Citizens be aware!

Volunteers who have spent the past six months working to keep Two Rivers Park looking good are dismayed at the level of disrespect shown this new park. This park is a community project located where the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers merge.

Three picnic tables have been chopped with an axe, even to the point of chopping around the chains that held the tables to the concrete slab on which the tables were placed. Two of the tables were carried to the river and dumped into the river.

Graffiti has been spray painted on various objects in the park, and the

'No Fires' signs have been destroyed.

Volunteers have picked up an unending mess of garbage, including garbage indicating illegal drug activities.

Local residents need to be aware of what is happening in Two Rivers Park and be ready to call police when this activity is seen or heard. A great deal of public money has been invested in this park along with a lot of volunteer hours. It is likely only a few vandals are involved in this repeated destruction of public property, and putting a stop to them will require the cooperation of the public.

Town approves recreation plan

Town Council approved a Recreation and Parks Strategic Plan at their November 5th regular meeting.

The approval gives the Town of Princeton Recreation Department the go ahead to proceed with a recreation future plan based on the Terms of Reference created which will lead to the use of a consultant to assist with a ten year plan. The plan will be used to assist with inventories, opportunities, recommendations and priorities.

The last major recreation survey dates back to 1998. The data collected at that time formed the strategy the recreation department has been using to guide the operation of the department and make recom-

mendations to council on development opportunities. That study was conducted 'in-house' with assistance from Chamber of Commerce staff and volunteers.

A total of fifteen projects identified in the 1998 survey have been completed including a skateboard park, Trans-Canada Trail development, KVR enhancement and core improvements, the Bridge of Dreams, Town Square, Two Rivers Park, Bike Park, Arena expansion, Museum renovations, Library renovations, China Ridge expansion, Golf Course expansion, public washrooms, community centre development and a performing arts centre/theatre.

"Our community has undergone many physical changes as well as demographic changes," states Recreation Director Lyle Thomas in his report to council.

"The 1998 survey results are now becoming dated and in need of a review."

Thomas says it is important to identify and address opportunities and concerns in providing parks and recreation services in the communi-

ty. "It is time to revisit and set new vision and goals." Town Council identified the need

to renew the Recreation and Parks Strategic Plan during 2012 budget meetings and have assigned a budget for this project.

Midget Rep hockey returns

Racing Days Association President Karrie Crucil read a quote from Baxter Black about the 10 percent of the people who do 90 percent of the work through volunteer efforts. It was appropriate for the occasion.

Agricultural Fair President Dan Kastor thanked his wife, Fran Murphy for helping him do a better job, and thanked the six women who made up his Board of Directors this past year and stepped up to put on the fair. He thanked all of the volunteers who turned out the week of the fair to make it a success.

If we see something happening that seems out of the ordinary, or that we know is wrong, like seeing someone destroying something, call the organization or call the police if it is illegal. If you know who vandalized any of the facilities, you should report them to the police. It is the least you can do to repay the volunteers who give so much for our community.

If you are looking for something to do this winter, why not join one of

these great organizations that keep our community going? Join the Lions, Rotary, China Ridge Trails, Vermilion Trails, PXA, Fall Fair, Racing Days, Rodeo, Princeton Posse, Museum or any of the many other volunteer organizations in town. All these organizations and so many that I did not list depend on everyday people to fill their ranks to keep not only their organization alive but to keep the activities and services they provide to the community going. Sometimes the public thinks that there is an army of volunteers who do all the work on so many of the projects, events, and activities, but in reality there is usually only a small handful of people who keep things moving forward. Of course there are exceptions to that, and our community has been great when it comes to volunteering when big projects are in the works, or when event day comes.

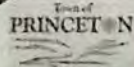

Speaking as the owner of a small business in downtown Princeton I can tell you we value whatever business we get. It's what keeps us in business and I'm not talking just about the advertising sprinkled throughout the pages of this paper.

We sell single issues of our paper for a buck each at our front counter. We sell classified ads at \$8 per week at our front counter. We send and receive faxes for customers for a per page rate. It's not hundreds of dollars a week by any stretch, but we appreciate all of it.

And I like to think we get that kind of business because it's cheaper than going out of town for those who use our classifieds and fax machine.

Why would Christmas shopping be any different?

