## Council okays new snow removal policy

The Town of Princeton has a new snow removal policy adopted November 19. The policy contains two important changes. The first is this: when there is up to or more than 150 mm. of snow on Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue, snow removal will begin at 5:00 AM. No cars may be parked on those streets between 11:00 PM and 8:00 AM.

The second major change is a ban on throwing or blowing snow from the sidewalk into the middle of the street on any street or road within Town boundaries. Residents having a sidewalk in front of their property

must remove snow from those sidewalks, but the snow is to remain at the edge of the street. Violation of this new regulation will result in a \$100 fine.

General snow removal will begin at 5:00 AM in all areas and will continue until all routes are clear. School routes and emergency routes will have priority as always. In a major snow event, residents of side streets can expect a delay of a few hours before the snow is removed.

The new policy on parking was adopted, and contains numerous ..... continued on Page 21

## Local crime continues decline

Sgt. Dave Clare attended the November 19 Town Council meeting to report on RCMP activity for the third quarter. Crime rates continue to be lower or the same as last year, with rates showing a decrease of 17 to 88 percent. The only crimes showing an increase were thefts from vehicles, with a 60 percent increase over last year. Unlocked vehicles are a target for thieves.

RCMP investigated seven drug offences, of which four were simple possession. One major grow operation proved to be connected to organized crime. Officers continue to target street level trafficking. Crystal meth and crack cocaine are an ongoing problem in the

Princeton area.

Drivers under the influence of alcohol continue to be a problem. Thirteen offences were filed, with 10 receiving 90 day roadside prohibitions.

Officers continue to monitor school zone vehicle speeds during peak periods.

Sgt. Clare had a lot of praise for the excellent conduct of Tulameen Family Days. During that event, officers conducted marine patrols on Otter Lake. Sgt. Clare stated it was the best year for Tulameen's celebration.

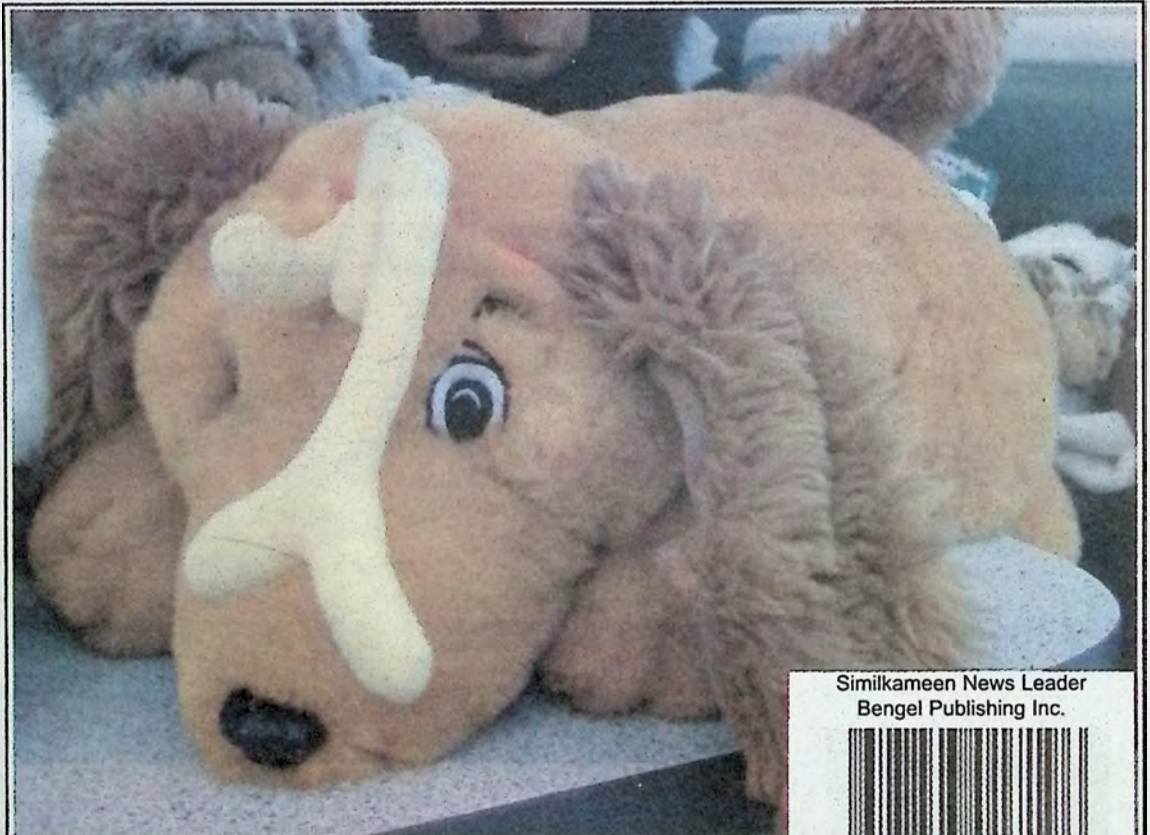
All of the officers in the local detachment are involved in community events. They support the Posse hockey team and Princeton Minor Hockey Association, Brownies, Ground Search and Rescue, the swim club and the figure skating club.

