# 2012 busy for bylaw enforcement

Town of Princeton Bylaw Enforcement Officer Stephanie Palmar presented Town Council with a 2012 annual review of her duties.

Property Maintenance, specifically the Unsightly Premises Bylaw, received the most complaints over the past year with an average of four to six active complaints at any given time with five currently active.

"Unsightly premises range from complaints as simple as overgrown weeds and grass to properties with accumulations of rubbish and unlicensed derelict vehicles," Palmar says in her report to Council.

"Completion of a complaint is dependent on the level of co-operation from the property owner and can vary anywhere from two to three weeks to two to three months."

Animal Control complaints Palmar has received in the past year include dogs at large, excessive barking, aggressive dog attacks, failure to clean up after a dog in a public place and on private property, breeding dogs within Town limits and cruelty to animals.

"Often residents of the town when they find a dog at large will bring the animal to the Town office,"

Palmar explains.

"If we are unable to immediately locate the owner with a Town of Princeton dog licence or veterinary

tattoo the dog is taken to the animal pound to await redeeming."

Only two dogs were not claimed by owners in 2012 and both found

new homes.

## Council supports proposal

Princeton Town Council supported in principal a proposal by the Museum Society at their November 5th regular meeting.

Town Council also granted the Museum Society approval to proceed with the concept, planning and budget stage of a project to construct a new outdoor interpretive display building.

The building will be used to securely house and shelter the Vivian Diesel and large logging wheels not currently on display at the museum grounds.

The Museum Society has a funding opportunity that has presented itself unexpectedly and they would like to

take advantage of the winter months to plan the project and then be prepared to start construction of the new structure in the spring.

"The museum we see today is representative of the rich history and culture of our community," states Recreation Director Lyle Thomas in his report to Town Council.

"In 2010/2011, the Museum underwent considerable renovations and the Society was able to access grant funding and volunteer labour to complete this task successfully," Thomas says.

"They demonstrated an ability to work with Town staff, contractors and volunteers in order to complete

the renovations."

The Museum building and grounds are owned by the Town of Princeton and managed by the Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society. The Society is made up of a group of volunteers who manage one part time employee, Operations Manager Robin Lowe.

The outdoor display project has been part of a vision developed by the Museum Society and although they are not looking for funding for the project, they will require staff assistance from both the Recreation Director and Public Works Manager ..... continued on Page 21

..... continued from Front Page time, cost, brief description, poster or pictures, organization website linkage, contact information for public use.

If a group needs support from Town Public Works, a letter requesting the work should be sent to Town Council a minimum of two months prior to the event. Support will be given free of charge between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday to Friday, but if overtime work is required of the Town crew, then there could be a charge to the event organizers to cover the overtime wages.

Requests for Town Public Works support should include the event, where it takes place, where barricades should be set up, or a tent set up, snow fencing layout, outhouse locations, garbage cans and any

other locations for equipment, as well as any site preparation such as weeding or mowing. If a group needs the water truck, dump truck, tables and chairs, the new Town events tent, lights or water turned on or off, barricades or any other equipment, this must be part of the request. If any street closures are required, Town Council must be consulted in writing and must approve the plan. If barricades are required, they should be picked up by the group the day before the event. Barricades are not to be left unattended downtown prior to or after the event, or overnight, and must be returned to the Town the next working day.

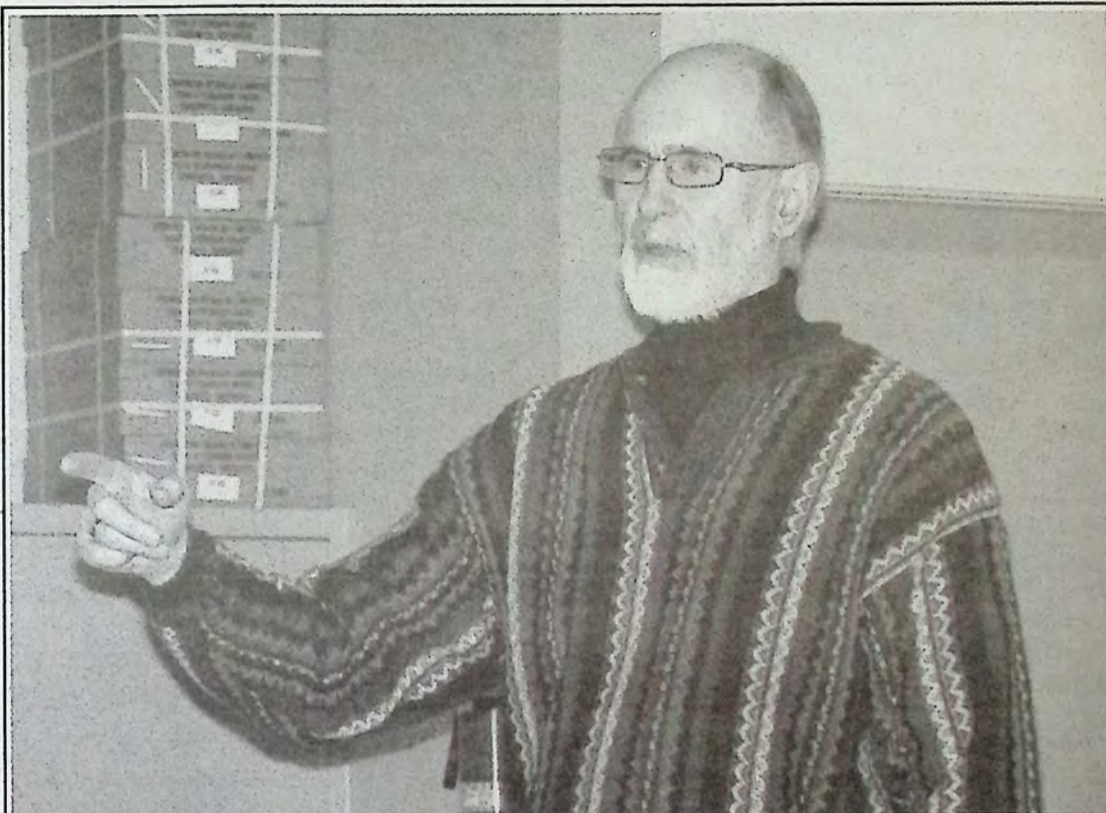
Grant in Aid application forms were distributed to a representative group of each group. Deadline for submitting the application is