We are blessed in Princeton in that you can shop at just about any downtown business and not be stuck in a line up for any length of time. Sure, it gets busier and we all have to be a bit more patient, but it's still quicker than a line up as far as the eye can see at one of those monster stores in the big city.

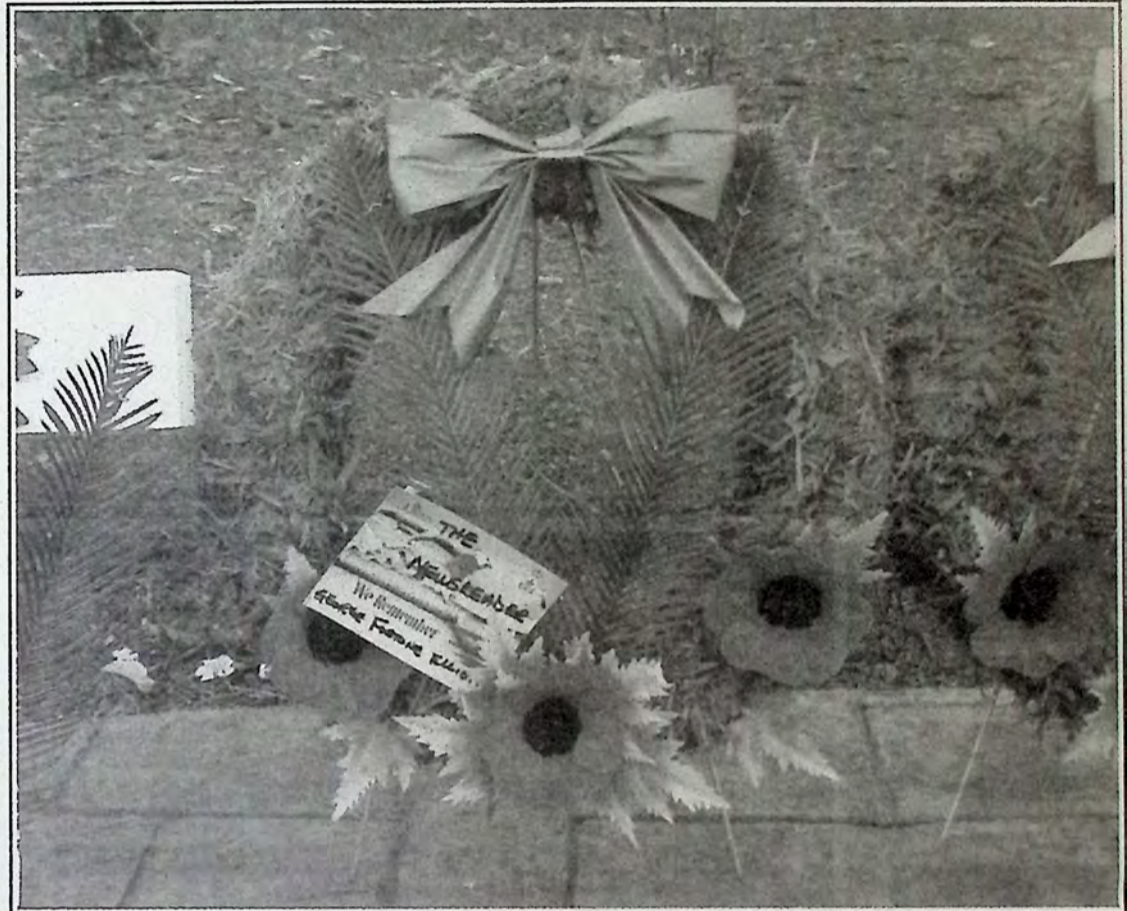
Another thing I like about Christmas shopping locally is that if I have a problem with my purchase I can often deal directly with the storeowner. Good luck trying that in those monster stores.

Legion hosts Remembrance Day

The annual Remembrance Day ceremonies drew a lot of community support. The number of wreaths and crosses around the Cenotaph were impressive. Royal Canadian Legion Branch 56 members, who organize this annual recognition of citizen sacrifice, did an excellent job as always. This year, Princeton Air Cadets participated in the Remembrance ceremony, and bugler Randy Gibson played the haunting notes for the two minutes of silence.