The detachment members maintain a Community Consultative Group and Sgt. Clare participates in

Highway 3 Corridor Liaison in partnership with ICBC, Traffic Services, the coroner service and MOT. A

Restorative Justice Program is small but effective and has proven to be an asset to the community. Citizens on

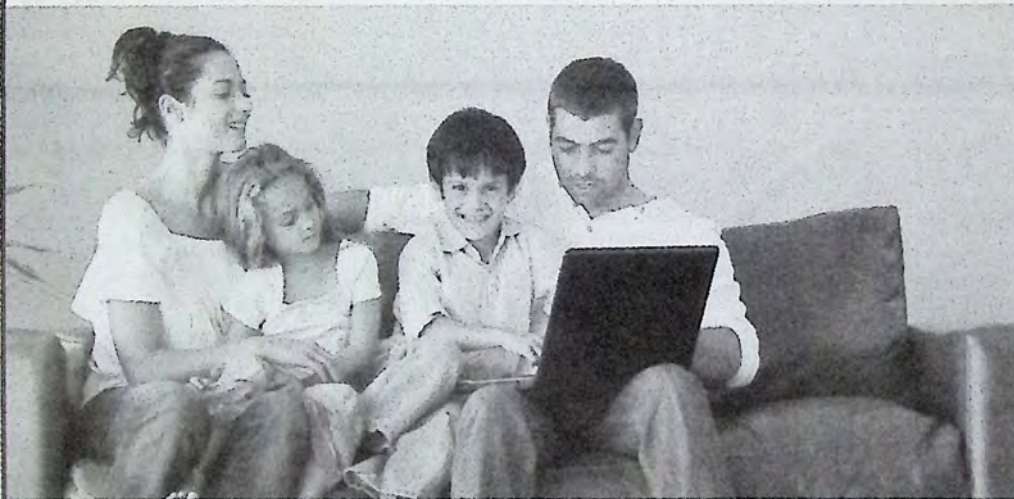

## Doctor signs Princeton contract

The annual fee is \$300, but the Christmas Store is open for just one month.

rent tables to home based businesses at a rate of \$20 per table for non-members of Chamber and \$15 per table for Chamber members. It is the intent to encourage people to shop locally as well as give local businesses some needed exposure. The store will close on December 22.

# Flip Of The Coyne

I just love it when I get those cold calls from telemarketers. They annoy me especially when they keep calling day after day and won't

take me off their call list. I am not a big fan of cold calls of any kind, especially from companies that I do business with. Every time I receive

a cold call from a company or bank that I do business with, it makes me want to do less business with them. It really does. The way I see it is if I

wanted to hear from your business, I would come and visit you or check out your website. The only real exception to this rule is if I give the company my email address. If I give you my email address, then I expect to hear from you.

I am always suspicious of telemarketers and cold calls. Are these calls legitimate? Are they really from who they say? I am sure we have all received the phone call with the boat horn and the voice trying to get us to buy a cruise trip to someplace tropical. Is this call even from a legitimate company? I have no idea but I am not about to go for it. Just today I got a phone call from someone claiming to be from the Windows Technical Department. The man on the phone claimed to be calling about my computer. I couldn't help but laugh and say, "You're calling about my computer?" Firstly, any computer problem I had would have to be pretty bad to make me call Microsoft for help and secondly, I very much doubt that Microsoft ever cold calls people to troubleshoot possible technical issues people are having with their product. Needless to say, when I said he wasn't who he claimed to be, he promptly hung up.

