## O'Rourke joins Hall of Fame

Members recalled hosting CPRA rodeos in the past, and although the calibre of cowboys was higher, the rodeo cost more to put on and did not draw any more spectators than any other year. Princeton Rodeo will stick with BCRA.

Planning for the 2013 rodeo is already in progress, and there was a

lot of discussion about which member would undertake which duties. Ken Crompton has secured JJ Harrison as rodeo clown, which pleased everyone. Harrison is in high demand, and is booked for the National Finals in Las Vegas this year, but was happy to come to Princeton. Al Parsons has agreed to be the announcer. JJ Harrison and Al Parsons make a great team.

President Crompton told members the cowboys like to come to Princeton because they are treated so

well here.

The Family Riding weekends conducted by Odelle Simmons proved to be a success this year, and she plans to resume the weekend riding opportunities for families in 2013, as soon as the frost is out of the ground. 4-H has resumed and there are youngsters in the 4-H horse club who may choose to participate.

Terry Wright is planning the 2013 edition of the Stan Thompson Memorial Team Roping. The first such event was held this year and

was a success. Wright hosted 75 teams this year and expects more next year.

Little Britches Rodeo was a great success this year. Princeton Agricultural Fall Fair is hoping to partner with Little Britches in 2013 and negotiations are underway at this time.

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
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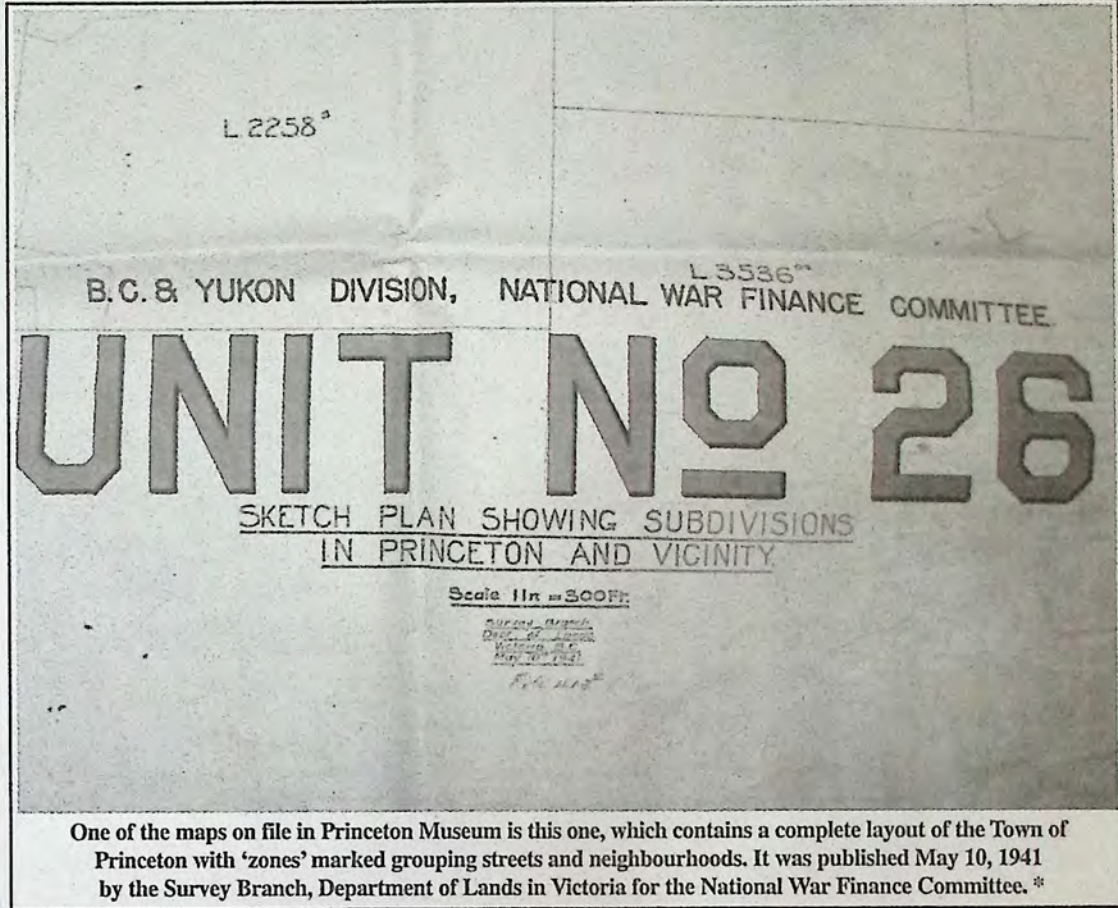

## WWII - The Beginning of the End

The beaches of Normandy saw the sacrifice of thousands of men who were ferried from ship to shore on specially built landing barges, or in amphibious tanks. The Nazi troops controlled the cliffs inland from the beaches, and from bunkers the Nazi machine guns mowed down soldiers like bowling pins. Still the Canadians, British and American soldiers continued their assault.

One doctor who attempted to help the fallen said he waded in water dyed pink by the allied forces. It was a bloodbath on the beaches, but somehow the soldiers assaulting the beaches managed to finally take the cliffs, clear out the bunkers and take control of the beaches. It was the biggest assault in the history of World War II.

The Allied Forces landing on the beaches were covered by artillery fire from the ships and air cover from allied planes, but it was the boys on the beaches who took the brunt of the withering Nazi firepow-

er. It was the boys on the beaches who paid the ultimate price.