Following the ceremonies outdoors, Legion and Ladies members, RCMP, and members of the

public gathered in the Legion hall to enjoy a luncheon, and another kind of ceremony. Bob Paterson was MC for this portion of the day's activities.

Poppy Chair Jim Turner read a message from Prime Minister Harper, then the Youth Ambassadors recited "In Flanders Fields".

Veterans of past wars were asked to stand and be recognized. There are no World War I veterans, and just three World War II veterans stood. There were two Korean War veterans in attendance, two peacekeeper veterans, and one Reserve

Forces representing active service.

Mayor Frank Armitage was the first guest speaker, and earned a round of applause in his first statement, "Canada is the best country in the world."

He reviewed the number of Canadians who lost their lives in each war, and praised the Legion for conducting Remembrance Day services.

Legion President Wayne Terepocki spoke about the role of the Legion in addition to Remembrance Day. He described the ongoing priority of ensuring veterans were cared for, and spoke of programs for new veterans, those returning from Afghanistan. He mentioned the many Legion programs for all veterans, for youth, and for the community.

Charlene Longdo, Ladies Auxiliary President, thanked the Auxiliary and Legion members who had arranged the luncheon food. The Ladies Auxiliary gave the Legion \$2,000, and an additional \$601.78 raised by Auxiliary members who obtained donations for poppies, which is the launching of the annual Legion Poppy Campaign.

The Volunteer Appreciation Dinner is a way of rewarding these hard-working people, but it is only a token of appreciation. They deserve a lot more. During the past year, these volunteers have put on two race meets, two rodeos, a fair, a community Halloween party, and weekends of horseback riding for families. Some of these volunteers are bringing 4-H back to life in our community. We should be proud of these ambitious volunteers.

One of the great things about these user groups is family participation. I do not know what we would have done without the Bernard family this year, as Jen organized the upgrade of the concession and the Halloween party

while husband Jim and Dad Bernard worked at and between every single event. The Graves family, the Crucils and the Littlejohns were a major help, too, along with many couples and singles. Most people do not know their children are welcome to participate in meetings and work parties. Most teens do not know they are welcome to become members.

During the past year, there has been a dynamic revival of cooperation between user groups, mostly because many of the same people belong to more than one user group. Even our work parties have had a pretty good turnout. When we say work parties, we mean work for sure, but we try to have a social lunch where we toss around ideas, share concerns, and do some short and long term planning we can take to meetings.

This year, the Town of Princeton (you, the taxpayers) have provided better funding and a great deal of upgrade work was accomplished. We were pleased this year to have the active participation of Councillors Jason Earle and Doug Pateman, and Mayor Frank Armitage (Yes, Frank, new horse-shoe pits are in the plans!). Our fire department and Ground Search and Rescue groups came out to help at more than one event.

We could use a lot more participation by men. Right now, most of the members of the groups are women, and they have worked their butts off this year, most of them working with all user groups and Princeton Exhibition Association.

There have been a few of us old ladies, like myself, who worked hard at events and planning. However, as good as these women are, we have only a few good men and would surely welcome some more. Men seem to know more

about how to fix things, how to build things, where to go to get supplies and equipment, and have those mechanical skills most women do not have. The men who have helped this year have been a real boon.

Our fairground facility is very valuable. It would take several million dollars to replace what we have built as a community. Some of our facilities are in need of serious upgrading or replacement, but it is still a great facility for a small town.

Having said all of this in praise of the people and the facility, I want to assure you I speak not just from the heart, but from 30 years of working with one or more of the groups. I have seen what they can do and what they are doing and what they hope to do. That said, I kind of blew my stack when I heard there were complaints from some people about the Halloween party. Imagine - people dared to complain about something they were given free of charge for their children!

After my anger died down, I thought, "We missed an opportunity! We should have taken their names and phone numbers and asked them to put their money where their mouths are and come out an help!"

When I say we missed an opportunity, I mean it. New members with new ideas are always welcomed, especially the kind of people who are serious about pitching in and doing the planning, the organizing, and the work. Our newer members have brought some really good ideas to our user groups and Princeton Exhibition Association. They have been generous with their knowledge and skills.

The older members have experience, of course, and their own kind of know-how, but newer members bring with them different experiences and different skills that keep our groups vibrant and successful.