Even before I talked to the guy on the phone there were some warning flags that made me suspicious about the call. First, the number came up as unavailable on my call display. This is not a big deal, except that if you are calling from a reputable company, you don't usually block your number unless you are trying to protect your workers. The second flag came up when I picked up the phone. I heard a ringing on the caller's end. This means my call was being transferred. Once the guy picked up, there were a few more flags, one being that the guy never gave me his name. He had just stated he was from Windows Technical Department, and of course the other flag was that I never called Microsoft for any sort of support, and thirdly, Windows is actually Microsoft Windows, not just Windows, so if someone was calling on behalf of Microsoft, he would have identified himself as being from Microsoft, not just Windows.

The bottom line in this case is this: if you never called Microsoft for technical support, the person on the other end is not from Microsoft. I ..... continued on Page 22

### ARE YOU BEAR AWARE?

Is your carelessness threatening the safety of your family and neighbours?

Bears in pursuit of an easy meal may damage property, break and enter a home or, in rare cases cause injury to people.

Tips for bear-proofing your home

Garbage:

- Store garbage in a secure garage, shed or outbuilding until pick-up day.
- If you do not have a secure building, consider purchasing a bear-resistant household container.
- Ensure bins are properly sealed.
- Wash and clean cans and jars and recycle where appropriate.
- Freeze pungent wastes until pick-up day.
- Don't throw cooking oil or grease outside.
- Never leave garbage bags, regardless of what's in them, in your yard.
- Don't leave food or garbage in the back of pick-up trucks-not even one with a canopy.

### GRANTS IN AID

To support non-profit organizations and agencies that provide programs and services that serves, benefits and/or adds value to the community.

POLICY:

That Council allocates annually a finite sum of money through the Town of Princeton budget for Grants in Aid, up to a maximum of \$10,000 per individual application request.

Applications for Grants in Aid are to be received no later than January 31st of each year in which the grant will be used.

Mayor and Council, as part of the annual Town of Princeton budget process, will review and assess Grant in Aid requests by April 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.

### FIRE SAFETY REMINDER

### The \$35 Question

Here's a question for you: do you jaywalk in Princeton? By definition, jaywalking is crossing a street either illegally or in a reckless manner.

The Town of Princeton has included jaywalking as one of the many 'crimes' it sets out to stop in a new set of policies put in motion at last week's Town Council meeting.

Hey, I'm all for protecting the streets and making our community safe for all of us but jaywalking?

I think someone should be looking a bit closer at enforcing rules of the road and protect those of us who occasionally use a downtown crosswalk from those reckless drivers who like to just drive down Bridge Street as if there's a time limit in place to get to the other end.

I know I'm not the only person who has been narrowly missed by vehicles while trying to legally cross Bridge Street at Fenchurch Avenue. It's examples like that that make jaywalking almost the most sensible – although obviously the safer – choice.

But beware; if you are caught jaywalking in Princeton it's going to cost you \$35.00.

To borrow a line from Corner Gas from character Hank Yarbo on the subject of jaywalking, "It's how things get done; walking as the crow flies."

It might be worth a look at the new regulations (copies available at Town Hall) so you can be familiar with what habits you currently have, such as parking too far from the curb, which may actually be a finable offence as of last week.

I have no problem with setting new policies, if they make sense.

Getting fined for jaywalking, especially in a small rural community, I think is wrong.

But it's not nearly as wrong as having to dodge reckless drivers when you're actually using a marked crosswalk downtown.

## Why We May Be Carrying More Debt

Recently, an agency that monitors household debt expressed a lot of concern over the fact that we Canadians have gone deeper into debt during the past year. Consumer debt is measured, not mortgages. It seems more of us have gone into debt for new cars in 2012, and I wonder if this is a reflection of the higher cost of gasoline.

There are other factors playing into the role of debt for Canadians. First, the increasing costs of just about everything, but especially the rise in the cost of groceries. I see it in not just food, but every other product purchased at a grocery store. This may be another aspect of increased cost of transportation.

There is a psychological aspect to going deeper into debt: we want to keep up our standard of living. Right now, Canada's standard of living may be a little less, but it is certainly not climbing. Everybody would love to improve their standard of living, but what do you do to improve it if wages are not increasing? What if you are among

the thousands of Canadians who have lost their jobs during the past three years? What if you are just out of post-secondary school and cannot find a decent job, and you have student loans to pay?