The assault on Normandy's beaches took place on June 6, 1944. It was called D-Day.

For many families awaiting news of loved ones, the D could have stood for Death, as so many soldiers were killed on those Normandy beaches.

Allied war strategists knew the risks, but believed the risks necessary to begin to undermine Nazi control of Europe. The strategists were right, but the cost was horrific.

Europe had been at war for five long years, and thousands had died in every country, including those who died in North Africa and Italy as the allied forces pushed the Nazis out of Africa to Italy, then north through Italy to Austria and France. D-Day was the big push to rid Europe of the Nazis. Eleven more months would pass before allied troops walked into Berlin to end the war, but D-Day was a successful beginning.

During those eleven months, Allied Forces fought their way across France, freeing the French capital of Paris first, giving hope to all of France that it would soon be free. Then the Allied Forces went to Belgium, Holland, and finally into Germany. There was nothing easy about those eleven months, and thousands more soldiers died as the Nazis frequently mustered an offensive battle, as happened in Belgium at Christmas time in 1944. This was a large offensive in the Ardennes forest on the border of Belgium and France. This offensive battle became known as the Battle of the Bulge, a play on the word 'Belge', which is what Belgians call their country.

Canadians fought in the Battle of the Bulge. Many of those soldiers were from our area.

While Canadians fought the Battle of the Bulge, Americans were advancing on a different route into the heart of western Belgium and ..... continued on Page 23

## Flip Of The Coyne

A few days ago I was approached by a kid I know from hockey and he asked, "Why is everyone wearing a poppy today?" I quickly replied, "Because Remembrance Day is coming up and the poppy shows that we are thankful for what our veterans have done for us." Naturally he just said "oh" and walked away.

Remembrance Day to me is not just a day off work. It has always made me upset when people treat it as such. November 11th is the one day that we take time to stop and think about our freedom and what it cost so many for that freedom. It is the day we stop and reflect on what our veterans have sacrificed so we can live the lives that we take for granted. When people treat the day as just another statutory holiday it upsets me.

When I had the quick exchange that I mention in my opening I was at first a little annoyed because I thought, "What the heck are they teaching our kids in school?" Then I realized that World War II ended 67 years ago and maybe some of these kids really are that disconnected from the World Wars. They don't really understand what Remembrance Day is about, not that this is really an excuse for today's youth to not understand Remembrance Day, but I am starting to think that the disconnect from today's society and the sacrifice of so many is beyond many people's comprehension.

As a society we have lived in relative peace for nearly all of the 67 years since the end of World War II. Yes there have been wars that Canada has participated in, like the Korean War, the first Gulf War and currently the war in Afghanistan, but those wars have not touched the

everyday public like the World Wars did. Today I know many people who do not even know a single veteran of Afghanistan. Our society and the disconnection from what those who put themselves in harm's way for us is growing all the time. In a way, this can be seen as a good thing because it means that those who did sacrifice during the two World Wars have given us the security and prosperity that we take for granted, but our ignorance is also a curse. When society forgets what the true cost of war is, it has a tendency to repeat its own past. This is all the more reason we need our youth to understand what our veterans did for us. It is why they should understand that during the wars it was not just those who were serving overseas who sacrificed. I will never forget the stories I was told about what it was like living during the war both here and in Europe. The stories that veterans have told me about their own experiences of the war still have me in awe that those young men were capable of so much.

I have veterans in my family. Those men are my heroes, not because of some John Wayne Hollywood idea of what they did, but because they selfishly left their homes and their families and went off to give their lives if necessary so that future generations would not need to know the horrors of war or live under the oppressive boot of a dictator. I never got to know my Great Grandfather Godden but the picture of him so young in his uniform is proudly displayed on my wall where I see it every day. His picture is hanging right beside my Granddad West's photo in his uniform from World War II. These men are my inspiration. They make me strive to be a

better man even if I'm only a fraction of what they were.

### I Know I'll Never Forget

Growing up in Kelowna in the 1970's there was one day a year where the household just stopped.

It wasn't Christmas, nor was it the twice a year 'dented can' sale at Sun-Rype.

The mood in the house was noticeably different on November 11th, or as my Dad would call it, Armistice Day.

I remember having to sit in front of the TV in the livingroom watching the November 11th service from Ottawa. Rarely did we actually attend the local service in Kelowna City Park, and I recall Mom saying something about how bad the memories were for Dad and that that was one of the reasons.

Dad's military record was a secret to all of us in the house until after his passing in 1980 and documents that had been locked away were discovered. It turned out that he had lied about his age to enlist on May 2, 1918 saying he was a year older than he actually was. He was transferred to the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders and from September 3, 1919 to February 5, 1921 was engaged in overseas duties in the North West Frontier of India.

He was also Aircraftman 2nd Class upon enlisting on June 20, 1941 in Winnipeg. He was also a Patrolman in the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve entering active duty July 6, 1944.

All we ever knew about his war years were two medals he would show us on occasion.

That was all.

There were stories of lost family members, friends and neighbours, but he never once talked about any of it.

I used to wonder then, as I do now, what horrors they must have been to keep them bottled up and never shared.

Both he and Mom would spend hours at the Kelowna Legion (Branch #26) socializing with other Members. I somehow doubt they were sharing old war stories. In fact, I'm quite certain they didn't.