The Rodeo Club has had its annual general meeting, but the AGMs for Princeton Racing Days Association, Princeton Exhibition Association and the Fair Association have upcoming meetings, and would love to have new members join. You are already putting your money into the fairgrounds, why not put your mouth in, too?

For unemployed, a 12 week session of job seeking assistance, called Footprints to Employment, begins on November 19.

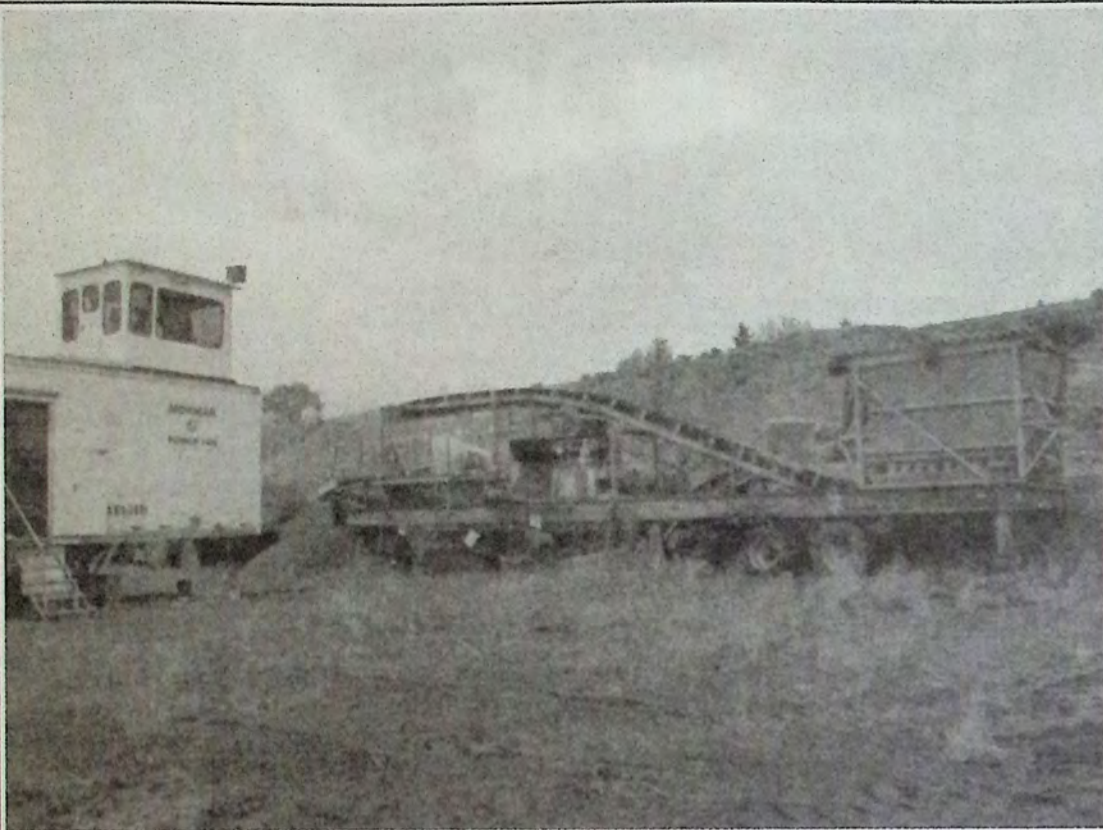

A series of seven sieves measures the sizes of aggregate produced by the mobile crushing crew from Inland Contracting in Penticton. Each sample starts with 1,100 to 1,200 grams of aggregate. The sample is weighed and cooked on an outdoor stove to remove moisture. The sample is then washed to remove dirt, cooked again to remove moisture and put through the system of seven sieves. 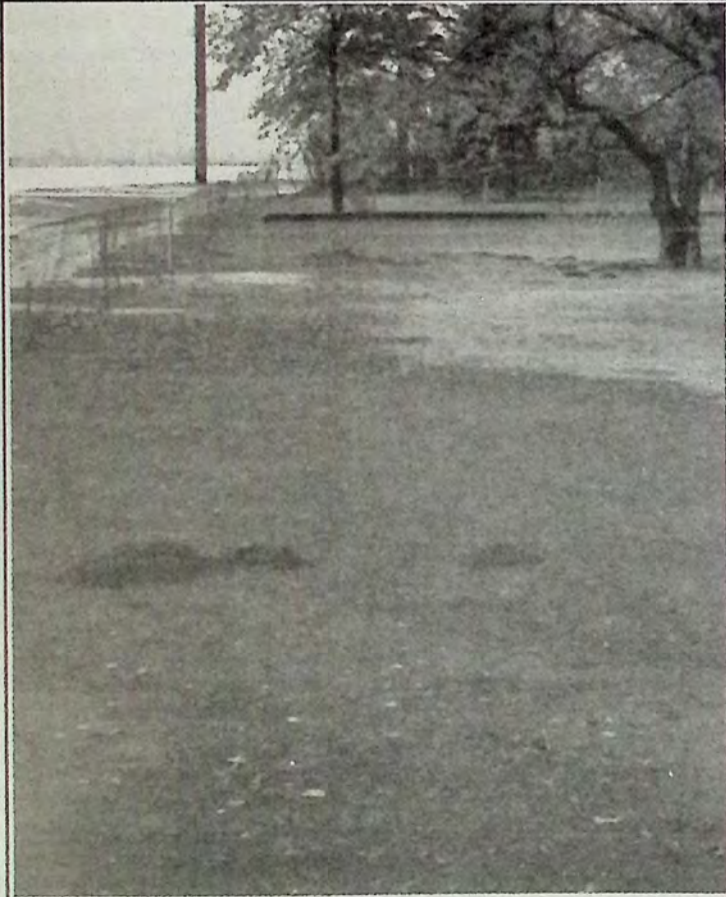

Atamanenko speaks out

BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko reacted November 6th to the House of Commons Committee hearing on Bill S-11, The Safe Food for Canada Act. According to the long-time Agriculture Committee member, there was absolutely no willingness on the part of the Conservative majority to consider any of the Opposition

amendments. "I find this totally reprehensible", stated the former NDP Agriculture critic. "Both Opposition parties told the Conservatives we support the bill especially in light of the recent crisis at XL Foods." Atamanenko added, "We offered very positive amendments to strengthen

en the bill – all were rejected." The NDP prepared 11 amendments including provisions for whistleblower protection, an independent audit and an exemption in regard to domestic regulations for foods processed strictly for export. "Today's experience with S-11 put the current state of affairs in Parliament in perspective," concluded Atamanenko. "I am convinced now more than ever, that the Conservatives have absolutely no interest in making Parliament work in a spirit of cooperation. This is a black day for democracy!"

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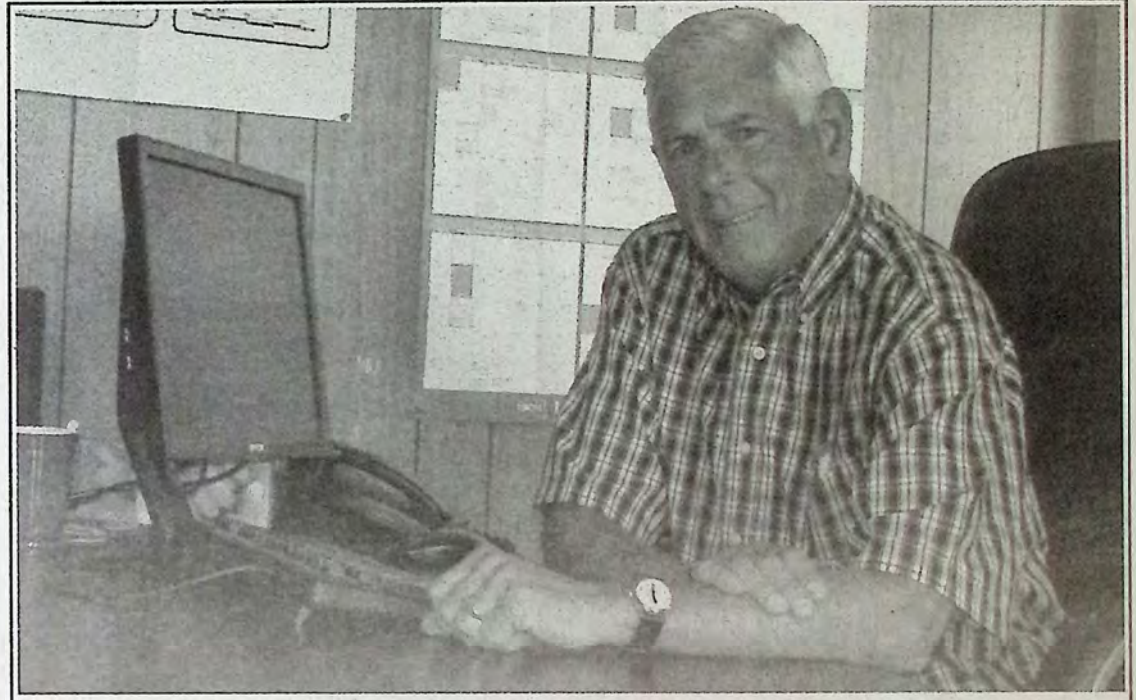