Saying Canadians are going deeper into personal debt does nothing to present a solution to the problem. Saying it does not fully explain why well-educated people are out of work, nor why food banks have growing numbers of people who cannot make it from one month to the next without some sort of assistance.

In every city and town in every province, there are people looking for work. I have no doubt many of these people have debts to pay. At the same time, our federal government has chosen to lay off thousands of employees, as if a civil servant is not a legitimate employee. To do this, the government is cutting services to Canadians while adding to the number of unemployed and giving corporations big tax breaks.

There is another aspect to our situation that astonished many people who watched the news ten days ago. Our province went to California to hire skilled construction workers.

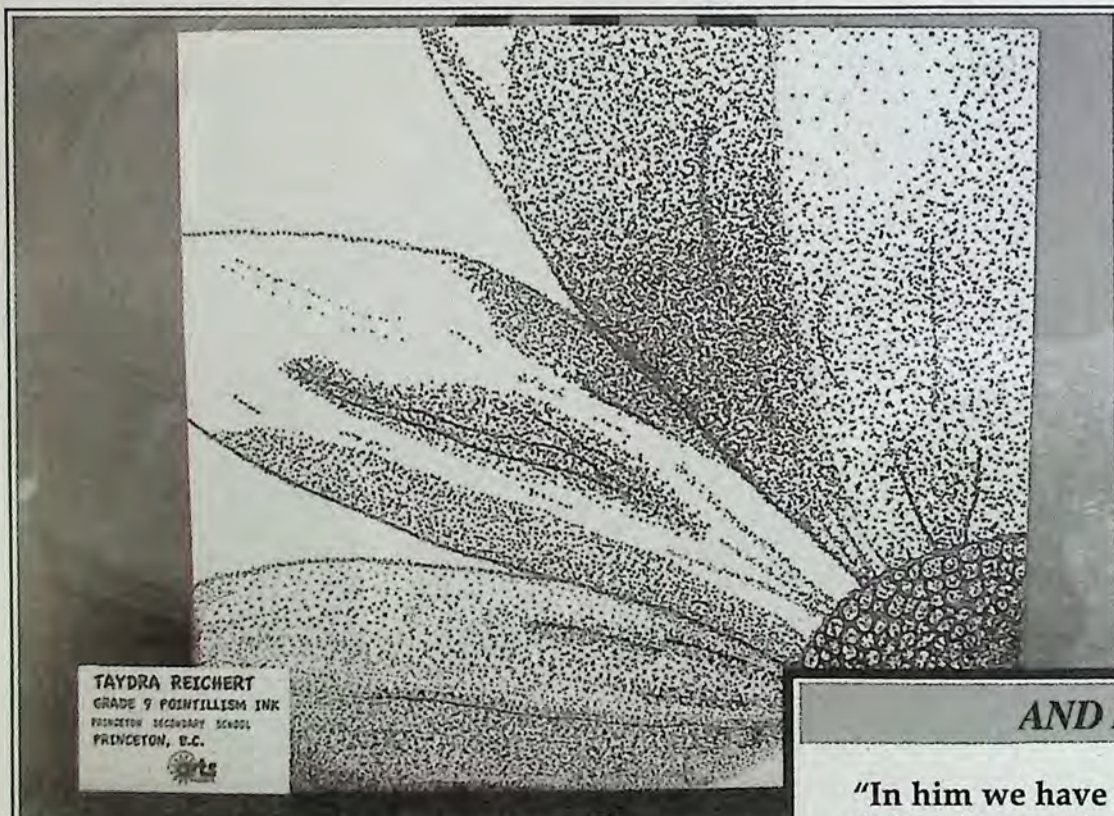
Why? The story is that we do not have enough skilled construction workers here. The reason we do not is supposed to be because the baby boomers are going to retire, but I know part of the reason is that we have not given enough training to our own young citizens to fill the gaps. This shortage was forecast long ago, at least 20 years ago, but our governments, both federal and provincial, and the industries in our

country, did not make an effort to train our young people. On the contrary, these governments were pushing high-tech training, the wave of the future, forgetting there are hundreds of jobs where people still have to get their hands and boots dirty.