One thing I never took lightly about the military secrets in our home was how the sacrifices made by my Dad, and all the other soldiers who were engaged in battle, made my life so carefree.

I don't think I can ever say I have taken it for granted, and if I ever do, I get a reminder every November.

I attend the Remembrance Day Service to remember.

And thanks to my Dad, I'm certain I will never forget.

## When I Remember World War II

You would think a person as old as I am would not remember the second world war because I was just a child when it was happening. Surprisingly, I have many memories of that time, in bits and pieces, because the world war affected everyone everywhere. In the more advanced countries, hourly radio news bulletins, along with daily war news wrap-ups, kept people informed. I learned very young to keep quiet when the news was on the radio.

However, when I remember that war, many other memories are part of the total picture, because the aftermath of the that war carried on for the rest of the century, the major part of my lifetime.

At the beginning of World War II, there were many places on earth where people had lived the same way for a thousand years, places such as the Pacific islands, the mountains of Tibet, the Innu of Resolute Bay, and the natives of Tierra del Fuego. They had never heard a radio, seen an airplane, and in some cases, had never seen a per-

son with white skin. They had never used a flashlight, never eaten food from a can, never seen a pair of flight boots, had no idea what a telephone was, and had never seen a movie. Suddenly, they were involved in a war that descended upon their territory, a war in which they had no vested interest and no interest to speak of. That war altered their perception of their world and who was in it. It changed their fundamental world view.

The same could be said for nearly every person in the world: it altered our world view in ways we had never thought possible.

In the aftermath of the war, the world entered a new phase of political power that made the United States a major world power, eclipsing all other nations in influence over world affairs. The United States had developed the nuclear bomb, and their exclusive possession of this doomsday weapon sparked an arms race. The Soviet Union came into being, as Russia annexed satellite countries into its realm of governance. The British Commonwealth reshaped itself from the Empire to a Commonwealth in which many nations threw off the cloak of colonialism to demand recognition as individual states. Due to a deal made with both the Palestinians and the Jews, fighting broke out over who should own the place now called Israel, as Jews made it their homeland.

Both Canada and the United States, but particularly Switzerland, were flooded with people called Displaced Persons, refugees who fled the Russian advance. Canada took in

Ukrainians (the second wave), Poles, Hungarians, Czechs, Slavs, and sundry others whose homelands had been so altered as to leave them with no place to go. This new wave of immigrants would alter our society in many subtle ways. A further wave of immigrants was comprised of war brides who followed their husbands across the sea to a new land. Most of these war brides were British, but there was a good representation of French, Dutch and Italians.

The result of the movement of the military through foreign lands and the immigrants who came after the war was a kind of stirring of the pot of humanity, forcing us to see beyond our own borders in a way we had never done before. This went on in Europe, Africa, the Middle East, China, Japan, the Pacific islands, India, and South America. The politics and the people of the world were in flux, and this situation continues today.

What Canadians fought for, and what thousands died for, was the defeat of tyranny in a form as ancient as politics and nationalism: the right of a government to invade its neighbours and claim its assets, and kill off any people seen as 'undesirables'. That battle continues. We call it a fight for freedom of the individual to have a say in how he or she shall be governed. Most often, in our nation, the fight takes place in an election, but there are petitions, strikes and protests that express what the people feel if the election does not work.

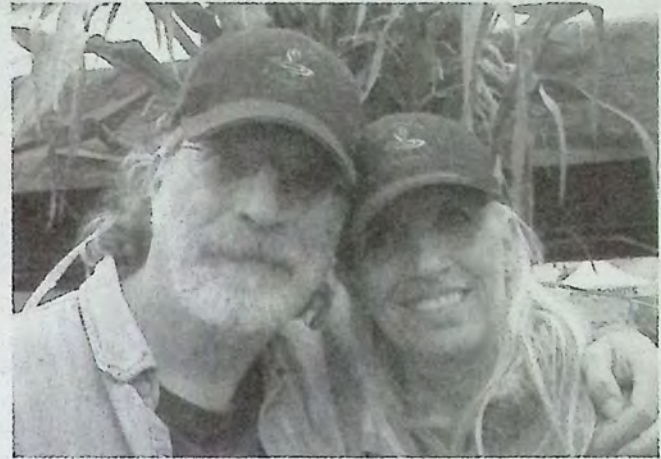
Remembrance Day is a reminder to us of not only who fought and died, but why they went to war in a fight they did not start.

## Province extends deadline

The deadline for those wishing to submit an expression of interest to manage the historic Keremeos Grist Mill has been extended for at least two more weeks.

Copies of the Requests for Expressions of Interest package are available on the BC Bid website at: <http://www.bcbid.gov.bc.ca> (Click 'Browse', then choose 'by organization', click '#72', then 'Operation and Management of the Grist Mill at Keremeos'.)

The Keremeos Grist Mill is one of

23 heritage properties owned by the Province. It is currently managed as a publicly accessible historic site museum by a third-party manager. Arrangements with the current operator expire March 31, 2013.

Proposals may include, but are not limited to, the site's current function as an outdoor museum. The Heritage Branch will also consider new uses for the site as long as they consider the site's heritage values.

Opened in 1877, the mill and store

served the needs of local ranchers, First Nations, miners and travellers on the historic Dewdney Trail.

The 6.9-hectare (17-acre) site includes organic gardens, three historic buildings, a modern building currently used as a visitor centre, as well as some bare land.