January 31.

Updating November and December events for 2012 began the calendar portion of the busy information session, followed by significant dates in 2013. These

dates will be entered into the Town website Community Events section, but groups must contact McEwen to fill in details as the event approaches. Groups were reminded to use all means of advertising an event, and

to share advertising when possible, for example, a group such as the Rodeo Club could share advertising space with another group to advertise the second group's upcoming event.

Council and staff have already begun the work on almost all of Council's priorities and Council looks forward to reporting out in the status of these priorities on a regular basis.

### Sign Of The Times

One of the things that have always bugged me about Princeton is address and road signage. It's also the same thing I think has added a bit of character, mystery and confusion to getting around town.

My favourite examples include: Our house. We live on Burton Avenue. Our property does not touch Burton Avenue as there is an empty lot in front of ours; however, we have a Burton Avenue address. Our second lot is on Bar Street. It has an even number. The property next to it has an uneven number.

Others include: Billiter Avenue, which is split by three benches and Angela Avenue which has been split by the Similkameen River.

I'm sure you can come up with even more examples that must leave many visitors and first responders shaking their heads.

Regardless of how you may feel about it, I am sure glad I don't live on Halliford Avenue. Residents there seem to put up with a lot of heavy truck traffic that ends up on their quiet residential street from a mix up in directions.

The most recent example of that is the B-Train loaded with hay that went down there last Thursday night. The driver must have thought he was heading down Highway 5A and clued into his error either just before or shortly after clipping a fence on the corner of Halliford and Lime. He barely knocked over a fire hydrant, which would have been a pretty good sign that he was cutting the corner a bit too tight.

Residents in the area say he didn't even stop to apologize for the damage.

There is a rather large sign at the Highway 5A/Bridge Street intersection, but it's up high and is sometimes missed, but not as narrowly as the fire hydrant on the corner of Halliford and Lime.

Although signage for Highway 5A falls under the responsibility of the provincial Highways Ministry, I think the Town of Princeton should add this and other confusing signs and numbers to their priority list for either upgrading or correcting.

The Halliford Avenue incident last week is a good reason to take this seriously and make some noise for a solution to the signage problem.

### Letters and E-Mails Received This Past Week

To the Editor;

Telus Communications Co. is proposing to construct a 25-metre-high cell phone tower in the middle of Hedley - across from the Seniors' Centre (formally known as the OAP), on Telus-owned property - at 796 Scott Avenue. Hedley residents were informed of this proposal (by way of fliers in post office boxes), on October 24, 2012, at which time the public was invited to a Telus Open House at the Seniors' Centre on November 8, to learn further of Telus' plans.

It is important to note the tower Telus is proposing to construct would have a limited range of service to residents of Hedley. That is, the cell phone range would not extend to Highway 3 in either

direction, east or west. Taken from the storey board presented at the Open House, outlining the ranges of three proposed towers in the Valley, the additional two towers Telus wishes to install, at a later date, would cover Highway 3 - both east and west of Hedley - but no earlier than 2014, as told by a Telus consultant.

What the proposed cell phone tower range would cover is, the village of Hedley extending back into Twenty Mile Canyon, west to the USIB Reserve - at least to the Snaza'ist cul-de-sac, if not the Upper Bench as well - and south to the USIB Reserve land across the Similkameen River.