I have worked for government, and I have been an entrepreneur. I have been on boards of management, too, and there seems to be some kind of myth out there that government spending has to be reduced in order to save the country, and individual Canadians have to pay all of their debts in order to save themselves.

Frankly, I see government spending as part of the spending of every Canadian, whether business owners or employees or government workers. All of us pay taxes in one way or another, and we Canadians are paying more taxes than ever for fewer services. At the same time, our government bailed out banks, and when we pay down our credit cards, we are bailing out banks, too. When we make our car payments, we are bailing out banks. All credit is backed by some bank somewhere, and banks are still making a profit.

Yes, I am sure there is reason to be concerned about the household debt of Canadians, but do not tell me this without telling me how we solve many of the other problems that make debt the alternative to tightening our belts. Tell me how we make more Canadians employed in good jobs so they can pay cash. Tell me how we can reduce the number of people using food banks. Tell me solutions along with the problems!

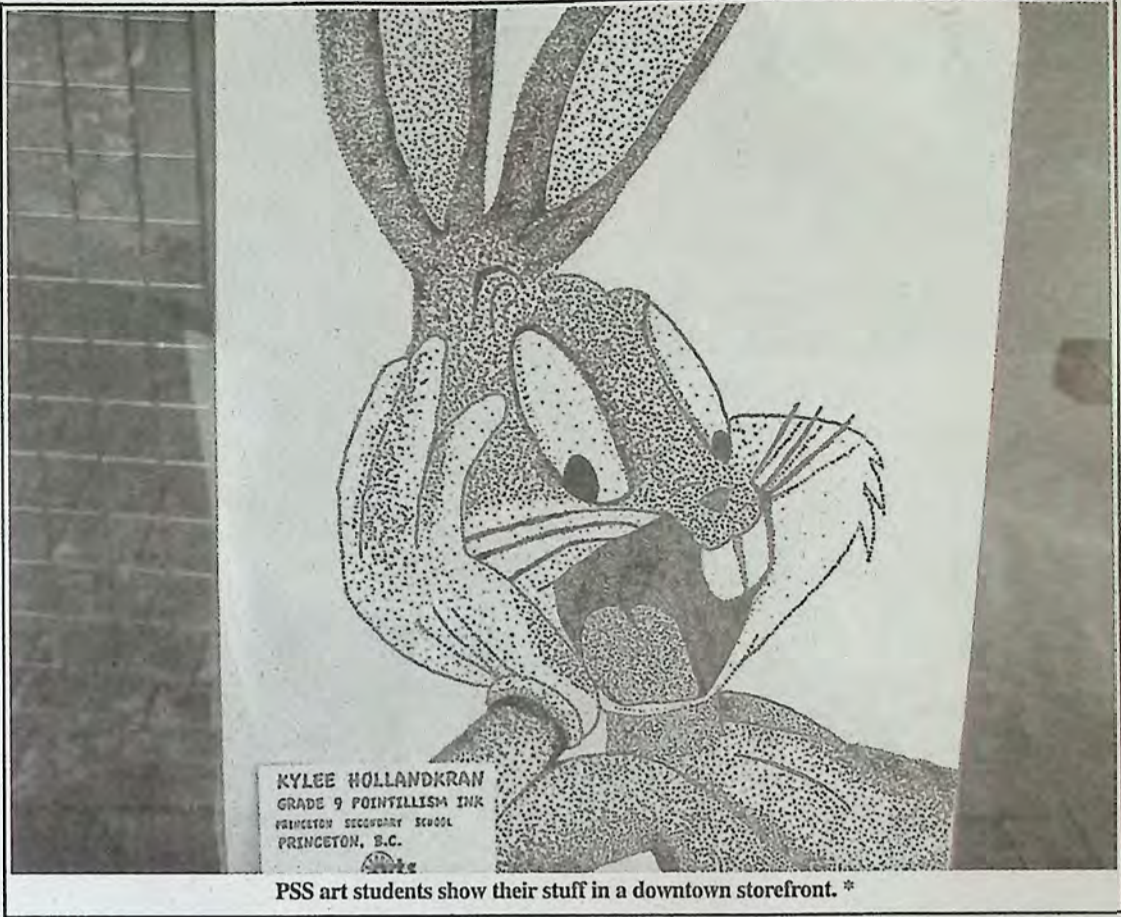

**Men, Protect Your Prostate**

November is the month of mustaches grown to remind us of how many men die of prostate cancer. Formerly hidden in a wall of silence because men do not like to talk openly about such personal male illnesses, Movember has brought prostate cancer into public view. There was a myth that prostate cancer was an old man's disease, but young men can be afflicted, too, and should be checked annually or at the first sign of difficulty.