The site also has an heirloom apple orchard and a small plot of heritage wheat growing on the upper fields.

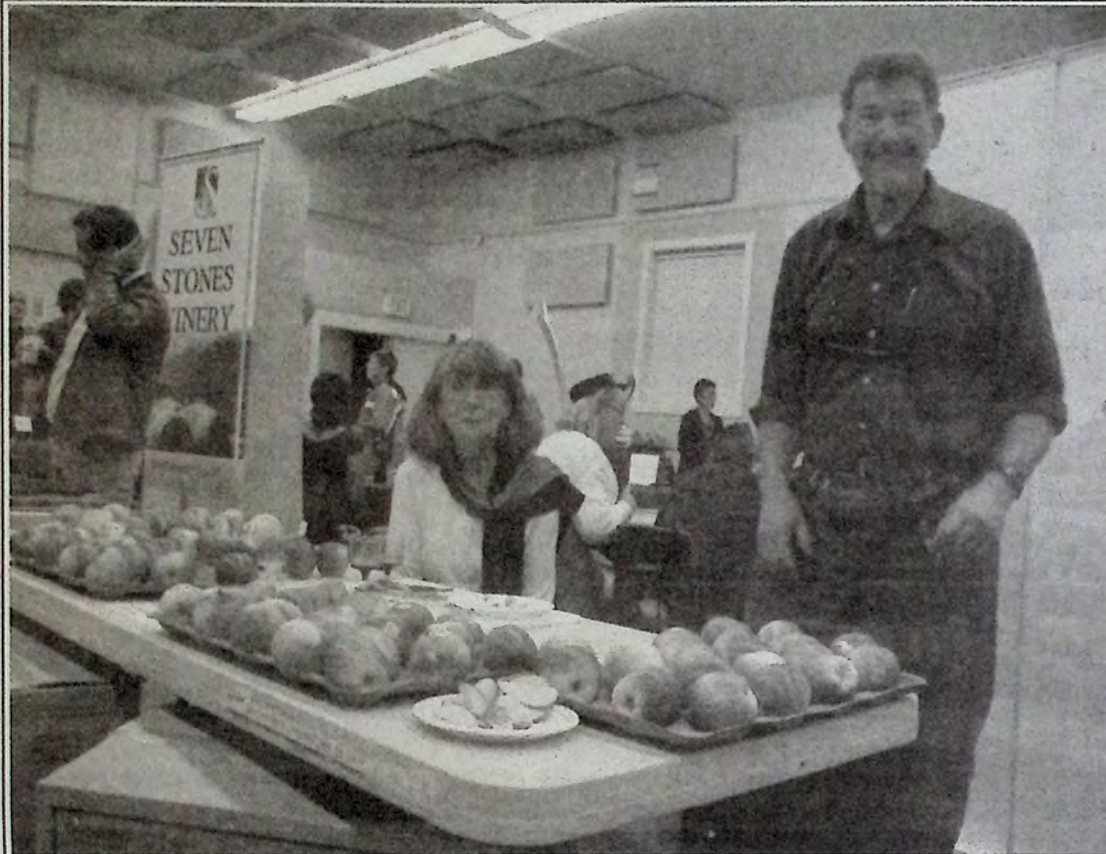

Information read to the court stat-

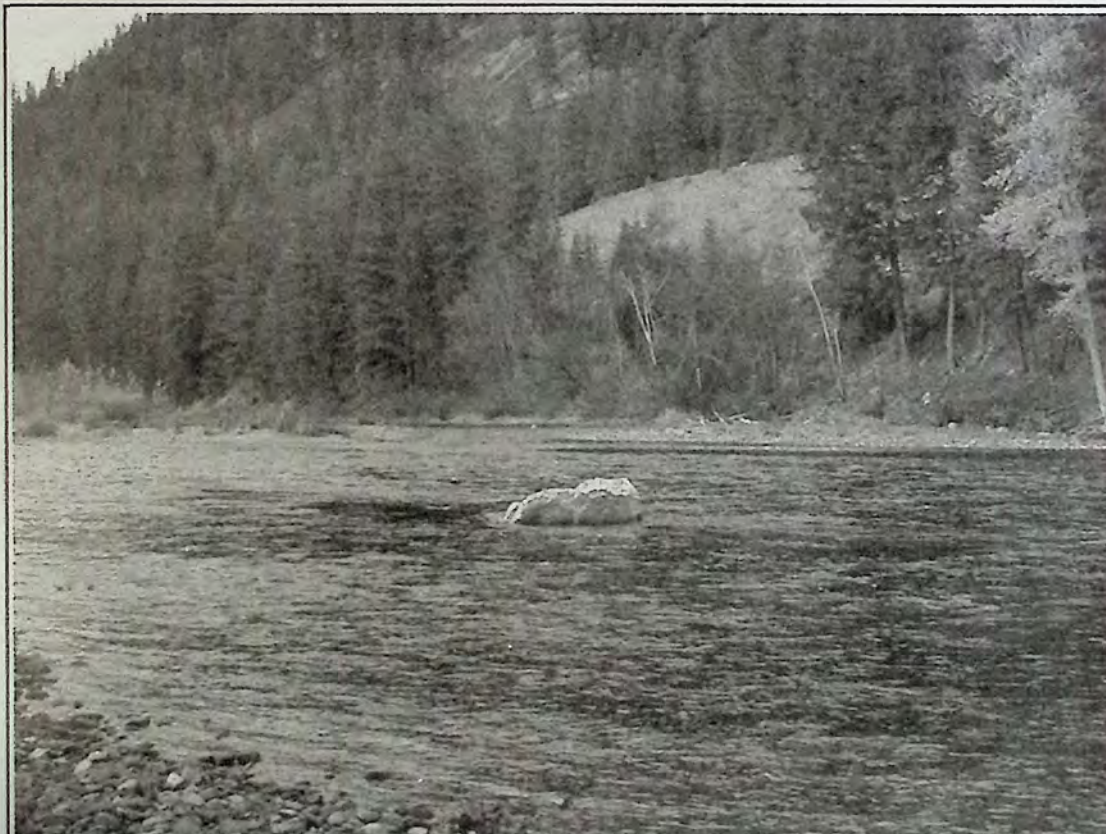
ed on July 1, 2012, at approximately 3:40 AM, Allison had been driving his pick-up truck through the streets of Hedley in an unsafe manner.