'Tis The Season For Holiday Scams

As the holiday season approaches, a time when people are typically feeling more generous, you may find that you're getting more requests to

donate to charities. And while there are many legitimate companies and charities calling you for fundraising purposes, it's a good idea to take some precautions and be informed. November 1st to 7th was Crime Prevention Week and the B.C. government teamed up with Consumer Protection BC to help keep families and communities safe from crime.

The following tips can help protect you from telephone charitable scams:

- Ask for the information to be sent to you in writing before you commit to a donation.
- Ask the telemarketer to call you back and, in the meantime, call the charity yourself to confirm they are actually running a fundraising campaign. You can also visit the Canadian Revenue Agency website at www.cra-arc.gc.ca/chrts-gvng/lstngs/menu-eng.html to ensure that a charity is registered.
- Ask them to give you the charitable tax number of the charity.
- Remember that if you are told you have won a prize, you should never have to pay money to receive the prize.

If you do decide to make a donation over the phone, always keep a record of the date, the name, address and phone number of the person and charity you spoke to, the amount you donated and the method of payment. Always be cautious around giving

Gene Therapy Is Going Commercial

Europe has approved the first-ever gene therapy for commercial use. This therapy is for a particular genetic defect that interferes with proper digestion. It is the beginning of a revolution in health care, but it is not one that most of us will see come into general use. Still, it is a beginning.

Gene therapy is highly complex, and has had some great disappointments and at least one real tragedy, but there is nothing wrong with the theory behind the therapy. In simple terms, gene therapy consists of taking cells from a patient, eliminating the offending genes, hopefully replacing them with good genes, and putting the cells back in the patient. As cells multiply by dividing, the good cells will spread through the patient's body and the bad cells will die off. That is the theory, and it works, but the practice is not proven or routine, except for this single therapy so recently approved in Europe.

Gene therapy is horrendously expensive. When it is successful, it is worth every penny spent on it. It is the answer to genetically caused disorders, such as Down syndrome. What would a family be willing to pay to have Down syndrome removed from their child?

What would a family pay to be able to change the gene that causes breast cancer? What would a family pay to be rid of Huntington's chorea? Or hemophilia? Defective genes cause health disorders that cannot be cured, can be passed on to another generation, and cause suffering to a huge number of people and their families.

Scientists have been isolating genes for decades in plants, and altering the genetic make-up of many food plants. These are called genetically modified (GM) plants, and there is a lot of opposition to GM food crops. Gene therapy is considerably different in the sense that it is eliminating a gene that Mother Nature would have eliminated through death in past times.

Human genetic modification is likely to reach astonishing new levels in the next 50 years, perhaps even to the point of making us live longer. For the next couple of decades, the research and therapy will be done to cure genetic disorders of as many types as possible.