One of the ways to prevent prostate cancer is to eat tomatoes frequently. Tomatoes contain a substance called lycopene which acts to prevent prostate cancer. However, not just any tomatoes will do, the tomatoes must be cooked! Dishes such as spaghetti, chili con carne, lasagna and pizza are excellent sources of lycopene. Whole cooked tomatoes served as a side dish are excellent. Tomato soup is a great source of lycopene. A man should eat any of these dishes at least three times a week.

Many men suffer from prostate problems long before they are considered 'old'. Zinc is essential for prostate health, and 80 mg. daily can be taken as a supplement. Brewer's yeast and pumpkin seeds are helpful. A calcium plus magnesium supplement can be helpful, along with essential fatty acids.

To protect the prostate, there are four things men should avoid: riding a bicycle, exposure to very cold weather, eating refined carbohydrates (such as sugar, white flour products) and alcohol. Avoiding tea and coffee are helpful.

A man who has had a vasectomy is three times more likely to have prostate problems.

We are looking forward to seeing you for one of these great performances. Please come out and support our local community theatre.



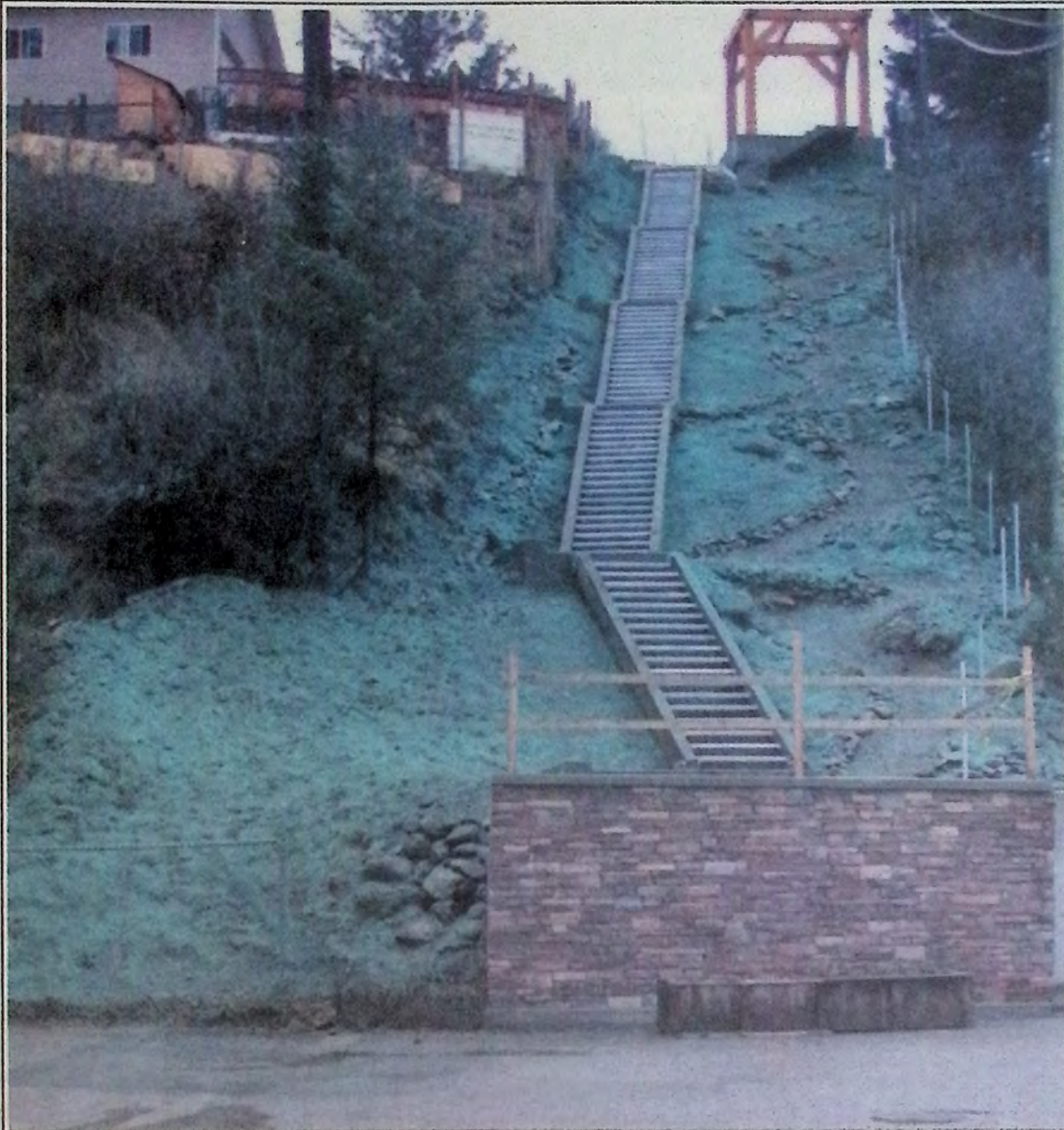

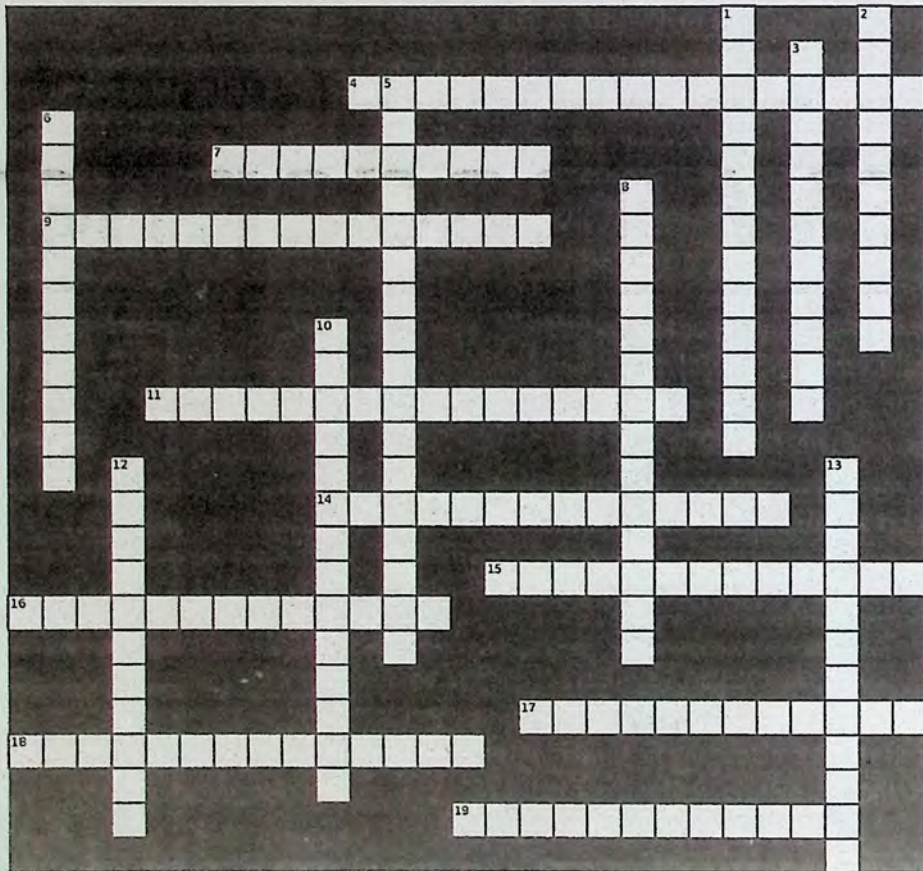



If you receive this phone call or any phone call that makes you suspicious, hang up. Never give out any personal information over the phone to anyone who cold calls you, and remember, if it seems too good to be true, then it probably is. Unfortunately we live in a world where people are constantly trying to scam you. They do this in many ways, from emails about being a friend stranded overseas and needing money to get home, to a phone call phishing for information to steal your identity or take your money. If you didn't ask for the phone call, you don't have to talk to the person on the line. Hang up. You are better safe than sorry.