A bit of research on Health Canada's Safety Code 6 - the regu-

lating body for the telecommunications industry - reveals that it is woefully behind the times it terms of safeguarding Canada's citizens. While Telus states the electromagnetic field (EMF) emitting from the tower would be at 0.1% of Health Canada's Safety Code 6, this still remains as much as 6 times higher than the standard recommended by independent scientific studies from around the world (see the BioInitiative Report, 2007).

These standards state a minimum of 300-500 metres between a cell tower and the closest residence, particularly where children are present, i.e. schools, playgrounds, libraries, etc., as children are particularly sensitive to the debilitating effects of EMF.

In May of 2011, the IARC (International Association for Research on Cancer) declared radio frequency radiation as a possible cause of cancer. Dr. Jonathan M Samet, MD, University of Southern California, was the Chair of this international group of scientists.

## Virgin Americas Is A Myth

We have grown up with the legend that when the Europeans first came to the Americas, they came to a pristine land of virgin forests and fields, with a few primitive native settlements. I have been reading a book called 1491 written by Charles C. Mann, and he documents archaeological and historical records that prove the legend is a myth.

A historical account of a voyage by Giovanni da Verrazzano in 1523 reveals the eastern coastline of North America was 'densely populated'. He remarked that the smoke from the many fires of the native American villages could be smelled far out to sea. Verrazzano was the first European to visit the shores of Maine and write about it. He described the natives as healthy, taller and more robust than most Europeans.

One hundred years later, voyages to the east coast found the remains of villages with skeletons lying in the ruins of native homes. They were dead from disease brought to them by Verrazzano's two week visit.

The same is true of the busy cities of the Mississippi basin. The first Spanish exploration of the Mississippi lasted months, and the reports repeatedly describe the large numbers of native people lining the shores of the river or coming out in canoes to look at the

strangers' ship. When La Salle went down the Mississippi nearly one hundred years later, he reported few natives lived in the area.

Today, estimates of the numbers of native Americans killed by European diseases range between 60 and 70 percent. Try to imagine your town going from 3,000 to 1,000 in a month. Then think of our Regional District of perhaps 100,000 people being reduced to 40,000 in one month. Those who die first are the very young and the elderly. What is left is people of working age who have lost parents and children, aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents. The grief must have been incredible!

What was lost, along with the dead, was knowledge, skills, social order.

Historical records from South America, particularly in the Amazon Basin, show the same high population on first voyages and almost total lack of population on later voyages. Records show the natives of the Amazon fleeing European explorers of a later period.

Archaeology in the Americas has advanced by leaps and bounds during the past century. Drawing together the archaeological data from a multitude of digs in the Americas, a new picture emerges of the Americas before Columbus. The Americas were heavily populated continents having large cities sustained by advanced agricultural practices. In short, the economies of the Americas depended on farming.

To say that most of the people of the Americas were farmers contradicts everything taught in schools. Modern archaeology proves our previous notions about the Americas are false.

Even along the Amazon River, where the soil is notoriously poor, archaeologists have found the remains of fields built up from charcoal, broken pottery, and organic wastes.

Let's go back to that visit to the east coast in 1523. The indigenous people of New England had fields of maize (corn), beans and squash. They had orchards of nut trees, in which 'weed' trees and bushes were burnt out on a seasonal basis. They had coops containing domesticated turkeys. They went fishing. No wonder they looked so healthy and were taller and more muscular than the Europeans - they had a highly nutritious diet!

In South America, crops ranged from manic fields and orchards of peach palm in the lower Amazon basin to potatoes and quinoa in the Andes, along with many other foods. The people of the Andes had domesticated animals, the llama and guinea pig, which they raised for food.

In all but the most inhospitable areas of North and South America, all of the native people fostered the growth and number of wild food sources. Berry bushes were encouraged where they were found, and other bushes were weeded out. Nut trees were protected from the invasion of non-food plants.

Irrigation systems were constructed where required, and raised fields developed where the land was swampy. The indigenous peoples of North and South America fed themselves well through excellent farming skills.

What the European settlers found was NOT virgin fields and forests, but the ruins of what had been a thriving agricultural society. Evidence was found in the Mississippi valley of a great city with its surrounding fields, and barriers to keep out the wild animals, such as buffalo and deer. These animals were hunted, but not part of the agricultural system. Those millions of buffalo roaming the Great Plains may have been far fewer if so many hunters had not perished in the epidemics.

Today, 60 percent of the world's food crops originated in North and South America. Beans, squash, pumpkins, cucumbers, tomatoes, maize, peppers, chocolate, peanuts and potatoes are found everywhere on earth, thanks to the farmers of the Americas. If you like passion fruit and papaya, you can thank the original orchardists of the Caribbean. The so-called wild plum of North America is now cultivated, as are cranberries and saskatoons.