Slow Cooker Pulled Turkey

Serves: 10-12 / Prep Time: 15 minutes / Cooking Time: 5.5 hours

Ingredients

- 2.5 kg Granny's turkey thighs and/or drumsticks, bone-in, skin removed
- 2 Tbsp (30 mL) vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) onion, finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp (30 mL) garlic, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup (65 mL) mild paprika
- 2 Tbsp (30 mL) smoked paprika
- 1/4 tsp (1.25 mL) cloves, ground
- 1/4 tsp (1.25 mL) black pepper, ground
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 tsp (10 mL) sea salt
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) cider vinegar
- 1-540 mL can low sodium whole tomatoes
- 3 Tbsp (45 mL) maple syrup

Directions

Heat oil in a skillet and brown the onion and garlic. Add both types of paprika, cloves, pepper, bay leaf, salt, cider vinegar and maple syrup; bring to a simmer. Drain tomatoes, remove seeds and puree in a food processor; add to the skillet. Place turkey into slow cooker then add all ingredients from skillet and mix well. Place lid on slow cooker then cook on low setting for 6 hours. Let cool, then skim fat off surface. Remove the turkey pieces from the slow cooker and "pull" the cooked meat off the bones by using two forks to shred it. Discard the bones. Mix the meat back in with the sauce and re-warm before serving. Serve on a crusty bun. Recipe courtesy of Chef Jason Wortzman.

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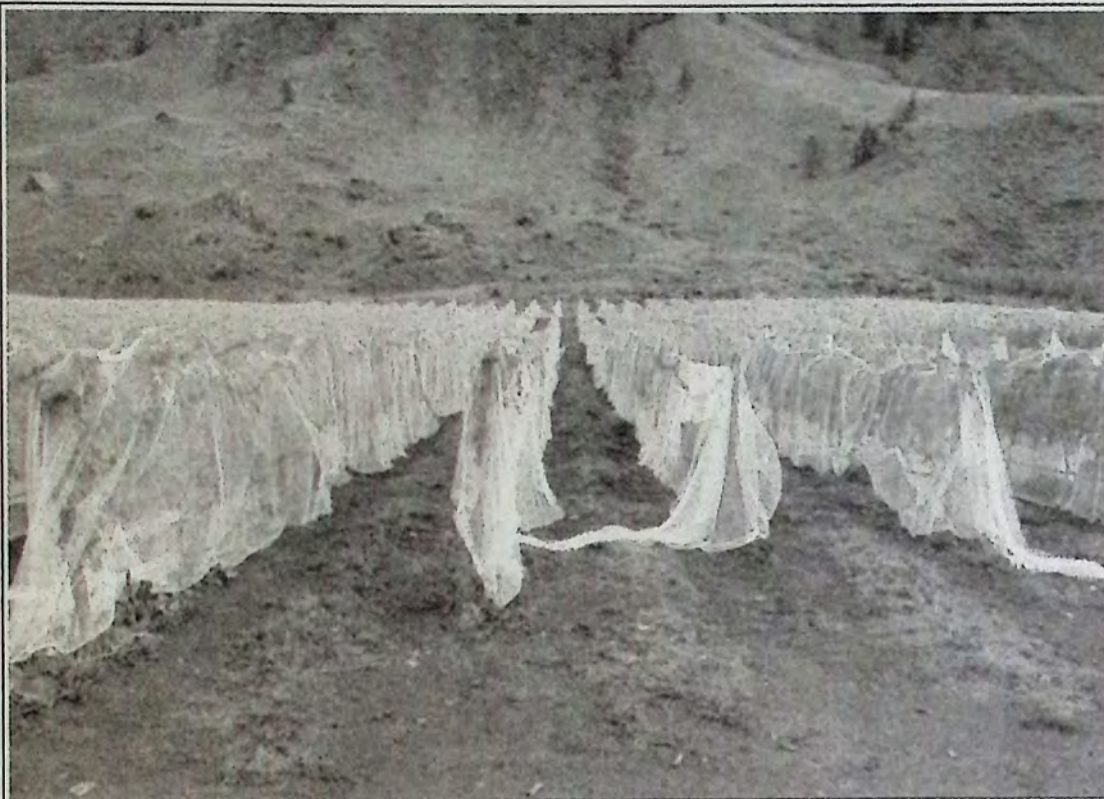