He noted that foods made from wheat flour raise blood sugar higher than most other foods. He wanted his patients to lose weight and reduce cholesterol, and he believed removing wheat from their diets would help.

Dr. Davis was right. His patients lost 25 - 30 pounds over the first few months they were on the wheat-free diet. What he did not expect was the multiple benefits they experienced. His diabetic patients had to take less insulin, and those patients who were pre-diabetic maintained healthy levels of blood sugar without taking any medication. Patients who had suffered from acid reflux no longer had this problem. Patients suffering from rheumatoid arthritis improved dramatically in a few months. Patients suffering from asthma became much healthier, some were able to dispense with their inhalers. Those with irritable bowel syndrome became free of symptoms. Those bothered with swelling in the legs were pleased to see this problem disappear. Patients with psoriasis noted considerable relief. Most patients enjoyed increased mental clarity, even those who had the beginnings of dementia. His patients slept deeper, and were less inclined to have mood swings. There was a decrease in cataract development in his patients.

Dr. Davis says modern wheat has a compound that stimulates appetite, acting like a mild opiate, in addition to having higher levels of gluten. At this time, he is working on having his patients stick to a diet that contains less grain products overall. Products containing corn flour or corn starch, rye flour, rice, barley and oats are high in carbohydrates, and he wants his patients to consume fewer carbohydrates. He is among the growing number of health experts who say we consume too many grain products. Dr. Davis would like to see less consumption of potato starch, too. 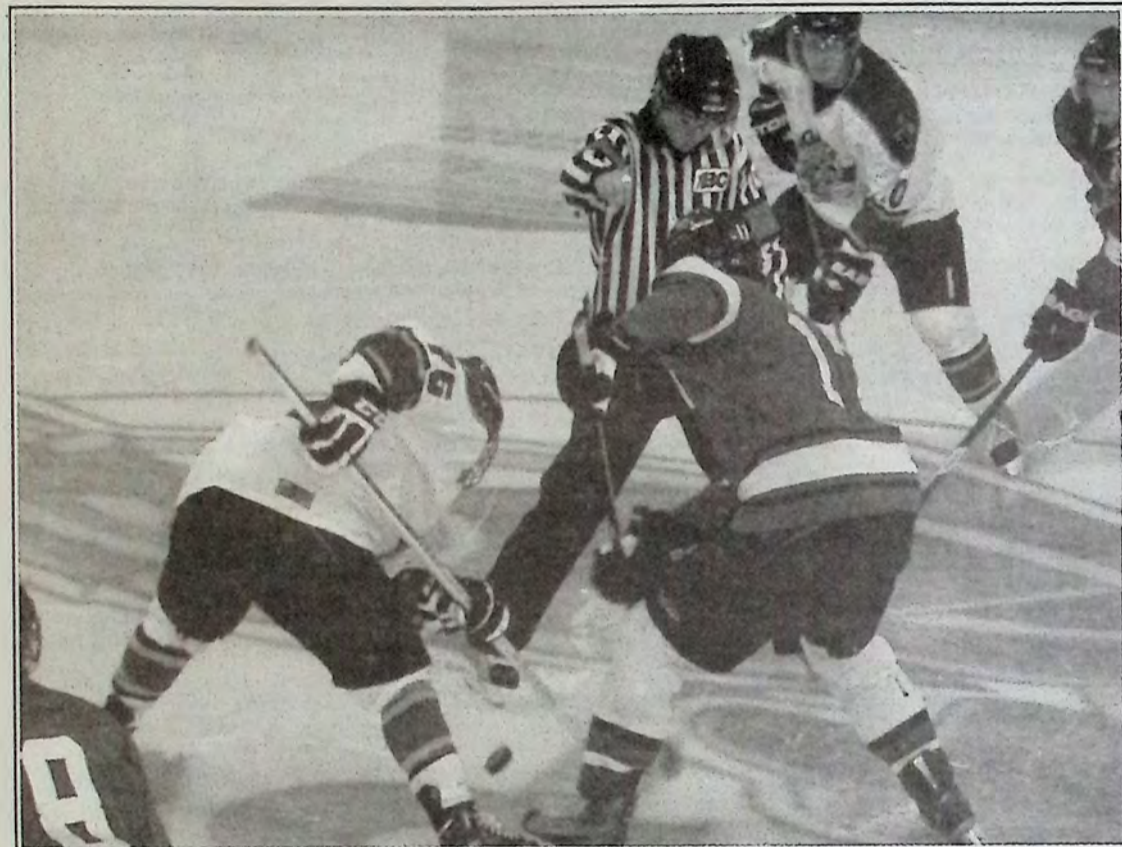