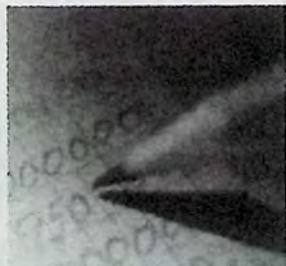

## Similkameen wines win 46 medals

Fall is an important time for wineries in the Similkameen. It's time to pick, harvest, crush and process the grapes and fruits that go into the award-winning wines of the Similkameen. This fall, the wineries of the Similkameen Wineries Association won a staggering 46 medals for their submissions at the major wine competitions.

The Wine Access International Value Wine Awards are held annually in Calgary, and have grown dramatically in size, success, and international reputation since they began in 2006.

Each year, Canada's leading wine experts evaluate over 1,200 wines from more than a dozen countries. This year, Clos du Soleil's 2011 Pinot Blanc Baessler Growers Series won Judges' Choice Award for White Single Varietals. In addition, Clos du Soleil won 2 silver medals and 2 bronze medals at the InterVin International Wine Competition.

The Wine Access Canadian Wine Awards is an annual competition where Canada's leading wine experts evaluate wines from across the country. The judging for the 2012 awards was held earlier this year in Penticton and included 1,255 registrations.

Wineries from the Similkameen Wineries Association captured 32 of these awards including 8 silver medals and 24 bronze medals.

Silver medals were awarded to Cerelia (1), Clos du Soleil (1), Orofino (2), Robin Ridge (2), Rustic Roots (1) and Seven Stones (1).

Bronze medals were awarded to Clos du Soleil (3), Eau Vivre (2), Forbidden Fruit Winery (5), Orofino (4), Robin Ridge (1), Rustic Roots Winery (5) and Seven Stones (4).

Regionally, the Okanagan Fall Wine Awards judges wines from all regions of British Columbia. Wineries from the Similkameen Wineries Association picked up 9 British Columbia Wine Awards including a gold medal for Robin Ridge Winery's 2010 Gamay. In addition, Cerelia picked up a bronze, Clos du Soleil a silver and two bronze, a silver and two bronze for Rustic Roots and a silver for Seven Stones.

Sara Harker, President of the Similkameen Wineries Association explained, "The Similkameen has been producing amazing grape and fruit wines now for many years. We are absolutely thrilled that our very special little wine region is now starting to get such incredible recognition regionally, nationally and internationally."

Harker continued, "2012 was a very successful year for our wineries. These 46 awards, combined with the other awards we won during Spring Wine Festival (37), Gold Medal Plates (2), Lieutenant Governor Award for Excellence in BC Wines (1) and other wine events (7) represent 93 awards for our member wineries in 2012."

Harker was very pleased to report that "while the esteemed wine judges were in Penticton to judge the Wine Access 2012 Canadian Wine Awards, our winery association members were thrilled to host them for dinner at Orofino, featuring the local foods and wines of the Similkameen. ## Economists cautiously optimistic

The majority of B.C. Economic Forecast Council members predict B.C. real GDP growth will slightly outperform the Canadian average in 2013, Finance Minister Michael de Jong announced November 16th at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the council.

On average, the council expects B.C. real GDP growth to be 2.1 per cent in 2012, down minimally from its 2.2 per cent forecast in January of this year. The council also projects B.C. real GDP will grow 2.2 per cent in 2013, 2.6 per cent in 2014 and average 2.6 per cent for 2015-17.

The council has lowered its growth projections for the province this year and next in light of ongoing weakness in the global economy.

Council members discussed their predictions for the B.C., Canadian,

U.S., European and Asian economies. Topics included resource development and the potential of liquefied natural gas, the state of the US recovery, the European sovereign debt crisis, rising household debt, tax competitiveness, and the importance of meeting labour market demand through trades and skills training.

The Economic Forecast Council includes some of the most respected independent economic forecasters in Canada.

The 14-member council's mandate - as determined by the Budget Transparency and Accountability Act - is to provide economic advice to the Minister of Finance in developing each year's budget and fiscal plan. Council members are surveyed twice a year, once in the fall and then again the following

January.

British Columbia's Ministry of Finance forecast in the September Quarterly Report that the provincial economy would grow 2.0 per cent in 2012, 1.8 per cent in 2013 and about 2.4 per cent annually in the following years. A new government forecast will be released with Budget 2013.