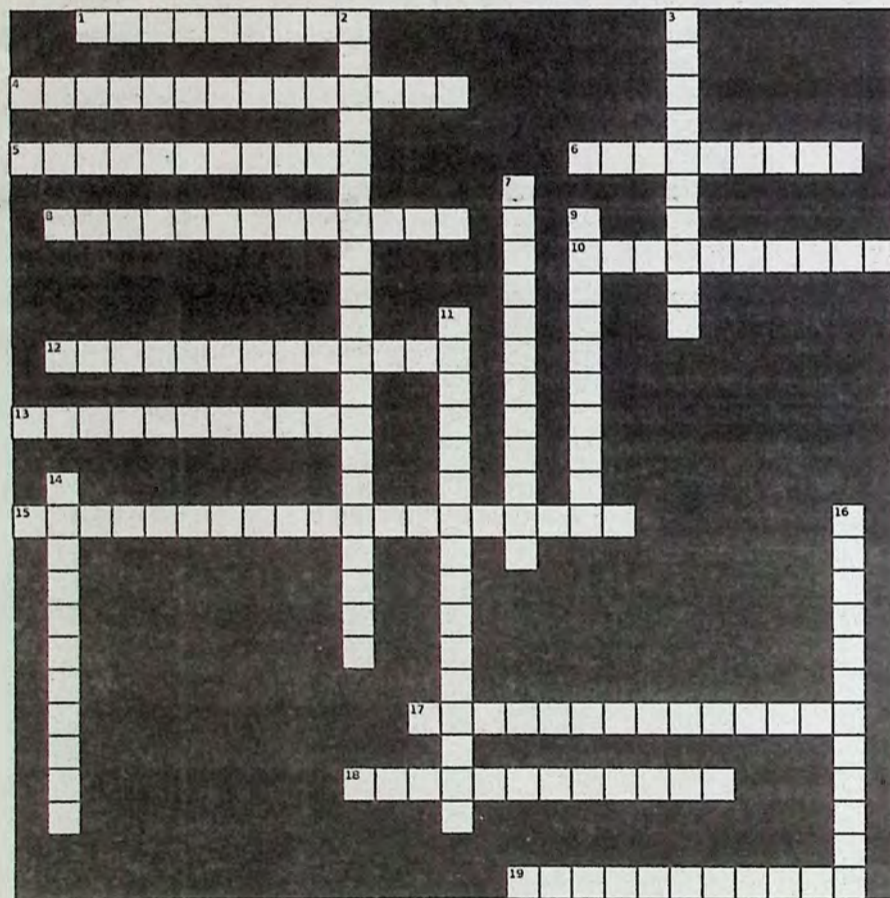

Council awards inspection contract

Town Council awarded EBA Engineering Consultants Ltd. with a contract to conduct a detailed site investigation of property located at 167 Bridge Street.

The motion made by Councillor Jason Earle, seconded by Councillor Doug Pateman, during the November 5th regular meeting

of Town Council is for work valued at \$108,842 plus taxes.

The Town of Princeton purchased the lot, next to Town Hall in February 2010 as part of a plan to expand the municipal building.

As the property was formerly a dry cleaning business, it requires a detailed site investigation as directed by contaminated site regulations and a multi-stage investigation will take place to identify potential contamination sources, location of soil, groundwater and sediment contamination and the delineation of any contamination.

Follow-up stages include remediation, the removal of contamination meeting applicable standards and confirmation that all contamination has been removed.

The first two stages have been completed.

Funding has been secured from the BC Brownfield Renewal Funding Program with a \$10,880 'in kind' contribution from the town in the form of administrative time.

The entire site investigation and follow up steps are to be completed in a two-year period.

Ball park grandstand receives new siding

During budget preparations for 2012 the condition of the grandstand siding at Memorial Park was presented as a priority item and in need of replacement.

Recreation Director Lyle Thomas presented an update on the project at the November 5th regular meeting of Town Council.

"Baseball in our community has been a large part of our history," explained Thomas in his report.

"Many of our forefathers have played ball in Princeton and area and have passed this legacy down to our children. The grandstands at Memorial Park are part of this rich heritage."

Thomas says that although the interest in ball has dropped off "a bit in the past" he says it appears to be making a comeback.

The facility had a lot of work done

to it in the 1990s with a major upgrade to the fields. A new metal roof was installed on the grandstand in 2009 and minor repairs have been made over the years by the Public Works Department based on recommendations from the Municipal Insurance Association resulting from reviews including a risk management assessment.

A total of \$24,000 has been budgeted by the Town of Princeton for the siding project and fall was chosen as the best time to do the work.

A structural review is expected to take place this week to satisfy requirement of the Building Inspections Office.

"Work will start as soon as possible," Thomas told Town Council.

"And it will continue as long as the weather holds."