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

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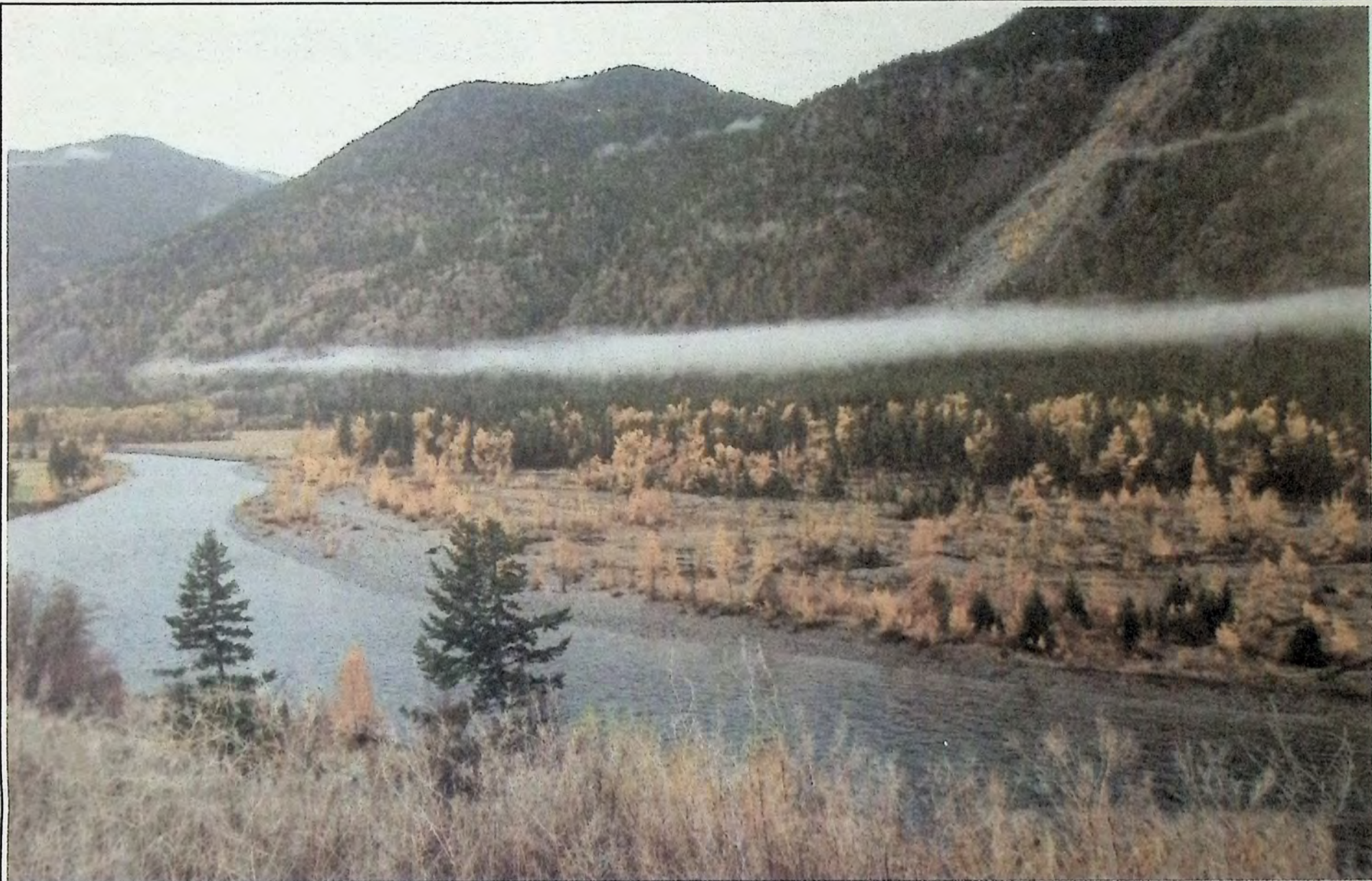

# Hummingbird year end report

After two years of training under Cam Finlay and Alison Moran of Rocky Point Bird Observatory, Sue Elwell was able to obtain a sub-banding permit to band hummingbirds.

The local Vermilion Forks Field Naturalist club has sponsored this project, giving money for equipment and great moral support. Because of the wonderful, patient and extremely dedicated team of volunteers, the team banded 592 birds and also had 35 recaptured birds. The recaptured birds were from previous banding sessions in 2012 or from previous years. There were two female Calliope which were banded in 2009 and 2010 during training sessions at a host site just out of town and recaptured at the same location – an example of site fidelity.

As for the 592 birds banded this year, both sexes of adult and juvenile Rufous, Calliope, Black-chinned and Anna's were trapped, except for the male Anna's. This elusive bird was actually observed several times at the Westridge location. The biggest surprise of the year was the discovery of the Anna's in the area. Prior to this the species had been observed a few times, generally in the fall, so to find them

throughout the summer around Princeton and surrounding area was a revelation.