"Our government is committed to balancing the budget in 2013-14. A balanced budget shows the world B.C.'s economy is stable, secure and ripe for investment. It also protects our triple-A credit rating which allows us to continue to focus our investment in priority areas, including schools, health-care facilities and roads, which support job creation and benefit B.C. communities and families," stated Minister of Finance Michael de Jong. - submitted

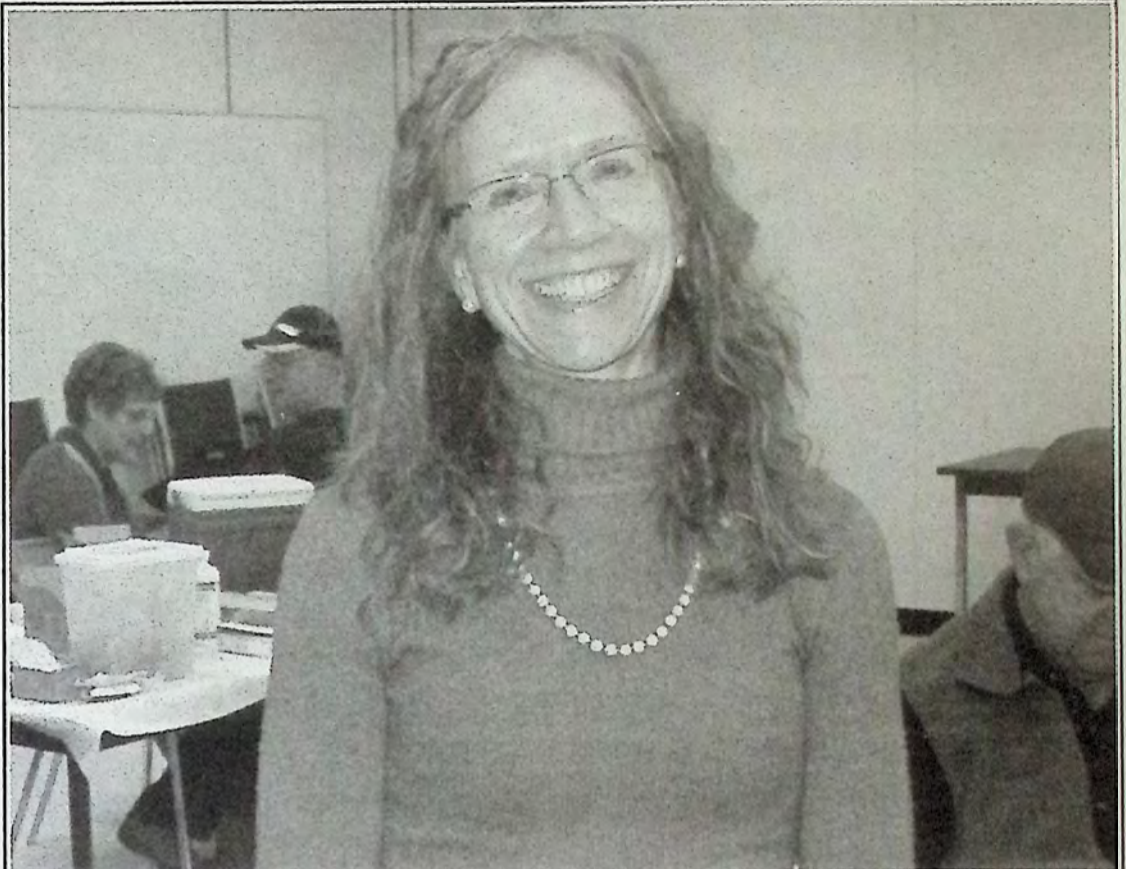

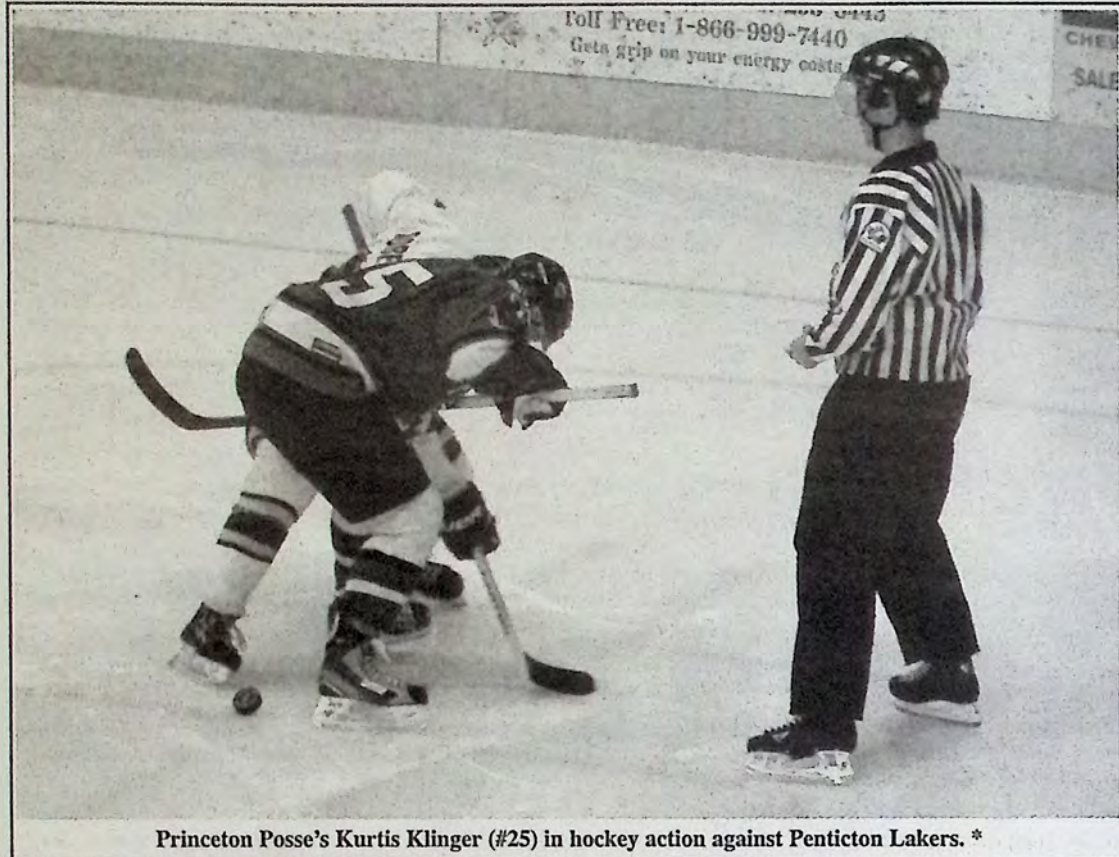

..... continued from Page 4 IARC (May, 2011), Dr. Samet stated the Group 2B classification of a possible carcinogen caused by radio frequency electromagnetic fields (EMF) has broad application to any source utilizing this EMF, i.e. including cell phone towers.

Dr. Andrew Goldsworthy (UK) told the Parliamentary Committee [on Health: An Examination of the Potential Health Impacts of Radio Frequency Electromagnetic Radiation, 2010] that microwave radiation disrupts bird migration and "probably causes colony collapse disorder in bees."

Recent research from Europe has shown that bees exposed to EMR from cell towers made 21% less honeycomb and more than one-

third of bees, taken a half-mile from the hive, couldn't navigate back home. (Joyce Nelson, CCPA Monitor 3 - 2011)

At the Open House, I learned Hedley residents are being given a scant 30 days notice - as of October 24th - by which to register their opinions to the Telus cell tower proposal. Which effectively translates to, Telus allowing two weeks time for the 'consultative phase' - to end November 23 - as the residents of Hedley were not informed of this process until the 8th of November Open House.

Meanwhile, Industry Canada, the authorizing body for the construction of the tower, states 'the consultation process should be concluded within 120 days.' Upon

inquiry to Standard Land Co. Inc. - Telus' representative at the Open House - I was informed, "...we are not too concerned with the 30 day period as we remain flexible so if you have further comments please send them along."

All this to say to the interested public, if you have comments you wish to address to Telus please do so,

regardless of the previously stated November 23 deadline.

