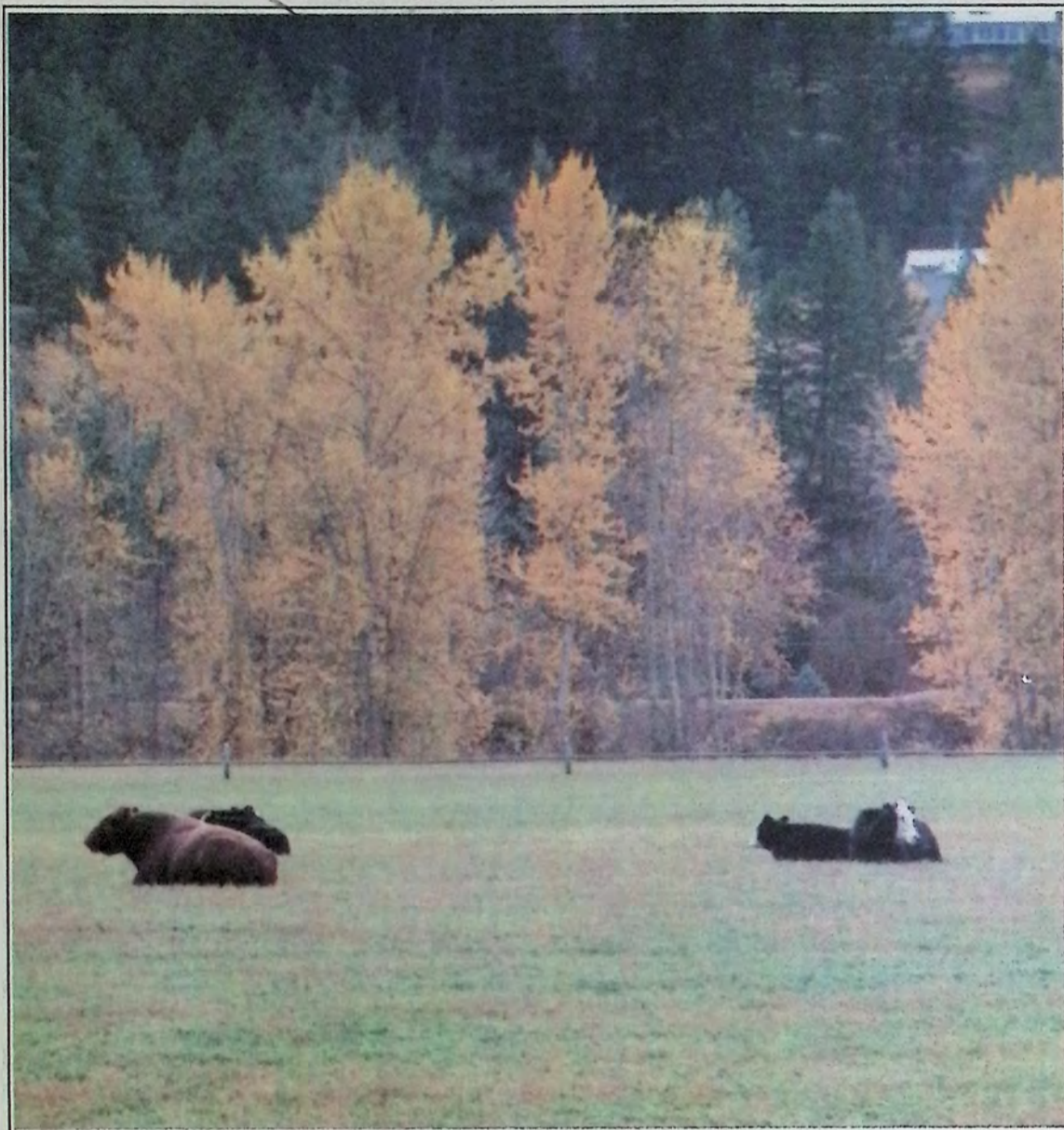

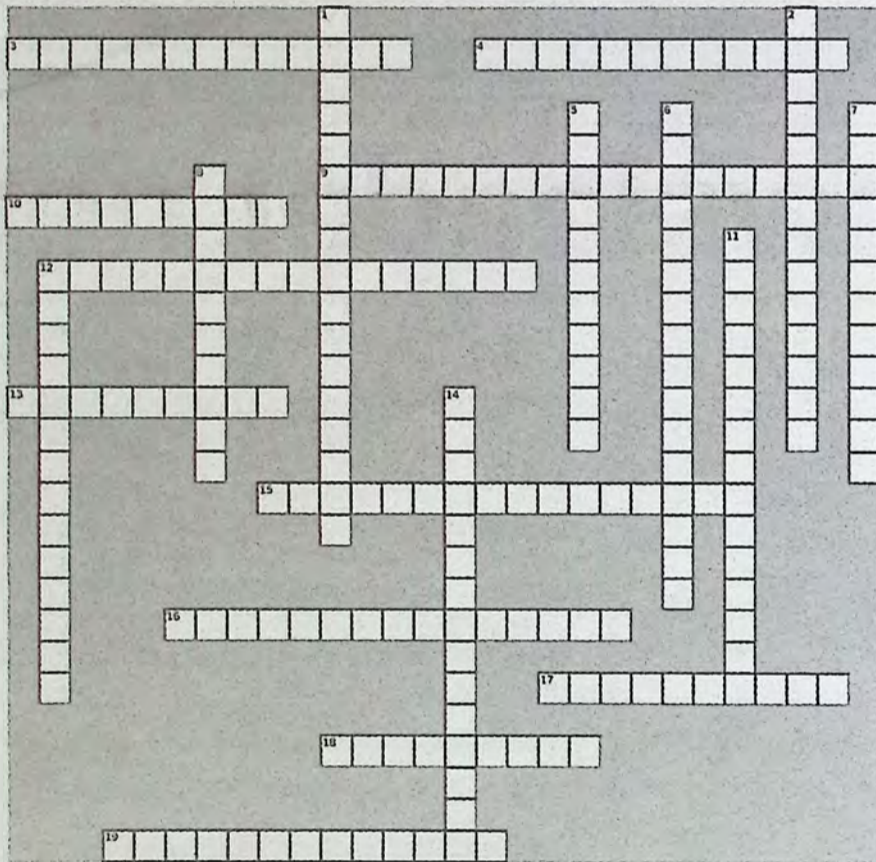
Weigh scales are required under