With the capture and banding of a female bird in late July with an egg "on board," it has been determined these birds are nesting in the area! The Rufous, Calliope and Black-chinned are migratory birds, but the general feeling is the Anna's are a resident bird and will more than likely try to winter over. If you have left your feeder out accidentally and have thought you have seen a hummer around, it is probably this species. Some people feel that they need to take in their feeders to encourage the birds to head south, but this is not so. The need to migrate is so strong that when it is time the migratory birds will go. The Anna's do not seem to have this need to migrate and seem to put their energy into producing young. It appears they are able to withstand colder temperatures and will go into a torpor, a kind of hibernation, overnight.

Because of this, if you find a hummingbird which you think is dead or frozen, don't be too quick to bury it! Also if you have a hummer still coming in you might want to think about keeping syrup out this winter. You can wrap Christmas lights

around a glass feeder which might keep it from freezing, or you can take the feeder in at night and put it back out in the morning. It has also been observed that the birds have been seen at suet, which would be a protein source for them.

The mission statement for Rocky Point Bird Observatory is "Conservation through monitoring, research and public education." Wherever we went this year, the team handed out material concerning the feeding of the hummingbirds and general information on the local species. Myra Quadling and Terry Tellier had a table set up at the Osprey Lake Labour Day weekend festivities and spoke and passed along great information to anyone who stopped by. Good job, ladies!!!

Now about the wonderful, patient and extremely dedicated team of volunteers. Terry Tellier and Amanda Lahaie banded all season and have now been recommended and can now apply for their sub-banding permit. The actual banding is only a small part of the whole picture, as the birds need to be trapped and extracted from the nets and all the information needed for the research has to be recorded.

Cathy Lahaie, Joann Gabriel, Myra Quadling, Marg Hamblin, Ed Lahaie, Janis Wright, Kathi Eldred and Jason Lahaie did these tasks with great care and expertise, always keeping in mind the welfare of the bird. Of course we could not have banded a single bird without our enthusiastic host families who put up with us arriving on a regular basis at sometimes strange hours and more often than not on short notice. All this makes for a DREAM TEAM and a TERRIFIC YEAR!!

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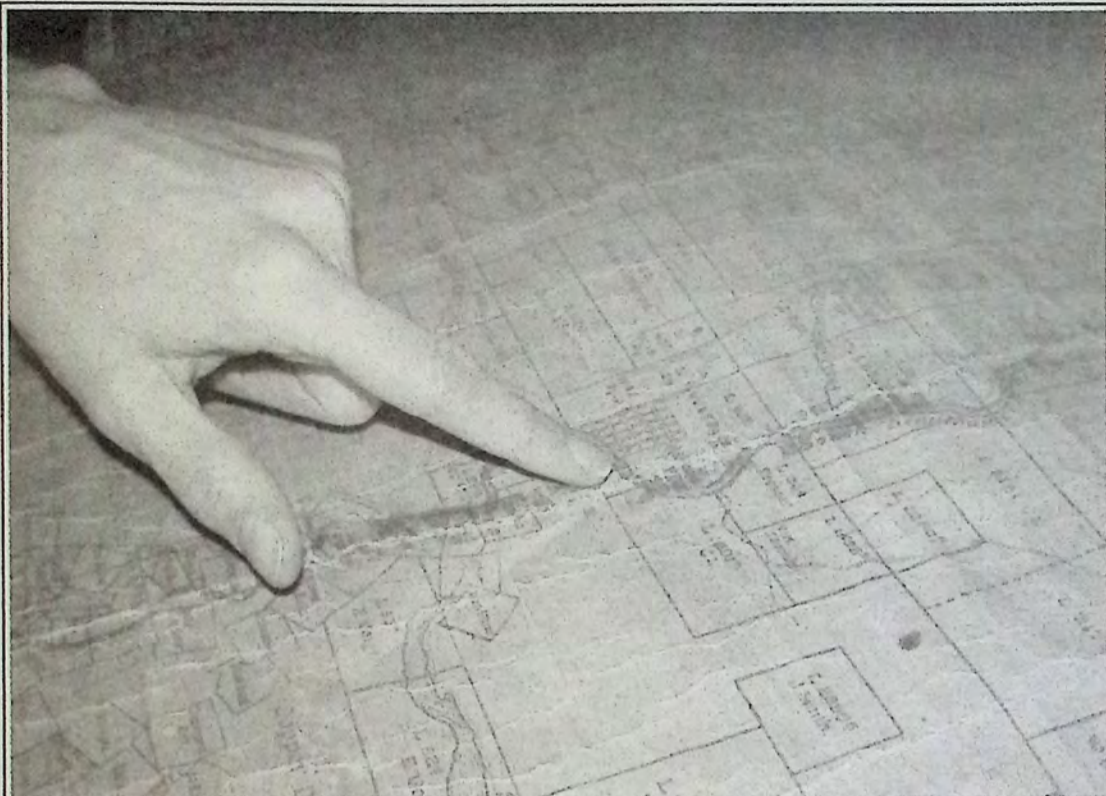

## Community Forests - Part 2

Community forests are commonly referred to as a "small tenure", but their hopes and aspirations are anything but small. Community forests were created to support local livelihoods and to promote innovation and economic diversification. They also encourage communication and the development of relationships within communities and with First Nations. They provide opportunities for local training and skills development.

Forest companies will change owners or come and go. However, community forests and the communities that manage them are here to stay. With area based, long-term tenures, incentives are created for long term investment in the land.