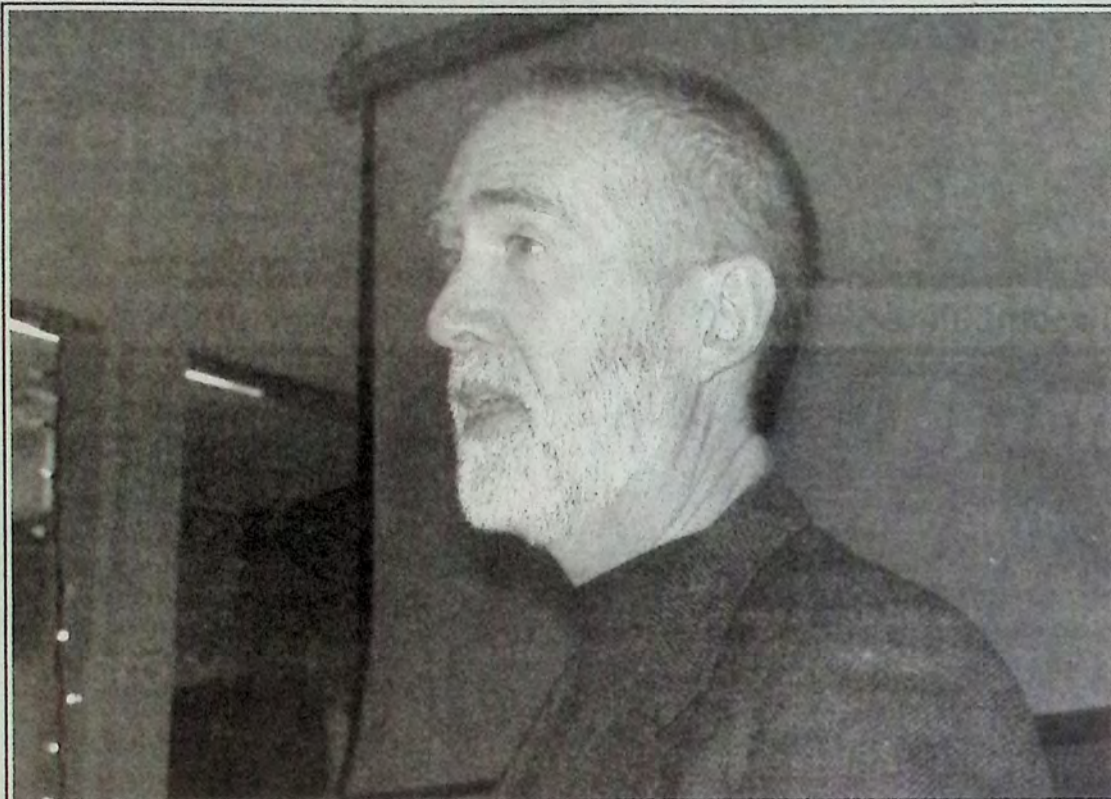

vehicles parked more than 72 hours, trailers parked unattached to a vehicle that can move it, RV units with people living in them while parked on public streets, overweight vehicles parked overnight in residentially zoned areas, unlicensed vehicles parked on public streets, garbage on sidewalks and roads and snow and ice on sidewalks.

Zoning complaints in 2012 include over height fences, building

decks or sheds within setbacks, lack of intersection clearance due to fences or trees/shrubs, use of shipping containers for residential and commercial storage and campers, motor homes and travel trailers being used as dwellings on residential and industrial zoned properties.

Palmar also reports there have been complaints regarding water restrictions, such as watering on the wrong day or at the wrong time of day as well as air pollution complaints during municipal fire bans.

## December starts with light-up

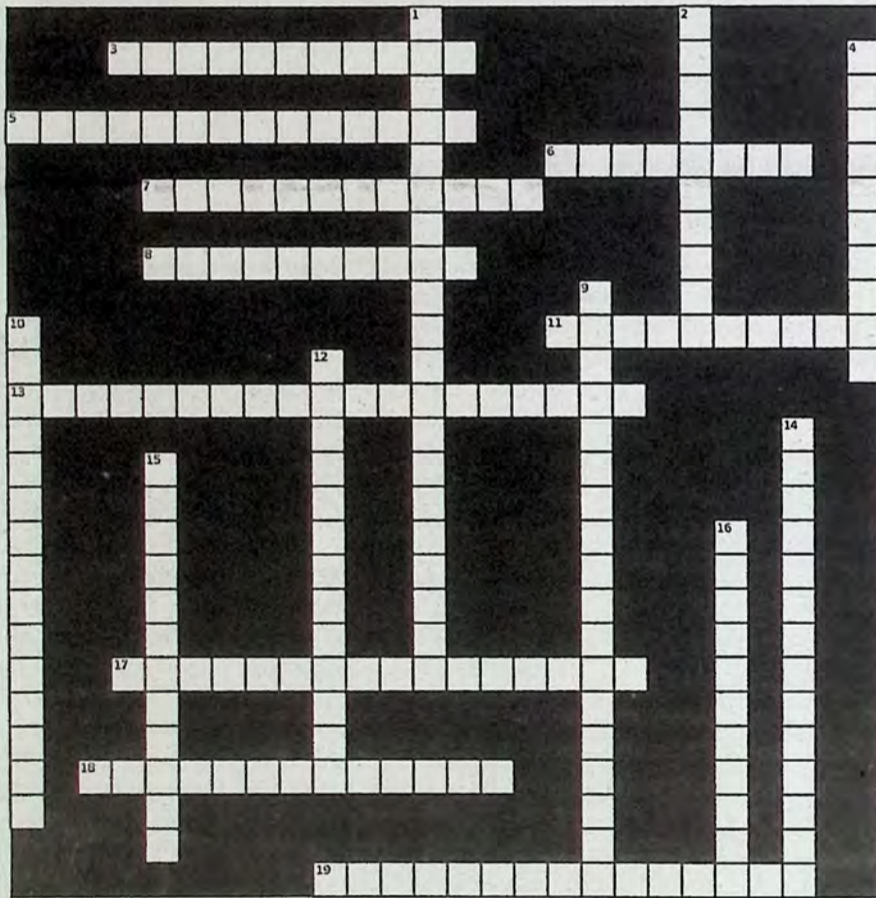

## Community Forum attracts residents

Close to 40 Princeton and area residents attended a community forum November 14th at Princeton Legion Hall.

The event, hosted by BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko, allowed residents an opportunity to hear from all elected officials in the area and to ask questions related to local concerns.

Princeton Mayor Frank Armitage described the relatively new Town Council as being energetic and a good team.

"There's no holding back, we want the best for our community."

Armitage pointed to a series of strategic planning meetings attended by council as giving the municipal elected officials focus and direction.

"We are also trying to have an open door policy that we don't just talk about, we actually do."

He said no resident should be afraid to ask questions of their town council or staff, "as taxpayers you deserve answers."

Ed Staples, Vice President of the Save Our Hospital Coalition, explained his group was formed in April to primarily address concerns related to scheduled service closures at Princeton hospital.