It is in the interest of these communities to manage their local forests for a range of values, including local jobs, wildfire mitigation and community interface planning, recreation infrastructure and small scale, local bioenergy.

There are five community forests in the BC Southern-Interior riding - Kaslo, Harrop -Procter, West Boundary, Keremeos, and Princeton - and the accounts of benefits derived from their operations are growing steadily. For example, Kaslo contributed funds to build the new clubhouse at the Kaslo Golf Club, a timber framed structure that also employed a local company for design and construction.

Harrop-Procter is the first community forest with Forest Stewardship Council Certification. With their low annual allowable harvest and a focus on protection of watershed values, they have established a small mill to turn their round trees into dimensional lumber products.

While community forestry holds

great potential for BC communities, the economic and ecological changes facing the forest sector as a whole present significant challenges. The British Columbia Community Forest Association (BCCFA) is working to help its members manage for future success.

At the recent BCCFA conference in Kaslo, delegates heard about the latest research on how to approach long term forest management in the context of climate change. They learned about the importance of understanding and monitoring the patterns and impacts of local change and they were introduced to some practical tools to analyze their vulnerabilities and risk. The new insights and tools will assist community forest managers to adapt their decision making to future conditions.

Community forests are seeking to diversify their operations and to capture more value for the wood harvested. WoodSourceBC.com is a new BCCFA initiative which helps to attract a wide group of log buyers and value added manufacturers to the community forest product and to partnership opportunities. Value added manufacturing can provide as much as ten times the jobs for each cubic metre of wood as can a primary breakdown facility.

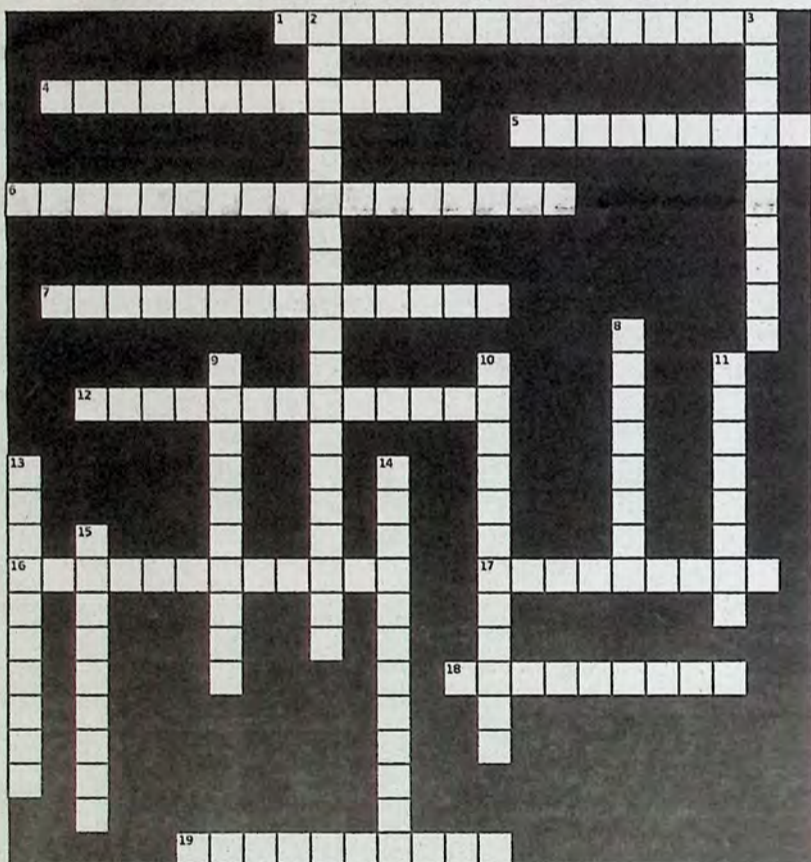
The higher value product can also provide for an alternative log market for community forests and other small tenures.

Value added is a good deal for communities because it can contribute to new jobs, youth retention, economic diversification and community stability.

 became trapped by Nazi forces. Hundreds died at a small city called Bastogne that winter until paratroopers managed to drop in sufficient numbers to bring an end to the siege of Bastogne.

The winter of 1944-45 was bitter, but the fighting went on and on, through Belgium and Holland. Many of the Dutch faced starvation and ate tulip bulbs in order to survive. Food was scarce throughout northern Europe that winter due to the war. Many of the troops on both sides had little to eat, and the civilians were often in worse conditions.

The effort to push into Germany continued as spring arrived. The Allied Forces gained ground not swiftly, but fighting every mile of

the way. Finally, Germany was taken, and Hitler committed suicide as his generals surrendered.

The war in Europe was over in the first week of May, and as the victo-

ry was celebrated in Europe, many looked back to that day in June, nearly a year before, to give thanks to those who stormed the beaches of Normandy.

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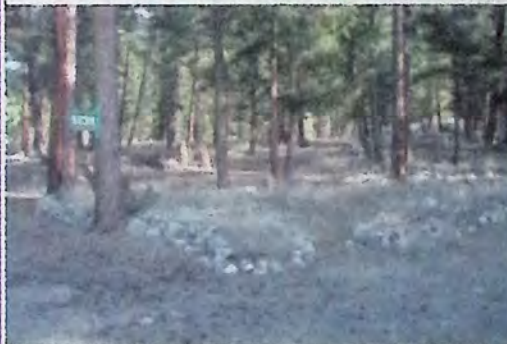