The SOHC has since become a member of the BC Health Coalition and in doing so is using the principles of the Canada Health Act as a platform.

"Public health care is affordable and sustainable," Staples said.

"Privatization of health care services is what we can't afford."

He says research is essential in creating sustainable health care in rural BC and the SOHC is currently working on developing a health care model for Princeton with the ultimate goal of equal access to health care for all citizens.

Fraser-Nicola MLA Harry Lali says he has been faced with a lot of issues in his riding this year ranging from school and mill closures to mine and ER closures.

"I know people in this community are mad at the health authority," Lali stated but explained the problem originates from the amount of funding provided to IHA from the Ministry of Health.

"It's sort of a game of ping pong."

Lali pointed to the main problem as being priorities saying that when services are reduced doctors find it difficult to live in those areas, as they can't use all the skills they went to medical school to learn.

Solana Allison, Chair of Save Our Similkameen, focused on the local health care situation.

"A hospital is the anchor of any community," she said.

SOS, which has existed for a number of years, jumped into the health care issue last April and has been working very hard on trying to find a solution to the problem.

A Stakeholders Group has been formed to assist SOS with their ongoing work.

Allison says policy is the main

problem, which revolves around centralization of services, and that there are currently 148 municipalities in the province with cuts to health care services.

The focus for SOS has shifted slightly from the beginning to, "honing in on doctor attraction and retention" and Allison says there has been some progress made in that direction.

Information packages and a video highlighting features and lifestyle choices in the Princeton area have been produced and are being distributed to doctor conventions across the country and will continue to be for as long as is required.

Area H Director Brad Hope added, "We need to get this ER open and working."

Hope is encouraged by the many efforts being made on the matter.

"I feel really, really good about Princeton."

He says he has been busy with a Similkameen Watershed Study, which will be looking at climate change, and how it will affect the Similkameen River and residents in the region.

He also attends a lot of meeting of the various communities in Area H and finds there are many different "flavours" in the district.

For example, residents of the Tulameen area are interested in ATV and snowmobile use where Allison Lake residents are focusing more on walking trails in their area.

"Each community has its different character," Hope explained.

"But we are all one big family."

Hope says the average age in Area H is over 55 and that 66% of residents are seasonal.

A variety of questions were asked from the audience, with most of them touching on health care services in the region.

### Council Priorities for 2012 -2013

For our municipality to make progress there has to be a clear set of goals and priorities. For local governments, the agenda can change quickly as issues come and go in the community. The town recently had a bi-election which resulted in a new Mayor and a new Councillor, making it necessary to undertake a Priority Setting exercise. Council needed to determine which goals and objectives will be acted upon during the remainder of their term. Council has set the following priorities with the expectation that regular progress reports will be provided on the status of each of these priorities.

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: (Supporting Health Care)

- Advocate for health care services for the Town of Princeton
- Lobby and participate in working groups for 24/7 Emergency Room Services
- Actively support and assist with physician recruitment and locum recruitment

### FINANCIAL GOVERNANCE:

- Explore and increase local government revenue sources to offset increasing infrastructure expenditures
- Looking at marketing opportunities to sell Industrial Park lots.

### LAND USE PLANNING:

- Development of a new Zoning

Bylaw that will regulate land use to achieve long range direction set out in the Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 808, 2008

- Focus on objectives for sustainability and innovation that will provide the most benefit for the Town.
- Look at opportunities to reduce Green House Gas emissions, improve water and air quality through revisions to the Zoning Bylaw

### PARKS, RECREATION AND CULTURE:

- Develop a long range Strategic Planning document that will help with the management and development of parks and recreation services over the next 10 years
- Focus on identifying needs, opportunities and priorities
- Ensure community input is incorporated in the process

### CIVIC INFRASTRUCTURE: (Courthouse)

- Investigate the structural integrity of the municipally owned "Courthouse Building"
- Explore the functionality of the Courthouse building as a Town Hall office
- Renovate the building to present building code standards, keeping with the historic theme of the building

### MAPPING INFRASTRUCTURE:

- Develop Geographic Information System (G.I.S.) mapping of the

Town's infrastructure; water, sewer and storm water. This will improve the day to day maintenance and reduce costs associated with operating the Town's underground infrastructure.

- Develop G.I.S. for mapping of the Town's Cemetery.




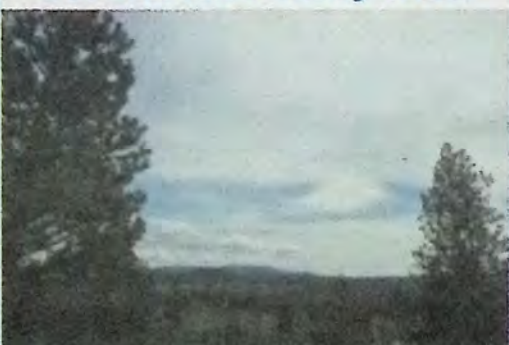
